■ Are television stations necessary?

That question could be the sub-

ject of national debate in a few years.

■ We do need the stations now, if only to take signals relayed from station or network cameras and transmit them to our homes. Whether we finally receive those signals through our roof-top antenna or by wire from a CATV system, the stations are necessary. We couldn't have TV without them.


Soon this will not be true. It will be possible to send a program from anywhere on earth to a satellite and from the satellite either directly to our homes or to a central receiving point which will send the signals to our homes by wire. This is possible now. All we need is equipment.

■ Satellite-to-home television is especially interesting to the military, scientists and industrialists who covet the space in the radio spectrum now occupied by TV. They point out that one channel takes up six times as much spectrum as all of AM radio.

By-passing of local stations could come about only if local stations had nothing to offer their communities but physical facilities. Most stations, however, are intrinsic elements of their communities. They broadcast local news and entertainment, are active in charities and civic projects. They fully justify their licenses to operate in the "public interest, convenience and necessity." In this they could never be replaced by equipment, however efficient, which would broadcast from satellite to home.

■ Still, there are a few stations which look upon their three-year licenses as permanent franchises. They refuse to carry controversial network programs, they all but ignore community affairs, and they offer few if any local shows.

These stations will find it hard to justify their existence when they are no longer physically necessary to TV.

What the hippies think of the square box

When they're not going up, up . . . and away in their beautiful balloons, you can find them in such hippie heavens as San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury or Manhattan's East Village. The press has labeled them Flower People, the Underground or the Subculture; they themselves prefer hippies or free men (the "narco" squads are not very enlightened and still pin that old "drug addicts" tag on them).

No matter what they're called, today's grass generation are as one when it comes to what turns them on: pot, peace, altruism, sex, freedom and psychedelics. There are no ifs, ands or buts about what turns them off either. You can lump in there just about anything "straight" society has to offer, right from "LBJ and his boys" to buttoned-down collars. And right at the tippity-top of hippie hates, you'd suppose, is that chatty champion of middle-class values itself -the TeeVee. It seemed safe to assume that whatever the beflowered sons and daughters of Grand Guru Timothy Leary were tuned in to, it wasn't apt to be The Big Bad Box.

Oh, no?

Fact is, America, the tuned-out generation is as tuned in to TV as Ernest Establishment and Company. True, most of their reasons for turning on the set probably won't make much sense to you if the only kind of pot you use is a kettle. Still, there's an awful lot of plain old straight-type watching going on in Hippiedom too. We came by this intelligence by combing through a horde of hippie pads (where a writer often has the option of taking off his jacket or all his clothes) and interviewing Undergrounders ranging from spokesmen such as poet-writer-musician Ed Sanders of The Fugs, a singing group, to hippie rank-and-filers like Richie (he's dropped his last name), a former Ashbury-based Digger (Diggers are sort of the Salvation Army of Hippieland). And although the majority of Undergrounders "freaked out" with everything from acid to Buddhism, all agreed that the boob tube was the groove tube.

"TV is groovy, man, hypnotic," says lead "Fug" Ed Sanders, blithely bouncing his naked 2-year-old daughter on his knee. "It's part of life-like toothpaste and cancer." Psychedelic poster-maker Peter Max thinks likewise. Max, who's all hung-up on yoga, has a Swami-eye view of TV, sees it as "almost spiritual." Ken Weaver. also of The Fugs, is similarly smitten, in a more earthbound way, "I watch TV all the time," says Weaver, whose TV-listings-strewn pad seems to bear him out. "I watch movies all night, and at 6 A.M. I start the day with Modern Farmer, That's groovy

-all about cattle diseases." Lastly, Village Voice staffer Don McNeill thinks TV is a "fantastic medium. You can find out where America's really at by watching TV." But if you're at all tuned in to the Hippie Manifesto-well, the TeeVee should be

a bad trip, man.

Why bad? Well, just for starters, TV news shows and documentaries generally don't present a rosy picture of hippie life. Moreover, documentaries such as Harry Reasoner's "The Hippie Temptation" harp on the fact that the drug trail to Nirvana is a mighty risky route. But most heads, it seems, take a convenient head-in-the-sand stand when it comes to things like damaged chromosomes, and TV shots of hippies in psychiatric wards don't appear to bother the Undergrounders much, "We always get a bad press," shrugs East Village Other writer D. A. Latimer, "the 'Hippies-are-outto-attack-vour-grandmother' kind of thing, it never bothered us."

Writer Don McNeill thinks some hippies should play peek-a-boo with TV permanently. Says he: "TV can ruin you. There was a hippie named Galahad, a nice guy, but he didn't have very much on the ball, you know? The press discovered he had a pad where hippies could crash [sleep] and the Times did a full-page spread on him. And fashion magazines wanted to do fashion spreads. It blew the guv's ego all out of proportion."

Overexposed hippies notwithstanding, the Underground isn't particularly unhappy about TV's opinion of them. And as uppity as they can get about the Establishment's hang-up with things like possessions, hippies don't appear troubled by all the possessionpeddling that goes on on TV-the commercials. They often dig the commercials more than the programs. For a couple of reasons, they say. Our boy Richie ventures it's because the Underground is on to the hucksters' hoaxy ways. Asks he: "Do they think some giant hand coming out of a washing machine makes us think that the soap's any better? Suds are suds, man." But Modern Farmer fan Ken Weaver has the most probable reason why hippies find commercials so easy to take. Says Weaver: "When you're stoned you don't get so mad at them. Even the soap commercials. You figure, what the hell; soap's to wash dirty clothes, man. They can't make that romantic."

Actually, to play these mind-blowing games, pot isn't always a must. "One of the grooviest ways to watch TV," says Ed Sanders, "is to turn on a series like Gunsmoke, turn the sound off and put on a Beatles or, better still, a Fugs record." What have you got? "Free mixed media," ->

Sanders says, "—and you don't have to pay \$4.50 to get into The Electric Circus." But if grass is handy, avers artist Peter Max, free mixed media is really dandy. "You've got yourself a self-produced show," Max says. "It's grand. The visual sense is pleased by the screen, the aural by the records, the physical by the couch or whatever you're on, while the taste buds are satisfied by whatever you're smoking."

According to EVO writer D.A. Latimer, you shouldn't let that stop you because something "groovy" called "synaesthesia" might just happen. Says Latimer: "Synaesthesia changes color into sound and sound into taste. Like, to me, Walter Cronkite's voice tastes like borscht. To someone else it might taste like liverwurst. Of course, synaesthesia doesn't make much sense if

you're straight."

No, it certainly doesn't. But to get back to ordinary viewing, there's another part of TV programming one would expect the hippies to switch off in droves: violence. Yet the Underground, militant pacifists all, seem to take televised killing in stride. Ed Sanders equates TV violence with "the Roman gladiators and the bullfights. People are afraid of death," he continues, "and, like the Daily News, TV caters to fear. If people want it, I say slap it to them. I'm democratic."


"Hippies aren't particularly antiviolence," says Don McNeill. "Most aren't put off by it." And although Sanders semiseriously speculates that the next step in TV violence might be "The U.S. Steel Hour presenting a napalm raid in Vietnam—live," the Undergrounders generally don't consider TV gore taboo.

Which just about wraps up our tour of tube-grooving hippies. And from all we've seen and heard, it seems probable that Timmy Leary's turned-on apostles are, indeed, tuned in to TV—between occasional trips to Oz, any-

way. Yet knowing the Underground's penchant for putting-on the straight world (the banana-smoking business was probably the most successful puton to date), we wondered a bit if we'd been had. A little, probably. After the long chat with Sanders, for instance, he confessed he "didn't own a TV." adding, "I'm waiting for a riot so I can steal one from the store next-door." But from all we can make out, we have to go along with a serious Sanders, who says: "Young Hippies aren't going to put down TV. It's like going to church for them. They're products of the middle class. Their parents have made sure they can plug back in whenever they want to. They can plug back into the Long Island railroad. the commuter card or TV. Those who haven't already plugged back in will do so eventually. They'll go back to Jersey and marry the dentist. The only difference is that they'll turn the dentist on to grass."

Will today's Undergrounders and, presumably, tomorrow's suburbanites have much of an effect on future TV? They are, after all, part of the supposedly awesome, up-and-coming "Under 25" generation we've all heard so much about. Most, like Sanders, think so. Says he: "TV is one generation behind. Today's kids will have a lot of power—and they're not going to be buying a lot of what's on TV."

What kind of television programming will they be buying? The Undergrounders—being inordinately vague about most things except the physical here and now—don't know for sure. But Peter Max, probably because he sees things in mystical ways, had a pretty prophesy, so we'll leave you with that. Says Max: "TV will become greatly sophisticated. We'll have beautiful pictures on our screens, esthetically pleasing images conducive to calm, happy, serene living. TV will reach a state of ecstasy."


Hope Lang and Anne Jackson, as shot by David Wayne (seen in mirror).



Some timely advice for maintaining the peace—and even a little quiet—on Thanksgiving Day

Ever since the television set became a fixture in the home, self-anointed intellectuals have been denouncing it for killing the art of conversation.

What art?

What conversation!

Some intellectuals.

The incontrovertible truth is that TV is the greatest boon to family harmony since the introduction of the second bathroom, and a vigorous defense of this marvelous force for

domestic tranquility is long overdue. I mean the rapport TV has brought to family gatherings, especially during the holiday season that is rapidly approaching like a thundercloud.

Frank Sullivan, one of the last satirists in the Mark Twain tradition, is celebrated for the invention of Mr. Arbuthnot, the cliché expert. Much as I hate to disparage the creativity of a fellow artist with a good shtick going for him, anyone with a

sensitive ear in his head is aware that Sullivan did not dream up Mr. Arbuthnot. He sat in a corner at family reunions and recorded the dopey remarks and banal observations of relatives acquired through accidents of birth and the perils of marriage.

Pseudointellectuals have never forgiven TV for stealing the captive audiences they once held at family affairs, the only place where they could get away with fraudulent claims of omniscience. There's one in every family, an opinionated loudmouth determined to impress one and all with his garbled misinformation. By no stretch of tolerance can these harangues be called conversations, which, by definition, are friendly exchanges of ideas. The pseudointellectual turns as waspish and insulting as a jealous woman when someone tries to share the floor with him

A recent article in the Saturday Review, the pseudoeggheads' favorite house organ, bemoaned the "conversation gap" which it blamed on TV. The piece was intended to alert the Republic to the tube's insidious sabotage of our priceless mental resources, but it brought back to me the fine, warm glow of last Thanksgiving. It was the happiest I have known in 30 years, even though I was the host for an annual family dinner which always is a nonstop cocktail party surrounded fore and aft by lunches and late snacks that could feed all the starving Armenians in Anatolia for a month.

Don't get me wrong. My relatives are no worse than anybody else's free-loaders. Maybe a little more gluttonous, but I won't dwell on that just because I'm cheap. What drove me out of my skull was their indefatigable efforts to bridge the conversation gap, until I discovered how to avoid talking to my guests save for such pleasantries as "Geez, you

sure can hold my liquor."

I rented a portable color set to backstop my black-and-white box. To paraphrase the Wrigley jingle, double your TV receivers, double your trouble relievers. Although the house was raucous with commercials for 14 hours, the racket was soothing compared to the incessant yakking and bragging of birdbrains on her side of the family who make more money than I do.

Everyone who has been stuck with a motley collection-and I'm not groping for words-of relatives knows the trick is to create a community of interest that will keep them from each others' throats. Little kids are easy. You buy quadruplicates of toys so that a child who has been spoiled rotten does not feel rejected if another rotten kid has something he wants. Slightly bigger kids are not hard to please. You give them \$3 apiece for a neighborhood movie and refreshments to keep up their strength. Adolescents are more difficult. With all the permissiveness going on, you can't reason with them by saying, "If you don't shut your contemptible mouth I will raise lumps on your head." They may hit back and maim you with a karate chop, which seems to be their academic major in school.

The real problem, though, is the male adults. Women provide their own entertainment cutting up absent friends, and it is dangerous for an innocent bystander to intrude upon their pleasure. Men demand more attention, particularly bar service, to keep their natural aggressiveness under control. The beauty part of TV is that it unites them in criticism of the show they're watching. Their hostility is diverted from the host to the performers on the screen.

Now it is only fair to warn the inexperienced of certain hazards in using color TV as a buffer against a plague of relatives. The networks → competing for the home audience are loading holiday schedules with so many morning attractions that people come early and turn a dinner invitation into an all-day chomping and guzzling marathon. On balance, though, the emotional wear and tear saved by TV more than compensates for the extra cost, even though it may be necessary to visit your friendly neighborhood Shylock to pay the bills.

When I first became the patsy for a Family Tradition, it was a modest project involving only nine people. Through a process that is not confined to birds, bees and rabbits, my groaning board now is stormed by 22 to 34 freeloaders, a number that fluctuates with the blood feuds going on at any given time. However, the prospect of living it up off the fathead of the land invariably effects remarkable reconciliations. The weather in the Northeast often is foul this time of year, but my moochers have driven 200 miles through blizzards to keep alive the tradition that half-killed me before I found deliverance in TV.

The Thanksgiving specials last year began at 10 A.M. (EST), with the annual Macy Parade on NBC and CBS's competing "Thanksgiving Day Jubilee," showing the quaint tribal customs of the natives in New York, Detroit and Toronto. Dragging Toronto into the act was a snide trick purposely plotted to confound me.

My wife's family comes from Toronto and she remembers that when she was a child—a formidable feat of total recall—Thanksgiving was commemorated in Canada on Nov. 11 to mark the end of World War I, like our Armistice Day. Canadians who have been searching for national identity can count on my support of a campaign to protest the debasing American influence on Canadian culture. Her side of the family arrived at 9 A.M. to savor every moment of pride in the city they had fled like thieves.

That meant coffee, Danish, eggs and booze, in reverse order of preference. Too soon thereafter the football contingent began to assemble for nine hours of continuous action and drinking. The Detroit Lions annually play a game on Thanksgiving starting at 11 A.M., local time. The explanation for this ungodly hour is that it enables fans to get home in time for an early Thanksgiving dinner, but the baldfaced lie doesn't fool me. It is designed to give freeloaders an early start on heartburn.

Unfortunately for the Lions and me, the San Francisco 49ers ran up such a lopsided lead that my guests deserted them for dinner at 2 o'clock, but the second TV set began to pay nice dividends. Some of the kids were watching "Treasure Island," which began at 1:30, and were so enthralled they refused to come to the table.

Further benefits accrued at 3 o'clock when there were two football games on the air, Oakland vs. Buffalo on NBC and Oklahoma vs. Nebraska on ABC. It is unclear how the myth originated, but it is an enduring fallacy of American folklore that after overeating at family dinners everyone is in a torpor broken only by gentle burping. Not my family. Before TV, conversation sprouted like crab grass after a heavy rain. To be more precise. there was a relentless torrent of such pompous nonsense that even the nitwits could not let it pass unchallenged. One word led to another and the situation deteriorated into a free-forall of abusive name-calling.

A damper was put on the seething caldron of animosity by the siren call of football in livid color. My guests were so confused shuttling between the two sets to catch both games that they forgot to repay old favors with contempt. In my youth I was a sportswriter and supplied them with free tickets to games. They hung deferentially on my every pronounce-

ment; but once the passes stopped, they suddenly became experts bent on exposing my ignorance. As Shakespeare observed, how sharper than a serpent's tooth is an ungrateful free-loader. This day the camaraderie was so expansive that when unbeaten Nebraska was upset by Oklahoma in the last 48 seconds they agreed, with only one dissenting vote (mine), to watch the Dallas-Cleveland game immediately following.

Now came the acid test of the second set, the critical time when wives, tired of yelling at their rotten kids and resentful of the fun the men were having, always turned on their husbands and demanded to go home while they, the husbands, were in condition to drive. If the men missed the game, they would brood on it for weeks and decide it was my fault for running a lousy party with inferior wines at dinner. TV rose to

the emergency nobly.

A local channel in New York was showing "Divorce Italian Style" with Marcello Mastrojanni, His charm always had escaped me until he bailed me out of an impending jam with my dear wife, who would blame me, through convoluted feminine logic, for being a lousy host if our reunion wound up resembling, as usual, a snake pit. The ladies blissfully watched Mastroianni and the gents happily watched Danny Villanueva kick four field goals to win the game for Dallas. I morosely watched my dwindling liquor, stubbornly clinging to the conviction that TV opens unlimited cultural horizons.

Faith and fortitude finally were rewarded. The CBS Thursday Night Movie was "Jason and the Argonauts," a gem of a horror that cleared the joint with occasional groans and retching noises from me. As I said, TV is a wonderful instrument for serenity.

The family that watches television together stays together. Practically indefinitely.



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## The Aba Daba Honeymoon Is Over

It is an older, wiser—and perhaps sadder—Debbie Reynolds who is trying TV again

Sweetness and cuteness and light. Tammy and puppy love, hot fudge sundaes and Aba Daba Honeymoon. So they called her first TV special in 1960 "A Date with Debbie." In this medium, no matter what anybody says, the image can be the message. and this particular image fitted cozily on the family screen: the batontwirling girl scout from Burbank, so well-scrubbed she was squeaky clean. Never mind that, at 28, she was obviously more adult than adolescent, or that, as a divorcée and the mother of two children, she was presumably more sophisticated than susceptible. The movies had precast the image, and television was only following the formula in presenting her as America's favorite date, a perky teen-ager eternally destined-or doomed-to wear Levi's and loafers and, for dress up, a jingling charm bracelet.

In seven years, things change. When last seen, shortly before she began work on her newest TV special (scheduled this Sunday, Nov. 19, on ABC), Debbie Reynolds was curled up on a sofa in the living room of her beach house at Malibu, wearing no shoes, snug jewel-blue silk slacks,

a silk print blouse in shades of watermelon, plum and lime, and a diamond ring the size of an egg yolk.

Outside, beyond glass sliding doors, the Pacific Ocean crashed spectacularly on the foggy beach; inside, surrounded by elegant Spanish furniture and a tiny black poodle, Miss Reynolds lifted an eyebrow. "Was the last piece about me in TV Guide in 1960?" she murmured. "I always block those things out of my mind."

Of course, she has had lots to think about since then; her marriage to millionaire shoe magnate Harry Karl, thrice divorced and 18 years older than she, who gave her that ring (and a glittering heap of similar goodies stashed in a bank vault); and her career, which swerved sharply from the sirupy when she was given the lead in "The Unsinkable Molly Brown," a picture that won her an Academy Award nomination and a chance to play other grown-up parts, such as the wife in the recent "Divorce American Style."

Actually, she wasn't given the lead in "Molly Brown"; she won it after a full year of fighting in which her worst enemy was herself: the cloying --> "little Debbie" image that took shape when she first became a movie star via something called "I Love Melvin" and was bolstered by "Susan Slept Here," "Tammy," et al. She hollered, badgered, pestered, finally in desperation put on a night-club act in Las Vegas that convinced MGM she could do something other than pout prettily and croon simpering lyrics.

"Debbie wanted 'Molly Brown' but nobody wanted Debbie," recalls a studio staffer who has known her since the 16-year-old Mary Frances Reynolds was crowned "Miss Burbank of 1948." "She came to the movies as a little girl and they didn't accept the fact that she'd changed. Sure, she was aggressive, but hell, if you're not aggressive in this business you won't get any place. And after she got the part she really worked at it. I watched her practicing those dance numbers, sweating like a pig and ending up with blisters on her feet. She's very emphatic about what she wants and what she does; right or wrong, she does it to the hilt."

From Debbie the doll-baby to Debbie the definite in seven years? "Yes, I am definite," she said. "It's my profession to know what I'm doing. I have positive opinions, and I know my career just like you know how to write that piece.

"In television, I used to put myself entirely in the hands of writers and producers; that was a mistake. I worked three months on that 1960 special—I could have made two films in that time—and I didn't even make any money off it. I spent the entire \$350,000 on writers and creative talent and it didn't work out to my liking. It wasn't good; the talk seemed stilted and unnatural and the spontaneous moments weren't.

"The big thing I've learned since then is how to accept the talent of writers and producers and integrate it with mine. Seven years ago I had not written anything; now I write a great deal. I used to write poetry and songs and stories in school, but for all those years I hadn't used that area of my, shall we say, mind.

"I didn't have onstage experience when I did my first TV show and I evidently needed it. During the intervening time I've done my nightclub act and I've learned a lot, because the audience at a club either applauds or gets up and walks out. and you know the verdict on the material. I did my first night-club act four years ago, then, after 'Molly Brown' and 'Mary, Mary' and 'Goodbye Charlie' I did it again. I'm not sure exactly when that was; I used to relate my schedule to pregnancies but I haven't been pregnant for a while so I've become vague on when I did what. I was just on the road for six months last season, from December through May, without a day off. I was so nervous and underweight when I got home, I was a shambles. Try that sometime-wanna die?"

The question is why an exceedingly rich woman, with all that money can apparently buy, including four homes (two in Palm Springs, a Beverly Hills mansion, and the luscious six-bedroom, four-bath "getaway house" at Malibu) and three cars (a Rolls, a Cadillac and an \$18,000 sports job), would grind so hard. Her instant answer-"Because my fun in life is to do variety, either on television or in Vegas; I can express myself in an entirely different way than in motion pictures"-seems to be only part of the reason, since she later remarks. "The most insecure people, either financially or emotionally, are performers. I don't know anyone who isn't insecure." And once, in discussing her grueling drive to capture "Molly Brown," she told a writer, "I hear people in this town say 'You stink' just so long, and then I have to go out before an audience and prove to myself that I don't."





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What she calls "proving," others have called less agreeable names, and the perennial Hollywood tag, "iron butterfly," has been stuck on her more than once. It annoys Lucille Ball, a long-time Reynolds friend and fan. "Perfectionist has become a dirty word," says Lucy, an edge in her voice. "It means attention to details, and someone who can work long hours without complaining, and take a lot of punishment. There's a great gal and a big, big talent in that tiny little bundle; she's a great wife and mother and hostess; a dancer, singer, actress."

Again, the problem seems to be the image; her critics seem peeved that she has been regarded as an adorably frivolous, petite ball of fluff while actually being stern, even hard, relentless. But after a time with her, the question arises: whose problem? Apparently not hers; she speaks openly, and although she refuses to discuss Eddie Fisher, she says anything else goes. "Tm an honest, direct person; ask me anything, I'll answer."

It takes a while for the directness to filter through the chic-brittle shell molded by 19 years in show business (including a period of being publicly pilloried and, worse, pitied for having lost her husband to her former schoolmate, Elizabeth Taylor). A newspaperman who interviewed her when she was touring on behalf of "Molly Brown" remembers that "it was less a matter of giving an interview than of holding court," and says he attended a publicity party where two cast members of the movie did not get a word from her, "only a regal nod."

But regality is a hard mood to maintain on a relaxed morning at home, and the initial coolness yields to an astringent honesty ("I find myself worrying, 'Do I look as good as I did last year?'") as she discusses herself with an undefensive bluntness that resists skepticism.

"I'm a square, basically. I live in a

swinging world which I enjoy, but a lot of my beliefs are square, and a lot of people put me down for it. Part of my being a square is that I believe in God, I like to go to church, I love my country, I enjoyed 'The Sound of Music,' and I'm concerned about children—I do a lot of work for the Girl Scouts and for charities. I just know what I believe in, and I believe it; if you don't stand by your own convictions, you're a bowl of mush."

She took on the care of her husband's three children when his former wife, Marie McDonald, died two years ago. The oldest girl recently married, leaving Harrison and Tina coexisting with her own two, Todd and Carrie. There are problems: Tina and Carrie "don't get along very well," and she finds it difficult "to bring up children when you have money. Todd will say, 'Let's take the Rolls today, and I have to tell him, 'It's all right if you want to take it because it's beautiful, but not just because it's expensive.'

"How do I feel about having money? It's wonderful. When we were young we didn't have much, and my birthday present was always a can of black olives, which I loved and which were very expensive. When you have not had, and then have, you have a comparison, and you realize what a wonderful thing it is to be able to buy anything in the store. Money is not my god, but I'm very appreciative of what I have, and enjoy it."

The candor and a disdain for euphemistic evasions is refreshing but, after a morning with her, not surprising. Neither is it surprising that she has turned out to be more interesting and dimensional than the girl next door, and that she is demonstrably more peppermint than marshmallow. Ultimately, the only thing surprising about Debbie Reynolds is that, for someone who says, "I am very happy, and I have everything I would wish for," she hardly smiles at all.

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## **PBL Is Launched on Stormy Sea**

If controversy was what the Public Broadcast Laboratory sought, it was not long succeeding. Even before the Nov. 5 unveiling of the experimental Sunday night teleseries, underwritten by a \$10 million Ford Foundation grant, 23 educational stations in South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Florida got wind of what PBL was up to for openers and bolted the nationwide hookup. What PBL was up totwo and a half hours of hard slogging on white vs. black issues-even got some backs up in PBL's own camp. The project's prestigious "Editorial Advisory Board," according to reliable sources, vetoed inclusion of a 57minute off-Broadway play enacted by a white-faced Negro cast, but at the last minute permitted it to go on when PBL's determined producers threatened to walk out if forced to remove it.

Immediate reaction to the PBL opener ran the gamut from huzzahs ("A searing . . . landmark," frontpaged the Washington Post) to gloomy predictions that it had killed any chances of Congress appropriating funds to activate Public Television. Even Fred Friendly, the Ford advisor who fathered the PBL experiment and then stepped aside to give it free rein, confessed he found the racial broadside "disappointing." "And the editorial board was right," he added, saying he felt the play, lampooning a Southern town bereft of Negroes, should have been deleted. But the ex-CBS News president also defended PBL's right to err. "Wait'll next week or the week after," he argued. "They'll cover George Wallace's campaign and alienate all the *Northern* stations!"

CBS would like to come up with an original drama like "The Final War of Olly Winter" and "Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night" every month-and hopes to, ultimately, says the network's program chief, Mike Dann. But scripts of this caliber are so hard to come by that nearly all of a half-million-dollar kitty set up to buy prospective plays has been exhausted and only five found exciting enough to produce, including the aforementioned CBS Playhouse productions. The other three are booked for later this season: "Dear Friends," with David Wayne, Eli Wallach and Anne Jackson, has a Dec. 6 air date. "My Father, My Mother," starring Ralph Bellamy, will be taped next month, and "Secrets," by Tad Mosel, in January. They will both be shown in the spring. CBS and General Telephone, sponsor of the dramas "want to do more of these shows," Dann reports. CBS therefore has freshened the script kitty, he says, and will keep looking for them.

Briefly: An ABC Christmas time special, "Silent Night," dramatizing the writing of that beloved hymn with James Mason portraying composer Franz Gruber, has been taken off this year's calendar and probably will be expanded into a 90-minute special for '68—150th anniversary of the songs composition.

HEMINGWAY'S ADVENTURES OF A YOUNG MAN (NBC), Sat. Judith

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

When things get too dreary—and they can in the course of this they can in the course of this network-movie week-you can temper the cinematic or autumnal chill and, at very least, get in some vicarious surfing in Hawaii and warm your heart with some good performances. In short, there are rewards.

The rewards in "Hemingway's Adventures of a Young Man" depend on how much of a purist you are about Ernest Hemingway's autobiographical Nick Adams stories. Primarily you'll have to tolerate Richard Bevmer's callow and colorless portraval of Nick, and Susan Strasberg's saccharine attitudinizing. But beyond these, you'll find admirable performances by Arthur Kennedy, Jessica Tandy, Eli Wallach, Dan Dailey and, above all, Paul Newman as "The Battler." a punchdrunk old boxer.

"Dear Brigitte" is what's loosely called a "family" film and in this case the calling is loose indeed. Though the movie boasts such pros as James Stewart, Glynis Johns and, in bit parts, Ed Wynn and Alice Pearce, it's for the family gooed together by corn syrup. Its labored and witless script involves a music-and-art-oriented couple whose tone-deaf and colorblind 8-year-old emerges as a mathematical genius. To spice the syrup for a real taste sensation, the 8-year-old has a crush on Brigitte Bardot and he and Daddy go to France to see her. How's that for family fun?

On its first network go-round, I

described "PT 109," a kind of comicbook - version - of - history - for - slow readers account of President Kennedy's World War II exploits, as an adventure movie that would appeal to 10-year-old boys of all ages. I got a lot of objections from 10-year-old boys. I agree. Let's lower the age limit. On the other hand, adolescents (and armchair athletes) of all ages can have some fun with "Ride the Wild Surf," which offers something beyond the expected bikinis-andukuleles. The something is wavesgiant green whitecaps—and surfers in action as the tide rolls in, washing away the innocuous script and providing some exhilarating excitement.

The TV-movies-TV cycle is completed with the telecasting of "Around the World Under the Sea," which is strictly for those who want to see their TV true-loves in more silly situations than regular programming provides. Brian Kelly of Flipper, Lloyd Bridges of Sea Hunt, Marshall Thompson of Daktari and David Mc-Callum of The Man from U.N.C.L.E. all share a submarine with Shirley Eaton, the gold-painted girl from "Goldfinger." The whole thing sinks.

Another phase of the TV-movies cycle comes via the second World Premiere tailored-for-television film. "The Outsider," a private-eye yarn starring Darren McGavin, since it serves also as a preview of an hourlong dramatic series now being filmed.

We'll comment next week.

# STAR TREK' wins the ricky schwartz award

### not to mention the loyalty of millions of viewers

One person at the meeting told him that "Cape

Kennedy practically shuts down when Star Trek is on."

Me and my cousin were watching your show, and he said he knew a friend in his class who wrote and asked you for phasers and communicators which are on television sometimes. Me and Mike would like you to send us 2 phasers, 2 communicators and 2 vairs of your pointed ears....

Leonard Nimoy, who plays Mr. Spock in NBC's Star Trek, says, "I've developed a philosophical attitude about the ears. When people ask me about them, I think it's a matter of affection."

All sorts of people ask him, too.

Last March, Nimoy was guest of honor in Washington at a meeting of the National Space Club, which includes top men in the Nation's space program, "At first I felt somewhat ill at ease," he says. "As an actor in a TV drama, I had no way of knowing what the attitude of the scientific community toward our show would be. But I don't overstate the fact when I say that the interest in the show is so intense that it would almost seem they feel we are a dramatization of the future of their space program, and they have completely taken us to their hearts."

For an obscure actor who principally played Indians and Mexican villains, this has been a heady experience, plus giving him a sense of security few actors enjoy. He says, "When I took this job, I couldn't afford to turn down any series. But now I feel a sense of personal worth and self-respect which is rare for a performer. It's as if somebody said, 'OK, now you can relax!'"

He doesn't relax, though, On the set he has a habit of offering frequent suggestions, which may or may not always sit well with the director. One of these, the "Spock pinch," has become a key part of the character. In an early episode of the series. Spock was supposed to fell a villain with a bludgeon. Nimoy objected that this was old-fashioned and out of keeping with the space-age setting of Star Trek-"the sort of thing they'd do in a Western." Instead, he said, "Why don't I just pinch a nerve that will put him out of commission?" The idea was accepted and has since saved Nimoy, who is not particularly the active type, all sorts of sweat and strain in fight scenes.

When he does try to relax, he is not successful because of the apparently universal popularity of Mr. Spock. Last summer, on a visit to New York, he tried to disguise himself by parting his hair on the side and wearing dark glasses. But passersby still recognized him and said, "Hello, Mr. Spock" or "There's Leonard Nimoy." He is pleased that more and more people are getting to know



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him as Leonard Nimoy rather than Mr. Spock. When he appeared at the California State Fair in Sacramento, a small boy had his leg broken in the crush to get near him. Which shows what a pair of pointed ears can do for an actor.

Dear William Shatner:

I watch your program every week. It is my best program I like. I wrote you a letter about 6 weeks ago and I asked you to send me a souvenir of the enterprize space ship. Why didn't you send me some? I asked you to send me a little lite off of the enterprize and a piece of your old shirt....

William Shatner, an experienced actor whose background was more Shakespeare than space, had just returned from a cross-country tour promoting *Star Trek*, in which he stars as Captain Kirk. "I've never had such an experience," he said. "There were mobs of people trying to tear off my clothes and phalanxes of police trying to keep them away."

A practical man, however, Shatner says, "I realize that this is all ephemeral." And he can take himself lightly, as when he tells of the kid who came up and said, "Hello, Captain Jerk, How's Mr. Spark?" To which Shatner replied, "He's still plugging along."

There are recurrent rumblings that all is not well between Shatner and Leonard Nimov. The former, like Robert Vaughn in The Man from U.N.C.L.E., finds himself being upstaged-especially with the younger set-by what would have been known in the aforementioned old-time Western as his side-kick. There is no outward show of antagonism between the two, but the fun-and-games spirit which marked their relationship in the show's early days seems to be absent now. A person close to the show says, "Sometimes it has been touch and go." Typically, when Shatner mentioned that he had signed a

recording contract and was asked whether there wasn't already a *Star Trek* album on the market, he neglected to mention Leonard Nimoy's big-selling "Mr. Spock's Music from Outer Space."

But perhaps the two men would not be friends even if they were not in competition as actors. Nimoy is an intellectual type who plays folk songs on the guitar, enjoys chess and, as his invention of the "Spock pinch" indicates, avoids excessive activity. Shatner, on the other hand, although highly intelligent and knowledgeable, is a more physical type who works out with weights on the set and enjoys skiing, motorcycling and scuba diving.

During Star Trek's hiatus, while Nimoy took his wife and two children out on a houseboat on Lake Shasta, Shatner went to Spain, sans family, to make a Western film. "I am now able to work in areas I was never able to work in before," he says. Nimoy still lives in the same modest West Los Angeles home he lived in pre-Star Trek, while Shatner has moved to digs more befitting a star.

But Shatner has not let his new fame affect the attitude of his children toward him. Recently, one of his three daughters, 9-year-old Leslie, said, "Daddy, are you a star?" He said, "No, I'm a working actor." Now at school—public school, by the way—if someone asks if her father is a star, Leslie says, "No, he's just a working actor." With ordinary ears yet.

has a diameter of 1.93 x 10<sup>6</sup> kilometers and a volume of 1473 x 10<sup>8</sup> km<sup>3</sup>."


"That's the great thing about this show," says executive producer Gene Roddenberry. "We seem to appeal to everybody, from the kids through the science-fiction buffs to the top scientists in the country. Dr. William H. Pickering, director of the Jet Propulsion Lab at Cal Tech, is one of our fans, and I get an amazing number of letters from principals of high schools. In fact, at first our mail was so damned literate it scared us."

The aerospace museum of the Smithsonian Institution has asked for a print of a Star Trek episode; the Navy has inspected the bridge of the Enterprise as a model for a proposed communications center; and a Southern California hospital has asked for and received a recording of the Enterprise's communicator "beep" to use to summon doctors in emergencies.

The Enterprise's apparent functionalism is the result of more than five months of planning and more than 200 design drawings, done with the assistance of the Jet Propulsion Lab-

oratory, The RAND Corporation and an Army colonel whose field is research and development. The art director of the program is an aeronautical engineer, and Gene Roddenberry himself was a bomber pilot during World War II and an airline pilot after it. (Despite the fact that he served in the Army Air Corps, he named the Enterprise after the Navy's aircraft carrier, because, he says, "I've always had a soft spot in my heart for the Big E, since she broke the back of the Japanese Navy at Midway.")

Despite such a prestigious background—or perhaps because of it—the Star Trek toy kit is reportedly the biggest seller in the United States, and a 12-year-old boy named Ricky Schwartz was so annoyed that the program did not receive a TV Academy Award he saved his money and bought an impressive 2-foot-high trophy which he had inscribed, "To Gene Roddenberry and the Star Trek cast." According to Roddenberry, "That Ricky Schwartz Award means more to me than the Emmy would have." He says it as if he means it, too.



# Taking another peep ar Ar. Peepers

A star of an earlier day tells how he handles comparative obscurity

Lunch had scarcely been served when this blonde came in and sat down in the opposite booth, on a line that broke left slightly beyond Wally Cox's shoulder. She had on a mini-skirt and not a whole lot else, and before she'd finished her first Collins she was beginning to irritate me. It wasn't her costume-of that we all took a tolerant view. But she was celebrity collecting, deliberately casing the place, as girls in Hollywood are likely to do, and at least twice her gaze swept indifferently across our table, past Wally's unmistakable profile, without recognition. I guarantee she would have goggled at even one Smothers brother, Phyllis Diller probably would have flipped her. Was she really too young to know one of the most original comic talents that ever brightened the television tube, not old enough to remember Mr. Peepers?

Well, it was possible. Although Wally Cox still looks boyish enough to step back into his shy schoolteacher role tomorrow, the historical fact is that it was some 12 years ago when Mr. Peepers left the air.

"If the characters of my own invention had any one thing in common. it was an unawareness of the oddness of their particular orientation," Wally was saying. He talks that way some of the time, his vocabulary flavored by nearly two decades of psychiatric experience in analysis and group therapy. The characters alluded to were an Army Pfc., a small-town banker, a Greenwich Village "Dead End Kid" and others created by Wally in his New York night-club monologs of 1948. None of these was in any sense an ancestor of Robinson J. Peepers, he explained.

"Tm a satirist, actually," he said.
"What I enjoy doing is low comedy, physical comedy and pantomime, satire on grossness and stupidity. My favorite comedians are Harpo Marx and Art Carney, if that tells anything. I don't like to play straight good boys. Peepers was just barely a comic role, something that took a lot

of subtlety.
"What made the show successful was



that he was surrounded by some very good comedians," Wally went on modestly, "and they all got in their licks." He ticked off Marion Lorne as the fluttery English teacher Mrs. Gurney, Tony Randall as Harvey Weskitt, Reta Shaw as Aunt Lil, Jack Warden as the athletic coach. Finally he mentioned Patricia Benoit as Nancy Remington, the school nurse whom Peepers long courted and finally married, and in the glow of recollection I realized that I too must have been more or less in love with her then.

"Wasn't she marvelous? She played it straight—with a Northern drawl. She came from Fort Worth, you know, and she managed to overcome the accent but never lost the drawl. She's a housewife now. In Croton-on-Hudson. After our show ended, Pat worked on a TV soap opera, and I once asked her why. She said she just wanted to work until she and her husband got their house paid for, and I think that's exactly what she did."

Whether it was comic or not by his own definition, the mere mention of Wally's performance as Mr. Peepers can still draw a warm smile from thousands who remember very little more of the 1952-54 TV seasons, and it won him the title of "Most Promising Male Star of 1952" in a nation-wide TV poll.

Surely there have been few starker examples of television's conspicuous waste than the fact that this promise remains unfulfilled—that 15 years later the best thing the prime-time programmers could find for Wally Cox was an inglorious little Peepers-like part as a scoutmaster in Raymond Burr's *Ironside* pilot, shown as a TV movie last spring.

True, he's getting daytime exposure. Viewers tuned in before noon can see him Monday through Friday on NBC's The Hollywood Squares, where since last October he has appeared with Cliff Arquette and Morey Amsterdam as the game panel's equivalent of an end-man.

"That's the way I make my living now, and there are many pleasures associated with it," Wally com-

mented, with the kind of cheerful loyalty a network, sponsor or any kind of employer likes to hear.

He may be earning his daily bread, but there can be little doubt that the inner man remains hungry. His career problems always seem to have been less financial than matters of artistic integrity and frustration.

The problems began during the third and last season of Mr. Peepers. The audience was dwindling, or so the ratings said, and salvage measures were taken. Wally didn't necessarily agree with them-he thought it was a mistake for Peepers and Nancy Remington to end the suspense by getting married-but he went along, When the show was canceled in 1955. he was making \$2500 a week and under an eight-year NBC contract. The network lost little time in repackaging him as Hiram Holliday. After 26 episodes spread across the 1956-57 season, that series also expired.

"Network executives will duck in doorways to avoid you after your show is dropped," Wally remembered. "Instant never-heard-of-you happens. For a while I was quite sour about the industry. I was just dropped like a hot potato, and I wasn't ready for that. Television is an advertising medium, not an entertainment or news medium. Its purpose is to move goods, and when you don't move goods, your services are not required any more. I didn't understand that at the time.

"I didn't lose any sleep, though, and tried to live without worry. I was never really embittered. I wrote a couple of plays and made a lot of furniture. Now I've changed from being on the couch so long, and the shoe has stopped pressing my toe. A lot of things don't hurt that used to."

What helped him sleep without worry was the three-year term remaining on his contract. Wally was careful not to breach it and dutifully made guest appearances on other network shows, collecting a reported minimum guarantee of \$50,000 a year for these token services.

His furniture-making during this period was productive and rewarding, the playwriting far less so. Back in the early Mr. Peepers heyday, when the national press was full of whimsical personality pieces, invariably illustrated with shots of Wally roaring around New York on a motorcycle purchased from his boyhood chum Marlon Brando, Popular Mechanics scooped the field with a serious layout on Wally Cox the cabinetmaker and all-around shopsmith. The pieces he turned out were handsome, practical and handmade right down to the hinges and other hardware.

One of his plays, "Violets Are Blue," was passed around rather widely in professional and straw-hat circles, but no one ever got around to staging it. Another, called "The Joke Company," may be one of the American theater's lost masterpieces. At any rate, it's lost. Wally sent it to a Broadway producer in the winter of 1957-58 and waited patiently for a reaction.

"I've never been one to push very hard—but 10 months later, when I still hadn't heard anything, I called him up," Wally recalled. "If he wasn't going to read my play, I asked him, would he please send it back? He said, 'What play?' I guess they turned his office upside down, but they never did find it. That was the end of that—it was my only copy."

Wally's writing is almost compulsive. He has done dozens of short stories, most never submitted to editorial view and none ever published, and claims authorship of three books. Simon & Schuster brought out his autobiographical "My Life as a Small Boy" in 1961, following his "Mr. Peepers—A Sort of Novel" in 1955; and "Ralph Makes Good," a novel written originally as a film treatment, was published in 1966.

On the day we lunched across from the unwitting mini-skirted blonde, Wally had just finished his stint in a motion picture called "The One and Only Genuine Original Family Band" at Walt Disney Studio.

"Tve had half a dozen so-called cameo roles in feature pictures—bits with billing. I never expected to find myself type-cast as the church mouse, but there was something about the Peepers role that became a curse for feature work. In this picture, though, I finally get to work without my glasses," he said cheerfully.

Wally, of course, would find something to be cheerful about at the bottom of a dry well. The Disney cast lists him seventh, behind such names as John Davidson and Kurt Russell.


Along with the movie bits, he has made a TV series pilot named Alfred of the Amazon, unsold; dubbed the voice of Underdog on a Saturday cartoon show; flexed his biceps on 21 detergent commercials; and gone thud in a brief Las Vegas engagement.

"It's not because you're poor that you do things like Las Vegas or selling soap," he explained, "but because it's a lot of money." At 43, twice married and twice divorced, Wally has a shiny new motorcycle and a rambling, white clapboard house in the Hollywood hills. There, most days find him diligently at work on a project he hopes will open up a new career in theatrical film. In collaboration with a good friend, actor-writer Don Joslyn, he's into the second draft of an original screenplay titled "The Toy Grabbers."

"It's a comedy, and I might say one for which I personally seem well suited," Wally admitted, beaming happily, adding that he and Joslyn plan to produce and finance it themselves. "So for the first time in my life I'll exercise some executive authority over what I'm doing. As I say, I'm not a great pusher, but we hope to get into production inside a year."

While wishing him well in the movie venture, the TV faithful who still hold Mr. Peepers in fond remembrance might also wish it would be no longer before its hero returns to the air in something worthy of his gifts. For the present, however, that appears to be a hope as wistful as Wally's smile. END

# YOU DON'T KNOW WHO SHE IS?

#### WELL, ANTOINETTE BOWER IS IN THE SAME PREDICAMENT

One of the fringe benefits of being a television performer is public recognition—having people on the street or in the supermarket or on an airplane say, "Aren't you so-and-so?" or, "Didn't I see you in such-and-such?"

Consider, then, the plight of an actress, Antoinette Bower, who has appeared prominently in almost all the major TV shows. People not only don't know her on the street; they don't even recognize her on the screen.

Miss Bower is just too versatile for her own good; there is no "Antoinette Bower image." "I've done so many different roles with so many different colors of hair and so many different accents that no one knows me from one show to another," she says.

A few years ago she did the final episode of the Ben Casey season playing one role, and the opening episode of the next season playing another, and nobody even noticed. So far this season, she has been a guest star on 10 programs, which must be some sort of record, playing such a variety of roles as a black cat in Star Trek, a spy in Hogan's Heroes, and a double for Barbara Bain (or vice versa) in a two-part Mission: Impossible. She has also played everything from an ingénue ("which I never was, even when I was 12") to a dowdy schoolteacher with a brain tumor in such programs as The Man from U.N.C.L.E., The Wild Wild West, The Fugitive, Dr. Kildare, I Spy, Ironside, Tarzan, The FBI and The Felony Squad.


Before coming to Hollywood she played a variety of roles on stage and in some 200 television programs in Canada. Since coming to Hollywood from Canada in 1960 she has, in addition to her TV work, appeared on the stage, again in a variety of roles.

Miss Bower describes herself as "a rubber-faced chameleon." On the plus side of the ledger, she sees TV as "my sort of repertory." But, negatively, she adds, "When I came to Hollywood I assumed that if I did two or three good roles, everything would follow, but it isn't that way at all."

The reasons for Miss Bower's relative anonymity rest in her background as well as her talents. Although she was born in Baden-Baden, and traveled extensively, that background is principally British. The traditional British reticence was drilled into her by her family, which she describes as "impoverished upper-bracket—good blood but no money." In that milieu she says, "I was taught not to be too pretty, not to be too clever—to underplay everything deliberately."

She is reluctant to discuss her private life. She is married to artist James Gill, and lives in Beverly Glen, west of Los Angeles. "I don't mind breaking down in front of hundreds of people," she says, "but I have such a thing about privacy."

Of course, one way for an actress to ensure privacy is to work in a variety of roles, makeups and wigs, so that she won't be recognized in public. But then she risks ending up with the feeling Antoinette Bower has: "Who is the real Antoinette Bower? There probably is no such thing."

# An uninvited quest crashes the party

There was a time when Hollywood had its social arbiters—from Sir Charles and Lady Mendl to Marion Davies to Basil and Ouida Rathbone. They gave "the right parties," and everyone who was anyone not only came—they came with an entrance. On one occasion, when it was decided by Lady Mendl that ladies were to wear nothing but white, the late Carole Lombard arrived in a white

ambulance and was carried to the dance floor on a stretcher borne by first-aid specialists in white jumpers.

On another occasion, when Marion Davies decided on a fancy-dress affair, the guest of honor arrived as Marie Antoinette, in hoops too wide to get through the dining-room door. Miss Davies saw to it, however, that a crisis was averted. "Just set up a table," she said tersely, "in the hall."

The stars did more than make entrances at such parties; they frequently performed as well. Judy Garland and Noel Coward sang; Clifton Webb and Jack Benny raconteured: Harold Lloyd, Frank Morgan and Orson Welles did card tricks. Others developed individual acts. Norma Shearer favored balancing a glass of water on her head, then, without spilling a drop, sinking to the floor and rising again.

In the old days, on New Year's Eve David Selznick usually gave a party, Charles Feldman frequently gave a party and Sam Spiegel always gave a party, and anyone who was anyone hit all three—and also, on even New Year's Eves, a fourth. This was because the famed New Year's Eve party given by the Charles Lederers was

given only every other year.

On the Fourth of July George Cukor gave a party, where there was not only corn on the cob but real popcorn. And regularly he gave memorable Sunday lunches. "We worked six days a week," he told us, "and on the seventh we rested and had lunch." And Charles and "Muff" Brackett gave perhaps the most memorable parties of all—Sunday lunches where literally everything was real. "Even," someone said, "the conversation."

In those days also the studios did not just give parties, they decreed them—and stars were not just invited, they were summoned. Columnists Hedda Hopper and Louella Parsons

wielded similar power.

Suddenly, it seems, the Hollywood in Hollywood Society all but disappeared. Hedda is dead and Louella has outlived her immense influence; the Mendls died; the Rathbones abdicated—and Basil, more recently, died; the New Year's Eve parties evaporated; and Mr. Cukor and the Bracketts stopped giving their Sunday lunches.

Today the studios don't own the stars; they don't even own themselves. A giant industrial complex, Gulf &

Western Industries, owns Paramount; a giant banking and insurance firm, Transamerica Corporation, owns United Artists; MCA, the former monster talent agency, took over Universal; Seven Arts Productions, Warner Bros.; and Time, Inc. and Edgar Bronfman of Seagram's have bought large blocks of MGM stock.

While the Coming of the Talkies is assigned in Hollywood history to the otherwise unmemorable year of 1927, the Coming of Television occurred on no specific date at all—for the simple reason that for many long years Hollywood assured itself that, if it didn't look at it, it would go away.

When it became apparent, however, that TV was here to stay, Hollywood tried to overwhelm the little box—first with use of more color, then 3-D and glasses ("The flat actor," Hollywood flatly decreed, "is dead") and then with such an incredible variety of wider and wider screens, combined with all manner of vistas and scopes, that the audience was not only surrounded but in some cases actually blockaded.

When, even then, TV audiences refused to surrender, more than one movie producer went so far as to try to bomb them into submission—unloosing upon his by-now-suspecting public actual scents. "For the first time," wrote one critic, "it can be said of this picture, without fear of contradiction, that it smells."

Then and then only, did Hollwood come to terms with television. If you can't lick 'em, they reasoned, join 'em. So, with relish, and even an occasional pickle, the studios began selling their movies to television and making serials for television, then making movies for television, and finally, in the age-old tradition, railing against television for making movies for television."

This raised, with Hollywood "society," if not hob, at least havoc. →

For glamor it had to fall back on George Hamilton, late by appointment to Her Majesty, Lynda Bird Johnson. Or the pugnacious Frank Sinatra, who if he couldn't give, take or make a party, punched one. Or, finally, a host of curious and rather unprepossessing "in" places—P.J.'s, Dominick's, The Daisy and The Factory, the latter inwardly a night club but outwardly literally a factory which Paul Newman and a group of stars own.

Typical of the new Take-Chargers in Hollywood today is Bob Evans, a 36-year-old ex-New York actor whom Darryl Zanuck saw dancing in El Morocco and, liking his profile, put in several bit parts in several pictures. Now Evans is head of Paramount Studios Production, which recently instituted an extensive new TV-production program, after years of lagging in that

department.

Mr. Evans has no illusions about either today's movie business or its Society. "Last winter," he says, "was the worst movie-theater box office in 10 years. And what business there is is very tricky." As for Hollywood Society, Mr. Evans dismisses it. "This is an early-to-bed town," he says. "I think it's a dull city. I feel much more alive in New York."

Richard Zanuck, young son of Darryl and head of production at 20th Century-Fox (which serves TV screens with Batman, Custer, The Felony Squad, Daniel Boone, Journey to the Center of the Earth, Judd for the Defense, Lost in Space, Peyton Place and Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea), agrees with Mr. Evans. "The movie business today," he says flatly, "is a weekend business." On the sub-

ject of Hollywood Society, he won't even go that far. "What is it?" he asks.

"I think," Art Linkletter told us, "the movie names will always be bigger. When you come right down to it, it comes right down to the size of the screen. They're blown up 500 times, and we're cut down 10 times."

William Shatner, the star of Star Trek, agreed with Mr. Linkletter, but he had an interesting addition. "They may be bigger," he told us, "but people know us better. On TV you're invited into their homes, and you're part of their family. There is a real intimacy. On Friday night I'm there. And that's why, when they see me, they say, 'Hi, Bill, how's the ship, how's Leonard, how's the Doc?'"

One prominent star, who shall be nameless, recently made up a list for us of Hollywood parties under three categories, as follows:

# People You Sometimes See Everywhere and Other Times Nowhere

When we asked the star to which group he belonged, he smiled. "Obviously," he said, "People You Always See Everywhere—otherwise how would I know?"

Hollywood's "Young Turk" star set—the Paul Newmans, the Steve McQueens, the James Coburns, etc.—don't live like the old-time stars, or operate like them. "Call me antistar," says Paul Newman. "I don't give a damn. I don't even want people to think of me as a star. I want them to think of me as a human being."

James Coburn points out that he doesn't think of himself as *in* Hollywood, let alone of it, for the simple reason that most of the time he's actually not there. "I'm not 'Hollywood' in any sense of the word," he told us. "In the last year I've lived in Paris and Germany and New York and Boston and Mexico and Jamaica. This summer I was in Tangier."

Jane Fonda, who says she lives "half the time in Rome and half the time in Paris"—and the other half in Hollywood—calls Brooke Hayward, daughter of Leland Hayward, her oldest friend. "You know," she says, "her mother [Margaret Sullavan] and my father [Henry Fonda] were once married." And to Brooke she said, —

"You're the only person I used to know that I still know now."

Brooke, herself, is philosophical. "I don't think the old thing will ever come back," she said. "The world is changing too fast. And you never go backward. Society has been undermined or rejuvenated or God knows what—but anyway, something has happened to it. My mother had a livein cook and the right service for 20 and artichoke plates. I know she never felt it would all blow up in one generation—but it sure did.

"I suppose," Miss Hayward continues, "Steve McQueen is the closest thing to a Gary Cooper we have. But he comes out of a different scene. Can you imagine him having a starched nanny behind his child at a birthday party? The Paul Newmans have three homes, but when they have a party, Joannie cooks and Paul does the hamburgers and then everybody pops corn. Nobody cares what they look like at home."

Other stars echo at least a part of these sentiments. "I would like to live here," says Inger Stevens, staring thoughtfully at her swimming pool, "part of the time." Says Shirley MacLaine, "I have none of the accouterments of being a star. I have an old car, one mink coat, and all I'm interested in is learning. I only had, you know, the kind of education you get in most American schools. My daughter's at school in Japan—she's being trained in six languages."

The rank-and-file TV star stays home, entertains informally if at all, shows up at a première if his press agent insists, sometimes rides a motorcycle or drives an Excalibur or collects art, but more often, like Dan Blocker, simply barbecues in the back yard with his neighbors. Lorne Greene and his wife Nancy would rather play bridge. Andy Griffith is quoted as saying he "won't go anywhere where I have to dress up."

Fred MacMurray is a fix-it man who seldom goes out at all. Dean Martin, who is supposed to swing, doesn't go to parties. He likes to stay home and shoot pool with friends. "I only know of one party Dino went to this year," says a pal. "And at that one he kept the motor running."

We did, however, find one member of Hollywood Society, Get Smart's Barbara Feldon, who registered a strong opinion in favor of Hollywood. "When I first came out here," she told us, "I was intimidated by Hollywood. Really, in my mind's eye, I had tied a ribbon onto the Empire State Building and I had unraveled it all the way across the country. Here I was alone.

"But in time I began to see that what New Yorkers criticize about California is things like the sun. Well, I liked the sun. Then you put the silence with the sun and you suddenly realize that vou must create out here-vou must create a life that has some meaning for you. I bought a house. I even bought a three-stroke pool, Then, finally, when I was in New York, I began missing it here. Now I've begun collecting sea shells and I'm looking at stars with a telescope and I have more meaningful relationships than I ever had in New York. In New York you only brush people on the surface. Here you get underneath it."

Even Eva Gabor, of all people, has turned into a respectable career woman. Eva wears slacks at home, occasionally lunches at The Bistro, goes to The Daisy under urging but not otherwise, and prefers the company of her TV executive husband and a few close friends.

Barbara Stanwyck, a glamor queen emeritus who straddles both eras, lives in a mundane Cape Cod in Beverly Hills and says, "Big parties are tiresome. I simply don't go any more."



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#### IRONSIDE

Some years ago, in a review of Raymond Burr as Perry Mason, we wrote that Mr. Burr's performance was too businessmanish. We hereby eat two large helpings of crow—No-Cal crow, of course. For in this new series Mr. Burr is magnificent. Playing San Francisco police detective Robert Ironside, a man confined to a wheel chair, he is, in character range, far from confined, and with the same ease with which he manipulates his chair he moves from fury to fun and from cynical curmudgeon to philosophical elder statesman.

Furthermore, to aid him in his work, he has a whole task force-all of whom, characteristically, he regularly takes to task. But you know that, deep down, he really loves them, and you will too-if for no other reason than because they are excellent in their parts. At first you may think that Det. Sgt. Ed Brown (Don Galloway) is just a pretty boy, but you will soon find out that he can be as taut and exciting as the boss. And you may be equally suspicious of policewoman Eve Whitfield (Barbara Anderson). No girl, you may think, who looks like that can be good too-at her job, we hasten to add. But she is. Finally, if you're inclined to think that Ironside's "legs," his aide-de-camp, Negro Mark Sanger (Don Mitchell), is in the show merely for the sake of being-well, in it-you are going to find his performance is both different and convincing.

All in all, Mr. Collier Young, who created this show, deserves high marks for bringing exciting originality

to a tired field. And if the scripts occasionally embrace subjects like stranglers of elderly women, which we think in questionable taste, they are generally excellent. Our favorite was one in which a pair of escaped killers (John Saxon and Don Stroud) manage to get into Ironside's office and, at gunpoint, demand he help them. He won't, of course, but when Eve comes in and her life is at stake. a different situation obtains. Ironside works out a plan for the killers to leave disguised as TV repairmen and, in the end, in as exciting a scene as we've seen this year, he immobilizes them both-one by electrocution and the other by spraying him with a TVset cleaner. You should, incidentally, always have yours handy-together with these reviews.

In another show, Ironside torments his group at the outset with a Persian proverb: "The best hiding place for a book is a library, for a man is a city, for a leaf is a forest." Finally, when they are at last relaxing at the end of the show in which they have tracked down not only a murderer of five but another murderer who pretended his murder was one of the other guy's, Ironside's force demands to know if he made the proverb up. "No," he says, "It's quite legitimate. Ask any Turk." "Turk!" exclaims Eve. "You said it was Persian." "Turks," replies Ironside, without the trace of a smile, "are very familiar with Persian proverbs." Then, and only then, he smiled. And well he might have. For a TV show as good as this, there should be no hiding place.



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
