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

The woes, agonies and frustrations of creating commercials

One of these days we're going to have a button made up and it's going to say, DUE TO A LACK OF INTEREST, TOMORROW WILL BE CANCELED, and we're all going to wear it.

We, the TV commercials writers.

The minutemen of modern marketing.

The short-distance channel swimmers.


What we offer you is a timely word from the sponsor.

What you seem to get is a sudden attack of famine, drought or sleeping sickness.

And, in one way or another, you turn us off while, in one way or another, we are trying to turn you on.

Mr. Galanoy, who has been in charge of making commercials for several New York, Chicago and Los Angeles advertising agencies, is now writing a book about the advertising business. It's a battle of wits, my friend, and we're not above trying anything at least once to get you to sit up and take notice or, at least, to sit up.

These days we're spending hundreds of millions of dollars in the writing. art directing, acting and producing of television commercials. We're far and away the largest collective users of soundstages, 35 mm. and 16 mm. film, musicians, magicians, Max Factor Pan Cake #5, paint, Moviola editing equipment, trained animals, film laboratories, cooing babies, sound trucks, electric cable, flowing streams, wigs and sinus-cavity mock-ups. We're second only to the U.S. Navy in the use of boats and to the Air Force in flight time on helicopters. We wouldn't really knock a little old lady down a flight of stairs in order to sell you some aspirin, but if the concept was good, we'd find a way to fake it. Do you care?

Or is the siren call of the cheese and crackers more competition than we can bear?

If so, we'll keep trying. We'll stand on our head to keep you in your seat.

Here are some of the *sure-fire* attention-getters that commercials writers all over the country have tried. Some of them have worked very well. In some of them, the sure-fire backfired.

Like last year when John Urie Studios was shooting one of the first Mercury Cougar commercials. The writer had decided that the sleek good looks of the animal cougar would play favorably against the mechanical Cougar. Enter, one snarling, very much alive cougar, complete with cage and trainer.

Again and again the crew carefully rehearsed the complicated camera directions, which called for a running shot of the cat. Ready at last for the filming, they unleashed the cougar, gave him his camera cue, and watched him run down the hill, past the camera crew, past the car and off into the high timber.

The crew spent two days shooting film of each other until the cat was rounded up and brought back.

Did you see that commercial? Or were you looking for the ball scores on another channel?

Here's one popular version of another classic car catastrophe:

Hey, the inspired commercials writer wrote, what if we put a beautiful model (female) in a flowing chiffon gown in one of our beautiful models up on a mountaintop somewhere way out West? Then a helicopter can fly over and find these two together, film them as head and shoulders above the crowd, the pinnacle of elegance, and all that.

"How?" somebody else said. \rightarrow

The engineering department stripped the car of its engine and most of its running gear and other heavy components and then disassembled the car so it could be helicopterlifted to the location. The film studio people went scouting for a mountain or butte top with a ledge big enough to hold a car. The agency producer hired a Pretty Young Thing and had her fitted for wardrobe and rehearsed her smile. A mechanic was put on detached duty to assemble the car once the components had been delivered to the ledge.

It was. Delivered and assembled.

When the car was ready, it was late in the day, but the director decided that there was enough time to get in one shot, then pick up the girl and the mechanic (who was to hide under the car during the filming) and return them to the valley floor.

They loaded the camera crew and camera into the helicopter. The pilot pushed the throttle. The blades turned. The bird sat. He tried again. The blades whipped up sand but that's all that went up.

"Hmph," said the pilot. "Wind change. Downdrafts."

"Downdrafts?"

"Downdrafts. Happens when the wind changes. Can't get up there until the wind changes again. Not safely, anyway," he explained.

"How about those two?" someone said, looking UP.

"I guess they'll get overtime," somebody else said.

That isn't all they got. As night fell, they got annoyed, then anxious, then desperate. It grew bitterly cold and, to save weight, no weather protection had been left in the car. The model looked at the mechanic. The mechanic looked at the model. Then they both looked WAY DOWN THERE where they could make out a light every now and then and hear a word of encouragement that would float up to them on the cold night wind.

The situation is the stuff of which MGM used to make movies, but, according to official reports, the model and the mechanic found nothing romantic about it.

In the morning the wind had changed and the helicopter picked them up, flew them off for rest and recuperation.

The crew went back to work.

The commercials writer went back to his drawing board.

Where did you go when they finally showed that finished spot?

Several years ago, before the haircoloring products were perfected, we had started working on a commercial for a new line of tints. The big objection to hair coloring had been that it was too harsh, that it could actually damage hair. The advertiser's laboratory had sent along a report saying that this new coloring was formulated differently and that it was perfectly safe. To convince the ladies in the television audience that this was gospel, we wrote a commercial in which a girl changes her hair color every day of the week to go with her outfits.

We filmed it. On Monday she was a brunette. On Tuesday, a redhead. On Wednesday she came on camera as a blonde. On Thursday she was a brownette. And on Friday she showed up in full makeup and bald.

You weren't out of the room for that one. It's in the company vaults.

Another commercial which didn't quite make it to your living room found us in solemn attendance at Jungleland, California. The project was to introduce a new Alberto-Culver product called Command Shave Cream. One writer had come up with a slogan, "Softens the world's toughest whiskers," and then had decided they didn't come any tougher than those on a lion. Ergo, we would shave one using the client's new product.

How to read a banana.

The ridge: A good way to tell if a banana was picked a bit too early or right at its peak is by the sharpness of the ridge. The sharper the ridge, the younger the banana. We try to pick our bananas when the ridge is rounding. But not everybody is quite so fussy.

> The peel: The peel should be smooth and sleek. No wrinkles. A wrinkled peel means the banana has lost too much moisture. Which is no great tragedy – except that the texture of the meat might be a little chewy.

for, were the writer and six people from the agency, 12 from the film studio, about 50 spectators, plus the lion trainer and a man from the SPCA who was there to make sure that we cut only the lion's whiskers and not the lion.

The only danger the lion faced all day was claustrophobia.

And the appearance of hydrophobia, every time he licked off a chinful of lather. Nine aerosol cans of it.

By late afternoon, we had yet to roll one foot of film. When the lion wasn't being playful, the trainer was gone, getting bandages and changing his torn khakis. When they were both spruced up and we were all ready, the lion insisted upon pouncing on the camera and licking the lens.

Finally, we had them in position. The trainer had the lion's head in a hammer lock and the chin was smeared with shaving cream.

"Now," urged the director. "Now, cut his whiskers!"

The first try broke the razor blade. The second try broke another razor blade. So did the third.

"Tough whiskers," the writer said proudly. "When I said world's toughest whiskers, I really picked 'em."

"Right, son," said the SPCA man, who had wandered up. "I thought you guys were going to fake it. The only real way you can cut off a lion's whiskers is with a hack saw or bolt cutters. Thought you knew that."

The newly educated writer returned to Chicago, changed the product slogan from "softens the world's toughest whiskers" to the never-to-be-forgotten "super shave cream for super shaves."

There's no place in the world the writer's imagination won't wander in search of a good commercials idea.

Mary Wells wrote the scripts and shot the Betty Crocker casserole commercials on location all over Europe.

Chicago writer Rolf Brandis went to a film illusionist in Holland to get an egg to slice itself in midair for a salad-dressing spot.

Allan Sandler Film Studios, looking for personnel to put in the "world's biggest brass band parade," went to Oxnard, Cal., and hired just about everybody in the town for a Rexall drug stores commercial.

At the Doyle Dane Bernbach agency, a film crew took a car to the 10th floor of a building and shoved it off to make a point about safe driving for the Mobil gasoline people.

At Bonneville Flats, Utah, General Motors and Radio Corporation of America teamed up with a writer from the Shell Oil ad agency to produce the Shell "driverless cars" commercials for their gasoline. The electronics and the buried cables and the five camera crews consumed a quarter of a million dollars before they were ready. The day they were, it started to rain and flooded the salt flats and caused a year's delay.

And so it goes. We were shooting a cigaret commercial and the cattle stampeded. And a car on a rock in the ocean and it floated away. A cigaret commercial in a barn and it burned down. A flying trapeze act fell. An ostrich kicked in a store window.

It isn't bad enough that sometimes we don't watch what we're doing, but it's even worse that you don't watch what we're doing either. Even when we come up with a brilliant story line, masterfully acted, exquisitely shot and edited and musically scored with a choir of angels, there's a sudden drop in the water pressure at your house.

But just you wait until our springtime commercials batch comes along.

They're clean. Simple. Graphic. Compelling. Totally different.

We open on a medium close-up of a man and we hold that shot for the entire commercial. In his left hand, the man holds a package. His right hand points to it. And he talks. And he talks. And he talks.



MISS AMERICA .8 YEARS LATER

Success at Atlantic City hasn't given Mary Ann Mobley what she really wants

Pity poor Mary Ann Mobley, 35-22-34, the pride of Brandon, Miss. (pop. 2139), who was Miss America of 1959. She would rather play Scarlett O'Hara than occupy the center spread of Playboy. She wants, she says, to "command respect" as an actress and forget this stuff about the body beautiful. Eight long years and it still hasn't happened to Mary Ann Mobley!

Mary Ann has done all the right the good—things. She has made seven movies—has even starred opposite Elvis Presley—and never once let a producer chase her around the desk. She has done the top TV shows, from Perry Mason to Iron Horse, and appeared on Ed Sullivan. She studied two years with Lee Strasberg. They measure out her glamorous titles ("Star of Tomorrow," "Deb Star of the Year," "Outstanding Young Woman of 1966," etc.) by the bushel, and her appearances have lit up state fairs and straw-hat circuits.

She wears Jungle Gardenia perfume, but don't let that fool you. She has never played the bikini game like Raquel Welch, her fellow Deb Star of 1965, because, she says, true sex appeal has to come from the inside. "Maybe," says Mary Ann Mobley, "I'm just not good at The Game."

Once she made a pilot—actually a spin-off. The producer loved her —all producers love her—but she didn't get the part in *The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.* Stefanie Powers got it instead. The network said, in that wonderful, inscrutable way networks have, "She does not have the necessary qualities audience-wise." The executive producer, Norman Felton, said he liked her "soft quality" but, "Somehow I didn't feel she was the sort of girl who would engage in this sort of bizarre adventure."

Now just a minute, Mr. Felton! You talk about bizarre adventure? There's this pretty little Southern girl, magnolia-scented and all, brought up on this Southern plantation—well, sort of—with all the trimmings. She wins all the local beauty contests, she's that pretty, and everyone tells her mother how she ought to be in movies, but no one ever dreams it could actually happen. Seems she has this conservative stepfather, a lawyer named David Williams, and he believes a girl ought to be in by 10:30 even when she's 18.

It's not that she doesn't have brains. She's an honor student and member of the Brandon High School debating team, later a voice and speech major at Ole Miss, and writes a little poetry on the side. Well, after she's been elected "The Most Beautiful," "The Most Popular," "National Football Queen of 1957" and just about everything else you can think of, along comes the Miss America Pageant. "I never dreamed I could win," was the quote. Know what she does? It's all in the "official" biography:

"As the spotlights dimmed, Miss Mobley stepped forth to sing 'Un Bel Di' from Puccini's 'Madame Butterfly.' Halfway through the aria she shed \rightarrow

a breakaway skirt and swung into a belting rendition of "There'll Be Some Changes Made'... Then to the audience's further delight, she peeled off a second layer of skirt to reveal a tantalizingly abbreviated costume and jazzy dance steps [sic] that sent heads awhirl. The crown—and \$10,-000—was hers!"

You'd think that would really get a girl going, all that money and fame and TV exposure. It didn't. What it did was send her to the Actors Workshop in New York, get her into a flop Broadway play ("Nowhere to Go but Up"), some summer stock, a couple of Elvis Presley movies, and some TV. Don't ask why. Suffice to say that since the Miss America contest began as a promotional device for the Atlantic City Boardwalk in 1921, some 2000 ravishingly beautiful girls have been turned loose on the world. If a man had a nickel for every one who made it in show business, he would probably be about 20 cents richer. (A nickel each for Bess Myerson, Rosemary LaPlanche, Lee Meriwether and Marilyn Van Derbur.) Mary Ann's agent says: "People think of her as beautiful-you know, Miss America? -but just not a fantastic actress." Her business manager says, "If she had not been Miss America, she would be a bigger star today."

Then there is the lady herself. We are sitting in a fashionable Sunset Strip saloon, she in a simple shift with the Jungle Gardenia coming on hot and heavy, telling me how she wouldn't live through her early life again (including Miss America) if you dragged her there with horses; and how she has not yet been married because "a real woman has to commit herself to someone, to be vulnerable and to know that, to say I may get hurt and I don't care: and up to now I just haven't found anyone I care to risk it with." [Shortly after this word, Miss Mobley decided to "risk it." She married actor Gary Collins. —ED.]

Just as she hesitated in marriage, she also has been leery about committing herself wholeheartedly to her career. "I was young. I had \$10,000 and a half-name. I didn't know what an agent was. All I knew was I liked to entertain. But to do it I had to sacrifice too much of Mary Ann.

"I'm not tall and Grecian like those other beauty winners. I've got a round face and a pug nose, and certain ideas of how things should be. But the producer hears you're Miss America and he expects that means no brains, no talent. If you smile a lot, he wants to pat you on the head and say, 'Isn't that a cute little girl?' or if you're lucky, 'Well, she's got a kind of funny face, but I've got a spot for her.' That's the cross I have to bear. Every time I get a chance to prove I'm not just a Has-Been Miss America-well. it's very hard being a woman in this business.

"Unless, of course, you put your career before everything. I don't. I don't do the Raquel Welch bit. That's her way, not mine. My stepfather was always opposed to show business. Not very ladylike. Not for his young lady. Now he sort of accepts it. But he looks away when I have a kissing scene.

"So it's hard to be me and all these other things, too. Guess that's why I'm drawn to Scarlett O'Hara." The Jungle Gardenia is coming on stronger than ever and I am trying to visualize Mary Ann in hoop skirts waiting to hear the hoofbeats of Rhett's horse as he comes riding up to Tara. "She has toughness and femininity. Someone told me once you have to be tough inside to be happy. I think I'm learning. It's up to me. I can't cop out by saying other people are stupid."

NET to Analyze 'State of Union'

NET is out to steal the big TV network's thunder again by instantly dissecting-in-depth President Johnson's State of the Union message to the Congress. Last January the follow-up telecast-NET's first live Coast-to-Coast hookup, fed to 70 stations-ran about two and a half hours. Next month (the date is not set but is expected to be in the week of Jan. 15) 130 stations will be on the line. With moderator Paul Niven on camera in New York with two "generalists," liberal Arthur Schlesinger Jr. and conservative William F. Buckley, the telecast will switch across-country to eight cities for comments by Daniel Moynihan, James J. Kilpatrick and Cleveland's Mayor Carl Stokes on urban aspects of the President's address: Milton Friedman and Walter Heller on economics; and Bill Moyers and Edwin O. Reischauer on foreign policy. "And because it's an election year," reports NET Washington bureau boss Jim Karayn, who'll produce the show, "we'll set aside about 45 minutes for the panel to discuss the political outlook." He expects the talk to run well past midnight.

Were the TV networks caught off guard by President Johnson's speech at the AFL-CIO banquet in Miami? Some TV news executives reported they were warned in advance Mr. Johnson would flail the GOP's Congressional record. But an official at one network, who preferred anonymity, claimed: "We were had! And all of us were mad as hell." In granting the Republicans a similar half-hour a few days later, however, the networks noted that they were not dutybound to do so, as Mr. Johnson is not yet officially a candidate. "We just felt it was better journalism to let the opposition speak, an NBC News spokesman explained.

CBS News has given up, for now, the idea of continuing its occasional "Town Meeting of the World" linking prominent figures in discussion via satellite. Networkers say the problem has been to find (A) valid topics for such televised debate and (B) qualified participants fluent in English. But a onehour "Town Meeting" on the domestic level is booked for Sunday Jan. 21. With Eric Sevareid as moderator, it will grapple with the belief that religion and science are incompatible.

A French movie, "A Man and a Woman," widely shown in U.S. art houses, has been bought for television by ABC. It thus becomes the first dubbedin-English foreign film to be picked up for network prime time, although others (i.e., "La Dolce Vita") have played the local-station circuit.

NET has just landed its biggest "sponsor": Celanese Corp. is giving the educational program service \$250,-000 to underwrite filming of five or six documentaries profiling college professors. The programs, to begin next March, will give Celanese a token plug.

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

No one can accuse the networkmovie programmers of catering to the Christmas trade this week. Their cinematic stocking-stuffers include family hatreds under the big top, adolescent pangs on a transcontinental hobo trail, a playgirl with a brain tumor, a session of Prohibition murder and mayhem and, for comic relief, a drunken poodle. About the only seasonal note is struck by the old beach party gang turning up on skis.

Well, let's look for positive values. To make you feel that your own folks are the sugar, let alone the salt, of the earth, examine the family in "The Big Show," as unappetizing a crew as ever did each other dirt in what seems to be the third film based on Jerome Weidman's "I'll Never Go There Any More." ("House of Strangers" and "Broken Lance" are its plot predecessors.) The film's sole plus is its setting in a medium-sized Continental circus. But even a few trapeze, high-wire and polar-bear acts can't compensate for the melodramatics about a despotic daddy and his four sons. The three no-goodnik sons get theirs; the goodnik gets to marry Esther Williams, but not before he's served a prison sentence.

Families get their licks too from "Wild Seed," a poetic-realism tract about a "nice" girl and a drifter who hobo their way across the country to find the girl's "real" father. The

film, made under Universal's special program for promising young moviemakers, is at best dull and at most banal, with no promise evident beyond that offered by Celia Kave, trapped therein as a girl on the run from her foster parents. Not, mind you, that Frankie Avalon and his beach buddies make youth more palatable in "Ski Party," what with the boys masquerading as girls to learn about sex appeal. It is, as they say, a drag. But from the high humor of transvestitism, alas, there's no place to go beyond canine alcoholism. For some reason we're being treated to a rerun of "Wild and Wonderful," a film which is neither and manages only wretched vulgarity via boy meeting girl and poodle, boy losing girl because poodle is jealous of her on their wedding night and boy getting girl by providing a mate for the poodle. The poodle gets the acting honors.

But screen life isn't all laughter. For the ladies who want to go the "Dark Victory" route in 1963 rather than 1939 terms, there's "Stolen Hours" to prove that Susan Hayward isn't Bette Davis and that even Jessamyn West's intelligent screenplay can't eliminate the sudsing of the opera. And for the gents who want to relive the life and loves of Dutch Schultz and/or the gangster epics of the Thirties, there's "Portrait of a Mobster" for all-around slaughter. ... where the problems run from sacred cows to snakebite serum

Jay North would like to play varsity football while he studies for a career as a chemical engineer. But since he is already 16 and only a slender 135pounder, he is much too light for the intercollegiate game. Hence his passion for buffalo milk. Buffalo milk is so much richer than cow milk it's a pity they don't serve it in Los Angeles for boy stars impatient to grow up. But they do sell it in India, which is just where Jay happens to be filming in NBC-TV's Maya.

End of the good news about India. The bad news is that it's a bothersome place to make a television series, thorny with hardships unknown on the back lots of Hollywood. Where else, for example, does a doctor stand by on all locations with antisnakebite serum? Where else can a sacred cow lie down for a quiet chew on a main road, blocking a busload of TV actors just long enough to lose the best filming light of the day?

Where else is the heat so intense, the water so tricky, the equipment so apt to become "nonfunctioning"? And where else does a youngster from a comfortable American home encounter poverty so appalling that the handsome face grows grave at the thought of it, and the hamburger and French fries so eagerly ordered on a quick return trip home from the teeming city of Bombay go almost untouched?

Maya is the first American series to be shot entirely on location in India, and to its merit is giving TV audiences their first long look at that vast nation of 470 million people; its teeming cities, great temples, historic ruins, maharajahs' palaces, dusty villages, dense jungles and the mighty peaks of the Himalayas. Plus, of course, elephants and tigers.

Jay plays an American lad who teams up with an Indian boy (15-yearold Sajid Khan) and an elephant (Maya) in what executive producer Frank King describes as "a spectacular action-adventure series." The American television audience, however, finds *Maya* something less than spectacular. The ratings have been low, and NBC will discard the series later this winter.

Jay, perhaps, can find some consolation in the fact that Dennis the Menace is still thriving, in reruns, nine years after its TV debut. Jay, of course, was Dennis, but only the grin remains of that mischievous moppet. Recently his mother, Mrs. Dorothy North, recalled how her son, then 6 years old, announced after studying the commercials that he would like to be on television. So she took him along to an audition. \rightarrow

It's an inside joke with the boys that Sajid can't understand why Jay waited so long. He himself was only 3 years old when his uncle, a film producer, really noticed the child with liquid eyes the size of halfdollars and not only starred him in the classic "Mother India" but adopted him as well. Like Jay, Sajid has grown up to be a good-looking, intelligent actor and a fine advertisement for his country.

By the time the boys returned to Bombay they were no longer downhearted, and ready to work even harder on a show that was unusually demanding. One of the first episodes of *Maya* involved a scene so hazardous Jay and Sajid were convinced they were going to be swept over a dam and the entire series was about to come to an untimely end. The script called for the crossing of a swift river. The idea was for them to wade into the water waist high, then withdraw to safety while doubles took their place.

"But we were in better shape than the doubles," Jay told me during a recent trip to the U.S. "The current was too fast for them, so we did the whole thing ourselves. There was a 500-foot waterfall behind us, and though we were fighting as hard as we could, we were being swept toward it. While we were yelling for help with all our might, I heard someone say, 'Keep them rolling—it's a great shot.' I suppose it would have been an even better shot if we had gone over the falls!"

"That's the worst thing we ever did," Sajid shuddered. "We were really getting panicky."

Because of close camera work Jay also had to do his own stunts in other risky scenes—leaping to the back of Maya the elephant from the hood of a moving jeep and firing a blank rifle cartridge into the unpredictable face of a full-grown tiger. He said: "They told me, 'Jay, you have to shoot a tiger today.' Well, I made my last will and testament. He was supposed to be a trained tiger and there was a trainer about, but I didn't know what he would do when I shot the blank into his face.

"Sajid was up a tree as part of the scene but only 10 feet high. I fired and the tiger suddenly turned and started for Sajid, who was so startled he fell back on the branch. Luckily the tiger didn't jump or Sajid would have been a goner. Ten feet is nothing for a tiger."

"Tell him about your schedule," said Mrs. North, a small, efficient blonde who is on location with her son every day.


"We get up at 6 A.M.," Jay said. "In the series I'm pretending to be an Indian beggar boy, so they spend an hour putting on my face and body makeup and you can go out of your skull while they're doing that. Then we ride out to wherever the location is in a bus specially made for the Pope's visit to India. We're out till the light goes—sometimes more than 90 miles from Bombay over rough and narrow roads.

"All day long you're climbing up and down an elephant." (He bobbed his head up and down to simulate the motion of a moving elephant.)

In the script Maya is an affectionate pachyderm. In real life she has a running feud with her trainer, and when relations are strained, she shows her displeasure by throwing off the boys.

"She certainly can get a little spooky at times," Jay said. "If she doesn't like visiting actors, she hits them with a gob of sweat from her trunk—elephants sweat internally, you know. And I've got to watch the peanut butter sandwiches my mother makes for my lunch or Maya will steal them. Amazing how she unwraps them first."

There was a loud interruption.



"Haguth!" Sajid shouted. "Chemp!"

"Elephant talk," Jay translated, "for 'Go forward!' and 'Go back!'"

Jay said that after dinner back in Bombay he studies with a tutor; he insists his eventual goal is engineering. not acting. But he is developing into an uncommonly attractive young man and looks a better bet to stay right in show business. He said diplomatically that he doesn't have time to take evening walks in Bombay. What he meant was a stroll would be difficult because of the hordes of "pavement dwellers" living in the streets. Sajid doesn't like the poverty any more than Jay, but it obviously comes as more of a shock to a boy in contact with it for the first time.

After a dinner of his favorite Mexican dishes aboard a ship in Bombay harbor one night, Jay looked sadly out to shore: "All that great food. . . and all those people starving there."

When the monsoon rains hit Bombay, the company moved north to the storied Vale of Kashmir and ran into another Indian complication—riots. "Most of them were religious," Jay said. "Something about intermarriage. Another started during the Arab-Israeli war when a rumor got around that Mecca had been bombed. We couldn't leave our hotel for three days. I didn't really see much of Kashmir."

Maya is the spawn of a feature film of that name made by producer King, who considers India one of the few countries in the world not yet stripped of its "foreignness" by the shrinking and unifying effect of jet travel. He's only just in time. Already there are mini-skirts among the saris in Bombay, and Jay and his mother live in a hotel inspired by a hostelry in exotic Miami Beach, Fla.

Sajid, who has picked up Jay's enthusiasms, said they were teaching Maya to kick an American football. A two-ton football player? Well, the way the pro game is going, it's not hard to imagine. Now we all know that the Ponderosa is a fictional place—sort of a horsy Oz —located somewhere outside of Virginia City, Nev., and that it is ostensibly named after the ponderosa pine that proliferates all over the place. Indeed, some have speculated that the Ponderosa is curiously shaped like a Chevrolet insignia, but, since it's a mythical place, no one can be sure. In any event no such place *really* exists, right?

Wrong.

The real Ponderosa is located some 12 miles south of Last Chance Gulch, an old sector of Helena, Mont. The Ponderosa is owned by a Cartwright (Claude, in this case) and is a 19square-mile cattle ranch (not at all shaped like a Chevrolet insignia). Ponderosa pine proliferates all over the place.


The ranch is on land that dates as a land grant back to the 1860's, when

Virginia City was the capital of the territory and violence, rapine and murder were integral parts of the native folkways. Gold was the byword, and the mischievous locals went to many lengths to acquire it.

But those palmier days are past now, and the Ponderosa is pretty quiet. Most of the violence occurs on television; rapine is considered bad taste; and murder is definitely forbidden. With the demise of posses and lynchings the horses have been allowed to get fat on the rich grass, and the contented cattle seem disinclined to stampede. Most folks don't even carry a well-oiled six-gun.

But if the tenor of the area has changed, the land hasn't. It's still vast with grass, dotted with grazing cattle and crossed by rutted dirt roads (although you're much more likely to encounter a truck or a jeep than a buggy or buckboard, and the highway-

man business is in a slump). The yellow-bark ponderosa pines still stand, and the fences are still fabricated of wooden rails—just as they probably were 100 years ago.

The Cartwright ranch house is typical Montana, with foot-thick stone walls, large fireplaces and a woodburning cook stove (it can get very cold during a Montana winter). Electricity is new to the place: When a power company wanted to run its lines across the Ponderosa, Cartwright traded right-of-way for free power. An electric freezer is the house anachronism.


"So," you may very well ask, "where are the boys—Hoss, and Little Joe, and what's-his-name who upped and run off to the big city a couple of winters back? Where's Claude's kids?"

He's got them.

They're not really his, in a matter

of speaking, but they do belong to his daughter, one Mrs. John Zipperian, who lives on a farm about 20 miles down the road. There are four of them and they are named Kenny, Mark, Danny and Gary, the youngest, who has been inevitably yclept "Little Joe" (you were expecting maybe "Big Sid" or "Beowulf"?). They have yet to shoot it out with the ugly folks up the crick, or participate in the Saturday night brawl at the saloon, but then they are still young.

In closing, it should be noted that Oscar Wilde once said something to the effect that life imitates art. Claude Cartwright did not name his place the Ponderosa until *after Bonanza* appeared. Therefore, you too may have a chance. For instance, if you happened to be named Elmo Cannon, and you own a ranch covered with scruffy weeds, the world might be in need of a factual *High Chaparral*.



THE NIGHT THE BRITISH STORMED THE PALACE

An inside account of the production of a Hollywood variety show

The command post is a red-carpeted office half a block from Hollywood and Vine. Producer Nick Vanoff nestles in a leather swivel chair behind a walnut desk. The walls above him are decorated with photographs of Frank Sinatra, Milton Berle, Bing Crosby and other celebrities he has employed on The Hollywood Palace.

Within easy reach are moroccobound volumes containing scripts from *The Palace* and *The Perry Como Show*, on which Vanoff once earned \$20-a-week holding cue cards before rising to the post of producer. A pair of television monitors face him from the far side of the paneled room.

It is video-taping day for Show #13 of the new season, which is being staged four months ahead of time for viewing on Dec. 5. [Because of the recent union strike, it was shown last Oct. 17 .- ED.] Vanoff has signed pop-singer Petula Clark to be the hostess for an all-British review at a fee of \$10,000. The remainder of the cast includes Lynn Redgrave, the gawky star of "Georgy Girl"; Noel Harrison, recently liberated from the flop Girl from U.N.C.L.E. series: George Sanders, one of Zsa Zsa Gabor's favorite husbands; Ullett and Hendra, a Cambridge University postgraduate comedy team; and the Nitwits, a bearded band of geriatrics

known for mangling Offenbach.

"We have everybody but Princess Margaret and Her Orchestra," wisecracks writer Jay Burton.

Burton has co-authored the show's major comedy sketch, a broad, slapstick satire of "Camelot." The script calls for Miss Redgrave (Queen Guinevere) to pour wine over Sanders (King Arthur), lose half her royal gown and train, submerge her hand in a bowl of soup, give Harrison (Sir Lancelot) a hot seat with a misplaced candle, and grovel on the ground for a broken strand of priceless pearls. In a rousing finish she accidentally stabs all the participants to death with a sword, including herself.

Vanoff watches a preliminary runthrough of this sketch on a monitor, idly strumming a guitar.

"Lynn should talk up a little louder," he says, speaking on a hot line to the control room. "She can't be heard. When her train comes off, everything has to come with it. It has to be like one move. When George steps off the throne, that should happen much quicker."

"There are so many things wrong with this," production assistant Rita Scott groans on the other end of the phone. "I know," says Vanoff patiently.

William O. Harbach, The Palace's graying co-producer, has been super-

vising the rehearsal on-stage. He walks into Vanoff's second-floor office, opens the second of four packs of gum he will chew before the end of the day, and evaluates Miss Redgrave's performance.

"She's just more or less walking through it," he complains. "I hope she comes alive when she sees audience. Did you get that opening line?"

"She's throwing it away," Vanoff replies. "She works like a circus performer. Until someone says: "This is going to be a print, get ready, we're gonna make it now,' she just kind of fakes it. Como used to sing like you couldn't hear him if you were standing right next to him, until the people showed up."

Director Grey Lockwood enters to review the just-completed runthrough. "We're concerned about the lights on Petula, Lynn and George in the opening," observes Vanoff. "I wish there'd be more light down on the apron, so they don't keep losing people in the shadows. There must be some way we can light that apron so we can have a whole high key."

"T'll set up those first three closeups," suggests Lockwood, peering through the glasses on the end of his nose. "Pow! Pow! Pow! As soon as they come out and each one has a line."

"The wonderful thing about this crew is that we've all worked together at one time or another over the past 15 years," says Vanoff, after Lockwood leaves the room. "They know what I mean, without going into a panic. It's like broom-boom-bamrim shot."

Six-year-old Nick Vanoff Jr. bursts through the door, crying. "Daddy," he wails, "Billy's hitting me. He's punching me in the stomach."

"Hit him back," demands Vanoff, sending the child away. "Give him a shot right back." He picks up his guitar and plucks eight bars of "Ave Maria." "Producing shows is easy," he says. "What's tough is just keeping the traffic straight around here."

Jimmy Durante arrives to rehearse a number for a later show. Actress Joey Heatherton, accompanied by her agent, discusses contracts behind a locked door. Vanoff's wife, a *Palace* assistant choreographer, kisses him good-by and leaves for home.

The traffic increases when four writers, several agents and managers and an ABC network trouble-shooter descend on Vanoff's office to watch the dress rehearsal. The monitor across the room lights up, showing a chalked slate which reads: "Holly- \rightarrow

wood Palace, Petula Clark, Show #13, VTR: August 27, 1967, Air: December 5, 1967."

The stage manager claps the top of the slate. Vanoff touches a remotecontrol switch beneath his desk, activating the sound. "From Hollywood, the heart of the entertainment world ... The Hollywood Palace!" shouts an announcer, his voice reverberating over the souped-up audio system.

The Mitchell Ayres Orchestra plays the theme of The Palace, "Put on a Happy Face." Vanoff dims the lights, leaving only a miniature klieg to illuminate his desk. Carol Warrian, his platinum blonde secretary, sits beside him, a stenographer's notebook on her lap. Over the din he barks comments in her left ear as the first production number fills the screen: "Fill empty seats for opening shot." . . . "As soon as they announce Lynn Redgrave, applause." . . . "Before Lynn finishes 'The British Are Coming,' bring in tympani." . . . "More hot light on Petula's face in 'England Swings' when she's on ramp by herself."


Vanoff fidgets on the edge of his chair, occasionally smiling at what he sees. "She looks sensational," says writer Bernie Orenstein, as Camera 3 dollies in for a close-up of Petula waving a Union Jack.

"Great," agrees Vanoff, mouthing "This Is My Song" along with her. "Yeah, yeah, yeah!" The screen goes to black and he resumes noodling at his guitar.

Ullett and Hendra's comedy turn is punctuated by the staccato laughter of Harbach, who stands just out of camera range urging them on. In his exuberance, Hendra hits a high note that disables an overhead microphone. Vanoff grumbles and dials the control room. The voices of Ullett and Hendra crackle and rasp throughout the remainder of the routine.

Next, Noel Harrison croons "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds," a recent Beatles' hit. "I love this song," Van-

off exults. "This guy is gonna be the biggest thing."

The "Camelot" sketch fares little better than it did during the runthrough. "The finish is an old bit," he grouses. "We've gotta punch these jokes up."

"Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band," a musical number featuring Harrison, Petula and Lynn, wins clamorous applause. Miss Clark then sings two tunes, "Imagine" and "Don't Sleep in the Subway," and the dress rehearsal ends.

Vanoff scoops up his notes, leaves the air-conditioned office by a back stairs and moves unnoticed through members of the audience exiting into the street. The eyes of two dozen shirt-sleeved technicians and staff are riveted on him as he reaches the jammed control room.

"The show was great, fellas," he

says, standing in front of a panel of darkened monitors. He glances over the notes and launches into a critique.

"Listen," he says, rubbing his forehead. "Can we fill the seats in the back here for the beginning?"

"We'll put some pages, a couple of pages," Harbach promises.

"Also," he says, "I feel Noel shouldn't wear that wig in the 'Camelot' sketch. He's got long hair anyway. He should look more romantic."

"OK," says Harbach. "Take the wig off Noel."

"The Beefeaters coming downstage in silhouette really are bad," he continues, reading from his long list. "Tell George to wait for the laughs. Petula kind of rushes her dialog on the opening spot. Tell her to take it easy. What happened with Ullett and Hendra?"

"One of them screamed and blew out the mike," explains Harbach. "We've gotta tell him not to scream."

Suddenly, Vanoff improvises a device to help beef up the "Camelot" sketch. "Right after the line: 'If Guinevere and Lancelot dance a lot, they'll romance a lot and he'll take her to France a lot,' " he breathlessly notes, "Hendra should say: 'Cha-cha-cha.' It's like a guaranteed laugh."

Several hunks of corny dialog have already been chopped from the cumbersome sketch, reducing it in length from eight to five minutes. Vanoff suggests that Petula add a third song at the end of the show, a ballad she has briefly rehearsed, to replace the missing three minutes.

"She doesn't feel comfortable about doing two ballads together," insists her husband, Claud Wolff, indicating that one of her two songs in the finale is a slow ballad.

"I don't think it's bad to have two ballads," argues Vanoff. "We used to do it on *Como* all the time and it never really hurt us."

"We can rehearse it with the orchestra in 10 minutes," says Harbach, anxiously eying the red sweep second hand on a wall clock. "Let me talk her into it."

"Sure," relents Wolff.

Custodians are mopping and waxing the stage of the empty theater as Petula stands next to conductor Mitchell Ayres, peering through her outsize blue sunglasses at pages of sheet music. A man's jacket is draped over her tiny shoulders. She sings "Just Say Goodbye," an up-tempo ballad for which she composed the music, with great emotion.

"It'll tear the house down," predicts Harbach, hugging Miss Clark.

"Once you try to fix everything," Vanoff comments, trudging back to his office, "you have no show left. This way you pick the important things."

He sighs and slumps into his swivel chair. The drama of taping the real show is only 15 minutes away.

A well-dressed Sunday night audience, many of whom have waited three months for tickets, settles into the *Palace* theater's royal blue banquettes. Cameramen check their focuses on the faces in the crowd, beaming images to the two television screens located in Vanoff's isolated nerve center.

"They look like they drove all the way from Miami overnight and made all the lights," says Vanoff, who has just changed into a fresh white shirt, black silk tie and rubbed himself with London Lyme Eau de Cologne. "OK. Here we go."

The miniature hurricane lamps girdling *The Palace*'s apron and runway twinkle on all at once. The 30-piece *Palace* orchestra breaks into the opening strains of "England Swings." A troupe of 12 dancers, dressed as Beefeaters, canters up the aisle and onto the stage. Vanoff, himself a former dancer and choreographer, hurriedly phones the control room.

"Do it again," he commands. "It was terrible." \rightarrow

Not much later, George Sanders emerges from an outsize box decorated with Union Jacks, glances at his cue cards and fumbles his lines. The scene stops in babbling confusion. In dress rehearsal Sanders had recited his dialog with great precision.

"That's OK," says Vanoff on the hot line to the control room. "We've got that on dress."

What at-home viewers customarily see is a skillful splicing of the best portions of dress rehearsal and actual performance, both of which are taped. Sanders insists on redoing the entire number, however, rather than relying upon the video-taped dress rehearsal. "Let him do it over again," Vanoff moans. "He won't get any laughs. We'll go to dress when he dies."

Sanders vainly repeats his opening lines. "Use the dress," Vanoff curtly instructs the secretary taking notes at his elbow. With a deep groan, he plunks his guitar and sings: "It's just one of those nights, just one of those ... horrible nights ..."

Vanoff idly examines some papers on his desk and comes across the ABC schedule for the current season. "You know something," he says. "This is the second oldest nighttime show on the network. We may die of old age."

Nobody gave The Hollywood Palace much of a chance the night it premiered in January 1964. ABC executives regarded the variety hour as a cheap, emergency replacement for the canceled Jerry Lewis Show, one of the most expensive failures in television history.

Celebrities of stature were at first reluctant to headline the stopgap show, whose format seemed to have been unabashedly lifted from Ed Sullivan. Even the ushers were hard put to fill the 700-seat theater with an audience for the first show, a vaudeville potpourri featuring among others, musical clowns, puppets, acrobats, a magician and Gary Crosby singing "Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho."

In the four years since that dubious beginning, more than 1200 acts have faced *The Palace* cameras—a motley roster ranging from Fonteyn and Nureyev to Koufax and Drysdale to Dwight Moore and His Mongrels.

As last season ended, Vanoff was negotiating for a *Palace* company to open at a Las Vegas night club. He shared in substantial profits from *Palace* road shows playing county fairs and music tents in addition to his \$10,000-a-week pay check.

"What we try to do is give every act some style and chic," said Vanoff. "Ziegfeld used to do it all the time. He'd get some act that was playing a third-rate vaudeville house, dress it up and put it on the stage. Then he'd try to leave the audience wanting some more."

That philosophy enabled the unlikely producing coalition of Vanoff and Harbach to parallel Ed Sullivan as TV's foremost variety-show impresarios—"unlikely" because Vanoff is a Greek immigrant from Macedonia who was once a \$150-a-week hoofer on Sullivan's show, and Harbach is the wealthy son of a Broadway lyricist, who attended the Choate School with the late John F. Kennedy.

On *The Palace* stage downstairs, Ullett and Hendra are doing their routine. They manage to avoid upsetting the overhead microphone. The fact that their act is receiving few laughs is even more upsetting.

"They got screams this afternoon," says Vanoff, shaking his head. "It's a tough audience tonight. Too many in-people."

Hendra spoofs Excedrin midway through a satire of television commercials. One of *The Palace*'s sponsors is Bayer aspirin. Vanoff snaps his fingers, anticipating another headache.

"He said Excedrin!" shouts ABC trouble-shooter Mitch Gamson, jumping from his chair. "That's OK," Vanoff replies. "It's a satirical bit."

"I'll bet Broadcast Standards will do a blip-blip," Gamson predicts.

"They said Excedrin," echoes a voice on the hot line from the control room. "Bayer aspirin is in [commercial] position two."

"Make a note and call me Monday morning and we'll move Bayer into the second half of the show," says Gamson grudgingly.

Vanoff grabs his guitar and plays several absonant chords while stagehands move sets for the next number.

"Hey, Nick," says one of the hangers-on sitting in his office. "Are you gonna do all your shows this year in this kind of format? Less acrobats and all that junk? It's a good idea. You know, it's like a special."

"It is," Vanoff agrees, "but we can't afford it. We're not budgeted for this kind of thing. The move of the time period is what did it."

The arbitrary switching of *The Palace* to Tuesday nights is a sore point with Vanoff.

"T'm awfully bitter about ABC," he admits. "You can't believe their interference. When you create something and work on it for almost four years, you should be consulted. We did beautifully for them on Saturday night. Now we gotta run down the street looking for a new audience and say: 'Yoo-hoo, come on in.' But how can you fight the network?" [The program will be shifted back to Saturdays on Jan. 13.]

"Here we go," he says, as Petula, Lynn and Noel limp into camera range, singing "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band." The three entertainers have never previously worked together, yet the number is the highlight of the show.

The "Camelot" sketch suffers almost as much the second time around as it did in dress rehearsal. "There's still something wrong with that," Vanoff admits. "I don't know what it is." But the audience howls when Hendra seemingly ad-libs, "Cha-cha-cha," just as suggested by Vanoff earlier.

Miss Clark then sings her three impressive songs. "A lot of great things are gonna happen to her," Vanoff shouts to those gathered around him. "I love her. Bella, bella!"

The show is over. Vanoff uses his secretary's brush to tidy his curly hair. He walks through the empty theater onto the stage. Harbach waits for him, chewing his gum. They shake hands. "I think we lost money this week," Vanoff says, facetiously, "but it was worth it."

They both wander toward a small room adjacent to the dressing rooms, which is stocked with liquor and all the participants in the show.

Harbach stretches out on a couch, Scotch in hand, propping his legs on a coffee table. The fourth *Palace* hour to be completed in a hectic 12-day period—and the 126th hour since the beginning of the series—has been committed to tape. "Right now, down to here, is when I begin to calm down," he says, designating the bottom of a tumbler. "It was a beautiful, beautiful show."

Outside the stage door, Vanoff glances at the British performers being besieged by autograph seekers. "You try to get what's hot first," he says, climbing into his Mercedes 250 SE. "All it takes is talent."





Richard Dawson, 33, who plays the Englishman, Newkirk, in CBS's series about fun in a World War II German POW camp, wasn't funny SO when, at 20, he made his debut as a comedian. An obscure repertory actor at the time, he wrote a London theatrical agency saying that he was "a well-known Canadian comedian" looking for an engagement while in England on vaca-

tion. Amazingly, the agency sent him a contract for six weeks at a music hall in Plymouth.

"I didn't even have an act," he recalls. "I got together a few jokes, bought a stock arrangement of 'Georgia on My Mind' and reported for work. I told the jokes. Nothing. Then I announced my song and waited for the microphone to rise up from the floor of the stage. I waited and waited. Suddenly I felt a strange sensation in my right leg. The audience started to laugh. The mike-it was one of those long thin ones-had gone up my trouser leg. I lifted my leg to try to get it out, but the mike kept coming. There I was standing out on the stage with my leg up in the air!"

The microphone was finally lowered, Dawson did his song and ran off the stage in tears. As he came off, the theater manager rushed up to him, grabbed his lapels and roared, "You've



never even been on a stage before, have you?" After Dawson confessed what he had done, the manager, somehow mollified. turned him over to a 90year-old comedian named Billy Bennett, who provided him with a routine and rehearsed him in it until it was time for the next show, "This time they laughed at the jokes," says Dawson. Later, when he asked why he had not just been thrown out, the manager said, "I was watching the audience - I could see they didn't hate vou."

Eleven months later, Dawson was playing the London Palladium.

"He's balmy, but he's bright."— A FRIEND.

It took some fast thinking and lots of nerve for Dawson to become an actor in the first place. After three years as a merchant seaman (he went to sea at 14), he was ashore at the Isle of Wight when he saw a notice that the Barry O'Brien Players were looking for actors. He applied.

As he waited his turn, he saw that other applicants were doing scenes from various plays for their auditions. "I didn't know any plays, but I once had a teacher who recited Shakespeare," Dawson says. "Of course, I didn't know any Shakespeare, but I did know the *noise* of it—the way it sounded."

Thus, when his name was called, he walked on-stage and mumbled, "Henry the VIII, Act Two." Then he launched into a rigamarole of highsounding double-talk which had the cadence and some of the words he remembered from Shakespeare. The manager of the company interrupted: "Mr. Dawson, what are you doing?" Dawson stopped and lamely answered, "I don't know, sir." The manager said, "Why are you doing it?" Dawson replied, "Because I want to be an actor." The manager pondered a moment and then said, "I may be able to help you."

The following week, Dawson was playing three parts—one of them a corpse—in the then current production of the Barry O'Brien Players. He traveled with the company for two years at three pounds (\$8.40) a week, before writing the letter to London saying that he was a Canadian comedian looking for a vacation engagement.

Richard Dawson had only two years


of formal education. Born in 1934, he reached school age during World War II. He and his brother were evacuated from Gosport. Hampshire. their birthplace, for the duration of the war. but they ran away and returned home because the people they lived with in country hit the them. "Our parents never did that." savs Dawson.

Home for Dawson now is a rambling ranch house in Beverly Hills, which he shares with his two sons, Mark, 7, and Gary, 5, their nanny, and a 185pound Great Dane. The boys' mother is actress Diana Dors. She and Dawson were married in 1959 and parted in 1964. She now lives in England.

Dawson says he sleeps only two hours a night. He attempts to read a book every night and he "writes" for an hour and a half (because he does not know punctuation he dictates short stories, comedy routines and ideas for teleplays into a tape recorder). He does not eat all day but, he estimates, he consumes 30 cups of coffee. In the evening, he returns home for a big steak with "my rats"—the two boys.

"He's amazingly sensitive and warm."—A FRIEND.

Dawson's two sons are the most important fact of his life. "They're the reason I wake up in the morning," he says. When the boys went to England for the Christmas holidays last year, Mark, at parting, said, "Thanks for being our Dad." Dawson



says, "That's worth more than any movie contract in the world."
