CHRISTOPHER GEORGE (The Rat Patrol) plays an American Air Force colonel who bombs Berlin in "The 1000 Plane Raid" movie. It's one of six features he's signed to star in for Mirisch Films . . . DENNIS DAY, one of Hollywood's perennial Irishmen, is the voice of a leprechaun in "The Magic Shillalah" episode of Hanna-Barbera Productions' The New Adventures of Huck Finn. The series, scheduled for fall, combines animation and live action . . SUZY PARKER will be a guest star in one of ROBERT WAGNER's It Takes a Thief capers on ABC. ■ At this writing the National Association of Broadcasters still is sitting on the results of a 1966 survey of public attitudes toward television. Actually most of the figures are quite favorable, but there are a few indications that the public is not entirely happy with things as they are on the screen and, being a trade organization, the NAB cannot admit any failures. Luckily, the weekly newsletter Television Digest managed to get the facts, which are as follows:

Their opinion of TV programming was rated "favorable" by 42 percent of the 2518 persons interviewed by the National Opinion and Research Center of the University of Chicago, "unfavorable" by 33 percent. Some 33 percent reported that they regularly watch programs they consider to be "bad." More educational shows were

desired by 70 percent.

■ A majority (53 percent) felt television has a good effect on children, only 19 percent thought it has a harmful effect. A majority (51 percent) also felt TV helps children learn; 37 percent said there's too much sex and violence. And 76 percent said they set limitations on children's viewing. Finally, 64 percent favor self-regulation of TV by broadcasters, only 28 percent want Government regulation.

Of the respondents, 45 percent objected to all three networks canceling regular shows at the same time to telecast a Presidential news conference, a political convention, or some

other special event.

■ To 58 percent of the interviewees the commercials were annoying, while 31 percent found them enjoyable. The complaints ranged from the quantity of commercials (63 percent) to too many interruptions (67 percent) and too many in a row (56 percent).

Despite the annoyance, 73 percent said that commercials are a fair price to pay for TV.



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Global Television...

When?

Experts detail the many reasons why it is still years away

Satellite TV, sí. Global TV, not much. So far, anyway.

And for reasons you might not readily guess.

Take TV's coverage of the Vietnam war: Why not live TV via satellite out of Vietnam?

Forget it! Hanoi, Saigon and Washington aren't about to arrange battle times and places to suit TV's prime time.

Well, then, how about lots of livelive TV news out of Europe?

Nope, wouldn't work so well. Europe's in bed by the time we settle down for an evening of TV. Picking up news as it happens in Europe as likely as not would only cut in on Treasure Isle or Everybody's Talking. You sure the ladies would approve?

Anyway, what's so big on the other side of the pond that we can't wait a couple of hours to see it? And what do we need satellites for if we can fly crisp, colorful film of it into New York in time for the evening news?

Besides, even though TV signals technically can circle the globe via satellite, it takes ground stations to pump the pictures up to the bird and pick the returning pictures out of space; and earth stations, though growing in number every month, sometimes just aren't handy to an event somebody wants to televise.

Then, when it comes to getting

satellite TV out of two big areas of the globe, there's the matter of a couple of curtains called Iron and Bamboo. The Russians don't choose to play in our satellite league. The Chinese have the A-bomb but no Early Bird, and presumably they wouldn't be speaking to us through it if they did.

And finally—or among the finallies—there's the cost. But a common assumption about satellite pickups being too expensive to permit frequent network newscast switches to Europe and Asia apparently is invalid. The TV networks, at any rate, insist the tab isn't all that prohibitive.

The charges levied by the Communications Satellite Corporation and foreign agencies operating earth stations are not exactly peanuts, it's true. A 10-minute color feed from London to New York even in so-called non-peak time can cost a network about \$5375. The Europeans have been slow in bringing down rates in line with Comsat's and those charged by Japan for a New York-Tokyo pickup. A similar feed over the longer distance to Asia typically costs \$4031.

But expense is not the prime deterrent, say newsmen at ABC, CBS and NBC. Clearing channels on the four man-made stars isn't a major hurdle either, although in the recent past the networks were inhibited in their use of the initial Pacific \rightarrow

satellite because Comsat sometimes couldn't get enough regular non-TV users to surrender circuits, especially to feed color.

Exactly why there are such infrequent news pickups or special programs piped via satellite seems to require other explanations. Take Robert (Shad) Northshield's. He is executive producer of NBC's Huntley-Brinkley Report, a program with anchor men in New York and Washington, as anybody knows, but which, in the wake of initial Early Bird excitement, was envisioned as soon to have a third anchor man reporting nightly, and live, from London.

"Europe simply has been dullsville lately," Northshield observed. "The chief focus of our attention overseas is on Vietnam. There just hasn't been much happening of consequence in Europe to warrant satellite feeds. Anyway, most of the time we can shoot what we want on color film over there and jet it to New York in time for same-day use. The time differential (that is to say, when it's 9 P.M. in London it's 4 P.M. in New York) works in our favor on European coverage."

Sid Darion, Bob Young's news producer, points out that "the gimmick value of satellites is gone—we now use them just as though we were switching to the West Coast." On the other hand, "Europe is just so close by plane that there are few stories we can't fly back, guaranteeing ourselves top picture quality and sound, at no risk of poor transmission."

Walter Cronkite echoes these attitudes, but the CBS News star says cost is a factor. "We could use a satellite feed nightly but something else would have to give, budget-wise. If we had a reasonably priced Atlantic satellite, I think we'd use it every day."

Remarkably, there is no feverish agitation among TV newsmen for

facilities to feed live TV out of Saigon.

As far back as October 1966, Julian Goodman, news-trained president of NBC, predicted in a speech: "Within a year it seems likely we will be transmitting directly from Saigon... Even live coverage from the battlefields of Vietnam will be a technical possibility."

It isn't yet. There is still no Saigon earth station. The reasons given are varied: The South Vietnamese government, which would have to authorize if not actually build such a facility, has no need or seeming desire to put one up. Besides, the U.S. military, while not censoring coverage of the war, apparently is not at all anxious to have live TV satellite-fed out of that zone.

In the same speech Goodman noted that "possibly within a year, portable ground stations will be available for shipment by plane to news spots anywhere in the world." Such gear exists—an ITT portable dish on shipboard has televised astronaut splashdowns from the mid-Atlantic—but thus far there has been no commercial use of it. One reason, it seems, is that a tab of somewhere around \$300,000 would be incurred in flying this equipment to a remote locality and setting it up for a special feed.

Network practice when a satellite feed from Vietnam has been deemed worthwhile has been to fly film or a newsman, or both, to Tokyo, closest site of an earth station. This saves about five hours as opposed to jetting film all the way to California.

In April the Thais will open an earth station near Bangkok, just 90 minutes' flying time from Saigon, which ultimately will prompt the U.S. networks, if the Vietnam war continues, to step up their satellite usage. For a few months, however, the Bangkok dish will be transmitting only as far as Hawaii via Pacific II. The same applies to a new earth station opening in April

at Manila. Direct feeds to the U.S. from Thailand and the Philippines will not be possible until Intelsat III, a third-generation bird, is lofted over the Pacific late this year.

An Australian earth station designed for immediate direct transmissions to California will be ready for use in April. New stations planned in Taiwan, Hong Kong and Indonesia will not be operational until 1969 or later.

The Pacific zone is not the only one rapidly being readied for wide participation in space-age TV.

Latin America, left out of the satellite swim up to now, is racing to get in. Earth stations will be operational this year in Chile, Mexico, Panama and Peru. Five other South American countries, including Brazil and Argentina, will join the satellite family in 1969, along with six African countries (Kenya is coming on this year) and six Middle East spots. Altogether, be-


fore 1970, earth stations are scheduled to be added in 34 localities. There are just 10 now having TV capabilities.

In space, a third-generation satellite, the Intelsat III, will be positioned over the Atlantic, a second over the Pacific, and a third over the Indian Ocean by next fall. If all goes according to plan, they will be stationed in time to beam the Olympics from Mexico City to virtually every corner of the globe.

A larger, more sophisticated bird than its forebears, Intelsat III will have full-time video channels, eliminating the necessity of blocking out telephone, telegraph, data and other users in order to clear a TV feed.

Moreover, Intelsat IV is already in the works, targeted for lofting in 1970-72. Its capacity will exceed III's by five-fold. "As you can see," a Comsat official cited, "rates for TV use are simply bound to come down."

With bigger Intelsats, a prolif- →



eration of earth stations and lower rates, won't satellite TV become commonplace on the U.S. networks? Surprisingly, not everybody in command thinks so. For instance, Richard S. Salant, CBS News president, com-ments, "The technological revolution has been way overplayed as to its influence on TV news coverage. I have long felt this. I see no marked step-up in our use of the satellites. I think it's unrealistic to expect it, partly because of time-zone differentials, partly because of costs." Satellites, he admitted, "are damned good" for covering "the great human events" like a Churchill funeral or the picking of a new Pope, but he thinks the networks on a day-to-day basis will continue to rely mainly on film flown in from abroad.

Actually, Comsat's records show there has been considerable escalation in use of the birds by TV. In 1965 TV systems abroad as well as in this country fed 33 hours, 30 minutes of programming via Early Bird. In 1966 the usage climbed to 80 hours. while in the first nine months of 1967 alone it exceeded 178 hours. "Satellite use by TV has become a fever chart of world events," Comsat's Dan Karasik noted. "The Arab-Israeli war last June jumped the pickups to 50 hours. That was not just incoming feeds from Rome (closest to the scene) and elsewhere, but included outgoing feeds to Europe and Asia of the United Nations' deliberations in New York."

The U.S. networks, as a matter of fact, are by no means the only TV users of Comsat's air-borne relays. Eurovision, Britain's BBC and the Japanese commercial and viewer-supported networks are almost as big Comsat customers as the Americans.

Looking down the TV pike three to five years, how much "via satellite" news do the networks foresee? NBC's Reuven Frank expresses a probably typical viewpoint: "In five years every place we have a news bureau around the world will be as close as Washington and Chicago."

But, like other news executives, Frank sees the birds being employed largely to expedite filmed highlights of events. For example, he thought that if the networks undertook live continuous coverage of an expected summit meeting in the Pacific area between President Johnson and our Asian allies, "it could bore people to death." But satellites would be needed to flash summarized coverage back home.

Says ABC's Sid Darion: "If there is real tragedy somewhere, such as that cave-in in Wales, then of course all stops are pulled out and there's no question about live coverage. Otherwise, we just use satellites as a tool for possible competitive advantage."

In five years there will be lots of satellite-fed news on TV, thinks NBC producer Shad Northshield, if only "because evening newscasts will be an hour long by then."

News, naturally, is not the only fodder for satellite TV. Sports events have been big features via Early Bird, especially on ABC's Wide World of Sports. The only live telecast out of the Soviet to date was ABC's of the Russian-American track meet at Kiev. ABC has on occasion fed sports coverage live to three continents simultaneously.

One of the most ambitious programs for satellite use will be ABC's coverage of the Winter Olympics from Grenoble, France, starting next week, while coming on next fall is the greatest sports telecast—and biggest single satellite-TV event—in history: the Olympics from Mexico, expected to be viewed live by upward of 400 million persons.

Roone Arledge, boss of ABC Sports, regards satellites as "a neglected breakthrough in communications which ought to be in routine use." At the same time he concedes not every foreign sports event worth televising warrants satellite treatment. "There's not much sense putting something on at 7 A.M. in the U.S., just so you can say it's 'live via satellite,' " he observes. "Much depends on where an event takes place and how important it is to show it while it's happening."

Entertainment via satellite is a potential novelty which has titillated the network programmers for several years, but thus far nothing of this kind has jelled. Both Thomas W. Moore, president of ABC-TV, and Mort Werner, program chief of NBC-TV, have glibly proposed experimenting with a "Wide World of Entertainment" employing live satellite pickups from various foreign locales. Moore's idea is that late-night variety acts in European clubs could be beamed across the Atlantic during U.S. prime time. Werner has not divulged specifically

what he has in mind except that it might involve Jack Paar as a roving emcee.

But very little—and that only for the novelty—has been attempted in non-news TV via satellite. The memorable demonstrations of Telstar's wonders, a few CBS "Town Meetings of the World," and the "Our World" telecast carried by U.S. educational stations last June remain, along with occasional sportscasts, the principal exhibits to date of the capabilities of satellite TV.

Comsat officials wouldn't be surprised to see foreign broadcasters, especially the Japanese, beginning to outdistance the U.S. networks in grasping opportunities for opening TV's windows on the world. The hangup here at home, it seems, is a kind of parochial lack of interest in what's going on anywhere away from home shores except in that fought-over strip of land in Southeast Asia.

Every Inch A Queen

Dame Judith Anderson is, in her own way, as regal as the monarch she portrays this week

The corridor outside Stage 2 at NBC Burbank is awash with actors in Elizabethan ruff and jerkin. There are enough fake beards to rival Haight-Ashbury. A beefeater, looking like a gin ad, is on the phone to his agent. A tin-hatted palace guard is deep in the trade paper Variety. A red blinker light on a stand revolves lazily, signifying action inside.

Upstairs in the client booth the usual coterie of ad-agency men, talent agents, press agents, production assistants, script adaptors and hangers-on hover reverently over the monitor. This is Hallmark Hall of Fame, the Tiffany of the dramatic shows. These men are true believers, from the agency man who has been "dreaming of doing Maxwell Anderson's 'Elizabeth the Queen' for five years" to the greeting-card tycoon Joyce Hall, who still thumbs his nose at the Nielsen numbers game.

In front of the cameras the dashing Lord Essex and the aging Queen Elizabeth cozy up to each other in what surely must be history's most improbable love affair. "You doubletongued seductress, you bitch of brass," coos actor Charlton Heston in his steamiest matinee-idol manner.

"Silver, my dear," soothes actress Judith Anderson, Dame of the British Empire, famed for her portrayals of Medea and Lady Macbeth. "Let me be a bitch of silver." Dame Judith Anderson? Mad affair? The woman is 69 years old! Moreover, the play creaks, even with a careful updating by adaptor John Friend to remove some of the more ponderous language. Following the example of other famous Elizabeths (notably Lynn Fontanne in the 1930 Theatre Guild production and Bette Davis in the 1939 Warners movie), she has shaved her hairline back a good three-quarters of an inch to achieve the high forehead of England's shrewdest, most ambitious and (it says here) most sensual queen.

Actress to her bone marrow, she skillfully suspends disbelief and brings Elizabeth richly, vibrantly, sensually alive.

Only the ancient actor Frederic Worlock (who plays Lord Burghley) is unmoved. He snoozes bolt upright in a director's chair. "She is incredible," rhapsodizes Heston as producer-director George Schaefer wraps up the scene. "She brings to it the quality the Queen herself must have had—the real Elizabeth."

"She has the instinctive sense of the rhythm of classical tragedy," adds Schaefer. "It is a terrible condemnation of the American theater that she isn't doing a play a year."

Actually, the theater has done pretty well by Dame Judith—and, indeed, she by it. In the 50 years since her mother brought her from Australia as a young girl in 1918, she has performed in scores of plays. Never having possessed the face of the ingénue (Cecil B. DeMille told her in 1918 the movies "had no place" for her), she came to rely on other things

besides physical beautylike power, passion, nobility of spirit. O'Neill suited her where S. N. Behrman didn't. She played the tragic Nina Leeds in "Strange Interlude," and the tragic Lavinia Mannon "Mourning Becomes Electra"; it was inevitable that she would play Queen Gertrude in "Hamlet" (as she did in Gielgud's 1936 production) and Lady Macbeth many times in many guises (including her Emmy-winning Hallmark performances in 1954 and 1960).

She needed and instinctively sought high tragedy, her search intensified by a mother who was never satisfied with her daughter's performance. Dame Judith remembers how she finally made it to the Old Vic playing Lady Macbeth opposite Olivier in 1937, many years before the Queen honored her in 1960. It was a Command Performance. At the matinee she acted her heart out. "I told myself, 'This time she's got to say it.' 'How was I, Mums?' I asked. 'You can do better,' she replied."

In the early Thirties, while on tour in San Francisco with "Strange Interlude," she met the high tragedian among poets, the spare, gaunt, hawkeyed Robinson Jeffers, master of Tor House in Carmel. "Friends brought us together," Dame Judith recalls. "He

was very tall in his riding britches. He just fit in the doorway. It was an immediate meeting of mind and soul. He spoke little; there were only long walks on Point Lobos with their beautiful periods of silence. And yet we

were in perfect communi-

cation."

It was she who persuaded him that in "The Tower Beyond Tragedy" (Jeffers' version of the Electra legend) he had written not so much a narrative poem as a threeact play. Not only did Dame Judith play Clytemnestra brilliantly in Carmel in 1939, but she finally evoked from Mrs. Anderson-Anderson a cautious word of praise. "Well, my girl," said that intrepid lady, "at last you are an actress."

Out of that friendship, too, came the performance for which she is best known. She persuaded Jeffers to do the new version of "Medea," and that tormented lady's searing cries of rage and frustration made a permanent mark on the American theater.

She invited the reclusive Jeffers to the New York opening of "Medea." To her surprise he came. At the final curtain call she blew a kiss in his direction. Later he told her how gracious it was of her to salute her audi-

ence in that manner. "Robin, don't be a fool," she said. "That kiss was for you."

Years later, when he read that she had received an Emmy for her television Lady Macbeth, he wired: CONGRATULATIONS ON YOUR →

EMMY WHATEVER THAT IS. ROBIN.

TV was not her game any more than movies were. She played the game but, significantly, always on her own terms. In the movies she played the part, not for the money-or the billing. She was Mrs. Danvers in Hitchcock's "Rebecca" and she was Big Mama in the movie version of Tennessee Williams' "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof." She played "Macbeth," "Medea," "The Cradle Song," "The Bridge of San Luis Rev" and a smattering of Plauhouse 90's on television. Never once did she consider a "guest shot" in a series because there was nothing, she thought, that she could bring to that flimsy a vehicle.

She persisted in the notion that quality theater, whatever or wherever it might be, was its own best excuse for being. Although she could see where Maxwell Anderson and perhaps even her old love, Eugene O'Neill, had become dated as playwrights, she could not wholly accept the new Williams-Albee-Pinter school either. "I don't like their people. With a guttersnipe there is no grandeur to the fall."

During World War II she and Maurice Evans went out to the South Pacific to bring "the theater" to the fighting men. The Army cautioned her that "Macbeth" might be "over the heads" of the soldiers. Indeed, she remembers one young soldier asking her whether the entertainment would be "round or flat." She explained that it was Shakespeare—a classic. "Classic?" he queried. "What's that?"

Later she saw him again. "I didn't understand a word," he told her, "but it's got me thinking. I want to go again tonight."

It is on this theory that Dame Judith has always operated. Ironically, it was in the South Pacific that she first encountered George Schaefer, the "roly-poly sergeant" who was to become "the C. B. DeMille of Hallmark." She pegged him as an honest man when he was producing soldier shows, and has not had cause to change her opinion. "Hallmark is George Schaefer, his taste, his know-how—a most meticulous man. I like that," she says.

Having done the Anderson play in a New York City Center revival in 1966, she called George to suggest they do it for *Hallmark*. She was convinced the transposition to TV would clear out the deadwood and actually improve the play. "The intercutting possible on tape or film really gives a chance to see the Queen's growing agitation with Essex," she says.

Besides, she loved the part. For her, Elizabeth, some 30-odd years older than Essex, was a woman of mystery. "She hated the idea of age, she loved youth and beauty, but loved above all her throne, her people and peace. In the last scene, the warlike Essex, torn between his ambition and his love, will not give in to the Queen's superior will, and dies. I find it infinitely touching.

For an actress so in thrall to the theater's grander passions, the off-stage woman presents a startling contrast. She is tiny, almost delicate, her manner so soft-spoken and unassuming that she seems less Medea than someone's sparkly maiden aunt.

Still, during the four weeks it took to rehearse and tape Hallmark's "Elizabeth" (for telecasting this Wednesday, Jan. 31), Judith Anderson's presence dominated the set. As it happened, the last scene Schaefer shot was the last scene in the show—Essex's descent into the dungeon to his death. Heston disappeared through a hole cut in the floor of Stage 2 at 8:25 P.M., and Schaefer had wrapped it up within seconds of the scheduled time. The crew broke into spontaneous applause. That is the way it is with real professionals.

NBC Unveils 2-Hour News Show

NBC says it will unveil "commercial television's first regularly scheduled, two-hour, prime-time news program" in January 1969. It will be a monthly, magazine-type feature. subjecting anywhere from two to a dozen topics to an "aggressive journalism" treatment, the network said. What NBC didn't say was that it's a lefthanded flattery of educational TV's Sunday night PBL, the first regularly scheduled, two-hour, prime-time news program. NBC also neglected to note that this is no step-up in its primetime public affairs, inasmuch as in September, a full four months before the two-hour monthly show is introduced, the network will wash out its current Friday night cultural (Bell Telephone Hour)-documentary hour, which NBC news fills on alternate weeks. But NBC made no bones about the audience it is after: First Tuesday, as the two-hour series is tentatively titled, will be tailored to appeal to "the uninvolved young," TV's favorite age group. Uninvolved or not. the younger viewer presumably buys the most soap, beer and cigarets, a statistic calculated to grab sponsors.

ABC meanwhile evidently feels it can be hip, even though poor in the wake of the International Telephone & Telegraph merger pullout, and already is bent on culling news with a pop beat. News vice president Bill Sheehan, the ex-foreign correspondent, has prodded the network's report-

ers and editors to meet with what's happening "I want more stories dealing with the 'pop people' . . . I'm suggesting that Truman Capote is news." Cutting back on less-popconcerns like Vietnam and politics, ABC will dump its Scope series at January's end and confine coverage of next summer's political conventions to 90 minutes nightly. Up to 9:30 (ET) during the nominating powwows, ABC will be rolling with entertainment-as-usual. That is unless a real roll-call battle develops.

ABC, however, isn't the only TV shop hit by "softness" in advertising revenues in recent months. Even top-rated CBS, looking for ways to prune costs, has decided to whittle down its religious programming. As of Jan. 28, Look Up and Live and Lamp unto My Feet, two of TV's most distinguished, long-running Sabbath offerings, will merge into alternating half hours.

Again, as it was last year, NBC is being hammered by an organized "Save Star Trek" campaign, allegedly instigated by a sci-fi magazine. Some of the letters, coming in at the rate of 1000 a week, threaten to blow up the network if the series is canceled. NBC officials vow no decision has been reached, saying none is likely, on any show, until close to Valentine's Day. Rating-wise, Star Trek is a borderline case.

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

By Judith Crist NO MAN IS AN ISLAND (NBC), Saturday SHIP OF FOOLS (ABC), Sunday THE PHANTOM OF THE OPERA (NBC), Tuesday OF MICE AND MEN (ABC), Wednesday YOUNG DILLINGER (CBS), Thursday THE APARTMENT (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

It's a big-name week for the network movies, with the honors going, perhaps, to the least pretentious among them.

The lack of pretension is in the film if not the title-quote of "No Man Is an Island," a true-life World War II tale of Navy signalman George R. Tweed, who, with the aid of the people of Guam, evaded and worked against the Japanese during their 34-month occupation of the island. It's a tale told modestly and sincerely, with a careful avoidance of clichés.

At the other end of the scale there's "Ship of Fools," which, sparked by a handful of brilliant performances, starts out with a glow of promise but finally fizzles into one of the classiest soap operas-cum-social significance to come our way since the original "Grand Hotel." With relative fidelity to the letter rather than complex character and intellectual level of Katherine Anne Porter's novel, producer-director Stanley Kramer and screenwriter Abby Mann have not only simplified but baldly overstated her allegory of the failure of Western Man. But despite characters stripped to stereotype, overwhelming performances disarm one for the duration of scene after scene-(no mean feat in the face of the dialog). Simone Signoret and Oskar Werner elevate sheer schmaltz and Weltschmerz to heights of personal tragedy; Vivien Leigh, Lee Marvin and Michael Dunn are also perfect.

Shirley MacLaine and Jack Lemmon too provide reason for watching the rerun of "The Apartment," Billy Wilder's witty, cynical and basically repellent comedy of bed-and-water-cooler politics, making the un-nice "little" people they portray palatable for the duration. It's the unpleasant aftertaste—or afterthought—that spoils the sport of this one.

Some of the sport is missing in the third remake of "The Phantom of the Opera," a British version that is a lot less scary than its predecessor but may provide the kiddies with a shudder or two. Herbert Lom, following Lon Chaney and Claude Rains in the role, makes the phantom a rather sympathetic type; it's a shame he's credited with writing the opera at hand, an English-language "Joan of Arc" (composed especially for the film) that is the most repulsive part of the movie.

There's nothing repulsive about "Young Dillinger," it's just a patchwork cheapie, a highly fictionalized account of the gangster (a rebellious but well-meaning kid, it seems), with ineptitude the order of the day as far as both crime and movie making are concerned.

A nonmovie version of John Steinbeck's "Of Mice and Men," a novel, then play, then movie, replaces the week's sixth movie. George Segal, who's in "Ship of Fools," and Nicol Williamson, the brilliant young British actor, are the George and Lennie of this one.

In interviews, the author-sportsman-musician finds out how his colleagues chose their instruments; learns of the joys, frustrations and tensions they experience; and gathers anecdotes about conductors they have worked under.

Producer Mel Stuart and narrator Plimpton wrote the script. The program may kick off a David L. Wolper series, in which Plimpton will, among other things, play hockey and learn to cook. (60 min.)

The man who helped deliver

a \$9,000,000 baby

tells how it all happened

By William Dozier

That esteemed chronicler of who's doing what to whom, where, how, and why in show biz, Variety, reported not too long ago that the rerun rights to Bewitched have been sold to ABC-TV for nine million dollars. That's \$9,000,000, and if I knew how to write it in Chinese or Arabic it would be no less staggering.

All of which takes me back-back to the days of the conception, birth, incubation and infancy of Bewitched. Whenever a project attains the success this one has, there are always all sorts of versions of how it came about, who did what to whom, where, how and why. I am constrained, therefore, to set forth the facts, ma'am; just the facts.

I was at Screen Gems at the time. vice president in charge of West Coast operations, or so it would have said on the organization chart, if there had been an organizatian chart. The organization didn't have a chart, because that would have made everyone's function and responsibility too clear, and that wasn't standard operational procedure at Screen Gems.


Harry Ackerman, one of the nicest and most astute entrepreneurs in television-notably in the comedy field-was and still is a vice president and executive producer at Screen Gems. In the course of one of my periodic meetings with Harry wherein we discussed possible new projects, we allowed as how a series about a pretty young witch married to a "straight" husband, who didn't know when he married her that she was a witch, should offer good possibilities. That's all we had. This was in

late 1962 or very early '63.

Step 1. I called George Axelrod, a facile wit, author of "The Seven Year Itch," and way back a gag writer in early television, and asked him to meet me at Romanoff's for lunch. Over the second or third martini (his, not mine, one of us had to remain coherent) I tossed the idea to him, admitting that it was the barest germ and needed almost total development. George sparked to the notion immediately and began to ad lib all sorts of disconnected ways to go. I didn't know then something I learned a few years later about George-he prefers coming up with one-liners to sitting down and actually

But George truly wanted to do this show and write the pilot script. It wasn't yet called Bewitched. That came later. So a deal was negotiated with George's agent, Irving Lazar, and George was supposed to start to work immediately. A few weeks passed with no results. Finally, Irving called me and said he had been able to make a fantastic deal for George to write, produce and maybe direct two or three feature pictures for United Artists. They wanted him to get started at once, and would we let him out of his commitment to write our pilot script? We would, and did, not knowing then how much better off we would be, but wanting only not to stand in the way of George's greater good.

Step 2. I called Charles Lederer, one of the truly imaginative and inventive writing talents in Hollywood, and asked him if Harry Ackerman and I \rightarrow

could come to see him and talk about an idea we had for a television series. We could. We did, at Charlie's home in Beverly Hills late one afternoon. Charlie likewise was quick to see the possibilities in the witch idea but explained he was too deeply involved then in the script of "Mutiny on the Bounty" (the Marlon Brando edition which was sold to television for \$2,500,000, thereby enabling MGM to get somewhere near halfway even on the enterprise) and simply wouldn't have time to take on anything else. Exit Charlie

Step 3. Harry and I had both worked in television with Sol Saks. Sol had written My Favorite Husband for Harry at CBS and Peck's Bad Girl for me, likewise at CBS. Sol is tradewise, commercial, fast and flexible, besides being talented. The idea was exposed to Sol. He liked. He would write the pilot script. He did.

Step 4. Along about the time Sol was approaching the finish of the first draft of his script, Screen Gems began a flirtation with Tammy Grimes, the luminous and wildly talented star of "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" on Broadway. We soon made a deal with Tammy to do a television series and also one or more features for our parent company, Columbia Pictures. The television series was to be Bewitched (by now we had the title), provided she liked it after reading the script.

Sol finished the first draft. Harry, Sol and I journeyed down to Malibu, where Tammy was occupying a rented house for a month or two. Tammy had read the script prior to our visit. The meeting turned out to be typical. Tammy "loved the idea," wasn't sure it was right for her, wasn't sure it was right for her, wasn't sure the script had realized the full potential of the basic idea, etc., etc., etc. Perhaps a rewrite would "shape it up." So we listened, patiently; particularly Sol, whose patience must have —

been more sorely tried than Harry's or mine, not only because it was his baby being dismembered but also because he hadn't had as many exposures to this sort of star-studded behavior as had Harry and I.

Anyway, Sol did a revised script and it was sent to Tammy, who by now had concluded her sojourn at Malibu and returned to New York. Along about this time I went to New York on a routine business trip. While there I was called by Tom Tannenbaum, an enterprising and very personable young agent, and asked whether Screen Gems would be interested in a series starring Elizabeth Montgomery, to be produced and directed by William Asher. I asked what series and he replied. The Fun Couple, based on a short novel and a very short-lived play of the same name.

Now it happens Liz Montgomery had long been a dear friend and one of my favorite actresses. I had often tried to badger her into doing a series for me, any series. While she and Gig Young were married, I regularly importuned them to do a series together for me, any series. In fact, we had a long-standing gag whereby I promised them if they would do a series together for me I would guarantee it would break up their marriage! At that time, of course, they were very happily wedded, so this routine seemed much funnier then than it does now.

So I told Tom Tannenbaum I would be very interested in reading The Fun Couple. He sent it to me at my hotel. I read it the next evening, and the following day met with Liz, Bill Asher and Tom in my apartment. Bill Asher at the time was in New York directing several segments of The Patty Duke Show. He and Liz were an "item" but not yet married. Now The Fun Couple is a somewhat conventional narrative about a somewhat conventional young married

couple in outer suburbia. Pleasant. innocuous, workable, but bland, And that's what I told Liz and Bill. I also said I thought that kind of material wasn't enough to stand a good chance for success. It needed something else. an added gimmick of some sort. Through my mind was whirling how ideal Liz would be for Bewitched. which had that something else, that added gimmick. But do you see the spot I was in? I couldn't even mention Bewitched because Tammy was still sitting on it, hadn't given us an answer, and unless and until she turned it down, we were committed to do it with her and indeed wanted to do it with her.

So I thanked Liz, Liz thanked me. I kissed Liz, Liz kissed me. I thanked Bill and Tom, they thanked me. And a few days later I returned to California.

Two or three weeks thereafter, making it late August or September of '63, Liz and Bill were back on the Coast, their romance was hotter than ever, and Bill was about to direct a pilot for us starring Paul Lynde. Then came what turned out to be the lucky day we received the unequivocal "No" from Tammy on Bewitched. It just "wasn't her cup of oolong."

Whew! I called Bill Asher, told him I was sending a script down to his office and would like him and Liz to read it that evening if they could, and talk with me about it the next day. They could. They did. They came into my office together the next day and Liz said to me, "This is a series I just must do, that's all." Bill Asher shared her enthusiasm. The rest was easy.

I called Harry Ackerman and asked how he would like to have Liz Montgomery for his series. He yelped with delight. Then a talk with Marty Baum, Liz's agent at the time, and a deal was made quickly. Liz wound up with a tidy stipend for performing as Samantha in each episode of the series, plus 20 percent of the profits.

For Samantha's husband we fastened on Dick York, whose comedy bent we all remembered well from "Tea and Sympathy" on Broadway.

We shot the pilot in October. The result was a total delight and sold immediately to the first customer who

saw it.

And that's how it all began. No one at Screen Gems today, except Harry Ackerman, Liz and Bill, had any more to do with the origin and early development of Bewitched than I had with the dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima. Sol Saks never wrote another line after the pilot script, and he's been collecting a handsome royalty per episode ever since. My recollection is that he also has a small profit participation. I hope so. His pilot script made the idea work. Maybe someone else could have done it, but he did it. Harry Ackerman has no

piece of the profits, which is too bad. Neither have I. That wasn't part of his deal, or mine. Perhaps the Screen Gems management will give Harry a substantial bonus out of its sizable distribution fee on the rerun sale. Perhaps it will also snow in Death Valley next August.

The series is in its fourth season on ABC-TV. It has seldom been out of the Top 10 in the ratings. Liz has twitched her beguiling nose through more than a hundred episodes and Bill has directed many of the best ones. They have a great marriage and two adorable children (both warlocks) and now, largely as a result of the \$9,000,000 sale of the reruns, Liz is assured of well over a million dollars. even after a hefty charge for distribution, etc. And since California is a community property state, she and Bill are assured of this. And do you know something? It couldn't happen to nicer people. END



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




PERFECT LANDING (CRUNCHS)

**It's simply a matter of cold cash." That's the way the talkative "Barrymore of Baseball" put it in 1952 when he made the switch from locker room to dressing room. "The day I left baseball I became smart."

Today lantern-iawed Chuck Connors, 46, rakes in more loot as title star of ABC's Cowboy in Africa than any baseball player in major-league history, Ruth to Koufax. He draws more than most of his film-series even to the Cartwright siblings. Clan (as individuals), though not as much as Arness, whose take is described as "ridiculous." It adds up to an authoritatively divulged 20 G's per episode for his acting, plus five G's per episode to his production company for Chuck's consultation in "artistic" matters, plus an (undivulged) profit percentage.

It's a long way from the \$30-a-month flat in his old Bay Ridge neighborhood of Brooklyn, where, as the son of an unemployed Irish immigrant from Newfoundland, he played sandlot ball. The player-turned-actor today has a top-drawer press agent (name of Dan Jenkins), who writes of his client: "Mr. Connors hobnobs these days with people like Senator Percy, Senator Brooke, Senator Murphy, Senator Thurmond, Governor Reagan and Mayor Yorty. He also is on old-buddy terms with General Eisenhower, General Westmoreland and,

to a somewhat lesser degree, President Johnson."

Between Chuck's old sand-lot pals and his new "old buddies" was a tolerable stretch of living, loving, begetting, more wooing and remarrying; along with the Dodgers, Royals, Cubs, Angels; 43 flicks, 600 telepix, The Rifleman's Top 10 status; four count-'em-four starring series; and a moderate amount of "moderate conservative" Republican politicking.

To appreciate the man in his habitat today, the setting has to be Soledad Canyon, 50 miles northeast of Los Angeles, and the 260-acre combined animal ranch, zoo, research center, hospital, breeding ground and site known location U.S.A.," home of 600 "wild" animals including Judy the chimp, Clarence the cross-eyed lion, Bruce the ocelot, Modac the elephant, and Sloopy the giraffe. Except for the cottonwood trees, the terrain could be taken for the Kenya veldt, setting for his new series. Connors plays a cowpoke hired to round up and rope from horseback eland, buffalo, oryxes, wildebeest, kangoni, impala, zebra and rhinos for a game ranch. Between takes he rides the rhino for kicks. "My natural exuberance," he calls it.

The day of our safari, though, Clown Connors was all business. "We spend \$25,000 a day out here," he cautioned soberly. And he does have


that participation percentage (undivulged) to think about.

His (rented) air-conditioned van, fitted like a mobile home, conveys him from one exterior set-up to the next. He slouched his rangy 6-foot-5-and-5/8 frame on the opposite cushioned bench in the "breakfast nook" for talk. Topic: Why Republican actors have done better in politics than Democratic actors. "Because they've been in a position to attack rather than defend. It's easier to do." What's his position in politics? "I'm a moderate conservative Republican. I'm left of the right-wingers, a little bit left of Ronald Reagan."

Connors not so very long ago was quoted: "I might be interested in the U.S. Senate from California. I wouldn't be interested in anything else. I'd go for the big pot." That would entail challenging and beating Sen. Tom Kuchel in the Republican primary in '68. "But if you're adding this up to my running—definitely not. I'm out. I hope Cowboy in Africa goes on for five years." If Cowboy fails to do well in the Nielsens, what then? "Son of Mr. Smith Goes to Washington"?

Chuck's wagon started to rumble through a guard-gate. The guard waved the van to a stop, shouting: "Mr. Connors, as soon as you can get to the phone! It's Washington! The White House!" Chuck bounded out. "My God, it's the President!"

He explained later: "It wasn't he but one of his aides. He said President Johnson was very happy about my 'Parade America,' but he couldn't publicly endorse it because that would only set off a reaction from the doves." Connors, outraged by an anti-Vietnam flag-burning demonstration in New York's Central Park, had organized his own parade and raised an undefiled flag on the same spot, a flag that had flown over the Capitol. He then forwarded the flag to General Westmoreland, along with the slogan: "Pride

not protest, devotion not dissent."

On U.S. military intervention in Vietnam, Connors regards himself a "hawk with claws," having toured there for two weeks for the USO last spring. He challenges U.S. conduct of the war as a "mysterious defensive operation" instead of an all-out effort to "defeat the enemy." As for Presidential politics: "If Ho Chi Minh thinks the U.S. is going to elect a dove in 1968, he's all wet! Any hawk who runs can count on 470,000 votes right off the bat—that's the vote of every man in Vietnam."

They don't talk about politics much at Africa, U.S.A., though. "There are other forums for such things," says Connors. "We don't get around to it." One of the *Cowboy* crew privately concurs: "Many people here are dovish. We don't bring up the subject."

At lunch break the dark-haired, dark-eyed Mrs. Chuck Connors ->

showed up, a couple of paraplegic veterans in tow. She said she was planning to bring out a group of 20 more Vietnam casualties from the veterans hospital at Long Beach. The former actress Kamala Devi, she was born of an English-Welsh mother and Indian (Bombay variety) father, Dr. Chan-Amesur, an eye-ear-nosedumal throat-and-brain surgeon. now is advisor to the Indian government on where to build hospitals for the deaf, dumb and blind." She met Connors in 1961 when playing his Indian (Apache variety) wife in the movie "Geronimo."

In Connors' opinion: "She's a tremendous dame. She's got so much dimension. She's sophisticated, humble, bright, cheerful; and she cares. When I wake up in the morning, she is lying there; I nudge her and before her eyes are open she is smiling." Just as he said when they were married four years ago: "She's a real swinger, this girl, and she's made me like women again."

Connors' first marriage, of 14 years, to Canadian model Betty Riddell ended in the divorce courts. "I guess all that adulation and stuff was what he needed more than us," Betty testified. "He didn't seem to need the family any more." That family included four boys, three of whom are now teen-agers. They visit their father on weekends and vacations. Says Kamala: "Chuck makes them work for everything they get. Our house is constantly being scraped and painted, cars being washed." Connors has just concluded the technicalities of legally adopting Kamala's nephew, Christopher Michael Molyneaux, 15, who lives with the Connors.

Weekdays they live at his Mulholland Drive house atop the Santa Monica Mountains. Weekends they're at his house along the 5th hole of the Canyon Country Club in Palm Springs, where Connors has been known to play as many as 54 holes of golf in one day. His press agent launches a small avalanche of top-drawer name-dropping at the mention of Connors' interest in golf: "This, of course, draws him into still another whirlpool of the social swim—Dino, Bing, Arnie, Jack, Gary (Morton and Player), etc."

The gabby Connors was always his own best press agent. He talked the then Brooklyn Dodgers' president, Branch Rickey, into signing him to a contract without ever seeing Chuck play. From then on Connors always contended that the three great men of our era were Churchill, FDR and Branch Rickey. (He later dropped Democrat FDR from the list.) But the Dodgers mostly farmed him out, and when he finally got his big chance and went to bat in Ebbets Field, he hit into a double play that ended the game. That's how he wound up with the Royals, the Dodgers farm club in Montreal, where he met his wife. Betty, on a blind date.

How did he get the moniker "Barrymore of Baseball"? "I used to memorize passages from Shakespeare and pull 'em on the umps, like "The slings and arrows of outrageous fortune I can take, but your blindness is ridiculous!" "He was famous for turning cartwheels while running bases and generally hamming it up.

That irrepressible clownishness in Connors' makeup is something the creators of Cowboy in Africa obviously hadn't fully appreciated. For love interest, according to the series prospectus, Connors was to find himself "in contact with" a female ecologist, lady bush pilot, nomadic nurse, distaff veterinarian, CIA sexpot, and "Peace Corps plum." Promised the prospectus: "This cowboy will not kiss his horse." Prospectuses, prospectuses! Already Chuck has been caught by the cameras kissing the sloppy nose of Sloopy the giraffe.

Some shows are a mishmash. This one is a mishbash. Indeed, it is doubtful if any show is more lavishly produced. Nonetheless, it is not point-lessly so. The songs and dances are inventively integrated, and chiaroscuroly choreographed; and if the whole thing is usually hung on a pretty unoriginal thread—well, these days what isn't?

The "Stage-Door Johnny" episode, for example, told the story of a big spender of the Twenties, Tony Randall -of his automobiles, his airplanes, his homes, his night clubs, his gangsters and, above all, his girls. They go from a six-day bike race to Cab Calloway, boldly past jokes like "You great big beautiful dollar" and "It's a real financial pleasure to have you in the house." It all ended, of course, with the Crash and "Buddy, can you spare a dime?" In a similar spirit, we shall spare you more criticism, except to note that, as an added attraction, the show even had Walter Winchell, in person. He was good, too-showing you that anything can mellow on Music Hall.

An even better show was "The Nashville Sound," hung on Dinah Shore. In this, just about everybody was in the kitchen with Dinah—all the way from Eddy Arnold and the Everly Brothers and Ray Charles and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers to a "genuine, authentic, original, imitation Parthenon." We even had songwriter Johnny Mercer, who spent a good deal

of time explaining how he wasn't from Nashville but that he loved Nashville anyway. So did we.

The third show was done by one of our favorites, Woody Allen. This started with what has become the stand-up operating procedure for such shows, the monolog—and though Mr. Allen made it funnier than most ("I went down to the draft board to enlist—they gave me the test and then they burned my draft card"), it was disappointing. So was at least one of Mr. Allen's three skits, an overdone, unamusing satire of a former Hollywood child star, Baby Bobby Dimple, going into politics.

Better was a mini-skirt sketch with Liza Minnelli, Unfortunately, it suffered by comparison with an almost exactly similar skit Jonathan Winters did on another network later the same night, Mr. Allen's best skit, a "Bonnie and Clyde" satire, suffered similarity trouble too-although through no fault of his. His was wonderful, but the fact that Dinah Shore had also spoofed "Bonnie and Clyde," a month before didn't help any. Allen also did a guest interview segment with William F. Buckley Jr. This should have been good, but it wasn't. It was a bit too serious to be funny and, unfortunately. vice versa. Mr. Buckley fluttered his eyelids exactly the way his fans demand: the trouble was, no issue had been raised that high. For a series which has as good a batting average as Kraft Music Hall, this show let us down.
