"Somebody strong and articulate," says an ABC staffer, "or BUCKLEY will make mincemeat of him."

DOM DE LUISE is busy lining up comedy guests for his summer-replacement series on CBS; so far, he's corralled GEORGE JESSEL, CHARLIE MANNA, RICH LITTLE and PAT COOPER . . . ■ Political money men already are groaning over the prospect of what it's going to cost to reach the Nation's viewers. During the last Presidential election the Democrats managed to enrich the broadcasting industry by some \$19 million. The Republicans came in second with their expenditure of about \$16 million.

For them, and for viewers who find televised campaign speeches somewhat less fascinating than a test pattern, we have good news. It comes from Ned Hoopes' article in a recent Educators Guide to Media and Methods.

"Dozens of scientific communications studies have provided data to demonstrate that people tend to watch only television programs that support their own point of view and to avoid those that do not," he wrote. "If they do watch something that disagrees with their own outlook, they tend either to forget it completely or to distort the content so that it agrees with their own particular focus."

Why spend all that money, then, if you're just going to reach people who were going to vote for you anyway?

And it's not just since the advent of television. A study of the 1940 election showed that radio campaigning had no direct effect upon the outcome of the Roosevelt-Wilkie race.

"Aha," you say, "what about the debates in 1960 and those Gallup and Roper polls that 'proved' the debates were the decisive factor in swinging voters to Kennedy?"

■ A later study by sociologists concluded that "viewers of the debates, if anything, changed less than nonviewers." They said people who watched the telecasts did so to confirm their original opinions.

Perhaps this research explains why the politicos are leaning more to spot announcements viewers can't escape than to speeches. That's selling candidates like soap.

Complaints about television service have received increasing publicity in recent months. But the man who fixes your set has a few complaints of his own. He feels he's misunderstood, maligned, distrusted, unappreciated, overworked and underpaid.

These complaints would appear to indicate a basic feeling of insecurity, except for the absence of one classic symptom. He doesn't feel the least bit unneeded. He knows he's needed. Everybody needs him, and they all

need him yesterday.

This serviceman syndrome may be more a case for a public-relations man than a headshrinker. TV-repair technicians feel that they've taken more than their share of lumps lately, as the result of a wave of "exposés" which, they feel, make them look like a bunch of thieves—incompetent thieves, at that.

This malaise in the service industry comes at a trying time. It's accelerating the exit of many top-notch technicians into higher-paying, betterappreciated jobs—just when tens of thousands of new super-competent service dealers are urgently needed to doctor the ever-increasing number of complex color TV sets now moving into the Nation's homes.

TV-set manufacturers consider the technician shortage so serious that they've united in a five-year "Service Technician Development Program," whose total budget could run well above a million dollars, to attract and train young servicemen.

Richard Tinnell, a former Oklahoma State University electronics professor who coordinates this development program, rebuts the suggestion of widespread incompetence with circumstantial evidence: "There are 515 million electronic instruments in the hands of the American public—including TV sets, radios, phonographs and tape recorders—and 75 million are being added each year. All 515 million are in working order. If 65 percent of the service technicians were unethical or incompetent, this situation just couldn't exist."

He was referring to the kind of publicity which irks servicemen the most-the doctored-set caper. Two of these were summarized last fall in TV GUIDE ("Set Repair Frauds," Nov. 11), one in New York, one in Chicago. In the New York test, 20 service dealers were asked to repair sets in which one bad tube had been purposely inserted but which were otherwise in good shape. The test's sponsors estimated that the repair should have cost about \$8, but found that 13 technicians charged more, some of them claiming to have made extensive repairs.

Technicians concede there are dis-

honest men in their profession, as in any other. But they object to the implication that such a small sample can be representative of the 120,000 to 130,000 practicing TV repairmen.

Frank Moch, executive director of the National Alliance of Television & Electronic Service Associations, says such tests often are made on "known crooked shops," giving a biased picture of the amount of fraud in the industry. Even in honest shops, he adds, a doctored set isn't a fair test, because the technician looks for natural symptoms, and a gimmicked set usually has an artificial problem which might not come about in the particular set in normal use.


But technicians are also critical of these tests on the ground that they don't reflect a realistic estimate of what the particular job should cost. Some servicemen insist that the sponsors of tests in both New York and Chicago don't understand the economics of TV/repair, and that their "reasonable" estimates of what the jobs should cost work out to a wage of \$1 to \$2 an hour for the technician who actually fixes the set.

Referring to the \$8 estimate, Tinnell cites John Markus's definitive "Blue Book of Standard Service Charges" as indicating that the tube replacement should have cost \$9 "in the lowest socio-economic area." In high-cost

New York, the guide indicates the repair to be about \$14, he says. "Anything below \$15 looks reasonable."

A Chicago-area technician has submitted what he considers a fair itemized breakdown of the charges for replacing the tube in question. If the work were done in the customer's home, he estimates these costs: Recording and scheduling call, 50¢; serviceman's travel time, \$1; locating tube, replacing it, adjusting set and explaining trouble to the customer, \$2; shop overhead (reckoned at 150 percent of actual labor costs), \$5.25. This brings "total labor charge for half-hour call" to \$8.75. Add in the price of the new tube-about \$5-and you've run up a bill for \$13.75. A set carried into the shop would cost \$19.20 to repair, he says, because it gets a complete operational and heat test on specialized equipment, in addition to the tube replacement. These charges are based on the assumption that the man performing the actual repair job receives \$4 an hour, or an annual pay of \$8000.

Why pay a "labor charge" of \$8.75 when the serviceman's actual labor came only to about \$3? This labor charge includes more than the actual pay of the man who repairs the set. John Gooley, service manager of the National Appliance and Radio-TV Dealers Association, estimates that a properly operated service business →



must charge about three times the technician's wage for a routine call. Thus, if the technician receives \$4 an hour, the labor charge would be about \$12 according to this rule of thumb.

The reason for this disparity is the large overhead required to operate a reliable service business. These expenses include a truck or station wagon, inventories of parts, complex test equipment, uniforms, laundry, rent and insurance.

There are also hidden costs, says Gooley. A good technician may spend as many as 17 days a year in service clinics and courses given by manufacturers and others to keep up with the newest products, circuits, test equipment and repair technology. Another hidden cost is the service warranty. Many, but not all, reliable service dealers guarantee the set for 30 days after any repair. During this period, if something goes wrong—even if it's unrelated to the original trouble—the technician will repair the set free, charging only for parts.

Gooley estimates that the average technician can complete only eight jobs per day at an average of about \$10 a job in labor costs. Remember that the highly skilled technician may be on the road for 15 minutes driving to a job which will take him only 30.

It's impossible to say exactly what any job will cost—or even to estimate a labor charge which will hold up all over the country—because of wide regional differences in pay scales and cost of living. In New York, for example, union bus drivers have signed a contract which will give them \$4.16 an hour plus fringe benefits. Is the skilled electronics technician worth more pay than a bus driver?

The service vice president of one television manufacturer points out: "People are inclined to remember what they paid for a service call 10 years ago on a black-and-white set. It could have run about \$5 for a

simple job—\$3 for labor, \$2 for a tube. But today, in some high-labor markets, such as San Francisco, service calls may now run as high as \$14.95 an hour for labor alone because of high living costs. Of course, conditions might be entirely different in Burning Stump, Idaho."

Why do seemingly simple jobs—such as replacement of one small part—often result in high bills? One reason may be the increasing compactness of TV sets, while their complexity grows as well. Technicians often blame the set manufacturer, who, in turn, insists he is responding only to the public's desires. Consider these carefully itemized troubles reported by a Dayton, Ohio, repairman:

"It is indeed an engineering marvel to pack the sophisticated circuitry of a 19-inch receiver into a plastic box measuring only 2 feet wide by 20 inches high by 10 inches deep. But for a serviceman attempting to trace a hairline crack or a cold-solder connection on a circuit board, it is sheer frustration trying to use a soldering pencil in such cramped quarters.

"On my workbench is a portable which developed one small overheated resistor in the audio circuit and burned the circuit board so badly that the audio tube fell out and clunked to the bottom of the set. There is not enough room to drill holes for nuts and bolts to hold a new socket. What do I tell the customer? How does one explain that replacing a 15-cent resistor and a 39-cent tube socket will cost \$15 in labor?"

The recent TV Gude article on set repair quoted some unkind words about "moonlighters"—those who repair sets in their spare time but work in other jobs. Predictably, this is a controversial subject. Many technicians who have turned away from the service industry because of low pay and lack of appreciation have found jobs elsewhere in the electronics industry but still take on repair jobs

on the side.

"I have mixed emotions on moon-lighters," says one TV maker's service manager, "especially since we don't have enough service people to go around. I know some men who work in our plant, then go out at night and fix sets: In a near-by town, there's a fireman who left the service business—but he's still the only television repairman in town. I don't know how we can object to the part-timer if he's skilled and knowledgeable."

The serviceman in Dayton, quoted earlier, is a part-timer who says he has "about 3000 bucks wrapped up in this side line." He adds: "You see, I make my living as a linotype operator and fix sets only for my family, neighbors, friends and co-workers. On each job I'm happy if I make enough for gasoline and a couple of dollars for beer and cigarets. Good luck to those thousands of trainees who try to make a living in this business."

Gooley insists that the customer himself is often to blame for being cheated. "People who have these problems are often those who have larceny in their own hearts, and who fall for lowball prices. A shop can't exist on \$2 service calls and 20-percent-off parts. A little simple arithmetic and cost-of-living figures will show you why."

The problem of service for the growing TV set population is reaching crisis proportions. Undoubtedly, members of the public are being victimized as a result of the shortage of qualified servicemen. But, as one manufacturer put it, "color is separating the men from the boys." The old-fashioned "tube-puller" can't survive in the color-TV age, which requires specialized knowledge, equipment and procedures. Reliable TV service isn't cheap, and you're probably going to have to pay even more for it, as for everything else. And, if the shortage of technicians deepens, you're going to have to wait in line for it.

The idea of a kind of weekly USO show-devoted to the entertainment of American servicemen at their bases. on shipboard, etc.-is one which, as Madison Avenue would say, is worthy of running up the flagpole and saluting. The trouble is that this very worthiness also involves the necessity of everyone playing not primarily to you but to the GI audiences. And thus everyone seems one step further removed from you than you are used to-from the emcees with their everlasting intramural jokes to the standup comics with their everlasting single entendres. Besides all this, however, the whole thing has a kind of amateur-night quality because picked GIs are mixed right into the show in some of the most farfetched contests we've seen outside of an office picnic. In one, for example, the program's socalled "entertainment girls" tried to help chosen GIs find someone who kissed like their wives. In another, there was a contest among three GI photographers to choose the best model poses for three entertainment girls. Actually, since it was all a rigged joke, one of the pictures turned out to be, sure enough, not of any of the entertainment girls, but the GI's fiancée, who had been flown in.

In fairness, the contests are only a small part of the show. But it's a part which bears the indelible imprint of Mr. Chuck Barris, who, besides this show, produces The Dating Game and The Newlywed Game and, for all we know, The Game Game. Mr. Barris obviously loves surprises. On one re-

cent occasion emcee George Carlin announced that he had a surprise guest, the Air Force Chief of Staff. This was hardly a real surprise, since the commander of the base or ship usually does come on the show to give us a few poorly chosen words. But, never fear, there was a switch-out came a bemedaled Bill "José Jiménez" Dana. Mr. Dana proceeded to announce that his job was, as he put it, "to bring the stuff to the staff." "You mean," said Carlin, "they made you a six-star general for that?" "You don't know," said Dana, "what kind of stuff I bring." And, as if that weren't enough, he added, "The staff likes to get stiff."

And then we had gospel-singer Bessie Griffin and her Pearls, Their screaming, velling, jumping performance was one of the most appalling acts we've seen this year. Altogether, if it hadn't been for singer Fran Jeffries, who was excellent, we would have gone A.W.O.L. Another turkey was the recent show at George Air Force Base. Here literally everything was bad, from emcee Tim Conway to Paul Lynde and his unfunny African routine, all the way to a confusing movie-star look-alike contest among the GIs. On the other hand, a show we liked was staged aboard the USS Constellation. Here emcee Dean Jones was funny and charming, singer Barbara McNair was wonderful and we even went along with sailors trying to sing while being nuzzled by Sivi Aberg, Eileen O'Neill and Shawn Robinson.

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
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




# THE WATER'S FINE

# Guess who's shy, retiring, warm, affectionate and lovable

# Don Rickles??

A new face has been popping up on the TV scene in the past season or two with the frequency of spots on a measles patient. The face—a striking combination of bald, bright-eyed bull-dog and cross-tempered snapping turtle—belongs to Don Rickles. And because having Don Rickles on a show has traditionally been equated with having the measles, or worse, a lot of people, including Rickles, are finding his omni-acceptance mighty startling. "It's a world that never accepted me before." he says.

"Omni-acceptance" isn't too elegant a word, but it's accurate. There's no category of entertainment that Rickles hasn't invaded. Tune in on Dean Martin, Danny Thomas, Jerry Lewis, Bob Hope, the Smothers Brothers, The Kraft Music Hall, Joey Bishop, Mike Douglas, Johnny Carson, eight or nine game shows-and comedian Don Rickles is there, has been there or will shortly be there. And as for shows like I Spy, Run for Your Life, Chrysler Theater, F Troop, Dick Van Dyke, Gomer Pyle, USMC, The Beverly Hillbillies and The Andy Griffith Show-to name just a few-actor Don Rickles has been there too.

Comics who can act are not extraordinarily rare in show business. What's so amazing about the Rickles Rash? The answer is that, by time-honored show-business logic, Rickles shouldn't be succeeding at all. He has built a career on the unlikely rock of attacking his own audience.

He has been called "The Merchant of Venom," "The Insultan" and, most often, "The Insult Comedian." He insults celebrities. Frank Sinatra walks in, and Rickles yells with glee, "Come right in, Frankie, make yourself at home. Hit somebody." Dean Martin: "One of the most sentimental guys I ever met. For his birthday he asked for an ice machine." Or Bob Hope, who arrived late: "Look who's here. The war must be over."

He insults unknown persons: "Take a look at what this guy with the beard married. He's gotta be lonely, or a python." Or: "You sir, are you married? And you never will be, with that roller-derby jacket. What's your name? You don't know? You idiot—look inside your coat!"

It seems unnecessary to state that there are two schools of thought about Rickles' humor. As he says, "People either hate me or they love me." The haters call him "vulgar," "crude," "offensive," "lacking in real wit," "hostile," etc. The lovers are legion-and the legion includes a great many celebrities, who claim that Rickles' insults are really offbeat expressions of love, "He's putting people down," says Johnny Carson, "but everybody knows it's a put-on." "The more Rickles loves you, the more he insults you," says Dean Martin. "I hope he always insults me." In a good segment of the celebrity world, it's a status symbol to be insulted by Rickles.

Rickles himself claims that affection is all mixed up with his insults. "My main problem," he says, "is that my humor depends on my face. If you take a quote from me—in print, it's different, I read it, and I say, 'Ouch.'

Seeing it in cold print bothers me. It's what's not in print that's important—my honesty and my love for people. I think this comes across in

my personality."

For a decade or more, however, TV had dominantly taken the anti-Rickles position and had written him off as too antagonistic a specimen for the family medium. "For a time, there was no acceptance of me at all," says Rickles. "People heard about my jokes, some of them felt I was insulting, mean, unkind."

On top of this, Rickles' acting career—he's a graduate of the American Academy of Dramatic Arts—was highly specialized: He appeared in 12 movies, invariably as a heavy. And the over-all combination of movie villainy and stand-up hostility fused into an image of an unlikable man.

So much has this "mean, unkind" image affected Rickles' professional life that his manager. Joe Scandore. is almost obsessed with the desire to prove to the world that Rickles is a kindly, lovable man, He talked almost nonstop for an hour about how serious, devoted, loyal, warm Rickles was in private life and above all how well-loved he was, both personally and professionally, "People who know Don just love him," says Scandore. "In reality, there are two Don Rickles -the fellow that's acting, that's making caustic remarks and insulting people-and the real Don Rickles. The real Don Rickles is the one the public doesn't know-a loyal, affectionate, warm man, a good man, a man who's loved, absolutely loved by his fellow performers."

Scandore needn't have worked so hard to make the point. Rickles is loved by his associates, and the ones we spoke to are only too happy to tell the world how amiable he is. "I've known Don for five or six years. He's a hell of a nice guy, and basically kind of shy," says Johnny Carson.

"He's an affectionate man. On-stage



he pokes fun at people who rock the baby and kitchy-coo and make a sentimental fuss," says Stan Irwin, Tonight, producer, "but off-stage he's the biggest rocker and kitchy-cooer around. He's an absolute reservoir of love and affection for his wife, his family, his mother, his friends."

And Ernest Borgnine, who has acted with him, says: "He's one of the greatest guys going. He's one of the kindest, sweetest men when you get to know him closely—anything but the character he tries to portray."

This is all true. On-stage, Rickles reacts to the sight of massed humanity by dishing out insults with computer speed. But in a private tête-à-tête the tension is suddenly cut, and Rickles becomes a simple, gentle, earnest man. He talks about himself as follows:

On Rickles: "I was born into an Orthodox Jewish family, on Long Island. I'm still very pious, very conscious of being Jewish. It's part of me. . . . I'm a serious man, serious about my work, my family. I think →

a lot about everything I do. . . . I'm sort of shy. I was a very shy, very inhibited, self-conscious kid. I had no confidence. I never believed I could be successful in school or in life. I only knew I could be successful when it happened. Today I'm very aggressive with people, outwardly. But inwardly I'm still shy and retiring. I have to be at home with people before I feel free to be me . . . kind of warm and loving."

On marriage: "I was a bachelor until 39, because all I met during my travels as an entertainer were women who were loose, unreliable. I wanted somebody who was beautiful, with simplicity, someone who wasn't flashy, someone who could command attention and respect. I found someone like

that, and I married her."

On his humor: "I don't know why it's the way it is. I was always interested in making people laugh. My father was a salesman. He always kidded around with people. I found it fun. too. Life to me was always ha-haha. Things from life always struck me funny. I'm always laughing at me, and at everything. They say I insult. I never see it that way. I see it as making fun of ourselves, of life, of all of us. In the beginning my humor was more rough and crude. But I've mellowed as a man. I'm not afraid of my own humor any more. I'm not afraid: Am I doing right? Now I know it's funny. I believe in it."

On his acting: "I always loved to make believe, ever since I was a kid. Anything that made me different from what I was always excited me. Playing at being somebody else. That was my fun. My mother went to work to pay my tuition at dramatic school. But 12 years went by before I was taken seriously as an actor. It's only the last three years I got parts of any importance. . . . I love acting. Acting is playing emotions. I'm an emotional guy. I think doing emotions is fun."

On the future: "If I had my life

to live over, I'd get an education. Intelligence is of tremendous importance to me. All my cousins are doctors. I respect them for how hard they worked for their knowledge. I have a little baby daughter, Mindy Beth. My whole dream is to see her go to college. . . . My dream for me? It's to sit in my house with my wife and say to my manager, 'We've accompished the height.' I'd like to be able to say I'm a success in every aspect of show business—I'm accepted."

One only has to spend a few hours with the gentle, humble Rickles to be certain that if his TV career was blocked for years, it was not caused by his private personality but his hostile public humor. In the past three years a pro-Rickles tidal wave has formed, and this season it has washed him all over the home screen. What caused the sudden "acceptance"?

According to his manager, people

finally found out how kindly a fellow Rickles was. According to others, people finally found out that he was one of the most proficient improvisers and ad-libbers in the business. ("His mind is unbelievable; it's like an IBM machine," says Irwin.) According to others, people finally found out he was a good actor. ("He's one of the finest talents this business has produced in a long time," says Borgnine.)

But probaby the two most telling reasons are offered by Johnny Carson and by Rickles himself. Says Carson: "I think he's doing something a lot of people would like to do—putting people down. He's getting all that hostility out."

And, says Rickles, this rebellious, "put-down" era itself is ready for him. "I make fun of sacred cows," he says. "I make fun of authority, of people of importance. I'm the guy who tells the boss off and gets away with it. The time is right for me."



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#### **Networks Yawn Over Primaries**

The primaries are going to get the most fleeting attention from TV in the medium's history unless they develop more heat than New Hampshire did. The networks aren't about to squander lavish coverage on stateby-state walkaways by Richard Nixon. This became apparent in the wake of Governor Romney's startling pull-out. The networks, convinced this left little doubt about the outcome in N.H., immediately canceled plans for primetime primary-night specials in favor of bulletins and brief late-evening vote summaries. How much TV time will be given the remaining primaries pretty much depends on how strongly, if at all, Governor Rockefeller comes on against Nixon.

ABC evidently intends to find out whether the TV audience is ready for insulting put-downs every week. Don Rickles, a Las Vegas phenomenon who makes a fat living hurling mean ethnocentric gags at night-clubbers, has been signed to star in a Friday night series starting in September. It will be produced by old game-show hands Mark Goodson and Bill Todman (What's My Line?, I've Got a Secret. etc.). With the addition of the Rickles item, ABC's fall schedule is pretty well locked up. Dropped in the final shakeout, besides shows earlier reported as casualties, are N.Y.P.D. and Garrison's Gorillas. Meanwhile ABC promises at least an hour weekly of fresh adventure fare to relieve the summer doldrums: Starting May 3, the camp-show Operation: Entertainment will be replaced until fall by a British spy series Man in a Suitcase, starring Richard Bradford.

Back in January, National Educational Television, the Ford Foundationfinanced chief supplier of programming to the country's noncommercial stations, defied a demand by 33 Congressmen that a scheduled twohour program on North Vietnam be suppressed. It featured a documentary film turned out by Felix Greene, a Britisher, which the lawmakers considered Communist propaganda. Last week NET offered a postscript: the telecast "produced the largest outpouring of favorable public comment any NET program has received in the last three years."

The urban crisis with its exploding racial tensions will be competing hotly with Vietnam and politics as a major TV topic in the days ahead. On May 6, for instance, the Nation's educational stations will turn over an entire evening to a live NET exploration of the whole dilemma. And in mid-June, Walter Cronkite will preside over three hour-long prime-time CBS Reports looking into the perplexing decay of the cities.

Briefly: General Telephone has renewed its full sponsorship of CBS Playhouse for next season, assuring viewers of at least four new original productions. CBS has "major commitments" for scripts from Gore Vidal, J. P. Miller, Paddy Chayefsky and Reginald Rose. —Richard K. Dogn.

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


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### THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

What with the two new offerings indicating that the barrel bottom is being scraped, this rerun-laden network-movie week is enough to give you the horrors. In fact its only saving grace is that it does, quite literally and intentionally, with the one worth-while film in the batch.

"What Ever Happened to Baby Jane?" that grandest of Guignols for grownups, is a genuine horror film, complete with character, plot and revelation decked out with thrills and chills and madness. This time around you can relax your grip on the story line—or at least try to—and take fuller note of the old-pro perfections of Joan Crawford and Bette Davis in demonstrating the art of grandiose performance and, with producer-director Robert Aldrich, epitomizing expertise in making the excessive effective.

But beyond this rerun all else is simply excess. Herewith a few hints on how to avoid the horrors if watch you must:

Keep the Kleenex, a box of chocolates and some Russ Columbo records handy for surcease with "Goodbye Again," the kind of "woman's picture" that gives women a bad name. You'll need surcease in that never-never land of Parisian suffering wherein suave Yves Montand so neglects his lovely mistress Ingrid Bergman that she finds solace with super-juvenile Anthony Perkins. And to last through the other newcomer of the

week, "The Destructors," you can brood about a system wherein a 1967 movie whose only New York showing was briefly on a double-bill at a 42nd Street grind house last month gets on network television this month, otherwise you'll find yourself involved with a "National Intelligence Agency" agent, a laser gun and a villain who makes a living importing bathing suits.

Keep an abacus and a jeweler's glass handy for diversion during "What a Way to Go!" which starts out fine but bogs down in an excess of Shirley MacLaine, noncomics, supersets and repetition of a single slightly stale joke. You might, however, try keeping count of the 72 outfits and \$3,500,000 worth of jewels press agents say she sports therein.

Keep a lemon handy for sucking to ward off an attack of the screaming-meemie cutesies during the just-folks saccharinities of "The Second Time Around." Only the most devout Debbie Reynolds fans can survive her cavortings as a merry-widow sheriff in Arizona circa 1912. The scientists among us might try estimating the energy the itsy-bitsy star expends on being jes' button-cute while Thelma Ritter need only stroll through a scene to steal it.

A sound sleep is the only suggestion for enduring the Carroll Baker "Harlow," a fiasco wherein neither star nor film makers manage to capture a wisp of the mystique of the Blonde Bombshell or more than the merest mechanics of her era.

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## 'I didn't want to play a nun'

But Sally Field changed her mind, and a TV phenomenon took flight

One day about two years ago Max Wylie, the author, TV executive and sometime ad man, lunched with a friend, LeBaron R. Barker, a top editor at Doubleday in New York. The two men were woolgathering together, as great idea men will. Barker said he had a feeling that Doubleday had published a lot of books with TV potential. But how to recognize and find them?

Wylie, a cool hand at this sort of game, volunteered to do something about it. Poring over old Doubleday catalogs, he came up with a slim volume called "The Fifteenth Pelican," about a nun who weighed 90 pounds and flew. At first glance the project appeared unpromising. While fantasy had gained a certain measure of success in shows



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like Bewitched and I Dream of Jeannie, religious fantasy was something else again. "Miracles" were not to be taken lightly in the Catholic Church.

Still, the little wheels went around in Wylie's mind. He thought of the box-office receipts of "The Sound of Music" and "The Singing Nun," and the thought proved intoxicating. He wrote a "rationale" for a TV series to be called The Flying Nun, in which he specifically answered this objection. He pointed out that the Church was becoming less conservative and he believed that it would not be offended by the idea. He said the way was clear for his nun with an aerodynamically designed cornet the embarrassment its miraculous quality brings to a strait-laced Mother Superior. If "the exact right performer" could be found, the fantasy might even be extended to the point where young Sister Bertrille "talked to pelicans." Possibilities were endless. What he really had here, he wrote, was "a nun with sex appeal."

He personally took the prospectus to Leonard Goldberg, ABC vice president in charge of programming, who, he understood, was hungry for ideas. Goldberg's minions, after stifling a few impolite yawns, turned it down. Later Wylie was to chide Goldberg about this, but he "failed to find the reference amusing." Wylie sent it to the Batboss, William Dozier of Batman fame, who was quite frank to say he thought Wylie had taken leave of his senses. Later, when Nun became the big new hit of the season, Dozier wrote Wylie a note "plucking the egg off my face and eating large portions of humble pie." Likewise CBS, Warners and MGM could see no humor in it but only large "religious obstructions" which none of them cared to try to circumvent.

Then Wylie thought of his old friend Harry Ackerman, who had had

a lot of successes with a more sophisticated fantasy, Bewitched. It so happened that the producer was looking for a vehicle for Sally Field, a talented young woman whose previous effort, Gidget, had been sunk in a sea of saccharine. He also happened to be talking to then ABC-TV president Thomas W. Moore about the network's plans for Bewitched. As Ackerman was leaving. Moore asked if there was anything else cooking, "Yes," replied Ackerman, "but you wouldn't like it." Moore demanded to know what he wouldn't like and Ackerman told him. "I want it," Moore said, and promptly placed it on Goldberg's schedule.

When the word got out about what Ackerman was up to, eyebrows shot up like picket signs at a love-in. Most people assumed that the nun would do her do-gooding by Piper Cub, an idea so cloying that it might even have turned Moore off. Those who understood that the intent was fantastic rather than scientific went around referring to the show as "Sister Terrific." Ackerman told his story developer, Bernard Slade, the Canadian comedy writer who had been a mainstay of Bewitched, about his plans in a San Francisco taxicab.

"I said he was crazy," Slade, a Protestant married to a Catholic, recalls. "Then he turned to my wife and asked what she thought. 'I think it's cute,' she said. I shuddered. The modern nun had some appeal, but this was something else. We would have to make her resemble an everyday human being and for that we needed Sally Field."

But Sally Field, a nonpracticing Catholic, was not available. An intense, serious young woman then just 19, she had taken the failure of Gidget very hard. Moreover, Ackerman had made the mistake of treating her like a child, not telling her what was going on, relaying everything through her agent and her stepfather, Jock Mahoney. Sally came away with  $\rightarrow$

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the feeling that somehow she was responsible for Gidget's flop and that no one would tell her why. When Gidget was canceled, no one bothered to call her. She left the studio "feeling defeated," hibernated for a month to lick her wounds, and embarked on a movie career, determined that TV should never darken her door again.

"Besides, I didn't want to play a nun," Sally said recently. "You're not allowed to kiss or show your belly-

button."

Now Ackerman proceeded to compound his error by failing to supply Miss Field the "personal contact" which would have solved all problems. Consequently the pilot started shooting in December 1966 with another actress, Bobby Troup's daughter, Ronne. Then, on impulse and afterthe-fact, the line producer, Bill Sackheim, called Sally in for a heart-to-heart.

"It was what I had been wanting all the time," she says. "He understood that losing Gidget was like having someone call your kids ugly. The business doesn't interest me. Acting does. Just the thought of doing 'The Graduate' for Mike Nichols [a part she lost to Katharine Ross] got me so excited I could hardly stand it. Sackheim made me see it was presumptuous to think I could step into movies. Idiot, I told myself, you're not Liz Taylor! The Flying Nun would give me time to learn and still keep me in the public eve. So-I changed my mind."

Insiders estimate that Sally's emotional needs combined with Ackerman's reticence cost Screen Gems about \$2000 a week, the salary offers having escalated from \$2000 to \$4000 during this period (not to mention the first day's shooting, which had to be scrapped). Quite a status change for a girl who thought she was rich on the \$450 a week she got for Gidget.

As if by magic the word raced

around Madison Avenue: Ackerman had a hit, Nun is hot—or, as one old hand observed, "It didn't smell like anything else you'd ever heard of." It seemed that all that was left was to collect the money, provided the Church could be kept happy. For this delicate diplomatic task Screen Gems procured the services of a politician, former Los Angeles councilwoman Rosalind Wyman.

Mrs. Wyman's job was to demonstrate that "The Flying Nun was no 'Going My Way' and that instead it brought the Church up-to-date." She showed the pilot in the principal archdioceses. She screened it for Cardinal McIntyre in Los Angeles, for Archbishop Hannan in New Orleans, and procured the tacit approval of the late Cardinal Spellman. "We just wanted to be sure the Catholic community dug it," says the forthright Mrs. Wyman.

Actually, the studio's fears were groundless. Everybody was worried except the Catholic Church. Indeed the National Catholic Office for Radio and Television looked upon it as an excellent recruiting poster and could thus afford to be lenient. "The show is positioning nuns as human beings," Charles Reilly, the executive director, said a few weeks ago. "Only the studio, the agencies and the sponsors were worried. I guess they thought Catholics might stop buying toothpaste."

When the show proved to be the hit Wylie had said it would, it was Sackheim's job to make it work on a week-to-week basis. This was not easy, since the studio had decided that Sister Bertrille must fly in every episode, come what may. He found himself ejecting her through flues in caves, or inserting comic but unrelated bits showing pelicans and painters doing double takes. Moreover, he found that many stories which ordinarily might be expect.

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ed to work, secularly-speaking, didn't work with nuns. "For instance, you can't have her kidnaped because you can't get her out of the habit. Or say you have a baby dropped on the doorstep of San Tanco, the oldest cliché story in the world. No good. They have orphans there already."

Back in Madison, Wis., the author of the book watched with bemusement. She was Tere Ríos, the half-Irish, half-Puerto Rican wife of a retired colonel of artillery named Versace (West Point 1933). She got the idea 15 years ago when "I saw a little Sister of Charity in her big white bonnet nearly blown off her feet in Paris." Since she was also a flyer who learned her flying in the Georgia Civil Air Patrol, the story came easily. She wrote "The Fifteenth Pelican," one of three published novels, in 1963, saw it published in 1965 and saw it achieve a small but steady sale over the following years.


She says she wrote it because "I had known nuns all my life and was tired of all this serious stuff about them." Generally speaking, she is pleased with what happened to her modest little tale. "It is like watching old friends get into new trouble." She may be even more pleased when Doubleday gets around to reissuing the novel. If Screen Gems can sell

a million dollars' worth of Flying Nun bubble gum, think what Lee Barker can do with the Flying Nun book.

As for Sally, she was having a ball. Instead of a child, she was a personage, a \$4000-a-week personage. In fact, the cash registers were ringing so prettily that, last November, Screen Gems production chief Jackie Cooper was moved to "show our appreciation." He put in a call to Herb Tobias, Sally's agent, and inquired what Sally wanted most in the world. "Well," replied Tobias lightly, "she always said she'd be driving around in a Ferrari one of these days." Cooper bought the little girl from Portola Junior High acting class a midnight-blue Ferrari 330 two-plustwo convertible with stereo tape deck. It cost about \$16,000. "Is that all right, Sally?" asked Cooper at the presentation. "You're putting me on," Sally said. To top it all off he threw a birthday party (her 21st) at The Factory, the discotheque in West Hollywood. She wore a bright-orange, cut-velvet Rudi Gernreich mini-dress with a ropette neck, had her first legal drink (Kahlua and cream) and frugged the night away with Davy Jones (of the Monkees), her sometime escort.

"I just couldn't believe it," said the Flying Nun. "There was little me where all the big stars are."

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

# THE HEADLINE SYNDROME

America may be starving for news and may not even know it

If, like most Americans, you derived the largest part of your news diet from television news broadcasts during 1967, there's a distinct chance that—as the Nation strides further into this election year of 1968—you are suffering from an aggravated case of intellectual rickets.

A canvass of newspaper editors in the U.S., Europe and Asia conducted by United Press International suggests that among the top news stories of 1967 were the devaluation of the pound, Red China's cultural revolution, the Greek-Turkish crisis over Cyprus, the war in Vietnam, the Johnson-Kosygin summit meeting, the Arab-Israeli war and the first human heart transplant.

Among TV journalists it is a truism scarcely worth restatement that television news programs simply aren't spacious enough to give definitive coverage to any of those news stories; nor is there an audience—in the numbers required for economic good health—of sufficient toleration and inquisitiveness to demand longer, fuller news shows.

An informal survey taken by TV Gume (of television critics, TV news directors, reporters and academicians) in more than 20 American cities confirms the impression that television news is now, and perhaps always will be, a kind of all-purpose vitamin capsule to which the concerned citizenvoter can repair for his minimum daily requirements of news; for the taste of meat, he must go to newspapers, books, periodicals and newsmagazines.

One of our respondents, Bill Henry,

news director of WFLA in Tampa, Fla., said this: "The fact is, people just aren't that interested in being informed. I would like a two-hour newscast, but it must be made palatable to the public. Perhaps if we weren't worried constantly about ratings, we could do it."

Jay Crouse, president of the Radio and Television News Directors Association, says he's as concerned as the next fellow about the relative robustness of TV news operations around the country versus the creeping economic decay afflicting many newspapers. "I certainly hope we're not taking readers away from the newspapers," he says. "We can't replace them, and that's not our intention. They're complementary to us. We hope to reach people and whet appetites for the news. We can break a big story, but we can't give it the full newspaper treatment."

Ralph Renick, vice president of news at WTVJ, Miami, says: "Television is all front page. There is no time or room for the insignificant.... Daily television news is . . . a surface medium. We can only go into depth in our documentaries and special features." (The minimal audiences who watch documentaries and special features, many observers suspect, are customarily the same people who are heavy newspaper readers anyway.)

Ray Dantzler, news director of WTVT, Tampa, says: "TV news creates newspaper readers because at best we scrape the news off the top."

When newspaper reporters and TV newsmen get together, they frequently debate just how different is the news-dissemination process, now that television is so central a part of it; how well are Americans served by this new presence; and how informed are they now as against that Pleistocene, pre-television era which fewer and fewer Americans remember.

This last is a question of such delectable impenetrability as to keep a gaggle or two of sociologists busy and off the streets for years—and it probably will, since no formal study of the matter exists.

Meantime, an adventurous guesser might conclude that collectively we do in fact know more about our world than the citizens of, say, 1940; but that since the planet has so shrunk in size and grown in complexity in the interim, a stern partisan of TV news is in danger of deluding himself that he does, indeed, have a workable grasp of what's going on when he almost certainly does not.

Still, in many parts of the U.S., television is the only window on the world for people with a yen for news; hundreds of towns and cities have only one newspaper, or perhaps two (New York, incredibly enough, has only three), and these are frequently so inadequate that the reader gets a diet of truncated wire-service dispatches and badly written and edited reports of PTA meetings and weddings.

Only a small percentage has easy access to the better journals, and that fact creates a wondrous opportunity for 1) the three big networks, who package and promulgate an assortment of brief news programs each day, as well as live coverage of  $\rightarrow$ 

the more portentous events; and 2) the 600 local TV news departments, which have undertaken to report on matters of interest in their own communities.

As Walter Cronkite pointed out recently, the interdependence between network and affiliate is almost complete in the area of news; the Huntley-Brinkleys, Youngs and Cronkites achieve large audiences or small ones in a particular city depending on how well or badly the local news show is received and vice versa.

So the efforts of local television news departments achieve heightened importance in light of all these circumstances. A sampling of opinion about their effectiveness, however, turns up considerable disagreement.

"The viewing audience is being cheated and confused as well as not being informed," says Joe Nevens, a news writer for station KTLA in Los Angeles. "As long as there is sufficient news to satisfy the FCC and separate the time between commercials, many station managers are more concerned with minimum bodies on the payroll than with quality in the newscasts."

Woody Klein, a newspaperman in New York for 10 years before becoming an investigative reporter for WCBS-TV—and subsequently press secretary to Mayor John V. Lindsay—says this: "The potential for covering news better than ever before is there. I used to write 10 news stories to accomplish the same minor reform which later I could do with one TV report. Many good newsmen are looking to television as the future of the news business. Newspapers, with few exceptions, are losing the race for attention."

Ray Miller, news director of KPRC in Houston: "We can convey to the public a lucid report of an event, but we have not learned how to convey understanding. . . . A good example of that is the Vietnam war."

Percy Shain, TV critic of the Boston Globe, says that news coverage in his area is "generally terrible"; that it's too fragmented, too shallow, and tries to treat too many topics in too short a time. Elizabeth Sullivan, Globe radio-TV editor, thinks that good news judgment frequently is lacking, and that there's too much national news in local newscasts.

Harry Sonneborn, managing editor of the Milwaukee Sentinel, says: "TV's main job is to entertain, causing news reporting to be secondary. A newspaper's main job is news reporting, with entertainment as a side light."

John Corporon, vice president of news for the Metromedia chain of stations, says: "It's becoming more common for a TV reporter to spend a week developing a story; if he's done his work properly, he'll end up with something better than the newspapers have. TV reporting is getting more sophisticated, although the art of TV journalism is still in its infancy. Newspapers don't change much; they've reached a plateau. But TV journalism is still growing."

Perhaps the most elemental concern of the truly aware TV journalist is his medium's unfaltering preoccupation with pictures, frequently at the expense of fine, tight, explicatory news writing. Richard Pack, senior vice president of programming and production for the Westinghouse stations, says: "We've been misled by that old Chinese axiom about one picture being worth a thousand words. Unfortunately, many television newsmen feel that any picture story is better than any spoken story."

Gabe Pressman, of New York's WNBC, expresses it even more strongly: "We become camera slaves," he says. "In the coverage of government and politics, especially, the camera perpetuates oversimplifications, outright distortions, and lies... Off-camera, an official frequently will tell you the straight story which he can't tell

you on-camera. It's our responsibility to recognize that film is two-dimensional, and the third dimension is the reporter providing a context. The camera can lie, make no mistake about it. It cannot substitute for a reporter's brain, nor his ability to sift fact from fiction."

The larger questions of how television journalism is to fulfill its manifest destiny have engaged the thoughts of newsmen like James Reston of the New York Times, who, in his book "The Artillery of the Press," suggests that the networks should set aside an hour each weekend in prime time to "review the important news of the week and put it into some historical perspective."

He also thinks that, ideally, the United States should have a television and radio service of special news and cultural events available on all sets and in all areas of the country. "Much more could also be done, through a nation-wide educational-television network and other ways, in the field of adult education on foreign affairs." The problem, he says, is to "present the great issues as a series of practical choices: Let the people look at the alternatives as the President has to look at them and try to decide among the hard and dangerous courses."

But one must conclude, more in sorrow than in anger, that commercial television news, as currently constituted, is far too imperfect a vessel to contain the letter and spirit of our world; but that this condition is not so chronic that it cannot be improved by broadcasting's entrepreneurs.

It needs also TV journalists of sufficient stature and perspicacity to lead the public taste, not follow it, by contriving news programs rich enough and spacious enough to engage the public imagination and, by the same act, providing the firmest, truest footing for Americans eager to confront their Nation and their world.
