

■ Cleveland Amory, who really is a most pleasant fellow and an entertaining critic, has come up with his own personal, private and individual list of awards for actors and shows. He calls them the Amorys and you'll find them on Page 18.

There are times when we disagree with Amory. Violently. But he's our critic and we respect him and we print what he writes. That does not mean we endorse what he writes. Not by a long shot. And never by a longer shot

than this week.

As one of many examples of fuzzy thinking to be found in this week's awards, Amory picked He & She as the season's worst comedy. He & She is the brightest, best-written, most capably performed, most sophisticated comedy to appear on television in a decade. Paula Prentiss is a delight. Dick Benjamin can throw away a line with more effect than most comedians can punch one over. It is not their fault that CBS's geniuses spotted the show following The Beverly Hillbillies and Green Acres and before Jonathan Winters, three of the least sophisticated comedy shows on television. Hardly the right place to attract the kind of audience that would like He & She. So the best new comedy show in years died. And Amory is jumping on the corpse.

There are more examples of strange (to us) taste in the column, but we won't labor the point. Actually, the Amorys make as much sense as most television awards, whether they're picked by one man, a committee or a collection of blue-ribbon juries, as the Emmys are now. It's always amusing, if you can keep your temper, to see what odd notions some people have about what's good and what's bad.

■ The individual viewer is the only real criterion. Come to think of it—that's what the Amorys are all about.

Fifty million Frenchmen can be wrong

...if they believe what their television programs tell them about the U.S.

Felix Laurent hauled his TV set high up in the Eiffel Tower in Paris and smashed it to the pavement 300 feet below to show what he thought of the state of French television. A lot of Americans living in or visiting the France of President Charles de Gaulle must have wished they had thought of the idea first.

Any Frenchman unlucky enough to get all his ideas of the United States from the national networks must wonder why the country which bailed his own out of two World Wars (and gave it billions in aid) has turned into a land of ruthless imperialists, racists and economic colonialists.

Certainly that could be the impression of a long series of one-sided programs on race relations, the Vietnam War, American investment in Europe and the Kennedy assassination. The thinking Frenchman knows his government-controlled stations reflect the policies of the De Gaulle regime and are thus hardly the best sources for an unbiased account of the U.S.A.

Anyone who works abroad soon realizes we are the most self-critical of peoples. No other country so mercilessly exposes its own faults, and if we insist on doing so, it is right →



that they should be examined by our friends as well as our enemies. But it's hard to tell from French TV that we may have a few virtues as well.

There is no question who runs Radiodiffusion-Television Francaise (RTF)—the government, which means De Gaulle, Unlike Britain, where no political party would dare tamper with the independence of the stateowned BBC, the French network gets direct instructions on programs, according to Gaullist sources, from a group called "Service de Liaison Inter-Ministeriel." This meets for a daily briefing and transmits its orders to RTF, one of whose executives was dropped some months ago, reportedly because he gave too much time to opposition views.

So the blame for the image of the U.S. projected by French TV leads to the Elysee Palace, the presidential residence. And since De Gaulle is a frequent viewer, he must be aware of its effect on the less sophisticated of his subjects, who as a result doubtless give daily thanks that they live under the benevolent, enlightened and humane regime of Le Grand Charles.

Typical was the French TV reaction to North Korea's seizure of the American ship Pueblo in January. The newsfeature program Panorama used the incident as a peg for a documentary on North and South Korea. An American who taped the sound track said it described North Korea "in flattering terms"-its desire for "peace," its "prodigious step forward" in industry and so on. In contrast it said South Korea "has lived in the American style since 1953" and went on to mention corruption, prostitution, unemployment and prison sentences for exercising free speech.

France has some 8½ million TV sets, whose owners pay an annual license fee of 100 francs (\$20), including radio. There are two channels, one of which is equipped for color, using

the French SECAM system. This is one of De Gaulle's disappointments in his pursuit of prestige for France. Only Russia and her Communist allies bought SECAM, turned down by the rest of Europe for the West German PAL system, which picks up American satellite color.

In mid-January, however, Russia was reported to be grumbling about the deal, on the grounds that France was still having to use some American equipment. Moscow said it would not accept American components under any circumstances and there were insinuations that it might revert to its own system.

This would be a wounding blow for De Gaulle, already forced to ask Russia for help in launching a French communications satellite in 1971.

French TV, once the dullest in Europe, has evolved into a mostly intelligent and attractive amalgam of drama, news, variety and the rest on (dare I say it?) the American pattern. Officially it is noncommercial, but it carries a few institutional advertisements, such as appeals to drink more coffee or eat more oranges. Under a new bill expected to become law this year, one station will carry about 30 minutes of American-type commercials a day at about \$6000 a minute.

There have been harsh words about this bill. One British newspaper described it as a "highly sinister" attempt to siphon advertising revenue away from the weaker of the independent papers which still criticize De Gaulle. But government sources insist the money is needed to expand the color service.

Although the French, reportedly at De Gaulle's suggestion, once produced a cowboys-and-Indians series with an all-French cast, they have not repeated the experiment. They use and have used a fair number of American series and films. Steve McQueen became so popular when his Wanted—

Dead or Alive was shown that he was summoned for personal appearances.

Many Americans phone the Embassy to complain of alleged slurs about the U.S. on RTF, while others shrug them off and decide to spend less time in France as tourists. Robert Stack, star of *The Untouchables*, who spent his early years in France, loves the country and speaks the language, is one of those depressed by the anti-American needling.

"It's so obviously slanted," he said. "Some of the commentators know so little and have such definite attitudes. They treat us almost with contempt."

Example: Winding up a program in which an American criticized U.S. involvement in Vietnam, the commentator smirked: "Of course, you won't be able to talk that way in your own country." Of course, he would—and many Americans do.

Normally, American embassies abroad do not take official notice of television or newspaper critiques, but in one instance Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen took the unusual step of lodging a formal protest against remarks by Emmanuel d'Astier de la Vigerie, known as "The Red Marquis," and in the eyes of a seasoned observer "viciously anti-American."

D'Astier, who has his own show, suggested that if some American prisoners of war in North Vietnam were placed in factories, villages and dikes, it might deter bombing of those spots because "Americans have a great deal of humanity for themselves."

Asked about this incident, Edoard Sablier, who is in charge of news programs for RTF, said it was a matter of freedom of the press.

A journalist of impressive qualifications, Sablier denied there was any government campaign to condition the masses on American matters.

"The de facto anti-American position at French TV is by no means a reflection of personal anti-American feeling by the French people," he said. "When we express our disagreement with American policy in Vietnam, it does not mean we dislike Americans; it only means we disagree with the U.S. involvement in an absurd war.

"Our race films may look anti-American, but they are only what American TV itself shows."

This is quite true, but Sablier, in company with other European TV executives, forgets that films made for Americans, who know both sides of their own problems, do not have the same effect on Europeans, who see only one side—the bad side.

"Never," said Sablier in sincere admiration, "but never, would France have shown the pictures of its own war in Vietnam as the Americans are doing. This is probably the greatest tribute one can pay the U.S."

American experts have spent a lot of time puzzling over De Gaulle's thought processes. One theory is that he believes he is fighting to save French as an international language against English. This (they say) is why he is so eager to orbit a French communications satellite; why there are over 100 French teachers in South Vietnam trying to forestall the takeover by English; why De Gaulle made his remarkable intrusion into Canadian affairs with "Long Live Free Quebec."

In this campaign (they say) De Gaulle is using TV as one of his weapons. All around the Elysee Palace itself are the dread signs of invasion—American pop music, Western films, American-style drug stores, young Frenchmen sewing English labels into their clothes, whisky edging out champagne at receptions, and the increasing use of "Franglais." This is the adoption of English words, giving them French pronunciations—le shakehand, le weekend, le shopping, le pullover, le pressing.

New ones come along all the time. But not yet le gratitude.



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


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
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

When you're writing about a roughand-ready guy like Cameron Mitchell, who plays rough-and-ready Buck Cannon in NBC's The High Chaparral, it gives the article some class to start out with a quotation from a distinguished source. So


In his "Pensées," Blaise Pascal, the French scientist and religious philosopher, said, "What a chimera then is man! What a novelty! What a monster, what a chaos, what a contradiction, what a prodigy!" Which, in relation to Cameron Mitchell, isn't as farfetched as you might think.

For instance, Mitchell admits that he has been called almost everything in the book. Maybe not a chimera, but any of Pascal's other words might well apply to him—plus a few more. It has been said that he is "an outspoken, hard-headed guy who has fought with all his High Chaparral colleagues and who manages to alienate just about everybody who runs into him, from

fans to producers." Here again Mitchell readily admits, "Everybody on the show hates me, except David Dortort. Maybe hate is too strong a word. But I think they all respect the truth of what I say."

Dortort, executive producer of *The High Chaparral*, denies any dissension in the ranks of his stars, co-stars, guest stars and special guest stars. "They're just like one big family," he says. But a few years ago he was saying the same thing about *Bonanza* at a time when Pernell Roberts, the prodigal Cartwright, was sounding off in quite another way.

It is true, though, that relations among the members of High Chaparral's big cast seem friendly enough. When they come to advance screenings at the studio, they bring their wives and children, there are cheery greetings all round, and something like a family picnic atmosphere prevails. So far, only one real "incident" has been reported—between Leif



Erickson and Cameron Mitchell on location in the 120-degree desert heat near Tucson—and that was talked out and settled amicably.

Probably the 49-year-old Mitchell did most of the talking. He has acknowledged that one of his major faults is that he is a marathon talker. Although his language may become strong on occasion, his conversation is laced with more religious quotations and references-from the Bible to Zen Buddhism-than with profanity or vulgarity. His preoccupation with religion is great. He says, "If you can't believe there's something more to life than the stink of man, there's nothing." Once he flew from Miami to Nassau when he heard about a "miracle" in a church there.

He comes by this interest naturally. His background is theological rather than theatrical. Born in a rural, Pennsylvania Dutch community, Cameron Mitzell—his real name—was one of seven children of a minister. As a

child during the depression, he wore his sisters' hand-me-down shoes and coats to school. But it was while he was in school that he first became interested in acting. Once, in a church pageant, his pants fell down. "I must admit that I rather enjoyed the laughter," he says. Later, when he was in high school, one of his teachers, convinced of his acting talent, lent him money to go to New York to dramatic school.

"When I got to New York I had never ridden in an elevator or used a telephone," says Mitchell. But he did know how to write letters, and write letters he did-to producers. actors and agents-while holding down jobs like ushering, washing dishes, being a mail clerk and a guide at Radio City, None of his hundreds of letters even got a reply until he wrote a particularly brash one to Alfred Lunt, criticizing his performance in the motion picture "The Guardsman." Lunt replied and gave him a chance to audition, Afterward, when he tried to apologize for his letter, Lynn Fontanne said, "Don't worry about what you've done. Acting is your life's work. and you're not only going to be a good actor, you're going to be a great actor." She also suggested that he change his name from Mitzell to Mitchell.

The newly baptized Mitchell worked with the Lunts ("the greatest training in the world") until he joined the Air Corps in 1942 ("I don't like to talk about that. I was a lousy bombardier—I never hit anything"). Meanwhile, in 1940, he had married actress Johanna Mendel. (The marriage lasted until 1960, when an acrimonious divorce ended it.)

Possibly Mitchell's talents as an actor, as appraised by Lynn Fontanne, have been a handicap rather than an asset during his 30-year career. Despite appearances in many top boxoffice films—from "Death of a Salesman," in which he repeated his —

Broadway role, to the voice of Christ in "The Robe"-he has never really made it big. The reason undoubtedly is that, unlike the Gables and Bogarts and Grants, he projects no image of his own, "Nobody ever knew me as Cameron Mitchell-I become the character," he says. Although he is contemptuous of Method actors ("You can't be somebody else, because you're you"), he completely immerses himself in each part he plays. Once he became carried away during a scene and choked another actor so hard that shooting had to be stopped and the two forcibly separated. When he appeared as an Indian in "Pony Soldier" with Tyrone Power, his own parents did not recognize him when they saw the picture. He says, "This may be nice artistically, but not financially."

In just one season of High Chaparral, Mitchell has probably become more identifiable to the public than in anything he has ever done, and if the

show continues indefinitely, a la Bonanza, he may become as much an uncle-figure as Lorne Greene is a father-figure.

After an up-and-down career in Hollywood movies and on the stage, Mitchell went to Europe in 1956 and acted in a series of generally undistinguished films there, including 30 made behind the Iron Curtain. On a trip to South Africa, he got the sort of mass adulation he had never received before. "I was almost mobbed when I went into the black compound," he says, "All those lousy movies I made in Europe were the only ones those poor people could afford to see. I was a big star to

On another trip two years ago, en route to Madrid, he ran into David Dortort, who had once produced a television version of "The Ox-Bow Incident," in which Mitchell appeared. Dortort asked him if he would like to

do a TV series. Mitchell's immediate reaction was negative—his appearance in an earlier series, Beachcomber, had not been happy, and he liked living in Europe. But his second wife, Lissa—a blonde dancer he had met while doing the movie "Carousel"—said that she wanted to come back to the United States. "Our older son, Buttons, learned to speak Italian before he could speak English," she says. Mitchell took the role of Buck Cannon in The High Chaparral.

Today, the Mitchells and their twosmall-children-going-on-three live in a modest home in Pacific Palisades. Cal. The actor is proud of the four children from his first marriage, now in their teens and 20's. And he speaks affectionately of his first wife. "We get along better now than we ever did when we were married," he says. She lives in Vancouver, B.C., which may have something to do with it. The Mitchells rarely socialize and when they do, it is not with actors. Says Cameron, "I like Angelo, the guy that runs the little Italian restaurant, better than any actor I ever met." (Mitchell has a prodigious appetite, by the way, and for breakfast will have chicken noodle soup, calf's liver and onions, and mashed potatoes with gravy.) He also enjoys the company of athletes. "There's nothing phony with them-they have to produce," he says. "Their tongues can't do it, and a press agent can't do it. It's closer to Zen than anything I know."

Mitchell has a disconcerting habit of throwing in bits of philosophy, such as the Zen reference, with his ordinary conversation. But, philosophizing aside, his major preoccupation is golf. He has, literally, hundreds of clubs at home and abroad, many of his own design and making—his putter, for instance, is made from an old driver with a five-pound lead weight taped to the top. Despite a painful arthritic condition in his arms and back, he plays

golf every day *The High Chaparral* is not shooting and every chance he gets when it is. He says, "If I had enough money, I'd buy an island—with a golf course."

Which brings up the contradiction in Cameron Mitchell. Someone who knows him says, "He likes to revel in the glory, like any actor." But Mitchell, with an intensity characteristic of him, says, "I shouldn't have been an actor. But now I don't know anything else, and I have to make a living. I hate conceit, and I hate vanity -what does the Bible say? 'All is vanity.' I'm in the worst business in the world." Also characteristically, though, he can take an almost mystical view of his role in The High Chaparral: "Here in Hollywood, it's another Bonanza, but just alone out there in the desert, you have a feeling you're doing something that really happened to somebody 100 years ago."

Of Cameron Mitchell the late Hedda Hopper once wrote, "He isn't handsome. He isn't one of the lucky-break boys or the overnight flashes." He certainly isn't. Since the Lunts first saw his promise, he has been at it a long time. As for his looks, what would pass for a bad nose job with any other actor is the result of his nose having been broken five times. Despite his philosophizing, which can sometimes become pretentious ("We make a world of duality that doesn't exist"), he is basically a down-toearth, rough-hewn person, whose roots are still back in rural Pennsylvania. Yet he has enough of the actor's vanity, no matter his claims to the contrary, to read aloud a Variety review that one of his Italian movies was "sleeper of the year." But he includes the reviewer's note that it has "poor marquee value" and adds, "That's me."

A novelty? A monster? A chaos? A contradiction? A prodigy? Cameron Mitchell, in one way or another, seems to be all of them.

Panel Shows on Comeback Trail

Shades of What's My Line? and I've Got a Secret! The venerable panel show may be destined for a new prime-time go-round. Reason: The network programmers don't like admitting it, but they're harder up than ever before for new ideas in action drama, situation comedies and variety shows. So far ABC, which has Dream House, Dating and Newlywed Games in its evening lineup, is the only network with a new half-hour game booked for fall: and even that one, the Don Rickles Show, may be as much a comedy outing as a game. But its producers, panel-show past-masters Mark Goodson and Bill Todman, are pitching new program concoctions of this sort. Just last week a G-T idea called Celebrity Countdown-"sort of a physical stunt show." Goodson said-was run off for CBS. A TV game for husbands and wives entitled It Had to Be You is being looked at by NBC. "A resurgence in panel shows?" Goodson snorted when asked about this activity. "I never knew they went away!"

Mission: Impossible clearly is an oddson favorite to walk off with the
biggest batch of Emmys at the TV
Academy's Awards clambake on NBC
May 19. In nominations disclosed last
week, the CBS thriller turned up a
candidate for 11 Emmys ranging from
the "Outstanding Dramatic Series"
award to those for best writing, direction, music, cinematography and
film editing. Martin Landau and Barbara Bain, two of the show's stars,

were in the running for acting kudos. No other program grabbed more than six nominations (that many going to the CBS Playhouse production, "Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night"). Ironically—but not for the first time—a series that is going off the air found favor. He & She, a CBS comedy, won five nominations.

ABC, tired of playing third eveningnews fiddle to its competitors, is of a mind to try to lure away some of the Walter Cronkite and Huntley-Brinklev habitues by juicing up Bob Young's nightly report. In a gradual, unpublicized revamping cued in part by a feeling that commentator Howard K. Smith's recent hyper-hawkish attack on Vietnam war policy was something the program should have more of, the network is lining up "guest columnists" with controversial Runvonesque views (i.e., Jimmy Breslin) and plotting exposetype reporting designed to stir up talk. On an average night when all this gets going, sometime this summer perhaps, says producer Sid Darion, Young's top-news roundup may well be crammed into the first five minutes of the half-hour.

Briefly: the FCC has removed a threat to politicking by TV personalities by decreeing that sportscaster Rafer Johnson of Los Angeles' KNBC-TV is exempt from equal-time rules as a Democratic convention delegate pledged to Bobby Kennedy.

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

By Judith Crist FUN IN ACAPULCO (NBC), Saturday KING RAT (ABC), Sunday THE TRUTH ABOUT SPRING (NBC), Tuesday PATHS OF GLORY (ABC), Wednesday RAMPAGE (CBS), Thursday DAYS OF WINE AND ROSES (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

This is a landmark week for both film connoisseurs and televised-movie watchers (the two groups all too rarely have common ground), with the Xerox Corporation once again doing a good deed for film on television and hopefully setting an example for sponsors at large. Under its aegis, one of the great films, Stanley Kubrick's "Paths of Glory," will be shown in its entirety and without interruption except for the legally required station identification on the hour.

This 1957 war film, based on Humphrey Cobb's novel, has grown in stature through the years, not only as an example of the filmmaker's art (Kubrick went on from there to further perfections of Strangelove") but also as an ultimate comment on the hypocrisies of war, on the defeat of brave soldiers by the exigencies and ambitions of those in power, on the inhumanity of those involved in the conduct of this most inhuman of human activities. The French Army in World War I is the subject (the sensitive French Government had banned the film from that country for many years) but any army in any war could serve for this story of generals trickling away the lives of ordinary men to serve their own vanity and vainglory. It is a bitter and biting tale, told with stunning point and nerve-racking intensity in 86 brilliant minutes.

Kirk Douglas has never been better than as the humane colonel caught between generals and privates: Adolphe Menjou and George Macready are nothing short of perfection as the generals, and Wayne Morris as a craven lieutenant, Ralph Meeker, Timothy Carey and Joseph Turkel as the ultimate victims, stand out in a uniformly excellent cast. The film. which has been shown on some local television stations, is strong stuff for a network and the manner of its showing, without interruption, a boon. The Xerox Corporation, which, for example, brought the superb international CBS Children's Film Festival to network television, is indeed our benefactor.

There's merit among the week's other dramatic offerings: "King Rat," a grim story of survival in a Japanese POW camp, is marked by very good performances; "Days of Wine and Roses" is a strong story of alcoholics, with Jack Lemmon outstanding in this domestic tragedy. And for leavening, there's "The Truth About Spring," a fine bit of family fare with John Mills (catch this fine actor too in "King Rat") and his daughter Hayley.

And just to get you back to the runof-the-mill realities of network-movie life, there's "Fun in Acapulco," strictly from Presley, and "Rampage," a safari story with the animals, as usual, out-acting the actors.

STILL A BROTHER: INSIDE THE NEGRO MIDDLE CLASS

Actor Ossie Davis narrates this study of the Negro middle class, a small but growing group that is caught in the middle.

A member of the black bourgeoisie runs the risk of rejection from two directions. Despite considerable economic and educational progress, he is frozen out of the mainstream of white middle-class American life. At the same time, other Negroes accuse him of deserting his heritage and abandoning his less-fortunate brothers.

Producers William Greaves and William Branch turned their cameras on the Negro middle class to examine its external trappings and internal soul-searching.

A montage of the Negro business community focuses on a two-sided problem: discrimination by banks, suppliers and insurance companies; and competition from more powerful white firms, which have belatedly discovered the 32 billion dollar Negro market.

Black middle-class social life is represented by the annual debutante cotillion at New York City's Waldorf-Astoria, the annual Evening of Elegance at Mrs. Sidney Poitier's Westchester (N.Y.) estate, and favorite vacation spots.

The Negro "mental revolution," and its relevancy to the black middle class, is traced from the time of slavery through the militance of today.

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At the spring-training camp of the Baltimore Orioles last year, gentlemen bearing microphones encountered an unusual problem. They were informed by the players that the price of a radio interview would be \$25. For television, the fee was fixed at \$50. Asked why the TV tab was twice that of radio. a spokesman explained, "TV involves twice as many elements-the voice and the face."

"Why don't you charge for newspaper interviews, too?" the spokesman was asked.

He responded, "We only object to having our voices exploited. If radio and TV merely want to quote us, as newspapers do, that's all right. But we consider our voices merchandisable commodities, which, if sold on sponsored time, should mean revenue to us."

surprisingly, the Baltimore Not management threw a fit. TV and radio, it pointed out, constitute an important part of a club's public-relations program, and lack of cooperation on the part of the players amounted to heresy.

In the end, the athletes backed down-at least temporarily-and one of the rare victories lately by an ownership over muscled personnel was scored.

A peculiar unrest has pervaded professional sports in America, leaving those who have invested in these forms of entertainment with nervous indigestion they never anticipated. Rebellion is not new to athletics. The Ruths and the DiMaggios have held out, the Hogans and the Sneads have refused to appear, the Chamberlains have threatened to quit. But what is evident today is not individual resistance so much as group action. Player unions are flexing their muscles, threatening management with just about everything, including strikes, Curiously, the uprisings stem not from hunger, as most rebellions do, but from security. Fatter than ever, the athletes no longer are reduced to running scared and they are coming to assert themselves in the establishment of ground rules in their crafts.

Recently, for instance, baseball players demanded and won major concessions from big-league owners. Minimum salary was raised from \$7000 to \$10,000. Other increases were gained in meal, travel and springtraining allowances, and the 25-percent maximum figure by which salaries could be reduced was lowered to 20 percent.

Still, the foregoing amounts to only a fragment of what baseball players will be seeking over the next year. They have asked for the right to sit in on local TV negotiations on the ground that this is a matter of "joint interest." They also have asked to ->

If athletes' demands aren't satisfied, the umpire may not be the only one



okay the annual schedule. They have requested first-class air travel, as opposed to tourist, and the adoption of "minimum standards" for the playing of games in low temperatures and high winds. In other words, if they feel it is too cold or too breezy, they want games postponed.

Finally, they have demanded a review of the reserve clause, possibly with the thought of gaining the option privileges included in the contracts of professional football players, who, upon serving management with a year's notice, are legally free to work elsewhere. Some have availed themselves of this opportunity.

Restlessness among performers has spread to all sports. In pro basketball, a strike narrowly was stalled at the NBA play-off games last year when owners grudgingly yielded to demands of players for additional pension benefits. The pro-hockey union has tapped the owners for minimum-wage increases, and even the touring golf pros have been stirring. They threatened last summer to give the boot to the controlling body, the PGA, and run the tour themselves. Peace was restored, but for how long isn't known.

What is creating the revolution in sports? Jack Kent Cooke, owner of the pro basketball and hockey franchises in Los Angeles, ascribes the problem to two things.

"First, TV is causing much of the trouble," he says. "It is making instant heroes of athletes. Whereas in the old days you had to go to the newsreels to see Red Grange and Babe Ruth, television is bringing athletes into every home and giving them greater stature. And, feeling their power, they are rubbing the owners' noses in it.

"Secondly, stupidity on the part of some owners is bringing grief to all of them. They sign one of their superstars for a fabulous sum and they crow about it. They get publicity, all right, but they also get headaches from all the others on the team. A guy making \$10,000 says to his wife, 'I may not be a superstar, but that fellow making \$100,000 isn't 10 times as good as I am.'"

Player unions do not bargain for individuals, but when athletes such as Willie Mays and John Unitas and Bill Russell push the ceilings higher, prices rise at the lower levels, too.

"Pro football is going out of its cotton-picking mind," says Ralph C. Wilson Jr., owner of the Buffalo Bills. "Our payroll last season ran more than \$900,000-and our players this year are asking for raises averaging 25 to 30 percent. They are deluded by television figures. They read about multimillion-dollar TV deals and get wild ideas. Profits are surprisingly small in our game. Four teams in the American Football League lost money last year. Our team, which is rated one of the better franchises, made less than \$300,000 before taxes. Oakland, the league champion, didn't make as much."

Pro athletes counter that owners have been taking advantage of them, preying on their lack of unity. And, while conceding that annual profits may not be outlandish, they point to appreciation of franchises.

"Owners complain that their earnings aren't high," says a big-league baseball star, "but they forget to tell you about the growth of their investments. In 1961, owners of the California Angels got their franchise for a little over \$2,000,000. Today you couldn't buy it for \$8,000,000. Football franchises have appreciated too. Art Modell bought Cleveland in 1961 for less than \$4,000,000. Today, thanks to TV, it's worth at least \$12,000,000."

Lines between labor and management, you can see, are pretty clearly drawn. Over the next few years, the liveliest shows in sports could be quite removed from the field.



In These Contests, Everybody Wins

Sponsors, networks, cities, promoters, girls and girl-watchers all profit from TV's beauty pageants

Among them, Pepsi-Cola, Toni and Oldsmobile spent over two million dollars just to sponsor last year's Miss America telecast. Is it worth it?

"It better be, or I won't have a job," said Joseph Lewis, Toni's vice president in charge of advertising. But he smiled as he said it, because nearly half the TV sets in the country carried his company's message home loud and clear last Sept. 9.

"We make hair products and face products, so it's a natural for us to have a show built around young women," he continued. "Miss America is the typical American girl—wholesome, intelligent—and that's a good association for our product."

Nor is the association limited to that one big night. Miss America is available to her sponsors throughout the year—to open a bottling plant, decorate an auto show, film a commercial—for a fraction of her regular fee (which stands at about \$500 for a civic appearance, \$1000 for a commercial booking). And the identification is continuous, pervasive and,

occasionally, subliminal: In an article chatting about her experiences as Miss America's traveling chaperon, Mrs. Margaret Lloyd wrote, "What does Miss America do about her hair? Frankly, she does it herself . . . usually a good home permanent . . ."

Ah, youth and beauty—therefore Clairol sponsors pageants on the ABC network; CBS carries Model of the Year, courtesy of Metrecal and Cover Girl cosmetics; and a regional Miss World telecast was recently pitched for a deodorant company. (That last item, incidentally, would never have passed muster on the Miss America Pageant. "No cigarets, no deodorants, no beer, nothing personal," explained Albert A. Marks Jr., chairman of the Pageant executive committee.)

That the sponsor regards his tie-in with Miss Whoever-She-Is as money in the bank was dramatically illustrated back in 1951, when Miss America (Yolande Betbeze) balked at modeling swim suits on behalf of Catalina, one of her sponsors. A big flap followed, ending with Catalina pulling out of the pageant altogether and setting up a new contest—Miss Universe, in Long Beach, Cal.

An intriguing sequel in the financial annals of beauty pageants, and a demonstration of the fact that a sponsor's tangible rewards need not be confined to increased sale of product, came when Kayser-Roth, which had acquired Catalina, asked Long Beach for \$100,000 as a token of that city's appreciation for being allowed to host Miss Universe and her preliminary pageant, Miss U.S.A.

Long Beach declined, and in 1960 the two contests were moved to Miami Beach, which currently pays \$90,000 (up from \$75,000) a year for the privilege. In a spirited attempt at one-upmanship, Long Beach latched onto something called the International Beauty Congress which—to further demonstrate something or other—fea-



tured Lee Meriwether, Miss America of 1955, on its judging panel last year.

Thus, everybody profits.

The sponsors obviously profit.

The networks profit. The Miss America people asked NBC for a relatively measly \$255,000 for the right to telecast last year's show, and the price will be raised only slightly—to \$280,000—this year.

Ron Friedwald, manager of television analysis for NBC, conservatively estimates that sponsors spend \$5 million on air time alone for network pageants but adds that there is no way to estimate how much is really spent when one includes promotion, merchandising and allied trimmings. Pepsi-Cola and its bottlers spend a quarter of a million dollars a year on scholarships alone at all the Miss America levels-in return for which. a V.P. says, "Every girl is a Pepsi girl"-and the total dollar value of TV's beauty business is uncertain. even to the experts.

"It's gone beyond anybody's original ideas, beyond our dreams," said Paul Levitan, director of special events for CBS. Levitan ran general herd on the Miss America telecast beginning in 1957 (ABC televised it before that) and ending in 1965 when "for a variety of political reasons" NBC got it away from them. ("CBS would like very much to get it back," he

says, looking menacing.)

The cities profit. Al Marks puts Miss America's value to Atlantic City at many millions a year, and the benefits filter down to the state and local levels. For example, Jackson, Tenn., does very well indeed with its Miss Tennessee pageant; so well, said Jim Rubino, who came to Atlantic City last year with 25 other Jackson Jaycees to root for their candidate and to scout the caliber of competition on behalf of this year's girl, that Memphis and Chattanooga are trying desperately to wrest away their franchise.

multilevel (Unlike most other pageants, the Miss America people do not levy a charge for the franchises, although there is a charge for production kits and such optional but encouraged materials as Miss America posters. Miss America slides, Miss America paper dolls, Miss America window streamers, Miss America place mats, Miss America bumper stickers, and official orchestrations of the "famous music" written by Bernie Wayne, including the philosophical "Everybody Can't Be a Winner.")

Pageant operators profit. Miss America's break-even posture is uncommon: but more typical is an enterprise such as that managed by Palisades Amusement Park in New Jersey, where weekly contests are held all summer long in the Miss American Teen-ager series. (Cunningly, the finals are usually telecast on a local New York station on the same night as Miss America, in an earlier time spot.) More than 90 local Miss A.T. contests are held in franchised states, with the winners coming to Palisades for the finals; and the franchises costing from \$350 to \$1000 apiece. Bob Paulson, director of the pageant, was succinct when asked if the project had proved profitable: "Oh, Lord, yes."

The girls profit. Although Miss America is frequently not old enough to vote or, in most states, to drink, she can nevertheless earn the undeniably adult sum of \$100,000 for working four hours a day for one year.

State pageant winners can make about \$20,000 for their year of promoting and appearing (although they are required to give back the new Oldsmobile they have for a year).

Miss Teenage America wins a \$10,000 scholarship and, like many other pageant winners, a stack of "miscellaneous other awards" that are not always distinguished by appropriateness or congruity.

A recent 16-year-old Miss A.T.

won a convertible, a Caribbean cruise, a chest full of Keds sneakers and a diamond pendant.

The latest winner of the New York State finals for Miss World, televised locally, won a black and white striped mink coat, a wrist watch, a wig, stockings, a motorcycle, a car, a flashlight.

Last year the prizes to Little Miss America (5 to 10 years old) included a week's vacation in Florida's senior citizens ville, St. Petersburg.

The Miss Universe contest, in which the girls are considerably older and considerably less sentimental, lays it on the line in cash, starting with \$10,000 to the winner (although in her catchall "miscellaneous" bag lurk such trifles as a \$3000 watch and a \$7500 chinchilla jacket).

And the viewers. Do they profit? If they think there is nothing like a dame, they certainly do. "There's a kind of primitive fascination in watching all that flesh parade around," said a television executive in New York, who added that, offhand, he could think of three big benefits to pageant watching:

"We're a Nation of girl-watchers, and a TV camera can really zoom in on them. And there's the element of competition: the physical (blondes against brunettes) and the geographic (Arkansas vs. Rhode Island), Besides, everybody likes the feeling of ordinary, nonfamous people suddenly being catapulted into wealth and good fortune. It wouldn't work if it were Lee Radziwill who wins; it has to be an improbable person, somebody who was nobody until this event, so that the viewer can watch her make that transition. Rags to riches-it's part of the national mythology."

But there is nothing mythical about the pageants' fantastic pulling power. In 1966 the Miss America telecast more than doubled the rating of its CBS competition, a Colts-Packers game. (Last year CBS hastily changed the starting date of its new Mannix series, which had been scheduled to premiere opposite Miss America until somebody remembered and, in a what-the-hell gesture, threw in a Gunsmoke rerun.)

The 10 pageants televised on the three networks last year attracted, according to an estimate based on Nielsen figures, a total viewing audience of 369,000,000. Many viewers, obviously, were counted more than once; the first operative principle of pageant-watching is that it is highly addictive, a la the Cracker Jack syndrome. On the other hand, it cannot necessarily be assumed that the 35,000,000 or so people who watched last year's International Beauty Congress included every one of the 30,000,000 or so who thrilled to Miss Teen International, because the second operative principle is based loosely on the theory of diminishing returns; that is, if you've seen one . . .

Indeed, a random survey around the tube establishes the validity of that second principle; for what is true of one pageant is, more often than not, inexorably true even of the palest copy. Thus Miss America has the perennial he-she duo of Bert Parks and Bess Myerson to host and comment: Hollywood Stars of Tomorrow has had Steve Allen and Jayne Meadows; on International Beauty Congress last year it was Eddie Albert and Eva Gabor; and the Teenage Americans got Dean Jones and Jane Powell. There is inevitably a swoony male vocalist: for the big girls on College Queen, Robert Goulet; for the Junior Miss, Bobby Rydell; for Miss Wool of America, Donald O'Connor.

Oh, occasionally there are differences, either in number—the range last year was from 12 to 90 contestants, although the usual quota is 50—or in nuance: Julia Meade, commenting on the swim-suit competition during the New York State finals →

for Miss World, gave height, weight and measurements, while on the parallel portion of Miss Universe, June Lockhart delicately noted only height, weight and ages; Miss Teenage America's "candidates" are Miss Universe's "beauty delegates."

And occasionally there is a genuinely moving moment, as fleeting as it is rare, as when Jimmy Durante slouched at the piano during Miss Teenage America and sang "Young at Heart." Generally, however, plus ca change, plus c'est la même chose in beautyland, where all winners are ideal, all proximate birthdays inordinately acclaimed, and no one has ever heard of an uncoveted title.

Sameness or not, though, there seems to be no end to the demand, and the supply is assured, as programs periodically spring forth full-blown from the heads of program execs who feel—and apparently quite rightly—that familiarity breeds consent.

Even Paul Levitan, who believes "there is a limit to how many of these programs you can put on," came up last spring with a new one, Model of the Year, although he says, "It wasn't a true beauty pageant; it was a Tiffany presentation of beautiful girls, it was absolute elegance in programming."

Whatever it was, it was surely proof, if any were needed, that television is now manufacturing what once it transmitted simply because it was there. Whereas Miss America tooled along for many years before the cameras moved in, Model of the Year was not only televised by CBS, but at CBS-at the network broadcast center in New York. Down with the ballrooms and civic auditoriums, up with beauty pageants of the networks, by the networks, and for the people whose concurrence in their own seduction does not make the whole thing any less melancholy, only more bewildering. (Nearly half a million in New York alone tuned in Miss

Wool of America, an hour-long commercial that was a literal giveaway to the station from the Wool Bureau, Inc. and the American Wool Council.)

"Eventually," says a TV seer who ought to know, "we will have just three kinds of programs: movies, beauty pageants and the late-night sermonette." Actually, we may need just two, since some pageants can already boast the inspirational touch. As a verbal garnish to the visual banquet of Miss Universe, viewers heard a full-throated rendition of the Miss Universe Creed: "We solemnly dedicate ourselves to peace, understanding and friendship among the people of the universe."

Nor need anyone worry about lack of parading beauties. Seventy thousand girls, it is said, took part in 3500 Miss America preliminary pageants last year, and the word is spreading as more and more of them are picked up on TV (Toni sponsored a number of them in 1967, including Miss Los Angeles in expensive living color).

Bob Paulson, who shuttles 700 contestants a week for 10 weeks through his Miss American Teen-ager preliminaries, estimates that a quarter of a million girls competed in affiliated locals last summer.

Tennessee holds 45 local contests to select the Atlantic City-bound Miss Tennessee at Jackson, where the pageant last year cost \$27,000 to produce. North Carolina holds 95.

Thus the pageants thrive and proliferate on TV, buoyed by the ratings, undeterred by the occasional scandal and less occasional critical knock. "Critics," says Adrian Phillips, the new president of the Miss America Pageant, "are like a flea on an elephant, and the Miss America Pageant will move on." So, undoubtedly, will they all, and when it will all end depends on how long and how often men will enjoy looking at pretty girls. At this point the sport does not seem to be losing its popularity.

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
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
