



■ A letter from reader Dorothy Handshaw of Florida asks: "Do the three major TV networks have any control over what local, network-affiliated stations show?" Mrs. Handshaw, a former New Yorker, was disappointed because she couldn't find some of her favorite network programs, though the Florida stations had the same network affiliations as her New York stations.

This query reaches us so often that we thought a reply here would be in order.

■ The fact is that a station is an independent entity. If affiliated with a network, it may carry or not carry any program it chooses. At any time it may decide to drop a program from New York or Hollywood and run one of its own because the locally originated show is of more interest in the area served by the station.

It is of some pertinence to note that a station is usually paid about a third of its hourly rate for carrying a sponsored network show. It collects 100 percent of its hourly rate when it carries a sponsored local show. Another item of interest: If its affiliate refuses to carry a program, the network often is free to offer it to another station in the same city.

■ No affiliate is going to turn down too many network programs. Unfortunately, many network stations do drop unsponsored or low-rated public information programs. More and more, of late, local outlets are refusing to carry a mediocre network movie and are substituting a film of their own. There's more money in it and the movies are usually just as good, even if they are usually a little older.

There are times when in place of a network show there's a prime-time local program of immediate concern to the station's viewers. That's when the station really comes into its own as a servant of local public interest.



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

#### With newspapers on strike, how well has TV kept Detroit informed? The answer seems to lie in wild rumors and fears that have swept the city, criticism by municipal leaders and widespread distrust within the Negro community **By Neil Hickey**

Scarcely a dozen hours had passed since the death of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in Memphis, Tenn.; and now in Detroit, Mayor Jerome Cavanagh lounged in his 11th-floor office in the slab-like City-County Building overlooking the Detroit River, and wondered what this new catastrophe meant to his city, which was tense and brittle enough already in the dour expectation of another summer of civil strife.

Moments earlier, in an adjoining room, the mayor had told a press conference of television and radio reporters (Detroit's two daily newspapers had been strike-bound for months, in the longest newspaper blackout the city had ever suffered) that he hoped Dr. King's death would not fan to flame the embers of rage that had left 43 dead and miles of the city in ruins during 1967's violence, the worst in U.S. history. And now the mayor was rubbing his eyes and telling a visitor he wished there were newspapers in operation to help him stay in better touch with the people, to lance any incipient boils of disorder, because television-no matter how well-intentioned-doesn't fill the vacuum.

Without newspapers, "things aren't known," said the mayor earnestly, "and people need the reassurance of knowing that the administration is doing things, is affirmatively engaged." But Detroit's television stations "hadn't done enough to take up the slack" caused by the newspaper shutdown, he said, and Detroiters were more in the dark than they should be, and more edgy about the approaching summer than was healthy, and more vulnerable to wild rumors.

But Detroit was, in fact, that day

a near-perfect laboratory case for any passing social scientist who might have wondered what happens in a great American city which has: 1) no newspapers: 2) 40 percent of its population, much of it disaffected, living in a ghetto, and therefore imagined by whites to be forever on the edge of violence; and 3) a terrible unanimity of opinion among its black leaders that-even in the best of circumstances-the black community receives shoddy, shallow, misinformed and wrong-headed treatment from the press, and that television is even worse than the newspapers.

To cast a little light on those questions, a researcher would have to search out—as TV GUDE did recently —both white and black spokesmen who could describe concretely how Detroit is typical of many urban centers having large minority populations, and make some worth-while judgment about whether, from television news, white people are getting a real sense about what's *really* going on in the black ghettos of the United States.

The answer to that last guestion on the unlikely chance you're still in suspense—is a resounding "They are not!" It is that logjam on the river of understanding that is of such deep concern to knowledgeable activists of both races; for practical purposes, they say, the lines are down, the bridges are washed out.

One day a few weeks ago, the managing editor of the Michigan Chronicle—Detroit's well-read weekly Negro newspaper—leaned across an incredibly cluttered desk and complained that the only time most Negroes see a television crew is when one comes to the ghetto to film rioting, looting and mayhem. At all other times, he claimed, there's a marked scarcity of TV reporters inquiring about the run-of-the-mill, day-to-day civic-action life of the black community—the

sort of thing which gets routine coverage among whites.

As a result—Al Dunmore added— Negroes are as likely to throw a brick at a television cameraman as they are at a policeman, because he's just one more facet of a white establishment that's insensitive to the root aspirations of black people. "Television is deeply resented by many innercity Negroes." Dunmore says.

"Whenever something big happens in the ghetto, I get calls from TV news directors and reporters, asking, 'What does it mean?' I don't mind helping them out once in a while, but they should *know* what it means. They should have in their news departments the kind of specialists who would *tell* them what it means. TV lives in a dream world, because 90 percent of its editors have been brought up ignorant of what's going on."

It's that same brand of near-invincible ignorance—on the part of both local stations and network operatives -which disturbs such other Detroit leaders as the Rev. Roy Allen, president of the Detroit Council of Organizations and pastor of the Chapel Hill Baptist Church. "I once asked a TV reporter why we only saw him around the neighborhood when there was violence. He said, 'Reverend, I'm sorry to have to say it, but bad news is good news.' It does, in fact, seem to be what white audiences want and expect. And it's the sort of news which keeps the TV reporters in business."

"If a black man steals, rapes, or kills, the story gets top coverage. But the duller—and more important stories usually aren't good enough for TV. They're not exciting or visual. Somehow, society will have to use its influence to change this—soon."

Detroit's TV stations have, however, demonstrated a readiness, when called upon, to help foster good order and discipline. All of them gave free  $\rightarrow$

prime time to Mayor Cavanagh last March 6 for an appeal to Detroiters to stop buying guns. They did it again on April 18 when the New Detroit Committee—a group formed by the mayor and Gov. George Romney after last July's riots—released its report on the causes of the city's disharmony.

But many activists continue to express bleak views on TV's treatment of Negroes. One of them is Dr. Karl T. Gregory, an economist at Wayne State University in Detroit and a frequent spokesman for black causes in that area. The mass media of television, radio and newspapers become "vehicles for preserving the status quo," says Gregory. "They propagandize for existing bureaucracies and thus preclude social change."

The reality of ghetto life projected by television is "not representative," and is even "farcical" at times, Gregory maintains. "White reporters have their own social habits. Through existing social arrangements, they have a set of contacts among black people whom they depend upon for information and interpretation. They go to these 'authentic' sources for interviews and get these people to say what they want them to say. Meanwhile, everybody in the black community is laughing."

However, says Gregory, the very fact that these Negro "spokesmen" are known at all to reporters of the mass media is a fair indication that they're not the leaders genuinely influential with the ghetto-dwellers.

A dramatization of that fact may be contained in the following incident. Three times in a single day of interviewing, this reporter was warned about a local Detroit character who had come to the city and purposefully set himself up as a Negro spokesman by the simple means of having stationery printed indicating himself as "chairman" of a high-sounding and largely nonexistent civic committee, and volunteering opinions to any press people who would listen.

"He's a pleasant guy," said one Negro informant, "an amiable and harmless charlatan, and something of a publicity-seeker. But he represents absolutely nobody but himself." That same evening, on two separate television newcasts, that same would-be spokesman was quoted respectfully and at length by the anchor men on an important issue relating to Negro aspirations.

Gregory also claims that television as presently constituted is a "racist apparatus." His special scorn is reserved TV "scandalmongers" for among reporters, and interview-show emcees, who "cater to the worst instincts in the white community" by bringing together on the same program militant whites and blacks and then simply standing aside while they claw at each other in a rancorously unpleasant display having more value for the station's ratings than for the cause of civil rights.

Some of these grievances were, in fact, noted in the recently released Report of the National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders (called the Kerner Commission report after its chairman, Gov. Otto Kerner of Illinois), which President Johnson constituted last year to get some answers about why the summer of 1967 was so riotous.

Television is the news source most relied upon in the ghetto, according to the Commission (which did its work in Detroit and 14 other cities). It quoted a study which indicated that 75 percent of ghetto-dwellers turned to television for national and international news, and that 86 percent regularly watched television from 5 to 7 P.M.—the dinner-hour news period. It also noted that 87.7 percent of nonwhite households own television sets.

In view of this overwhelming de-  $\rightarrow$

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pendence upon TV by ghetto-dwellers, the Commission regretted that broadcast news (and newspapers as well) had "failed to analyze and report adequately on racial problems in the United States and, as a related matter, to meet the Negro's legitimate expectations in journalism."

The news organizations also have "failed to communicate to both their black and white audiences a sense of the problems America faces and the sources of potential solutions. The media report and write from the standpoint of a white man's world. The ills of the ghetto, the difficulties of life there, the Negro's burning sense of grievance, are seldom conveyed."

The white press, said the Commission, repeatedly although perhaps unconsciously reflects the biases and paternalism—and at times the indifference—of white America: a condition which is understandable but not excusable, since news agencies "have the mission to inform and educate the whole of our society."

The Commission's strongest words on the matter are these: "The world that television and newspapers offer to their black audience is almost totally white, in both appearance and attitude. . . [The white press] is at best mistrusted and at worst held in contempt by many black Americans. Far too often, the press acts and talks about Negroes as if Negroes do not read the newspapers or watch television, give birth, marry, die, or go to PTA meetings."

The percipience of the Kerner report's findings is confirmed by a number of knowledgeable whites in the Detroit area, among them Richard Marks, who is secretary-director of the City's Commission on Community Relations and so vocal a partisan that he has been hanged and burned in effigy in downtown Detroit by white extremists.

Marks says that television news is

an easy mark for any activist—white or black—who has 1) a propaganda idea, 2) a mimeograph machine and 3) a good media sense. Into that category he places a Detroit organization called Breakthrough, which saw fit recently to disrupt a civil-rights rally at Ford Auditorium conducted by Father James Groppi, the angry young Catholic priest who has led many activist protests in the Midwest.

Marks claims that the local television stations gave only a fraction of a minute of air time to Groppi's speech and many times that amount to Breakthrough's disruptive tactics. News judgments like that are commonplace, not only in Detroit but elsewhere, he says.

**TV** stations have three basic, stereotype Negro news stories, according to Marks: 1) the 101-year-old ex-slave interview, which he lumps in with other "tinker-toy" nonevents, such as coverage of Boy Scout meetings; 2) interviews with flashy and vocal but essentially unimportant ghetto characters ("They've always loved Prophet Jones," Marks says, referring to a Detroit preacher famed for his theatricality); and 3) the riot, arson and looting story.

"As a result, the Negro community has no respect for this medium," Marks claims. "A hundred separatists have a meeting and it gets plenty of local coverage, because these fellows are sophisticated propagandists. The fault is somewhere in those news departments."

There's no need to manufacture black leaders for the cameras, Marks says, because the real ones are there, but many TV people "don't have the right kind of seeing-eye dogs to find them—a savvy Negro cameraman, perhaps, who could steer them off phony stories and onto solid ones."

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

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

Sharp, one-time ad designer, one-time cartoonist, one-time scriptwriter (Oh. Susanna, The Donna Reed Show and others) and now story consultant for The Wild Wild West. Sharp sketches the preliminaries of the designs (inexplicably numbering every sketch "fig. 37"), and it is from these sketches that the final thing is modeled. The concept and sketch is given to a writer and he writes a story around it-an unorthodox procedure which is a bit like thinking up a baby and then building a family-mother, father, grandparents and siblings-around the infant. (This method inevitably vexes the writers, who have to tailor their plots to some crazy machine; but. writers being the sunny group they are, one can be assured they don't mind.)

Among these doom machines (in sketch), on page 12, are the predecessor of the bazooka, an explosive arrow propelled by a telescopicsighted bow; a "prototype of the modern torpedo," which sports a dragon's head (the better to scare you with); an armored robot-knight in which the evil and diminutive Dr. Loveless (played by Michael Dunn) traipses about; and "Amorous Amanda"-gigantic hands which clutch James West (Robert Conrad) and threaten to thrust him into a ghastly electric furnace. (Sound a bit like "Dr. No," or maybe "Goldfinger"?)

The pictures on page 13 illustrate pretty well how one of these strange gadgets evolves. Top left is the initial schematism for a condor-shaped cannon, wings fully outstretched and looking very ornate and thoroughly Victorian Gothic. This concept appeared to be somewhat too much, both visually and financially, so they altered it to the simpler, more streamlined shape seen in the second drawing. And finally, as seen in the bottom picture, the monstrous metal beastie as it appeared in an episode of The Wild Wild West. END





#### After buying shares in a British station, Richard springs some programming ideas

Richard Burton loves Elizabeth Taylor, and even if he didn't say so over and over again in public, it would be obvious to anyone seeing them together. Like any doting husband he enjoys giving his wife supporting evidence of this affection on birthdays and special occasions—a 675,000 jet plane one year, a 100,000 diamond ring the next; or renting a yacht for 50,000 as a floating kennel on the river Thames to save her dogs from English quarantine.

Like any husband? Well, let's put it this way: like any husband who shares what might well be the biggest annual joint income on earth. The Woman Who Has Everything doesn't really exist, but the way Burton is going, Miss Taylor may be the first to hold the title. Last summer he filled in one of the remaining gaps by buying her an interest in Harlech Television, the company which holds TV rights for Wales and the West of England.

"A television station!" exclaimed Miss Taylor in what-will-he-do-next tones. "That's all we need."

These "His" and "Hers" seats on the board of directors cost Burton about \$200,000, and although he insisted he was more interested in better programs for his native Wales than in profits, so rich are the rewards for TV financiers in socialist Britain that the investment doubled in value even before the station opened.

To be fair, there is no question that the Burton motives are primarily artistic and patriotic. Like all Welshmen, Burton is fiercely devoted to the land where he was born, one of 13 children of a poor coal-mining family. Miss Taylor is fiercely devoted to Burton, and since this is something he wants, it overrides her resistance to more appearances on TV.

So Burton has big plans for the shows he wants to do. Miss Taylor has big plans for the programs she wants to do. Lord Harlech, good friend of Jackie Kennedy and head of the station, has big plans for selling the re-

sults to the American networks.

In Britain, station owners on the commercial chain have to reapply for licenses every few years. Renewal was thought to be automatic, but Harlech-TV decided to challenge the regional monopoly given Lord Derby's company (the old owner) in the belief its weak drama programs would tell against it. While the Independent Television Authority was mulling its decision, someone at Harlech got the idea its own chances would soar if it could enlist two of the greatest names on stage and screen.

Emissaries were dispatched to the French Riviera, and Burton and Miss Taylor agreed. Harlech got the contract. Lord Derby thought its loss "absolutely disgraceful."

One can hardly see the network turning down a Burton and/or Taylor program. That is, if and when they find the time to do one. Burton, in the fine flow of Welsh fluency that makes one wonder why he bothers with scriptwriters, mentioned a number of projects in his dressing room at MGM's Elstree Studios outside London. But financial advisors on the sidelines shook dolorous heads like a Greek chorus. Film commitments (and *each* of the pair gets about \$1 million per picture) are stacked up for a year or two ahead.

"We'll find the time," Burton declared, limping around the room in the uniform of a Nazi officer and denouncing the doctor who had diagnosed a bruised tendon as gout. He plays a British officer in disguise in "Where Eagles Dare."

Out of the verbiage and the gathering tension—scouts reported Elizabeth was approaching from London in a white Rolls-Royce to cut her 36th birthday cake—it developed that three ideas are crystallizing into programs.

One of these will be a TV film, feature length, of "The Keep," a play by the Welsh writer Gwyn Thomas.

"I've never played a Welshman before," Burton said, "and I like the idea of playing one of my own. It's a very funny show, a comedy, a tragedy, with the same general feeling of demoniacal brilliance as 'Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?' We're making it for Harlech, but we will see if we can sell it to anyone else."  $\rightarrow$

This last was said with becoming modesty. Paramount's fleetfooted executives reportedly had already panted up with the financing, a short head in front of the rest of the industry.

"I'll also do the commentary on the investiture of the Prince of Wales at Caernarvon Castle in Wales in the summer of 1969. It's a tremendous ceremony, sort of a coronation. Queen Elizabeth presents her son Charles to the people of Wales as their prince in the castle's splendid ruins (where King Edward II presented his son as the first Prince of Wales in 1301).

"Elizabeth is going to do a life story in depth, or some such thing," Burton continued. A Harlech official later amplified this throwaway line into one of the more exciting TV possibilities of the year—Miss Taylor reliving her own extraordinary professional and social career on television in news and feature-film clips, with her own frank commentary.

Burton topped up his morning drink and said that was all he was going to reveal of his specific plans.

But he owns a Dylan Thomas manuscript which he thinks would make a good half-hour TV play and he will use his influence to attract international stars to Harlech—Sammy Davis Jr., Sir Laurence Olivier, Sir John Gielgud and the like, and through them encourage Welsh talent.

"I don't see much television myself," he said. "I'm rarely in a place where I can watch it. What I have seen is not very good, though I like sports and old films in which I can see my friends when young. Elizabeth watches a great deal and the kids would too, except that I impose a strict limit."

Looking back over his own TV career, Burton said it was astonishing how outspoken dialog had become.

"Ten years ago I did John Osborne's play 'A Subject of Scandal and Concern.' It was a bit strong for TV then but not now. Oh, not now! I've never heard such language as on the BBC the other night." The thought drove him to more strong drink.

"I played in a number of American specials. One of them was 'Anna Christie' for, I think, Playhouse 90. It wasn't very good, rather hastily thrown together, and it was live. I can't bear to see a live program. I can't bear to see the eyes of the actors when they dry up. I had to pick up a chair and smash it. I played a raving, mad Irishman and I was supposed to smash it in my fury. But one of the props had forgotten to put the breakaway chair there." He hacked at the air with his arms. "Did you ever try to break a real chair while speaking lines? It only chipped away bit by bit but I kept flailing away till it shattered. It's a good thing I'm strong." [Burton also was heard as the voice of Churchill on Winston Churchill-The Valiant Years. a widely seen documentary.-Ep.1

One of the Greek chorus offered the news that the Burton-Taylor film of "Taming of the Shrew" had already grossed \$13 million. Burton was exultant. Did that mean they might do a Shakespeare play for Harlech?

"Culture on TV?" he asked, surprised. "I'd have to think about that."

Before he limped off to greet his wife, Burton related a domestic vignette. They had waited up till midnight to toast her birthday, but in the midst of the cozy little celebration Miss Taylor had suddenly demanded he swear again that he had really sent her a bouquet on her 30th birthday—six years earlier. She had received a bouquet, but it bore no name.

And away he went muttering about the illogicality of woman. The ravishing Miss Taylor said later that she would talk about anything but television, which is also pretty illogical for a director of Harlech Television Ltd.

There may be some interesting silences in the board room.

# **Emmy Awards Come Under Attack**

It was Emmy Night again, and the fans ate it up. After all, wasn't it just like being there, seeing the Big Stars live-live, all dressed up fit to be rewarded, traipsing up to snatch those glittering mantel pieces and saying their very own lines? There was Lucy Ball, all weepy and cooing "I love you!" and Frankie Sinatra with his hair razored and combed forward. And Dick Smothers sporting a bushy upper lip. It was plain to see the Hollywood bunch was having a ball, just as Greg Garrison, Dino Martin's producer, planned it. But that was only half the picture, and the other half certainly was a different kettle of fish, being fried at the New York end of the 110-minute clambake. Old-pro Dick Van Dyke's emcee gags died. Art Carney, unaccountably split-screened with Pat Paulsen in Hollywood, obviously didn't know what the jig was. Melvvn Douglas, accepting a top dramatic award, mocked the Hollywood gush by proclaiming his indebtedness to God, his mother and President Johnson. But worst of all by far, the winners of 18 news and documentary awards, all in New York, got dismissed with quick stand-up shots at their dinner tables, if that. Dismayed and disheartened, the TV news contingents could hardly believe what they saw: In a year in which TV had ably covered the Vietnam war and the country's racial agonies, and offered scores of noteworthy insights into real life ranging from ABC's evening-long "Africa" and CBS's

hard-hitting Warren Report inquiry, to the PBL experiments and NET's stepped-up networking, the Emmycast could kiss these off but find time for a Don Rickles routine and film clips of variety-show nominees, with Dean Martin well represented. "Where," ABC News chief Elmer Lower wondered in rage, "is the TV Academy's sense of values?"

The Academy's "very unhappy" operating head, Peter Cott, blamed Garrison, claiming the producer insisted on staging a big entertainment and felt viewers cared little about news awards. NBC News president William R. McAndrew, "deeply disappointed and embarrassed" by what happened, said he'd urge the Academy next year to give the news awards a show of their own. ABC's Lower and CBS News boss Dick Salant left no doubt they were determined to avoid a repetition of this put down, even if it means, as one TV newsman suggested, "getting the hell out of the Emmys." A high CBS executive, reminded that his network will carry the 1969 Emmys under a rotation plan, lamented the awards in general as "contributing little to creativity and freshness in the medium" because a Hallmark warm-over of "Elizabeth the Queen" got top dramatic honors over original CBS Playhouse productions. But he felt that "We'll just have to try again to make the Emmys better. They're the only ball game in town."

# THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

THAT TOUCH OF MINK (NBC), Saturday WALK ON THE WILD SIDE (ABC), Sunday BUS RILEY'S BACK IN TOWN (NBC), Tuesday PORTRAIT OF A MOBSTER (CBS), Thursday I COULD GO ON SINGING (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

f some Swiftian satirist decided to epitomize the worst of commercial movie-making, he'd probably wind up with a network-movie week like this one. Actually he'd have to go Hollywood one better since the week also boasts a rerun of the TV version of "Laura," as cruel a travesty of one of Hollywood's better films as ever fell into the hands of a pretentious rewriter (Truman Capote), an obviously embarrassed supporting cast of pros and a thoroughly inept would-be star (Lee Bouvier).

The worst is highlighted by a couple of items which, interestingly enough, a number of you doubters out there told me you had refused to believe could be as bad as my first-timearound reviews had indicated; they were, you reported after watching for yourselves, worse. These goodies are "Walk on the Wild Side," an infantile venture into the sordid side of pseudolife, with a Texas farmer and a brothel-keeper vying for the heart (pure gold, naturlich) of a prostitute, and "Bus Riley's Back in Town," a tale of a poor li'l Navy vet who returns to Midwest, U.S.A., to find his truelove married to a millionaire and his atsell vacuum cleaners tempts to thwarted because the housewives prefer him to his wares. That the first involves Laurence Harvey vying with Barbara Stanwyck for Capucine or the second has Michael Parks doing imitations of Brando and James Dean (unofficially, of course) is hardly worth noting. Saul Bass's titles for "Wild Side" are.

The compleat parody of the gangster film is "Portrait of a Mobster." Its stars are the Tommy gun, the bootleg whisky and the black sedan, despite the fact that semi-human characters labeled Legs Diamond, Dutch Schultz, "Mad Dog" Coll, etc. wander through the plot.

For the stereotype of the rich (i.e. "unreal") life, let alone eternal virginity, there's "That Touch of Mink," which you can go right ahead and get mixed up with "Pillow Talk" and "Lover Come Back" because the same unsullied Doris Day is right in there. mugging and fluttering and being unemployed in a style to which the very well employed among us might well daydream about. Only switch is that this time it's Cary Grant who doesn't sully her. But don't let it throw you: Gig Young's still around as a secondbanana and scriptwriter Stanley Shapiro's there for all the gaggery about will-she won't-she should-she (and who-gives-a-damn?).

And finally, there's a touch of sadness to "I Could Go On Singing," not because it's a supersentimental and interminable reheating of the old "Madame X" hash but because Judy Garland is stuck in the middle of it. For her fans at least there are four Palladium appearances to show, despite mediocre material, the mystique of this fine performer. For the rest, including co-star Dirk Bogarde, it's super-sturm, drang and glup.

Lord Louis Mountbatten: "For every soldier that died at Dieppe, 10 were saved on D-Day."

SPECIAL COLOR On Aug. 19, 1942, 6000 Canadian, American and British soldiers stormed the French port of Dieppe. The Nazis were ready. More than half of the assault force was cut down, and the Dieppe Raid was a bloody failure.

This chronicle of the first major Allied attack against Festung Europa—Fortress Europe—focuses on fatal blunders and their costly but well-remembered lessons. As Churchill said: "Honor to the brave that fell. Their sacrifice was not in vain." The tragedy of Dieppe ultimately became the triumph of Allied arms on the beaches of Normandy.

# **A Thousand Sunday Nights**

Revealing stories about Ed Sullivan, the man everyone knew couldn't succeed on television



If critics could kill, Ed Sullivan would be a corpse. In 1948 television writers laughed at his appearance and personality, predicting he would never be a polished host and he couldn't last out the year. They were partially correct. The unsmiling Irishman has had the last laugh, but his lack of smoothness still inspires caricature. Today the awkward introduction is a trade-mark, and people react with warmth and not irritation to the most unintentionally hilarious ad-libs on television.

"Ed Sullivan has introduced me as Jack Carson, John Crater, John Kerr and Carson McCullers," Jack Carter said. "Now I have my contracts with him made out 'to whom it may concern.'"

There was the time he said: "Let's hear it for the Lord's Prayer" after Sergio Franchi sang it on the 1965 Christmas show. He introduced Roberta Sherwood as Roberta Peters, New Zealand natives became "the fierce Maori tribe from New England," and a word on behalf of the tuberculosis drive ended up as "Good night and help stamp out TV." When his producer and son-in-law Bob Precht

Excerpts from the book 'Always on Sunday,' published this week by Meredith Press, © 1968 by Michael David Harris. went home sick one Sunday afternoon, Sullivan extended on the air get-well wishes to his "producer, Bob Hope." He presented "Eileen O'Farrell of the Met" and "the Samoans from Samoa" and said, "I'd like to prevent Robert Merrill." A very much alive composer became the late Irving Berlin; Walter Winchell was a "sports star," and clarinetist Benny Goodman a "trumpeter." He has introduced Robert Goulet so many times as a Canadian that few people besides Goulet himself are aware that the  $\rightarrow$

singer was born in Massachusetts. He presented the Supremes with a lengthy and flattering description of their abilities, but after he finished the introduction and brought them on camera, he forgot the group's name. "Here are the girls," he said.

When Michigan State won the Big Ten championship and Sullivan had the team on his stage, he kept referring to the school as the University of Michigan. They did not correct him. The football players went home and sent Sullivan a huge birthday cake, and on it his name was misspelled.

Sullivan called over Jack Jones at rehearsal and asked, "Wasn't Allan Jones your father?" "He still is," the singer replied. The line got a big laugh from the studio audience and the host told Jones he wanted to keep it in the show. At night he asked, "Is your father still alive?"

Sullivan and Richard Hearne spent a Saturday afternoon rehearsing an introduction to the comedian's famous "passing-out ceremony." In the script, Hearne explains that he's performed it 19 times on the show and would like to try something new, the conjurer's routine. This is Sullivan's cue to persuade the comic to do the old sketch one more time because it's still funny. On the air, when Hearne proposed the conjurer's routine, Sullivan replied, "Fine, Dick. Go ahead. Let's see it."

He came downstairs from his dressing room on the night of a live show in June 1967. It was a quarter of, and he wanted to know why Robert Goulet, who was opening the program, was not backstage and ready to go on. A staff member explained to Sullivan that he had misread his watch and it was quarter to 7, not quarter to 8.

It is ironic that a man who is unaware of the correct hour has known exactly what time it is for two decades. His mistakes on camera may make him appear foolish, but underneath the facade lies a shrewd and serious showman. His is the most unusual success story in the history of a very unusual medium, the spectacle of the loser<sup>\*</sup> who wins every week.

This Sunday (June 2) Sullivan celebrates the 20th anniversary of his television show. In 1951, as he looked back over his first three seasons on the air, he said: "If I had to name just a few top headliners who were responsible for the biggest moments in our show's history, the list would include Sheila Bond, Billy De Wolfe, Gene Raymond, Johnny Johnston and Bill Tabbert."

Today the list has undergone some changes and other highlights stand out in Sullivan's mind. They are the memorable moments he talks about when he reminisces about his television career.

The name of Bob Hope has been prominent on every list of Ed Sullivan's, from 1948 to the present. On Sept. 26, 1948, the comedian made his television debut under unusual circumstances. Earlier in the year comic Al Bernie had agreed to fill in at the last minute when Louis Jordan and his Tympany Five were delayed in traffic coming from Harlem's Apollo Theater. Sullivan was so appreciative that he promised Bernie another appearance on an evening when his would be the sole comedy spot and he could be presented to the best advantage.

"On the Friday night preceding Bernie's appearance, I was master of ceremonies at a benefit show at Madison Square Garden. Bob Hope, who was on the bill, said he was very anxious to watch a TV show. 'Tell you what, Ed,' said Hope. 'I've got to go to a West Point dinner at the Waldorf Sunday night and then rush to La Guardia Airport and catch a plane to the Coast. On the way to the airport, if the time schedule works out, I may get a chance to drop in and catch your show.'"

On Sunday night, just before Al Bernie was to go on, the audience suddenly applauded, whistled and stood up. Bob Hope was at the head of the center aisle in the theater, bowing and waving to the people. He walked up to the stage and talked to Sullivan, and the audience went wild. This was Bob Hope's television debut and "in those days a movie star in a TV theater was page-one news."

"How much time do you want me to do?" Hope asked the host quietly.

"Get off." Sullivan whispered. "Al Bernie is on next."

Hope joked with the audience. "How do you like this. I am here on the cuff and Sullivan tells me to get off the stage. That's gratitude."

But Hope understood the situation and worked quickly and expertly. He called up Jerry Colonna and Tony Romano of his company for fast bows. and then left the stage to make room for Bernie.

Sullivan had the dancing chorus come on next so Bernie wouldn't have to do his routine immediately after Hope. Ray Bloch went into finale music, and the Toastettes did a twominute number. Then Sullivan introduced Bernie. When the young comic reached center stage, he said, "This is the kind of spot you wouldn't even give a leopard."

"With real courage the kid made a big hit." Sullivan said.

The singing debut of Margaret Truman, made while she was the daughter of the President, provided one of the most exasperating but eventually rewarding moments. Sullivan had been trying to book Miss Truman on the show for one year without success. Then he signed singer Mimi Benzell.

"Our greatest ads are the artists who appear on our show. One performer always leads to another."

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told Miss Truman about it. Next thing Sullivan knew, he was having lunch with Margaret and her manager James Davidson. Ed was certain she would agree only to an interview and was surprised when she asked, "Could I sing on your show?"

The day she appeared was a unique one in the history of the television theater. Secret Service men swarmed through the studio and set up rigid security precautions. "I thought to myself, this is like cops and robbers. It's so silly." Sullivan was frisked by the Secret Service and then later evicted from his own dressing room, which was turned over to Miss Truman for security reasons. The Secret Service then decided that the alley downstairs was potentially perilous to the singer and asked Sullivan to trade rooms with her again.

"When they prowled my room downstairs, discussing whether the fire escape leading to the upstairs dressing room was a potential assassin's route, I couldn't wait for that silly business to be over. But a few weeks later armed fanatics tried to kill President Truman at Blair House in Washington, and I realized it was I who had been foolish."

Margaret Truman was to be paid \$2000 for each of two appearances, but she was such a big hit on the first program that Sullivan called Jim Davidson afterward and raised the fee for the second show to \$3000.

The television audience included the singer's parents, her maternal grandmother and the family cook, all of whom watched from Blair House. For Sullivan the high spot of the evening was President Truman's telephone call to the studio to congratulate his daughter. He then asked to speak to the host and said he was delighted with the way his daughter had been presented. Sullivan had given her a simple introduction instead of a flowery speech and did not mention she was the President's daughter.

One of Sullivan's favorites, as a person and a performer, was the late Charles Laughton, whom the host describes as "a lamb in ogre's clothing." Laughton appeared in 1949 and suggested that he read from the scriptures. "I suppose it would be too much to expect that this benighted, hapless, puerile, infant television, this graveyard of talent, would risk my reading from the Bible."

Sullivan was not only delighted by the idea but insisted that Laughton direct the sequence himself. It was so successful that it resulted in a nationwide Bible-reading tour for the actor.

"Charles always played the part of Captain Bligh off screen as well as on, often to cover his concern for people," Sullivan says.

When the host told Laughton that Frank Fontaine, who was booked for the same show, planned to do a comic imitation of him, Laughton became bombastic.

"What! Do you mean to say you have engaged this sniveling lad to impersonate me! I forbid it, I tell you! I have, I assure you, been sufficiently humiliated on this program already. All those blithering, idiotic, half-baked comedians do the same thing—'See here, Mr. Christian!' I am sick unto death of it. I tell you, Ed if he goes on, I don't."

Sullivan knew Laughton well enough not to take his ultimatum seriously and persuaded the actor to at least listen. After the comic spoke his first few lines at the rehearsal, Laughton rushed onstage and interrupted. "Enough of this impertinence! Stop, I say!" Fontaine was shaken and Sullivan prepared to apologize to both of them. Laughton halted the host with a gesture, turned to Fontaine and bellowed, "Not like that, young man! Like this!"

"And he proceeded painstakingly to coach Frank in how to mimic Charles Laughton to perfection. Then he turned back to me. 'Ed,' he said, 'when Frank finishes his imitation of me, I'll come bellowing out like a wounded bull elephant and chase him off the stage. That way we may be able to milk another laugh.' He did exactly that in one of the funniest scenes I have ever witnessed."

Sullivan considers the Josh Logan story on May 17, 1953 as his single most important program because of its tremendous impact on the public attitude toward mental illness. The Logan story was a biography show that offered highlights from the career of the author-director.

"In the weeks preceding the show, when I visited Logan's apartment, it became apparent that Josh was becoming more and more apprehensive about an hour TV show which would recite his stage triumphs. 'I dread the thought of one of those And-Then-I-Wrote sagas,' Josh told me."

Logan preferred doing something that would be of more value to the country. He wanted to talk about his own mental breakdown and his stay in a sanitarium and to tell the audience that breakdowns can be cured. Apparently friends and relatives advised him to steer away from the subject on the television program. It was an unhappy episode in his life, and everyone he knew wanted him to forget about it and not bring the problem into the Nation's living rooms.

In the middle of the program Logan was standing backstage next to Sullivan, who asked casually, "How do you like it, Josh?"

Sullivan was amazed when Logan said, "It's horrible. The production is fine, Ed. It's just that all this talk about my success is hollow. I should have gone through with my determination to give a message to the country about mental health. That would have been important."

Logan's voice was intense and em-

barrassed. "Do you want to do it now?" the host asked.

"I'd love to."

From backstage Sullivan telephoned Ray Bloch and asked him to cut the music at the first possible spot. Moments later the curtain closed and Sullivan stepped in front of the cameras. "Ladies and gentlemen, here is Pulitzer Prize-winner Josh Logan."

Logan took over the stage and addressed the television audience. "This has been gratifying to my ego, but it's not important. As it happens, I do have one important thing to tell the country, and I'll tell it quickly. I never got any of the awards I've won until I'd been committed to a mental hospital and released from it. I tell you this because the world is suffering from tension, with the result that many people are crippled by mental breakdowns. The old way of treating them was to hide them in the garden house when people came to visit in warm weather, or lock them up in the attic in winter. You don't have to do either any more. A lot of people who are disturbed mentally can be cured, just as typhoid, scarlet fever and tuberculosis can be cured. There is no reason why they should go through life bearing a stigma because they have once been mental patients. The proudest memory of my life is that although I had been in the theater a good many years, I never won the Pulitzer Prize until after I had been in the sanitarium."

When he finished there was a hush in the theater and then a tremendous burst of applause. "People who were watching Logan's face on their screen at home could see that this was no phony plant. The audience realized that this famous Broadwayite had stripped himself of all pride to tell them something that might help others.

"As far as I'm concerned, it was the all-time big moment on the show," Sullivan says.

Hors d'oeuvres need not be those slivers of bread overdecorated and dull tasting. Mexico's food is spicy, satisfying and colorful. Guacamole, the filling for the tacos and the empanadas can be prepared ahead and chilled. The empanadas should be baked at the last minute and served hot. The filling of the tacos should be spooned into the tortillas and fried just before serving time.

#### GUACAMOLE Serves 6

3 soft ripe avocados 2 large ripe tomatoes, chopped 1 small onion, minced 1 small green pepper, chopped 1/2 cup lemon juice 1% tsp. salt Hot pepper sauce or Tabasco to taste

Peel avocados. Cut into halves lengthwise, remove seed and press through a food mill or sieve. Combine with remaining ingredients adding hot pepper sauce to taste. Cover tightly (air will cause avocado to turn dark); refrigerate until ready to serve. Serve garnished with chopped tomato and green pepper. Can be served with tostadas for dipping. To prepare the tostadas, cut tortillas into quarters and fry in shallow oil or shortening until richly browned and crisp, about 2 minutes. Drain on absorbent paper.

#### TUNA EMPANADAS (not pictured).

Makes 15 turnovers 1 can (7 ozs.) solid-pack tuna, drained 2 hard-cooked eggs, sieved 2 tbsp. frozen chopped chives Heavy cream Salt and pepper

21/2 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine 1 egg, well beaten 1/2 cup ice water

Flake tuna finely and mix with egg, chives and enough heavy cream to make a thick paste. Mix flour with 1 teaspoon salt. Cut in butter until particles are very fine. Add egg and ice water and stir until dough cleans the bowl. Knead into a smooth ball. Cut dough into 15 pieces. Roll out each piece on a lightly floured board to a 4-inch circle. Top each circle with a spoon of filling. Moisten edges with water and fold over, enclosing filling. Press edges together with the tines of a fork. Prick top. Place on a cooky sheet. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (375° F.) for 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Empanadas can also be fried in deep fat, if desired, at 360° F, for 3 to 4 minutes. Fill and shape empanadas and chill. Cook when just ready to serve.

## TACOS CON CARNE

- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 1 lb. ground beef, lean and ground twice
- 1 can (1 lb.) kidney or pink beans. drained and mashed

1 can (8 ozs.) tomato sauce

1 tbsp. chili powder

Salt and pepper

- 1 package (9 ozs., 12 tortillas) frozen tortillas
- 1 small head iceberg lettuce, shredded
- 1/4 cup bottled French dressing
- 2 large tomatoes, cut into thin slices, each slice cut into halves

Heat olive oil and saute onion until golden. Add meat and saute until meat becomes brown. Stir in mashed beans, tomato sauce, chili powder, salt and pepper to taste. Heat until sauce is thick. Cool. When ready to serve, heat tortillas in their plastic bag in boiling water until they are soft and pliable. Unwrap and spread filling in a mound down the center of each tortilla. Fold tortilla in half, enclosing the filling. Fasten top with a toothpick. Fry in shallow fat or oil until brown and crisp on both sides. Drain on absorbent paper. Mix lettuce and salad dressing. Open taco slightly and fill with 2 half tomato slices and shredded lettuce. Serve at once.

Dick Cavett chats with (I.-r.) singer Angeline Butler, critic Cleveland Amory and comedienne Joan Rivers.



"I adore Garbo," says the slender young man, in a confidential voice. "I followed her once. I got tired of being the only person who'd never seen Garbo on the street. So I went to her neighborhood one day. And bang!" his eyes widen with suppressed excitement—"there was Garbo coming right at me. It was a great sighting. She didn't have her glasses on. And it was just—well, it was Garbo! She looked right at me. I had to catch my breath"—he gasps—"then she walked past. And I thought, 'It's over. I've seen Garbo. What's left in life?"

"So I followed her. She went into a grocery store"—his voice drops, becomes tense—"and I got this *urge*. I thought, 'I've got to have contact with her.' So I went in. She was picking up artichokes. So I grabbed one, and I said, 'Is this an artichoke or an avocado?' And Garbo *laughed*. To this day, when I hear the word 'artichoke,' I get goose pimples"—a sad, vulnerable smile—"and I like to think that when *she* hears it, she thinks of *me*."

This story is actually several yards longer. An embroidered tissue of yearning detail has been removed. But the cut version still gives you a good idea of how Dick Cavett is inclined to carry on. He's one of the most engaging chatterers in New York City and, as such, is presiding over the new Dick Cavett Show, ABC's daytime talk-show entry.

Dick Cavett, in fact, is a born talkshow host, which is to say a fusion of comic, rattle, raconteur and interreactor with people. He's a Nebraskaborn 31-year-old who looks 25. He's slender, with a pale, muted yet mobile face—his base expression being something between that of an expectant terrier and an unnerved second son of a Gothic romance.

He went to Yale drama school, put



# AFTER HE SAW GARBO...

Dick Cavett wondered what was left in life; his new TV show is providing an answer

in some time as an actor, shoved an original two-page monolog under Jack Paar's nose, was promptly hired by Paar as a comedy writer, and has since ghosted many of the words that have flowed from the mouths of such folks as Groucho Marx, Jack E. Leonard, Jack Carter, Merv Griffin, Soupy Sales, Sam Levenson, Mort Sahl, Jerry Lewis and Johnny Carson. About three years ago he started writing for himself, showed up on the Carson and Griffin stages, starred in two ABC specials—and is now permanently out in front, a performer in his own right.

About his show he says, "There's nothing new about our format. It's the classic talk-show format—chairs in a semicircle. Everytime they start one of these shows, they say, 'We're going to get rapped for looking like *The Tonight Show*.' So they try to put people in baskets or hammocks or something. But they always end up

with the same old chairs in a circle, because it's the easiest to shoot. If there's a real difference' between this show and the others, I guess *I'm* the difference."

He is the difference, but it's a little tricky to describe. Dick himself is puzzled about it. "What are you, I ask myself. I can't describe what I am. I can tell you the main things I admire about other emcees—Bishop's believability, Carson's class, Griffin's energy, and Paar's . . . dangerousness; with Paar, you sense that in the next second something will happen to startle you, to shock you. But me? People say I come across as wry, subtle, Ivy League, Midwestern. Sometimes I worry about it. I don't have any image of myself."

One could add a few more adjectives to the descriptive list: He's also low-key, cultivated, diffident, fey, rueful, twinkling, relaxed, etc. But  $\rightarrow$

a list doesn't capture the unique Cavett flavor. His "image" is actually a mobile: It's generated by a kaleidoscope of subtly switching responses to situations and people.

For instance, on one show, Dick's guests included magazine writer Rex Reed—there to gossip about celebrities; Melina Mercouri—there to champion a free Greece; and Jani Gardner—there to plug a little non-book called "365 Ways to Say 'I Love You.'" And with each, Dick was a subtly different man.

With Rex, a puffy Kewpie doll of a youth with a bee-stung nose, Dick was both provocateur and evasive cop. As Reed began hinting at some of the gamier peccadillos of Hollywood notables, Cavett's eyes widened in a blank stare of incomprehension, and he swiveled, like a trained society hostess, to another subject. Reed continued, coasting ever closer to slander. Cavett bit his lip, sucked in his cheeks, giving himself a look of skeletal purity, and finally asked, "What's your favorite color?"

With Melina Mercouri, who showed up looking tired, her blonde hair flying, her husky voice impassioned as she protested U.S. recognition of the Greek dictatorship, Dick was respectful and serious.

And with Jani Gardner, a cloyingly cute young lady who advocates such male love play as planting 40 blownup balloons in a girl's Volkswagen— Dick subtly disavowed responsibility for the nonsense. He flipped through the pages of her opus—one eyebrow frozen at a quizzical slant—saying: "I'll just turn here at random to a passage that was marked for me."

In person, Dick is the same as on the air, only a lot more so. He's vivacious, expressive and talkative. His former Yale roommate, Chris Porterfield, now music critic of Time magazine, describes him thus: "He has a quick, lively mind, an eager curiosity in all spheres. And he never loses his quick, light, humorous touch. It's what makes him such good company and his talent stems from that quality. He has a literate form of humor, yet it doesn't become cliquy or ingroup. He'll always be somewhat of an earnest, wholesome, Midwestern kid."

It's a good description. Almost the first thing one notices about Dick, offscreen as well as on, is his literacy. cultivated vocabulary almost His amounts to a character trait. He staggers into an interview after a day of taping, refuses a drink and collapses into a chair and says, "Even coffee makes me high. One cup. and I hallucinate." He starts a story by saving, "Not too long ago-as geologic time goes . . ." He speculates about the long-ago marriage of critic Edmund Wilson and writer Mary Mc-Carthy, and says, wistfully, "Gee, I bet they had great polysyllabic spats." He complains mildly about the century and says: "I'd have liked the 18th Century, when they started sentences with, 'Sir-I put it to you that . . .' Or the Elizabethan period. I have a badly concealed affection for ribaldry." When asked about his wife, actress Carrie Nye, he grins and says, with Victorian formality: "Her character is beyond reproach."

He also goes in for minute explosions of admiration and wrath. "You know whom I hate? The guy who invented the machine that blows your hands dry. I'd like to get him some day." And: "I'm crazy about fish. I'd rather scuba dive than anything, so I can watch them. I even like looking at them in fish stores."

He glides cheerfully from subject to subject—Oscar Wilde's prose, Olivier's acting, modern philosophy—revealing a complex cultural frame of reference, but avoids any serious expression of opinion. Occasionally one pops out: "I believe in a capricious universe with a limited freedom of choice." Then he looks startled and says, "I'm not usually this intellectual. I'm not reflective at all."

He tends, as a matter of fact, to undercut himself and claims to have several other clay toes. "I'm shy," he says. "It's hard for me to talk to people in a social situation. I can't remember when was the last time I enjoyed myself at a party." He reports that he's under considerable tension in performing: "When I come off from the show, I'm in a daze. There's a lot of anxiety there." And he says he has "a nasty temper."

His close friends challenge his selfproclaimed lack of intellectuality. "He's not scholarly," says Chris Porterfield. "but he's got a good intellect." "He's enormously well-read, and he knows how to use his intelligence." says comedian Woody Allen. They also debate his claim of shyness. Says "There's absolutely nothing Chris: shrinking about him." But both confirm his temper. Woody says: "He definitely has a hasty temper. He gets angry at people who give him a hard time, anyone from a network executive to a cab driver. I guess it's the stupidity or the hostility of the other person that makes him hit the ceiling.'

As one might expect, Cavett claims to have no coherent views about his future: "I've a nonreflective attitude to life. I'm aware of whether it's a nice day or not, and beyond that I don't think ahead. I'm one of these people who wake up in the morning and think, 'What is it exactly that I do? Oh, yes, now I remember.'"

It's an unlikely story, but no matter. Even if he's the male Vera Vague he says he is, his wit, subtlety and schnauzerlike earnestness will keep propelling him in the general direction of increasing fame. He does dimly anticipate making more and more money as the years go by. "If I ever have \$50,000 all at once," he says dreamily, "I'll buy a big bag of popcorn and open two bank accounts."


