

And producers NORMAN FELTON (Dr. Kildare) and IRVING ELMAN are working on another series pilot. It's A Time to Love, an anthology show with some dramatic continuity but no regular characters . . . ANNE BAXTER stars in a ROBERT STACK segment of The Name of the Game series, which makes its debut on NBC this September.



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# as we see it

■ Television spent most of the day Senator Kennedy was shot covering details of the terrible incident and developments at the hospital where he lay dying. That evening the networks went back to their commercials and their prime-time entertainment.

Such as *The Virginian*, in which a bounty hunter set fire to a barn full of horses in an attempt to bring an outlaw into the open. The horses were finally saved. But the battle that ensued resulted in the gunning down of several characters, including the outlaw, against the background of the burning barn and the neighing of terrified horses.

And Run for

And Run for Your Life, in which two punks seized an Army payroll, then shot and killed—in close-up—a motorcycle policeman. They fled to Mexico where they were befriended by Paul Bryan. When the police caught up with them, they shot it out and were slaughtered.

■ There were others, but that's enough to make the point. Violence certainly is a basic element of drama. And we know the argument that "Macbeth" is full of violence too. But that violence is necessary to the plot, not something forced in to titillate the audience.

Magazines, movies and books also are guilty of exploiting bloodshed for its shock value alone, but television is our most popular medium, and its violence has the biggest audience and the greatest impact. We can't prove that witnessing so much fictional violence leads to disrespect for law, for property rights and for human life. But it certainly doesn't encourage respect for those things.

■ We appeal to the networks, which are chiefly responsible, to exercise restraint—even if it does hurt their ratings. We ask them to reduce, or eliminate, unnecessary violence in entertainment shows.

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# GHOST TEACHERS OF TV

An educator's eye-opening revelations for those parents who feel guilty about the time their children spend in front of the set

According to recent surveys, young children devote more time to television entertainment programs than they do to all of their basic subjects in school. Nielsen's figures report that the average American subteenager these days spends approximately 23 hours a week in front of the television set; and any parent can tell you that children are not likely to be tuned in to the educational channel or to one of the "educational" programs offered by commercial stations.

When Johnny is home from school, he wants to be entertained. And, unquestionably, he "digs" the entertainment TV provides.

Some of his teachers are convinced he is also digging his intellectual grave. Some go so far as to contend that democracy itself is in mortal danger from an onslaught of *Batman*, The Monkees, The Beverly Hillbillies and ball games.

Many parents are concerned too. They don't want to deprive their children of the enjoyment television gives them, but they feel guilty about the amount of time their kids are "wasting" on apparently worthless programs.

Worry about how American children use—or abuse—so many of their recreation hours is certainly legitimate. But the truth is, we can't really be certain exactly where time-killing entertainment ends and mind-building education begins. We need to understand the relationship between enjoyment and learning; it is a relationship which too many teachers (and parents) view from too narrow a perspective.

Teachers too often resent having to learn anything that smacks of Madison Avenue or the psychiatric couch. We know very little about the process involved in the acquisition and retention of information. And many of us, regretfully, are disinclined to learn more because we don't appreciate the role the mass media can play—and every moment of the day are playing—in education.

From 1956 to 1966 the National Communications Laboratories conducted a unique study of the mass media. We reached some startling conclusions. We discovered evidence of what we call "ghost teaching"—effective academic three-R's teaching—in operation in some of the least likely places on TV. Efficient ghost teachers were found lurking on cereal box tops, in commercials produced by unsuspecting advertisers, in comedians' frivolous gags—all over the television channels.

In a TV spy series there was a gymnasium door with the word "KA-RATE" printed on it in large capital letters. If a word is prominently displayed and shown repeatedly over a period of time, it becomes an automatic spelling drill. The more often a child sees a difficult word in print, the more likely he is to learn its spelling. I know of a high school student who, perfectly innocently—and logically—once spelled the word "CAROTTY." We can be almost certain that she had not been exposed to that film-set door.

If, every weekday, Mom tunes in the soap opera Love Is a Many Splendored Thing, it is likely that 5-year-old Junior will find it easier to spell "splendored" than "cat" by the time he is 6, if the title is printed in letters

sufficiently large on his TV screen.

Bill Cullen may not look like Janie's private reading tutor, but he may be. Television's quiz-show hosts are among the most valuable members of the medium's ghost faculty. Eye Guess, Concentration and other lightweight games teach spelling, reading and arithmetic.

We need less than a 500-word vocabulary to get along in the world on a normal day. A single episode of the game-show Jeopardy may drill us in more than 400 sight-reading words. As the program's host, Art Fleming, calls out words which appear in prop windows or on signs, he becomes an effective reading teacher for an audience of millions.

If you doubt that TV could program a child's reading from the start, just pay attention to the station-identification announcements and the network blurbs. You can start with ABC, then go on to NBC, then CBS, as the letters flash by. Along with P.D.Q., N.Y.P.D. and other alphabeticals, these are automatic, first-step reading lessons that radio could never have produced for us.

As for vocabulary building, you have to look no further than those scary Saturday morning cartoons. Replete with superheroes, supermonsters and supercharged action, they have been subjected to a superabundance of criticism from outraged parents and teachers. Yet there are some quite spectacular hidden assets in these shows. Notice the big words, spoken or written out, which most of us would not dare to use on the small fry but which, in fact, they love.

In one cartoon a hero is told by the villain, "You are powerful," rather than just "strong." In a fight scene, you hear, in rapid sequence, "You are an able foe," about to become "food for the serpents of the sea." The adversary is warned to "yield to the mighty fighter." We are then told

that the "time regressor" will take us back to "the 12th Century and earlier"—back to the days of the Vikings. And it does. We see the Vikings, dressed in authentic garb, complete with horned helmets, sailing their beautiful ships.

Yet schoolteachers still believe that a child has to wait to get a film strip in class to learn about Leif Ericson's bold voyages. The fact is, teachers are hopelessly outclassed by those ghost educators who work around the clock without pay and who can transform even the most difficult information into child's play.

There seems to be no limit to this automation of hidden teaching in TV entertainment. Math? Televised baseball games give a 7-year-old child excellent and continuous practice in adding. For nine innings he is doing real math homework, just by keeping score in his head. His 9-year-old brother watching a football game does more sophisticated kinds of arithmetic, by adding up touchdowns by sixes and tacking on extra points by ones, then varying the mental number drill by adding on field goals three points at a time. And in the daytime game shows, where scores can mount by tens or twenties or fifties or hundreds, schoolchildren can learn to add large sums painlessly.

Languages? Doris Day joined the ghost faculty when, in the televised movie "The Man Who Knew Too Much," she taught us that "Que Sera, Sera" means "Whatever Will Be, Will Be." And once Dean Martin informs us that amore means "love" in Italian, we are not likely to forget it.

Even ethics, a subject taught in college, is part of television's ghost curriculum. Along with Anthony Perkins in the movie "Tall Story," which has been rerun many times on TV, millions of viewers have taken a 10-question quiz in ethics. This is not bad homework.

One more example: The average person will never, in his whole lifetime, read one of Freud's books. He may, however, have learned some useful things about psychoanalysis from Dr. Kildare or Ben Casey—or even from a Bob Hope quip.

One of the things that prompted us to take a close look at the play pedagogues on television was an opinion poll we conducted. We were looking for the most important or influential science teacher in the United States. We polled average citizens, educators, community leaders and students. The winner? Walt Disney! Nobody even ran a close second.

Results like this prove that it is foolhardy for any of us to underestimate the educational power of the so-called noneducational programs on television.

I was once foolish enough to do just that, not too many years ago. Butchie, as we called him, was all of 19 months old. Imitating his 4-year-old sister, Butchie sat for hours on end, silent, fixated, in front of that dancing screen in the living room of my friends' home.

Days, weeks, months went by. Butchie's stout little bottom stayed glued to the three-legged stool from which he did his silent, compulsive, constant, almost ritualistic viewing. At first his mother thought it was a huge joke—little Butchie so engrossed in something he couldn't understand. Cartoons, commercials, news, specials—nothing seemed to bore him.

We began to worry a little.

Then one fine day we discovered that the joke was on us.

Butchie finally broke his silence and gleefully yelled out, "Two!" as the huge digit appeared on the screen.

What was most significant was the fact that he spoke a split second before the announcer's voice identified the channel.

Rushing ecstatically to the TV set, →

Butchie pointed his chubby finger right at the numeral. Because he did this before the announcer gave him the answer, an accurate account of Butchie's life history would list this as the magic "Aha!" moment of discovery that it was possible for him to read.

It is unlikely that most broadcasters realize that such automation of learning exists on their stations. What it is, simply, is a modern use of the old-fashioned schoolmarm's "flash card" technique. Whenever a *single* object is immediately identified by its written or spoken word, an elementary lesson has been taught.

That single word is a lightning learning unit, and it is a building block toward improved reading and spelling skills, a larger vocabulary and proper diction. These are important academic objectives. We are, without a doubt, learning a great deal from television.

There are many people who think this is just awful. Perhaps it is a hangover from our Puritan ancestry, but there is strong opposition to any form of learning that is not disciplined and formal. If we enjoy it or if we come by it quickly and painlessly—even joyfully—then it is to be condemned. If it ain't book larnin', it's good-for-nothing.

But think: If we can acquire our facts painlessly, during our leisure hours, we have that much more time for the tougher tasks of using the information wisely for more efficient problem-solving. This is a discipline we haven't acquired yet.

In the 10th grade, students are taught that amino acids are the end products of protein digestion. One year later, this fact will probably be forgotten, along with 80 percent of the other science facts that have been taught in class. Television drills us so that we won't forget so much. Television entertainment contains

subliminal, high-speed information systems of such potency and magnitude that it truly staggers the imagination.


Our study of TV's ghost teachers has turned up a remarkable statistic: No less than one-tenth of the entertainment programming on television was found to be educative in one way or another—either motivation for learning, or transmission of new information, or just plain drill. So those 23 hours a week that a child may spend watching, can be said to include more than two hours of automatic homework.

What seems to the formal educator to be an addiction, if not an affliction, turns out to be an unexpected but powerful ally.

We ought to change our conventional attitudes toward television. We seem compulsively anxious to add up the number of horror shows and Westerns and comedians and game shows and cartoons and rock 'n' roll bashes, and multiply it all by the number of commercials. The result we get is used as proof that the situation is hopeless for our Nation.

Such pessimism and despair are not warranted. The thought of giving a cap and gown to Soupy Sales or the Flintstones or the Munsters and punsters and duncesters who fill so many of television's hours may not sit well with some people. But the facts of educational life do demand such symbolic recognition. We are going to have to call an educational spade a shovel and admit that formal education owes much to the informal medium of television.

Television is so young, so new, we are just beginning to understand its power as a teacher. Once we are able to throw away our out-of-date prejudices about television, and harness that awesome power, we may yet usher in a new era of automatic education through entertainment.



Unemployment-compensation offices in the Hollywood area are unique. Not only is there no stigma attached to being observed there, but familiar faces from television and movies—on hiatus or between pictures—may be seen in line, cutting up touches with each other as well as with studio grips, carpenters and electricians, all glad to get those 65 income-tax-free dollars each week.

For a relative newcomer like Goldie Hawn, the elfin 22-year-old blonde in Rowan and Martin's NBC Laugh-In, there may even be some prestige in being recognized in the unemployment line. This summer, while R & M are off the air, she says, "I can hear people say, 'Is that Goldie?'

Not that Goldie has ever really been out of work. Encouraged by her mother, a former singer, and her father, a professional musician in her native Washington, D.C., she started taking dancing lessons when she was 3 years old and has been busy ever since. She is still a dancer at heart.


"It's so frustrating," she says. "I've been a dancer all my life, but I don't dance on the Rowan and Martin show." And, although she doesn't knock it—because it has given her recognition in and out of the unemployment line—she does not want to become typed as the dumb blonde she plays on Laugh-In. She says, "People ask me, 'Are you really that dumb?' I want to get out of this dumb bag."

As has been discovered, sometimes too late, by generations of men who have become intrigued with blondes, she isn't really dumb at all. In fact, she takes herself quite seriously-but not too seriously. One of her first roles was as a young Juliet-in a Williamsburg, Va., production Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet." She is still proud of the fact that she, a kid dancer with little previous dramatic experience, beat out a whole gaggle of Catholic University drama majors for it, but she adds, laughing, "I auditioned in a low-cut with my bellybutton showing."

Rowan and Martin didn't know she was a dancer and didn't even see her bellybutton when she came to be interviewed by them, after a short-lived role as Sandy, the next-door neighbor, in CBS's short-lived Good Morning World. Dan Rowan says, "She just walked into the office and said, 'Hello.' We looked at each other and said, 'She's in!' "Since Laugh-In has been on the air, she has become, according to someone close to the program, "the team-spirit of the show."

It has been pretty simple all the way along for Goldie. (That, by the way, is her real name.) After attending Silver Spring, Md., Intermediate School, she studied drama at American University. Then came the two years of operating her own dancing school, a tour of duty as a cancan girl at the New York World's Fair

in 1965, and tours with traveling companies as a chorus girl. When she went West, she was seen clowning as a dancer in an Andy Griffith special. An agent recommended her for Good Morning World.


Goldie attributes little of the success she has achieved in her short career to herself. She says, "Lots of people told me I had potential, but I'm not a pusher. I loved the chorus—I never wanted to be a star." Only once was she faced with a major de-


the cision concerning direction she would take. An Eastern mentor told her that to get ahead she would have to take what is euphemistically referred to as "the easy way." Goldie said simply, "If I have to make it that way, I won't go." She still makes decisions conservatively: "I sit down and decide what's real and what isn't, because it's so easy to be carried away." When she read "Valley of the Dolls," she said to herself, "Could this happen to me?" But you know she knows it couldn't.

Today Goldie Hawn lives quietly in a cozy paneled apartment minutes from NBC's Burbank studios, where Laugh-In is taped. spend most of my time with Gus. We go to Malibu Canyon and just sit").





# WHAT EVER BECAME OF JACK LESCOULIE?

The story of one of television's most successful announcers, who awoke one day to find himself out of work

What happens to a television personality who suddenly and mysteriously gets the boot? Well, if he's an ordinary guy, he cooks up some story about "going on to bigger and better things," pokes around for something else and quietly turns into a star for a smashingly successful 26-week run at the local Unemployment Bureau. His wife keeps the neighbors in the dark and makes noises like she's going back to work—after all, the children are in their teens and able to fend for themselves—and everyone keeps smiling those Gardol smiles.

But Jack Lescoulie, the jovial pacemaker of NBC's Today show for some 141/2 years, isn't smiling much any more. Except for a few occasional guest appearances, the man whose sun-lamp glow used to be America's alarm clock five days a week has not held steady employment on a regularly scheduled television show for 22 months. Those sizable ivories, which looked to many as if they'd be more at home in the mouth of a thoroughbred, are less compelling now, set in the jaw of a guy who is brooding on subjects like unfairness and injustice and the sudden smashing of the limelight.

Sure, we all know the world's an unfair place. Another Jack—yes, even

Kennedy—had remarks on the subject. But few of us will have to adjust our standards of living from what's possible at \$200,000 a year (which is what Jack made as one of TV's top announcers) to what's possible at a fraction of that amount. Jack Lescoulie always lived modestly. He now has reason to be glad he never moved from the \$25,000 development home he purchased in Garden City, Long Island, where he lives with his wife, two teen-age children and a German-shepherd dog.

Why was Jack Lescoulie fired? Exactly what happened? I mention that I've heard there was an uproar over an expense account he submitted while on a Caribbean junket. There were rumors of a fight with a crew member. Any truth to that story? He smiles slowly, playing it cool. We are seated in a small room for which he has apologized, saying he uses it rarely, in a suite belonging to Lescoulie's lawyer, Howard Epstein. (He no longer has a business manager.) Afternoon fallout from the New York light filters through dirty windows. A few cartons, containing Today memorabilia, are piled in a corner. I slap my brief case down on top of them and there is a tiny explosion of dust

"Well, you can certainly say that I was fired. I mean, my contract was up and they didn't renew it. But I was fired, all right. There definitely are a couple of bloody lances somewhere at NBC." Thus starts the first story of how Jack and the Peacock parted. Later there is to be another, supposedly more accurate.

"I found myself being eased out gradually," Lescoulie continues, "doing less and less, until there were actually times that my part in the program was limited to one minute of sports. On the other hand, there were also times, when Hugh was away on trips [he has not heard from Downs since he left NBC], that I did the

whole show alone. So that if I were offered another *Today*-type show, I would want to run the whole thing and not function as before—as the pacemaker. My job was never clearly defined, but it was—well, as Jackie Gleason once said: 'Lescoulie makes people seem better than they are.'

"You have to realize that the show's popularity was slipping, and they had to start thinking in terms of new formats and new faces. I left, without phony fanfare, on Sept. 2, 1966. There were thousands of letters of inquiry from fans, to which NBC responded with the usual form letter, saying essentially that I had been a valued member of the show for many years

and that I was now going on to bigger and better things."

Lescoulie smiles ruefully. Physically he is more handsome than he ever appeared on TV; taller, trimmer, very fit—looking for all the world like a candidate for national office. I ask whether personality differences played a role in his sudden departure from the show.

"I had no enemies in the crew, that you can say for sure. If you can find anyone-a cameraman, a grip-who has a bad word about me, you can print anything about me you like. I had very few if any arguments with the producer of the show. Al Morgan [whom he also has not seen since leaving NBC1. And as far as the men at the top are concerned - well, I away from staved them altogether. ->

Besides, this was not a decision that was made at the top. I heard that General Sarnoff himself called from his yacht to ask, first, was it necessary to get rid of Lescoulie and, second, if it was, he didn't like the way it was handled."

I'm still baffled. There must be more to it than this. "You're a man with tremendous ability and experience," I say. "Couldn't NBC have used you in some other capacity?"

"Of course," he says. "But this was never discussed. I could have done anything. I came up through the old 100-watters, sweeping studio floors, putting away records, throwing out garbage. I served a thorough apprenticeship. I was quality. I was paid for quality, I delivered quality and I was treated like quality—until the end, when I was told that I was through. It was unbelievable."

I suggest he was treated shabbily and I ask whether he can feel anything but bitterness toward NBC. He turns suggestions of bitterness aside.

"I won my Ph.D. in television at NBC. I owe them an awful lot. It was a wonderful experience. I was never pigeonholed. One moment I'd be interviewing a sports figure in Florida, the next doing a report on the death of President Kennedy, the next a eulogy of Adlai Stevenson, the next a talk with Robert Frost or a spot with Art Carney. Of course you feel a certain loyalty. And when it's over and you're out, you feel as if you've been kicked in the gut.

"But you've got to be a pro about it. You can't wear the NBC peacock on your chest like your alma mater. Business is not like the college frat house. Even though, when you sit down to sign a contract, they give you the old malarkey about how now you're a member of the NBC family, making you feel as if you're grappled to the bosom of the company with steel hooks. But what it truly means

is that you've got 13 weeks. The minimum. And you'd better make the most of it."

We go on to talk about longevity on TV. Is it a matter of luck or timing or talent or what?

"Usually the pro is only as powerful as the program is rated. As long as ratings are good, the job is secure. Once ratings slump, there's no such thing as security. As a consequence there's no fun in the TV business today. There are very few performers who don't have to fear the ratings game. People like Lucille Ball, Carol Burnett, Johnny Carson-who got themselves into positions where they run their own ships completely, defying all comers. But there are so many other fine performers who are simply used and discarded, TV is eating itself to death. We do a very bad thing in television by not promoting great performances. The public wants to look up to great stars. A man like Jason Robards could have been built to the stature of a Gable or a Cooper. He does a fabulous thing like 'The Iceman Cometh' and should be publicized to the sky. But let the ratings be bad, and he's finished. It could be prevented if an aura of glamor were maintained."

I ask what Lescoulie is up to now professionally.

"I expect any moment to turn a corner and sign a contract in a matter of seconds, I know that one day some producer's going to be sitting in his office saying, 'Hey, here's just the thing for Lescoulie,' and I'll be working regularly again. I can do almost anything. I'm probably one of the most famous salesmen alive. I was the voice of Buick for five years. When I left, sales in the Buick Division were the highest ever. I cannot walk in the street two minutesanywhere in the United Statesfrom New York to Florida to Kingman, Ariz., to Los Angeles to San

Francisco—without being stopped by a fan and asked what I'm up to these days. As far as my image is concerned, I know I'm still with it."

He searches in the desk drawer, producing a big batch of recent fan letters. "But today they're doing a different type of advertising. We're living in very kooky times. The whole approach to advertising has changed. My type of selling is not in great demand today. I was selling to the bread-and-butter people of America, with a sincere, direct approach. When I sold, I wanted to look like a Buick salesman in Omaha, Neb., not a flashy, tailor-made New Yorker. I had an off-the-rack look that never offended anyone."

We talk about commercials today.

"I like the Hallmark commercials very much. I think they're in exquisite taste. The Geritol commercials are kooky. I like the commercial for that airline—where the man dances in the aisle. Which airline is that?" Neither one of us can remember. "You see," he pounds the desk, "that's an example of bad selling. Good commercial, but bad selling. If Garroway or Godfrey were selling that airline, we wouldn't forget its name for an instant. Those two, by the way, were the two greatest salesmen in TV history."

"If you could choose," I ask, "what would you most like to be doing?"

"Look, I could be happy, really happy, just teaching a group of kids how TV works, how to walk so that you're fluid, how to read from a Teleprompter, and so on. But I come from an acting background and would love some dramatic work on TV or in pictures. And despite the fact that I number people like Ida Lupino, Abe Burrows, Kirk Douglas and many others among my personal friends—getting dramatic work is like batting your head against a brick wall. Producers think of me as the old Today show, not as an actor. They say, 'Jack, ->

you should be going along just fine.' But they don't seem to know where.

"I have some ideas on the subject. I'd like to have played Richard Widmark's part in 'Kiss of Death.' I would have given almost anything to play Bob Preston's role in 'The Music Man.' And I'm almost angry at Barry Nelson for getting to 'Cactus Flower' before I did. I wouldn't object to doing a panel show or a sports program. I'm an avid golfer, have been for seven years, and could easily host a tournament or two. There's a certain sanity about the game that you don't find anywhere else. And this you won't believe-I was turned down as a guest on two of the biggest conversation shows on TV-for no reason."

"It sounds to me," I say, "as if you're being blackballed. Is it possible?"

He doubts it. "No, there's no reason. I've always been a pro in this business. I'm not a troublemaker and don't wish to be known as one. I could blow holes in NBC if I wanted, but that's not my goal. I just want to get back to work. I know my image is there and I'm still with it."

"Exactly what have you been doing since the firing?" I ask.

"An Easter parade for WPIX in New York, a New Year's Eve celebration from Times Square for ABC, commercials—the latest being for Toots Shor's new salad dressing."

It kind of blows the mind to think that these are the activities of a guy who used to begin his day in a whirlwind at 4 A.M. "Do you start your day by watching the *Today* show?"

Lescoulie readily admits that he does not. "There's too little fun in the Today show. It's completely newsoriented, and I don't believe you can do two hours of unbreakable serious material and have the housewife and working man pay full attention. The crack of dawn is somehow not the time for two hours on The Pill or

Black Power."

"But isn't Joe Garagiola there for laughs?" I ask. Jack smiles that old jack-o'-lantern smile. "Joe's a great guy. He did his first show—a World Series game from Pittsburgh—with me. I don't know of anyone who can talk with more intimate knowledge about the refinements of baseball than Joe. But he's completely out of his depth on a host of other topics."

I ask whether he watches the evening news on NBC or CBS. There is a very long pause, during which I feel that I've asked something very meaningful, after which he admits that he's usually tuned to CBS for the news.

Anything else in summary? Lescoulie certainly wants to sum up, and here he speaks like a member of the bricklayers' union: "Number one—yes, I want to be back in front of the public. Number two—I know there is a demand for me. Number three—how to channel that demand into the hands of a TV, stage or movie man who will believe in me. Number four—I am unafraid. Number five—I blame almost no one."

And here a very interesting thing happens. Lescoulie suddenly declares that he will now tell me exactly what happened during the Caribbean junket that sparked his firing back in 1966. He tells the story. Just like it happened. The rumors turn out to be true. It did concern some money, and something that a crew member said to him. "If that fellow talked like that to Johnny Carson, he'd be in Siberia today." True, but one concludes. thinking it over on the way home, that perhaps the first story was more accurate. Ratings were off. NBC was looking for a new format and new faces. Maybe the Caribbean incident was just a pretext and someone at NBC had been aiming that lance for a long, long time.

"I'll be back," says Jack Lescoulie. But this time he isn't smiling.

# **Violent Switches in Programs**

TV's devout could be forgiven if they wondered lately how the program schedule could be so fouled up. One announced series episode or movie after another has failed to turn up, each replaced mysteriously by an unannounced one. What the networks left unexplained was that the murder of Senator Kennedy and resulting outcry against violence had provoked a convulsion of program rescheduling. Every show that could be deemed too violent or in "bad taste" in view of the national mood has been yanked -often at the last minute-and either rebooked later (presumably when things have quieted down) or chucked out. ABC shelved a Big Valley story for good-it dealt with the assassination of a congressman. Reruns of The Avengers, The FBI and Will Sonnett were shuffled: a Man in a Suitcase episode was dumped. Even comedy sequences of The Flying Nun and The Second Hundred Years were found inappropriate. CBS for its part, not only switched reruns of Cimarron Strip, Gunsmoke and Wild Wild West, but pulled out some movies like "Portrait of a Mobster," "Where the Spies Are" and "Young Dillinger" in favor of such happier items as Judy Garland in "I Could Go on Singing" and Peter Sellers in "World of Henry Orient." CBS's daytime serial Love Is a Many Splendored Thing got orders to postpone for a few days a story line about a young aspirant for the White House, At NBC, the soft-pedal

removed episodes of Bonanza, High Chaparral, I Spy, Tarzan, The Champions, and even Mothers-in-Law. On the Saturday night movie, "Girls! Girls! Girls!" turned up in place of "Prescription: Murder." The network insisted all the postponed shows will be aired "ultimately," unaltered. At another network, so many questionable series episodes were being pushed back to August that one underling predicted that month probably will be "the bloodiest in TV history."

Cable TV as well as the over-the-air kind falls under jurisdiction of the Federal Communications Commission, the Supreme Court has ruled. The landmark decision is seen by some as reinforcing the FCC's authority over all broadcasting, even possibly to licensing of TV networks. At the same time, the ruling is viewed as enabling the FCC to protect TV stations, if it wishes, from competitive en-'croachments by community-antenna systems. If the verdict is something of a setback to CATV operators, a subsequent ruling clearly isn't: the court held that cable services owe nobody any copyright fees for picking TV programs off the air and relaying them into homes via wire. One direct result: CATV systems might originate more programs of their own-something they talked of foregoing if broadcasters in return would waive copyright payments.

# THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

Summer doldrum rerun time? Find consolation during this networkmovie week with the fact that Sophia Loren, Clark Gable, Laurence Harvey, Richard Widmark, Stewart Granger and Gregory Peck are there for the star watchers, and the kids can cool it with a horror classic.

The dazzling beauty of the scenery is rivaled by that of Sophia Loren in "It Started in Naples," made in 1960 when Miss Loren was at her lushest. Clark Gable is her co-star in this rather labored comedy that stretches its one joke—the American puritan vs. the Italian amoralist—farther than feasible. Miss Loren and Gable are, however, masters of the comedy craft and provide some passable fun.

If you're not convinced of American inferiority by this film, you might try your chauvinism on "A Girl Named Tamiko," an up-dated Madame Butterfly bit that proves that all Japanese are kind, courteous and charming and all Americans are simply stupid when they're not downright nasty. But the nastiest character on hand, we should note, portrayed by British actor Laurence Harvey, is a Chinese-Russian photographer who plays fast and loose with the ladies of both nations.

As any movie-watcher knows, of course, boy gets girl in the last scene (I'm really not ruining those last two movies for you, am I?) and shipwrecked sailors ultimately get

rescued. In "Flight from Ashiya," one of those almost-perfectly-awful adventure films, the "ultimately" becomes an eternity because each of the three air rescue service members heading for the survivors over the China seas takes time to flash-back his life story to us. At least the ship-wrecked sailers are spared the details and only Widmark watchers can win.

Gregory Peck watchers will find him authoritative as usual as "Captain Newman, M.D.," a relatively sincere film about Air Force psychiatry that at very least doesn't reduce mental illness to low comedy and/or Grand Guignol levels. But corn and cliches are rampant and its major embarrassments are Tony Curtis and Angie Dickinson as Peck's prime aides. Curtis has a hideous dialect but pretty teeth; Miss Dickinson has pretty legs.

Stewart Granger and Dalmatian scenery watchers can hopefully catch "The Secret Invasion," previously postponed, this week. This rottenapples-with-cores-of-gold war-time-adventure bit boasts some of the loveliest views of Yugoslavia on film, as well as some strictly-from-muscle chases involving nasty Nazis and a passel of pretty partisans.

"The Phantom of the Opera"—Herbert Lom in this second remake of the horror classic—has an unpretty hero, a pretty heroine, nice old-fashioned scares and some dreadful operatic interludes. It won't beat the heat but it's good for a shudder or two.

SPECIAL COLOR CBS opens a seven-part series focusing on the Negro in the U.S.—from his African heritage to his American future. Executive producer Perry Wolff: "We want to change the language of the current racial dialog by showing that racial trouble stems from historic attitudes—an inheritance of ignorance."

Bill Cosby and CBS newsman George Foster are the reporters for this hour, which focuses on these attitudes, the black heritage and the search for racial identity.

The all-white orientation of American society has almost eliminated the black man from U.S. history. Many whites—and even blacks—think of Negro heroes and contributions in terms of athletes and performers. Few are familiar with Norbert Rillieux, who revolutionized sugar refining, or Dr. Daniel Hale Williams, who performed the first

open-heart surgery in this country.

Men like these are only a part of the heritage today's Negro searches for and passes on—so fewer black children will grow up with what James Baldwin called "a feeling of no past, no present and no future."

In Philadelphia, cameras visit the storefront Freedom Day School. Here, black children learn Negro history before going to a white-oriented school that will teach them little or nothing of their own heritage. In New York, psychiatrist Emmanuel Hammer interprets drawings (of the same subjects) made by black and white fourth-graders.

TV and movie film clips show the changing image of the American Negro—from the caricatures in "Birth of a Nation" and "Amos 'n' Andy" to the more human realistic portrait in "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner?" (60 min.)







If there is such a thing as an anonymous movie star, Robert Wagner fills the bill. The concept is a peculiar one, and yet there are a good many of these anonymous "names" in Hollywood. Some are steady workers whose faces are always on the screen but who have never attracted a strong personal following. Some are actors who briefly won the adulation of millions but slid back before their celebrity—or talent—was consolidated. Robert Wagner is in this second class.

A blue-eyed 6-footer, a superb athlete with a chiseled face and a winning smile, he achieved a certain measure of fame some years ago, with the younger citizenry. He was married to Natalie Wood for a time and lived in a blaze of petty fan-book publicity. And then the blaze fizzled out. He has appeared in a long string of movies, roughly two a year since 1950, most of them unspectacular.

As Bob Wagner himself puts it: "When I started in the picture business, I was very successful. I became a teen-age idol. When what you do is responded to favorably, that's all they want you to do. It's safe, so you stay in it. But the time has come to do

something new."

The "something new" is ABC's midseason entry It Takes a Thief. It's an expensively produced rehash of The Saint, Raffles, The Rogues, The Dirty Dozen and Garrison's Gorillas, all coated lightly with James Bond. Its hero, Alexander Mundy, is a professional thief who's been dragooned to ply his unholy talent for his country. The rest you know, or can easily figure out. Like every TV lead alive, Wagner has issued hopeful statements about the artistic potential of his TV role. It's whistling in the dark, of course. One does not leave motion pictures to churn out a TV series because it affords extensive opportunities for acting. It doesn't. One takes a series for other, perfectly wellknown reasons. In Bob Wagner's case, he's clearly trying to refurbish his "image" and make a second try, in his late 30's, for nation-wide prominence.

When one meets Bob on the *Thief* set, one does not, at first, get the sense that this is a man engaged in a tense battle to resurrect himself professionally. He's handsome, friendly and earnest, and settles down easily for a chat. He recaps the basic facts of his life—born in Detroit, moved


"I grew up in California at a time when the San Fernando Valley was nothing but two or three big ranches. I had horses. You could ride, it was all open. I practically lived outside. I was a very esthetic kid, too. I liked paintings and antiques. I used to help refinish furniture and help with the display in an antique shop. I read a lot, too, I still read constantly, I was crazy about Robert Louis Stevenson, stories about the sea, about horses, Zane Grev. I ended up spending most of my time in the movies. I used to try to jump over the wall of the Fox Studios and watch 'em make pictures. Basically, I was a romantic kid. I still am."

The "romantic kid" was under contract to 20th Century-Fox by the age of 20. He talks only briefly about his early success—and it's here that the

tension begins to show. His manner becomes strained, almost groping, "When I took off on a career, it was based on-well. I became a teen-age idol. tears roll out of his eyes . . . . They responded to that. I suspect it's vulnerability. Most of the time, my roles have had that vulnerable element. . . . I think that's what I meant to the kids, vulnerability. That's how I was, myself. It's hard to explain . . . "

While talking about his career, he keeps interjecting unintelligible comments about himself, such as: "I used to be conscious of the arrival, therefore I lost the journey. Lately, ->

I've been working more on the journey than the arrival." And: "The trouble was, I had an idea of what I should be like, or what I should project, instead of being it." And: "It's the enjoyment part of it I care about now, rather than wondering where it comes from. I've finally gotten down to being it, not something I'm not." All this is said intensely and earnestly. One gets the feeling that he's trying to say something delicate and dear to him about his evolution as a man and as an actor. But he's saying it in Wagnerian, not English.

When one speaks to people who know him well, or work with him closely, one gets a translation of the Wagnerian code:

Thief producer Leslie Stevens says: "He's changing, growing. The realities around him, he's embracing them, he's not hiding from them or withdrawing from them. He's becoming more emotionally liberated. He's warmer, more charming than he was before, when he felt he had to be warm and charming. His work as an actor is growing. He's been built up as a studio commodity, but he's adding in artistry, and he's sensitively dedicated to the work. Recently, he's discovered his ability to project himself, his real self. At one time, he was afraid to show himself. Now he's willing to be what he is, first and foremost-to stand or fall on that."

News analyst Alex Dreier, a friend of Bob's, says something similar: "He's much more confident than he used to be. He takes a more definite stand in his own existence. He knows now where he's going and what he wants to do in the business."

As one listens to his friends speak about his change and growth, one gets the sense of unearthing a secret love affair between Robert Wagner and his own development as man and actor. As one friend puts it: "Bob's real life has been developing under cover. On the surface, he's strong, flashy, athletic. Under all the action and muscle, he's been shy, uncertain, withdrawn—a sweet guy with a lot of hang-ups. He was crushed by the failure of his marriage to Natalie Wood. He went to Europe for a while to think things out, about himself and his work. Ever since, he's been changing steadily. I think he's begun to come to grips with the things that were throwing him."

It's only on the second encounter with Bob Wagner that he drops his code, relaxes into clear language, and talks about the struggle that's been going on. "I've had a psychological breakout," he says. "It's like breaking out of jail. In the past, I was constantly doing what I thought should be done, according to what I thought people would expect from me. I was always trying to satisfy others, to adjust to them, to avoid conflicts. It was a constant capitulation.

"Sometimes, I'd react as strongly in the other direction. I'd be defensive and angry. I remember once, in an airport, three years ago, someone beckoned to me with his finger. I dropped him. A perfect stranger, and I smashed him. I had the feeling he thought I'd jump at the gesture of a finger.

"The effect of all this concern with what other people expected of me—with the impression I was creating on them—was a loss of—well, I was locked up. I couldn't really see other people. I couldn't be seen myself. I wasn't even seeing myself. I was unable to communicate.

"It kept me from being happy, from getting any kind of contentment. And it affected my work."

Bob Wagner is unusual in that he really knows both why he "made it" and why he "lost it." Paradoxically, the reason is the same: "The teenagers identified with me because I was vulnerable. I was vulnerable just

because I was always trying to do what others expected of me. But the result of this capitulation showed in my personality, in what I projected as an actor. It created a certain . . . non-definiteness . . . non-uniqueness." This is about as candid a self-assessment as has ever come out of the lips of a Hollywood "pretty boy."

But this one is not just a "pretty boy." He's been battling his own conformism for five years. "People," he says, "are constantly setting up false restrictions on you. Don't smoke, don't drink, don't make love, don't live! I'm trying to eliminate all these restrictions from my life. I'm much happier now. And I'm freer all the time, freer as a person and as an actor, free to be myself."

Bob's second wife, onetime actress Marion Marshall, is credited by many of his friends for much of his new contentment. "She's very bright, and very good for me," he says shyly. "She believes in me. That's about enough for anybody, isn't it?" Marion, when asked about Bob, is equally shy: "I don't know, I just like him. I can't really—well . . , he's marvelous. He's beautiful. He's bright, funny, warm. There are very few things negative about him. He wears well." When asked about his developing self-assertion, she bristles protectively, and says, "I don't know what he means by that. I don't know what that has to do with."

It has to do with everything, of course. If, on screen, Robert Wagner, actor, is engaging in a battle to resurrect a career, behind the scenes, Robert Wagner, man, is engaging in a battle to resurrect a soul. "You see," he says, with touching solemnity, "I want very much to be myself. I don't want to be locked up. I want to be visible. Everyone wants it, it's right to want it. I want to be simple, exposed, and seen."



# Father O'Connor and all that jazz

A priest takes to television to deliver a musical message

Stan Kenton said yes, he'd love to appear on the program, and showed up with his whole orchestra; Count Basie, Lionel Hampton and the Modern Jazz Quartet performed; Gene Krupa, Gerry Mulligan, Dave Brubeck, Coleman Hawkins, Cannonball Adderley, Maynard Ferguson and Hazel Scott signed up, and so did Carmen McRae, Felicia Sanders, Chris Connor, Della Reese and Miriam Makeba.

The aforementioned jazz supernova collectively command fees ranging into the millions of dollars, but all of them—and many others—accepted the bare minimum "scale" which their unions allow for the ambiguous privilege of appearing on an aggressively

modest half-hour television series called *Dial M for Music*, which isn't even seen on a full network hookup, but only in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Philadelphia and St. Louis—the five cities where CBS owns its own television stations.

It's difficult to say quite why Dial M for Music, in its three years of operation, has attracted more leading jazz artists than any other program in television history, but part of its secret resides in the person of its host, a silver-haired, 45-year-old Catholic priest named Father Norman O'Connor, who, years ago, was tagged by trumpeter Dizzy Gillespie with the label "The Jazz Priest"; and it →

has stuck to him, through many rousing choruses, ever since.

Father O'Connor was out in the deep water of aggiornamento and ecumenism before those words achieved their current vogue, busy in areas of worldly concern which would have appalled the more parochial curates of only a generation ago—and even today there are some who think he should be less a public figure and more a private priest.

Besides his Dial M for Music chores he is host of a weekly syndicated music-and-interview radio show; he is president of the New York Chapter of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences, which awards the Grammys; and his first novel, called "Death Is All Metaphors," will be published by Harper & Row this fall

He's an enthusiastic ("but not very good," he says) jazz pianist, a lecturer and article writer: Downbeat magazine named him man-of-the-year in 1959. But one of his most conspicuous and unlikely guises is that of master of ceremonies for the now legendary Newport Jazz Festival, a task he has performed every year since its start in 1954 and which he will repeat when it reconvenes there on the shores of Narragansett Bay for four days beginning July 4.

If there is any lingering, old-fashioned dismay among some Catholics about a clergyman being in show business, it hasn't affected The Jazz Priest much; and even if the disapproval were more vocal, one feels that Father O'Connor would continue.

"The limits of what one can do as a priest have never really been defined," he says. "Twenty years ago, perhaps, it might not have been possible to do what I'm doing."

Father O'Connor is a glib talker, but there's one aspect of his career he declines to discuss, and that's his involvement in the personal lives of some of his jazz-musician friends and their special hang-ups: narcotics and alcohol. "He's done a lot of good for many of them," says an associate, "but he's silent about it, of course, as he would be about a penitent's confession."

The format of Dial M for Music is quite simple: The guest performs, then chats with the host about himself, his life and his thoughts, and then performs some more. Since the program is done as a public service in cooperation with the New York City Board of Education, the studio audience always consists of public high school students who are aiming at careers in music or TV or the popular arts.

The show's guiding, behind-thescenes spirit is actually a bouncy, good-natured lady named Ethel Burns who is music supervisor for the city of New York, and who handles the program's production details and booking. It was she who chose Father O'Connor as host because, as she puts it, "He knows all the people and he knows the subject. In his hands, the show has a marvelous informality."

The subject of religion never comes up on *Dial M for Music*; there are no messages, no sermons, no pious allusions. "I don't think that the performers or audience are aware of him as a priest," says Ethel Burns. "He comes on as a jazz authority, and there's no intrusion of theology."

The cleric grew up in Detroit, the son of a sometime schoolteacher who later sold electrical appliances. "As far back as I remember, there was music around my house," he says. "My older sister, Mary Alice, was a tap dancer and I took piano lessons."

During high school, he joined the musicians union and played in a dance band around the Detroit area. But he quit playing professionally when he enrolled in the University of Detroit; and there wasn't much time for music,

either, when he decided to become a priest and entered the Community of St. Paul (the Paulists). He was ordained in 1948.

He was chaplain at Boston University for 10 years, and while he was there, the old jazz bug got him again. He started writing music articles for magazines like Downbeat, the Saturday Review and Esquire, and pretty soon he had himself a weekly television show on a local Boston station. Besides that, he became jazz critic of the Boston Globe and contributed reviews for eight years.

More recently, he has been operating around the New York area while writing his novel, juggling the multifarious activities of his highly visible life, and occasionally spinning for his own pleasure a few of the more than 10,000 recordings in his

personal collection.

"Jazz will always be minority music," he said recently. "It's too demanding of its audience. It will never be as popular as, say, Mantovani or the Beatles."

And the kids who dig the Beatles and other pop-rock groups concern him a bit: "Since World War II, we haven't given them anything to be happy about. It's a sad generation, the most unhappy group of youngsters the country has seen. We've even destroyed war as a noble experience. They reflect the hang-ups of us adults. Then along comes a Bob Dylan and gives a voice to this dissatisfaction with grown-up values. There's a certain despair in many young people, induced by the atmosphere we produced for them."

The Jazz Priest is doing his subtle best to change the atmosphere. This season, Dial M for Music is presenting performers like Duke Ellington, Ella Fitzgerald, Tony Bennett, Earl Hines, Teddy Wilson, Dizzy Gillespie, Chuck Berry and Mel Torme, and if those people can't convey some solid values, then who can?

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

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
