



■ The television industry's initial response to public outcry against violence in America was to be expected. In effect it was: "It isn't our fault. We didn't do it, and furthermore we won't do it again."

Network officials, who usually are busy describing the tremendous impact of television upon the Nation, quickly pointed out that there is no conclusive evidence that television violence has any impact upon the Nation. Still, just in case, they rushed emissaries to Hollywood to urge writers and producers to reduce violence in future programs.

They even authorized some editing and reshooting on shows already scheduled for the fall season.

Of course nothing can be done about the thousands of hours of violence that have already been seen on the networks and now are being syndicated to local stations. Editing all those programs would be impractical, if not impossible, and having paid good prices for the syndicated violence, few stations are in a position to casually toss it into the dump heap. It is difficult to understand why television suddenly finds it necessary to cut down on unnecessary violence. The Television Code, to which the three networks and major stations subscribe, has long had a rule which reads: "Such subjects as violence and sex shall be presented without undue emphasis and only as required by plot development or character delineation." There is also a paragraph saying: "Material which is excessively violent or would create morbid suspense, or other undesirable reactions in children, should be avoided."

Could it be that the Television Code—written by broadcasters, interpreted by broadcasters and enforced by broadcasters—is not really being followed by broadcasters?

THE PROGRAM THAT EXPLORED REAL AMERICA

Its purpose was simple and the response has been extraordinary, raising the question of the fairness of television's coverage of our country



Three times, while the country has reeled under political assassinations, a strange thing has Lappened on the air waves. From the screen has emerged an incredible chant from the mouths of hundreds of our citizens: America is sick . . . insane . . . murderous. . . . America is evil.


In the middle of the second of these catastrophes a little program went on the air. It was an NBC documentary called "American Profile: Home Country USA." It, too, was filled with the voices of our citizens, but they communicated a very different theme: America is healthy . . . sane . . . productive. . . . America is good.

To affirm the good was the conscious purpose of this documentary. Chet



Huntley opened it with these words: "For the space of this program, let's declare a cease-fire in the painful but necessary process of searching, scolding and scaring ourselves. For a change, we will consider some of our virtues, instead of our faults."

And the documentary did just that. NBC's Bob Rogers, who conceived the show, produced and wrote it, took us on a voyage across the Nation, from a ship-building seaport in Maine, to a Kansas dairy farm, to the tobacco country of south Virginia, to a South Carolina steel plant, to a Texas ranch, to the game-filled Montana mountains, to a Mexican-American town in Southern California. There, we saw an intimate version of the black and

white citizens who inhabit the vast geographical expanse of this Nation those we call the "grass-roots" Americans. And by the time it was over, "Home Country" had succeeded in portraying what is enduringly beautiful about the American character.

Bob Rogers describes what he set out to capture in this poetic film: "There's a big America. . . . It has a lot of virtues. And the people who reflect these virtues in their characters are common all over this country, regardless of terrain, income, race or accent. We found them everywhere—the rugged individualists, the independent, resourceful and courageous Americans—the people mature in the basic human knowledge that you only

get out of life what you put into it.

"The outstanding thing that unites them all is self-reliance. Each is his own man. They all have strong convictions about what they want, and a willingness to do a fantastic amount of work to enable them to have the career they want and to live the way they want to live. They all have guts.

"These are the useful, skillful Americans, who don't advertise, who don't brag about their accomplishments, who just do their work well and are confident that people will notice it because it is good."

"Home Country" was Bob Rogers' personal "Of Thee I Sing." "I love this kind of person," he says. "I love these qualities in America. And I set out →

to portray what I love." And the reaction to this portrayal during a week of *nightmare indicates that multimillions of other Americans share his love.

"The response was extraordinary," says Rogers—and for once "extraordinary" is not too strong a word. This documentary was virtually a communications miracle. At the moment of writing, not one critical voice is known to have been raised against its content. It was acclaimed by TV critics, by viewer mail, and by innumerable people within the industry. Herewith a quick report on the universal response:

The reaction of the totality of the Nation's press to "Home Country"—from big-city publications such as the New York Times to grass-roots dailies—can be summed up in the words of Cynthia Lowry, AP reporter: "It was like soothing balm."

Variety, the show-business publication in New York, declared: "The program was reassuring in pointing out that the verities of American life . . industry . . and independence—are alive and well . . ." Boston critic Percy Shain wrote, "There's still a strong backbone running down our Nation's anatomy." And critic Aldine Bird, in the Baltimore News American, reported that the film evoked emotions comparable to those felt by "persons returning to this land from abroad (who) stoop down and kiss the ground beneath their feet."

The letters that arrived at NBC were equally emotional. The themes were the same: gratitude for a sight of the good in America.

A Memphis viewer wrote: "With this sorrowful event [the assassination of Martin Luther King] in our city, most of us became depressed and almost defeated over today's problems. Your program helped me to remember the rest of America." From Washington, D.C., where rioting had erupted, a Wac wrote: "I couldn't go to bed tonight without saying thank you . . . I have never been to those communities. I'm so glad they exist."

Much of the mail reflected a release from an anguish which had long been building. From Oklahoma: "Thank you. I had almost forgotten about the good in America." From Virginia: "A basic good exists in the American spirit. Thank you for reminding us of it."

Behind the scenes, at the network itself, many television professionals experienced the same emotions.

Lou Hazam, who produces documentaries, says: "It was so thrilling to see these people. They were so real. This show gave us the essence of the American character. The terrific integrity and self-reliance! I can't tell you what it meant to me."

There was only one question provoked by this extraordinary showand it was of a very strange nature. Was this actually America? Many people wrote to thank NBC for portraying "the real America," and "real Americans"; and a Baltimore paper even headlined its story: "Real America Being Filmed." But some bigcity critics did not see it as current reality. The New York Times headlined critic George Gent's article: "Rugged Individualists . . . An Almost-Forgotten Breed." And Newsday's Barbara Delatiner commented affectionately on the rugged individualists who "seemed like relics of days long past."

This view of "Home Country" as nostalgic Americana surprised and rather shocked NBC executives. "This kind of American isn't extinct!" insists Bob Rogers. "These are the real, fundamental Americans!"

Said Lou Hazam: "Relics! These are Americans! They represent most of America. This is the Horatio Alger ethic. You find it in the cities, as well as in rural towns. You find it in the slums! You find this character in the

deep Southern Negro community. You find it everywhere!"

It's not surprising, however, that words like "forgotten breed" and "relics" were used. There seems to be, in some circles, a growing view that the self-reliant, productive American is "extinct"—that this country is peopled largely by the dependent, the helpless, the hostile and the violent.

The reasons for such thinking are many, but one factor certainly is the influence of television documentaries which devote so much of their time to the acknowledged ills of our cities and devote so little to the more problem-free areas and more problem-free citizens of our Nation. The purpose of these documentaries may be praise-worthy but they also may be creating problems. As Rogers puts it: "The responsible man, the productive man, the man without a chip on his shoulder, is 'The Forgotten American.' You hardly ever see him on TV."

Why aren't the Forgotten Americans on TV?

The answer comes back from Rogers, dry and terse: "Because everybody's covering urban problems." Says Huntley: "It's true. Our attention has certainly been turned to the cities. That's where the problems are." And then he adds, "But it is distorted. It doesn't reflect the total country. We're ignoring the rest of America."

Actually, the degree to which America is being "ignored" is enormous. The real American beat spans a continent, and more. It includes some 200,000,000 people. With network news cameras focused on localized, if explosive, urban problems, often photographed in New York City, the mass of this Nation is invisible. TV's domestic "window on reality" is mainly showing us social "evils."

Recently Howard K. Smith of ABC criticized network news reporters for negatively slanted coverage. "TV news isn't telling people the way life is," he

said. "We're giving the public a wholly negative picture on a medium so vivid that it damages morale with a bombardment of despair."

It also generates the disturbing view that "America is evil." It also generates dissension. "The imbalance in coverage is causing Americans to mistrust each other," says Rogers. Yet another effect is hostility to TV news itself. President Johnson voiced authentic grass-roots anger when he exploded recently at "those people who are bad-mouthing this country all day long, all night long," and who have "a vested interest in catastrophe."

And the last and perhaps the most prevalent result is: suffering. Hazam says: "I know it has hurt people. It has hurt and frightened me. I often wonder, myself, is everything I love dving?"

Everything, of course, is not dying. Beneath the weirdly potent illusion of the omnipresent evil, and the Nation's very real problems, Home Country USA is still there. The Forgotten American, of every race and creed, is still living quietly, and working productively, from Maine to California.

"The question is," says Rogers, "do the networks have a moral obligation to present a balanced view of evils, or do they have a moral obligation to present a balanced view of the Nation—the evils and the virtues?"

That is the question.

And that's why "Home Country USA" is "important"—because it strongly suggests the answer. The show was aired when flames were leaping in slums, when violent conflict, dissension, anger and fear were rampant. And yet this version of social reality generated love, courage, pride and unity. It made people of conflicting views and of different races reach out to each other.

The soothing "balm" was the sight of American goodness. It is a vital necessity, in this troubled period of our history, to show it on the screen.



At the Hollywood Roosevelt one noon, Kaye Ballard gnawed a finger as she studied the menu. "They have liver. I'm supposed to eat liver. I hate liver." She settled for a poached egg. She is dieting. The first year's shooting of The Mothers-in-Law had ended; a second season would not begin for two months. Another actress might have let go, celebrated the success of the series and the hiatus.

But Kaye Ballard had a four-week engagement at the Flamingo in Las Vegas, and she wanted to trim down. She weighed 142 pounds. Her weight plunges and peaks like the stock market, more bullish than bearish. She ate her poached egg, starved herself for a week, reported to the Flamingo, and promptly bedded down with the flu. The day before she opened, she said, "I don't know if I can go on." She got out of bed, with a raging fever, and was a smash.

Physical woes assail Kaye Ballard. She is deaf in her right ear. Her looks dismay her—oversized chin, blocky figure, heavy legs.

But physical woes are minor compared to what goes on inside Kaye Ballard. For over a decade (and for over \$20,000) she has sobbed out her problems on a psychiatrist's couch. Several couches. She wonders whether she'll ever marry, ever have children. At 41 she says, "Time is running out." She goes from trauma to trauma, once

(she says) "on the brink of insanity for three years," another time so strangled by fear for six months that she couldn't sing. "I called it laryngitis." She clings to a stranger like a child as she babbles out her insecurity—"Do you understand what I mean? I never make myself clear. That's why I hate to write letters. Does that make sense? Oh, this is awful. I'm telling you everything."

She earns \$7500 a week when she appears in Las Vegas, but she hates night clubs because of the drunks who heckle her. She hates drunks, yet she was engaged for seven years to a man she describes as "an alcoholic."

Still, a brassy ebullience lies behind all these tears, and belies all those couches.

She leads you through her penthouse apartment that faces the Hollywood hills, and shows you her art. All representational. Nothing non-objective. People fill her canvases. "Look," she says, in joy, pulling out a letter from a Manhattan art gallery. "I've had the paintings evaluated. This one I bought seven years ago for \$2750. Now it's worth \$12,000!"

This is Kaye Ballard. No, she is not Little Mary Sunshine, but then she is not Camille either.

What she really is is Gloria Katherine Balotta, born in Cleveland on Nov. 20, 1926, daughter of a cement finisher, Vincent Balotta, whom Kaye

She Lives From One Trauma To Another

calls "the most noble man I've ever known, a beautiful man." Her mother, Lena Balotta, who had named her after Gloria Swanson, took a second look and dropped the Gloria. "I had bags under my eyes when I was 2. I looked like a character actress." Later, the girl changed Katherine to Kaye. When she was 5 she said to her mother, "I want to take singing and dancing lessons," and Lena Balotta grunted: "Do the dishes." So the girl sang while she did the dishes and imagined she was Bette Davis.

Kaye began to try out for school plays. She had two problems: her bad chin and a worse lisp. Kaye's parents took her to a speech therapist. The therapist said, "Say, 'President.'" "Prethident," she said.

"Hopeless," the therapist "She'll never get rid of it."

Kaye faced the therapist. "President," she said. The lisp was gone. ->

Her chin wouldn't go away, but the same determination showed. "I had a boy friend—George—the bestlooking boy in high school. One day I overheard a friend say to George; 'How can you go with her? What lousy taste!' So I dropped George!" she says, in triumph.

At 16, Kaye became a straight woman in a Cleveland burlesque house. After high school, she shaped an act-singing, impersonating, telling jokes—and went on the road, Because "Balotta" didn't sound chic, she became Kaye Ballad, which everybody misspelled Ballard, In 1946, Spike Jones caught the 19-year-old girl at the Bowery, in Detroit. He said casually, "If you're ever in California, call me," and left. So did Kaye. "I bought a one-way ticket to Los Angeles, checked into the Biltmore. and called Spike Jones." Jones hired the girl, introducing her to his brand of zany satire. "It changed my life."

After a year and a half, she quit Jones. She played the sophisticated saloons in New York, and spent 10 months in a revue, "Three to Make Ready." In 1949 and 1950 she appeared in command performances before English royalty, and once found herself face to face with Princess Margaret. Not knowing what to say, Kaye says she gushed, "I'm just crazy about your mother and father!"

Her career seemed to be burgeoning—summer stock, Broadway shows, off-Broadway shows—but Kaye Ballard began to have doubts. Did she really have talent? Why was she still in the clubs, playing before audiences that ranged from indifferent to inebriated? Today, when television people complain about their work, she scoffs. "Nothing is difficult that keeps me out of a night club. People don't know what 'difficult' is, they don't know what 'alone' is, until they've been on a night-club tour."

In 1956 she hit 30, and 30 hit right

back. "I couldn't accept my life. I couldn't give it up. I wanted to be loved by everybody. I couldn't sing." She began Freudian analysis in New York; she's been under analysis ever since. "Analysis permits me to function in a world I know isn't perfect," she says today. "I used to run on emotion alone. Now I also run on intellect and experience. I am better adjusted. The hardest thing was realizing it isn't wrong not to like everybody. Analysis saved my life."

In 1963 she began another night-club tour, a long stretch of club dates which she describes, overdramatically, as three years "at the brink of insanity." Still, her brass kept piping up. In Houston to play the Cork Club for a couple of weeks, she learned that club owner Glenn McCarthy had just returned from a hunting trip where he'd supposedly bagged 70 deer. "How can anybody," she asked on the floor of McCarthy's club, "kill 70 Bambis?"

Then one day in 1966, Sal Mungo, an independent movie producer, caught her act in Las Vegas.

"Why aren't you doing a TV series?" Mungo asked. "Nobody asked me." "If I get a series, will you do it?" "Sure."

Mungo went to Procter & Gamble, who went to Desi Arnaz, who asked Lucille Ball, "What do you know about Kaye Ballard?"

"She's the best," Lucille Ball said. Today, Kaye Ballard earns \$2500 weekly on Desi Arnaz's The Mothers-in-Law. The show is an excellent vehicle for her madcap comedy, full of exaggerated gestures, what Kaye calls "heightened reality," and what an occasional critic calls "mugging."

"The show is the best moment of my life," she says. "People yell, 'Hi, Kaye,' in the street." A 10-year-old boy wrote: "No matter who says you're ugly, I think you're pretty. I want you to be my mommy."

She laughs. Then: "Do you think he means it?"

PTV Group Asks Federal Funds

In an eleventh hour stab at influencing the 90th Congress (which adjourns in a few weeks), the National Citizens Committee for Public Television issued a report this week (July 15) calling attention—in explicit and rather impatient terms—to the lawmakers' conspicuous inertia in appropriating the \$12.5 million (for facilities in fiscal 1969) and the \$9 million (for administration) authorized by President Johnson's Public Broadcasting Act of 1967.

The Committee's chairman, Thomas P. F. Hoving, complains in the report that: "It is past time that the greatest communications tool the world has ever known was used to illuminate and unravel the dark, tangled labyrinth through which our society and our planet so precariously move. There is too little of beauty and excellence in any of broadcasting. If there were more, it would ameliorate the brutality in our lives and help humanize the existence we share."

Those strong words are followed by a series of recommendations, including 1) that money levels for public broadcasting be hoisted quickly to what the Carnegie Commission requested 18 months ago (\$56 million a year for four years, leading to a plateau of \$270 million a year; 2) that free or reduced rates be granted for interconnecting the country's PTV stations in network hookups; 3) that permanent, long-range financing plans be agreed upon, with Federal monies free of annual appropriations review.

A supplement to the report is a survey of 146 noncommercial TV stations, which indicates that those outlets believe that a 95 percent increase in their budgets is necessary if they're to operate anywhere near the efficiency they'd like to; and that only 25 percent of their program schedules should be locally produced, with 75 percent being supplied to them from national, state, and regional public broadcast sources.

Washington observers have felt for a long time that Congress has pushed public broadcasting well down its priority list in deference to Vietnam and the crisis in our cities. What Hoving's influential 120-member committee is saying is that public broadcasting deserves a spot right near the top of any priority list, and that time's a'wasting.

A Senate subcommittee is scheduled to discuss the matter this week, and if all goes well, both chambers of the Congress will have voted on the President's \$9 million request by Aug. 2, the projected adjournment date. Partisans of public broadcasting are predicting that the vote will be "yea" (even though it's unlikely they'll get the full \$9 million) before the lawmakers go off to their August conventions in Miami and Chicago.

There's an oasis in the desert of network-movie reruns this week and a stop for refreshment is mandatory. Before it shows up on the horizon, of course there's enough to discourage the hardiest among us, but

don't drop by the wayside.


"The Best Man," the 1964 film version of Gore Vidal's hard-hitting political melodrama of 1960, is the oasis, a top-notch no-holds-barred commentary on how things are at nationalconvention time. Still topical, with importance in or out of an election year, the film achieves near-thriller status with the almost unbearable tension building from a man's reconsideration of his own moral values and the suspense dependent on how far a demagogue's passions can carry him. Second viewing gives one a chance to concentrate on the performances-and each is a dilly. Watch every nuance of Lee Tracy's superbly subtle portrait of the ex-President; study Henry Fonda's liberal intellectual, a bit too funny and a bit too clever to suit the average housewife (or so the national committeewoman tells him) but a man of troubled and groping soul, too aware of the many sides of issues, too conscious of the hearts of others; above all, savor Cliff Robertson's creation of a frightening human dynamo of evil, dominating the screen with a ferocious and righteous passion. Take note too of Kevin McCarthy, Ann Sothern, Edie Adams, every member of the cast-it's a fine opportunity to watch the pros at work.

Otherwise the week's offerings are to laugh-and I mean at, rather than with. Off you can go to deepest Africa with Lew Cody and Blanche Sweetoops, sorry, wrong era-it's Robert Mitchum and Carroll Baker: understandable error, though, with "Mister Moses," an archaic rehash of the chestnut about the gin-swilling diamondsmuggler who gets conned by the missionary's pure daughter into playing Great White Father to the child-like natives. The laughs lie in the tasteless idiocy of this latter-day Exodus.

It's up to you to find the laughs in "I'd Rather Be Rich," a frilly construction for fans of Maurice Chevalier, Sandra Dee, Robert Goulet (who gets to sing only the title song), Andy Williams (making his screen debut) and Hermione Gingold (given nothing to chew on). The mess was a mite merrier back in 1941, when screenwriters Norman Krasna, and Leo Townsend came up with a similar setup called "It Started with Eve" that co-starred Deanna Durbin and Charles

Laughton.

For the rest you can choose between Frankie Avalon in "Ski Party." a beach-party bit to chill you, wherein the boys dress up like girls to discover the secret of sex appeal, and Elvis Presley in "Tickle Me," wherein Elvis is a traveling bronc-buster roped into service at a beauty-spa dude ranch. The choice, of course, is from Hobson and hunger.

Shades of Sherlock Holmes!

With the aid of British television, Scotland Yard calls on civilians in its fight against crime

On a Saturday evening in London, millions of TV armchair detectives watched, entranced, as the exciting story of a daring jailbreak was unfolded. The prisoner had simply climbed to freedom on a steel-andrope ladder, brazenly tossed over the prison wall by outside confederates, and had driven off in a stolen van.

Just another mystery thriller? Not at all. The escapee, Ronald Biggs, was not a fictional character, but a living member of the Great Train Robbery gang. His spectacular exploit was being related on *Police Five*, a program presented under the auspices of Scotland Yard. Clues found at the scene of a crime are shown to the British public, in hope of turning up new information for the police.

In this instance, the ladder had been left behind. Police Five viewers were shown a tiny piece of tape found on one of the metal clamps used to hold the rungs of the ladder. The word black was written on it. Who or what was black? What did the little piece of tape mean? A local police number was given, and any viewer with information was asked to call at once.

Soon after, a caller identified Black as a shopkeeper who sold ladders. Police asked Black to go through a group of mug shots. He quickly picked out the man who had purchased the ladder. The information gave Scotland Yard the lead it needed to identify the gang operating the jailbreaks. However, Biggs himself so far has eluded recapture.

Every week *Police Five* draws its audience into an exciting game of cops and robbers. Time for the show is donated by London's independent channel, ATV, while the material is provided by Scotland Yard, which has jurisdiction over London police.

Almost every type of crime is dealt with, ranging from juvenile misbehavior to murder. The former can sometimes become a serious matter, as in a situation where a noisy group of youths, riding on the top of a double-decker bus, were disturbing other passengers. The conductor (London's double-deckers have both a driver and a conductor) went up to quiet them. Although the boys obeyed for a while, they soon began to act up again. As the conductor went up the stairs a second time, one of the youths kicked him in the face with a pointed shoe. They then fled. The conductor was so severely injured that he lost the sight of an eye. The next Saturday, the assault was described on Police Five.

A call came from a 16-year-old girl passenger who had seen the entire incident, and knew who the boys were. She had not come forward before seeing *Police Five* because she hadn't realized how badly the conductor had been hurt. The hoodlums were arrested and convicted.

Because such immediacy is vital, former actor Shaw Taylor, who produces, writes and is the commentator on the program, prepares the script for *Police Five* only three hours ahead of time. He selects four or five current crimes, with the advice of Scotland Yard's press bureau, and then consults with the detectives on the cases. The script is passed by Scotland Yard, which takes full re-


sponsibility for it, and broadcast against a huge photographed backdrop of London as seen from the main crime room of the Yard.


Witnesses can turn up in unexpected ways. Recently, when a hijacked truck was recovered empty, police figured that it must have been unloaded on a Sunday in Birmingham, a city north of London. Such activity on the Sabbath is a very unusual occurrence in England; and Taylor, who also does a *Police Five* show on Mondays from Birmingham, asked viewers if any of them had witnessed men working on a truck on Sunday.

The next morning a Birmingham housewife described *Police Five* to a neighbor, who had not seen it. The second woman interrupted excitedly to say that *she* had watched a truck being unloaded that Sunday, that there was also a car parked right behind it. She had made a mental note of the license plate on the car. She telephoned the police, who traced the car and apprehended the hijackers.

Even seemingly minor clues can elicit valuable information. During a brawl a man was hurt by an unknown assailant. At the scene, police found a pair of steel-rimmed glasses with one lens cracked, the other intact. The glasses were sent to the lab in the hope that they might prove to be a useful clue. The lab reported that one lens had a prescription in it, but that the other was plain glass, and pointed out that it was extremely rare to have this particular prescription in one eye while the other eve was normal. On Police Five, Taylor showed the glasses and mentioned this oddity. A witness came forward who recognized the glasses. The owner did indeed have such a prescription in only one eye-because the other eye was glass!

Scotland Yard thinks highly of the program. Says an official: "It allows us to let the public know that we need their help, and tells them what type of crime is going on, what to look for, how they can be useful."





RICHARD THE GOOD

Nothing seems to bug him
—not even his
own limited success

I am watching them make pictures on the old "St. Joe" Western street on a fine sunny day at CBS Studio Center in Studio City, Cal. It is the first shot of the first show of the fourth season of an immensely successful ABC-TV family shoot-'emup called *The Big Valley*; a simple shot, but, judging by the people and paraphernalia, it looks as if what they had in mind was a small Central American revolution.

Here comes the director now, threading his way confidently through a phantasmagoric clutter of arcs, reflectors, cables, booms, grips, juicers, sound mixers, gingham-clad supers and Old Injun Whisky posters. He is an uncommonly handsome fellow dressed in yellow corduroy jacket, tan Levi's and brown suede shoes

with sponge-rubber soles. He nods to his first assistant, Bob White; narrowly avoids collision with a cadre of wranglers, horses and a farm wagon two-up; salaams pleasantly to a couple of front-office types, here to see that "The 25 Graves of Midas" gets off to a flying start; has a whispered conference with Miss Anne Baxter, guest-starring today as "Hannah"; and peers intently through his Bausch & Lomb range finder, which he wears like a hippie medallion.

This director looks like an actor. He is. He is Richard Long, the one-time movie-juvenile-turned-instant-TV-hero, best known for a long tenancy in the Bourbon Street Beats and 77 Sunset Strips of another era. He is one of the lucky ones. He is doing what leading men have often said they wanted to do most—direct.

"Cool, intelligent, bright!" insists Arthur Gardner, one-third of the production team of Levy-Gardner-Lavan which birthed and nurtured Long's directorial career. "If we didn't need him so much as an actor, he'd make a fine director. I mean, he's—good!"

Richard the Good. Very very good. Old Calm, Collected, Steady, Dependable. No fuss, no muss. His nerves, like his pompadour, never become unraveled. Nothing bugs him. Not producers who want to turn out TV shows like sausages. Not actors who figure "the system" treads all over their sensibilities. Not budgets so anemic they have virtually turned rehearsal into a lost art. Not the aggravations of a six-day shooting schedule, nor the airplanes that ruin the take, nor even his dear friend, Peter Breck, that charming poseur of the saddle, with his tendency to play to the gallery and the girls, and spook his horse at the wrong moment.

"An insane business!" chortles Long. "But I have a great deal of respect for it. I see it as a job, a craft. That part turns me on."

This may be lucky for Long, who has always been discomfited by the

prospect of stardom. "The whole idea of becoming an enormous star is frightening. I look at it this way. Story-telling is a marvelous recess for the human race. Back in the Stone Age there was some guy sitting on a rock telling stories. I'm that guy sitting on the rock."


Dick Long did not really seek out acting; but, it having sought out him, he accepted it gracefully. He was 17 at the time, doing a play back in 1945 at Hollywood High School, when the talent scout came along, eager to put him in a Universal-International picture with Claudette Colbert called "Tomorrow Is Forever." "I didn't know what the hell was happening to me," he recalls. "Then, right in the middle of a scene with Orson Welles, it dawned on me: Kid, you're making pictures!"

The producer, Bill Goetz, called him "the most remarkable find since Lew Ayres in 'All Quiet on the Western Front.'" Long was embarrassed. "Like it helped to get a table in a chic restaurant. I never pressed too hard. It wasn't in my nature."

His father was an aspiring artist who couldn't see starving in a garret when he had six children to support. In the early days he did oil portraits of movie stars in the Pantages Hollywood Theater lobby. Later he kicked around Chicago, a commercial-art center (where Richard was born), and came back to Hollywood in the early Forties to become art director for a manufacturing concern.

When his fifth child began to make it in show business, there was a feeling of unreality about it that persists even today in son Richard. Dick spent 11 years at U-I. He is hardpressed to remember the names of most of the pictures he made. The real drama occurred off the screen. He fell in love with a spirited young actress named Suzan Ball, one of the up-and-coming U-I group which included David Janssen, Clint East-

wood, George Nader, Mamie Van Doren, Barbara Rush and Rock Hudson. Shortly after the courtship started, it-was discovered that she had cancer, and Dick was swept along in the kind of lump-throated public tragedy that robbed him of the privacy to grieve.

When the doctors announced that she would have to lose a leg, the press inundated the world in moistly sentimental stories. GRIM FIGHT FOR LIFE JEOPARDIZES HAPPINESS, warned one headline. DICK SAYS HE'LL MARRY SUZAN ANYWAY, cried another. I'LL WALK DOWN THE AISLE, VOWS SUZAN, promised another. He did and she did, but in the end she lost her "grim fight" and was buried in her wedding gown.

Today he says of it: "We all lose, and you have to be prepared for that. You learn from it. You have to allow it to happen. There is a suffering period and life goes on again."

In 1957 he married again and drew another kind of press fire. She was the high-spirited Mara Corday, the actress and one-time model who had come up through the "Vanities" chorus line, a forthright free-swinger who vaguely resembled and indeed had been a friend of Suzan's. She believed that when a man and a woman had differences, it was best to get them out in the open. They squabbled, fought, separated and sued for divorce so many times that it began to play like comedy. Both consulted psychiatrists. Both proclaimed their love for each other. In 1961, Mara, carried away in the heat of a battle, called the cops and impulsively declared that he had "tried to strangle" her. His brother-in-law, Marshall (Daktari) Thompson, married to his sister Barbara, arrived with the bail, Dick and Mara kissed and made up. "Didn't really mean it," she said as she dropped the charges.

The wonder of it is that the relationship is as solid and touchingly quiescent as it is today. They are, as the saying goes, nuts about each other.

Wondrous, too, is the fact that so little of this less-controlled but more human Richard Long has rubbed off on the public image. "If it had," suggests a close friend, "we might be talking about the new Clark Gable." Says Mara with characteristic honesty: "His defenses are up. He's afraid of what people might think. The squeaky wheel gets the grease. He does not squeak."

His good friends know that privately he squeaks good, Basically conservative, he supports the Administration's stand in Vietnam and can be extremely vocal about it. He can appreciate the student protest movement but thinks it's "juvenile unless they offer an alternative." He is not a churchgoer but says he is "not an atheist either. If you build a church you ought to build it here," he explains, tapping his forehead. It maddens him when people think him incapable of anger. "I can be aroused," says Dick. "A couple of belts," says Mara, "and the pendulum swings."

There is something else that sometimes happens at *intime* cocktail parties, too. It is Richard, the nonatheist, suddenly asking, "God, why

are we here?"

A good question. But one which he stopped asking about television years ago. Four years, to be exact. It was at the time The Big Valley pilot was shot. Dick was all fired up. He had played a lovable scoundrel called Gentleman Jack Darby in the very successful Maverick series, and he wanted to play Jarrod Barkley in somewhat the same kicky manner. But the management was not interested in roguishness, not when it could have nobleness. And nobleness is what Dick gave them.

"There's a certain nobility in it, at that," muses another friend. "It is the nobility of being content to be exactly what you are."

THE WONDROUS ANDY GRIFFITH TV MACHINE

Second of two parts

THE WHEELS KEEP TURNING

Though Griffith has left town, it'll be business as usual in profitable ol' Mayberry

For one last time, Sheriff Andy Taylor stood silhouetted against the jail-cell mock-up on Stage 1 at the Desilu Studios, a six-pointed silver star pinned to the left breast of his gabardine uniform. Flanking him before the color cameras were Goober Pyle, the goof-ball filling station attendant; and farmer Sam Jones, the latest arrival in Mayberry. Amidst a mood of melancholy, actors Andy Griffith, George Lindsey and Ken Berry tried extra hard to keep in character.

Just a single take was required for Griffith to deliver his final line, the immortal words: "Are you gonna see her again?" Several minutes later, at precisely 4:31 P.M. on Feb. 21, 1968, The Andy Griffith Show became history. No longer would the likable comedian be regularly seen dispensing homespun homilies and provincial wisdom, save for several lame-duck appearances on his successor's show next season.

He had concluded an eight-year tenure among the mythical denizens of Mayberry, N.C., a fictitious community which almost seemed real. There was no doubting the authenticity of the program's impact. It had annually been found among the Top 10 in the Nielsen ratings.

"We were a fine company," Andy observed, removing the sheriff's badge in his dressing room. "We're all going to miss one another."

His incumbency had been one of the most prosperous in television history, in terms of both ratings and financial rewards. Although he never acted like one, Griffith had emerged a bona-fide millionaire. Furthermore, the national Nielsens published only two weeks before had listed his show

as the most popular on the air. Like heavyweight boxer Rocky Marciano, he had stepped down undefeated. Now it was time to celebrate his retirement.

Among the 251 invited guests who assembled the same night at Lakeside Country Club were such renowned Mayberry alumni as Don Knotts and Jim Nabors. Young Ronny Howard, a kindergarten student when he started the series, was ready to enroll as a high school freshman. The crew-cut hair of series creator Sheldon Leonard had turned a salt-and-pepper gray.

The presence of Leonard's avuncular partner, comedian Danny Thomas, and virtually everyone else associated with the program, made the gathering resemble a family conclave. All of them enjoyed a feast served from a buffet table laden with jumbo shrimps and slices of prime rib. Ironically, not a turnip green, hominy grit or black-eyed pea was within sight.

Mounting a makeshift stage, Leonard wistfully recalled the 1959 midnight meeting at Manhattan's Plaza Hotel, during which he first outlined his concept for the understated com-

edy to Andy. He explained how the series had spun off from The Danny Thomas Show several months later and metamorphosed into a resounding hit the following fall.


Tears welled in the corners of Andy's blue eyes as he mounted the platform to thunderous applause and shook hands with the master of ceremonies, his long-time personal manager Richard O. Linke. Rather than chance a maudlin display, he had decided to make his farewell address to the troops short and succinct.

"Well, it's been awfully good," he said. "It's been the best eight years of my life. I'll see ya again."

The subsequent largess accorded Andy visibly embarrassed him. Each member of the cast and crew had contributed to the \$800 cost of a gleaming, 12-gauge Beretta shotgun. He also received a silver cigaret case inscribed with all of their signatures. The Benton & Bowles advertising agency presented him with a wooden music box containing a composite of eight years of Nielsen ratings emblazoned on its lid. The whistling "Theme for Andy Griffith" played when the cover was opened.

"Did I do the right thing?" Andy wondered to himself, reflecting on his decision to quit. "Should I have gone on?"

Curtailment of his television activities had come after years of soulsearching. "He could have continued at a fantastic amount of money," Linke observed. "I could have gotten more than a million a year in two minutes. I could have made another two-year deal with one phone call."



The party at Lakeside had been officially tendered by Mayberry Enterprises, one of the many corporate arms of the Andy Griffith TV Machine. But actually it was Linke who had planned the entire send-off—supervising the invitations, arranging for Les Brown's 17-piece orchestra to provide dance music, and designing a souvenir key chain adorned with a miniature Mayberry sheriff's badge that each of the guests received.

The nostalgic evening was one of several similar events in which he had recently participated, all of them testimonials to the success of the machine. Late last year Nabors and Griffith gratefully spent \$6000 for a blacktie birthday commemorating Linke's 50th birthday. Some 170 well-wishers gawked at an imposing two-tier cake identical to the one baked for Frank Sinatra's 50th birthday, symbolic evidence of Linke's eminence in statusconscious Hollywood.

Until recently, few people outside of show business were aware of Linke, despite the fact that he was possibly the only personal manager in his \rightarrow

profession to retain a personal press agent. But he was highly regarded

among those who counted.

"I can pick up the phone and get to the president of CBS in two minutes," boasted Linke, whose enviable track record includes two No.-1 rated specials and another which earned the second position, in addition to his role in developing the Griffith and Gomer Pyle series.

The Nation at large became more closely acquainted with Linke last March on The Joey Bishop Show, where each of his seven clients assembled to observe his 25th anniversary in show business. In a backstage dressing room, prior to the show, the group swapped mischievous anecdotes about their mentor.

"If he says something real good to somebody on the phone, he'll wink at the phone," Andy recalled. He also exposed Linke's irritating habit of babbling nervous small talk just before Andy's stage entrances at supperclub and personal appearances.

"It drives me right up the wall," Andy complained good-naturedly.

But as air time for the Bishop show approached, most of his clients were displaying the same nervousness for which they had criticized Linke.

Andy hastily stuffed wads of tissue into his nostrils, attempting to stem a psychosomatic nose bleed. Recently returned from a Caribbean vacation shortened by a dose of food poisoning, Nabors impatiently brushed specks of lint off his double-breasted serge suit. "This thing catches everything but money and women," he groused. "The cleaners just murdered it."

Jerry Van Dyke, who had lost his banjo en route, discovered that he was wearing a pair of mismatched black socks—one an anklet, the other knee length. Griffith, Van Dyke and Ronnie Schell restlessly paced the dressing room as perspiration stained their blue broadcloth shirts. The on-camera show exemplified the type of family entertainment long advocated by Linke. What took place seemed more like a living room divertissement than a panegyric. Nabors and Griffith sat around telling stories. Blonde Maggie Peterson, wearing a new \$300 wig, harmonized with them on "Down in the Valley." Ken Berry offered a song and tap dance in between comedy recitations by Schell and Larry Hovis.

Near the end of the program, Linke announced that he would contribute all of his clients' salaries for the show to the Boys Home of the South in Greenville, S. C. Miss Peterson gasped. She was counting on the money to

pay for her wig.

Seated in the Jimmy Durante Room at the Villa Capri restaurant two hours later, all of the principals participated in a peculiar Hollywood rite—watching themselves in a taped replay of the show on a color television screen. They took great relish in applauding each other's segments.

One of the more enthusiastic observers was Danny Thomas's daughter, Terry Thomas, who held Nabors snugly around the waist and cheered wildly after her frequent escort sang an adenoidal ballad.

But nobody received greater applause than Linke himself. A frustrated song-and-dance man, he had forsaken a performing career years before when he lost a Summit, N.J., amateur contest to a spoon player.

"Sell it, baby," shouted Ken Berry, as he watched Linke trip across the stage in black patent leather shoes, attempting a soft-shoe number.

There was good reason for Berry's fervor. As Linke's latest protege, the slump-shouldered veteran of F Troop had recently been selected to replace Griffith as the principal figure in Mayberry R.F.D.—the fall series spawned by The Andy Griffith Show.

Linke had become convinced that

Berry was a cross between Fred Astaire and Fred MacMurray after scouting him on a Carol Burnett show. Now, Berry was a 15-percent owner of Mayberry R.F.D. and potentially Linke's third major star.

"When I saw an opening for my new client," says Linke, referring to Berry's placement into Mayberry, "I ran with the ball and scored a touchdown." Before kicking the extra point, however, he had to contend with some

red-dogging CBS executives.

Initially, there had been no trouble selling the network on a sequel to the *Griffith* series that would retain the same folksy quality and understated humor of its progenitor. "They were buying a winning team," Linke explained.

CBS eagerly approved the pilot script for Mayberry R.F.D. written by Robert Ross, producer of the Griffith Show. It firmly established Berry's character—farmer Sam Jones, a wid-

ower with a young son who becomes head of the Mayberry town council. Griffith, of course, also played a widower left with an adolescent child.

An important character in the pilot episode was Mario Vincente, an Italian farmer whom Jones had known during the Korean war and had invited to help him work the farm. Linke had signed handsome Italian actor Gabrielle Tinti to play the role, certain that he would generate sex appeal for the vast female audience.

The pilot film took seven days to shoot, at a cost of \$150,000. But long before it was broadcast last April 1, CBS began having second thoughts about the premature scuttling of such familiar characters as county clerk Howard Sprague, handy man Emmett Clark and Aunt Bee, Andy's aunt and housekeeper.

The network now demanded a carbon copy of the *Griffith Show* that would enable viewers to identify \rightarrow

with their old Mayberry favorites, rather than introduce a new group of regulars and thereby risk losing the existing audience. Tinti, and the actors who played his father and sister, would have to be jettisoned.

Co-producer and 50-percent owner of the new series along with Griffith, Linke originally felt the Italian was indispensable. Pressured by CBS, he vacillated between endorsing the network's revamped proposal or follow-

ing the initial plan.

Late one afternoon last March, Sheldon Leonard stormed into Linke's office to discuss the alternatives. His face had the same malevolent look he had employed in dozens of Grade-B gangster movies in the Forties.

As creator of the Griffith Show and co-executive producer of Gomer Pule, Leonard enjoyed the major voice in policy matters. But now he owned only a token 10 percent of Mayberry, the same slice retained by his silent partner, Danny Thomas. Although he could only counsel, rather than implement unilateral demands, he informed Linke in no uncertain terms that the Italian family must remain.

"What you need to make a series work is conflict," he advised. "A series needs problems. You should not bring in more characters, but more

sources of trouble."

Linke straightened his Y'vel of Beverly Hills tie. "CBS is running scared," he assured Leonard. "We're not."

"Don't let them ruin your show," Leonard pleaded, "Do you have creative control? Then tell them where to get off. They can't yank you [from the fall schedule]. They'll have to pay vou [off]."

impassioned argument Leonard's went ignored. As commander-in-chief, Linke decided to adopt the CBS suggestions and populate Mayberry R.F.D. with as many old familiar faces as possible. Gabrielle Tinti was paid \$20,000 to stay home in Rome.

"We are eliminating every possible risk according to network statistics," Linke explained, "We're not taking any chances. It'll be business as usual in Mayberry."

Much of his confidence stemmed from the network decision to install Mayberry in Andy's customary Monday-night-at-9 time slot, sandwiched between two ratings heavyweights-Lucy and Family Affair. He held an additional trump card. If the show falters in its early episodes, the four guest appearances Griffith has contracted to make presumably will be scheduled during the weeks when Nielsen ratings are computed.

Meanwhile, Linke was busily touting Andy's replacement. "Ken Berry will be my next big star," he predicted. "He's similar to Andy. They're both shy and retiring. When I first met each of them, they didn't know their potential. They both have great warmth, which you can't buy. Andy, to this day, still doesn't know the great appeal he has to women, And I know Ken has the same appeal."

To ensure Berry's viability, a big build-up is already under way. Newspapers are being flooded with color photographs and glowing publicity releases. The promotional campaign will reach a crescendo during the month of August, when Linke escorts Berry on a good-will tour of a dozen cities. The trip will end with a press conference in a private room at Sardi's restaurant in New York, the identical site where Linke first unveiled Griffith before 50 television editors eight years ago. Berry's ascendancy will be made official at the moment that Griffith, standing at his side, hands him the microphone-the scepter of his office.

"Supposedly, lightning never strikes twice," Linke observes. "In my case it happened twice. Now it's gonna happen a third time. I have the formula-the formula like on Andy Griffith. And I'm gonna put it to work." [END]


