

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as we see it

■ It has been, withal, a rather unusual summer, marked by three rather encouraging developments.

For one, the networks appear to have discovered that America's racial crisis is not to be dismissed with an occasional Sunday-afternoon documentary. ABC and CBS have made concerted and generally successful efforts to expose the problems in depth and to discuss possible solutions. These were serious, well-planned, carefully produced series of programs which by the very act of informing the audience were bound to have had a beneficial effect. And let us not forget NET's important contribution with its continuing Black Journal series.

■ We were also offered two quite pleasant new variety shows. One featured Joey Heatherton and Frank Sinatra Jr., the other Glen Campbell, a young man who seems better qualified than anyone else to bridge the musical generation gap. We also had *The Prisoner*, a fascinating, too-brief series starring Patrick McGoohan. These three provided welcome oases in a summer desert of reruns and rejects.

Finally, after the initial self-condemnation that followed the tragic assassination of Senator Kennedy, television authorities took some longneeded action regarding violence on the home screens. Realizing that while fictional violence may not be the basic cause of the current atmosphere of violence it cannot help but contribute to it, the three networks told their writers and producers to cut down on violence for the sake of violence. We'll still have fights and even murders when they are necessary to the plot of a drama, but there will be-we are promised-no more mayhem for shock value alone. It's a step forward.

HITCH YOUR WAGON TO A ROCK

I have, for many years now, been an assiduous watcher of television programs.

On occasion, of course, this has been simply for pleasure. Like anyone else, I have laughed heartily at Ed Sullivan's more subtle witticisms and enjoyed the sharp realism of Batman. I have appreciated the sociological implications of Gilligan's Island and delighted in the homespun philosophy of The Untouchables.

But television has meant more to me than pleasure. It has been an unfailing source of education to me. It has led me into all the obscure byways of the human spirit and taught me to understand my fellowman. And it has never done this better than by presenting me with little puzzles.

I wonder, for instance, how many others, in addition to myself, have made the rather astonishing discovery that in every single episode of Mission: Impossible our doughty band of Good Guys has won out over the villain and foiled the forces of evil? Have you noticed the same is true on every single episode of The Avengers? Gunsmoke? Star Trek? I Spy?

Perhaps you have been confused by the fact that there are different heroes on each different program and have therefore failed to notice this unusual thread of consistency? Or perhaps you have indeed noticed it but have dismissed it as mere coincidence.

You may have said to yourself, "Think of that: Marshal Dillon has

the Bad Guy in jail again; that's the 326th time in a row." And then, perhaps, you said, "Just luck, I guess," and let it go at that.

But how could it be just luck? I admit that if Marshal Dillon had won, say, a hundred times in a row it might have been just luck. An expert in the mathematical theory of probability, using the technological language of that field, would have said, "That's the way the ball bounces."

But 326 times in a row goes too far. That is no longer coincidence but must be something else. Add to it, what's more, the 72 times in a row that Batman has won out; the 58 times that Maxwell Smart has won out; the 54 times that John Steed has won out; the 302 times that Perry Mason has won out; the—but why go on with Tarzan, Mr. Lucky, Peter Gunn, Bat Masterson, Amos Burke, and all the others?

You may say that each case is different and that each case must be considered separately, but you would be wrong. I can prove that with a little mathematics.

We begin by saying: "Let X be the Good Guy." That means that instead of calling them by 50 different names, we call them all by a single name: "X." You see how they are no longer different? (Where would we logical, incisive thinkers be without mathematics?)

Having done that, then, a little elementary calculation will show you that X has won out, by actual count \rightarrow

(I have the figures right here in front of me) 42,375 times.

Think of that! When's the last time you threw 42,375 sevens in a row? When's the last time you won 42,375 poker hands in a row? When's the last time 42,375 girls said "yes" to you one after the other?

Think of it that way and what may have seemed a mere accident

becomes significant.

Vaguely, as I gathered my statistics, I began to realize that something must lie behind it all. But what? Is television trying to tell us that Good always wins over Evil? Well, of course! Is it trying to tell us that the Good Guy always shoots a little faster, hits a little harder, thinks a little smarter? Naturally!

Assuming you're a Good Guy, don't you shoot a little faster, hit a little harder and think a little smarter than the next guy? And you get the girl,

too, every time, don't you?

I suppose there are some individuals who are not Good Guys. They may lack the classic profile; those tall, lean, good looks; that attractive manner of speech that the rest of us have. Well, then, surely television can do nothing nobler than to give them a mark to shoot at.

That is the function of television, and I honor the men who run it for working so hard at it. They are expressing in the most strenuous fashion that fundamental aspiration of all humanity—the urge to be a success.

Or at least that is the way it seemed to me before the beginning of this summer season that has just passed. Then came a new show, *The Prisoner*, starring Patrick McGoohan.

I had no sooner heard the announcement than I made up my mind to watch it. McGoohan had starred in Secret Agent, which had always been a sterling item in the mass-

aspiration for success. Week after week I had watched him take on the most extraordinary villains with the odds stacked against him. He ran the most incredible risks, suffered the most fearsome dangers, survived assault and battery in all its forms, and yet managed to win every time.

And what was his reward for all this? It hardly seems possible, but for merely risking his life, limbs and sanity, he was permitted to do it all over again the next week.

So I settled back to watch Mr. Mc-Goohan foil the villains again.

In the first program, our Hero (he was called "The Prisoner," I noted, which is an odd name; it would sound better if they used his full name and called him Theodore Prisoner, I think) resigned from the British secret service. I wasn't worried; he was going to be a double agent.

Then he got captured, but I wasn't worried. He would escape. I kept looking at my watch and chuckling. In 10 minutes he would escape; now in only five minutes, four minutes, three minutes. I was overwhelmed at the ingenuity of the writers, for he had only one minute left and there was no sign of an escape yet.

He didn't escape. You won't believe me, but he didn't. I was thunder-struck!

Could it be a two-parter? Surely

he would escape next week.

He didn't escape. The Bad Guys

had these huge spheres that—oh, well, he didn't escape.

The next week he didn't escape either. Week after week he didn't escape. To be sure, he won some minor skirmishes. For instance, he never told them why he left the secret service.

But we, the audience, never found out either. We never found out anything. We never found out where the place was where Theodore Prisoner was being held prisoner, or who ran it, or why it was run, or who everybody else was, or why they wanted to know why he resigned, or anything.

Failure, failure, failure! Theodore P. failed. He never got out. We failed.

We never understood.

I took the matter up with my young daughter, who is 13 and highly regarded throughout her junior high school for her keen perception. "How do you explain it?" I asked.

"Well," she said, thoughtfully, "I think that Mr. McGoohan is trying to portray the plight of modern man trapped in a conventional society that he is incapable of altering and yet from which he cannot escape. The Number 2 villain changes each week, as do many of his fellow prisoners, to show that although society superficially alters as different men come to power, it remains always a prison for individuality, as is indicated by the fact that the protagonist does not even have a name but is known only as The Prisoner. It means—"

But I sighed and walked away. Poor child! She is bright for her age but she lacks the necessary sophistication to grasp the deeper meanings. She, too, had failed——

And I believe it was then that I grasped the point. Failure! That was

the key!

What is so noble about success? How many people can be successful? To be successful, you must work and slave and even then you may not make it. How few are successful; how many aren't!

To preach a drive for success is to preach human inequality and that is

undemocratic!

In a blinding flash, the words of a tender and touching ballad came to me: "It takes a million dollars to be a millionaire,

But a pauper can be poor without a cent!"

That was it. We can't all succeed, but we can all fail; and in this common, universal failure we can find the brotherhood of man we all seek, the true equality at last.

This is a new age we live in. The old shibboleths are gone. Let us, all of us together, with Patrick McGoohan showing us the way, backtrack to failure. Let us shamble along the leaden road to obscurity, head sunk low. Let us, all of us together, aspire to the depths, grasp for the ground, hitch our wagon to a rock, and look the other way when opportunity knocks.

Is it any wonder that *The Prisoner* proved a tremendously popular program? Surely you wouldn't have thought so. Can you think of a single confusing, obscure novel that has become famous? Or a single piece of poetry of this type? A single play? Artistic production?

Well, then, *The Prisoner* can't have become popular because it was obscure and confusing. It must be popular because it cracks the old undemocratic folly of success for the few; because it points the way to comfortable attainment of failure for every-

body.


My young daughter, when I enthusiastically explained this to her, pointed out that if I were to write this thesis in the form of an article and sell it, I would be cutting myself off from humanity by being successful.


I had to smile faintly at her naivete. Poor dear! She was obviously too young to see that I had passed on to the next stage: I was even failing to achieve failure, and that was the ultimate failure of all.

PAINTING WITH TELEVISION

The screen is Nam June Paik's canvas for his startling creations







When most viewers twist their look-alike little knobs on their look-alike TV sets, they tune in a handful of look-alike programs—sent from afar, packaged and ready-made in half a dozen formats. But when artist Nam June Paik flicks his switch, he becomes master of 1,200,000 color dots. Cameraman, director, programmer alike, this "Michelangelo of electronic art" can produce:

A floating eerie rainbow, a gyrating ray of neon light, colored Slinky-Toy accordion coils jumping rope, or a soap-opera star framed by a kaleido-scope of images in an Op arrangement of colors. All this without commercials.

The 36-year-old Korean-born wiring wizard, until now known largely only in the art world, creates his own infinite range of "shows" out of 19-inch color TV wrecks that repairmen snub. By now, Paik has rescued more than two dozen from junkyards and resurrected them into art works—a do-it-yourself game show that may be the electronic wave of the future.

Paik rewires the sets, then attaches an audio generator to the top. This mechanism deliberately distorts the images of normal reception. And

so art and TV technology make a new medium that can produce genuinely beautiful pictures, an underwater ballet or a surrealistic silly-putty face from the commercial fare sent by Madison Avenue via Hollywood.

For his late-spring exhibition at New York City's Galeria Bonino, Paik demonstrated the ease with which the folks at home can shift pictures. He turned one or two amplifier knobs on different sets, twirled buttons on the back, or let the visitor wave a weighty magnet a few inches away from the front. The knob-turning caused the colored lights to weave about, dance and move in many ways; the passing magnet interacted to make the over-all picture become a smoky abstract scene.


"I prefer that people do it themselves," the artist avers. He'd like to see his art-game as widespread as the everyday TV model. [Mr. Paik is an electronics expert as well as being an artist. The average viewer should stay away from the inside of his television set, which is an extremely dangerous instrument unless he is an electronics expert, too.—ED.]


Despite the far-out sound of Paik's pictures, the artist describes his TV "drawings" much the way traditional artists talk of work with paint and pen. Looking at the patterned screens, he smiles proudly as a plant-like form springs up from the "soil." "It's like an oriental drawing," he says as he twirls more buttons and the form begins to grow. "Here's a flower. You can make the flower have many leaves." Instantaneously, the blossom opens.

Paik started working with electronic music a dozen years ago. He mastered its engineering techniques, then moved on to this new field, which he likens to "an electronic minuet." Artists' \rightarrow









love of light is, of course, not new. For five centuries painters have used darklight illumination, the color spectrum, and, lately, more technical notions in kinetic (motion) art. Art museums daily show works with electrically moving parts—these perform both by plan and by accident in the random art form called the Happening.

"Anything that makes something more beautiful is art," Paik says in defense of such experiments.

A restless writer, musician, teacher, technician (with a Rockefeller Grant at the Stony Brook campus of New York State University), Paik finds television's everyday image too static. "It bores me," he says. "In a way TV makes you nervous. But this soothes you." He points to the hypnotically shifting and floating abstract images. "It's like a tranquilizer."

"Art and TV are no longer two different things," is Paik's credo. "Some day artists will work with capacitors, resistors and conductors as they work today with brushes, violins and junk." On that day, you can swap Hoss Cartwright for an evershifting Paik color ballet. [END]

Funny faces and fanciful forms are the programming in Paik's novel use of the TV medium. The sculptor himself, a Korean-born musician turned artist and teacher, appears in profile (bottom, center) before one creation. In his work, on-screen faces have undergone the silly-putty treatment of his special wiring. They bobble and bend like a Pop artist satirizing the everyday world of soap opera and corny commercials. Some screens distort images. Others simply create abstract designs, Another (see bottom at far left), not even electronic, is a piece of Pop sculpture (in collaboration with another artist, Christo): a TV set bound, blinded and gagged in rope and plastic. These relics of the junkyard, recast by an imaginative artist, cost less than most color TVs.

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
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

Candidates Unlikely to Debate

Failure of the Hubert Humphrey-Eugene McCarthy TV debate to materialize on the eve of the Democratic Convention-even though three networks offered simultaneous prime time for it-strengthened a view in some TV quarters that debates between the Presidential contenders are unlikely this fall. The Vice President bowed out of the confrontation with the Senator, citing the "sensitive international situation" and demands by George McGovern and Lester Maddox to be included in any debate. McCarthy's campaign manager, Blair Clark, immediately charged that Humphrey just did "not want the debate." The front runners all have agreed to debates-provided Congress suspends the equal-time rule. Congress, now in recess, hasn't seen fit vet to lift it. The broadcasters, itching to get the candidates before their cameras, have ignored the rule and invited the office seekers to appear on "special editions," in prime time, of regularly scheduled interview shows, which are exempt from equal time. Except for a McCarthy-Bobby Kennedy confrontation during the California primary, the candidates have ducked the gambit. NET has invited Richard Nixon to debate his Democratic opponent on a special NET Journal, whether the equal-time rule is lifted or not. As of a few days ago, the Republican nominee had not replied.

Many a TV networker, sweating out brain-racking preparations to televise the Democratic Convention, probably wondered-if he had an instant for reflection-why he got into such an occupation. Beset by Chicago labor troubles and dangers of angry street demonstrations. TV newsmen had to cope simultaneously with the sudden focus of world concern on the agony of Czechoslovakia as well as the succession of heart attacks suffered by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. Then there was Pope Paul VI whose arrival in Colombia and subsequent attendance at the 39th International Eucharistic Congress in Bogota had to be covered and then relaved by satellite. Meanwhile, the networks had their hands full switching between politics and Prague. One night CBS even had to cut away from a Nixon paid political program to report United Nations Security Council deliberations on the Czech crisis.

To add to the networks' never-rainsbut-it-pours situation, George Wallace let it be known he expects TV coverage of a contemplated threehour "convention" of his third party, which, to compound the TV problem, might be staged in mid-September, knocking out some new-season premieres. The networks would not be duty bound under Federal rules to cover the convention. But they're worried that if, in fairness to Wallace, they air his "acceptance" speech, a dozen or so major and minor candidates might demand equal time. CBS has tossed the question to the Federal Communications Commission.

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

This is the network-movie rerun week for the screaming meemies and you might as well settle for the one movie that gives you them intentionally rather than the other five that offer them as an unintended byproduct.

It takes a stouthearted strongstomached mystery-horror fan (and I happen to be one) to take the screams and the meemies induced by "Hush ... Hush, Sweet Charlotte," a no-holdsbarred wallow in a good old-fashioned blood-and-gore Gothic tale, with the light and shadow of twisted souls writhing in mutual animosity and flailing out in astonishing double-twist final revelations. Above all, such old pros as Bette Davis, Olivia de Havilland, Agnes Moorehead, Joseph Cotten and Mary Astor are on hand to make every bit of mayhem, every crash of glass and every succulent scream a chiller. And the photography is simply superb.

From thereon down, 'way down, is a quintet of films that can't even qualify as perfectly awful, so filled are they with imperfections of plot, performance and production.

On the teen-age front, there's "The Lively Set," a deadly sort of Andy Hardy meets a Gas Turbine anachronism involving a quartet of young people who are all sparkling teeth and infinite exuberance and who are outperformed by the gas engine. There's a racing sequence that in 1964 (pre-"Grand Prix") seemed pretty flashy.

The film is in favor of teamwork, marriage and a college education.

On the sex front, for the young, there's "If a Man Answers," wherein Bobby Darin and Sandra Dee, looking as animated as Tweedledum and Tweedledee, provide a tasteless demonstration of how to hook a man and keep him squirming. For the slightly older set, and equally tasteless, there's "Who's Been Sleeping in My Bed?" which involves Dean Martin with the wives of his five friends, psychiatry and Carol Burnett, Miss Burnett, making her movie debut in this 1964 film, went on to a great career-in television. Both films are in favor of tickle-and-tease for all ages.

On the modern-crime front, there's "Party Girl," in which Cyd Charisse's lovely legs are wasted on what could be taken as a caricature of a gangster movie of the Thirties were it not so heavy-handed, dull and pointless. This film is in favor of crime not paying—but it licks its chops over the crimes at hand

On the spectacular front, there's "Kings of the Sun," a Mayans-and-Indians fiasco with Yul Brynner and George Chakiris as warring chiefs. Chakiris has hair, Brynner has only a pigtail and poor Richard Basehart wears dirty old dresses and a gray beehive wig to make like a high priest. This film is in favor of the abolition of human sacrifice in religious rites.

So, better stick with "Charlotte's" monster rally. In its own special way it's in favor of entertainment.

AIR TRAFFIC: CRISIS IN THE SKY

45,000,000 take-offs and landings by commercial airplanes in the United States. That figure is expected to triple in the next 10 years. Flights in the last five years are up 50 percent and the number of air traffic controllers, for the same time, is down.

Today, chances of a mishap are 30 times greater during take-off or landing than in a cruising pattern. Projections indicate that, in 1985, one jumbo jet per day will not reach its destination.

These are some of the myriad problems faced by the airlines, airline employees and the Federal Aviation Authority.

What can be done about these problems is discussed in filmed interviews with attorney F. Lee Bailey; William Blodgett, associate editor of Flying magazine; Gen. Joseph



"Dlympia," Leni Riefenstahl's ingeniously conceived study of the 1936 Berlin Olympics, is telecast in four weekly instalments.

The Guinness Book of Olympic Records notes that "At Berlin the Nazi Government of Germany disgracefully attempted to turn the Olympic movement into a propaganda vehicle for the glorification of their creed." For this reason, Hitler entrusted the filming of anticipated "master race" triumphs to Miss Riefenstahl, who, by age 24, had already filmed powerful propaganda epics of Nazi political conventions and rallies.

ALL THIS... AND CHERRIES JUBILEE TOO

G. D. Spradlin, oil tycoon, industrialist, lawyer and politician, turns to an acting career

"NAME: G. D. Spradlin. OCCUPA-TION: Tycoon. HOBBY: Making money. ASPIRATION: Acting."

No, this is not the opening teaser for a new series called *The Rich Man*. This is a genuine excerpt from a routine Paramount publicity questionnaire of the sort usually filled in by aspiring starlets to help the publicity department get them started.

Gervase Duan Spradlin, who filled it out, is, indeed, an Oklahoma oil tycoon who retired at 35 with 66 oil wells, a vending company, an electronics company, a permanent staff of 30 to look after his investments, a yacht, a stable, and all those other things actors dream of owning. He is also a practicing lawyer, a Ph.D. candidate in history and a motion-picture producer. Moreover, he's a cook, very big on cherries jubilee.

With several million going for you, it might even seem easy to start a career in acting—just buy a television station and star in all the programs. But G.D. believes "some things aren't worth having unless you've earned them," and so he began his new career on the grass-roots level of acting schools, auditions and waiting—just like actors without a million. He went jobless for several months

until producer Hal Kanter cast him as a cowboy in a Chrysler Theater. Since then, the histrionic millionaire has become a familiar figure on shows like The Rounders, Run for Your Life, Dundee and The Culhane, Gomer Pyle, I Spy, The Fugitive, Iron Horse, Pistols 'n' Petticoats, Big Valley, Mannix, Cimarron Strip and Dragnet 1968. He has played cowboys, ranch foremen, sheriffs, diplomats, businessmen, marines, bankers and prosecuting attorneys. In a new film starring Charlton Heston called "Will Penny," he's a Texas cattle rancher.

Lunching at the Hollywood Brown Derby, G.D. is dressed in a tweed sport jacket, black knit tie and Harvard flop haircut, and looks more like a college professor than the playboy he is supposed to be. He talks a nonstop stream of ideas spiced with Irish brogue and Oklahoma twang. As he talks, two questions persist: "Is he for real?" and "Who's paying the check?"

He answers the first without being asked. "I have this horror of seeing myself as the wealthy playboy who toys with acting on a whim," says Spradlin. "It may seem crazy, but I love acting. It keeps me in the 'action and passion of our times.' In fact, I intend to finish up my days on this road. Hollywood is where the work is. It affords an actor that most sublime forum, a stage upon which he can 'strut and fret his hour.'

"I was born on a cotton farm and my childhood was filled with hard, hot, dirty farm work, with streaked overalls, wheat chaff down the neck, cow dung on the shoe. I had an incredible desire to get off that farm and get rich. I wanted to be somebody with a big house up on the hill."

He struggled through the University of Oklahoma as a dishwasher, bootlegger, waiter, and woodwork washer, emerging with an LL.B. "I was a 'flaming liberal' because I understood the problems Roosevelt was talking about firsthand. I knew what had been done for me."

Spradlin jumped from college to South America, where he worked for Phillips Petroleum until returning to a private law practice in Oklahoma and a successful career of wildcatting in the Southwest oil fields. Within 10 years, he amassed a fortune in oil and subsidiary investments, enough

to leave it all at 35 and take a leisurely, year-long yacht trip through the Bahamas. ("I guess I wanted to be like Lord Jim, find those tropical islands and dusky maidens.")


Restless, he dropped anchor in graduate school at the University of Miami in South American history and worked past his master's degree, until old friends asked him to run for mayor of Oklahoma City. He ran last in a field of four candidates.

Then he read Galbraith's "The Affluent Society." "I started to do some soulsearching. I'd made money my goal in life. Now that I'd achieved it, I was adrift and purposeless." He was asked to play a part in "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," by the Oklahoma Mummers, a repertory group, and he stayed with the company three years. Why? "I never found anything in life which com-

pares to the sustained joy of acting," he answers. "I went at acting the way I went at finding oil. A man can do anything he wants, but he has to pay the price."

G.D. has formed his own production company, which will begin with two feature films to be shot in Israel this fall. "I may play one male lead and we are thinking of Lee Bouvier for the female lead." Bouvier and Spradlin? An all-millionaire cast? Seriously? "Seriously," he says.

Who could resist asking if he really felt free of his former hunger for money? "Let's be honest," he replies with an Irish grin, "I still have a profound respect for a dollar bill. With equal candor, I can say that my goals are not measured by money."

'I'll take my chances here, any time'

Johnny Carson opens up on subjects he doesn't discuss on the air

John William Carson is as synonymous with Slumbertime U.S.A. as curlers and cracker crumbs between the sheets. From the first brassy bars of "Johnny's Theme" to the final fade on what has to be the busiest couch this side of a Harold Robbins novel, some 10 million viewers gladly flood their eyes with Murine to stay up late, even too late, with Johnny.

No matter. Viewed horizontally or vertically, Johnny Carson is television's undisputed Captain Midnight. Squirming into the *Tonight* hot seat vacated by a pouty Jack Paar in 1962, Carson today is—to put it mildly—sitting pretty. For sewing up the witching hour for NBC—Carson has squelched a gaggle of late-night —

chatterboxes (Les Crane, Merv Griffin, Regis Philbin) over the years-the network pays Carson over a million per annum. Fun City visitors ranging from Vice President Humphrey to the Scotch-slugging king and queen of Brooklyn gypsies vie for a tete-atete with Johnny. The rewards are obvious. Marveled thorny Britisher Kenneth Tynan: "Anyone seen on The Tonight Show is automatically famous." Even the already famous, like Zsa Zsa Gabor, risk Carson's incredibly quick wit for the exposure. When wordy Zsa Zsa refused to button her pretty lip, Carson sassed: "Any girl who owns a dripdry wedding dress can't be all bad."

Yet, as any Carson buff knows, Johnny's television manners are usually as impeccable as a parson's. Not only is he genuinely interested in treating his visitors with respect but to Johnny, one well-placed look is worth a thousand gags. The Carson takes are predictable. If a guest mutters something off-color. Carson becomes an Eagle Scout who's inadvertently heard a dirty joke. Let somebody put him down and he freezes into a Jack Benny gaze of utter indignation. Funky jokes don't faze him either. He'll let the line clunk to the floor, gaze at the kleig lights, and then hum a chagrined "Ho-o-o-kay."

Not that Carson's style is all dumb show. Essentially a comedian who reacts to events and people around him, Carson is a past master at turning a sexy situation into a palatable (for NBC's censors) laugh. Samples: A blatantly shapely chorine is greeted with a mock "I suppose you're on the way to a 4-H Club meeting?" Joining physical education expert Debbie Drake on a mat for a demonstration, Carson cracks, "Would you like to phone the desk and leave a call?"

No one has ever confused The Tonight Show with Lamp unto My Feet. Carson's Little Boy Blueness—usually double entendres he says—are par for the 90-minute course. Getting titters for a sex-loaded line in his monolog, Carson rebuked the crowd with "This isn't Captain Kangaroo, you know. I'm not going to stand here and tell you how the camel got the extra hump." That's Johnny, like a swig of Schweppes: cool, bubbly and a little tart. He's likable too. "Johnny comes into the bedroom," Walter Kempley, Carson's head writer, says. "You have to like him or you wouldn't invite him in the first place."

It's all Johnny Carson, bona-fide BIG star, and it's all as familiar to most Americans as the "Star-Spangled Banner." The private Johnny Carson. however, is the best-kept secret since the Coca-Cola formula. Adamant about playing The Tonight Show strictly for laughs, Carson is inordinately reluctant to air controversy or take sides on issues. (Of late, however, he's been campaigning for stronger guncontrol laws.) And although he hosts the country's most successful "talk" show, Carson, in fact, is the least talkative host around. After his opening monolog, and maybe an Aunt Blabby bit, Carson's job is primarily that of a catalyst. Ninety-nine and forty-four one-hundredths percent of the time he is pure performer, seldom giving the viewer a hint as to what he would talk about without a countryful of customers waiting for the next funny line, next guest or next bleep in the tape.

The press hasn't gotten Carson to talk much either. First of all, Carson hates interviews. Second, he can get uppity and blow the whole story. Reporters are briefed on some of the danger signals; for instance, if Johnny drums his fingers on the table, he's bored—a sure sign the reporter is taking his last look around. And pushy writers get the back of his hand. When one aggressive fourth estater

snapped, "What made you a star?", Carson slapped him with "I started out in a gaseous state, then cooled."

So up we trudged to Carson's Rock-efeller Center retreat, hoping to experience what a private talk with Carson would be like. He works out of an isolated, deadly quiet office on the seventh floor which, on the hour of our arrival, also happened to be deadly hot. "The air conditioner's broken down," Carson starts out, crisply apologizing for the sweaty tee shirt he's been forced to strip to, as he stiffly settles on the couch. Right off we think of roughly 200 more congenial locales in which to interview television's talkiest nontalker.

Unfortunately, the first question we put to Carson—about what he considers *The Tonight Show* highlights over the years—turns out to be the finger-drumming query of all time. "I don't know," he says vaguely. "Five and a half years is a hell of a long

time. I can't remember who was on last night." Drum-Drum-Drum-Go-The-Fingers. "I had Janet Leigh on once, and I mentioned how nice it was to finally have her on the show. She told me she had been on twice before. I'd completely forgotten." Drum-Drum-Drum. "And Janet Leigh isn't exactly a fry cook at Riker's."


Ho-o-o-kay, we say to ourselves.

Q: Well, does the fact that the show's been called "blue" bug you?

A: (A bit up tight) What's "blue" mean? No one has ever been able to define it for me. What does prurient interest mean? The courts can't even

define pornography.

Carson grabs for a cigaret. "I've been called a foul mouth," he says tensely. "Well, some four-letter words I could mention [and he mentions them] never corrupted anyone. My kids once asked me what words I considered to be bad. I told them, 'nigger, kike, greaseball, wop.'



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Those words are *fraught* with meaning. But, as Lenny Bruce said, 'No one has ever been hurt by a pillow.'"

Suddenly, Carson is up and pacing the rug. "I've been accused of spouting 'blueness.' So was Paar. It goes with the territory. I stripped down to my pants to do a stunt, and you should have seen the letters I got. They poured in. You can wear bathing suits on the beach and no one objects. But because we go into the home, everyone is up in arms. I can't say what that means about the letter writers. If some little old lady gets her jollies seeing me stripped to the waist, that's her problem."

He is back on the couch, arms on his knees, and going great guns. "I've been out with some of the columnists who've called me 'blue.' They told me some of the foulest jokes I'd ever heard. And not just between two men, but in public places where everyone could hear them. Then they turn around and call me 'blue.' It's like newspapers writing editorials about pornography. Then on the amusement pages you find an ad for 'Orgy at Lil's Place.' Well, I don't want newspapers lecturing me about morality.

"The hypocrisy bugs me," Carson continues. "The networks are just as hypocritical. They'll censor me and then put on a prime-time movie like 'Palm Springs Weekend,' which is nothing less than a sex romp in Palm Springs. But on my show, if a cleavage is too low the netting goes up. And we're being shown at midnight."

There seem to be an awful lot of midnights when Johnny isn't on. In other words, all those vacations he takes. We bring this up and it opens a whole new can of words.

"I'm on 39 weeks," bristles Carson, "and off 13. I know people complain about my taking time off to play concerts and clubs. They don't understand mine isn't a 9-to-5 job. It's a different bag. My club act is set. I know exactly what I'm going to do. I

relax. I enjoy it. It's a vacation. On the show I never know where I'm going. Whether I'll have to go out there and fight to get it moving, get it cooking. But I can't take three minutes to explain to people that I need time off. If they don't understand, I can't worry about it. I don't care if they don't understand.

"I suppose they think I'm doing it for the money," Carson goes on. "People resent it when they learn I'm going to Las Vegas to make \$50,-000 a week. I can't help the fact that I make money. No one seems to remember the time I was making \$40 a week and working just as hard for it. And I make my money honestly. No one seems to acknowledge that. O'Brian [columnist Jack O'Brian] calls my money 'loot.' Do you know what loot means? Stolen money. Bounty. He actually sees it as stolen money. And when I worked out my last contract with NBC, I read how I was holding up the network for more money. Not in one story did I see that NBC makes 26 million a year on my show. When I took over, they were making 131/2 to 14 million. I wasn't exactly holding them up."

We come up for air and fumble around our person for a fresh pencil when, by gosh, Carson's at the starting gate again. The subject this time is his well-known reluctance to side with issues, especially this year when celebrities are falling over themselves to jump on political bandwagons. "It's not my job to get into the political wars," Carson says, "I can't use seven hours of air time as a platform. It's OK for actors to get involved. It's fine for Paul Newman. People go to see him in a movie and he's a characternot Paul Newman. It's the same with John Wayne, and we all know where he stands. But I'm always Johnny Carson. There I am in the living room every night. The audience has a personal relationship with me. It's

a totally different bag. Hope and Benny don't get politically involved. I can't either. I have some strong opinions on Vietnam. But it wouldn't do any good to air them on the show. However, I'm in a position to voice my opinions, privately, to people who can do something about the situation."

In the wake of Robert Kennedy's assassination, television's alleged role in glorifying violence has become a hotly debated subject. Carson considers the controversy and says, "There are network meetings going on now about violence. I'd like to know why they think there is too much violence now and didn't to begin with. After the rioting, all sorts of studies were made to discover the cause of rioting. I could have told them the cause before the rioting: racism, lack of job opportunities, a need for educational facilities, rats..."

A decidedly somber Carson returns to the subject of TV violence. "I don't know if TV violence has an influence," he says. "I'm not a psychiatrist. But pointless violence has to be unsettling to the young. They have to become immune to it. And something is wrong when they take off shows like Exploring and Mr. Wizard to put on those -- cartoons. They're easier to sell, of course. It's the old give-'em-what-they-want theory. How will we know what they want until we try giving them something different? After three assassinations, something's wrong somewhere."

The somber Carson suddenly switches to a markedly confident Carson. "We're being told that we're a sick society, a violent society. I don't think we are. No more than any other, certainly. We didn't kill six million Jews. We had nothing to do with the mass murders in Russia. And Duvalier, in Haiti. That butcher. I'll take my chances here any time."

This is Johnny Carson . . . off the air.

'VIOLENT' WORLD OF PRO FOOTBALL?

-HAH!

A former great admits today's game is rough, but consider the days of 'The Hangman' and 'The Claw'

If I read or hear once more about the "violent world of pro football," I am going to turn in my 23-inch screen in protest.

I will do this for two reasons. First, I don't see the pro player today as a person of violence, but as a young man in a custom-tailored suit, who, carrying an attache case and accompanied by a lawyer, a business manager and an accountant, strolls into the office of the team president.

Secondly, pro football today, contrasted to 10 years or so ago, is not violent. Mind you, they aren't playing croquet out there, but they aren't assaulting each other as they did during that era of pro football lasting from the end of World War II until the late Fifties.

For eight years of that era I was a linebacker for the Los Angeles Rams. Modesty prevents my listing all my decorations, but I did make All-Pro and was named three times to the Pro Bowl All-Star team.



My business today is restaurants. I own five of them in Southern California. But I am a full-time football kibitzer who served three years as a CBS analyst—I was benched in the big announcer cutdown this season—and I have reached the following conclusion on today's game:

It never has been played better. It is faster and more skillful, and the teams in the National League now would have knocked our brains out. But more violent? No chance. Profootball today is civilized compared to what it was.

There are a number of factors that substantiate my argument. To start with, five officials now appear on the field. We had only four. That extra pair of eyes often is all that's required to restrict the shenanigans of a good lineman.

Next, the rules today are designed specifically to suppress violence, and they tend to protect the offensive backs and ends. A tackler, for instance, isn't even able to grab the face mask of the man with the ball. In a game I broadcast in Baltimore last year, a lineman was nailed 15 yards merely for scraping the mask of Johnny Unitas. Tacklers in football always are looking for handles, and the face mask provides a way to bring down a ball carrier painfully.

Also, greater shielding than ever is given the quarterbacks by the officials. There exists in football a sort of twilight zone between the time the passer releases the ball and the onrushing lineman hits him. Under the guise of not being able to stop his motion, many a tackler used to cream the quarterback without penalty. In the mid-Fifties, the Chicago Bears had a defensive end named Ed Sprinkle, who was known as "The Claw." He had a left forearm as powerful as Sonny Liston's. The instant the quarterback released the ball, Sprinkle-the poor fellow couldn't stop in time-would wrap that left ->



arm under the victim's chin and flip him like a hot cake. Y. A. Tittle once confessed, "When quarterbacks go against the Bears, they look with only one eye for receivers. With the other, they look for Sprinkle."

The San Francisco 49ers had a linebacker named Hardy Brown, who got quarterbacks and runners in another way. He decked them with a shoulder to the side of the head.

Today, you can't get away with that kind of stuff. Officials guard the quarterbacks as they would the Star of India.

Nor do teams put prices any more on the heads of passers and runners. When I was playing, it was common before a game to get up a pool of two bucks a person and designate an opposing player who had to go. It was winner-take-all. In order to collect, you had to knock the target out of the game without getting caught by an official. If you drew a penalty, you blew the pot, and it carried over until the next week.

The former rule permitting ball carriers who hit the ground to crawl, or get up and run again, contributed beautifully to the violence of pro football. Brother, what we used to do to guys! If you tackled a man, you would trick him into crawling by loosening your grip a little, thus arranging for maybe 700 pounds, belonging to three other linemen, to come crashing down on his back.

I am not asking, like a sentimental slob, to bring back the good old days. I merely point out that when you talk about violence, you don't see it today as you did. What you have is football that is more sophisticated, and athletes who are better trained, stronger and smarter. They also arrive fresher for a road game, because of jet travel. We used to ride the piston jobs. In bad weather one time it took us 19 hours in a DC-4 to get from L.A. to Philadelphia. We got so sick that we asked one of our men.

an ordained minister, to offer a prayer. We asked him to pray that the plane would crash.

Injuries are common in pro football today, but they result more from speed than calculated violence. You watch dumfounded the finesse of Green Bay's offensive linemen. They don't collide with guys headon; they move like swift machines. brushing tacklers crisply and precisely. Pro players used to look for contact. Today, they play a tough but brighter game, for which you can hardly fault them. They make a lot of money, participate in a fat pension fund and share in many fringe benefits. A linebacker today easily can earn \$25,000 doing what I did for \$7500.

Shooting for such stakes, players have greater mutual respect. The dirty player is a rarity, and the most dangerous weapon in football, the elbow, is seen only occasionally. It was an accepted fact a while back that the elbow was the dentist's best friend.

The type of characters who used to populate pro football no longer are around. Seasoned viewers, for example, may recall a defensive end for Cleveland named Len Ford, known as "The Hangman." His specialty was abusing blocking backs, and one of his tricks was to extend an arm firmly and catch an unsuspecting opponent under the chin, thus "hanging" him.

Art Donovan, an interior lineman

for Baltimore, used to concentrate on fakers, meaning those backs who pretended they had the ball when they didn't. He would subject them to so much punishment that they would make it obvious they didn't have the ball to avoid Art's beating.

I was no shrinking violet in this league. Leon Hart, who used to play for Detroit, was quoted in Time magazine as saying, "Don Paul is the dirtiest player in football." All I had done was give him a few elbows in the face.

At 260 pounds, Hart was considered a giant in the Fifties. Players his size are common today, and they very likely will continue to grow. Whereas few big men were coordinated and fast, almost all of them now have speed and balance. You look on your TV set at linemen such as Deacon Jones and Merlin Olsen of Los Angeles, Henry Jordan and Willie Davis of Green Bay, and Bob Lilly of Dallas, and you will agree that you never saw big and graceful men like that during my time.

What my era did produce, however, was a lot of football analysts, many of whom you have been listening to for years. Among those surviving the cut this season on CBS is an old rival of mine, George Connor, who used to play for the Bears. His elbow wasn't as good as mine, but he had what was known as an educated foot. George was the slickest tripper in the league.

I have been asked if former players are, as a general rule, suited for broadcasting. There are valid arguments both ways. On the negative side, the average ex-player working before the mike rarely has had training in journalism; he may not be able to recognize an interesting story when he sees one. Then his vocabulary isn't always the best. If many of the guys were like me, they went to college to play football, not to learn the



Queen's English.

Next, the former player tends to root on the air. Knowing what the game is all about, he enters into its spirit more readily than those who have never played, and he must fight to restrain his enthusiasm. For the same reason, he also must struggle with himself to avoid blurting out criticism indiscreetly. When he spots a blunder, his natural instinct is to sound off, as players do on the field. Sounding off isn't always welcome on television.

Counter balancing the negative aspects are certain advantages that belong to the announcer who used to play. To begin with, he does have the technical knowledge. When the play unfolds on the field, he knows which way the guards should be pulling and who should be blocking the defensive end and who should take the linebacker. Moreover, in the locker room he not only is more welcome than the average interviewer. but often can pose more pertinent questions because he understands better what happened.

Finally, I honestly believe that the TV viewer prefers to listen to an ex-player, quite content to let him talk conversationally, even if he does split his infinitives and leave his participles dangling. There are polished announcers who don't know a side-line pattern from a stolen base.

These birds, incidentally, often are the ones who describe pro football as a game of violence. It used to be. Today, it's only mild cruelty.


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
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
