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■ The broadcasters, however, because they use "the people's air," among other factors, have not enjoyed this right. The Federal Communications Commission set up ground rules to assure "fairness" from broadcasters. For instance, a station has been required to give equal time to any persons it criticizes editorially and also equal time to all political candidates when the station has endorsed one candidate.

Now the rules have been changed.

The Federal Circuit Court of Appeals

in Chicago has decided unanimously that the stations do not have to give equal time to individuals to reply to criticism nor to political candidates to air their views after a station has endorsed a rival. The decision, of course, is subject to review by the Supreme Court.

What's next?


■ Broadcasters will have much greater freedom of expression and the FCC's power will be greatly curtailed—provided, of course, the Supreme Court upholds the Chicago decision.

There are more than three times as many television and radio stations as there are daily newspapers in this country today. They are staffed and controlled by men of widely divergent opinions and points of view. There is no reason why they cannot deal with the issues of the day—without Government regulations.

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# THE OLYMPICS: A PREVIEW

The hero of the 1936 Games has high hopes for this year's U.S.A. team

In 1936 when I had the honor of participating in the Summer Olympic Games in Berlin, 49 nations competed and the United States won more gold medals in men's track and field (14) than it has ever won since. Starting this Saturday (Oct. 12), athletes from 103 nationsmore than 8000 young men and women -will convene in the giant, 80,000-seat Olympic Stadium in Mexico City to begin the 19th Summer Olympics. There's an excellent chance, if all goes well, that the U.S. will emerge with more gold medals this time than ever before -not only in track and field-but across the whole spectrum of 22 sports in this thrilling spectacle.

Many sports fans musing about Summer Olympic matters think mostly of track and field—the sprinting, hurdling, shot-putting and the rest-as well as swimming and diving; and these indeed are the chief focal points of any Summer Games. (The ABC network will devote 50-60 percent of its television coverage to them.) But at widely separated points around Mexico City (and as far away as Acapulco, where the yachting events will be held), a great deal more will be going on in such esoterically sportive areas as horsemanship, fencing, field hockey, shooting, volleyball, water polo, cycling, weightlifting, wrestling, canoeing and rowing, as well as in such crowd pleasers as basketball, boxing and soccer.

Mexico City will be a splendid and colorful locale for the games. The stadium on the grounds of the University of Mexico will be the site for all trackand-field events except the marathon. This will be the most spread-out Olympics in history, with many of the events coming from 15 different spots in and around the capital city.

The Olympic track itself is made of a special new all-weather material—instead of the customary clay or asphalt—which will assure top performances because the runners will never be competing in mud; spike holes automatically reseal themselves and the surface is always smooth and springy.

Mexico City is 7347 feet above sea level (our athletes have been training at Lake Tahoe, which is roughly the same), and for that reason I'm certain we'll see many records fall by the wayside, especially in events with running times under two minutes; and also in any field event which requires a body or object to sail through the air—javelin, shot put, pole vault, discus, etc.

The reason, of course, is that the air is very thin in Mexico City, and anything projected through it is going to fly a little farther than usual. In races beyond two minutes, however (or to put it another way: in contests longer than 800 meters), the runners will lose one to three percent of efficiency, and records will prove more difficult to break.

Let's get down to some specifics. The United States men have customarily dominated Olympic track events from 100 to 800 meters (or roughly half a mile). We haven't won a 1500-meter race (the metric mile) since 1908, when Mel Sheppard won a gold medal for

us. Americans are not particularly interested in the longer races, such as the 5000 and the 10,000 meters: it's not the tradition in this country, and we don't have many events of that kind here. Europeans, Australians, and, more recently, Africans, have been better in the long distances than we have.

This time, however, we'll almost surely see a breakthrough in the 1500

meters, thanks to Jim Ryun, the brilliant American runner who currently holds the world record for that distance at 3.33.1. Ryun will be one of the big stories of the 1968 Summer Games and, of course, the 1500 meters is always one of the big dramatic contests of Summer Olympic meets.

Except for the 800 meters (in which Franz-Josef Kemper of West Germany is the favorite), the U.S. should dominate the shorter races: Jimmy Hines and Charlie Greene are superb 100-meter sprinters, and it's my judgment that nobody in the world can take this race away from them.


In the 200 meters, the U.S. has the pending world-record holder (at 19.7) in John Carlos, and the great Tommie Smith of San Jose State College; and in the 400 meters the U.S. is for-

tunate to have Ron Freeman, Lee Evans and Larry James.

In brief, these Olympic games will have together in Mexico City the greatest array of sprinters the world has ever seen. As usual, the U.S. can probably forget about the 5000 and 10,000 meter races (although, to everyone's surprise, we won those in Tokyo four

years ago), and probably the 3000-meter steeplechase as well.

But the U.S. is the overwhelming favorite in the pole vault, shot put, hurdles, discus, long jump and high jump. We've never lost the pole vault since the revival of the Olympic Games in 1896, and if Americans Bob Seagren and John Pennel have anything to say about it. we'll maintain that record.



Randy Matson of Texas A&M (6-feet 8, 245 lbs.) is the first and only man to put the shot over 70 feet, and nobody in the world is close to him in this event. Dick Fosbury, whose eccentric style in the high jump (he clears the bar by falling over it backward) is favored to capture the event which until recently was almost the private domain of  $\rightarrow$ 

Russia's now-retired Valery Brumel. Erv Hall and Willie Davenport will give the U.S. dominance in the 110-meter high hurdles; Jay Silvester (who recently broke the existing world record by 5 full feet) and Al Oerter (who won the event in 1956, '60 and '64) practically assure the U.S. a gold medal in the discus. And our long-jumpers, Ralph Boston and Bob Beamon, will, I predict, stand off the challenge from Russia's great long-jumper, Igor Ter-Ovanesyan, to give us another win.

To sum up track and field: I believe the U.S. men will win 16 out of 24 gold medals, which would be more than we've ever won before in a single Summer Olympics meet. In Tokyo in 1964 we won 12, and that was considered an excellent performance; but in the interim we've become enormously more track-and-field conscious, we've developed a number of superstars, which always makes for heightened public interest, and there's been a concomitant upsurge in the fans' emotional involvement in these events, as well as in the athletes' performances. And that's why the U.S. has reached the high plateau in track and field it stands on today.

The United States is the strongest swimming power in the world, and that status-barring unforeseen mishapswill be defended and reinforced in Mexico City next week. To give you some idea of how thoroughly we dominate swimming and diving, consider this: in Olympic competition, the U.S. has won a total of 111 gold medals, while its closest competitor, Australia, has won 24. Three American superstars will supply a lion's share of the drama and excitement this year: Debbie Meyer, the 16-year-old aquanaut from Sacramento, Cal., is almost sure to cop three gold medals in the 200-, 400- and 800meter women's freestyle events.

Don Schollander, the 22-year-old Yale senior, is by far the strongest entry in the men's 200-meter freestyle. In the last Olympics, Schollander be-

came the third man in history to win four gold medals in a single Summer Olympics meet. (One of these, if I recall, was a chap named Jesse Owens.)

The third member of this trio is 18-year-old Mark Spitz of Santa Clara, Cal., who is determined to be the first man in Olympic history to win five gold medals—and it's even money he'll make it. He is all but guaranteed three gold medals (100-meter freestyle, 100- and 200-meter butterfly) and, including relay races, has a good chance to win six.

The Russians as usual will dominate the men's breast stroke, this time with Viktor Kosinsky. The host nation, Mexico, could win its only gold medal in a major event in the 1500-meter freestyle: Guillermo Echavarria came out of nowhere last year and broke the world record by 6 full seconds. The American Mike Burton has since broken that record by about 20 seconds.

If such U.S. stars as Sue Pedersen (100-meter freestyle), Catie Ball (100-and 200-meter breast stroke) and Claudia Kolb (200- and 400-individual medley) match the expected performance of the fabulous Debbie Meyer, then the United States will surely win 10 out of 16 gold medals in women's swimming and diving. And the men should easily win 11 of 17 gold medals.

In basketball, the United States has never lost a game in Olympic competition since the sport was included in 1936: a record of 66 wins and no defeats. This year, however, the U.S. won't be represented by the biggest and strongest team in the field; some experts are saying that either Russia or Brazil has a better chance than we do. We have no big names this time (many of our best prospects, including Lew Alcindor and Elvin Hayes, decided to pass up the Olympics), so we'll have to rely on old-fashioned team basketball.

Rowing has always been one of the U.S.'s best showcases: in Olympic competition, we've won 33 gold medals, more than twice as many as our closest adversary, Great Britain. This year  $\rightarrow$ 

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we'll be represented by the Harvard University club in the "eight oars" and by top-flight entrants in the other rowing and sculling events as well.

Russia once again will have strong teams in most of the events it enters and will surely dominate wrestling, weightlifting and fencing. In soccer, the world's most popular sport, the U.S. will be just an interested bystander: our team was eliminated in the pre-Olympic play-offs by tiny Bermuda.

Those are some of the high points of interest we'll be seeing in Mexico City for the next few weeks. There is another, of course, unhappier aspect of the games this year, and one which all sports fans who love the Olympics and its traditions are sure will be dissolved by the good sense and loyalty of many of the athletes themselves.

I speak of the expressions of discontent which some black American athletes have voiced over representing in international competition a nation they claim has failed to give them equal opportunity—in education, housing and jobs—with their white colleagues. I recognize, as do these young people, that there are many problems here in the U.S.A. with regard to Negro participation in sports. But I also look at the many things both blacks and whites have done to alleviate these conditions.

Economically, Negroes haven't been able to rise as fast as whites in many areas of American life; but the athletic world has been good to Negroes-they can walk and talk with other athletes man to man, and they can demonstrate their abilities without reference to race. As a result, many blacks have become heroes in this country. Because of their achievements, they've done a great deal of good for themselves and the people around them. I'm not in favor of cutting off the one area of understanding we have. Negroes have a right to be proud of the disproportionate percentage of black athletes representing the U.S.

The Olympics is a place where people live, work, and break bread together;

it has brought about tremendous understanding and cooperation in racial matters. So I don't think the pride which our black athletes have in themselves and their country will allow them to do anything to embarrass the United States in so conspicuous a world arena.

There were no more angry people than black Olympic competitors in Berlin in 1936. We had insults thrown at us by our host nation; Hitler didn't accord Negroes and Jews the same courtesies he did others who came to Berlin. That made us more determined to prove that, in the eyes of God, we were every bit as good as any man.


Many of the youngsters competing this year don't realize the kind of hostility that was directed toward us. But through the efforts of athletes before me, and men who competed in my own day, we paved the way for the opportunities which many young men have today in schools, in business, and on athletic teams. I say to these boys today who are considering public protest against their own country that they would not only be hurting themselves, but they might in the end aid our strongest competition, Russia.

South Africa has been banned from these Summer games, which, I think, was the best move in the circumstances. Their presence would have been a farce. There should be no political nor ethnic divisiveness in the Olympic Village, and the segregated teams they planned to send would have been an insult to other athletes.

But aside from such considerations, I expect to be witnessing one of the most exciting Olympic meets ever. The talent from participating nations will comprise the greatest array of athletes ever collected in one place. And it's my own belief that the spirit which they will bring to this peaceful combat will be an inspiration and an example to the world's peoples, demonstrating how men can live together in friendship, cooperation and toleration.

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# MITZI KEEPS IT LIGHT

And dances her way into the heart of our hard-boiled writer

As far as I'm concerned, anyone with the moxie to come right out and tell Yul Brynner, "You're the biggest hamhock in the world," has got to be one terrific dame. As it happens, the straight-shooter was his co-star in "Surprise Package," Mitzi Gaynor!

Generally in Hollywood, when a star has an image that's as wholesome as home-cranked vanilla ice cream, you can lay odds that off camera she swears like a sailor and behaves like a shrew. All those freckle-faced little tootsies who ooze their way off the TV and movie screens of America and into our hearts are, by and large, as wholesome as a swamp. They'd kill you for a nickel, and if the right role were at stake, they'd kill you and forget the nickel.

My first meeting with Gaynor took place on a Saturday in July. She was taping her special at NBC in Burbank. (It will be telecast this Thursday.) When I wandered into Studio 4, she was off somewhere, changing costumes.


She suddenly whooshed in, looking terribly healthy and very sexy, in chandelier earrings and a shimmering gold dress that had lots and lots of cleavage. "Okay, have no fear, the star is here," she laughed. One of the members of

the crew sidled over. "You writing something about her?" Yeah. "Well, write that she's one of the best people we've ever worked with. Sometimes you have to work 12 or 14 hours a day, and it gets to be kind of a drag—but that Mitzi, she always keeps it light."

It's important to Mitzi to keep it light and friendly, because, as she says, "When there's no strain, and everybody likes everybody, I can give more of myself."

Mitzi has wanted little else out of life but to give of herself, so long as the giving could be done stage center. According to her mother, Mrs. Pauline Gerber, "She always wanted to dance. When she was just 4, my sister and I took her to the ballet. She was simply starry-eyed, and she had never sat so quiet in her life. After that, we took her to all the ballet shows that came to Detroit and she was in her first professional show at the age of 13."

When 20th Century-Fox put her under contract, she was just 16. It was then that Francesca Mitzi Marlene de Charney von Gerber became Mitzi Gaynor. There followed a series of forgettable film musicals that included "My Blue Heaven," "Take Care of My

Little Girl," "The I Don't Care Girl," "There's No Business Like Show Business" and "Down Among the Sheltering Palms." Even her "South Pacific," which made a lot of money, didn't get anyone too excited.

It's Mitzi's mama's theory that, "In movies she had to follow a script, and it limited her. In her own night-club act she has the freedom to do everything."

Mama may be right. It certainly helps explain how a movie star of only moderate stature has become one of the hottest items on the night-club circuit, with a Las Vegas price of \$45,000 a week.

If, way down deep, Mitzi is really a typical Hollywood type, she keeps it her own little secret. For instance, Mrs. Seymour Felix, the widow of Mitzi's choreographer in the 1951 release "Golden Girl," says, with (literally) tears in her eyes, "My husband was in the business for 40 years, and they just don't come like Mitzi. Of all the state he handled, and he handled many, many, many, she's the only one who never forgot him. Or me. She has a quality you can't explain; she has such wonderful talent, and yet such humility."

The following day, Sunday, Mitzi taped the show's comedy spots with guest-star George Hamilton. It's a mutual admiration society the two of them belong to. Standing side by side, they resemble Mattel's Barbie and Ken Dolls. She's got a doll's face to go along with her 36-22-35½ measurements, and he looks like he's made out of a superior brand of plastic—with painted-on hair.

He says of her and her husband, Jack Bean: "I've known them for about nine years, and I've always liked them. We've never worked together before, but I think she's one of the most talented people I know. And, believe me, she has the patience of God."

I'd taken an immediate dislike to Mitzi's husband of 14 years. I figured anyone who dressed that well has got to be up to no good. But he disappointed me. It turns out that in spite of the fact he owns one of the world's great wardrobes (consisting mainly of what Bean sheepishly refers to as "businessman hip"), chews gum and used to be an MCA agent, he's a nice, pleasant guy. He seems to have learned to cope

with one of the alltime tough jobsnamely, being the husband of a star.

Although he manages her career, he devotes most of his time to real-estate and other business investments. They met in 1952. As Jack tells it. "I was working at MCA, but T wasn't one of the big agents. One day, a auv in the office walked up to me and asked me if I knew how to rumba." (Even in Hollywood

that's not a question a man gets asked by another man every day in the week.) "I told him I did, though not too well. He explained that MCA was trying to sign up one Mitzi Gaynor. He was an older man, so that night we went, the three of us, to the Coconut Grove, and while I did all the rumbaing, or whatever, he did the agency pitch. The result was Mitzi didn't sign, I left MCA and we got married two years later."

They live in a modest 13-room, 5bath mansion, which Jack describes as a typical Beverly Hills Spanish mauso-

leum. They have no children.

Mitzi makes fun of her own whippedcream image, calling herself at various times Mitzi Goodglove, Nancy Neat and Betty Bath. She sympathizes with anyone who has to write about her. "I'm not a hashish smoker, I'm not a drunk and Jack's not my 14th husband. I'm just a vicious, hardened criminal with narrow, beady eyes," she said, trying unsuccessfully to make her eyes narrow and beady.

When I wondered about their glamorous social life, Jack set me straight:

> We don't really have what you'd call a social life. We'd rather stay home and have a few people over for a drink than go out to a party. People always assume we're busy, always on the go. It's not true. We hardly ever go anywhere. When's the last time we went to

dollars. We don't really have too many show-business friends. There are the Vincente Minnellis and there's Ross Hunter, who's our best friend. If Ross were opening a can of tomato soup, we'd go. Even though we don't go out much because we choose not to, we read the columns to see who was at whose party the night before. Then we get sore because we weren't invited; we're all Charlie Browns when it comes to things like that."

Mitzi, who was born in Chicago and raised in Detroit, feels that, "Coming from the Midwest helps you in this business. It flattens your feet and makes

you level-headed."

Flat at both ends and curvy in the middle is a tough combination to beat. But I could sense that she was unhappy, or at least unfulfilled. It clearly wasn't enough to go through life as Nancy Neat, with one husband and no hashish. True, she had on one occasion gotten a strange glint in her eye, and confided to me, "Something in the garden is

trying to kill me." In her growing desperation to seem at least as exotic as Doris Day, she had exaggerated. What she had in her garden, or rather what her trees had, was a Cuban blight. *They* were the ones that were being killed. The blight, however, did make Mitzi's nose itch. Which is something.

But I remained at a loss as to how to help her spice up the vanilla. She rarely smokes, never drinks anything more potent than ginger ale, doesn't talk dirty, and is as scandal-free as Daisy Mae Yokum.

Finally, I gave her one last chance. "Do you sleep in the nude?"


"No, I sleep in one of Jack's old T-shirts."

# Relax: The Computers Are Coming

I wonder why it is that computers make people so nervous. For instance: just a few weeks ago, the eminent Wall Street Journal reported that an anonymous computer expert had figured out how rigged computers could steal a Presidential election.

See, what you do is you bribe the key programmers in the three TV networks on the East Coast. Come Election Night, the crooked computers predict a land-slide for candidate Smith, and a corresponding defeat for candidate Jones. The result is that Smith's supporters in the Middle West, Far West, Alaska and Hawaii, where the polls are still open, rush forth eagerly to mount the bandwagon; Jones's admirers stay gloomily home with a six-pack; and Smith wins.

Simple, isn't it? And, to nobody's surprise, TV news executives were a little shaken by the suggestion. Robert Chandler of CBS News said it was "a cockeyed idea," but that was just whistling in the dark, for he added pessimistically, "There's always the possibility that a key man in an election will be bought off."

After several months of computerizing the primaries, I doubt that Chandler feels much easier in spirit, or that his counterparts at ABC and NBC are much better off. Both of the latter networks have testified that their election computers will be used with extreme caution

If this is correct, I can only say that U.S. network TV has cravenly betrayed a public trust and blown an easy chance to change history. The combination of TV and computers applied to reality might well have salvaged the 20th Century as a tolerable time to live in. Let me explain.


As far as I can learn, computers were first used in reporting political results during the Presidential election of 1952, when NBC introduced an electronic marvel called "Mike Monrobot" to the viewing customers. CBS had UNIVAC, while ABC rather stodgily relied on Walter Winchell and John Charles Daly.

These pundits, human and electrical, all performed in about the same way: when fed information on the current results of the balloting, they blinked rapidly, whirred a bit, and then predicted the final outcome of the election.

Generally speaking, the computers were a popular success on this occasion; one of them—the CBS UNIVAC—even kept insisting until late in the evening that Adlai Stevenson would draw more popular votes than Eisenhower. This obvious inability to cope with reality did much to make UNIVAC seem human and even charming—like H.V Kaltenborn in the 1948 elections, when he insisted on electing Thomas. Dewey in the face of a considerable popular demand for Harry S Truman.

Well, time went on and computers were improved (though they never acguired the elegant diction of John C. Daly), but their significance in TV news escaped me until the elections of 1966. On election evening that year, while dallying in a friendly neighborhood tavern, at approximately 7:03 P.M., CST, I found myself face-to-face with an activated television set. There on the screen, in glowing green and purple, was Walter Cronkite, the sage of CBS, flanked by Harry Reasoner and Mike Wallace, and backed by one of the most enormous and alittering computers ever assembled.

As I focused on this apparition, Cronkite was saying something like, "Well, it's definite now. Chuck Percy  $\rightarrow$ 



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has been elected in Illinois. And Lester Maddox, as I announced before, is definitely governor of Georgia. And . . ."

As things turned out, it wasn't all that simple. Maddox accepted the Georgia governorship from the computers, and then they changed their minds about him, and it was some time before the whole snarl was worked out in his favor. (Among other clumsy expedients, they had to count the votes.) But aside from such minor mishaps, there was plenty that the computers could and did do about the 1966 elections. They all but eliminated them.

Their basic technique was interesting, and comparatively easy to understand. What you had to grasp was that reality—i.e., all those silly little ballots—was meaningless. At this point—say, 7:10 P.M., CST—the votes on the East Coast could hardly have been counted, most polls in the Middle West were barely closed, and in California the citizens were still voting for Ronald Reagan, with occasional write-ins for Rudolph Valentino and Francis X. Bushman.

**B**ut at CBS, all this made absolutely no never mind. Old Walter and Harry and Mike were busy inhaling the great, fragrant gusts of pot which emanated from the electronic monster, and occasionally blowing a whiff in the direction of the customers. By the time I left them, they weren't just predicting the results, they were practically swearing in the victorious candidates.

Not many minutes later, I joined some friends for an evening of harmless gaiety at their apartment. The group assembled there—and this is important—were exceedingly intellectual and politically hip: employees of Hugh Hefner, a science-fiction writer who wore whiskers, several ethnic girls—people like that.

Now, mark me well: normally, on Election Night, characters of this stripe would have hung over the TV set until the small hours of the morning, moaning and cursing the folly of the electorate. Not so this time. One of the group

insisted on tuning the tube to NBC, but there was small joy in the viewing. David and Chet had settled the election a half hour earlier, and all that remained was electronic tiddlywinks. The poor fellow who wanted, as he naively said, "to follow the election," we finally walled up in a subcellar oubliette, along with a battery-powered Sony and a cask of amontillado.

In the weeks that followed, I brooded deeply over the events of that evening, piously thumbing through the pages of Marshall McLuhan as I did so. McLuhan, I knew, had labeled TV a "cool" medium, meaning that it takes a good deal of the excitement out of things, but this seemed ridiculous. Television had taken a major political election, occurring at a time of acute national crisis, and in a brilliant tour de force had made this event almost nonexistent. I realized that I had witnessed a wonder of science, and with bated breath I whispered, "What hath God wrought now?"

Well, sir, the good Lord hasn't seen fit to confide in me directly, though I believe that an organization called Woroner Productions, Inc., working in the antiquated medium of radio, may point the way toward the light. Mr. Murry Woroner, president of the corporation, last year came up with a fascinating idea: why not use computers to determine the all-time heavyweight boxing champion? No sooner thought than programmed: into an NCR 315 computer were fed two million bits of information concerning the ring capacities of such worthies as Bob Fitzsimmons, Max Schmeling, Jack Dempsey, Joe Walcott, Rocky Marciano, et al.. The computer then whirred, blinked and explained not only who would beat whom, but how and in what round. These findings were then presented in classic radio reporting style, "as originating from the Convention Hall in Miami, Florida."

Reality and fantasy were wonderfully confused in these broadcasts; vari-

ous eminentissimi were interviewed "at ringside" and asked to predict the outcome of the fights, and I guess some of them were real. Of course, a good many of the pugilists involved were, in fact, with the angels; but despite this, the fights were handled with an air of absolute conviction and authenticity.

As a matter of fact, they were the best prize fights I have listened to since Joe Louis hung up his gloves, maybe even since Dempsey was belting his opponents into the 10th row of spectators. Computerized broadcasting had created a series of sporting events far superior to reality, and had done so without producing a single bruise, fracture, cauliflower ear or addled brain.

Baseball has been computerized too. With the assistance of an IBM 1130, the Triangle Stations have staged a "Dream World Series." Willie Mays and Mel Ott play side-by-side, Sandy Koufax pitches to Babe Ruth, and the Ebbets Field bleachers are alive with the sound of raspberries in two-hour radio broadcasts.

And now Woroner Productions, I understand, have turned their attention to developing a substitute for championship golf, which is all right with me—the only exciting golf game that I can recall is a match played between Auric Goldfinger and James Bond, and if W.P. can better that, my blessings go with them.

These pioneering efforts at doing away with the necessity for real political and sporting events are interesting mainly in their promise for the future. If we can, via computer, eliminate the election, why not eliminate the candidates as well? As an intermediate step, we would have to program Richard Nixon, Hubert Humphrey, George Wallace and the rest into computers, so that the actual politicians could return to their private pursuits, if any, where they would be more or less harmlessly occupied. Later, of course, the computers could exhume politicos of the past,

working out a popularity contest between Andrew and Lyndon Johnson, or between Richard Nixon and Chester A. Arthur. Eventually, I suppose, NCR 315 or its successors might create completely synthetic leaders (based perhaps on the vast cultural pool provided by comic strips and TV series); consider the unprecedented excitement of a political campaign featuring not the dreary and rather antiquated Reagans, Murphys and Shirley Temples, but carefully updated and market-tested versions of Steve Canyon, Matt Dillon and possibly Phyllis Diller!

Of course, politics and sports are not the only areas in which reality is inferior, unsatisfying, too expensive and/ or too painful. It has long been argued that human beings have an ineradicable hankering after warfare. For example: think what a good TV packager could do here with the right computers and an adequate budget! John Wayne vs. Erwin Rommel; Douglas MacArthur vs. Genghis Khan; George Patton vs. Hannibal—the possibilities are endless, and the beauty part of it all would be that not a drop of gore would be spilled.

And then there are depressions, riots, natural catastrophes—the whole range of reality which makes the 20th Century less and less tolerable for any form of life more sensitive than the Galapagos turtle.

Of course, there would be the perennial problem of automation: computerizing the real would put a certain population of prize fighters, generals, politicians and such permanently out of work. However, there aren't really very many of them-and since, without actual wars, political campaigns, sports tournaments and other disasters, the human race would be more prosperous than ever before in history, no doubt we could afford to pension them off. Or maybe they could be retrained to do something useful. Who knows? Technology being what it is these days, anything is possible.

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## **Jury's Still Out on New Season**

The jury is still out on the new TV season, networkers were prone to say in recent days. Reason: while they had some inklings from early ratings as to which new TV series might be comers and which might bomb, the first really indicative tally of viewer preferences was not going to be in hand until Monday, Oct. 14. That's when Nielsen figures are due on the first week in which all new network line-ups were in head-on competition, with few pre-emptive specials throwing off comparisons. Among new shows, Doris Day's and The Land of The Giants seemed to look most like cinches. Privately, NBC worried most about Phyllis Diller's chances, CBS about Blondie, ABC about The Ugliest Girl. But everybody also knew that slow-starters sometimes turn out winners and conversely, quick hits sometimes fade.

While the fate of individual TV shows remained to be told, nobody quibbled with one hunch: NBC, thanks in part to a new third night of movies every week, seems certain to unseat CBS as the top-rated network, a distinction NBC has not attained in years. "Suddenly," moaned a CBS exec, "everything NBC does seems to shine." It was not quite true, really. Besides Diller being no killer, Huck Finn was a washout as the Sunday night lead-in. And NBC's big 90-minute, Name of the Game, was no shoo-in. But ABC and CBS did seem to have far worse troubles.

Is all the steam gone out of a Presi-

dential task-force project which a few months ago had some sectors of the communications world, including TV and the FCC, quaking with anxiety? Most observers think so, if only because the group, which was set up to explore the entire field of communications, will be reporting to a lame-duck President who won't have time to implement any major recommendations for overhauling the country's communications structure. Even so, the task force's findings, expected to be submitted to President Johnson in the next several weeks, are awaited with interest in TV circles if only out of curiosity as to what the group did with a "wired-city concept" of putting most TV programming on cable systems. Washington speculation is that the task force will propose encouraging the spread of community antenna (CATV) systems, letting them provide added diversity in viewing, but not at the expense of overthe-air TV. The touchy part is how both objectives are to be achieved simultaneously.

As Congress raced to close shop so its members could get in a few campaign licks, it became clear no time was left for hearings on TV's disputed political convention coverage, much as many irked lawmakers wanted them. But the TV networks are braced for a Congressional onslaught in '69. "I imagine," a top-rank networker sighed, "we'll be on the New York-Washington shuttle a lot next year."

To, Virginia, it was not when grandma was a little girl—it was only eight years ago, count 'em, eight, that "Suddenly, Last Summer" was a downright unique shocker and the Beatles were strictly for kiddies. And now the Tennessee Williams wallow in aberration is on the home screen and we gray-heads don't even have to apologize for joining the youngsters in watching "Help!" at home. Don't tell me the world doesn't turn!

It was back in 1960 that one critic declared that "Suddenly, Last Summer" was "the only movie that has ever offered the paying public, for a single admission, a practicing homosexual, a psychotic heroine, a procuress-mother, a cannibalistic orgy and a sadistic nun." Ho hum. Now we get it for free, complete with Elizabeth Taylor as the girl who is almost lobotomized, Montgomery Clift as the neurosurgeon who truth-serums her troubles away and Katharine Hepburn as the vampire-mommy at the root of all the evil. It's a wallow, all right, mild though it may seem in this eighth year of our perversion-preoccupied decade.

We can also play this perversion stuff for laughs, you know—or at least Debbie Reynolds does in "Goodbye Charlie," playing a lecherous male reincarnated as a sexy female with his masculine mind making the transmigration intact. Its double-sex entendres are enough to set straight sex

and comedy back 20 years—let alone win the all-time nasty Film sweep-stakes.

If wallow one must, do it via "Help!," the Beatles' second and, for my money, more delightful movie than "A Hard Day's Night," courtesy of some utterly kookie plotting and added characters, chief among them Victor Spinetti, as a mad scientist ("He's a mad one-wants to rule the world if he can get a Government grant"), Leo McKern as a plump villain and Eleanor Bron as a mysterious heroine. The satire's subtle and the pace of the non-sequitur comedy frenetic. If you prefer more traditional stuff, there's "The Nutty Professor," the first 10 minutes of which provide, even for non-Jerry Lewis fans, one of the funniest Jekyll-Hyde transformation takeoffs on film.

Another kind of wallow—in a perfectly awful movie—is offered by "Youngblood Hawke," a grandiose soap opera based on the Herman Wouk novel that purported to be based on the career of Thomas Wolfe. James Franciscus, hardly a Kentucky behemoth, doesn't even take up pen or typewriter as the great author and the portrait of Manhattan's literary set is enough to give the girls on the Squeedunk High Gazette the giggles.

### XIX OLYMPIAD: U.S. CHANCES

For Americans, the Olympic picture has long been clouded. Scholastic demands, professional sports, personal reasons and time, the athlete's greatest enemy, cost the United States team some of its finest competitors. Top American entrants are listed below; world records are in parentheses. Use this page as a scoreboard for the games, which run Oct. 12-27.

#### Track and Field

Long a U.S. strong point, track and field events are the oldest and most dramatic Olympic contests, Sprints: Jim Hines and Charlie Greene are two of three who share the 9.9 world mark at 100 meters; John Carlos (19.7) and Tommie Smith lead the field in the 200 meters. 400 meters: world titlist Lee Evans (44.0) is the leading candidate. 800 meters: Tom Farrell and Wade Bell could score. 1500 meters: the U.S. hasn't won the metric mile since 1908, but this could be the year: miler (3:51.1) Jim Ryun's time for the shorter 1500 meters (3:33.1) is five seconds faster than the gold medal time of 1964. Ryun's challengers include Kipchoge Keino of Kenya. Decathlon: Bill Toomey is among the favorites. 110-meter high hurdles: Willie Davenport heads a strong U.S. threesome, 400-meter hurdles: Geoff Vanderstock (48.8) or Ron Whitney may strike gold. Distance events: U.S. victories in the long runs will come hard. Australia's Ron Clarke leads the 5000-meter field with a time of 13:16.6; the 10,000-meter field is headed by Kenya's Naftali Temu; and Ethiopia's Abebe Bikila is after his third straight marathon gold. Steeplechase: George Young is rated a strong contender. Long jump: Ralph Boston shares the world record (27' 43/4") with Russia's Igor Ter-Ovanesyan; indoor champ Bob Beamon (27' 1") beat Boston in the trials. Pole vault: top entrant is Bob Seagren (17' 9"). Discus: Jay Silvester (224' 5") can expect stiff competition from three-time gold medalist Al Oerter. Shot-put: Randy Matson (71' 51/2") heads the U.S. contingent. High jump: Ed Caruthers, Reynaldo Brown and Dick Fosbury all stand a chance.

In Rome and Tokyo, the U.S. and USSR dominated the women's track events, and the U.S. should fare well again. Top hopefuls include Wyomia Tyus and Margaret Bailes in the 100 and 200 meters; Jarvis Scott in the 400 meters; Madelaine Manning at 800 meters; and Mamie Rollins in the 800-meter

hurdles. Top field prospects include high jumper Eleanor Montgomery and discus thrower Olga Connelly.

Swimming and Diving

The U.S. swimming and diving teams are counted on to make an almighty splash in Mexico. U.S. men—led by world-record holders Don Schollander (four Tokyo gold medals), Mark Spitz, Charles Hickcox, Mike Burton and Ken Walsh—are favored in a majority of the 17 events. The U.S. ladies, who are also heavy favorites in most events, are led by world titlists Debbie Meyer, Claudia Kolb and Catie Ball.

#### Basketball

This Olympiad may see the end of an era. The U.S., which has won every basketball gold medal since the sport became an Olympic event in 1936, is not the favorite—the team will have to do without such stars as Elvin Hayes, who turned pro, and Lew Alcindor. Top challengers: Russia, Yugoslavia and (if they compete) the Czechoslovakian team.

Equestrian

Americans come up no better than possible favorites in any of the six events.

The U.S. is among those favored in two (5.5 and Dragon classes) of five yachting competitions; and in five of seven shooting events. (Women shooters are competing in their first Olympics.) In rowing, the U.S. is represented by the Harvard University crew, and is favored in one of seven events—the spectacular eight-oared shells, which the U.S. has won in nine of the last 10 Olympics. In weightlifting, the top prospect is heavyweight Joe Dube; in boxing, heavyweight George Foreman.

No U.S. entrants are favored in the following sports: canoeing, cycling, fencing, gymnastics (the U.S. won six medals in 1932; only one bronze since), pentathlon, volleyball, water polo (no U.S. golds since 1904) and wrestling. U.S. teams did not qualify to compete in field hockey and soccer.

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Movie monsters aren't what they used to be—and the world's the worse for it.

Only on television, and only then in the wee hours of the viewing schedule, can those of us who love and revere the old horror films once again feel the touch of teeth on our throats and hear the unholy clank of shovels in a cemetery.

The classic horror films no longer are made. The gory, glory years of monsterdom were 1931 to 1945. The zenith was that twin bill of terror, "Frankenstein" and "Dracula" (nurses in attendance at all performances, said the advertisements, and an ambulance parked at the theater door).

Not the spiteful visitors from other planets ("The Thing," "Invasion of the Body Snatchers"). Not the prehistoric hulks who somehow missed the evolutionary boat ("Godzilla," "Rodan!"). And certainly not the bad-tempered insects ("The Fly," "Tarantula"). For those of us who remember the films of our youth that left us clammy under covers even on a summer night, the fine films involved four familiar, fiendish faces—the werewolf, the vampire, the mummy, and Frankenstein's tortured monster.

I, and others like me, saw them all. Growing up in Kalamazoo, Mich., my friend Jimmy Evans and I often went to the Uptown Theater, which was then a gloomy rerun house and now is a discount store, so no ghosts roam

its rows of empty seats. Our tennis shoes skreaked on the backs of the seats in front of us as we waited for the lights to dim, and for our transmigration to the dirt-floored coffins of Carfax Abbey, or the moonstruck Carpathians, where Count Dracula welcomed us to his webbed castle.

There, on Saturday afternoons out of the sun, we learned such never-to-be-forgotten lessons as how to kill a vampire (a stake through the heart), or a were-wolf (a silver bullet). We

watched the mad baron pull the switch that should best be pulled by God, and wriggled wide-eyed while Bela Lugosi slobbered over naked necks and crackled, "I am—Count Dracula!"

Today the wounded monster bellows from living-room screens. The mummy, Kharis, still stalks the night, dragging a foot and with only one good eye, covered with flaky, rotten bandages. Though splintered by commercials, the films have kept their charm. Alarmists to the contrary, probably no more people are harmed by watching Shock Theater than are helped by watching The Flying Nun. The old films endure, not because they are frightening but because they are fun.

For instance, "Frankenstein" (1931) was and still is the most famous of the horrid horrors. Its monster is a figure known to us all—the flattened skull, the electrodes, the lead-weight boots. Boris Karloff, under makeup, appeared to have about the same number of stitches sewn into him as Betsy Ross took in making the first flag.

Released by Universal Pictures (Unusual Pictures, some said), the film was a runaway success. Like Hopalong Cassidy in his time, and The Monkees in theirs, the monster was a national art treasure. T-shirts lined store counters. Books and magazines fawned over the phenomenon. One psychologist

suggested that we kids idolized him because he looked like somebody our parents wouldn't like.

"Frankenstein" ended with the monster perishing in the flames that consumed an old mill. Realizing it had been financially hasty, Universal resurrected him for "The Bride of Frankenstein" (1935). A new screenplay had him fall to the mill's flooded cellar, escaping both the flames and the angry villagers, who wanted to tar and feather him, or worse. By such gambits did the monsters keep returning to the movie houses, no matter how many times, in preceding films, they had gone to that big cobwebbed coffin in the sky.

In "Bride," the monster's obliging creator decides to make the monster a do-it-yourself woman of his own (Elsa Lanchester's hair curled electrically). Unfortunately, the bride takes one look at her prospective mate and hollers for the cops. Her screaming puts the monster into such a raging snit that he destroys her, his creator and himself.

Next to the monster, the snaggletoothed Wolf Man was the most-photographed fiend. Lon Chaney Jr., dressed always in tweed suits, portrayed Lawrence Talbot, heir to a stately English home, but otherwise a born loser.

"The Wolf Man" (1941) was sinister cinema. Talbot, ankle-high in fog, is walking on a darkened moor, alone and silent. Night. A chilling wind rustles the

trees. A hairy creature darts from the shadows. Talbot is bitten. He lurches forward, into a gypsy camp. There, wizened and wrinkled Maria Ouspenskaya rasps in her small, dry voice, "When the moon is full you will be a wolf, my son." The old gal knows her stuff. Next full moon, as advertised, hair spreads on Talbot's body. Fangs sprout from his mouth. Off he goes, down moonlit streets, killing people and committing assorted bedevilments.

For Chaney, changing under a full moon was so strong an impulse it became a habit. In "Wolf Man," Talbot is battered to death by his own father (Claude Rains). But he arose from the family crypt for a string of sequels. In "House of Dracula" (1945) he became the only monster with a happy ending. Brain surgery cures him and he even gets the girl. Later, in still another movie, however, it seemed his old affliction had cropped up to bother him again.

From nickelodeon to new wave, horror always has been a part of screen entertainment. Even old Tom Edison took time out from his inventing chores to film a version of "Frankenstein" as early as 1910.

The Germans were the first to go big in the business. An expressionist film, "The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari," was a wild success in Europe in 1920. →



Hollywood didn't cash in until later, being preoccupied with Latin lovers, flaming flappers, and Rin Tin Tin. Then, in 1930, Tod Browning, a noted director, filmed the stage version of "Dracula." He used the Hungarian-born Lugosi. After that, once it had seen the box office receipts, Hollywood couldn't get enough of horror.

This was especially true for Dracula, that Transylvanian vampire. Since Lugosi first donned the cloak, the Count has been in 14 films. Fourteen times a cedar stake has been sledge-hammered into his grisly heart. But the Count is unlikely to ever lie down. His problem is that he is undead—a nasty condition that forces him to thrive on blood.

Thrive Lugosi did. In "Mark of the Vampire" (1935) and "Return of the Vampire" (1943) he sank his teeth into necks by night (Nina Foch caught the brunt of it) and returned to his coffin by day to escape the rays of the sun. Edward Van Sloan, as the tireless vampire-killer Dr. Van Helsing, was running about uttering his famed, "We must find it and destroy it!"

Others played the no-account Count, notably John Carradine. But Lugosi was the best. He had to be. Otherwise he didn't work. To his everlasting dismay, Bela learned he had been type-cast. Like Henry Ford's Model T, which could be had in any color as long as it was black, Hollywood wanted Bela to play any part he wanted—as long as it was the vamoire.

As for the mummy, he appeared in five major films, the best of them "The Mummy's Tomb" (1942) and "The Mummy's Curse" (1945). Kharis (usually played by Chaney Jr.) is called from his tomb by a troublemaking Egyptian priest. He is kept alive and controlled by Tana leaves. He also keeps mistaking beautiful women (Evelyn Ankers for one) for a princess he loved 3000 years ago.

Kharis was a character. He walked through doors without first bothering to open them. Bullets wouldn't stop him. A lot of men tried and a lot of men died. When last seen, Kharis was sinking slowly into a pile of quicksand while Dick Foran, his arm clutching the lovely Miss Ankers, muttered something about "Good-by and good riddance."

Good-by indeed. The mummy's popularity had come at a time when the horror cycle was beginning to end. The science fiction boom of the late 1940's was driving off the old monsters in favor of robots and mangy mutations ("Island of Lost Souls," "Freaks").

Universal tried hard to save its monsters. Undaunted, it increased the dosage. "House of Frankenstein" (1945) featured the monster, Dracula, the Wolf Man and a hunchback. But the shock treatment didn't take. The Big Four were fading fast. Finally, in 1948, the death blow was struck: "Abbott and Costello Meet Frankenstein."

So today, of course, the old monsters are gone. Gone, too, are many of the actors who populated those fun films. Karloff is relatively inactive. Lugosi is dead, along with Lionel Atwill (scientists a specialty) and George Zucco (the mummy's priest). Chaney works bit parts. Turhan Bey, once suave and sleek, now is fat and bald, a photographer in Vienna.

No matter. For a while the good ones were made. The monsters live again on The Late Show. Those of us who remember will dream the old dreams. And may the Curse of Karloff shrivel up the money-grubbing hands of those fly-bynight producers who lately have given us "I Was a Teenage Werewolf" and "Werewolf in a Girls' Dormitory" (with its theme song, "The Ghoul in School").

As Baron Frankenstein himself once said, after pulling the switch and seeing he had done a bad thing, "There are some things man was not meant to tamper with."

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



#### She sings upbeat tunes

Why not? Everything's coming up roses for Gloria Loring

"Things happen for me," bubbles singer Gloria Loring. Her Dresden-doll face is beaming beneath a shower of tinsel-straight blonde hair.

To show you how *tast* things do happen for Miss Loring, get a load of this:

A little over a year ago she showed up on *The Merv Griffin Show* and caused the kind of commotion that launches careers. In no time she cracked the Class-A clubs (Puerto Rico's El San Juan, Miami's Diplomat) as a headliner, while continuing to travel all around the tube. She's practically a fixture on Griffin's clambake, has done a *Kratt Music Hall*, three *Carol Burnett Shows*, *Operation: Entertainment*, and was profiled—along with Soul Queen Aretha Franklin—in an ABC documentary called "The Singers: Two Profiles." Last week she was on *The Dean Martin Show* and has been booked by Ed Sullivan,  $\rightarrow$ 

so there seems little reason to doubt that things will continue to happen for Miss Loring.

There are reasons for this nonstop activity. Her looks, for one. She's a tub-fresh 5-feet-6, with all the curves falling into proper place. But talent's the thing. A stand-up-straight-and-sayall-your-words songstress (and how few of those are around today), Loring is a purveyor of upbeat tunes (an equally scarce type, we might add). "I won't sing about despair," Gloria says. "Who wants to be unhappy? Audiences are reaching out for joy." Loring, to listen to the critics, must be giving the crowds what they want. "Unique," "Exceptional," "Sparkling," are a few of her plaudits from the press.

Home is a mid-Manhattan apartment Gloria shares with her pet Peruvian guinea pig called Lowest Form-"because he's the lowest form of life," she explains inaccurately. As Lowest Form cuddles on the couch next to his mistress, the highest form, you learn that Gloria's real name is Goff; that she's 21, the daughter of former trumpet player "Buzzy" Goff; and that she has been in the business three yearsstarting out in Miami coffee houses. About her entry into show business, Miss Loring explains: "It just happened, like everything else. I can't say I was the master of my own fate."

She pretty much is now, though. A "Power of Positive Thinking" type, Gloria chattingly serves a listener the following mixed platter of thoughts: "Seventy-five percent of the people who've made it, made it happen. . . If you sit around pitying yourself, it's your own fault. . . I don't believe you should say, 'I won't do something.' I believe you should say, 'I will do something.'"

Gloria, you also learn, is a "student of Christian Science," although "not yet in complete control" of her mind.

That happening, professionally anyway, shouldn't be far off. "A singer must have control," she says with the sureness of a laser beam. A hard

worker, Gloria, according to her voice coach Marty Lawrence, "is constantly striving for perfection, and nothing shall stand in the way of her achieving it." Jack Franklin, Loring's arranger, adds, "Gloria's a very dedicated girl. She knows exactly what she wants."

A chronic question asker ("I want to know as much about my business as possible," she says), Gloria apparently asked one question too many around a recent show. "Word got back to me that I was a troublemaker," she says. She sees as part of the trouble the "insecurity" of many who toil in theatrics. "If I feel insecure," Gloria says, "I come home and work out a solution. Besides, I'm too busy to go around spreading rumors."

Busy as she is with her career, Miss Loring has an almost nonexistent social life, and she has few friends around her. "I don't go out much," she says. "I don't think I'm missing anything that would add something to me as a person. . . My life is bound up in me and the people I work with." Not that Gloria doesn't want to be accepted. "I'm asking for the whole world!"

Those friends Gloria does have, like Marty Lawrence, are devoted to her. "Gloria is warm, sweet and absolutely sincere," he says. But there are those who find Loring, as one musician put it, "too aggressive" and "overbearing." Says Lawrence: "I don't think Gloria realizes that the warmth and sweetness don't always come through. But, don't forget, she's still trying to cope with instant success."

And Miss Loring doesn't expect things to quiet down much. "Things are still happening for me," she says, "only now it's on a different level." To the growing legion of Loring followers, that can only be the best news since the end of World War II. As for Gloria, her goal is crystal clear. "If you make the few people who believe in you proud, that's enough. I want to be able to say I did all I could, I did my best."




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

This show deserves high marks for breaking the color barrier. Nonetheless. it is so self-conscious about doing so that a good part of the time Julia will give you a fast pain. And without providing fast, fast relief—the pace is so slow that there are times when you are going to be convinced that the show has stopped entirely. Furthermore, the story is strictly soap opera-the cooking of a breakfast, the burping of a baby. the fixing of a television set, the coming of a baby sitter are big events here. The story concerns the trials and tribulations of a beautiful young black widow (Diahann Carroll), a registered nursehighly qualified, of course-who has a beautiful 6-year-old son (Marc Copage) by her late husband, an Air Force captain who was killed in Vietnam. She has to make her way in an apparently allwhite apartment building and all-white industrial health office

On top of all this the widow's "little man" son, who could be a large charmer in small doses, is made into a curious combination of Machiavellian schemer, elder statesman and pain in the neck, and is forced down your throat in great sirupy gobs around an endless series of "Yes, Ma'am"s (to his mother, no less). Stirred in with this is such incredible dialogue as—Julia: "I like you, mister." Corey: "I like me too." Julia: "That's very important, for a man to like himhimself." Corey: "Do you know why I like me?" Julia: "No." Corey: "Because I like what you like, and you like me."

Why then, you may ask, all the excitement about this show? The answers are simple. First, because it is being done at all—for which all concerned have our congratulations. Second, because it has no laugh track—for which more congratulations. Third, because it is being done by Miss Carroll, who is amazingly convincing even when she's wearing \$5000 worth of clothes and hasn't yet got a job.

Besides this, there are other excellent performances—notably, by Michael Link, playing Corey's 6-year-old white friend, who, happily, goes easier on the sirup; and by Lloyd Nolan as Julia's crotchety doctor boss. Indeed, the first episode did not come to life until Mr. Nolan delivered his famous line, "Have you always been a Negro-or are you just trying to be fashionable?" And. by the end of the fourth episode, he and Julia are having truly delightful scenes. Turned down at the door of a restaurant by a snooty maitre d' who demands, "Who made the reservation?" the doctor replies, "Abraham Lincoln." "The chef," he tells Julia, "is an old patient of mine. Myron Goldfarb." "Really?" she replies. "He doesn't cook Jewish."

All in all, we have high hopes for this show, if only something interesting would happen—like, for example, the producer hiring a brand new black writer who would have the courage to tell him to stop telling it like it isn't.

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
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
