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Mazola makes good eating good sense!

Should women only be seen and not heard?

An essayist bemoans the fact that females have not been accepted as news commentators

Walter, Chet, David, Eric, Frank, Edwonderful guys, superb professionals, and we know them better than anybody else in the world, except for our husbands. For they come into the room every night and tell us what the score is and where the action is, and we don't care if they're handsome or homely, or 40 or 50 or 60, because they have authority, they have presence, they have experience and reason—and because they are men.

That, in fact, is the clincher. For if there were such a thing as a top woman commentator on television with the same attributes, would we feel the same way about her as we do about these

men?

I suggest that the answer would be No. And I suggest that the reasons for this No lie in attitudes toward women of authority that are shared equally by the broadcasting powers and the public they purport to serve.

These are questions that assail at least one of the very small handful of women—myself—allowed to comment on matters of life and death on television: specifically through a brief weekly commentary on New York's educational TV station, Channel 13, and occasionally on ABC-TV's news program.

While I consider myself fortunate to be one of this tiny band, I cannot help wondering about a representation so token that it is virtually nonexistent in a population of which half are women. Of these women, admittedly, the ones with the requisite wisdom, experience and presence to communicate with a large public are indeed a minority. But still they exist by the hundreds in the arts, the sciences, the political scene, and above all, in literature. Who sees them on television, not as panelists, but in their own right as voices of authority?

The answer is, invariably: Pauline Frederick, reporting to us on NBC from time to time from the United Nations. But her durability could be ex-

plained not only by her obvious competence and pleasing presence but by the fact that she is more of a reporter and interpreter of events than—in the sense of being a catalyst of thought—a commentator. The opinions expressed are those of others: almost no personal attitudes toward individuals or events are apparent. You might say that this was also true of Cronkite and Huntley and Brinkley and McGee, if not of Sevareid and Newman. Yet even these masters of fact, of objectivity, manage to convey their own stamp and stance:

a way of looking at things which is entirely theirs. This Miss Frederick lacks, thereby remaining totally uncontroversial.


Like Marlene Sanders of ABC, for instance, her function is certainly more than that of a newscaster in that she edits the wire-service reports and news releases as they come in and—exerting selection and a sense of priorities—prepares her own newscast. Both supplement their reports with interviews, on-the-spot observation, and extensive background reading.

The newscasters, on the other hand —mostly personable young men throughout the country who appear on your screen and describe the day's events—merely read the scripts handed to them by their news-writers.

Yet even in this category of neutral news wholly free of opinion, women are seldom visible, although in many other countries they are familiar presences on the home screen.

Again, why not here? Certainly we allow pretty young women to explain the weather on television or tell us what Mrs. Nixon wore at a rally or what Lynda Bird Robb likes to eat.

And the networks often send them "on the road" and even—in the case of Marlene Sanders, and Liz Trotta (NBC)—on a Vietnam tour.→



Yet it is a fact that the only national television female of real authority is Julia Child. That is not merely because she is a superb human being but because her opinions are confined to that natural and universal passion, Food. Nobody can knock a woman Doing Her Thing in a kitchen. And nobody cares if she doesn't look like Raquel Welch or have her hair done by Kenneth. In fact, quite properly, they care for her more because she is, simply, herself.

But put a woman behind one of those desks with buttons and monitors and let her rip? For one thing, she should look young and smooth-faced, and who can be that after 20 or 30 years of training, involvement and experience? And who-as one network executive was heard to say-"wants to look at a middle-aged dame, especially if she's bright?" A vice president suggested that women like that were regrettably apt to remind the men in the audiences of their wives or mothers -or mothers-in-law: always talking or laying down the law, presumably. A man can take it from a man, although he may wince at the debonair sophistication of a Buckley or a Vidal, because after all he knows what he's talking about. Besides, objectivity has long been claimed (with little evidence) as a masculine virtue, and while opinion is therefore a male prerogative, it is a female flaw.

To a lesser degree this is true of print too. Newspapers have some very fine female political correspondents and general columnists who report and comment on major issues, but it is very seldom that they are quoted either by pundits or the public. They are hardly ever on the editorial page of daily or weekly newspapers, for that is the sacred male domain. If a woman of any distinction says anything or does anything of public importance, she lands on the woman's page with the recipes.

And when women move into fields of exposure or reform—to wit, the late


Rachel Carson and insecticides in her book "Silent Spring," or Jessica Mitford and the undertaker business in "The American Way of Death." or former Sen. Maurine Neuberger and cigarette advertising and the tobacco industry - the reactions of outrage from the particular interests exposed invariably include the implication that the attacks were unfounded (the woman didn't know her facts) or hysterical (women are emotional, hence wholly subjective). Women novelists, from Rebecca West down to Jacqueline Susann (yes, the graph is steep) are all right, and women mystery writers are universally embraced. And there is always, of course, Margaret Mead, especially if she sticks to primitive tribes.

But at least the male public does not expect such women to be beautiful or sexy; success is enough.

In a recent article in The New York Times Magazine, newsman Bob Teague of NBC complained that he was weary of being complimented by whites because he was a Negro rather than because he did a good job. The parallel with women in broadcasting is obvious. Since our representation is even less than token, we are oddities, often praised mainly because we are women.

The fact is that television is primarily a medium of entertainment, and that's presumably where women belong. Public affairs are male affairs, and that's where they don't belong-except in the early-morning hours. In spite of its appalling title and climate of gush, the women on Girl Talk occasionally tackle the facts of life between a rash of commercials. And now, on the new WNBC discussion show called (of courseand stupidly) For Women Only, Aline Saarinen and her guests really come to grips with major subjects. This the housewives can hear, but not the general public. Women may have borne the sons who go to war, but in prime time when do they speak of war? They conceive the children, but when-in ->

prime time—do they express their opinions on the Pope's encyclical?

There is still, let's face it, a deep resistance to the career woman as such, no matter how feminine she may be. And this resistance is quite understandable in the case of militant females who bulldoze their opinions with strident voices, contorted faces and guerrilla tactics. Even worse, perhaps, are those silken-voiced, super-groomed ladies who use the guise of femininity to conceal a vaulting and implacable ambition.

But the time will come, hopefully, when it won't matter whether facts and opinions, ideas and insights are communicated by a man or a woman, or whether, if a woman, she is young or not young, neither a fashion model nor a Playboy centerfold.

Heaven forbid that we should ever replace Walter and Chet and David and Eric and Frank and Ed, whom we love dearly. All we are asking-and by we, I clearly mean those women who are qualified by training and experience to communicate, those who are deeply committed to the society we inhabitwe ask only that our voices be heard more often and more widely in matters that concern us all-men and womenequally. Surely it is an abnormal situation when major discussions and news panels addressed to world events are composed, almost invariably, only of men.

As women we might not only be able to offer special and different insights, but it might make for a more peaceful world if we did.

Our job as women, after all, is to create and not destroy. We have learned through centuries of instinct and experience how to preserve a family; and that family has now been extended to our town, our state, our world. We are committed to keeping house; and that house has now become our city and our Nation. We must clean the air we breathe, the streets we live in and the

land and water that sustain us.


The machinery of peacekeeping is as much our function as that of our men. It is our boys who are killed in war; it is unplanned, unwanted children borne by women who bring the starvation, poverty, and congestion that lead to war. It is love for the wanted child that should make our voice in the forming of his future as essential as that of our men.

On a more immediate level. I believe that women have a special way of looking at things and feeling about them that men by their very nature often lack. This can concern matters that might seem trivial but could be very important. It is a kind of intimacy of vision, a direct human approach which can often be more revealing of truth than the "grand design" or portentous abstraction projected on the media by most men. When I see the inevitable row of men questioning a President or a public figure in the news, asking whether he still believes such and such that he said in such and such a speech of Oct. 8, I wish some woman would ask what he does in his spare time, what writer or painter or music he most likes, how he communicates with his son, what he misses most, what he wants most. Just as men should be often assigned to interview women. I wish women were often the probers of men.

If only for variety, the female presence as a commentator of the human as well as of the political scene would be an asset. In the recent manned Apollo launch and orbit, the combination of Rene Carpenter and David Brinkley added a refreshing dimension and new insights.

So—gentlemen of television, leaders of broadcasting—what are you waiting for? Could it be that you are more concerned with public acceptance—than with the public interest? Could it be that because you are men, you see only your own image?

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
Behind the wheel again

After driving up and down 'Route 66' for years, Martin Milner is now cruising on a police beat

You know how hard it is to back into a parking place when the light turns green and the cars behind start honking? Then you won't envy the traffic hazards that Martin Milner faces in Adam-12. All he has to do is wheel around in dimesized spaces, with color cameras rolling at hundreds of dollars per minute, and bring his police car into exactly pinpointed positionswhile delivering lines of dialogue and managing to look casually heroic at the same time. There is, of course, an easier way to film such stuff: the way it's usually done, with "process" shots -actors performing against filmed backgrounds. But Adam-12, dramatizing the duty tours of two uniformed Los Angeles cops, carries Jack Webb's Mark VII trade-mark. Webb is the executive producer and he personally directed the first episode. From the outset it was clear that the new show would reflect the same overwhelming "dum-de-dum-dum" realism →





that Webb has always aimed for in *Dragnet*. Among other things, this meant that the actor starred as Officer Pete Malloy would do his own driving, in a car with built-in sound recording and in intricate sync with traveling cameras.

Of all the available leading men in Hollywood, as it happened, Marty Milner was uniquely qualified. Normally one of the more modest actors you're likely to come across, Milner himself will tell you, "I'm probably the best in the business at hitting camera marks while driving. With all my experience, I can pull right into a close-up."

His experience goes back to four long seasons behind the wheel on the *Route* 66 series, which was shot on widely scattered locations around the U.S., likewise without the benefit of process

photography.

Valuable as his driving skill has proved in terms of time and money saved during production, it was a negligible factor in Milner's selection for Adam-12.

One thing everybody at Mark VII. Universal Television and NBC-TV agreed on in advance was that Adam-12, in order to realize its best possible chance for a successful rating, would need an unusually warm bond of audience identification with the occupants of its blackand-white patrol car. In reverse of the customary order, the junior co-star's role was filled first. Kent McCord already was under contract to Universal and had played a rookie cop in a Dragnet 1968 segment. Both Webb and producer Robert A. Cinader, his Adam-12 co-creator, thought that the tall, 26-year-old Mc-Cord had just the sort of ingenuous enthusiasm required for Officer Jim Reed. Putting the right man in the driver's seat as the relatively hard-bitten, veteran Officer Mallov was more difficult.

"The guy had to be physically right, and he had to have the range and facility as an actor to project the totally credible illusion of a cop, and do it in an attractive way," Cinader summarizes.

"As soon as Milner's name came up, everybody said that's the guy. Along with his experience and maturity, there's this wholesome and still youthful quality about him."

Freckled, sandy-red-haired Marty Milner has been carrying the "boy next door" image for 22 years-since he made his debut before Hollywood cameras at age 14 as the Day family's second son in the movie version of "Life with Father," starring Irene Dunne and William Powell. Later the image was doubly enhanced on television when he played similar "daughter's boy friend" parts on Stu Erwin's The Trouble with Father series and Bill Bendix's The Life of Riley program. The shows overlapped and Milner, still as bovishly trim at 6-feet-1 and 175 pounds as he was then, recalls, "Finally it came to the point where I married the daughter on the Erwin show at the same time I was going with Riley's daughter."

With time out for two years of stateside army duty, Milner had important parts in such feature films as "Sweet Smell of Success" and "Mariorie Morningstar" to his credit and already was described as "a veteran TV and movie actor" when the heralded big break of his career came along in 1960. That was Route 66, in which he teamed with the comparatively obscure George Maharis. Milner was the clean-cut kid who owned and drove the sporty car. He had top billing in the cast, and the show was an instant hit. Then something unforeseen happened. Maharis. saturnine and a bit raffish as he slouched in the passenger seat, won greater press and public attention. The mail piled up-1800 fan letters a month for Milner, 5000 for Maharis.

"It wasn't that George tried to steal the spotlight," Milner remembers with philosophic good humor. "He was a more colorful guy than I. We had almost nothing in common, but actually we got along pretty well. His basic devotion was to his career. I had other drives and other interests."

In their travels through New England, for example, while bachelor Maharis socialized and made provocative comments on whatever popped into his or his interviewer's head, Milner quietly went shopping for antiques to take home to his wife and growing family.

Early in Route 66's third season, Maharis withdrew from the series with hot words for the producer and all others concerned, including "Mister" Milner. The latter maintained his cool. The two have met only once since, a chance encounter that Milner describes as "cordial but without any real warmth." The last Milner heard of him, Maharis was making movies in Spain: "I think George has done all right. He hasn't become another Paul Newman—but then, neither have I."

Milner drove Route 66 alone during the remainder of its third year, then acquired Glenn Corbett (who remains a close personal friend) as his touring companion for a fourth and last season. After the show ended, Screen Gems, its producer, bought all his residual rights. With the payments spread out over several years for tax purposes, this gave Milner financial security to compensate for the top-flight stardom his four years of solid trouping might have brought him but didn't.

Since then he has guest-starred occasionally in other TV shows and appeared in several feature films, including the recent "Sullivan's Empire" and "Valley of the Dolls." "I've had all the work I wanted, though not everything had the quality I might have wished," he admits. In partnership with director-writer Allen H. Miner, he has formed an independent production company that has two movie properties almost ready to roll.

His "other interests" now center around a walnut-shaded Mexican mockadobe house on an unpretentious deadend street in Van Nuys, Cal. Two cars stand in the driveway. One is a six-


door airport bus that Mrs. Milner, former TV singer and actress Judy Jones, uses to transport their four children (two girls and two boys with ages ranging from 10 to 4) and neighbor kids to and from school. The other, Milner's own, is a rare 1953 Bentley Sedanca de Ville that once belonged to Frank Lloyd Wright, now lovingly restored and driven with pride.

In a corner of the furnace room is a small woodworking shop where he painstakingly repairs pieces of "primitive" American furniture for family use. There he recently finished several months of patient labor on a de-luxe. miniature dollhouse, infinitely detailed and electrically wired inside and out, as a gift for his wife. "She says I've got a completely one-track mind, and I guess she's right," he says. "While I was working on it, I was called about doing a Tarzan quest spot. I didn't want to go to Acapulco and the part didn't sound very exciting, but the real reason I turned it down was that I couldn't leave the dollhouse right then."

He brings the same kind of single-minded drive to his work as an actor. Four days of every current week he's totally immersed in Adam-12, even giving up his lunch hours to watch daily screenings of the previous day's shooting, constantly criticizing and trying to improve his performance. His junior partner, Kent McCord, expresses both awe and admiration of such professionalism: "I've got so much to learn, but I'm very lucky. I couldn't have been paired with a better man than Marty, and on top of it all he's such a helluva nice guy."

Win or lose in the 1968-69 ratings race, that's already more kind, appreciative words than affable Marty Milner ever heard from the right-hand seat in more than two years along Route 66—and exactly the impression that Webb, Cinader and company fervently hope the Saturday night Adam-12 audience will get of him, too.





hot winter sun blazes hypnotically on a flat, parched plain of golden stubble. The plain spreads around us, unrolling emptily toward the sky, bounded by the flat silhouettes of leafless trees.

Nothing moves in this hollow world but the jagged design of a tremendous woolen rug, spread like a patch on the empty plain. We all sit crouched, immobile, on this patch—35 souls with drugged faces, facing in one direction, like Arabs at prayer.

We are staring at an altar, a sacramental display of food: great twists of crusty bread, jugs of red wine, a platter of golden chicken. A high priest, a tall, beak-faced man with a red beard,

stands by the offering.

Suddenly, the collective trance is broken. A short, stocky man, his face masked with sunglasses, leaps to his feet. It is Truman Capote. He bellows with nervous laughter. "My God," he cries, "we're all in an Antonioni film."

"No . . . Pirandello," whispers Eleanor Perry, a slender woman with beautiful stunned eyes. "It's pure Pirandello."

And it is pure Pirandello. We are the characters in an improvised play that might be called "The Author Confronting His Past"; a strange assortment of Northerners and Southerners, consisting of Truman Capote, Princess Lee Radziwill, director Frank Perry and his wife, bearded Oscar-winning art-director Gene Callahan, some newspaper people, and 20-odd Capote relatives, forgathered from remote corners of Alabama. We huddle together on our little woolen island, in an empty Alabama field, drinking wine and eating chicken, staring at each other mutely, suspended in a world where the boundaries between art and reality have been dissolved.

We are prisoners, all of us—locked into Truman Capote's memories.

We are locked into "A Christmas Memory," first televised on ABC in 1966, brilliantly directed by Frank Perry. . . . It is the true story of Miss Sook, the



tortured, lonely woman who loved the little Truman, whom she called "Buddy," and nourished with her fragile capacity for joy . . . who flew kites with him and gathered pecans with him in the fields, and made fruitcakes to send to people they both admired . . . who sheltered him from the caste-conscious respectables in the family. "Miss Sook and I are cousins . . ." said Truman's voice, in narrating the story, "and we have lived together-well, as long as I can remember. Other people inhabit the house, relatives; and though they have power over us, and frequently make us cry, we are not, on the whole, too much aware of them. We are each other's best friend . . ."

When Truman Capote came home again

And brought his memories to life for a TV special

Miss Sook, with her inner current of suicidal pain, is dead now. But the "other people," the relatives, are here. They are sitting right on the rug with us, real yet unbelievable characters from fiction that have suddenly sprung to life.

And we are locked too into the memories of "The Thanksgiving Visitor," the story being filmed right now on the other side of the horizon, to be played Thanksgiving Day ... another true story set still farther back in time, back to the Thanksgiving Day when the relatives all came to the house ... to that day when a little "Buddy" was forced by Miss Sook to invite his torturer, a bully named Odd Henderson, to this feast of love ... when he caught Odd stealing,

and denounced the crime before the assembled guests . . . when Miss Sook taught Buddy the tormenting Christian lesson of turning the other cheek. . . .

Miss Sook is dead now. . . . But they are sitting here . . . the others who sat, some of them, at that table heaped so high with Thanksgiving bounty. . . . They are sitting here, remembering . . . pinned helpless, as we all are, under the strange, overlapping weight of fact and fiction . . . of present and past . . .

It is yesterday . . .

I have just arrived to watch the filming of "The Thanksgiving Visitor." I stand in the Alabama field, a few minutes \rightarrow

outside of Montgomery, and watch as the aunts and uncles and cousins arrive . . . slowly, in antique cars and muledrawn carts. They are not the real aunts, uncles and cousins, they are actors and local Alabama citizens hired to play the parts. And high on a truck, shouting instructions by megaphone, is director Frank Perry, rosy-cheeked, mustached -quiding them, coaxing them until they rush spontaneously up the steps of the old dilapidated Victorian house, with the glad cries and strange cackling laughter of aunts embracing aunts at a family reunion. And there is a rumbling undertone of uncles embracing timid little girls in huge hair ribbons. And a frail little blond boy stares out at them all from the shelter of Miss Sook's skirts on the porch.

It is acting, but it is strangely real. Not only because of the artistry involved; but because of the fluidity of boundaries that is already present. Because, on the set, everyone is aware that this did happen, that the frail little boy has grown up, that he is Truman Capote, that he will shortly arrive on an airplane, with Lee Radziwill; that the real relatives themselves are on their way . . . that the present will shortly invade this delicate projection of the past . . .

And then they arrive. The silver plane drops to earth from the silent Southern air, and settles. And out steps Lee, slender and adorable in a pony-skin costume, with Truman, in a fashionable sports coat, clinging, childlike, to her hand. They get into cars, drive out to the set-and all production stops while Truman visits the re-creation of his childhood home.

It is an abandoned Southern country house. It has been brought to life by Gene Callahan, who has repapered the walls and stuffed the rooms with worn Victorian furniture, and given it the tired, musty look of permanently inhabited, genteel decay. Truman and Lee wander through the house, hand in hand, crying, "Marvelous! Absolutely marvelous!"

And the rest of us-actors, crew members, the director and Eleanor Perry, who adapted Truman's stories for film-follow along, watching Truman watch his own life . . . And a stunned look appears in Eleanor's eyes, and she whispers, "It's Pirandello. . . . It's eerie. . . . Here he is, facing his own past of 30 years ago."

The high-pitched cries of "Marvelous" tinkle thinly, like false crystal, against the painful density of the past, and eventually cease. "Truman is such an artist," says Lee, softly, "there's nothing he wants to hide or forget." "When Truman saw the stills of 'A Christmas Memory' he burst into tears," confides Eleanor, "When he saw the whole film,

he just dissolved, he wept."

And quite suddenly "the others," the real relatives, start arriving. . . . Mr. Arch Persons and his wife, Truman's father and stepmother, are there. [Truman's mother married Joseph Capote, whose name the author adopted. 1 And aunts and cousins follow. And they are all standing in front of the old house. Mr. Persons speaks. A tall man, courtly in manner, he looks like an older, more conventional Truman. "I was there when it all happened," he remembers. "So true to life. We all loved her, Miss Sook. Still do. Of course the three old ladies are gone now. But one uncle and three aunts are left. Some are coming here."

Off in the shadow of an old porch, Callahan, the art director, watches the Capote relatives as they wander through the house. His eyes are bemused. "It's a weird experience," he says. "It's so strange to have the man alive and on the scene. . . . We're all feeling this, this strange thing, having the family here. The fact of the family walking through an era which we've created. It makes me feel—I don't know how to say it-as if I were the architect of their past. . . . It's eerie."

By the side of the road, outside the house, relatives and strangers overlap, caught up in the web of Truman's

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past. A discussion flares over the dead Miss Sook. Should she have betraved Truman by protecting the boy who was bully and thief? "Yes," says Mr. Persons, "she was teaching Buddy a moral lesson. He learned from it. Even Odd became a better boy." A neighbor, Mrs. Grady Hale, agrees. "It was a sweet and tender thing for her to do."

And behind the old house stands Miss Sook herself, ravaged, gentle, slovenly. It's actress Geraldine Page, with Sook's own anguished eyes, who plays this character brilliantly. Her face is marred by subtle confusion. "Every time I'm introduced to a real relative," she whispers, "I feel sort of . . . stunned. I can't exactly explain it. They knew her, you see. They knew her . . .'

Later we dine together at the hotel at one long table. Truman sits at one end, his old friend Miss Sook at his left, and his new friend Lee sits at the foot. We are all aware, suddenly, that this is A Capote Party-a sacramental feast to commemorate the bittersweet

of Truman's past.

But the past is now the present. It is sitting there, around the table. We are surrounded by it, and by the sensitivities of those who still embody it.

A Capote aunt, Mrs. Jennings Carter of Monroeville, Ala., chats a little excitedly. "You know, Sook wasn't really like that, childlike. She was a brilliant woman. And neat as a pin. And we weren't poor like that! Why, a neighbor came up to me after 'A Christmas Memory' and said, 'I didn't know you were so poor you had to swipe pecans.' I was furious! We weren't poor. . . ."

And Mr. Persons says, a little defiantly, "Truman had a wonderful childhood, a very happy childhood."

And, at Truman's end of the table, a literary discussion flourishes. "I can't think of anything of mine that is pure fiction," he says. "These are autobiographical memories. Mostly, I distill my art from reality."

But the reality from which he has distilled it is sitting there, around the table. . . . Miss Sook's agonized eves are looking out of Geraldine Page's face. . . . And the gently bred, familyconscious relatives chat about their lives. And slowly, the confining glories from which the young Truman fled are delineated before our eyes . . .

Suddenly, Arch Persons looks up, as a very old lady passes the table. "Who's that?" he whispers. "It's an actress." someone says. "She's playing Truman Capote's great aunt." "Oh ves." savs Mr. Persons. "On his mother's side."

And unreality swirls back in on reality, swamping us all . . .

It does not lift, throughout the next morning's shooting, but still hangs like a dense fog around us. Everyone, by now, has the same drugged face. And on the set. Mr. Persons sits inside a car, talking intimately, to a frail little Truman, his child of 30 years ago, by the miracle of casting.

The endless shuttling back and forth between past and present, between art and reality, becomes increasingly confusing and disturbing, a strange mental dilemma from which we can't escape. Gradually, nothing outside it seems of importance. And the world slowly shrinks down to a pinpoint, until nothing is left in it at all. Nothing except all of us. enmeshed in the warp and woof of two short stories, weighted down by their continuous liquetaction into life.

Thus, at the final sacramental picnic. we find ourselves crouched, motionless. in a hollow world-35 characters in a Pirandello play, victims of an acute form of anti-artistic shock. And only a nervous bellow from the masked author himself can stir us out of our trance. And so we sit, huddled close together. on our woolen island in the Alabama sun, suspended in a no man's land between art and reality . . . eating chicken, drinking wine, and looking at each other with strange, stunned eyes.


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
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It's On to New York for Brinkley

David Brinkley is about to abandon his long-time Washington TV newsbeat. He has rented an apartment on Manhattan's Sutton Place and will do his nightly news stint from New York, across a desk from Chet Huntley, for the first time in their 12 years as a team. One reason for the move: Brinkley and his wife have separated. In the new Huntley-Brinkley format, probably to be unveiled in December, the brunt of Washington coverage will fall to John Chancellor.

No sooner had the networks put on seven nights a week of prime-time movies than the old Hollywood flicks lost their bloom with the viewers. "They've peaked out," shrugs CBS program chief Mike Dawn. "We never learn," confesses top ABC programmer Len Goldberg. "Something gets hot, like the movies-or the Westerns, earlier-and we all overdo it." The fact is, while only a few months ago TV series stars and producers were wailing that they just couldn't compete with movies, the ratings for network pictures this fall have skidded alarmingly. What's worse, networkers privately concede they've got a lot of "dogs" (B pictures or worse) they had to buy along with the blockbuster releases and they've got to start playing these off. "Wait'll January," one highranking networker moaned. "The ratings will be awful." NBC reportedly is thinking of lopping off its third movie night next fall. All three of the networks were so hypnotized by the movie binge last year they scarcely bothered with new-program development. Now they have ordered up many series pilots. "The programmers are thinking in TV terms again," Dann exults. What that means for 1969-70: more variety shows, more situation comedies, may be some revival of lawyer and doctor dramas.

Cable (community antenna) television, with its profusion of available channels, is much more likely than Public (educational) TV to provide U.S. viewers with diversity in programming in the years ahead. That's one conclusion reached by a Presidential task force on communications policy that is expected any moment to submit its findings to President Johnson. while bullish on CATV, the study group admits to fear that unhampered expansion of such closed-circuit TV, which the viewer pays a monthly fee to receive, poses a peril to the economic health of over-the-air "free" TV. How to encourage cable-TV programming while protecting the existing on-air service, the task force concedes, "is the most important challenge" facing the country's broadcasting policymakers. Interestingly the study finds satellite TV less likely to lead to a fourth national network than it is to offer "the cheapest mechanism" for distributing TV signals locally-say, in a metropolitan area. As for pay TV, it's "unlikely to reach substantial proportions," the probers believe. -Richard K. Doan

A superspectacular and a couple of thrillers lend distinction to a network-movie week that also includes two tailored-for-television films and a couple of sops for the teeny-boppers.

The superspectacular is "55 Days at Peking." The ultimate in exotica-a Manchu Western made in Spain. Inspired by the historic Boxer Rebellion, producer Samuel Bronston hasn't let history throw him: it's the Alamo all over again, \$9,000,000's worth, including some 6500 assorted movie stars (exquisite Ava Gardner and noble Charlton Heston among them) and extras and a full-scale replica of old Peking that is blown sky high at finale time. There are some simply lovely fireworks, an infectious excitement in the combat and enough eve-tingling colorful spectacle to make you forgive the cliches and overlook the banal dialogue. In contrast, "Marco the Magnificent" reduces Marco Polo's epic journey to China to a series of crude capers. It's cheapjack spectacular, with oodles of dead extras, bad dubbing, big-name stars contributing low-budget cameo bits and, as Polo, Horst Buchholz, who emerges as little more than a poverty-program Cornel Wilde. It's for the teeny-boppers.

The week's thrillers are the premiere of Stanley Donen's "Charade" and the repeat of Alfred Hitchcock's "North by Northwest." "Charade" is a handsomely wrapped package of fun and games and mayhem and murder, with a twisting, twirling plot and,

for superglitter, Audrey Hepburn and Cary Grant. And just for extras you get Walter Matthau as a plotter and James Coburn as one of a trio of stupid hoods. Maybe the plotting isn't perfect—but the blend of good humor and suspense is. The Hitchcock movie, one of the maestro's top works, also involves Cary Grant, with Eva Marie Saint as the mystery woman and the Presidential profiles on Mount Rushmore the site of the by-now classic climax.

The second offering for teeny-boppers (and serious sociologists) is "Bikini Beach," son of "Muscle Beach Party" and grandson of "Beach Party," starring, as usual, Frankie Avalon, America's middle-aged teenager, and Annette Funicello, the teenager's wind-up doll. It involves surfing, wiggling and revved-up songs and, hopefully, very little resemblance to intelligent young people living or dead.

The week's World Premiere tailoredfor-television offerings are unknown
quantities. "Companions in Nightmare"
presents Melvyn Douglas and Leslie
Nielsen as a couple of psychiatrists involved in group therapy and murder.
"Something for a Lonely Man" has
Dan Blocker starring in his first nonBonanza dramatic role on television
as a 19th-century blacksmith trying
to develop a town in the High Sierras
and the emphasis, we gather, is on
industry rather than gunsmoke. Can
this be a Western?

How Sinatra Did His Thing

A day with the entertainer, in which he tried to come to grips with the younger generation and cut short his taping after a phone call from Mexico

Of all the superstars, actor-singer Frank Sinatra has always been afflicted with the most unfortunate press. During just one week in mid-August, his name made headlines when he allegedly "walked out" on the taping of the CBS special scheduled to be telecast this Monday (Nov. 25); again when conflicting divorce-action charges were publicized from Juarez, Mexico, where his wife, actress Mia Farrow, 23, was granted a 30-minute "quickie" (26 minutes longer than their "instant" wedding ceremony two years previously); and finally, most glaringly, when the Wall Street Journal excoriated him in a front-page story headlined: "SINATRA'S PALS -GANGSTER FRIENDSHIPS CAUSE SINGER TROU-BLE, BUT HE ISN'T FAZED." Where the singer's battered image would be without the soothing services of Hollywood's smoothie press-agent Jim Mahoney-whose prime function it is to keep Sinatra's name out of the papers-is a prospect to boggle the mind.

As for the mellowing entertainer's celebrated "walkout," TV GUIDE was there, readers, there in Studio 4 at NBC-Burbank, and here is the inside

was on hand with an elliptical surmise: "So what's so strange? So Frank likes to sell his specials to CBS and tape them at NBC."

Why (one wonders) this ill-fated week for a fabricated journalistic rehash of the singer's "long and intimate associations with gangsters," as the Journal not so elliptically phrased it? (Was the paper motivated by Presidential politics? Sinatra was indeed busy raising money for the Humphrey cam-

paign.) Snapped Mahoney in the face of the austere financial organ: "Mr. Sinatra has associated with Presidents, heads of state and hundreds of personalities much more interesting and copy worthy."

For Frank Sinatra, as so sickeningly often in the past, a most unfortunate

week with the press.

Not all the press, though. Not TV GUIDE. Not after Sinatra's opening line: "Nice to meet you. I've read a lot of your stuff. You're a damn good writer." Wow! Wowee! Now, there's a gent!

Handsome! Debonair! Younger than springtime! Frank Sinatra stepped jauntily out of his customized Dual Ghia at NBC's artists' entrance at 2:30 P.M. Wednesday, Aug. 14. Frank never looked swingier, his lined face reflecting perhaps the maturity of his years. Actually, if it isn't too down-beat of me to say so, he looked downright melancholy. In fact, my dominant impression of the man, after two days of observation, was one of fathomless sadness. Touching. But what can you do for the man who has everything?

He obviously didn't lack companionship; he was dripping with pals. There was hefty Jilly Rizzo, who owns Jilly's in New York as well as Jilly's South. Sinatra's favorite Miami night club. There was portly Mickey Rudin, Sinatra's attorney. And George Jacobs, his groovy Negro valet (subsequently sacked for dancing with Mia Farrow at the Candy Store, a Beverly Hills discotheque), Dominic Di Bono, "Shotaun" Britton, and others. Many others. One couldn't help recalling Mia's pitiful lament: "We are never alone."

Why so sad? Sinatra's career at least was doing all right. He was tied for first place in the male-vocalist category of Cash Box magazine's year-end survey. His last Christmas TV special with old pal Dean Martin and their respective joint families (Mia alone excepted) pulled a wow 67 percent of the

viewing audience.

Yet he'd been feeling more and more out of it lately. The old Cole Porter and Rodgers-and-Hart and Gershwin ballads were still going over with the boozy, middle-aged night-club crowd, true. But Sinatra was all too hip to What's Happening, Baby, in the world of pop culture, Baby, and he was all too conscious that he was still fighting yesterday's rear-guard action. Everywhere he turned: New Sound, New Sound, NEW SOUND.

It was time, and past time, to update the autumnal image. Last summer, at 52, he hired pyrotechnic young genius Jim Webb, 21, of "Up, Up and Away," to write him a new album. He hired his daughter Nancy's arranger, Lee Hazelwood, to help him make a now-modish Country and Western debut. And he had hired the with-it producer-writer team of Saul Ilson and Ernest Chambers of The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour to put together this, his fourth and latest special, "Francis Albert Sinatra Does His Thing."

His Thing, on Wednesday, Aug. 14, was hardly contemporary. It was a brief tape insert, labeled in the script "The Rainy Day Spot," with Sinatra standing before the shaving mirror of a desolate motel-room set, singing to himself:

Funny how love becomes a cold,

rainy day.

Funny, that rainy day is here.

The "spot" is ineffably "down," with the sound of rain water dripping from the eaves, and the sadness and loneliness mirrored on all faces in the studio—the crew, the hangers-on. Was Sinatra musing upon his own cold, rainy day, the rainy day that indeed was here and now?

Suddenly the mood on the set changes. A red-checkered tablecloth and a can of Budweiser appear. "Let's have no hang-ups," Sinatra warns. "It's not worth it. TV is here one minute and gone the next." Predictably, the adagency executive wants a second →

take. Not Sinatra. "Maybe for another Mercedes Benz," he jokes on his way out, flanked by his solemn retinue.

Back with the fellas in his dressing room, Jilly guarding the door, Sinatra sighs and grabs a bottle of Stolichnaya vodka. "I gotta wet my whistle. Want some of this Russian stuff?"

On Thursday, Aug. 15th, the day of the taping, there were scheduled the three customary stages in the making of a TV show: (1) at 12:30 the runthrough, (2) at 5:30 the dress rehearsal before a live audience-taped as a matter of precaution, and (3) at 8:30 the actual "air show," video-tape recorded before a second live audience. which on this occasion was to comprise Budweiser dealers, and other functionaries of the brewery with which Sinatra has a long-term deal as pitchman. As headlines were subsequently to proclaim, the singer invented some short cuts in the making of a TV show that day-short cuts that, according to the trade-paper Variety, "left the taste of stale beer" in the mouths of the Budweiser crowd.

The run-through, at least, came off according to plan, followed by a break during which Sinatra granted his "first interview in two years," in the words of press-agent Mahoney, who added, "I'm not saying this is an interview with the Pope!" in the same tone of voice that he might say, "I'm saying this is an interview with the Pope!"

My "interview," if such it can be termed under the conditions, took place in Sinatra's outer dressing room, a small, crowded cubicle supplied by the network. Jilly Rizzo was guarding the door as if it were a Prohibition speakeasy. Mr. Rudin was on and off the phone. Milt Krasny, Sinatra's business manager, kept muttering: "We're going 40 G's over budget." Valet Jacobs was sipping a Coke. Sonny Burke, Sinatra's music supervisor, was in and out. Dolores Rubin, the adoring new secretary who calls him "Francis," was there.

Plus, at times, Helen Turpin, Sinatra's usually anonymous hair stylist; Mahoney, of course; and Mahoney's assistant, Paul Wasserman; and all the jokers with the orange psychedelic shirts and socks. Ever been on the rush-hour subway to the Bronx?

The Man himself displayed an ingratiating demeanor—quiet, serious, interested. I asked him if this special was really a departure for him. "Not really. It's not a complete wipe-out of what I've done in the past. The orchestrations more than anything else have a contemporary touch."

I asked him if he felt estranged from the Now Generation. "When all this began, I felt left out. I wondered what was going to happen to people like me. I couldn't compromise with the New Sound. I just sat on the side lines waiting it out."

Weren't things at last looking up? "I began to feel that there must be a way for me to be a part of it. Five years ago I said that in five years' time something would congeal from the early skull-rattling sound. It congealed. Today the young songwriters are more ballady than even Rodgers and Hart. I don't feel like such an outsider.

"The lyrics of the kids these days are poignant and sweet. It almost goes back to early-American days. Their thing is a form of poetry, or lyricism. Lyricism is what I've done all my life.

"The kids are unhip as compared to a few years ago when they were going through the protest thing. Now there's a kind of sadness to their lyrics, yet they're so young. They're like people of around 40 or 50. They are sad and quite serious. Their genre is really the cowboy lament.

"There's an undertone going back to the old blues structure—in their lyrics more than in their music. It fits their own demeanor. It's not a hokeypokey sort of sadness. They are saddened by the world, by poverty, by the war. And their message has gotten —

through to their parents."

I asked Sinatra if he hadn't been something of a revolutionary rascal himself in his day. "In the early Thirties we were looking for a new sound, too, but not a return to the past. We went forward."

What about the new respectability of Country and Western? "There's a lot of good music being written in that vein. I'm doing an album myself, so I guess the old dog will be learning a few new tricks."

I told him I had read that he always regretted not having had a formal musical education. What did he have to say about the young geniuses of today who can't read a note? "I deplore their dropping out of school. It's a shame they're not fully educated. Their creative output now is so enormous, and suddenly they're at the top of the charts, they're deluged with activity, but they are not prepared."

Where's the New Sound leading us, I wondered. "Their songs are already standards. It will settle in 10 to 15 years to a new style. I wouldn't be surprised if it evolves into serious music that will be played in the repertories of symphony orchestras."

Then it came. The phone call. Personal. He'd been waiting for it all day. From Mexico. Juarez. Sinatra took the call in his inner dressing room. A few minutes later he summoned Ilson and Chambers. They left, sober-faced.

In Studio 4 a production meeting was hastily called. "Fellas, you won't believe this—" Ilson began. "Frank just told us, if we get it great, once is enough. He won't do a second show. The dress rehearsal will be it. That's it!" The producers broke the news to guest stars Diahann Carroll and the 5th Dimension: "Only one performance. Give it everything. Don't save it."

It was the biggest orchestra Sinatra ever had had for a special: 47 pieces, including 16 strings, three guitars. The dress-rehearsal audience was in place. Sinatra's first "Thing," to no one's surprise, turned out to be his old "Hello, Young Lovers."

Was Juarez anywhere in the geography of his consciousness?

In his opening patter Sinatra confided that his recording income "keeps me in mad money—in case I get the urge again." A reference to alimony? Property settlement? (In further headlines, three days later, Mia denied that she had asked for either.)

Sinatra sang some of his old standards. One lyric went like this:

And my gal just up and left last week.

He didn't betray a spasm of untoward emotion.

He sang one new song. He dueted a medley with Diahann Carroll. He pulled on a silver and turquoise Nehru jacket for his number with the 5th Dimension. When the "rehearsal" was over, he proclaimed, "That's it!" and departed with his pals and hangers-on.

On the following day Sinatra flew to Chicago for appearances in behalf of Presidential candidate Humphrey. Three days later those appearances were abruptly canceled when the Wall Street Journal so noisily revived the story of his alleged friendships with Mafia leaders. Press-agent Mahoney wound up his busy week trying to convince anybody who would listen that the reason for Sinatra's ducking out on Humphrey was that "pressing recording commitments in California make it impossible for him to appear, after all."

Meanwhile, what of that second audience of Budweiser dealers, distributors and district managers left standing outside NBC waiting for the 8:30 taping of "Francis Albert Sinatra Does His Thing"? They had the choice of watching the "rehearsal" tape run off on the studio monitors, or attending *The Jerry Lewis Show* taping near-by, or going home to cry in their beer.

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Gurglers, cooers, criers and crawlers

(expert diaper demonstrators all)

HAVE THEIR DAY

The diaper commercial called for 18 babies. The script required the BE-FORE group to be "good criers." The "gurglers and cooers" were to represent happy, satisfied customers AFTER being pampered with Pampers. And there was a special request for "one good crawler."

The bulk of the casting came from Dick Miller, who modestly claims his New York and Hollywood agency "books 75 percent of the babies in



the business." Miller, who handles actors, performers and those luscious full-sized models whose diapers come with bikini tops, is an expert in talent 6 to 18 months old. His client list, currently numbering 150, is elastic because "almost as soon as I get them they've grown into the next category and are listed under 'children.' Unfortunately, babies don't stay babies."

His stars j.g. come from several sources. Besides recommendations

from day nurseries and friends of friends, he contacts relatives and neighbors who are pregnant, and posts notices on hospital maternity floors.

"Casting directors usually request 'adorable babies not too pudgy and not too skinny' with the emphasis on happy babies," volunteered Miller, a go-go-go type of high-powered, 28-year-old ex-press agent who "adores babies" but has none of his own.

"If a kid's off schedule and hasn't ->

had his nap, then he's unhappy. If it's right after his nap he's happy. To minimize problems it's best to film around a youngster's best hours but this can't always be done. So, I've developed ways to tell if a new prospect is a co-operative child. On my first interview I insist the mother leave the room. If the seemingly happy infant reacts wildly when mommy disappears, then I know the kid's troublesome."

As he pinned a large yellow and black "I'm a Dick Miller Kid" button on a smiling goo-goo-er who wasn't appreciably larger than the button, he volunteered more information. "However, if a very cute, smily infant has a mother with a lousy personality, then I don't want that kid either. No production outfit spending fortunes on a commercial wants a disagreeable stage mother who'll stir up the others."

"Darn right," said one of the dozen or so mommies who, along with their offspring, jammed the office. "Bad enough it takes so much time just to show up for interviews and auditions, all we'd need is more aggravation."

Another, after pulling her beauty away from pulling a damp zwieback out of a rival's mouth, added, "For one Ivory soap job I had to bring my little one to three different auditions. I live in New Jersey. That's \$2 every time I come in. And I have to get a sitter for my bigger one. And I have to ready dinner for my husband in case I'm late and I have to keep the little one happy and coochy-coo'd so she's in a good mood and I have to see that she stays clean. It's a big job."

And why do they spend countless hours pushing their kids? One mommy was a model in her salad days and wants the same experience for her children. Another has an older child in the theatrical profession already. Most have their husbands' approval and many pursue it because their children can make good money.

I was introduced to Peter Cooke,

a regular on the CBS-TV network soap As the World Turns since he was 4—months, that is; this veteran in pale blue rompers was now 9—months, that is. "He plays an illegitimate son," explains his legitimate mother happily.

Peter, since replaced on the show by an older child (about a year old, that is), is a member in good standing of the theatrical union, AFTRA (American Federation of Television and Radio Artists). "Some weeks he did as many as three shows," explained mama. And Master Cooke's salary? It was \$87.50 per shot.

Kerry Ann O'Donnell, bent on creeping across the lollipops and crunchy candies on the desk, was pointed out as "the one with the tight close-up in the diaper commercial that's out soon." Seems Kerry fell asleep during shooting and the cameras zoomed in on her. Providing she doesn't wind up on the cutting-room floor, Miss O'Donnell is definitely headed for fortune if not fame.

"If Kerry were just one of the extras, she'd earn \$156.50 on a buy-out, which means that's her whole fee. Period. Since her face is definitely viewable she's classed as a principal and her pay is \$120 plus residuals," Miller said.

No matter what your vintage, there's a going rate for residuals. For spot commercials it's based on the number of cities and the size of the city. For regular sponsorship on a network level, the price is \$120 the first time it's played, \$75 the second and on down per 13-week cycle.

Plucked at random, one model's data card lists her income from one commercial for one six-month period as:

Dreft commercial\$120.00 Add'! Day's Shooting\$120.00 Residual Checks ..\$607.00, \$818.20, \$416.80. \$80.00, \$40.00.

And \$2202.00 isn't too bad considering the vital statistics of this hotshot wage earner are listed as: height 29 inches; weight 25 pounds.

The Miller emporium, located in New

York's Victoria Theater building on Broadway, was involved in considerable casting when I arrive, and the office over the marquee blaring "Clint Eastwood in 'Hang 'Em High' " featured wall-to-wall babies who had days and weeks earlier been interviewed privately.

"An important qualification is mutual co-operation," said Miller. "Some babies are pleasant when they're alone but they can't work with others. Last week we were on a set on Ninth Avenue with 30 babies. Suddenly one started screaming, crying and shrieking and wouldn't stop. Right away all the others followed suit. It was acid. Often we'll try to precheck that by bringing a whole bunch together."

Unlike the full-sized variety, baby models can't be categorized as "sexy type." "Grace Kelly type" and so on. Those about 5 to 6 months are classified as "sit-uppers." "Good crawlers" come around the 8-9-month range.

Then there are the "toddlers," who run like they're drunk. Another specialty is the "good sleeper." One 30-second commercial was shooting three days because the kid who was guaranteed to be "a good sleeper" wouldn't shut her eyes or her mouth. The scene was to be one baby asleep in the midst of crawlers and rompers. Well, the crawlers crawled and the rompers romped but the sleeper wouldn't sleep.

The vast numbers of infants needed are because of the backups or standins. There are increasing calls for children of every race. Should a handpicked Chinese or Puerto Rican baby get cranky or restless, backup babies must be on call. Heinz recently requested "a pudgy-faced German baby." Lest Heinz's star take sick during filming, a pudgy understudy has to be standing by.

There are strict rules governing a baby's work load. An infant bread-

winner must be at least 3 months old before he can work. By law a nurse must be present at all times. The baby may be under lights only 10 minutes at a time. He may not be on the set more than three hours on any one day. He must have working papers issued by the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children, which, in the City of New York anyway, must be then officially approved by the office of the Mayor.

Miller, a brown-haired, brown-eved Dick Beniamin look-alike, prides himself on the professionalism of his clients, saying, "I've had only one negative comment. The Gerber people complained one of my babies woopsed on their rug." END

I get thrown into a haystack and go to a discotheque," reports the versatile Miss Fleming. And that's not the usual iceshow material at all.



He has more hangups than a pop-poster joint

Woody Allen, 5-feet-7-inches of assorted fears, hasn't let them keep him from a remarkable career

Get Woody Allen up in front of an audience and he looks surprisingly like a crumpled gum wrapper. His worried eyes—framed with huge horn-rims—are topped with mussed red hair and a complexion the color of Cream of Wheat. After sizing up the crowd, he locks his hands in his pockets, hunches his shoulders and starts spouting jokes with the pulsating rapidity of a Water Pik gone berserk.

His humor is highly personal and most of it is howlingly funny. In the main, it's based on Allen's view of himself as a man beset by more hangups than you'd find in a pop-poster joint. Woody might start by telling you he was the only kid to get "drummed out of the Boy Scouts on a Section Eight" or about the time he joined a childhood baseball team "composed entirely of neurotics"-he recalls that when a boy stole second "he felt so guilty he went back to first." Then there's the boy in Woody's group analysis who's "a Southern bigot and a bed wetter-he used to go to Klan meetings in a rubber sheet."

On and on Woody goes, waging a wobbly battle against life every step of the way. Yet, at 33, this self-styled flop is a smashing success. His first play, "Please Don't Drink the Water," had a healthy two-year run on Broadway. "Play It Again, Sam," his second show, is due on Broadway soon. He has written two high-grossing pictures: "What's New Pussycat?" (he also costarred) and "What's Up Tiger Lily?" A third film, "Take the Money and Run," has just been finished. Besides working in clubs like Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, Allen has turned out successful record albums and written humorous essays for leading magazines. On TV, he has shown up just about everywhere: the variety and talk-show circuits (the Sullivan, Cavett and Martin shows) and specials (a Kraft Music Hall, which he wrote and starred in). And come the week of Dec. 9. Woody sits in for Johnny Carson—the show that launched his career back in 1962.

Allen's take from all this is said to be something like a half-million a year. The money is immediately evident when you get a load of his digs: an expensively furnished Park Avenue duplex, complete with a paneled study bulging with the expected books plus an unexpected billiard table roughly the size of Sioux City, lowa. It was in the study that we first encountered Woody. Bounding in, dressed in rumpled corduroys, loafers and a faded, old sweater, he looks like an overripe teen-ager who's been given the run of the place while the folks weekend in Westchester.

The place belongs to him, though. And unlike the crumpled gum wrapper you see on-stage, Allen, at home, is a fairly solid 5-feet-7, with a springy walk that comes closer to belonging to a bantamweight boxer than any Mister Mush. He's unfailingly friendly, if somewhat formally so. When talking about himself, he's direct, markedly devoid of humor and conspicuously cautious—the caution always showing in his alert and wary eyes.

They are wary with good reason, according to Woody. Right off, he tells you he's "a mass of fears." "When I was a kid," he says, "I had a terrific fear of being attacked, of suffering bodily harm. I couldn't pass an alley without thinking a big, black jungle cat or something would jump out and snatch me away." Alleys weren't the only thing that worried him. "I was petrified of the dark," he continues, "and of the basement. I was sure someone was down there ready to do me in." Being "done in" is an adult fear too. "I'm always fearful someone will break into the apartment," he says, "when I'm in bed or something." When not shaking over that possibility, Woody worries about crowds. They scare him so much he seldom enters a restaurant without a chum to "divert" his attention. Audiences come next on his most-

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
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scared-of list, although says Woody, they don't scare him as much as years ago, when he was "incapacitated with fear."

Despite the myriad fears, however, you can't help but sense a strength in Woody. It manifests itself as a feeling of urgency—as if what he's doing at any given moment is a gross interruption, something that's holding him back. Allen has no trouble naming the urgency. "It's a need to work," he says, "to write. I'm driven to it. If I don't write every free minute, I have this terrible guilt. It's like—I don't know—if I don't write, I'll be sorry someday." Catching himself, he adds an almost apologetic: "Doesn't that sound juvenile?"

Little outside of writing and working interests Woody. The theater, he thinks, is "a drag," and he seldom attends. His social life is practically nonexistent ("Parties and drunks bore me"). He hates to read ("Unless it's a slim book with large type") and has little interest in politics. "The reshuffling of world powers," he says, "is far less important to me than my work."

Some, like Woody's manager, Charles Joffe, think they have Woody's compulsion to work figured out. "Woody's a fantastically talented man," Joffe says. "It has to burst out in every possible direction." Woody's wife, actress Louise Lasser, has another opinion. Says she: "Woody's fears are really a fantasy that he'd be consumed in some waysucked-up. He had to create a safe atmosphere for himself." There might be something to both theories. But in tracing Allen's life one thing emerges crystal clear. Riddled with fears to be sure, Woody has managed not only to combat his hangups but to hone and funnel them into one of the most multifaceted careers in show business.

Born Allen Stewart Konigsberg in Brooklyn's Flatbush section, Woody experienced an early life that was somewhat shaky, but not much shakier than a lot of other people's. His father, he says, was a job-jumper, "switching from waiter to jewelry engraver to egg candler—the guy who holds an egg up to a candle to see if it's bad." His mother worked steadily as a book-keeper, but Woody remembers waiting around wondering what job Papa would pop up with next. "He was a cab driver once," Woody recalls with a smile. "I found out about it by accidentally hailing him on Newkirk Avenue."

The Flatbush schools. Woody remembers, were "terribly backward" filled with "anti-Semitic teachers-not the Jewish ones, of course, but ladies with blue-gray hair who'd keep the kids after school so they couldn't go to Hebrew lessons." Woody rebelled, reading, he says, "nothing but comic books" until he was 16, and going to movies. "I lived in the movies," he says. "I'd go seven days a week and sometimes sat through two or three shows. The movies served as my education." He adds wryly, "Tens of tons of Betty Grable pictures made me far more sophisticated than any of my contemporaries."

Be that as it may, by second grade, Woody says, he knew he wanted to write. "The thought of going home and writing something was a terribly exciting idea to me." It remained just an idea, though, because by that time Woody was developing into a remarkably good athlete. "I was a street kid." Woody explains, "and you could always count on a fight. In the course of the day you were likely to get beaten up. But I never got it more than any other kid." Indeed, as a teen-ager, Woody was a good enough boxer to qualify for the Golden Gloves championships. Explains wife Louise: "Woody's tremendously competitive. Then, as now, he's a fighter. Winning is crucial to him."

At 17, Woody started to write. "I was scared of performing," Woody explains, "so I started writing gags and sending them to columnists like Earl Wilson and Winchell." They started

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printing Woody's jokes and crediting him for them. It didn't take long for a show-business publicity outfit to get hold of Woody and put him on the payroll at \$25 a week. Next movewhile he was still a teen-ager-was to turn out TV jokes for the likes of Sid Caesar and Garry Moore. But something was gnawing at him, a something he describes as "the knowledge that my ideas could only be effective if they came from me." Which meant a big jump into performing-a move which terrified him. "I must have felt strongly about it, because I gave up \$1500 a week as a writer to work for nothing as a comedian."

That's exactly what Woody was making when he opened at a Greenwich Village tourist trap. According to manager Joffe, "Woody was just terrible. Crippled with fear," Joffe goes on, "he'd come on the floor in a cold sweat, trying to hide his face." Woody knew how bad he was. "I'd wake up in the morning," he remembers, "and just knowing I had to go on that night sent me into the depths of depression." Yet lousy as Woody then was as a performer, says Joffe, "his jokes—stuff that could only be funny coming from Woody—carried him through."

Fear-ridden though Woody was, he managed to keep going. Says he: "It was beginning to pay off. All kinds of channels for expression were opening up for me—writing for the movies, play-writing. I couldn't give it up." Gradually Woody found his fear of audiences lessening and, after cracking TV, Allen's frequency of appearances rivaled those of the NBC peacock.

But the tube has seen less and less of Woody lately. Not just because he's been busy elsewhere, either. "TV censorship bugs me," he explains. "I work too hard on my stuff to have some know-nothing censor tell me I can say 'sex' but I can't say 'sexual' because the 'ual' has a dirty sound to it. It's like being back in school in Flatbush where

the kids were so far ahead of the teachers. The public is way, way ahead of the censors."

Successful though Woody has been professionally, however, he's had a fair share of knocks personally. His first wife, Harlene Rosen—whom Woody married at 19 and divorced 5 years later—has since slapped him with a million-dollar lawsuit (for allegedly making her the brunt of "wife" jokes on TV). Then there's Allen's 10-year bout with psychoanalysis. "I don't know if it's helping," Woody kids. "It's only been 10 years."

No kidding matter is one of the reasons Woody sought help in the first place: "an obsession with violence," Woody says. "Not that I could ever be violent," he explains. "If I had gone into boxing, I'm sure I would have ended up with a very bad record. Still, being a crook," Woody continues, "seems an ideal way of life. It still does. If I'm restless at night, I fantasize pulling a necklace job at the Plaza. Nothing puts me to sleep faster than a good caper."

Although Louise Lasser feels there is "a great deal of fury in Woody," she sees his Dillinger daydreams as "an attraction to the element of danger, the unpredictability of the situation. And crime," she adds, "is a rebellion against the Establishment—like robbing the Bank of America. It's rebellious—and Woody's a rebel."

He's far more than that. You have to go along with Louise Lasser, who says: "Despite his problems, Woody is well-adjusted to what he is. He's very much in control of things."

Woody concludes thusly: "I've just scratched the surface of everything I've tried so far. I hope someday they'll say I contributed something to comedic literature." Given that Woody Allen has already managed to mold a barrel of insecurities into a whopping tale of theatrical success, there seems little reason to doubt it.

Hollywood has always been infamous for nepotism behind the scenes. Now apparently we're going to get it in the scenes too.

The trouble comes second with the fact that the scripts are poor, even on the rare occasions when they are based on a basically amusing idea. Such an episode was the recent spoof on *Mission: Impossible*.
