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

■ One of the little freedoms left to us in this era of traffic lights, income taxes, no-smoking signs, diet consciousness, the draft, and anti-smog ordinances, is the freedom to tune our color sets any darned way we please.

Now they're going to take that away from us. Not by law but by a subtle appeal to our desire to conform.

■ Viewer A likes red flesh tones when he adjusts his set. Viewer B leans to yellow. Viewer C likes a bluish cast while Viewer D goes for a magenta look. Each owns —or has at least made a down payment on—his set. No one, until now, has challenged his right to color choice; no one has used his selection of color to blacken his reputation.

It was Dr. Boris Townsend, research chief of a British TV broadcasting outfit, who recently proclaimed that the color theory of Prof. Max Luscher was valid. "It has been broadly proved," said Dr. Townsend.

■ Professor Luscher's theory is quite simple. If a viewer adjusts the picture so that it is too red, it can indicate that he is lustful. If too blue, he overeats. If too yellow, he's overhopeful. Too magenta? He may be a homosexual.

Psychologists have long held that colors connote particular moods. As reported by Dr. Ernest Dichter, the guru who tells advertisers why people buy specific products, "Red connotes a mood of passion; yellow—intuition; blue—intellectualism; brown—earthiness; black—danger; white—purity; green—emotional agitation, envy; pink—exotic; and purple is associated with martyrs."

■ Whether Luscher is transferring the color-mood ideas of the psychologists to TV or starting his own color-meaning school, we don't know. We just wish they'd all let us tune our sets in peace—without worrying about what it means if the set is too red, or yellow or, heaven forfend—magenta.





Now what about public TV?

So far, there's been more talk than action

Most TV viewers probably won't notice the difference, but—this week the Nation is getting a fourth national network.

Five nights a week (Sunday through Thursday) for two hours a night, about 150 noncommercial stations across the country will begin airing programs received on a hookup devised by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. This is an organization created by the Federal Government as an initial experiment in nation-wide programming.

Much of the networked material will have a familiar look: it will include the Public Broadcast Laboratory's Sunday night series, PBL, which returned to the air last month; NET Journal, NET Playhouse, NET Festival, News in Perspective and other National Educational Television offerings which in the past have been shipped from station to station on film or tape.

The idea behind the new networking arrangement is that programs regularly seen live at the same hour across the country can have more topicality and can be better promoted.

Public television, heaven knows, needs promotion.

The people who make a business of counting TV watchers contend that they usually can find hardly anybody looking at noncommercial stations.

Much more often than not, they say, viewers of these so-called educational channels either are too few for statistical notice or add up to only one or two percent of the total TV tune-in.

This is true, it seems, even when these stations, now called "public television," offer lightly cultural entertainments with star names, as they sometimes do, or public-service features

such as NET's State of the Union analysis with such commentators as William Buckley and Arthur Schlesinger Jr.

Indeed, a sampling of ratings reports from cities with relatively popular PTV stations indicates that the most-watched series on noncommercial TV may be David Susskind's syndicated talk show, a strictly commercial venture which some stations have chosen to qualify as educational. But even this oftencontroversial, celebrity-oriented attraction does well to get five or six percent of the available watchers.

Another recent study of city-by-city PTV audience trends showed an alarming decline in the tune-in during the past three years in some major centers. The few exceptions with uptrends were cities like Boston and San Francisco which have aggressively programmed PTV operations.

These findings lead inevitably to some crucial questions about the present state of PTV and its future:

- If do-good television is playing so often to a largely empty house, does it indicate the country really feels little need for "an alternative" to Gomer Pyle, Bonanza and Bewitched?
- Or, has public TV just been too poor up to now to do the kind of "quality" programming many discriminating viewers would welcome?
- Or, the programming does exist, but do too few people know about it because public TV lacks the money to advertise its wares the way commercial shows are promoted?
- Has the Ford Foundation, PTV's biggest angel, poured \$170 million into this medium over the past 16 years with little to show for it?

 Why has Congress created a Comsat-type of semipublic Corporation for Public Broadcasting and endowed it with \$5 million in first-year funds if the populace has no particular appetite for something other than it already is getting?

Such questions beg for answers, and a few are around.

Obviously, somebody feels public TV is needed. The country this year added about 30 noncommercial stations, raising the total to more than 180—almost as many as there are commercial stations airing, say, Laugh-In or Gunsmoke.

On the other hand, public TV often still seems like a sometime, nowhere thing. For all the talk and newspaper stories and magazine pieces in recent months, PTV proponents have a feeling the average American is unaware of efforts to create a nation-wide ad-free TV system.

There was some clamor, at least at the opinion-leader level, a few months ago. But now the cause is widely believed to have lost headway. The lost-momentum arguments:

The Ford Foundation's ingenious scheme for linking up U.S. PTV stations via domestic satellite, at the same time selling satellite time to the commercial networks to raise programming money for public TV, has gathered dust at the FCC for about three years while powerful interests vie for satellite control.

PBL, the Ford Foundation's \$12.5 million effort to demonstrate what public TV can do, if not what it necessarily will do, in its first season failed dishearteningly to achieve its self-proclaimed goal of being Something You Just Can't Miss. Indeed, some of public TV's best friends felt the undertaking to be so ill-conceived and ill-timed that it was setting back instead of aiding their cause at a time when Congress was being importuned to ladle out big sums for the movement.

Clearly bent on an experimental, if not consciously controversial role, *PBL*'s producers launched into a second season in December with a "Birth and Death" documentary, happily re-

CPB—the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, a federally chartered agency created by Congress last year "to encourage the growth and development of noncommercial educational radio and television."

ETV—educational television, the common name for all noncommercial TV.

NET—National Educational Television, a Ford Foundation-financed service supplying programs to ETV stations.

PBL—the Public Broadcast Laboratory, a two-year experiment in programming underwritten by the Ford Foundation.

PTV—Public television, a name created by the Carnegie Commission on Educational Television as a broader designation of all non-commercial TV.

ceived by most critics as a promising improvement over the general run of last year's *PBL* fare. Even so, the project's aims still were not clearly defined. One question yet unanswered was whether the very name *Public Broadcast Laboratory* was not an error of judgment. Its creators obviously hoped to demonstrate how irresistible public TV might be vis-a-vis the commercial pap, but then proceeded to set up *PBL* as an experimental undertaking obviously groping for answers and certain, as such, to turn many viewers off.

Frank Pace Jr., one-time Secretary of the Army, and Federal budget director, as President Johnson's appointee to chairmanship of the new Corporation for Public Broadcasting, has seemed to PTV eager beavers an overly goslow-and-make-no-mistakes guy who hasn't pushed the blueprinting of CPB possibilities as fast or excitingly as he might. "He'd better have something good to show for that \$5 million," a Congressional aide growled recently,

"before he comes around here looking for more money."

Thomas P.F. Hoving, as maverick chairman of a National Citizens Committee for Public Broadcasting (recently reorganized as a watchdog over all broadcasting), persisted for months in a gadfly role antagonistic to commercial TV, not only rubbing sensitive broadcasting interests the wrong way but arousing sharp dissents in his own camp, and giving outsiders the impression that PTV was a squabbling family torn by differing objectives.

Opposing schools of thought on the shape public TV should take are indeed producing dissension. Many an educational station manager, beholden to conservative community interests. fears what he regards as the liberal leanings of "the Eastern establishment" in nationally distributed programming coming out of New York. Other ETV stations are resisting the drift toward networked prime-time programming just because it pre-empts their own choice air time. On the other hand, forces spearheaded by the Ford Foundation. whose purse strings are so vital to ETV at this point, are pressing for programming that will win bigger audiences and give public TV a stronger national image. And that means more network shows.

Some observers see public TV as on the horns of a terrible dilemma: it is constantly being goaded to shed its programming timidity and unleash audience-shaking programs that will show that noncommercial TV isn't afraid to challenge sacred cows. The trouble is that controversial programs unsettle if not enrage the very public and private sectors to which public TV must go with hat in hand for its existence.

Much of public television at the national level actually remains privately rather than publicly supported, the very existence of National Educational Television (NET), for instance, being dependent on the Ford Foundation. McGeorge Bundy, foundation president,

would love to get out from under that obligation, but can't tactfully do so until somebody, in Washington or elsewhere, picks up the tab—and so far nobody has offered to.

In sum, the clatter of a couple of years ago in behalf of public television has died to a murmur—or more accurately a grumble—and perhaps nothing short of Something Dramatic will have to happen to revive zeal for it.

The fact that nobody can suggest exactly what needs to happen, or could happen, seems a measure of the despair and frustration which have overtaken the cause.

Pace, publicly at least, maintains an optimistic stance. CPB has "a long, hard row" ahead of it and its initial \$5 million "is a very small amount," he concedes, but he insists that starting slow and small is the best way. "Our first priority is to convince the Congress we can manage this situation," he advised an educational broadcasters' convention in November. "If we fail, the cause of public television will be set back at least a decade."

Pace has said he looks for Congress to hand out another token-sized sum to CPB this year and probably postpone a fateful decision on big-money, long-range financing until 1970.

While Pace was characteristically slow in disclosing where the first \$5 million would be spent, authoritative sources reported \$1 million of it was expected to go to NET for the series to be networked, and most of the remainder to be passed around in small amounts to ETV stations to underwrite local programming—a gambit intended to butter-up influential congressmen who will be deciding CPB's future.

In short, nothing will be concocted in CPB's name to make waves. Ripples will be enough at this time, especially if they make the right people happy.

Meantime, NET, under the indefatigable goading of its long-time boss, John F. White, is steadily building an image for itself as the Public Television Network—a name White pre-empted last year without challenge—and for the current year has pulled together a total budget of close to \$25 million from various sources for its program projects.

White says, however, "We've simply got to shoot for bigger audiences, but we face the prospect of having to inch along instead of leaping forward until the corporation (CPB) gets the money to do a job. We need money for promotion and advertising, to help us build audiences. The other thing we badly need is stronger local programming."

The NET president is immensely annoyed over what he regards as the programming timidity of many of the country's noncommercial stations. Cracking the whip over them in characteristic fashion at an NET affiliates gathering in Chicago, he complained:

"When public television really disturbs its viewers to the point where they think for themselves and begin to do something about what it is that disturbs them, then we will have succeeded. How useless a life, how weak an impact, how wasted an opportunity, how squandered the money, if the objective is tranquility, innocuous pap, peace at any price! . . .

"Why is it that congressmen have reported that they sense no support for public television in their areas? Do you believe they're afraid of us and, therefore, oppose us? The truth is, they don't even know us . . .

"Ladies and gentlemen, flower arranging, book reviews and guitar lessons all have their place, but your station won't gain the respect it must have unless you provide your community with a healthy proportion of local programming with substance...

"I ask you again—those of you who have not already done so—to get going!"

Getting going, it seems, is the nub of PTV's problem.

From the halls of network studios to the shores of local stations can be found a specialized personality spawned by TV: the waist-up female. Although she is viewed primarily from the waist up, it's not because the rest of her is less appealing. It's simply that these newswomen, weather girls, moderators and panelists are either seated behind desks, standing behind podiums or cropped by the medium-close-up lens.

An important part of a waist-upper's stock in trade is wardrobe, and when these females of assorted shapes, sizes and budgets can no longer pull beautiful, new clothes out of their closets, they pull them out of somebody else's. Or out of a store on a lend-lease basis. As long as they look smashing from the waist up, they smile, chat and charm millions while hung together at the back and below the waist with little more than pins and adhesive tape.

In return for a credit line, dress manufacturers provide their samples for Barbara Walters, who has decorated the Today show since 1961. Unfortunately, fashionable waistless shifts and semifitted skimmers look best when the wearer stands. The perfect "sitting" dress is full-skirted, with a cinched belt which tightens the excess blouse fabric. Although this has been out of fashion a while, it's a fact that diaper and other pins never go out of style. So, while Barbara looks devastating headon in these samples which don't always fit, her back is often a network of safety pins and paper clips.

Then come those off-days, such as July 4th and Labor Day, when Barbara tears in from the country. Seated safely behind her desk, Miss Walters' stunningly attired top half winks and blinks with the regulation three-piece set—earrings, pin and one refined-looking bracelet—while her bottom half is wrapped in sneakers and slacks. Says Barbara, "I live in fear that one of these days the camera will catch me standing up or walking away."

Kitty Carlisle, who was a permanent



panelist on *To Tell the Truth* for 11 years before it went off the air and now is a guest on other panel shows, sometimes shops "in friends' closets." At 5-feet-6 and size 10, she says she "can wear anything anybody gives me" because "I have a collapsible figure."

Of her steady suppliers, Mrs. James Fosburgh is two inches taller and neighbor Mrs. George Backer is three inches shorter and two inches narrower. None the less, Kitty managed to fit in their hand-me-down finery for at least a 30-minute show. On one program her wardrobe was so tight that when she laughed it split.

Miss Carlisle's wall-to-wall clothes collection, some 20 years old, hangs in one whole room of her 11-room apartment. She takes only from the best. For instance, "My friend Mrs. Gardner Cowles has a busy life with a great many changes and can't keep all her wardrobe. For color television I can't wear black or white and there's a limit to how many colored ensembles

I want to own. So, Jan Cowles might say, 'Listen, I have this beautiful Dior that I'll never wear again. Would you like it?' One raspberry-pink linen she gave me I wore on camera in midwinter and it looked divine."

TV's elegant Second-Hand Rose occasionally bastes a hem fast before air time, sometimes adapts negligees to double as evening gowns and laughingly admits, "Our out-of-camera-range creations are sometimes peculiar looking." On more than one stormy night this glamourous lady has graced night-time shows exquisitely groomed, coiffed and jeweled—with galoshes on her feet.

Like an iceberg, the largest portion of the waist-upper is hidden from view. Nancy Dickerson, who anchors NBC's 10:25 A.M. network news show, is an example of just how much the waist-up female can hide.

Styles may come and fashions may go but Mrs. Dickerson's working wardrobe consists of double-breasted lapel suits with turtle-necked blouses. The fabrics and colors vary but seldom "the look," since she considers it her most flattering. On July 5, 1968, clad in the ever-present tailored suit and highnecked inset, Mrs. Dickerson gave a waiting world the news of the day. The next morning, Mrs. Dickerson gave her waiting husband other news—she gave birth to a baby boy. Not a single viewer had guessed that the TV newswoman was pregnant.

In 1967 newswoman Marlene Sanders severed her Achilles' tendon and for weeks hobbled about in a cast. Daily, while telecasting her five-minute wrap-up for the ABC network, she came over the air as cool, calm and authoritative. Meanwhile, back at the studio, her crutches were stacked against a wall and her leg was propped up on a chair off to the right.

During and after the six-day Middle East war of June 1967, Pauline Frederick, NBC's United Nations correspondent, reported "practically night and day, seven days a week." In dire need of changes ("I couldn't even wait for clothes to be cleaned"), she flew into Saks and hurriedly chose something "that was too large but had a good neckline." Taking her selection with her, Miss Frederick explained, "I'll have it altered when the war's over."

Waist-uppers are ingenious. They throw nothing out, knowing that beads, brooches, detachable collars, fur trims, flowers and varied colored kerchiefs worn frontward, sideways and backward can jazz up even the saddest reject. Virginia Graham, whose Girl Talk devotees insist she's never repeated an outfit in five years, swears by three-piece ensembles. Worn once with the jacket and the blouse, then with the jacket without the blouse and then with the blouse without the jacket, it's three outfits for the price of one. After Abby Dalton of Hollywood Squares spied a contestant wearing her identical dress, she developed a new system. For a while she wore the same black skirt every day and just changed shirtwaists.

For more than a year I did a segment on WABC-TV's early evening news in New York City. In moments of desperation, I wore spring coats on the air. I wore long housecoats and ankle-length gowns because they had good necklines. I wore dresses back to front. I pounced on somebody's V-necked jacket if it harmonized with my own ancient round-necked, sleeveless sheath, I lifted good-looking earrings right off the lobes of anyone in sight and even linked one pair so it made a hanging pin. At air time I frequently stripped one of the secretaries of a particularly stunning creation and bundled her into whatever it was I had on.

My segment involved participating in whatever feature assignments I covered that day. When covering a mounted-police story, I rode with them. In interviewing Billie Jean King, I volleyed with her. If I trotted back to the studio in shorts or gym bloomers or

whatever that day's costume was, I just tucked my bare legs under the desk, added pearls with matching earrings and went on.

Even if one could afford new dresses daily, nobody could spare the shopping time to meet the requirements. In television you don't just need a lot of clothes—you need the right kind of clothes. Bright, bold prints are out. So are gauzy, transparent fabrics, clingy, tight-fitting jerseys and rustly, noisy taffetas. Sleeveless dresses are impossible

Vivian Farrar broadcasts the weather for WPIX-TV in New York. Her clothes are on loan from Ohrbach's, and many of them were meant for girls bigger than this 5-foot-1 blonde. Thus, while today's styles feature hems three and four inches above the knee, Vivian's oncamera costumes are likely to hang three and four inches below. Each dress is returned after its wearing, and the tags attached to the hems dangle almost to her shoetops. To hide the over-

for those with heavy arms. Frills down the front are unsuitable for those with big bosoms. Certain colors clash with your television backdrop. In addition, garments must be loose enough to hide the lavaliere microphones most newswomen wear, and sheer enough so that they do not muffle the sound. Usually we snake this unattractive, cumbersome mike under the dress; and, of course, from beneath our skirts and down our legs dangles a long, ugly

large, bulging midriff, Vivian developed a stance. She holds the weather board pointer directly in front of her to minimize the midsection creases, while the hand out of camera range pulls the bodice taut.

Once, racing against seconds, she just threw her dress with the long hem and dangling price tag over the slacks and T-shirt she had on. Chuckles Vivian, "The public should only know."

Well, now they do.

Jack Lord, the actor, has come a long way from the dusty rodeo and fair grounds of *Stoney Burke*—a one-season wonder of a few years back which Lord calls "the most successful failure in television."

After the demise of that program, Lord—to the tune of what he estimates, probably exaggeratedly, at \$200,000 annually—embarked upon a series of personal appearances as Stoney. "They thought he was a real person in those small towns," he says, "and I still get mail addressed to Mission Ridge, South Dakota, which was supposed to be Stoney's home town." Jack, in his cowboy boots and Stoney Burke costume, would walk into the arena with his saddle slung over his shoulder, say a few words to the folks in the stands and then sing some. Western songs, which he had learned in an intensive four-week vocal course.

Now he is thousands of miles and a world away from all that, starring in the CBS series Hawaii Five-0. He and his wife of 17 years, Marie ("the best thing that ever happened to me"), live in a 4500-square-foot apartment adjacent to the Kahala Hilton Hotel on the beach at Waikiki, where, when the moon comes up behind the palm trees, it looks like a Hawaiian picture postcard. The apartment, identified by Lord's real name, J.J. Ryan (his wife calls him "Mick"), is decorated with his own paintings and has "His" and "Hers" lanais-his filled with artists' supplies, easels and unfinished paintings (the Metropolitan Museum of Art owns five of his works done when he was 18 years old), and hers with a dressmaker's dummy, sewing machine and other sewing supplies (she was formerly a dress designer but hastens to add "in the garment district").

Only the cowboy boots remain to remind one of Stoney Burke; but now, often as not, they are pure white and worn with a white Nehru suit or a dashing red dinner jacket.

Lord dresses more conservatively—dark blue suit, white shirt, plain dark tie, but still the cowboy boots—for his role as Steve McGarrett, head of the mythical *Hawaii Five-0* unit. But even at work his surroundings are luxurious—a 30-footlong, 16,000-pound, all-steel mobile dressing room, decorated by his wife and complete with bedroom, kitchen, bath, make-up area, stereo, two air-conditioners and a self-contained water-

purifier. Lord's idol, the late Gary Cooper, never had it so good, even in his palmiest days.

But then Gary Cooper probably never worked as hard as Lord does. The Hawaii Five-0 company, imported mostly from Hollywood, puts in a six-day week of days that are sometimes 18 hours long. Lord insists that "it's fun," but it is hard, grueling work too. Often it involves as many as five different locations a day, ranging from the seamier sections of downtown Honolulu, where Lord once found a lady of dubious repute stark naked in his fancy dressing room, to the canebrakes outside of town, where the company's "studio" is located. This studio, beyond Pearl Harbor, is a converted Navy warehouse, where standing sets of McGarrett's and the governor's offices are maintained. Not soundproof, it is near a rifle range and is also susceptible to resounding rain on metal roof and to passing trucks and airplanes ("Is it one of ours?" someone inevitably cries).

There are other, lesser, hazards. Once, for instance, a frog was on a bookshelf in one of the sets. Everyone assumed that it was a prop—a decorative, porcelain bit of bric-a-brac. It remained motionless while the scene was being shot, then, when the action was completed, suddenly leaped from the shelf and hopped out of the studio.

The frog was heading for where most of *Hawaii Five-0* is shot—outdoors. This was the basic intention of the program's creator and executive producer, Leonard Freeman, who wanted to get away from conventional motion-picture sound stages, which he refers to contemptuously

as "dinosaur eggs." Freeman, who had previous experience in and out of the studio with Mr. Novak and Route 66, says, "I wasn't about to do another reprise of an old series shot in Burbank." Three years ago he decided, although he had never been there, that "our 50th state would be a wonderful setting for a series—the crossroads of the world, full of color, a now place." After visiting the islands, he approached CBS with the idea of doing a show there, "involving a cop." The network liked it. Then Freeman returned to Hawaii and convinced Governor Burnswho is played by Richard Denning in the series-that a major television production "was the sort of smokeless industry Hawaii needed." (It has been estimated that Hawaii Five-0 will pump \$5,000,000 a year into the islands' al-

'Dear, who decides what show we watch?'

ready booming economy.) CBS continued picking up its options on Freeman's idea until a movie-length pilot film was made to get the series under way last September.

Jack Lord was not an automatic or immediate choice for the role of Steve McGarrett. "You always start with Gregory Peck," says Freeman. "Who knows? You might call him up and he'd feel like doing a television series that day. After that, you put a lot of names in a hopper and finally sift them down to one." Not that Lord's name was at the bottom of the hopper. He and Freeman had worked together on an unsold TV pilot called Grand Hotel, and, according to Freeman, "He's terrific. I'm a perfectionist, and so is he. Having a star like Jack is like having money in the bank. He's always on time, no bags under his eyes, and he always knows his lines." Freeman also feels that Lord fits into what he calls "credibility casting-like E. G. Marshall and Ben Casey and Jack Webb. When he flashes his badge, people believe it."

Lord, who takes everything seriously -principally himself-feels that there is more to his role than that. He chooses to believe that "McGarrett has more facets than Stoney Burke." The seriousness with which he can attack a copsand-robbers role is probably a throwback to the days when he was doing really serious acting in New York, his birthplace. "You can't work this hard and this long without being serious," he says. After working as a seaman and in the merchant marine, attending New York University on a football scholarship and serving in the Navy during the Korean war, he studied under Sanford Meisner, who recalls him as "very intense." Then Lord went on to such Broadway plays as "The Traveling Lady," with Kim Stanley, and "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof." Of those days he says, somewhat sadly, "I've drunk from the cup a couple of times."

Lord says things like that. He also →

recites poetry at length and will solemnly compare a TV show to the sonnet form: "A television show must be done in an exact time, and a sonnet must be 14 lines—no more, no less." This is also a throwback to the days when his father, a shipping magnate "who made and lost two fortunes," would give the five Ryan children a penny for every line of poetry they memorized.

Although Jack Lord has a rather unbending facade, he is a sensitive, vulnerable man, who still remembers bitterly a magazine article during his Stoney Burke days in which it was said that he visualized himself as another Gary Cooper. He and Cooper met when Lord, a struggling actor, was trying to pick up eating money selling Cadillacs in New York. One day Cooper came into the showroom to look at an old Duesenberg he had formerly owned. When he learned that Lord was an aspiring actor, he took him to lunch at Schrafft's, In 1955, Lord came to Hollywood and was cast in "The Court-Martial of Billy Mitchell." which starred Cooper. Lord said, "Do you remember me?" Cooper answered, "Yeah, you're the guy that likes Duesenbergs." The two were friends until Cooper's death, but Lord denies any illusions of filling his idol's boots.

If he ever did entertain any such illusions, Lord has probably long since abandoned them. Once, years ago, when he tested for the role of Bo, the innocent cowboy, opposite Marilyn Monroe in the movie of "Bus Stop," the director, Joshua Logan, told him, "You can't play a virgin-your face looks lived in." Today, starting to get a bit jowly, the face looks more lived in than ever. But-with the apartment at Waikiki, the luxurious mobile dressing room, a piece of the action on Hawaii Five-0 (Lord is a shrewd businessman, one of the few Hollywood actors not represented by an agent), and the dust of the rodeo arenas far behind him-Jack Lord is really living.

The TV Special from Outer Space

Live TV pictures of the moon's craterpocked surface shot from a manned spaceship spinning 60-odd miles overhead were a scientific triumph second only in wonder to the textbook perfection of Apollo 8's trip into lunar orbit. Thanks to communications satellites perched a mere 22,500 miles from earth, millions of earthlings from Asia to Europe shared the thrills of the most remote pickup in TV history.

There were, astoundingly enough, some disinterested Americans who crabbed about a few minutes of the Baltimore-Minnesota NFL Western Division title game football telecast being pre-empted for the first of Apollo's TV show. "You and 'Heidi' are running neck-and-neck...", a Houston ground controller kidded the astronauts. For most viewers, however, the space spectacular was a Christmas special to remember.

Only weeks away from locking in their prime-time entertainment choices for next fall, the networks are putting out word that they mean to duck violence as a come-on in the new shows. Apparently there is even a chance not one new cops-and-robbers series will turn up next September. Only one such drama is reported under development, and it's one among 30 proposed series on ABC's show-shopping list. CBS and NBC haven't so much as one fresh police show between them, although CBS is looking at a "law

enforcement" drama with Van Johnson which it says will depend little on physical conflict.

Behind the violence soft-pedal is a mounting concern in Washington over the cumulative impact of televised killings, sluggings and torture. On the eve of Christmas, network brass got often-hostile grilling and frequent lecturing from a Presidential commission on the causes and prevention of · violence. One observer termed it "just a dress rehearsal" for official inquiries yet to come. When ABC president Leonard Goldenson sought to persuade the study group that his network had cut back violence in its shows, Rep. Hale Boggs (D-La.), a commission member, barked: "Your reply is totally inadequate, inaccurate, and, according to critics, untrue." What seemed to annoy the probers as much as uncertainty that TV violence was being de-emphasized enough was lack of evidence of its effects on viewers Under Bogg's goading, CBS president Frank Stanton angrily retorted that the impact could not be gauged until "a methodology" is devised for measuring it. Goldenson, Stanton and NBC's Julian Goodman also vowed they felt violence in their programming had been brought into reasonable "balance." But all also agreed they could spend more on research trying to find out what watching murder and mayhem, real and fictional, does to viewers. -Richard K. Doan



It's a something-for-everyone network-movie week with the emphasis on fluff but one that gains distinction by offering not only a pleasant and tasteful "family" comedy but also a serious and excellently performed melodrama for the mature. NBC's Tuesday night movie is being preempted, and will be monthly, by First Tuesday, a two-hour "magazine."

The family fare is "Father Goose," a cheerful and unfrenetic offering with plot and kids and characters and nonsense to please the young and an edge of sophistication and some very neat performances to satisfy their elders. Cary Grant, off his usual suavity beat as a sort of seagoing American beachcomber, and Leslie Caron, as a spinster stranded with seven schoolgirls, both at their least glamorous and most appealing, bring an air of relaxed enjoyment to this wartime adventure tale. Their charm more than compensates for the predictability of the story line. Above all, they behave the way a couple of civilized adults would in the company of kids-and who could ask for more?

The melodrama is "Bunny Lake Is Missing," a 1965 Otto Preminger suspense film. Initially a seemingly routine mystery involving a child's disappearance, it develops into a game of psycho, psycho, who's got the psychosis. Long on gimmicks and short on logic, the film is distinguished by fine performances by Carol Lynley as

the child's mother, Keir Dullea as Miss Lynley's brother and Laurence Olivier as a police official.

The rest of the week's offerings demand a special interest on the part of the viewer. If you're a Martin & Lewis fan, you'll find "Jumping Jacks" one of their better team efforts, with Jerry braying his way through the paratroops and Dean playing straight man and songster. One hilarious bit involving disappearing sandwiches in a railroad dining car should delight even nonfans.

If you're a True Confessions fan, you might tolerate "That Kind of Woman," a sodden story of an older "kept" woman giving up her lover for a juvenile paratrooper. Or you may have to be a fantasy-fiction fan to think that Sophia Loren would give up anything, including George Sanders, for Tab Hunter. Another bit of fantasy-fiction is labeled "Kissses for My President," a cheap-jack situation comedy about the first female President that ought to assure male perpetuity in that office. Polly Bergen's a pretty enough President and Fred MacMurray is appropriately glum as First Gent.

The week's rerun, last around two years ago, is the 1960 "Where the Boys Are," the sexploitation of Fort Lauderdale as a college fun spot. It's a ball of corn and sex and ultimately dreary in its monotonous boy-girl theme, but it does have Paula Prentiss as some sort of compensation.

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Jackie Cooper is a pacer. On this particular morning the dapper ex-Skippy turned TV tycoon paces his splendid mahogany-paneled offices at Screen Gems in undisguised joy. Here Come the Brides, a simpleminded costume piece (circa 1870) about a hundred man-hungry, marriage-minded ladies and the hundred women-hungry Seattle lumberiacks who aspire to their favors, is one of ABC's few bright spots in the early-season ratings and appears to be headed for a long run on the air.

Cooper wears this information as jauntily as he wears his navy-blue blazer and red turtle-neck. Like other studio heads with an unexpected windfall on their hands, he likes to give the impression he knew it all along.

"Surprised? Well, no. I believed in it from the beginning," he says lightly. "We didn't make the same mistake we made with *Iron Horse*. ABC said we couldn't have frilly shirts at 7:30. Avoid fist fights. No playing around with women. We agreed and the show failed. Petticoats and bosoms work fine at 7:30."

This "petticoats and bosoms" show which "works fine at 7:30" operates on a premise that sorely strains even TV's credibility gap. It asks us to believe that if a single one of the hundred "brides" behaves promiscuously with a lumberjack not her husband, the three heroes blow the whole ball of wax, forfeiting their logging empire to the heavy (Mark Lenard). This places the chief hero, played by the dashing Robert Brown, in the position of the housemother in a girls' school, making sure the ladies make it through the vestibule without any undue hanky-panky.

"The show is the opposite of hip, and in this day of the protester that's unique," says Cooper. "What the heroes are so lustily protecting is the old-fashioned morality the Bible Belt holds so dear—the Golden Rule, chastity of women, self-reliance, that sort of thing."

MAKING SIN PALATABLE

'Here Come the Brides' seems to have found a successful method

He and his executive producer, Robert Claver, based the series on an old movie script by playwright N. Richard ("The Rainmaker") Nash, who also wrote the first episode. Claver and Cooper simply borrowed a page from the late C. B. de Mille, who believed that the perfect way to make sin palatable was to oppose it. As their principal hero they cast. Cooper insists, "an oldfashioned sex symbol in the Gable tradition," a shaggy-maned young swashbuckler who has been swashbuckling around Broadway and Hollywood for 20 years without going anywhere in particular.

"Robert Brown's no Steve McQueen," Cooper is saying. "Doesn't smack 'em before he makes love to 'em. Robert dates back to Flynn and Gable. But apparently there are people out there who still are looking for another Gable."

Another Gable, huh? Well, that's not all there is to it, either. Not if we are to believe the bearded Bob Claver. Claver wears a peace medal over his two-tone gray dickey collar, and his office sports a groovy recruiting poster showing an irate Donald Duck pointing a finger at prospective recruits and yelling, "QUACK." Esprit de corps is what counts, Claver says. He praises the delicacy of the ensemble work, the vigor of the writers, his story editor, his costume designer (an indefatigable lady named Betsy Cox who for one episode may have to dress as many as 67 ladies). He fails to see any satire implicit in Brides. "What we are really saying is, wouldn't it be great to live in a small house, be able to walk to the store, and know everyone in a small town? This show represents that simplistic belief. I think people are ready for that."

To Claver, Brown constitutes a formidable apostle of that credo. "I have an open-door policy," Claver explains. "Anyone with a complaint, all they have to do is knock. Robert is the spokesman for all the actors. He is the Big Daddy of Here Come the Brides."

At the moment "Big Daddy" is playing a tender love scene with guest star Kathryn Hays on the Columbia ranch some five miles away. Miss Hays, a one-time model, is dressed as an Amish woman, one of a group of Amish immigrants on their way to settle in the Yakima Valley. The scriptwriters have contrived to have Jason fall in love with her en route. In between set-ups, Brown is all over the place like a bump-

tuous Saint Bernard puppy. He confers with director Jerry Bernstein, peers into the camera finder, keeps a sharp paternal eye on his young colleagues and co-heroes, Bobby Sherman (Jeremy) and David Soul (Joshua), and gives the big hello to visitors.

"Ah, lad," he booms. "You're just in time. I want to marry this beautiful girl, but it means I have to adopt the Amish faith. But, as it turns out, I can't do it. Very dramatic."

We lunch in the heavily shuttered star dressing room, one of two on the ranch that are not trailers (the other belongs to The Outcasts' Don Murray). It is protocol; Big Daddy expects it. Entering this place is to travel backward in time to another era, another set of values. Robert (he is always called Robert or Robbie) has had it done up to resemble a Victorian parlor. There is nothing particularly camp about it; this scene is for real-the dark wood paneling, Tiffany and tassel lamps, cut-crystal goblets and heavy wood furniture. On the wall, dark portraiture from the French, Flemish and Hudson River schools in heavy gilt frames. On a side table an arms-around photograph of his 17-year-old daughter, whom he can now afford to send to a Swiss school. On a green felt table a pile of papers, a copy of Ramparts, and a huge New York-cut steak.

"Yes," he says as he spears the first bite. "I think you could say I am the old-fashioned hero. I speak of all the virtues. This room is a reflection of me. We rehearse our destinies and become that thing . . ."

The phone rings. It is a woman from a Memphis paper ready for their prearranged interview. "Well, I'm glad I'm the plum at the top of your tree," Robert says, leaning hard on his joviality. "Yes . . Yes . . I'm the hit of the season? How kind . . . You're right, it's no fun to be in a flop . . . Yes, I've played every kind—half house, quarter house, no house. Even a poor

play is fun to a full house. I hate to play with nobody out front. It's against the nature of the artist "

Now I know. The man harpooning that steak is one of the last of the old-time romantics. In another time and place he might have been John Barrymore. Even his costume is an anachronism. Who ever heard of an 1870 lumberjack in a Sy Devore turtle-neck? He wears it for one reason. As Betsy Cox, the costumer, explains, "The producers think he looks good in it."

As the house extrovert and sometime put-on artist, Robert tends to override his two male co-stars. It is not that he means to: it simply works out that way, David Soul (né Solberg), a Lutheran minister's son, is a shy, self-effacing young man with natural tow-hair who shuns the worldly places. Originally he was a folk-rock singer who made it to The Mery Griffin Show and eventually found his way into Screen Gems' new-talent program. He gets his kicks writing poetry, composing songs, clearing brush and rebuilding furniture with his new bride, Karen, atop their Benedict Canyon mountain.

Now that he has "made it," David doesn't quite know what to do with it. Robert's tactics frighten him a little. "There is a lot about me that Robert has seen in himself 20 years ago," he muses. "All those insecurities! That thing where somebody comes on the set and you start asking yourself, "Why doesn't he want to talk to me?"

Bobby Sherman is something else again. The worldly things agree with him. A child prodigy, he began studying trumpet at 8, gradually came to play 10 instruments. Ultimately he became a rock 'n' roll singer on Shindig. Somewhere along the way he acquired his own recording studio, which numbers among its clients the Monkees. Outside his dressing room sits his new car, a midnight-blue Silver Cloud Rolls. It sits next to David's car, a battered 1961 Volkswagen. "It's not a status

symbol," insists Bobby. "Just something I always wanted. So—why not?"

He, too, didn't quite know what to make of Robert. "When we first met he seemed jolly, happy, boisterous and not too sure of himself. Then one day I happened to mention I didn't feel so good about a certain scene. He said, "I'll call Claver." I like that.

"David and Karen are very groovy people. We're friends. I didn't know Joan Blondell for a long time. Then one night we had a long talk in her trailer. An awful lot of colors, that old girl. Open. We could laugh and we could relate. I dig.

"Me? I'm a loner. But I have a bug for this business. I want to get through to people. All we've got are words and pictures. The only rules are don't get up tight. The show? There's no way to explain it. Like Kate Smith. No way to explain her either except to say she's got soul, man, soul. . . ."

Henry Beckman is putting on the pants of Captain Clancey, the old curmudgeon of a sea captain who brought the brides to Seattle from New Bedford and proved so amusing doing it that Claver wrote him into the script permanently. Everything okay, Henry? The smile is broad. "This kind of part a man waits 20 years for. I'm not about to blow it now."

Bridget Hanley, who plays the chief bride, Candy Pruitt, isn't working today. Catching up on household tasks instead. We talk anyway. She says the show is "mentally lovely." That explains everything for her.

She's happy but scared. And so are most of the rest of the cast. Scared because most are relatively inexperienced young people and they are frightened that the venture might become a failure.

The hour is late. They have moved to the saioon set, where Joan Blondell as Lottie, the salty lady saloonkeeper, is giving Jason Bolt what for. Joan, a veteran of going-on-40 years of movies, the premiere dumb blonde of the 1930's, has seen it all before. What is she

doing among this callow youth?

"I thought it looked like an elegant set-up," she says between takes. "I liked Robert; not everyone is psychedelic these days, thank God. I liked Bobby; very aware, though for a long time he was too shy to say good morning. I liked David; a nice young man full of innocence who really comes to life with a guitar in his hand. So I thought, damn, I'd like to stick around.


"Funny thing about a series, though. A little girl came up to me the other day. 'I know you,' she said. 'You're Lottie.' You know, she was right? Joan Blondell no longer exists. I'm somebody named Lottie. That's—what do these kids say?—where it's at these days in TV.

"As for Robert, well, sometimes when he talks I don't quite follow. At times he is too gentlemanly, too humble, too sure. I don't know whether he's putting me on or not."

There is Robert smiling over at her. Putting her on he is not. Life is good. It shows on his face. "The show is a kind of joyous spewing forth of old-fashioned things," he says suddenly. "The country says it's a hit. I wouldn't know. All I know is I don't feel any different at all. I'm still me. I didn't have to sell anything to get here and I'm—I'm—"

Having a ball?

His Honor is on the air

Carl Stokes joins Private Clem and Captain Cleveland to explain a city's problems to its children

Movable type added the print dimension to political propaganda, and radio put the political at every man's fireside, but it is television that has revolutionized the art of electioneering. Perhaps this explains the avid interest of professional politicians all over this scarspangled Nation in Carl Burton Stokes, who credits television in large measure for his coronary-close victory over a distinguished white opponent to become the mayor of Cleveland a year ago. He is the first Negro to achieve such eminence in a major American city.

Speaking of that November 1967 election, Carl Stokes, while gratefully acknowledging the help of all media, said, "In the final analysis, television was the medium I most relied on. I used it to the greatest extent of the funds available."

Wound-licking ex-candidates who used television unsuccessfully to the full extent of *their* funds will find no solace in this, nor is it the complete answer, says Alexander Ostrow, who directed the Stokes public-relations campaign. Ostrow said, "We used as much television as possible, but so did the opposition, maybe more. But it

was obvious when Carl Stokes went before the television camera that there was a natural affinity

between the man and the medium. Experts have attempted to define it with phrases like 'empathetic reciprocity' and 'charismatic emanations,' but all I know is, television was one of the big factors that won Carl the mayorship against almost overwhelming odds, and it's still working for him."

The election was a photo finish. Stokes received 129,396 votes, to Seth Taft's 127,717, hardly a mandate. It was obvious that about half the people of Cleveland had not wanted Stokes for their mayor.

Acknowledging this, Mayor Stokes said, "Winning was important, but just as important was the day following the election. Would I be accepted? Would I receive, from all the people, an acceptance that would confirm my mayoralty without a drastic overreaction? Again I placed my faith in the immediacy and pervasiveness of television."





Now well into the second year of his administration, there is no doubt that he has used television more extensively and with greater adroitness than any other Cleveland official and that it has been of incalculable help in building that acceptance and advancing his program of municipal reforms.

He instituted "town-hall meetings" at six-week intervals, which the television stations, and all media, cover assiduously. The meetings are held in public schools throughout the city and are open to all. Attendance has been large and the meetings have been remarkable in establishing an intimacy of communication among the people, the mayor and his cabinet.

In an unprecedented pooling of the creative people and technical equipment of all Cleveland television stations, Mayor Stokes used the medium

announce his to "Cleveland: Now!" project. 10-year a community-action program to raise \$11,by public 250,000 donation, to augment civic efforts in housing. health. welfare and recreation. The television documentary which dramatized the urgent needs of the disadvantaged, young and old, white and black, and which was the kickoff for the proiect. was written, filmed and edited in the incredibly short time of 10 days. It appeared in prime time on all Cleveland channels. with each station staggering its time of scheduling to ensure universal coverage. The response was instanta-

neous and enthusiastic, with contributions ranging from school-children's pennies to a \$1,000,000 donation from a retired couple.

Largely through his ability to inspire confidence, combined with the persuasive power he is able to generate through the use of television, Carl Stokes has awakened Clevelanders to a new realization of the city's potential. The city that had once been termed a "disastropolis" is now acquiring a new metropolitan silhouette.

Writing of the mayor's use of the medium, Bill Barrett, television editor of the Cleveland Press, says, "He uses it with consummate skill. No other Cleveland mayor has demonstrated such preference for television exposure, but then no other official has had Carl Stokes' unique talent for the medium. He has style, a direct and honest de-→

livery, and the real man comes through."

Deprecating any such expertise, Mayor Stokes said, "I go before the camera, but I never see it. I see people, a family. I am a privileged guest in their home, and if, in my sincere desire to communicate with them, I stammer or stumble or get my foot in my mouth, that's the way it is and that's the way people see and hear it. I don't believe in the dilution that results from retakes or careful editing."

"All true," said Don Perris, general manager of WEWS-TV. "Recently the mayor requested prime time on all stations for an urgent plea. We were asked to make the parent tape.

"He arrived at the station at 2 P.M. For a busy man he never appears to hurry. He took time to greet station personnel, then went before the camera for a seven-minute appeal for individual restraint and compliance with law-enforcement agencies. As always, he was calm, relaxed, natural.

"Because it was mostly ad-lib, we were prepared for retakes. He declined and was out the door at 2:20. And as anyone can tell you, when that tape was played on all stations eight hours later, it was alive, sincere and persuasive."

Bob Hope was a recent guest of Carl Stokes, who had proclaimed "Bob Hope Day" in Cleveland. Hope said, "As a native Clevelander, it makes me proud to see our mayor on television so often. Now, he's what I call a handsome cat! And I find he's also a comedian. It won't surprise me if I hear next he's qualified as an astronaut!"

In spite of increasing administrative duties, Carl Stokes finds time for frequent television appearances, including a weekly appearance on a children's show. "Shortly after my inauguration," he said, "I was invited to appear on Channel 61's Captain Cleveland show, featuring a very talented ventriloquist, John Slowey, and his puppet, Clem. I had reluctantly refused any

regular TV series with other stations, but in this case I couldn't possibly say no because of my deep belief that none of us will have the time to solve the grievous problems that face the world, and our best hope lies in the education and training of the coming generations.

"The reaction to my appearance was so marked that I've been on ever since. When Vice President Humphrey was campaigning here, he appeared with me on the show and said later, 'This has been the highlight of my visit.'

"I enjoy talking to the children," the mayor added, "explaining my duties, the functions of my cabinet members, why and how taxes are levied and every facet of city government. The youngsters write in questions and they are surprisingly astute.

"Recently in Philadelphia, as I came out of my hotel, a little boy, perhaps 5 years old, pulled away from his father, ran up to me and said, 'Hi, Mayor Stokes!' I was surprised and delighted, and as his perplexed father joined us, the boy said, 'Daddy, this is Mayor Carl Stokes. He's on television with Clem and he tells us how he runs the city.' I wondered how the child had seen the program until I learned that Channel 61 in Cleveland circulates the show among other Kaiser stations around the country, including Channel 48 in Philadelphia. I was gratified to learn that it is also shown on educational TV."

With humorous cynicism, a Cleveland newspaperman gave his opinion of Mayor Stokes' dialogues with Clem and Captain Cleveland. "He's not talking to a puppet. He's talking to a whole generation of voters who'll age to the franchise in about 15 years. Carl's 41 now. The way it looks to me, with what he's got going for him, the next couple of decades is going to see him pretty high on the ladder. Maybe reaching for the top rung. That's when those votes'll come in mighty handy."

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
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

Company coming unexpectedly? Keep the ingredients of these individual pot pies in the freezer and on the shelf for quick use. Perfect for winter lap meals in front of the television set. Add a salad, a beverage and fruit for dessert.

Each of these recipes is enough for 6 pot pies using individual casseroles holding 1 cup.

CHICKEN AND BISCUIT POT PIE

Heat 2 packages (11½ ounces each) frozen creamed chicken in a skillet, stirring over low heat until bubbly. Fold in 1 can (1 pound) sliced carrots, drained. Reheat. Spoon hot mixture into 6 individual casseroles. Open 1 package refrigerated biscuits and cut each into quarters. Place quarters around the outer edge of the casseroles. Bake in a preheated hot oven (400° F.) for 20 minutes or until golden brown.

BEEF AND DUMPLING POT PIE

Heat 3 packages (6 ounces each) frozen beef-with-onions-in-red-wine-sauce, or beef stew, as directed on package. Mix hot beef with 1 can (1 pound) mixed vegetables, drained. Reheat. Spoon hot mixture into 6 individual casseroles. Mix 1 package corn muffin mix with 1 egg and ½ cup milk. Drop teaspoons of the batter around the outer edge of each casserole. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (375° F.) for 20 to 25 minutes or until richly browned.

PIZZA POT PIE

Saute $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds ground chuck, 1 green pepper, chopped, and 2 tablespoons instant minced onion in 2 tablespoons oil until meat is brown and crumbly and pepper is tender. Drain excess fat. Open 1 package ($15\frac{3}{6}$ ounces) pizza mix with cheese. Open sauce in mix and stir into meat mixture with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chili sauce and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sliced stuffed olives. Spoon hot mixture into 6 individual casseroles, Prepare pizza dough in mix according to package directions, adding cheese in mix to flour before adding water. Knead dough into a smooth ball. Cut dough into 6 pieces. Roll out each piece into a circle large enough to cover the top of the casserole. Cut a cross in the center of each circle. Turn back points in cross and place crusts on top of pies. Bake in a preheated hot oven (400° F.) for 20 to 25 minutes or until crust is brown.

CHINESE POT PIE

Place ½ cup hot cooked rice in the bottom of each of 6 casseroles. Heat 2 packages (14 ounces each) frozen shrimp chow mein in a skillet, stirring over low heat until bubbly. Stir in 2 tablespoons soy sauce and spoon on top of rice. Slightly crumble 1 can (3 ounces) chow mein noodles and sprinkle around outer edge of casseroles. Cut 4 slices of American cheese into small triangles and place over chow mein noodles. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350° F.) for 15 minutes or until cheese is melted.

MEXICAN POT PIE


Combine 1 pound frankfurters, cut into ½-inch crosswise slices, 1 can (12 ounces) Mexicorn, drained, and 2 cups marinara sauce. Heat until bubbly. Spoon into 6 individual casseroles. Prepare 1 package instant mashed potatoes as directed on package, adding ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese to potatoes. Place potatoes in a pastry bag with a large star tip, and pipe a border around the outer edge of each casserole. Bake in a preheated hot oven (400° F.) for 15 to 20 minutes or until potatoes are lightly browned.

Totie Fields contends that if she lost weight, she'd be out of show business

Co-hosting The Mike Douglas Show, Totie Fields looks like a snowman in drag. Setting her dumpling face on beauteous Arlene Dahl sitting nearby, Totie tsk-tsks: "Honey, you shouldn't let yourself go like that." Then, after Dahl hands out some beauty tips, Fields turns to the housewives in the crowd and bellows: "Why do you listen to her? Chances are you'll never look like her. Better you should listen to me because the chances are you will look like me."

The housewives roar and Totie Fields continues her reign as America's favorite size 44. A little-known strip-club comedienne seven years ago ("They wouldn't let you in if you wore a tie,"

Totie hoots), Fields today headlines at such big-time spots as Vegas' Riviera and LA's Century Plaza. But TV has always been her bread and butter. Sullivan, for instance, has had her on 25 times in five years. And chances are, if you tune in the Virginia Graham, Griffin, Bishop or Douglas talk shows you'll bump into Totie.

She's hard to overlook—on the tube or off. At home (she's married to excomic George Johnston and has two teen-age daughters) Miss Caloric Catastrophe sidesaddles a settee and sets you straight on the weight right off. "In this house we eat," she says in a voice that sounds as rusty as old nails. "Listen, I've never had such a good time in my life. I don't want to worry, I can't eat this, I can't eat that. I enjoy."

Out of the kitchen meanders another family member who apparently "enjoys." She's a friendly poodle with a barrel shape to rival Totie's. "That's Bubbles," Totie informs. "Once, on the Douglas show, a dog analyst told me Bubbles overate because she was alone too much. I said, 'You want to know why she overeats? Look at me. She's fat because I overeat. I don't have to pay 25 an hour to discover that!"

There's another hoot (it sounds unnervingly like a falsetto foghorn), and a listener laughs too. Just why is a little hard to figure at first. Fat's not fun to most people. But Fields manages to make it both funny and acceptable. For one thing-on stage or off-Totie tells it like it is. According to Virginia Graham, Totie couldn't do it any other way. "There's not a dishonest hair on her head," says Miss Graham. That's pretty close to the truth. Once, at Joey Bishop's house, Totie was subjected to one of her host's mandolin solos. "Joey's so terrible at it," Totie gasps, "you can't stay in the same room." So Totie put on her hat and headed home.

But it isn't just candor that makes Totie likable. Beneath the bulky exterior, Fields is as open as a hearth ("I have to trust people," she says, "until I find I can't") and generates almost as much warmth. "If you love," Totie says, "it's so much easier on your insides."

Born Sophie Feldman to a shopping-center owner in Hartford, Conn., 38 years ago, Totie, by age 4, was already singing on local radio. "But I was never the kind of child performer who entered contests," Totie says. Which was probably just as well. Once Totie's mother entered her in a beautiful-child contest. Reports Totie: "They sent my picture back by return mail." It didn't bother Fields. Shrugs she: "Nothing's ever fazed me."

A good thing, too. At 18, Totie headed for Boston with an act she describes as "a singer who did comedy" and played some pretty wild clubs—mostly strip joints. "If I got an anonymous call telling me to go out for coffee around 10 that night," Totie remembers, "I knew we'd be raided." Switching from singing to straight comedy-emceeing, Totie found herself in a pickle. "I couldn't remember the acts I had to introduce," she says, "so I'd write them out on the palm of my hand." Fat good that did, admits Totie, explaining, "I can't spell, either."

In Boston Totie met and married fellow comic George Johnston (he's now her musical conductor) and gave birth to her first daughter, Jody, now 17. Until then, Totie was a svelte 100 or so pounds. "It wasn't until my early 20's," Totie explains, "when I became pregnant with Jody, that I started to gain." After trying "100 shots at dieting," according to her manager, Howard Hinderstein, Totie threw in the towel. Reasoned she: "If I lost weight, I'd be out of show business."

But that was 'way before Totie's bulk was worth its weight in box-office gold. Meanwhile, back in Beantown, husband George dropped out of show business to run a beauty salon while Totie continued to tour the circuit. And although seldom fazed, Totie had her trying moments. ''A lot of acts you'd work with

were *unbelievable*," Totie recalls. Some weren't the most safety minded. Totie tells of one stripper who did a fire dance—"over a bucket of *real* fire." "One night," Fields says, "her tassels went up in flames."

Through thick and thin-to say nothing of emblazed exotics-Totie tended to house and family. "Honey, if you don't have that," she says resolutely, "you don't have anything." Recalls daughter Jody: "In Boston, Mom would be up all day, working at night, and still get up at 6 A.M. to get us off to school." Even today, Fields is seldom out of commuting distance with her kids. Count on one thing: Totie, as she puts it, has "no sense of humor" when it comes to her family. When asked, "Now that you're a star, what do you plan to do with your children?" Totic leveled him with "Sell them!"

But during Totie's Boston days, stardom was still a good seven years hence. Eventually, however, an agent offered her work around New York and Totie grabbed at the offer. "Over a weekend," Totie recalls, "we decided to just go. leaving Georgie's business, the house -everything-behind." Thought Totie: "If you don't take advantage of things, you're sunk." After she played some fairly small clubs around Brooklyn and Jersey, the move paid off. Booked into the Copa, Totie was seen by Ed Sullivan, and TV exposure was but a Sabbath away. Mumbles Ed: "Totie's never failed to stop a show. She's a great comedienne."

Not all, to be sure, agree with Ed. One detractor finds Totie the comedienne "crude and totally lacking in class." As for Totie the woman, one club singer says, "Anyone that heavy has to be coping with a barrel of fears, tensions and frustrations. Still, I like her." Indeed, it would take detectives to find someone with a totally negative view of Totie. Explains Virginia Graham: "Totie's a richly abundant woman—in every sense of the word."

This show was highly touted as television's first "motion-picture series." If so, it is proof negative that there's still a large difference between movies for television and movies for movies. For one thing, of course, they have more time to make theatrical movies. In *The Name of the Game* television apparently attempted to lick that problem by having three stars who would alternate and thus allow the producers as much as three weeks to shoot each episode. It was a good idea—except for one small detail. They forgot to get another good idea—one for the show itself.

The idea they got was to have the three stars be the three top men of an international publishing empireone the publisher himself (Gene Barry), another a former FBI agent who is now the editor of a magazine called Crime (Robert Stack) and the third a man who is billed as "a fast and flip investigative reporter for People" (Tony Franciosa). But no matter. It was all evidently supposed to be a kind of TV look at our Lifes and Times, as well as our Playboys and Cosmopolitans. As such, of course, the whole concept left a good deal to be desired-not the least of which was which side the viewer was supposed to be on. It's hard enough to tell the good guys from the bad guys in the average show nowadays, without having all of them, in The Name of the Game, wise guys. Most of the shows we've seen so far have been, from opening tease to final wheeze, so crammed full of false values

and phony status standards that, as movies, they move all right, but as far as moving *you* goes, our guess is that it will be primarily to turn them off.

All this is too bad, because no show offers you, on the surface at least, more for your money. There are so many guest stars, usually portraying villains, that many of them hardly have a chance to be introduced before they are shotfrom their good side, of course. A recent show, for example, offered Boris Karloff, Roddy McDowall, Jean-Pierre Aumont, Lilia Skala, Bethel Leslie, Susan Oliver and Richard Jaeckel-and hard as it is to believe, they were all overwhelmed by a sea of muddy melodrama and messy, unmotivated characterization. Indeed, of all the guest stars we've seen, only one performance stands out -that of Robert Young as a right-wing fanatic with his own paramilitary guard. He was paraterrific.

When it comes to the home team, we've seen Tony Franciosa very little. Apparently he not only alternates but hibernates, too. So we will reserve judgment on him. As for Gene Barry and Robert Stack, they have two expressions—between them. Barry is better than Stack, but that is still a long way from a compliment. Finally, 'researcher Peggy Maxwell (9usan Saint James) evidently sees her role as one third a mod Mata Hari, and another third a kind of immod impersonation of Paula Prentiss. We realize that leaves still another third, but then so does she.



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
