The prospect of world-wide television, enthusiastically hailed by most nations as a likely step toward international understanding and permanent peace, is viewed with some alarm by a prominent Soviet historian, Yuri Sheinin.

He predicted in an article published in the Moscow Literary Gazette that Western television companies might soon be capable of beaming programs directly into Soviet homes. "It is enough," Sheinin wrote, "to imagine what the malicious use of the latest channels of information for reactionary purposes might lead to. To a certain degree it could impede social progress." It's a little early to start worrying about this because, while we now know how to beam programs directly from satellite to home, the huge home antenna required would hardly be available to the average Soviet set owner. Still, there's no telling what advances may come within the next few years and it is possible that some day we'll be able to send and receive television signals internationally as easily as we do short-wave signals today.

Should that come to pass, we're certain that the Soviets would soon be capable of beaming television to our homes too. It's an exciting prospect, really, for we believe many Americans have an avid curiosity about how the Soviet people live and how they think. And we're certain the Soviet people are just as curious about us.

■ Let's be practical and admit that we would both put our best foot forward and transmit only the best, only the most flattering picture of our political systems and our cultures and our ways of life. Even learning *that* much about each other would be helpful.

We sincerely hope Mr. Sheinin was speaking only of his own fears. Surely by now some Soviet historians are ready to face the facts and the promise of modern communications.

'Bewitched' is destroying all that is most holy and wonderful in marriage-'wifely terror'

Despite the fact that I am somewhat past the age of 30, I am accepted by the younger members of society as one of themselves even in this age of ferment. The reason for this—aside from my astonishingly youthful appearance—is that I write science-fiction stories on occasion. This, by lending me an air of professional eccentricity and eliminating me forcefully from the square world of respectability, gives me the cachet of youth.

It is natural, then, that I am occasionally approached by youngsters of my spiritual age in order that they may profit from the wisdom of my chronological age.

One young man, pushing his beard TV GUIDE MARCH 22, 1969 to one side to free his lips, recently said to me, "What's the best way of handling women, sir?"

Smiling benignly, I answered, "Terror, my child. Terror."

With a sigh of relief he said, "Then I'm on the right track, because they terrify me."

He was gone before I could correct him, but I knew what was wrong. He did not own a television set.

Show me a man who is afraid of women and I will show you a man who is not engaged in that noblest of all American occupations—the careful watching of television.

It is television which presents the American way of life at its most \rightarrow

noble, resolute and dominant. The sterling men who write, direct and produce the shows give of themselves without stint that the quality of American life may be englessly enriched.

And most of all, I have noted, is the concern evident in their firm endeavor to keep American husbandhood unpolluted, to make of the American family a strong structure in which the man is dominant.

I refer you, for instance, to the fascinating study of husband-wife relationship that has enlivened hundreds of episodes of *I Love Lucy*, a program so important to sociologists generally that the various local television stations of the Nation, at great financial sacrifice to themselves, are currently engaged in airing the ninth reruns.

Do you remember the program? Do you remember Lucy, for instance, a tall girl of statuesque appearance out of whose brown follicles flaming-red hair grew. She was married to Ricky Ricardo, a band leader of pre-Castro-Cuban extraction.

For a woman, Lucy was extraordinarily intelligent, for her IQ easily topped 50 and matched her incredible enthusiasm. How exciting it was to see her plot the fulfillment of her simple girlish dreams—a simple mink coat this week, a simple starring role in a Broadway show the next—the kind of dreams your own wife has, for Lucy is Everywoman.

Each week, naturally, in her enthusiasm she commits some small whimsical misdeed or other. How I chuckled with delight as she burned down the house one week; lost her husband his job the next; smashed the car through the plate-glass window of a department store and across the crowded dress section the week after.

It was nothing the average wife need worry about and yet on each occasion Lucy was absolutely terrified of her husband finding out. Please observe the significance of this. Lucy is clearly a girl of enormous strength and muscular development for despite all the mischances she passes through (enough to destroy a stevedore) she emerges unscathed. Ricky Ricardo, on the other hand, is a gentle soul who, on these programs, has never been seen to do anything more strenuous than to finger a bongo drum.

Yet, despite this, Lucy frequently cries out on such occasions, "Ricky's going to *kill* me." Of course, he doesn't. I have waited with some indignation for him to kill her but aside from dropping his lower jaw, popping his eyes and making incoherent sounds, he has offered no violence.

Yet it is this dread of husband, this quality of terror, that has given this fictional Lucy's life its fulfillment and has made of her television marriage a glorious pattern for all Americans.

This pattern is to be found in other programs as well. Do you remember Pete and Gladys? Remember how Gladys was always terrified of Pete? Remember / Married Joan? Remember how Joan was always terrified of Brad? And how about He & She? She was always in panic concerning He.

Do you suppose all this is an accident? Do you suppose the incredibly talented writers on television merely copy each other? Never! They are expressing a deep truth. To keep the family stable the husband must keep his wife in a condition of abject terror.

I have explained this to my beautiful blonde-haired 13-year-old daughter who, I have noticed with some concern, is insufficiently terrified. She said, "But Daddy, don't you see that Lucy, Gladys, Joan, She and all the rest always get their way? Don't you see they have to wheedle and connive to get it? It's disgraceful. It makes women out to be creatures without dignity or self-respect and destroys them as people."

Naturally I was horrified at this. Thirteen is quite old enough to know the facts of life. I called in my wife and said, "See here, I want you to talk to our beautiful blonde-haired 13-year-old daughter and acquaint her with the facts concerning wifely terror." \rightarrow

Whereupon the lady of the house said, "What wifely terror?"

Instantly I smelled a rat. Somewhere, somehow, the purity of womanly panic was being tampered with. For months I searched for the wellspring of poison, with that bulldog persistence that forms so remarkable a part of my character.

And I found it. Right on television, too. It took the shape of a program called *Bewitched*, a monstrous production that is destroying all that is most holy and wonderful in the husband-wife relationship.

On the surface it seems innocent. A personable young woman, Samantha, is married to a personable young man, Darrin. It would seem that this situation is a healthy one, but observe! Samantha is a witch!

This means Samantha can make things appear or disappear; she can turn herself into a variety of animals; she can control the thoughts and wishes of others; and so on.

The result? How can I bring myself to tell you the mind-shattering nature of the result. The *husband* is terrified.

Let me give you an example. In one episode Darrin, our handsome young advertising executive, outlines his plans for promoting the line of cosmetics manufactured by a certain firm. The head of the firm (as is commonly the case where such firms are involved with handsome young advertising executives) is a young lady of surpassing beauty.

Naturally the young lady of surpassing beauty is immediately impressed with Darrin and invites him to her yacht —a situation which must face young advertising executives every day.

On the yacht, as you can probably guess, the young lady of surpassing beauty evinces unmistakable signs of passion. It is inevitable. I have lost count of the number of times this has happened to me.

In such a situation, then, what would the normal young man do? What would you do? What would *I* do?

The answer is plain. Given a passionate, beautiful woman in a situation 10 of great privacy, a gentleman must oblige. When it happens to me (and I will speak quite plainly with you, for these are times of great frankness) I routinely shake hands warmly. What's more I give the hand a little squeeze and then engage the young lady in friendly conversation, taking care to sit on the same couch with her as a gesture of intimacy.

Admit it, wouldn't you do the same? But did our hero do so? No, indeed! And why not? There was a cat in the room. Darrin, convinced that the cat was his own witchy wife, Samantha, in disguise (it wasn't), disintegrated into a thoroughly shocking and unmanly mass of terror.

It was revolting! Picture (if you can) a grown man so frightened of his wife that his hands shake, his lips tremble, and his words grow incoherent. What a disgraceful and unheard of display!

I pointed all this out to my daughter. "Is this," I said, censoriously, "what you would like to see, eh?"

Whereupon she said, "Oh, Daddy, don't you see that *Bewitched* is just another example of the degradation of womanhood? Here's a woman with unimaginable magical power and she uses it entirely to shore up her husband's ego, make him look good, help him keep his job, beat down his enemies. Has she no life of her own?"

See what harm the program has been doing? She wasn't even aware of the disgrace of Darrin's terror. The toxin of *Bewitched* is pouring into the veins of innocent Americans and I must fight it by any and all methods.

One thing I am going to do at once is to keep my own wife in a state of wholesome terror.

I am going to draw myself up to my full, angry height; I am going to frown and pop my eyes; I am going to speak in my very deepest tones; and I am going to do it right now! —Or maybe tomorrow.

Anyway, I'm definitely going to do it sometime this week or possibly next, if I can catch her in a good humor.

We know.

You were expecting a drink.




The Mood is Marlene

Barbara Bain becomes a latter-day Dietrich for 'Mission:Impossible' Marlene Dietrich was especially in "The Blue Angel"—sexy, seductive and not terribly kind. She lured men a lot. So, too, is Barbara Bain sexy, seductive and not very kind in the episode (to be seen on April 13) of *Mission:* Impossible when she



emulates Miss Dietrich. She plays a night-club performer who tries to lure an East European security agent into trying to kill her, in order to trap him. As the performer, Barbara does a mild strip, a few modified bumps and grinds and sings a couple of songs. She sings—although husband, Martin Landau suggested she imitate Dietrich's voice —in her own style; and, although certain of the ploys, like the foot-onthe-chair-with-cigarette (above, left) are Dietrichesque, she plays the scene pretty much her own way. The whole business is properly tawdry (the above picture is a good example), and two of the songs, written specifically for this episode by musical director Lalo Schifrin and executive producer Bruce Geller, are equally tawdry in →

WARREN BEATTY TALKS ... about his new co-star Elizabeth T. Burton, about 'Bonnie and Clyde' and about 'Mickey One' (on TV this week)

The set, considering it was put together by French craftsmen, was a remarkably accurate version of a latenight spot in Las Vegas, Warren Beatty, the bar pianist, was on the phone to his chorus-dancer friend. Elizabeth Taylor-the born loser in the game of life and the born loser in the game of love clinging together in a last-chance romance. In the thin days before his first acting role, Beatty earned a crust playing cocktail-hour piano and maybe this helped give the scene its taut reality. But then Beatty and Miss Taylor (or Elizabeth T. Burton, as she ordered her dressing room labeled) usually know the people they portray.

Director George Stevens indicated his satisfaction by turning on the mood music he uses to prepare his actors emotionally for the next scene-in this case a smoochy Latin American ballad. "Besame Mucho." Beatty accepted a glass of milk from an aide and wandered over, smiling a greeting. "There's a rumor around here that I've been acting," he said. He explained the milk: "If I drink coffee I get jangled." A couple of French studio workers slunk away, chagrined; they had assured me when I showed up on the set of 20th Century-Fox's "The Only Game in Town" that Beatty would break our appointment.

"He says he'll see people but then he doesn't," they alleged.

The idea that Beatty is rude or difficult with interviewers has been around the movie business since his first film eight years ago, when he was only 23. Maybe this is because the man who has everything tends to alienate others and Beatty has an almost illegal abundance of assets. He is tall, young, very talented, very handsome and, since his astonishing tour de force as star and producer of "Bonnie and Clyde," very rich. Come to think of it, I feel a few twinges of envy myself, although the last time I talked to Beatty he was just as vulnerable as you and I, carrying a torch for Leslie Caron, who had ended a long relationship by deciding it would be wrong for them to marry.

Beatty suggested we chat on a couple of folding chairs in a corner of the studio. But when I said I was interested in his opinion of one of his earlier films, "Mickey One," and its appearance on television this week. he sighed and said it was a film to experience rather than talk about but perhaps we would be more comfortable in the dressing room. On our way he chatted for a moment with a Czech friend-in Russian! He said he had picked up the language out of a book, an achievement that deserves respect even if he actually learned it, as a friend of mine confided, from a Russian girl. To tell the truth, this does sound more like the Beatty method.

In the dressing room Beatty finished the milk and called for a large jar of what he said were protein tablets. "I was out till 5:30 this morning," he said, munching away. "The paparazzi [photographers] were all over the place but I got my girl out the back way." He did not identify her, but his success with women is approaching the legendary.

For a man who has ambitions in the cinema and in public life, Beatty manages to find a lot of time for ladies in all the social strata. For their part, women of all ages find him most appealing. When the Duchess of Windsor heard I was going to see him, she enthused: "He must be the most handsome young man." His name has been linked more or less seriously with Natalie Wood, Jean Seberg, Miss Caron and a lengthening list of beauties.

"The press never hears about the right girls," he laughed, sweeping his thick, dark hair back from his forehead. But he admitted that the blonde English star, Julie Christie, was the "something special" in his life right now.

This is a beguiling subject and reluctantly I brought the conversation back to films. Beatty said he enjoyed working with Miss Taylor.

"She couldn't be nicer. There's a simplicity about her, an innocence almost. I'm always surprised at how American she is despite the time she spends abroad. She's really the American girl."

Frank Sinatra was originally scheduled for "The Only Game in Town" but withdrew just as Beatty's first project since "Bonnie and Clyde" fell through.

"I was preparing my own film and some of it was to be filmed in Prague," he said, wryly. "I was sure nothing would happen there; they were moving toward a fancy liberalization. Then came that 'problem' [the Russian invasion], so I thought I'd better do a job as an actor."

It was a keen disappointment personally as well as artistically. He believes deeply that Russia and the U.S. must reach an accommodation or there will never be world peace. He is as politically aware as his sister, Shirley Mac-Laine. "I worked for the Humphrey ticket in the last election," he said. "Shirley was a delegate to the Chicago convention, but I went on my own. I campaigned actively on behalf of gun control, the Tydings Bill. It was later watered down, so in that sense it was a defeat, but it's better than nothing."

He is working on the script of a film that will be set in both Russia and the U.S., but he does not wish to be too explicit too soon; his study of Russian is partly linked to this venture. "Bonnie and Clyde" did more than make him a millionaire; it taught him that a producer must know every aspect of film making and he is even sketching some of the orchestral themes for this East-West project.

"They didn't expect 'Bonnie and Clyde' to do so well," he grinned, "so they gave me a big percentage of the picture and the global gross so far is over \$30 million."

"Bonnie and Clyde" was directed by Arthur Penn, who persuaded Beatty to star in "Mickey One." Beatty tried to discourage my interest in the story of the picture.

"'Mickey One' was a good film, but few people understood it," he said. "It was an uncompromising type of picture that would take some work to understand even without commercials. With commercials, well, 'Three Little Pigs' would be difficult to follow with commercials. It makes use of most of the innovations in the cinematic vocabulary that have since become more and more accepted." He paused, then said earnestly: "Look, tell them to switch on and let it happen without trying to understand it at the moment. Later something will come out of it."

He was equally adamant against "cerebralizing" or "intellectualizing" about his own role in the film, and stumbled briefly over the sesquipedalianisms, as who wouldn't? "I wouldn't get into it, if I were you," he advised. "But if you insist, I play a young comedian who's in trouble emotionally. It has to do with paranoia. It has to do with facing fear and finding an identity."

After the above you may be interested in what the official synopsis of the film says: Mickey One is a night-club entertainer who goes broke on a gambling spree with a playgirl. His manager gets him an audition in a swank club. Fearful of the debt he owes the gang, he tries to run away but is persuaded by a girl in his rooming house to stay. With the glare of the spotlight pinning "'Mickey One' struck out at a higher price than was usual. A picture like that demands very positive acceptance by a large group of critics who are really pressed to keep up with the public IF YOU KNOW WHAT I MEAN. And you can quote me!

"The public sees visual images on

Beatty complained that too much depends these days on initial critical reaction and this is not always accurate, as evidenced by the reversals made by some critics who had at first panned "Bonnie and Clyde." its TV every day. It's very sophisticated and shouldn't be talked down to. The public is ahead of the distributors, critics and, usually, the film makers. The public watches commercials which are masterpieces of the hard sell. The commercials have enabled film makers to make a point more quickly in feature films. They have speeded up the \rightarrow

audience's rate of comprehension—as I soon found out when I had to design one for 'Bonnie and Clyde.' "

Beatty made stardom strictly on his own without the help of sister Shirley. They are good friends now after an uneasy early coolness that was more psychological than actual. A brilliant high school football player in Virginia, he turned down 10 athletic scholarships to concentrate on acting—and to preserve his good looks. After appearing in amateur plays directed by his mother, he got his first theatrical job at 17 in 1954—patrolling the alley outside the National Theater in Washington, D.C., to keep rats from entering the stage door.

Later he spent an impatient year at the School of Speech at Northwestern University and then moved to New York, where he attended the Stella Adler Theater Studio. To make a living he played piano and worked as a bricklayer's helper, as a construction worker and as a sandhog on the Lincoln Tunnel under the Hudson River. He finally got small jobs in off-Broadway productions, on live TV and in summer stock, and made his Broadway debut in William Inge's "A Loss of Roses."

The play flopped but not before director Elia Kazan had spotted him as just the player he wanted for "Splendor in the Grass." Few stars have moved more swiftly up the artistic and financial ladder. "The Only Game in Town" is only his ninth film.

"He thinks too much for an actor," said one of his few critics. "Despite his success he's insecure like all actors. There's always that anxiety, will the next one be as good as his last?"

This feeling isn't unique to Beatty, of course. He also worries about being misunderstood or misquoted and often asks that things he says or does be "off the record." This is a pity, since I cannot therefore mention an instance of gallantry on his part, rare in show business and entirely to his credit.

Pastore Asks TV to Censor Shows

TV's severest and most influential critic on Capitol Hill clearly feels the purveyo s of home-screen entertainment have carried sex and violence "too far." Facing an array of network brass he had summoned to Washington one day last week. Sen. John O. Pastore (D-R.I.) demanded to know, for instance, how a show like Turn-On, an ABC "Second Season" series that got vanked after one performance, ever got on the air, Indeed, the senator seemed, despite the fact that the hearing was called mainly to explore TV "crime and violence," to be as much or more concerned with TV's sexy stuff. Along with colleagues on the Senate Subcommittee on Communications, he wondered how a movie like "La Dolce Vita" got on a Washington station in prime time. Even the sex in commercials worried Pastore. What, he asked, about that shaving-cream spot imploring "Take it off . . . take it all off!"? "The American public is not naive." the senator lectured ABC's Leonard Goldenson, CBS's Frank Stanton and NBC's Julian Goodman.

It a'l adds up, Pastore suggested, to "getting a little more risque and a little more risque . . . Laugh-In and Turn-On, things of that kind . . . that's why we're here; that's what this is all about." Although Pastore coupled his lecturing of the networks with the announcement that he had asked the U.S. Surgeon General to undertake a year-long study of the cancer-andcigarettes type to try to measure "the impact of televised crime and violence children." the senator seemed on mainly intent in the hearing upon inducing the networks to submit their shows to preview by a "code review board" of the National Association of Broadcasters, the leading industry o ganization. Pastore obviously regarded the notion as a compromise between undesirable Government censorship and letting the networks have their heads. At present the industry has "a beautiful code that reads like the Ten Commandments." Pastore asserted, but it is not enforced.

The network chiefs expectably resisted the idea of a "czar" passing on their fare. They insisted they have cut back sharply on violence in current and upcoming drama, but contended it is an essential ingredient of "conflict" in fiction. CBS's Stanton argued his network is "doing a pretty good job" of holding down mayhem. NBC's Goodman reported he had directed a cleanup of Saturday morning kiddy cartoon violence. The networkers unanimously praised the objective of the Surgeon General's probe, but they had some doubts that even a "methodology" could be devised which would conclusively prove a causal relationship between viewing and committing violence. Pastore declined to be put off. "You men know the difference between violence and nonviolence," Pastore smiled. The network officials knew what he meant: the Congressional heat is on.

hile fine and even classic films V lie moldering in the can, network-movie programmers are using the two-hour prime-time movie slots to pretest next season's series or get mileage out of quickie movies that are going to be dubbed and shipped abroad, on the assumption, we presume, that American moviegoers wouldn't pay to see them. Two "pilots" and a quickie are on this week's schedule. By coincidence and/or contrast, the two "theatrical" films new to television-and even the two others being rerun-may show you what serious (i.e., nontelevision) movie making is all about.

"Mickey One," director Arthur Penn's and star Warren Beatty's 1965 precursor to "Bonnie and Clyde," is an avant-garde American film, an elliptic and allegorical tale of modern man in society and outside it, on the run from nameless terrors, "guilty of not being innocent." It is told in terms of a night-club entertainer in flight from the syndicate that "owns" him; Beatty is brilliant, with a cast to match. It is a thoroughly cinematic work, subtle, demanding and Pinteresque; if it survives the fragmentation of telecasting and if you are willing to cope with its stylistic complexity, you will find it a richly rewarding film.

At the other end of the theatricalmovie scale, there's the pure entertainment film, exemplified by "Sorry, Wrong Number," a 1948 thriller based on a celebrated radio drama. Barbara Stanwyck, as the wealthy hypochondriac who learns of her imminent murder, and Burt Lancaster, as the homicidal husband enmeshed in phone calls, sustain the unrelenting savagery of the tale's terror. It's all in the goreless classic style.

Even the reruns have special inter-"The Misfits," last telecast in est. 1965, burdened by a pretentious Arthur Miller screenplay but skillfully directed by John Huston, at very least preserves performances by Marilyn Monroe, Clark Gable, Montgomery Clift and Thelma Ritter (Eli Wallach is its surviving star). "Night of the Iguana," on the other hand, is undoubtedly the best film version of a Tennessee Williams play, with Huston in fine form as director and a brilliant cast doing justice to this exploration of the human agony.

So much for "real" movies. "Then Came Bronson" is the pilot for a series in which Michael Parks wanders around, via motorcycle, searching for "meaning in life," to be found, we presume, in as many weeks as the ratings hold up. "Marcus Welby, M.D." is the pilot for a series in which Robert Young is a general practitioner-i.e., a cross between physician and Dear Abby. And "The Challengers," CBS's first tailored-fortelevision movie, is about auto racers and includes just about everybody you've, seen in these quickies, from Darren McGavin to Anne Baxter to Sal Mineo, right out of the Universal Studios garage. Et tu, CBS?

If you think that some of the television programs this season have been going to the dogs, take a closer look at the commercials. Not only are many of the stars dogs, but also any other type of animal that can hold the audience's attention long enough for the sponsor to achieve his goal-namely, to take a bite out of the viewer's wallet. Maybe you've



been watching those animals wistfully, wondering whether your pet could ever become as famous as the Hartz Mountain dog who scratches his fleas on television. "After all," you may have been thinking, "my dog does that all day long at home for free." There is, however, one difference—the Hartz Mountain dog doesn't have any fleas. He got \$200 for that bit because he was trained to scratch when his owner, offcamera, scratched himself.

Whether you can make your canine a celebrity (or your cat another *femme fatale*) depends on your talent, your pet's temperament, and a proper amount of training—for both

of you. All animal theatrical agencies require dogs to be trained with their owners at a recognized obedience school, and they also like it if you teach them to roll over and to stop and start eating, although not necessarily in that order. The owner, however,



should be careful not to overtrain his animal.

"Stop training him the minute you think he is losing his own personality, is becoming too rigid, or is looking over at you too often for cues," says Barbara Austin of the Dawn Animal Agency Inc.

Lorrain D'Essen, of Animal Talent Scouts Inc., has some suggestions on getting your pet on TV. If you think your animal meets the training requirements, look up "Animal Rental" in the yellow pages and send each agency a description (include his training) along with a snapshot of your pet. On the day of your interview, don't make the common mistake of tranquilizing him, since that often causes unexpected or unnatural reactions. If you're angling for an animal food commercial, give the pet some of the food for a few days before the casting so he gets used to, if not exactly enamored of, the stuff.

Once you're at the interview, no matter how well trained your animal is at home, he will have to perform now in a strange environment, with people milling and shouting around him, other animals standing temptingly in front of him, and strobe lights going off convulsively at him.

And don't be surprised also if you are scrutinized just as carefully as your animal. "You should see some of the animal stage mamas we get in here," said Linda Hanrahan of All-Tame Animals Inc. "Some of them swear that their animals can do everything but talk—and some even insist they can do that also. Since we often send the owner out to a shooting with his animal, we look for people who are quiet, intelligent, poised, and don't seem overanxious."

One area in which people tend to be overanxious is money. Modeling animals is no easy way to get rich overnight; most cats and dogs earn only \$50-\$100 an appearance after the animal agency has siphoned off its wellearned 30-50 percent commission. (After your pet has done a few commercials, you can go directly to the advertising agencies, which charge no fee.)

One way to make a bit more than the average \$50-\$100 is to have a common pet that can do rare tricks. like the dogs that answered telephones the gerbils that jumped through hoops, the snakes that coiled on command, or the chickens that square-danced in commercials. Or, you could have a rare animal that can do common tricks such as a slightly trained giraffe or polar bear-they could make in the neighborhood of \$10,000 a day. Unfortunately, most people find it difficult not only to purchase such animals but also to keep them in their apartments. But smaller animals that are difficult to train are also paid well.

Even the best-trained animal in the world, however, may lose out simply because he isn't in demand. Animals, like fashions, do go out of style and while it's easy to change your wardrobe, it's hard to change a poodle into a Yorkshire and then a shih tzu, all of which have pre-empted each other respectively in popularity.

"What we are looking for right now," says Doug Gruber of All-Tame Animals Inc., "are cute, all-American mutts, preferably shaggy, and any of the shaggy or long-haired pedigrees. Among cats, Persians, Siamese, orange and black are definitely 'in' right now. As for other types of animals, no one has ever really trained a koala bear, panda, or platypus, so if they brought us in a trained one, they would certainly have no competition."

And don't give up just because an animal isn't in demand today. With the current proliferation of animal names for commercial products, especially cars, sooner or later they're bound to run out, and it might pay, say, to buy and train an aardvark or a zebu today, before the competition becomes too beastly.


To Africa, With Love

William Holden returns to Hollywood to promote TV specials about his adopted land

The Sunset Strip had a distinguished visitor a few weeks ago. He wore a safari shirt with Sam Browne loops at the shoulders, khaki pants, and a few lines around the eyes that weren't there before. William Holden was in Hollywood strictly on "business"—the business of nine African specials he is doing for CBS, the first of which, "Adventures at the Jade Sea," is scheduled for this Wednesday (March 26).

Holden deserved to be called "visitor." There was a time, before he left movietown to become a "citizen of the world," when he symbolized all that was enviable about the modern, "young banker"type superstar. His uniform off the screen was a well-tailored business suit and a short haircut. His advocacy lay not in the torn T-shirts and other status orna-→

ments of the era, but in the brisk new science of star corporations, diversification, tax shelters. He was a gifted salesman who considered selling "The Bridge on the River Kwai" just as important as acting in it.

Then, about 10 years ago, he ran away from Hollywood, making it clear he no longer found anything there to nourish his interest. "I don't give a damn about my image," he said. "I never could conform to Hollywood's taboos."

He sold his North Hollywood house and moved to Switzerland. When the press suggested that reduced income taxes might have had something to do with it, he was furious, Hedda Hopper, he said, had made him into a "whipping boy." He gave himself over to the mystique of travel. He divided his time between Hong Kong, Tokyo, the capitals of Europe and other far-off places where he had "business interests," including an electronics company in Japan. One of his former associates claims: "Bill gave up being a first-rate actor to become a second-rate businessman." When he made pictures, he tended to do so on foreign soil. He bought an ancient hotel on the slopes of Mount Kenya in 1959 in partnership with an oil man, Ray Ryan, and turned it into the glamorous Mount Kenya Safari Club, with bird sanctuaries, tennis courts, some soundstage facilities (just in case), and a charter membership which included Sir Winston Churchill, Dwight Eisenhower, Henry Ford and Walt Disnev. Lord Louis Mountbatten staved there. So did Prince Bernhard.

In time he came to spend at least half of every year in Kenya. He became less hooked on Lord Mountbatten and more on African art, culture, history and conservation. He read widely about them. He made safaris that would have given pause to Dr. Livingstone. He found mystery in the veld, poetry in tribal rites, a gueer kind of comfort in physical danger. He gave every indication, despite stout denials, of a man desperately searching for meanings and willing to go to the ends of the earth to find them.

He bought a 1250-acre "game ranch" in Kenya and set about turning it into a vast wildlife research project to determine the feasibility of domesticating eland and other native animals. His purpose, he explained, was to develop a massive long-range program to feed some 10,000,000 protein-starved Africans. Once, when he was passing through the Rome airport, an official had the temerity to list him as "Actor." Holden angrily crossed it out and wrote "Game conservationist."

Marty Rackin, former head of Paramount and perhaps the closest friend Holden has in Hollywood today, says: "He always hated being the star. Now all the tinseled nonsense is gone. He is dedicated to being. He became totally involved in game conservation and the nobility of Africa. He has matured, seldom talks motion pictures—90 percent of Hollywood talk is superficial anyway. He never answered a fan letter in his life. What really bugged him was that men like De Bakey and Salk didn't get fan letters at all."

When he made the movie "The Devil's Brigade" for producer David Wolper. he persuaded Wolper to have his company also produce nine African TV specials. Holden didn't really cotton to the medium, but it was good for getting messages across. The first special details a grueling four-month safari into the Lake Rudolf region of the northern Kenva frontier, one of the most inhospitable areas in the world. It is there that volcanic rock holds heat that sometimes soars to 150 degrees in midday, the crocodile-infested waters mean instant infection, the breakdown of good diplomatic relations with Kiswahili-speaking tribes can spell violence, or even death.

"Way down deep, Africa was something Bill has been looking for all his life—a challenge," Rackin adds. "He once walked across the rail of [Pasadena's] suicide bridge on his hands. I have seen him hang out the window of his hotel room and chin himself with one hand." An actress who worked with him in the old days and now lives in Switzerland says: "He has always driven sports cars and still drives like a maniac."

In 1966, in Italy, he nearly killed himself in an auto accident which did kill the other driver, and was convicted of manslaughter (sentence suspended).

We talk one evening in his modest quarters at the Continental Hotel in Hollywood. He will be in town a few days only. He will see few people—not even his friend and mentor on the movie "Sunset Boulevard," Billy Wilder. The Continental is no Beverly Hills Hotel. Lots of chrome. Heavy floral pattern on the carpet. An open six-pack of Dutch beer on a table. Ice bucket to cool it in. Two straight chairs jammed between the wall and twin beds. A press agent, a .dedicated-to-Hollywood type, sits nervously on the bed. Holden is dressed to play the White Hunter in a story by Hemingway. All he needs is the safari hat.

He explains that he has been in Mexico shooting "The Wild Bunch," a Western for Sam Peckinpah. On the way back to Europe he has stopped off to see David Seltzer, the producer of the TV specials. The specials are the reason for the press agent, the reason for bothering with the press at all.

"I don't talk to the press. I don't need to," he keeps saying. But it is obvious that he does want to talk. He wants people to understand the why of Africa and, perhaps, through that, the why of him. But people have a \rightarrow

way of not getting the message. Like the time he was criticized for "running away" from America.

"I was an 'actor,'" he says—and the way he says the word it belongs in quotation marks. "I had an 'image.' First I was Smilin' Jim. Later I was Disgruntled Dan. I wanted to change that image. I didn't want to be cornered in one area all my life."

Ask him about his wife of 25-odd years, Ardis (Brenda Marshall, the onetime screen star), and he tunes out. Although she went with him to Switzerland, it was common knowledge that they were having "family squabbles" and that he had sought some solace in the bottle—too much solace, some said. They temporarily separated in 1963. At the time he was seen with the French actress Capucine (invariably described as "lissome" in the columns), who had co-starred with him in "The Lion."

In 1966 the columns had Ardis returning from Switzerland to file for divorce. But it never actually happened. He and Ardis live in a Geneva apartment (they sold the Lausanne villa). Ardis spent four months in Kenya last year.

Ask him about the kids and he perks up a little. Virginia married a college professor and presented Holden with his first grandchild a few years ago. West has just finished his first movie in Madrid. Scott is an undergraduate at Menlo College, near San Francisco. "Old friends," on the other hand, are just part of the ephemera of a past existence. "They do not pursue my way of life. Billy Wilder was never in Africa —so how can I see Billy Wilder?"

Looking back on it, the old Hollywood seems merely silly. "I remember 'Sunset Boulevard.' I had to kiss Gloria Swanson on a bed. I did it with my overcoat on, one foot on the floor, so nobody'd think I slept with her.

"My education was the finest. I had

everything South Pasadena had to offer. I knew no hardship. When I became successful as an actor, I saw a bit of the world. I found I couldn't speak a language. Most of the world's culture—which the U.S. chooses to ignore—lay elsewhere. My kids knew nothing of it.

"Ran away? I don't think so. To know who you are, you have to know where you came from. I'm Irish, English, French, Dutch, and I asked myself why can't I live where my forefathers came from? So I moved to Switzerland.

"In 1958 I went on my first safari. My interest then was trophy shooting. But I found beauty and mystery. Africans are mysterious people. I found strange vistas, forests, water holes, areas so remote and barren that no one knows them. The beauty is the mystery. There is time to live.

"Hemingway found it. Ruark found it . . ." His voice trails off.

"Man has to react in an animal way to life. But an actor gets out of bed, goes to the studio and changes his *clothes* to suit the part. We create false emotions instead of having them grow out of experience. It's actors who can't cope with that who end up in strait jackets.

"There is something tremendously exciting to me about an emerging nation. When our fathers crossed this country their pioneer spirit was stopped by the Pacific. There is still that spirit over there. Landwise, animalwise, moneywise."

The press agent fidgets on the bed. The "civilized" sounds drifting up from Sunset Boulevard provide an apt accompaniment to the confessional.

"Have you been in the Marille district lately? That's the one where you never know when you're going to get the spears in the back. Young men there must kill and mutilate an enemy to prove *their* manhood.

"What else counts?"



The gentleman was calling from Kitzbühel, Austria, happily not collect. A new snow had fallen. Chalets lay halfburied in this hillside garden of the Austrian Alps. Thin curls of smoke twisted from chimneys and a bright sun now illuminated the uppermost peaks.

"Too bad you're not with us," said Mr. Bob Beattie, director of the U.S. Alpine Ski Program, who, with his dashing wards, was making the routine European tour. This week, it was Kitzbühel. On another, it would be St. Moritz, then Chamonix and Garmisch-Partenkirchen. There also could be a stop at Hoch Gurgl, which sounds like a German mouthwash. You picture the commercial . . . "Fräulein, if you are getting only handshakes instead of kisses, try Hoch Gurgl, the antiseptic you can be sure of."

Skiing, unmistakably, is the glamor pastime of sports, a fact television has come to recognize this winter. Whereas normally a few snowflakes go a long way on TV, the medium has fallen through the ice altogether the last three months. An hour special has been offered on Jean-Claude Killy, the godlike figure of France, over whom ladies lose their composure completely. This is interesting to veteran observers, who never have pictured anyone named Claude as a famous lover.

Then Killy has put on television a series of ski films called *The Killy Style*, which instructs you on how to come down the slope without breaking your fool neck.

From Aspen, Colo., ABC has offered this winter the U.S.-French races. It also has shown that part of the World Cup to be held in the U.S. from Squaw Valley, Cal., and, this Saturday (March 22), intends to carry the second half from Waterville Valley, N.H.

Coach of the last two U.S. Olympio ski teams, Beattie serves as analyst on the ABC alpine telecasts, aimed primarily at developing a following in a sport that appears to be growing in North America. "Ten years ago," says Beattie, "only a million people skied in the U.S. Today there are 5,000,000."

It must be admitted here that the foregoing figure has not been documented by your correspondent, to whom skiing as a sports event remains suspect. In other words, Killy, *le champion*, has yet to convince us that skiing is something more than a ruse by which a guy gets his girl in front of the fire, and vice versa. For *aprés ski*, an Italian we know recommends Northern Sweden because it gets dark there at 3 in the afternoon.

If people in our country were serious about skiing, how could a Nation this size come up with such a paucity of Olympic champions? In winter sports, we have won but two gold medals (none in skiing) in the last two Winter Games.

"Our trouble," explains Beattie, "is that we started long after the Europeans and haven't yet caught up. [And looking at the dolls surrounding Killy, we never will.] Whereas ski programs have been going in Europe for maybe 40 years, we have had one of consequence for only about 15 years."

A snow-oriented country, Russia is no more proficient at skiing than the U.S., doubtless for the same reason.

"The first requirement for building a program," says Beattie, "is money. We have been raising it for our skiers lately, and the cash we get from these telecasts will be added to the kitty."

"How do you square this with Avery Brundage?"

"There is nothing to square. Unless money goes directly to individuals, it isn't professionalism."

The money from TV, in other words, goes into group development, with the idea of training our skiers for the big time. This is done, for the most part, by sending them to the major meets of the world. They make the circuit of Switzerland, France, Austria and Germany. They will hit the biggest events in the U.S., and, when winter comes to the Andes (during our summer), it is time for Chile and Argentina. It's just like jet-setting, only on someone else's chips.

Considering the limited audience of a ski show, why would sponsors bring so much of this sport to television?

"The Killy series and the big races are sponsored by two motor-car companies," says Beattie. "They want identification with the young. Skiing is basically for the young. Another sponsor is a big airline, which flies people to winter-sports resorts."

Superficially, winter sports suggest an air of freshness and purity, but they are, in truth, trouble prone and they create more rumbles than the giant spectator sports.

In the last Winter Olympics, for instance, a large argument developed over the practice by skiers of advertising the brand names of the companies they represent. They got poor Mr. Brundage so upset that he called an emergency meeting of the International Olympic Committee and threatened to disqualify all entrants unless they painted out the manufacturers' names appearing on their equipment.

Then, in the women's luge, a form of

sledding, a winning team from East Germany was disqualified when the discovery was made that the ladies competed with hot sleds. Unlike a hot mink or a hot watch, a hot sled isn't stolen merchandise. Its runners have been heated to make the sled go faster over the frozen course. The East German ladies were caught, and they were given a hot foot.

Finally, Killy, the triple winner, faced the prospect for a while of having his gold medals taken away on a charge of professionalism. It was an agonizing moment for France. In its time, that nation has produced some pretty good matinee idols, dating all the way back to Chevalier. Boyer was no slouch, and the line of succession has turned out the Louis Jourdans, the Jean-Paul Belmondos and others. But Killy is a special vintage. He is the hottest item to come out of that country since French fried potatoes, and when it looked as if his name might be blackened, gentlemen raged and ladies wept.

Happily, Jean-Claude was cleared, thus paving the way for *The Killy Style*, which tells you everything except how to get snowed in with a beautiful heiress.



THE GLEN CAMPBELL GOODTIME HOUR

There is something about a show which uses "Goodtime" in one word in the title that makes you wonder whether said goodtime will be hadbyall. In any case, you are going to find that this show, like so many variety shows. varies. Mr. Campbell, whom you will recall from The Summer Brothers Smothers Show-which was guite a title too-is a big, blond, all-American farm-boy-charmboy type. His thing is a kind of new country style which we can only describe as more hoe-up than hoe-down. And if his series has its ups and downs, it's less his fault than his producers'. Certainly he has few equals as a singer who appeals to both yesterday's generations and today's.

Besides Mr. Campbell, there are three other excellent regulars here. Two of them, Mr. Patrick Paulsen and Mr. Jack Burns, are comedians in residence, and the other, Mr. John Hartford, is a musician in residence. In their very different ways, all are excellent. Mr. Paulsen, for example, has not let his recent defeat for President get him up. He is still his wonderful deadpan self, and we love him, even if he isn't always up to his campaign standard (though most of the time he is). In the premiere show he was the narrator for a history of folk music ("The word hootenanny is a curious word. Why not call it a festercrabbit, or a nurdledurdle?"). In the third episode he was a ski jumper, going down the dreadful Kamikaze Jump ("All my life they've been calling me a coward. What a lousy time to find out they were

right"). Both of these sketches were terrific. Mr. Burns too is a very funny man. Our favorite sketch so far was in the third show, when he played an outraged older generationer to Avery Schreiber's hippie ("You kids today don't know what you want. When I was a kid I never wanted that" . . . "You just can't keep going through life like a football game, getting everyone downfield to throw a long pass. You have to have a game plan. What *is* your game plan?" Replied Schreiber, "I punt").


Mr. Hartford, the composer of "Gentle on My Mind," is so gentle on your ears that he is always welcome. All in all, it is remarkable that a program which has so much going for it could ever be disappointing. But such is the nature of the variety beast. We are thinking particularly of the fourth show. Here, despite the fact that Mr. Campbell sang two of our favorites, "Mary in the Morning" and "Those Were the Days," and then with Mr. Hartford did a rousing duet of "Memphis," everything else seemed to fall apart. Roger Miller was disappointing enough, but then so too were Mr. Campbell and Stevie Wonder singing another favorite, "Blowin' in the Wind." Never have we heard such a blow-wowo-ing mess made out of such a fine song. As for the final sketch-supposedly a lampoon of advertising-it was so bad it turned out to be a lampoon of itself. But patience, Remember this was one bad show out of four, and any series which can bat .750 can play in our park any night.
