#### as we see it

■ You're going to read a lot of numbers in the next few minutes. What they add up to is the fact that the number of local commercials on television has recently increased more than 25 percent.

More than 25 percent. To be precise,

it's 26.8 percent.

Our figures are from Broadcast Advertising Reports. BAR is employed by advertisers to monitor broadcasts and make certain that all the commercials the advertisers pay for get on the air.

During one week of December 1967, 262 stations in 75 markets broadcast 176,369 local commercials. During the parallel week of December 1968, the same stations broadcast 223,723 local commercials. That would be, roughly, 900,000 a month compared with 1967's 700,000—fcr just those 262 stations, and for just local commercials.

■ Network commercials have increased only 11.6 percent; from 2726 in the December 1967 week to 3042 in the December 1968 week.

This increase was prompted by a change in the Television Code which shifted the guidelines from the old emphasis on number of commercials to the number of program interruptions for commercials.

■ Thus where there were once three one-minute commercials during *The Beverly Hillbillies*, there now are seven 20- or 30-second commercials. No more *time* is consumed for commercials, there are a lot more products plugged.

Advertisers like the shorter (and lessexpensive) commercials, but they also would like to get away from bunching commercials by interrupting programs

more often.

■ For the sake of the viewer, who also is the consumer, there must be an intelligent solution to all this advertising clutter if television is to continue as a productive advertising medium as well as an effective communications medium.

As if the world of today were not tough enough to take-let alone the world of tomorrow-CBS has here taken on the world of the day after tomorrow. But don't think this is just one more program for the young fry. It's a terrific program for the old folks, too. If nothing else, it takes the sting out of the fact that some of us won't be around in Times Square on Dec. 31. 2000 (it's a Sunday, by the way), to celebrate the coming of the third millennium. But don't despair. We want our fan to know that we, of course, will be there-and we'll still be saying, with the same open mind we've always had, what a terrible mistake it is.

The point is, the world of the future, at least as depicted by most of the episodes of The 21st Century, looks like a great place to visit if you're going to be a computer or a robot or even an automated recording. But if you're planning on being a real person, lots of luck. The premiere show, for example, gave us a woman buying, by computer, a pair of shoes. Now really! Tell that to a shoe salesmanor, for that matter, anybody who has ever, in any century, witnessed any member of the feminine sex being shod. Another show depicted the efforts to make a computer more "humanized" by teaching it to speak English instead of digits. The darn thing, obviously still hung up, sang "On a Bicycle Built for Two." Still another was a little gem called "Art in the 21st Century." In this an artist told us he believed that art which is, as he put it, "personally painted" is out of date. He has a

whole factory turning out his stuff and, lest the pain of personally designing it all gets too onerous, he is now working on having a computer do what he calls his "potential designs." There was also a program called "Incredible Voyage," in which, via something called an endoscope, we were treated to a complete trip through the human body. We're all for in-depth interviews, but this was a bit much. Nothing, we mean nothing, was left either to the imagination or out. Such a show belongs, edited, on educational television.

On the other hand, *The 21st Century* deserves high marks on several counts. One is that it is narrated by Walter Cronkite, who is, bar none, our favorite narrator. He was particularly fine strapped into a moon-gravity simulator and jumping and flying around like Peter Pan. Give that sequence to nine out of 10 commentators and you'd have something too cute to bear. Mr. Cronkite, however, as Mr. Peter Dead Pan, never lost either his cool or, more important, his warmth.

By all odds the best show this program has done was a two-parter on smog and pollution which ranged from the Everglades to "the world's largest cesspool," Lake Erie. Here, for once, they forgot all the so-called wonders man is supposed to be going to achieve tomorrow, and took a good, hard look at the awful mess man has made of his world today. We suggest they rerun it—because if people don't pay attention to it, there won't be any 21st Century.

Filming takes place in Los Angeles, Washington, New York, Chicago and St. Louis . . . ABC is hashing over plans to rebroadcast its highly acclaimed "Africa" special in a slightly shortened version . . . A CBS News crew leaves for Greece in a few weeks to film the Jewish community living there. The footage will go into a religious special.

GERALDINE PAGE agreed to narrate "Little Women," the NBC Children's Theatre special now set for May 18 . . . SHEILA MacRAE will still be much in evidence on the JACKIE GLEASON show next season: in addition to a backlog of nine "Honeymooners" segments that haven't yet been seen, she'll turn up for three other appearances as a variety performer . . . Impressionist RICH LITTLE has signed up as a regular on JOHN DAVIDSON's summer series, which bows on ABC May 30.

There was an article in The New York Times the other day all about Pierre Salinger: "Salinger, in Paris, Content but Ready," said the headline. It brought back some stifling memories of the days in 1950 when I first presented Pierre to the world via station KRONTV in San Francisco.

I was the most highly paid and possibly the least-praised artist on San Francisco television then. I arrived at this eminence by a simple formula of my own devising. When they were ready to set a stipend for my appearance for 15 minutes each and every Wednesday night, I asked how much the air time cost.

"A hundred dollars," I was told. "Then that's what I want to be paid," I said. "I should be worth as much as 15 minutes of air." Curiously, no one questioned this statement, so I got \$100 a week—an unheard-of sum. And when the station obligingly raised its rates, mine went up, too, to a blazing \$125.

I was writing a three-dot gossip column at the time and Pierre Salinger was my assistant. When he came to work for me, I declared, "There's only one rule around here—you are not me."

"Yessir, chief," said Pierre. And he forthwith went about diligently becoming Pierre Salinger—with some success.

He was a great help. He knew everyone in town and he had an inborn radar for gossip—an indispensable asset for an assistant columnist and aspiring politician. I don't think anyone ever got as many phone calls as Salinger—mostly from his family. As the family's certified genius—or anyway, prodigy—Pierre was called on to solve every problem faced by his mother and brothers. I can still hear him shouting, "That's riddickeless, just riddickeless," at someone near and dear to him.

Pierre was already smoking cigars and, although my country has not asked me what I have done for it lately, I

can claim one contribution to the general welfare and to the great benefit of the people: I took Salinger off the terrible-smelling cigars he consumed.

"Now that television is making us rich," I said, "you can afford to smoke some stoves which do not cause your co-workers to cough and choke." "Yessir, chief," said Pierre. Today, he smokes nothing but the best cigars he can get.

Before I was accepted as a television star, I was made to submit to a kind of preview. The producer put me in front of a camera and stood there along with the station manager, my director, the ad-agency boys and the sponsor. I did my act under those cold, cold eyes. They regarded me as they would any shoddy, makeshift

product. They clearly regarded me as unfit for human consumption.

At the end, the station manager stalked from the studio. "He's a great little trembler, if that's what you want," he said. The sponsor thought I was wonderful. But then, he was also enthusiastic about the Nash, an automobile which he sold, and, perhaps, was an imperfect judge of the public taste. I was, in fact, terrible and I did not improve.

The program took the form, if that is the word, of my column. It was actually a kind of antediluvian *Johnny Carson Show*. The camera caught me while I was busily typing, then panned in for a close-up of my face and I would begin—hark!—to speak. To speak a few items of gossip and what I firmly

believed was humor. Much like Johnny Carson.

Then we'd have a guest—an entertainer, a politician or an athlete—someone we believed might be interesting. Since the singers could not sing because of union rules or contractual obligations or something, and the athletes could not perform because of lack of space, the program ran pretty heavily to heavy talk.


But we had some notable guests. Lefty O'Doul, a ballplayer, came along and told everyone how to hit a baseball with a bat. The chief of police was there: "I'm going to close this town so tight the wind won't be able to get through the Golden Gate."

A cigar maker appeared and made some cigars—this was Pierre's idea.

The chef of the Palace Hotel could not bring along all his equipment, but we got a little rubber duck and a duck press and pressed that duck so hard it cried out in mortal terror. Things like that.

When Jim Farley, the Democrat, came to town, I told Pierre to grab him. Jim Farley had the best memory on the political scene and I wanted him to clobber a certain governor I knew.

Governor What's - his-name also had a reputation for his infallible memory. "Hello, Joe," he'd say to a man he hadn't seen in years and years. "How's the wife, Olga? Over that trouble with her back, I hope. And the kids? Young Joe must be pretty near ready



for college." The show-off.

I did an article about him once, him and his memory. Pierre was along for the interview. A few days later, we met the governor at a cocktail party. He rushed up to me. "Hello-o, Pierre," he said. "Nice to see you again."

So I wanted to prick that balloon good. I relied on Jim Farley to show us what a memory really was. I knew the governor watched the program—there was nothing else to watch.

But on the air, Farley said, "I haven't a good memory at all. I've just got the reputation. It's the old story—if you get the reputation for getting up early, you can sleep late."

Then, as an afterthought, he said, "Actually, your own governor's got the best memory of anyone I've ever heard of." At least he didn't call me Pierre.

My time on the tube was before tranquilizers became popular, but I was so nervous my doctor gave me a lot of soothing pills. I ate them like gumdrops before each performance, but I continued nervous. One night I twisted a button off my coat.

"Great," screamed the director after the show. "That's it. That's the natural touch I want. You were sensational."

Remember, this was before Perry Como began to scratch his nose and ears to show how relaxed he was. The director wanted me to twist a button off my coat now and again, but I had to stop. My wife put her foot down. "I'm the one who has to sew them back on," she said. "Find out some other way to look nonchalant." A born director.

After the guests, we had a thing called "Roses from De Roos." This was a hard thing to say, a bad rhyme because my name matches with "dose" as in "dose of medicine" and not with "rose." Each week we would choose some deserving lady, preferably elderly, who had done some nice thing—helped a boy scout across the street, or fed macaroni and cheese to some neigh-

borhood moppets in a time of crisis.

It was Pierre's chore to appear late in the show with two dozen red roses. "Now . . . it is . . . time for Roses . . . from De Roos," he would say—say it with an eloquence surpassed only by Ed Sullivan. This was in Pierre's prejowl days, when he was just a roly-poly French kid—but he appeared on camera with all the lithe grace of a Disney dinosaur, a fat kid whose juices had congealed.

After he delivered his lines, I would chirp, "And what nice lady gets the roses tonight, Pierre?"

Pierre would turn red—wastefully because we were in black-and-white—and say, "To-night . . . the roses . . . go to . . Mrs. Balan-tine of . . five two . . three . . Don-o-van Street. And . . I will take . . them . . to her . . in a new . . Nash . . from Such . . and Such Motors. Good night." Then he would bow gravely and depart.

The betting was as high as 12 to 1 that Pierre would never get through his lines, but he always staggered to a wooden finish. Scared stiff. They don't call him "Plucky" for nothing.

I am sorry to say this delightful fare ended after 13 weeks. The trouble was that television was so new that people expected it to be good—even though Milton Berle appeared regularly.

Ended after 13 weeks, and television—freed of its shackles—leaped into its brilliant future, a future resplendent with The Jerry Lewis Show, The Monkees, Turn-On and other masterpieces too numerous and familiar to mention.

I am still, of course, available to television producers who want a proved performer. And you have the word of The New York Times that Pierre, "in Paris, is content but ready."

I have the feeling that I will be carrying the roses this time around, but I am still available at my old rate—pay equal to the cost of the air time. Pierre will probably come higher. Those content guys can be expensive.



Of course, everybody knows that you are 6-feet-5 or 6 anyhow. Well, this Jan Davis is 6-feet-2 in her stocking feet and 6-feet-5 in heels.

As long as we're being statistical, I might as well add that she has red hair two-and-a-half feet long, and her other measurements are 38-26-37. She gets a little cute when you ask her age—"Eleven, going on 72," she says. She won't even discuss her weight, but whatever it is, believe me, it's well-distributed. She is, as they say, a lot of woman—and she's still growing.

She has never been on Gunsmoke. In fact, I've noticed that you aren't on it very much any more. ## As easy as the One ball in the corner pocket

Philip Abbott clicks off episode after episode of 'The FBI' while his mind is with the avant-garde theater

The pool game is in progress at Phil Abbott's house.

"It's a wonderful life. (Click!) It wasn't always so. It was quite a few years before the opportunity came. (Click!) Of course, the acting challenge—One ball in the corner pocket—is not as great, but then I never had any illusions about it." Click—clunk!

The framed photograph over one end of the pool table shows him shaking hands with a heavy-set older man standing before a desk bearing the great seal of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, jaws jutting forward in the typical "sincere" attitude of the official photograph. The inscription says: "To Philip Abbott—With Every Good Wish, J. Edgar Hoover."

Abbott is the actor who plays Arthur Ward (modeled after Hoover), the "deputy director" of the Bureau as it is projected every week on the popular television show The FBI. The part is not easy. Whoever plays it must ride the narrow line between the FBI's protocol-conscious view of itself as dictated by Hoover, and the dictates of good popular drama. Abbott combines just the right amount of actorlike flamboyance-if that is the right word-with the dignity necessary to satisfy the exacting requirements of the Bureau. The FBI is the kind of show in which the agents wear the standard company uniform, a conservative business suit.

On Abbott it looks good. In fact, he at times even manages to give it a faintly rakish air. He lends a touch of class, and, according to Cartha DeLoach, an assistant to the Bureau director, "emulates the perfect image of the ideal FBI director." He can sit on the set, a dupli-

cate of the FBI offices in Washington, reeling off what his co-star, Efrem Zimbalist Jr., calls "Wardisms" by the hour—lines like "Be careful, Lewis," or "How are things going out there, Lewis?" or maybe "What do you think our move is now, Lewis?"—and make it sound like the sheer poetry it isn't. For this expert service he receives well over \$2000 a week.

Someone suggests that TV melodrama-even one dignified by the imprimatur of the FBI—is still basically ruled by the Fist and the Gun. Abbott rechalks his pool cue and lines up the next shot. "Yes, TV emphasizes that. Uh, Two ball in the side pocket. But still, we spend a great deal of time trying to develop character. Now we had this scene the other day. (Click!) There is a stern, rather self-righteous banker type involved with a shady but charming character. The idea is to force the banker to face the fact that he is basically attracted to this guy. We actually rehearsed it." (Click!)


Coming from Phil this is really marvelous, considering the fact that when left to his own devices the first thing he does is embrace the avant-garde theater, a world far removed from the meat-and-potatoes of commercial TV. For years he has been a big gun in Theatre West, a little-theater group made up of some of the best professionals in the business. A few years ago he wrote an episodic play adapted from the poetry of Robert Frost. Produced at UCLA and directed by Abbott (who also appeared in it), the play caused a minor sensation locally. Moreover, it attracted the attention of producer Paul Gregory, who had had such success with the dramatic reading of "Don Juan in Hell" and "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial." Gregory commissioned Abbott to make a play out of Thomas Wolfe's "The Web and the Rock" in what is now known as the Abbott manner.

It took three years to write "The Web." He recalls it now with obvious affection. "I was working under a disadvantage. I had never read Wolfe. When I did, I began to see that there was humor in the man, who is usually thought of only as a brooding genius. I set out to find his humanity."

In this he succeeded admirably, according to the Los Angeles critics. Gregory was eager to take the show

antithesis of what he played for a living. Last summer, for instance, he surprised and delighted Los Angeles audiences with a raffish portrayal of Scottish poet Robert Burns.

Phil Abbott racks up his cue and opens a can of beer in the spacious living room of "The House That J. Edgar Built." Hard by is the new "Residual Bathroom." Through the picture window is the swimming pool, as yet unnamed. This is comfortable living. Around somewhere is wife Jane (he met Jane DuFrayne in summer stock in North Conway, N.H.), and son David, 12 (he's a pool player, too). Daughter Denise, 17, and son Nelson, 7, are not



to Broadway, but its unfamiliar form made name actresses reluctant to take a chance. While Abbott rewrote to beef up the feminine lead, Gregory got off on another tack. He is shooting a pilot for an ambitious new 90-minute anthology show to be taped for syndication and called *The Paul Gregory Theater*. His director: Philip Abbott.

Abbott, meantime, continued his regular avocations with typical Abbott zest. He set about reorganizing Theatre West to put it on a paying basis, arranged with executive producer Quinn Martin to direct at least one FBI when shooting resumes in May, and played an occasional stage part, usually the direct

at home. We talk but not very easily. Phil does not talk easily about himself.

He is a product of the Golden Age of Television. A contractor's son from Lincoln, Neb., he had two older brothers who wanted to be actors. (Neither of them made it.) At 18, he had decided to become an actor, but at 19 he was flying B-24s over Germany (30 missions) and "realizing, in a burst of antiaircraft fire over the Netherlands, that somebody's trying to kill you. I suddenly realized what life was all about."

This developed in him, he says, "the desire to reach out." He started strong on Broadway as the juvenile lead in "Harvest of Years," but the play  $\rightarrow$

closed after two weeks. He tried radio, and, finding that there was another actor named Phil Alexander (his name is Philip Abbott Alexander), he dropped the Alexander. Sometimes he worked. Sometimes he didn't.

"One day in 1953 I decided to give up the theater and go back to flying. It must have relaxed me. The next day I read for Franklin Schaffner for a Stu-

dio One. I got the part."

He caught fire and became a staple of the live shows of the day-Philco, Goodyear, Kraft, Climax!, Playhouse 90. He and Kathleen McGuire became known as "the Eddy-MacDonald of live TV," he as its leading juvenile, she as its leading ingenue. He hit occasional high points, such as "The Legacy," in which he played the son who did not measure up to his father's image (Melvvn Douglas was the father), and "The Rabbit Trap," a withering portrait of the frustrations of a white-collar worker. He was capable of prodigious acting feats. In 1958 he replaced Fonda in "Two for the Seesaw." a complicated play with complicated moves, on eight hours' notice, without a rehearsal or even a runthrough. Those who saw it say that Fonda never topped that performance.

When live TV died, the Abbotts moved to Hollywood, where the action was. He worked regularly because he was money in the bank for any producer. When The FBI came along four years ago, he thought long and hard about taking it.

He took it. That's the game.

But the game right now is eightball. Phil carefully chalks his cue. "The things I do in the theater," he is saying, "I don't say it's an escape. It's just that thing the other side of the hill that draws me. I love to fly. I get a charge out of that other world up there. When I work on Frost or Wolfe, I get that sense of taking off, and everything else drops away. You create an atmosphere, a whole world of your own. Maybe that's what it's all about. . . . Fifteen ball in the side pocket." (Click!)

## **Peabody Awards Snub Networks**

Laugh-In. TV's hit of the year by the Nielsen count, obviously has not amused the Peabody judges. Indeed, the bestowers of TV's most coveted awards, in passing out their 1969 kudos last week, gave network entertainment the total brush-off. In commercial TV the Peabodys were reserved for ABC News for its '68 Olympic Games coverage and its "creative" documentaries ("How Life Begins," the Jacques Cousteau adventures, etc.) and for CBS News for its "Hunger in America" report and Charles Kuralt's "heartwarming" photo essays on Americana. Westinghouse Broadcasting was saluted for its "One Nation Indivisible" special. Otherwise the laurels went to public TV to NET Playhouse as the most notable entertainment. Misterogers' Neighborhood for wholesomely diverting the kiddies, and Chicago's WTTW Book Beat (also seen on NET stations) for filling "a neglected niche" in TV.

Any doubts about this being the Year of the Black TV Star were firmly dispelled by CBS's choice of replacement for the Smothers Brothers show. In picking 21-year-old Leslie Uggams to headline a weekly variety hour in one of TV's hottest time periods (Sundays at 9, ET), the network tacitly acknowledged that sepia is all the rage in entertainers this season. Bill Cosby gets his own NBC series next fall (in which he portrays a schoolteacher) and ABC, not to be outdone, is bringing up Lloyd Haynes as a Negro schoolteacher in a new series titled

Room 222. Ex-grid-star Roosevelt Grier is taking on a Daniel Boone role. And in courtroom dramas in NBC's The Bold Ones, Hari Rhodes will portray an ambitious black district attorney. Diahann Carroll's Julia, of course, triggered the development.

NET president John L. White's hope of tagging the nightly newscasts of Huntley-Brinkley, Walter Cronkite and Frank Reynolds with a half-hour of top-grade analysis via the Nation's public (noncommercial) stations has gone glimmering. For one thing, Jack White is stepping out of his key role in public TV this summer to become head of Cooper Union, a small but prestigious New York college. But it is more than White's intended exit that took the wind out of the newsanalysis project. The cost of five such half-hours weekly was estimated at about \$4 million a year, far more than money-hungry PTV can spare for one series at this point. But a more decisive factor, insiders say, is a feeling that with public-TV forces about to ask Congress for more seed money. this is no time to rock the boat with news commentary.

CBS has lined up a replacement for the summer replacement show the Smothers Brothers would have produced had they not been dropped. The substitute show—He-Haw, a country and Western satire starring singer Buck Owens and comic Roy Clark—will borrow heavily from Laugh-In.

rate lady wrote the other day wondering if anyone shares her feeling that she seems to be seeing about 10 movies on television year in and year out, on local stations and on the networks, over and over and over.

It is, alas, an optical illusion we all get to share at this point of the season—but honest, madam, this week at least neither "Madison Avenue," a 1962 drama about huckstering, nor "Gigot," Jackie Gleason's 1962 attempt at being Charlie Chaplin, has been telecast before on the networks.

This is not to suggest that you haven't seen any number of movies about the over-ambitious advertising man who outsmarts himself, loses his job but manages to flourish, gets a comeuppance but comes up smelling of roses by fade-out time because he's a sadder if not wiser type and his girl is going to give him another chance. In "Madison Avenue" the wise guy is Dana Andrews and the second-chance-giving girl is Jeanne Crain and the drama is blah.

"Gigot" was presumably to be a tour de force with Gleason playing a lovable mute janitor whose only friend is the small daughter of a not very golden-hearted prostitute. Attempting pantomime in the manner of a chubby Chaplin, Gleason emerges as his familiar Poor Soul in Paris, surrounded by pathos and winding up in bathos, badly in need of someone to cut down on the sop and the self-indulgence.

A couple of the season's less sensational (that's a mild term, admittedly) tailored-for-television movies are being rerun. "Shadow on the Land" is a rather sententiously grim and dreary sort of it-could-happenhere on totalitarianism taking over. "Now You See It, Now You Don't," about the only outright (or at least officially designated) comedy in the collection, is strictly for Jonathan Winters fans. It's all Winters despite a real and a fake Rembrandt intruding in the plot.

The theatrical reruns aren't much nearer the barrel top. "The Pad," a vulgarization of Peter Shaffer's delicate play, "The Private Ear," has Brian Bedford as the shy young man trying to make it with a girl who's already fallen for his swinging chum. The fact that thirtyish actors are trying to be teeny-cutes doesn't help the heavy-handed fun. Nor is the fun lighter-handed in "A Man Could Get Killed," one of those spy spoofs that just about killed off spy spoofery two years ago, James Garner's the gay and giddy banker-agent in this one; the few bright seconds are provided by Melina Mercouri who, ordered to strip, sheds her false eyelashes with a super-queen's hauteur. And finally. there's a third go-round for Elvis Presley's "Fun in Acapulco," full of scenery and 11 songs. By now you can brood on the titles. The one I find myself brooding about is "There's No Room to Rumba in a Sports Car." Please don't ask why.

We were straggling along a narrow, winding trail, pushing the lush green jungle foliage out of our way as we walked. "The critics call my films 'home movies," Jack Paar grumbled, "but you have to admit we're a helluva loway from home." That we were. We were in a remote corner of Uganda in Eastern Africa, just a few miles, as the vulture flies, from the Congo.

The purpose of the Paar safari was to film his African TV special, which is scheduled to be shown on NBC this Thursday (May 1). The motley group plodding through the jungle included the Paars-Jack, his attractive wife Miriam and their blonde, Radcliffejunior daughter Randy-our guides, Jock and Betty Leslie-Melville; a beaming black Bwamba tribesman named Dominic, who seemed to be the local chamber of commerce man; me; and a gaggle of about 25 ragged native children trailing along out of curiosity. The purpose of this bedraggled company was to find and film a tribe of Pygmies

reported to be somewhere ahead in the dense banana forest.

The Pygmies are a dying race and can be found in this remote corner of Uganda and in the deep recesses of the Congo rain forests, where it is decidedly not recommended you go looking for them. To reach this remote spot, we had flown by jet from Athens to Entebbe, Uganda, then by small plane over Lake Victoria to a hunting lodge at Semliki, then by Land Rover into the Ruwenzori range, the fabled "Mountains of the Moon." which are higher than the Alps. After a half day's drive over a tortuous road, with a spectacular view of the Congo far below in the hazy distance, we had reached the tiny village of Bubukwanga —a few huts around a general store.

"The Pygmies are about two miles from here," Jock Leslie-Melville, a tall, handsome former member of the Coldstream Guards, had announced. That is how we found ourselves trudging through dense jungle staggering under the modern version of the "white man's burden"—cameras and film equipment—in quest of the Pygmies. Paar, in gray bush jacket, olive-hued safari pants and desert boots, led the way, turning now and then to film our incongruous troupe with his hand-held 16-mm. camera.

The equatorial sun filtered through the foliage, and prickly red dots began to appear on our skin. "We call that Pygmy pox," Betty Leslie-Melville, a blonde former Baltimore model, explained. "No one knows what causes it."

"There are no snakes here, are there?" Miriam Paar asked anxiously,

stepping over a fallen tree.

"Oh, yes," Dominic replied proudly.
"Many snakes."

"But they aren't the poisonous kind," Mrs. Paar said nervously.

"Oh, yes," Dominic said, as if defending the tribal honor. "Very poisonous."

After about an hour's walk, we broke out into a clearing with about a dozen straw huts—the Pygmy village at last. However, there was nary a Pygmy in sight. There were signs of recent habitation. Ashes were still smoking. But no Pygmies. Consternation! Veteran talk-show-host Paar was sidelined speechless as Jock and Dominic wrangled in Swahili. Finally Jock explained that the word was that the Pygmies had gone fishing—en masse.

If we came back the following day, they would be home—for a slight consideration, of course. There was nothing to do but turn around and take the long, bumpy road back to Semliki.

Rather skeptically and grumpily Operation Pygmy was mounted again the following morning. We retraced the same teeth-rattling route in the Land Rover over the twisting mountain road into the Ruwenzoris. Our group was the same as the previous day, with the addition of a grizzled, old African game tracker named Andaria, who had reportedly killed over a thousand elephants in government control programs.

As we neared Bubukwanga, we found the road lined by little tribesmen waving bows and arrows and other objects for us to buy. "These aren't real Pygmies," Jock said. "The real ones have oval eyes and the women have hair on their chests."

We slowed down as some of the little tribesmen crowded around our Land Rover as it moved slowly through them. "Me Pygmy. Me Pygmy," one little tribesman said, thrusting a bow and arrow at Paar. "I'm sure you're a terribly nice chap," Paar said with some hauteur, "but you're no Pygmy. Now

buzz off."

However, he did pay another native two shillings for two little balls, attached by a leather thong, which made a sound like mini-maracas. "How do you play this thing?" he asked the seller, who was running alongside us. The enterprising salesman took back the little instrument to demonstrate, and then melted away in the milling crowd of natives.

By now our Land Rover looked as if it were stranded in a bargain day at a department store. It had come to a complete stop, with the natives chattering noisily and thrusting knives in every window, presumably for sale. Paar bought a knife for five shillings and handed the native a 10-shilling note. "Do you have any change?" he asked in his confusion. It didn't matter, for by then that native had disappeared, too. Finally, Leslie-Melville got our Land Rover moving again. As we pulled away from the crowd, we found one grinning tribesman still clinging to the rear of the Land Rover. "I wonder if I bought him," Paar mused.

This time, somewhat to our surprise we found the Pygmies at home in their village. They welcomed us with hearty "hello's," which seemed to be the only English word they knew. Jack and Randy filmed them smoking marijuana (which they call bhang and which grows in profusion there), shooting arrows, making fire by rubbing two sticks together and other Pygmy pastimes. No less a cultural guru than Marshall McLuhan has called Paar one of the great communicators, but it was obvious with the Pygmies that he loses something in translation.

"You shouldn't be smoking that stuff," Paar said, as they puffed happily on the marijuana. "It's not good for you."

"Hello, hello," the Pygmies said cheerfully.

Paar tried it in halting Swahili, but that also produced only a chorus of "hello's." He finally settled into a  $\rightarrow$ 

kind of "Me Tarzan, you Jane" talk that seemed no more effective, on the danger of smoking marijuana. "I give up," Paar finally conceded. "I can't tell them it will stunt their growth. Anyway, I still can't see why, if you speak slowly and distinctly, anyone can't understand English."

Sitting on the flagstone terrace of the Paraa game lodge, overlooking the Nile meandering lazily below, Paar squints into the setting sun as he sips a martini. The lodge, which is contemporary Howard Johnson in style, seems strangely out of place in this setting on the African plain teeming with game. Waiters in uniform serve drinks while just a few feet away an elephant called Dustbin Nelly and her baby amble up casually to drink at a well. Paar is feeling relaxed after a productive day's filming. "We finally showed them how to make a really dry martini here," he says. "There should be a plaque to mark the event."

By now Paar is an old African hand, this being his sixth trip to the Dark Continent, where he filmed segments of *The Tonight Show* when he was its host, and later the weekly *Jack Paar Show*, before the present trip to film the new special. He has filmed in Africa from A to Z, literally: from the Arab Republic to Zanzibar. He filmed the Holy Land on Good Friday from King Hussein's private helicopter, and Dr. Schweitzer and his jungle hospital from a pirogue (dugout canoe) on the Ogowe River.

Paar is probably television's most traveled and unpredictable personality. He gave up an enormous income in television some years ago to retreat to Maine, where he bought a TV station. He now has sold the station but remains TV's reluctant dragon, making only about one special program a year. (This will be his first program in a year and a half.) Still a recluse, he won't come in to New York from his Westchester home to have lunch with

a network president, yet will take off on a whim to fly a thousand miles up the Amazon on a filming expedition, as he did some years ago.

Paar talks about his approach to TV filming as he sits enjoying his martini, looking down at the Nile in the fading light. He looks much the same as when he first burst upon the TV scene in a big way as NBC's midnight mayerick in 1957, although he is now a trim 25 pounds lighter. "Shooting with a handheld 16 mm. used to seem like a big joke," he says. "Critics called it my 'home movies' when I did it back on The Tonight Show. Now they call it cinéma vérité and it's the big 'in' thing. Well, I think that's one thing we've got in this African show—vérité . . . truth. I'm just trying to find things that are true and amusing," Paar said, as a new martini arrived. "I can't stand those old cliches about my being asked to protect a native village by shooting a roque elephant.

"I've never even seen a gun in six trips to Africa. I guess you've noticed that we haven't filmed any sunsets, or natives dancing around fires. Have you seen any natives dancing around a Coleman lantern. There's so much hokum about filming in Africa. You've seen films about elephants and rhinos charging the cameras. Well, you've seen the animals we've filmed. The elephants and rhinos run away, if they can. If you shoot it the way it is, all you get is film of animals' rumps."

Betty Leslie-Melville tells of a tribe that has a custom that, anyone can address the tribal council for as long as he can stand on one leg. "It would be a good system to use for Hubert Humphrey," Paar remarks. As the sun sets, a band of African musicians materialize from the dusk. They are known locally as the Garbage Can Band because they use a garbage can for a drum. Jack sets his sound recorder and the musicians sit down cross-legged against the railing around

the terrace and begin playing a plaintive African melody. The musicians play for about an hour, while Paar moves his recorder around to get different effects. "I think I can use that background music on the show" Paar says. "It's the real thing."

No doubt about this being real Africa. When we flew into Paraa Lodge, our two small planes circled low over Murchison Falls so Jack and Randy could film the thunderous cataract in the Nile from the air.

"It wasn't far from here that Ernest Hemingway crashed," the pilot said, banking the plane so we were looking straight down at the falls with nothing in between us but the plane's window.

As we came in to land at the tiny airstrip near the falls, the pilot zoomed the length of the strip and then pulled up and circled for another approach. "See all the game," he said, pointing out the window. Sure enough, the little grass airstrip was covered with perhaps a hundred wild animals, mostly impalas and kongoni. As we buzzed the strip twice more, with Paar twisting acrobatically in his seat trying to film through the window, most of the animals scattered rather casually and we came in for a bumpy landing. The air strip at Paraa Lodge is a tiny one, with nothing but a small hut and a crew of natives who come out when a plane approaches to shoo the wild animals off the grassy strip.

When we were leaving. Paar decided to film the unique operation of the natives shooing away the animals. He was loading his camera when a small plane appeared in the sky. As it neared, the natives ran out and began chasing the gazelles and kongoni out of the way. Just as the small, single-engined plane touched down, a big Cape buffalo, one of Africa's fiercest beasts, trotted out in front of the landing plane, Jack still had not finished loading his camera. but Randy rushed to the edge of the airstrip and began filming with hers.

The pilot touched down not far behind the buffalo and then taxied in pursuit of the lumbering animal, zig-zagging playfully for effect, until the buffalo veered off and disappeared in the tall grass.

It's a chilly August day and we are ranch-hopping in the great Rift Valley, which runs like a jagged scar across East Africa. One stop is the 25,000acre (they think big in Kenya) Block family cattle and poultry ranch on the shores of Lake Naivasha. Paar is surprised at the luxury of the Block ranch house and the number of servants. "If I'd known you had this many servants, I'd have brought my laundry," he tells Block. "I hate to come empty-handed." Jack Block, an African-style tycoon, is a native-born white African who looks and sounds remarkably like the late British actor Leslie Howard. He and his brother own such valuable knickknacks as the venerable Norfolk Hotel in Nairobi, famed Treetops Hotel in the Abermountains and game lodges scattered from Kenya to Mozambique.

"This silly business all started when I came back from London wearing a derby," Jack Block said, by way of explanation of the feature that Paar had come to his ranch to film, "One of my Masai herdsmen admired it, so I gave it to him. Then I found out that the other Masai herdsmen were taking turns wearing the derby, so on my next trip to London I brought derbies for all of them. They make quite an amusing sight."

As we bumped along in our Land Rover to find the derby-wearing herdsmen, Paar explained the incongruity of Masai wearing bowlers. "They're perhaps the proudest and most independent tribe in East Africa," he said. "They ordinarily wear only red robes, carry spears and live on cows' blood mixed with milk." Turning off the main road. toward a series of barns and corrals. we came upon a dozen Masai herding perhaps a hundred cattle. The Masai ->

were tall and lean, with proud, aquiline features.

Sure enough, they were wearing the traditional red robes, flapping around their lean shanks their ebony faces topped by the incongruous British bowlers. They carried long poles, rather than the usual spears, and the chief herder toted a shotgun. "To ward off rustlers," Jack Block said. Miriam Paar presented each Masai with a red blanket and then Jack and Randy filmed them herding the cattle over the grassy, rolling country, their derbies tilted at a rakish, Bond Street angle.

"That's the kind of thing I like to get on my shows," Paar explained later over barbecued chicken, salad and wine on the verandah of Block's house overlooking Lake Naivasha. "I look for the amusing, little things, the offbeat minutiae, that often tell more about a country than the speeches of politicians or the newspapers. They always ask me if I want to see the political leaders, but that's not for me. I'm no pundit. I try to find the simple things people can relate to.

"For instance, did you know that Queen Victoria once gave Mt. Kilimanjaro to Kaiser Wilhelm as a birthday present! Well, that tells you something about colonial Africa."

In pursuit of offbeat things that people can relate to. I followed Paar around the streets of Nairobi on one of his last days' shooting. In New York I have seen him bolt like an impala at the sight of an autograph seeker, yet in Nairobi, where he was unrecognized, he was as cheerfully gregarious as a traveling salesman, stopping to chat with shopkeepers, professional hunters, passers-by and even beggars in quest of local color for his special. "It's a relief not being recognized on the street," he said as we made our way along the crowded sidewalks, unnoticed despite the fact that Randy was preceeding us, filming her father as he strode jauntily along. "Of course, I'm not recognized so much in New York any more," Paar observed.

"Maybe I'm Bruce Cabot and just don't know it." It was plain that Paar was enjoying his anonymity. He had his hair cut in an open-air "barber shop" under a tree, had a pair of shoes made from old truck tires, and even took a lesson in Swahili. "Nairobi has changed a lot just since the last time I was here," he says. "Now what used to be Queen Elizabeth Avenue is Kenyatta Avenue, and Delamere Street is Uhuru Highway. You saw the new Hilton hotel going up that looks like a silo. I want to show some of the striking contrasts in the changing city. One of the main streets is named for Kimathi, a leader of the Mau Mau, yet there is also a Cordon Bleu cooking school, taught in Swahili. Last time the servants at the hotel called me bwana. Now you call them bwana. But that's as it should be. Some of them even called me 'boy.' I suppose I could complain to the NAACP about that. But at my age I was flattered."

At the Nairobi airport, catching a plane for home, we were all feeling weary. Both Jack and Miriam Paar had been ill, and we had been in constant motion for nearly a month, covering thousands of miles by plane, Land Rover, boat and on foot, Jack had several hours' worth of film, which he would now spend months editing, and had gleaned enough offbeat facts for his special, with enough left over for conversation stoppers at a half dozen cocktail parties. In fact, he had become a walking encyclopedia of offbeat facts, which he managed to toss off with all the aplomb of un grand seigneur tossing coins to peasants.

"The crocodile is the second biggest killer in Africa," he declared as we waited at the airport. "What do you think is the first?"

"The lion?" I guessed.

"The mosquito," Jack announced, looking pleased.

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## You just can't win...

No matter what a station telecasts, there will always be complaints

If WTIC-TV had paid strict attention to the complaints of some of its viewers during 1968, the Hartford, Conn., station wouldn't have bothered to carry:

- 1. The President's State of the Union Message.
  - 2. The UN hearings on the Pueblo.
- 3. Secretary of State Rusk's testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on the war in Vietnam.
- 4. President Johnson's announcement that he wouldn't run again.
- 5. Coverage of the assassination and funeral of Martin Luther King.
- Coverage of the assassination and funeral of Robert Kennedy.
  - 7 The national conventions.
  - 8. Apollo 8's flight to the moon.

These televised events led all others in the number of telephoned complaints they inspired from the station's viewers. Apollo 8, occurring as it did during the football season, caused many complaints not only in Hartford but all over the Nation. In his column in the Jan. 4 issue of TV GUIDE, Richard Doan took astounded note of the "disinterested viewers" who called television stations to complain when a National Football League game was interrupted for the first transmission of TV pictures from Apollo 8.

The stations weren't astounded. They're accustomed to complaints whenever regular programming is interrupted for anything—anything from a special to extraordinary news.

At WTIC-TV, where they keep a daily record of telephone calls from viewers, 103 people were angry enough to complain about missing a few minutes of football for the Apollo pictures, but nobody called to say that showing the Apollo pictures was a good idea. This is the usual pattern. In the fall of 1963, when Yale professor Frederick Barghoorn returned to the United States after being imprisoned in the Soviet Union, WTIC-TV pre-empted the first 16 minutes of the Sunday night Judy Garland Show to present the professor's homecoming news conference. Seventysix viewers telephoned the station in those 16 minutes and 75 of them complained. This in an area where Walter Cronkite's evening newscast gets higher ratings than a lot of entertainment programs.

The 103 complaints WTIC-TV received about the Apollo pictures were the biggest batch since August, when the Democratic and Republican conventions kept the switchboard humming with calls from people who preferred summertime reruns to living history. The relatively calm Republican convention inspired more complaints than the raucous Democratic convention in Chicago. During the GOP gathering, 159 people called to complain that the sessions were too long and not nearly as entertaining as the programs they usually see. Later in the month, only 74 were similarly unhappy with the Democrats. The network's controversial coverage of the clash between demonstrators and police didn't get much of a rise out of WTIC-TV's audience in southern New England. The station's record of phone calls for Aug. 28, 1968, shows that three people called to protest the "brutality" of the police; three said

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Walter Cronkite wasn't doing a good job; five said he was doing a good job; and two just wanted to say how happy they were to see the hippies getting what they deserved.

WTIC-TV—and a lot of other stations—keep telephone records because calls are one means of determining the interests and desires of the television audience. There are many reasons why a television station should try to determine these interests and desires. To cite only one, the Federal Communications Commission requires it.

But there are also many reasons why a station should consider the interests and desires expressed on the telephone as something less than the voice of all the people. The voice heard on the telephone is often angry, sometimes profane and almost always opposed to the finer things television has to offer.

On April 9 last year, 67 viewers called WTIC-TV to complain about missing the regular daytime programs for the King funeral, and one viewer called to thank the station for carrying the funeral. The score on the Kennedy funeral was 32 to nothing in favor of complaints.

Having discovered the term "bad

taste" somewhere, many callers attack pre-emptions on the grounds that the station is guilty of "bad taste" when it deviates from normal programming and presumably confuses the viewer. On March 16 a caller objected to a Saturday morning news conference, saying "it's in bad taste to have news Saturday mornings when the children are home watching cartoons."

Not all the calls are complaints about regular programming being pre-empted, of course, and many do provide valuable information for WTIC-TV.


"A couple of seasons ago," says Kendall Smith, the station manager, "we concluded that the nighttime version of *Password* had run its course and we dropped it. Hundreds called—and wrote—to protest our decision, and as a result, we put it back on the schedule."

During the furor over violence on television following the assassinations of Dr. King and Senator Kennedy, 71 viewers called to protest violence on television—but one called to say: "I enjoy violence on TV and want to see more, not less. None of this kindergarten stuff."



## 'Angelo's a real ding-dong'

Lucy Hollis, a 34-year-old Negro mother, became a waitress in a Miami restaurant because she could never find a way to get to college and study law. About all she had was the children. And one of those seemed to be getting away from her. Angelo (they always called him Pookie



at home) would go into his room and make his getaway. Lucy could hear him talking when there was nobody there but himself. "To other children, he was like a mystery," she says. "For a while, he was a mystery to me."

Now, three years later, his mother can see

where all this strangeness was leading—to a semiregular position on the Gentle Ben television series. At 14, Angelo Rutherford has caught himself a ride on the network; and there's a whole pack of youngsters, who learned to act right beside him, who cry, "His timing, his timing!" and have deep dark Stanislavski talks with him about "acting secrets." A tiny, appealing boy named Brad Bell says the secret is that "Angelo's a real ding-dong."

Angelo believes-maybe that's what makes him a ding-dong-that if he thinks about something hard enough, he can find a way to do it. Nobody told him he was born to be an actor until he told himself. Unlike the battalions of performing voungsters who pushed forward by aggressive mothers, Angelo became an actor entirely under the power of those dreams he dreamed when they thought he was in a daze. He scouted an acting school on his own, persuaded his mother to finance him there. She squeezed the money out of their meager budget, warning grimly, "Once you start, you go straight on-I got no money for you to start and then stop."

Lucy was afraid he might be "overlooked and snobbed" among the rich white kids from Miami Beach. But calls began to come from the director of the school, who wanted Lucy to witness Angelo the Actor. Lucy wouldn't go because of her job. She told a friend, "Go and represent me." The friend saw Angelo in a playlet, came back and said, "Lucy, you got to go! If you lose your job, you got to go!" Next time, she told the restaurant she was sick. The Gentle Ben staff soon found her son.

Now Lucy has caught Angelo's dream herself, and says he could be "as great as Sidney Poitier—or greater." And Angelo? Angelo doesn't bother himself about Sidney Poitier. He's always thinking in a different direction from the people around him.

"Maybe I shouldn't be an actor," he muses. "I don't like anybody yellin' at me. I'd kinda like to be a psychiatrist." He dances away into another dream and doesn't speak for several minutes.

For those who watched him grow up in Liberty City in Miami, the speed with which a boy called Pookie transformed himself into one of those lucky kids who prance about on TV is almost too amazing to comprehend. His mother had married, divorced, married again, separated. Now she calls Angelo "the head of the family." Head of the family has meant, most of the time, babysitter-in-chief while Lucy worked. "And usually they (his younger brother and sister) ran away on me," he says. Now he makes "four or five hundred dollars" for a couple of days in front of a camera, sitting on a bench with a bear and the bear is easier to handle than his brother and sister. How could all this happen so fast to a boy from Liberty City?

Angelo and his family moved from Liberty City last year, looking for a good school for the younger children. Judging by what happened to Angelo, if you got to the right school, if you learned something, it was a passport to a different life.

And at the exact moment a riot was following its melancholy course in Liberty City last summer, Angelo was the center of a different sort of mob  $\rightarrow$

scene at Ruth Foreman's playhouse in North Miami. He had just been onstage in a tiny revue about a gang called "The Astronuts," and now tiny fans pressed on him to get his autograph, girls from the acting school were kissing him, a white mother was demanding he dine with them—it was Hollywood in miniature.

"We are the young actors and actresses of America," a girl named Ellen Felk told me importantly as the crowd

thinned.

"Not America; Miami," said Angelo, who doesn't like anything inflated.

"Angelo even acts like an actor offstage," said Ellen. She thought it over and added, in her best movie-magazine style, "He's mature and a great personality. And you can put it down that Angelo likes spareribs."

In his office at Ivan Tors studios, producer George Sherman says, "To be perfectly frank, I didn't know what I was looking for. We went on the prowl and came up with Angelo. They idol-

ize him at Ruth's school. In his first couple of shows, he was a little bit on the bashful side. Then all the tension kind of left him. He's called Willie—we haven't given him a last name."

Gentle Ben won't be back on the air next year but this shouldn't upset Angelo's way of living. The truth is that the family lives in a new neighborhood but lives there on what Lucy makes as a waitress. Angelo's money ("I thought I should get half and save half," he says) has been stored away, every cent, under the three-cornered control of his mother, his acting teacher and a bank. He has a career going but it hasn't even brought him bubble-gum money.

Pinching out the money for acting school was hard but Lucy did it because—well, partly because of what her own mother, the sternest of women, had said one day about Angelo. His grandmother looked at Angelo and said, "That boy's gonna be somethin'. Because of the way he carries himself."


