


as we see it

■ Commentators who know what to say are usually competent. Commentators who know when to shut up are always competent.

That seems to be the opinion of readers who tell us they start climbing the walls when, during network coverage of, say, an Apollo mission, the network commentators blithely talk on over the voices of the astronauts and Mission Control officers.

■ "They seem to have reached the conclusion that their asinine comments are more appreciated than the astronauts' conversations," one furious Cape Canaveral, Fla., reader wrote us. "I suggest," he continued rather unkindly, "that these harbingers of doom be locked together in a space capsule and allowed to talk each other to death."

Similar sentiments were voiced by readers during last year's political conventions when the networks decided on and off that general background and behind-the-scenes political activity were more important than what was happening on the convention floor—or that the floor was more interesting than what the speaker on the rostrum was saying.

■ And, of course, there are certain sports commentators, like the baseball lads who give the life history of a player every time he comes to bat, and who feel compelled to gabble on and on describing what the viewer can see for himself. And the football commentators who never let you hear the bands.

Silence is a wonderful thing, especially with a medium that is supposed to be visual. As that noble old Roman Publilius Syrus said: "I have often regretted my speech, never my silence."

Which is good advice for TV commentators—and for all of us, for that matter. There's just too darned much noise in this world.

NEIL HICKEY REPORTS:

A hardy news crew from NBC's <u>First Tuesday</u> leaves on July 15, aboard the S.S. Manhattan, to trace the fabled Northwest Passage. Theirs is the first commercial ship to enter the route, and NBC reports that an open Northwest Passage would mean not merely an oil route, but an international trade route that would have a profound influence on the rate of arctic development and patterns of world-wide trade.

Producer-writer-director MARSHALL FLAUM grapples with the heady question "Can Man Survive?" (that's the American Museum of Natural History's centennial theme) in a Sept. 18 CBS special. It's called "The Natural History of Our World: The Time of Man" and will place in dynamic and historical perspective man's position on earth and examine the significance of his role in nature . . ENGELBERT HUMPERDINK signed up for his first television special—a musical-variety outing on NBC in September . . . The Aug. 7 installment of Summer Focus devotes a major segment to an all-black production of "Fiddler on the Roof," performed by Brooklyn junior high school students.

TIM CONWAY, frequent guest comic, will tape his own CBS special this summer but it won't be telecast until next season . . . ARTUR RUBINSTEIN himself narrates the September NBC special devoted to his life and art; selections include portions of Beethoven's Third Piano Concerto and Brahms' First Piano Concerto, Beethoven's "Emperor" Concerto, and Chopin's Polonaise in A-Flat, Etude in C-Sharp Minor and Nocturne in D-Flat. The Israel Philharmonic and the Orchestre de Paris participate.

TONY CURTIS will play host to a number of world-famous circus acts in September for NBC's "Circus Hall of Fame" . . . Singer-songwriter JONI MITCHELL performs for JOHNNY CASH on July 19. Also on hand: ED AMES, ROY CLARK and the MONKEES . . . Speaking of the MONKEES, their creator DON KIRSHNER is co-producing a new pilot with ERNIE PINTOFF, which will star (natch) a saddled singing group of three boys and a girl called the "Kowboys." The hunt is on for 18-23-year-olds who can sing and ride.

JOAN RIVERS has three ED SULLIVAN dates next season: Oct. 19, Dec. 28 and March 8 . . . JUDI FORD, Miss America 1969, will spend August entertaining American servicemen in Vietnam; she heads a contingent of six state queens . . . DICK CAVETT has STANLEY HOLLOWAY and MILDRED DUNNOCK on July 15, and EDWARD VILLELLA on July 28 . . . BOBBIE GENTRY, whose syndicated special "The Sound and the Scene" has sold in 55 markets so far, is due for an October date with Music Hall and a November visit to The Jim Nabors Hour.



The silent screen

Julian Goodman, president of NBC, believes that television "is now under threat of restriction and control." Frank Stanton, president of CBS, says that "attempts are being made to block us." Elmer Lower, president of ABC News, thinks he may "face the prospect of some form of censorship."

I agree. Censorship is a serious problem in our country. My only dispute with these network officials involves just who is doing the censoring. They apparently believe it's the Government. I disagree.

NBC recently cut Robert Montgomery's statements off the air when, during the Johnny Carson show, he mentioned a CBS station being investigated by the Federal Communications Commission. Folk singer Joan Baez was silenced by CBS when she wished to express her views about the Selective Service System on the Smothers Brothers show. Now, of course, the entire show has been canceled—notwithstanding the high ratings and its writers' recent Emmy. Sure there's censorship. But let's not be fooled into mistaking its source.

For at the same time that network officials are keeping off your television screens anything they find inconsistent with their corporate profits or personal philosophies, the FCC has been repeatedly defending their First Amendment rights against Government censorship. Just recently, for example, the FCC ruled—over strong protests—that the networks' coverage of the Chicago Democratic convention was protected by the Constitution's "freedom of the press" clause. In other decisions, the Commission refused to penalize radio station WBAI in New York for broadcasting an allegedly anti-Semitic poem, or a CBS-owned station for televising a "pot party."

Many broadcasters are fighting, not for free speech, but for profitable speech. In the WBAI case, for example, one of the industry's leading spokes-

men, Broadcasting magazine, actually urged that WBAI be punished by the FCC—and on the same editorial page professed outrage that stations might not have an unlimited right to broadcast profitable commercials for cigarettes which may result in illness or death.

This country is a great experiment. For close to 200 years we have been testing whether it is possible for an educated and informed people to govern themselves. All considered, the experiment has worked pretty well. We've had our frustrations and disappointments as a Nation, but no one has been able to come up with a better system, and most of the newer nations still look to us as a model.

Central to our system, however, is the concept of an educated and an informed people. As Thomas Jefferson said, "The way to prevent error is to give the people full information of their affairs." Our founding fathers were familiar with censorship by the King of England. They were going to replace a king with a representative Congress. But they were concerned lest any American institution become powerful enough to impede the flow of information to the people. So they provided in the First Amendment that "Congress shall make no law . . . abridging the freedom of speech. . . .' Why "Congress"? I believe they assumed Congress would be the only body powerful enough to abridge free speech. They were wrong.

A lot has happened to the creation and control of information in this country since 1789. That was an age of town meetings and handbills. Today most information comes from the three broadcasting networks, ABC, CBS and NBC, and the two wire services, Associated Press and United Press International. As Professor John Kenneth Galbraith has reminded us in "The New Industrial State," 70 years ago the large corporation confined itself to

mass production in heavy industry. "Now," he writes, "it also sells groceries, mills grain, publishes newspapers and provides public entertainment, all activities that were once the province of the individual proprietor or the insignificant firm."

It is easy for us to forget how large, profitable and politically powerful some corporations have become. In 1948 about half of all manufacturing assets in the United States were controlled by 200 corporations; today a mere 100 corporations hold that power. A single corporation such as American Telephone & Telegraph (one of FCC's many regulated companies) controls the wages and working conditions of 870,000 employees, purchases each vear some \$3.5 billion in goods and services, has assets of \$37 billion, and has annual gross revenues in excess of \$14 billion. This gross revenue is several times larger than the combined budgets of all the Federal regulatory commissions, the Federal court system, and the U.S. Congress: larger than the budget of each of the 50 states; a larger operation, indeed, than all but very few foreign governments.

I am not suggesting that large corporations are inherently evil. Not at all. They have created much of our wealth. I am merely urging that we be aware of the fact that large corporations have both the incentive and the power to control the information reaching the citizenry of our free society.

Sometimes corporate pressures to control what you see on television are just plain silly. For example, in his book "TV—The Big Picture," Stan Opotowsky reports that "Ford deleted a shot of the New York skyline because it showed the Chrysler building. . . . A breakfast-food sponsor deleted the line 'She eats too much' from a play because, as far as the breakfast-food company was concerned, nobody could ever eat too much." Often, however, corporate tampering with the prod-

uct of honest and capable journalists and creative writers and performers can be quite serious. Sometimes there is a deliberate alteration of content; sometimes needed information is squeezed out by more profitable "entertainment" programming.

On Feb. 10, 1966, the Senate was conducting hearings on the Vietnam war. Fred Friendly, who was president of CBS News at the time, wanted you to be able to watch those hearings. His network management did not permit you to watch. If you were watching CBS that day you saw, instead of George Kennan's views opposing the Vietnam war, the fifth CBS rerun of I Love Lucy. Fred Friendly guit CBS because of this decision, and subsequently wrote "Due to Circumstances Beyond Our Control" to tell the story. He began his book with the quotation, "What the American people don't know can kill them." Indeed it can. In Vietnam, about 35,000 so far. We have been shown miles of film from Vietnam, it's true. But how much has television told you about the multibilliondollar corporate profits from that war?

There are many other situations in which censorship exists side-by-side with large profits-and disease or death. The tobacco industry spends about \$250 million a year on radio and television commercials designed to associate cigarette smoking, especially by the young, with fishing, football, the fresh air of the great outdoors, sexual prowess, and all other desirable attributes of a fun-packed adult world. In exchange for this investment, the industry sells on the order of \$9 billion worth of cigarettes a year. Would it really surprise you to learn that the broadcasting industry has been less than eager to tell you about the health hazards of cigarette smoking? shouldn't. Just recently, for example, a United States congressman alleged that the president of the National Association of Broadcasters had suppressed from Congress and the American public revealing information about the "substantial appeal to youth" of radio and television cigarette commercials. The relation of this forgetfulness to profits is clear: cigarette advertising provides the largest single source of television's revenue, about 8 percent.

The FCC has ruled that broadcasters can't present one point of view on a controversial issue and censor others just to serve their own beliefs and profits. The "Fairness Doctrine" requires that all viewpoints be presented. The FCC applied this doctrine to cigarette commercials. And what was the response of the broadcasting industry? It fought the decision with all the economic and political strength at its command. It has finally gone all the way to the Supreme Court to argue that a doctrine which limits its power to keep all information about the health hazards of cigarette smoking from the American people is a violation of broadcasters' First Amendment rights!

Or how about the 50,000 people who die each vear on our highways? Their deaths are due to many causes, of course, including their own intoxication and carelessness. But how many television stations told you-either before or after Ralph Nader came along-that most auto-safety engineers agree virtually all those lives could be saved if our cars were designed properly? Nader, in "Unsafe at Any Speed," speculates about "the impact which the massive sums spent (\$361,006,000 in 1964 on auto advertising alone) have on the communication media's attention to vehicle safety design."

Television certainly didn't take the lead in telling us about unfit meat, fish and poultry. (Chet Huntley was found to have been editorializing against the Wholesome Meat Act at a time when he and his business partners were heavy investors in the cattle and meat business!) Bryce Rucker, in "The First Freedom," notes that:

Networks generally have underplayed or ignored events and statements unfavorable to food processors and soap manufacturers. Recent examples are the short shrift given Senate subcommittee hearings on, and comments favorable to, the 1966 "truth in packaging" bill and the high cost of food processing. Could it be that such behavior reflects concern for the best interests of, say, the top-50 grocery-products advertisers, who spent \$1.314.893,000 in TV in 1965, 52.3 percent of TV's total advertising income?


What could be more essential than information about potentially harmful food and drugs?

All Americans are concerned about "the crime problem." Have you ever stopped to wonder why the only crimes most of us hear about are, in the words of the Presidential Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Jus-

tice, "the crimes that are the easiest for the poor and the disadvantaged to commit . . "? What we haven't been told is that much of the crime in the United States is "white-collar" crime; that the rich steal as much or more than the poor. As the Crime Commission report defined it:

The "white-collar" criminal is the broker who distributes fraudulent securities, the builder who deliberately uses defective material, the corporation executive who conspires to fix prices, the legislator who peddles his influence and vote for private gain, or the banker who misappropriates funds. . . .

Did you ever find out from television, for example, that a *single* recent price-fixing case involved a "robbery" from the American people of more money than was taken in *all* the country's robberies, burglaries and larcenies during the years of that criminal price fixing? The crime commission declared



that "it is essential that the public becomes aware of the seriousness of business crime." Why is it the news media do not tell you about these threats to "law and order"?

One could go on and on. The inherent dangers in cyclamates (the artificial sweeteners in soft drinks) have been so widely discussed in Sweden that the government is considering prohibiting their use. The danger is scarcely known to the average American. Most of the Nation's 160,000 coal miners have "black lung" disease (the disintegration of the lung from coal dust) in one form or another. Mine operators may refuse to pay for fresh-air masks-or support workmen's compensation legislation. Some television stations in coal-mining areas have, until recently, refused to televise programs offered them by doctors about this serious health hazard. Reports differ, and no one knows for sure, but one current sampling showed that 20 percent of the color-TV sets studied were emitting excess X-ray radiation. Naturalgas pipelines are exploding as predicted. And did you know that the life expectancy of the average American adult male has been *declining* in recent years? The list goes on almost without end.

Note what each of these items has in common: (1) human death, disease, dismemberment or degradation, (2) great profit for manufacturers, advertisers and broadcasters, and (3) the deliberate withholding of needed information from the public.

Many pressures produce such censorship. Some are deliberate, some come about through default. But all have come, not from Government, but from private corporations with something to sell. Charles Tower, chairman of the National Association of Broadcasters Television Board, recently wrote a letter to The New York Times, criticizing its attack on CBS for "censoring" the social commentary on the Smothers Brothers show. He said, →



There is a world of difference between the deletion of program material by Government command and the deletion by a private party [such as a broadcaster]. . . Deletion by Government command is censorship. . . Deletion of material by private parties . . is not censorship.

Another Times reader wrote in answer to Mr. Tower:

Mr. Tower's distinction . . . is spurious. The essence of censorship is the suppression of a particular point of view . . . over the channels of the mass media, and the question of who does the censoring is one of form only. . . .

He's right. The results are the same. You and I are equally kept in ignorance, ill-prepared to "prevent error," and to engage in the process of self-governing which Thomas Jefferson envisioned—regardless of who does the censoring.

A number of talented people within the broadcasting industry recognize its failings. One of the Nation's leading black announcers told me of his first job as a disc jockey. He was handed a stack of records, but forbidden to read any news over the air. Said his boss: "You're not going to educate the Negroes of this community at my expense." A high ABC network executive was recently quoted in the pages of TV GUIDE as saying, "There are many vital issues that we won't go near. We censor ourselves." Eric Sevareid has said of the pressures involved in putting together a network news show: "The ultimate sensation is that of being bitten to death by ducks." And the executive editor of the San Francisco Chronicle has warned: "The press is in danger. Not the exciting kind of Hollywood danger, but of dissolving into a gray mass of nonideas." For it is also a form of censorship to so completely clog the public's airwaves with tasteless gruel that there is no time left for quality entertainment and social commentary, no time "to give the people full information of their affairs." Mason Williams, the multitalented one-time writer for the Smothers Brothers, has left television in disgust and written a poem about his experiences with "The Censor," who, he says in conclusion,

Snips out
The rough talk
The unpopular opinion
Or anything with teeth
And renders
A pattern of ideas
Full of holes
A doily
For your mind

Your mind. My mind. The mind of America.

The Rolling Stones said it long ago:
When I'm drivin' in my car,
When the man comes on the radio,
He's tellin' me more and more
About some useless information...
Supposed to fire my imagination?...
I can't get no satisfaction!*

Many Americans are trying to say something to each other. But the media haven't been listening. And you haven't been told. So some have turned to violence as a means of being heard. All you've been shown are the dramatic pictures; you know there's "something happening." But, like the Everyman of Bob Dylan's song, "You don't know what it is, do you, Mr. Jones?" The "Silent Screen" of television has left you in ignorance as to what it's all about.

The time may soon come when the media will have to listen. From many directions come suggestions for change. Law professor Jerome Barron says the courts should recognize a "public right of access to the mass media."

Free speech in this age of television, he believes, requires that citizens with something to say be permitted to say it over radio and television, Suppose you approach a television station with a "commercial" you have prepared either supporting or protesting the President's conduct of the Vietnamese war. It may no longer be sufficient for the station to say to you, "Sorry, we don't like your views, so we won't broadcast your announcement"-as a San Francisco station did last year to those trying to express their point of view regarding a ballot proposition! As the U.S. Supreme Court said a few days ago in the Red Lion case, upholding the constitutionality of the FCC's Fairness Doctrine:

There is no sanctuary in the First Amendment for unlimited private censorship operating in a medium not open to all. Freedom of the press from governmental interference under the First Amendment does not sanction repression of that freedom by private interests.

It is too early to know the full, ultimate impact of this decision.

In Holland, any group that can get 15,000 persons to support its list of proposed programs is awarded free time on the Dutch Television Network for a monthly program. There is even an organization for tiny and often eccentric splinter groups without 15,000 supporters. If a similar experiment were conducted in this country, groups interested in electronic music, drag racing, handicrafts, camping, as well as the League of Women Voters, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, local school boards, theater and drama associations, the Young Republicans (and, who knows, even the Smothers Brothers), could obtain television time to broadcast programs prepared under their supervision.

Or each network might devote a full one-third of its prime time (6 P.M.

to 11 P.M.) programming to something other than entertainment or sports. It could be nonsponsored cultural, educational and public-affairs programming. If the networks were required to stagger such fare, then at any given time during the 6 P.M. to 11 P.M. period of greatest audiences the American viewer would have an alternative, a choice. There would still be at all times two networks with the commercial-laden. lowest-common-denominator mass entertainment of situation comedies. Westerns, quiz shows and old movies. The third, however, would have something else.

It would be wholly inappropriate for me as an FCC Commissioner to insist that broadcasters present only the information, ideas and entertainment that I personally find compatible. The FCC does not have, and would not want, the responsibility for selecting your television programs. But it would be equally irresponsible for me to sit idly by and watch the corporate censors keep from your TV screen the full range of needs, tastes and interests of the American people.

The television-station owner, not the network, has ultimate responsibility for his programming. But somebody has to select his programs, you say; nobody's perfect. You're right. And all I'm urging is that, when in doubt, all of us -audience, networks and Government -ought to listen a little more carefully to the talented voices of those who are crying out to be heard. In short, I would far rather leave the heady responsibility for the inventory in America's "marketplace of ideas" to talented and uncensored individuals-creative writers, performers and journalists from all sections of this great country-than to the committees of frightened financiers in New York City. Wouldn't you? I think so.


I am delighted the networks have raised the issue of censorship in America. I hope they will permit us to discuss it fully.



Jerry Andrea of ABC caught the atmosphere of tension in this stark drawing, made during New York's luridly sensational Alice Crimmins homicide trial.






TV cameras are sometimes permitted at a hearing or inquiry, but the trial proper is still inviolable. Thus the courtroom artist's work is seen by an audience of millions—while he himself remains for the most part unknown.

of the time they work on maps, diagrams, charts and other art work (even program credit crawls) used by the news departments. When a trial comes up, covering it becomes a part of the artists' regular duties. (There is no extra pay for trial work; just whatever overtime may be forthcoming, plus the welcome opportunity to be in the thick of the action.) Each of the networks also has its own stand-by list of available free-lance artists, and, says Ben Blank, ABC's director of graphic arts for news and public affairs, "If the situation were really desperate, we'd call the local art school for an artist."

Above all, courtroom artists must be accurate and fast, but Blank lists other requirements: "They must be able to work in different styles, appropriate to the trials they're covering. We don't want anything too arty, because this is a reporting job—the artist is really just a stand-in for the TV camera. A good memory -is also important, because some judges will allow artists in court to observe only, and will insist that the drawings be made outside the court-room."

Blank's experiences with courtroom artists include a memorable encounter with a rare malady he calls Trial Fright: "During one trial, my artist—a new man—came wandering back to the studio in something like a state of shock. And he had absolutely nothing on his sketch pad except for a few meaningless squiggles!" What did Blank do? "First, I yelled. Then I got another artist—fast!"

Recently, in San Diego, there was a display of drawings made during the Navy's court of inquiry on North Korea's seizure of the intelligence ship Pueblo, and an exhibition of sketches from the Sirhan Sirhan trial is currently running in Los Angeles. It appears that the courtroom artist, like many another specialist in the labyrinthine world of television news, is finally winning his own share of fame.

CATV Projects A Rosy Future For Viewers

A lot of new pie is floating around the TV sky. Some of it is wondrous to behold, like the airy stuff dreamed up 20 years ago when old-fashioned overthe-air TV was a-borning. The magic box, they said then, was going to dazzle, uplift, cultivate and save the world. Mostly, as it turned out, it just dazzled.

But now there's glittering new promise in an embryonic system of cable (or community antenna) TV which, unlike its spectrum-bound forebear, virtually knows no channel bounds. As a delegate to the National Cable Television Association convention in San Francisco last week aptly put it, "has channels to burn." And the proprietors of some 2200 CATV grids around the U.S., serving about 3.6 million hearthsides at this point, are chafing to light up more of their spare channels. People are more apt to shell out \$5 or so monthly for cable-fed TV if they get something besides their regular overthe-air TV shows.

Up to now the cablecasters have had little to pick from but old-old movies and ancient cartoons, but fresher, more exciting fare is on the way.

Item: TeleVision Communications Corp., an outfit with cable systems in 10 states, is readying a four-channel service offering first-run movies (for a \$5 monthly tab from CATV subscribers), information and education programs and a counseling service for physicians (each for \$2.50 monthly).

Item: Television Presentations Inc., partly owned by Time-Life, and CBS are offering CATV systems a program service (initially Madison Square Garden events, kiddie shows, movies, etc.) taped on CBS's new EVR cartridges.

Item: Teleprompter, operator of over two dozen cable hookups from New York City to Hawaii, has bought the cartooning studio that has turned out such series as The Archie Show and Aguaman, and put it to work cranking out CATV shows. By far the biggest CATV pie, however, has been cooked up by the industry's own trade group in league with Comstat. NCTV president Frederick Ford has bedazzled his constitutents with a scheme to supply wired-TV homes by 1975 with a sixchannel feed via satellite for up to 24 hours daily. Two of the channels would be programmed by the Public Broadcasting System with academic and cultural fare, and one each would be allotted to weather reports, health and medical programs, Congressional hearings, and "selected" reruns of commercial TV's finest nonfiction. The cost of all this, NCTA and Comsat estimated-assuming about 39 million homes linked to cable by that timecould be as little as 90¢ a year per home.

Everybody in CATV knows, though, that these "packages" and ploys are just for openers. Cable won't really compete with broadcast TV's big time—if ever—until it is big enough itself to steal some of broadcast TV's thunder. And that moment—without a doubt—is some years away.

Sorry, Wrong Number Take Her, She's Mine Trial Run The Vikings Bikini Beach Dead Ringer Youngblood Hawke

A quartet of Hollywood pros walks off with the honors in a network-movie week of reruns otherwise distinguished by costumed cavortings, soap opera and some of that beach-party stuff that suddenly has a nostalgic tinge to its suff-and-silliness.

Barbara Stanwyck and Burt Lancaster take first honors in "Sorry, Wrong Number," a 1948 suspense classic in which Miss Stanwyck is the wealthy ailing wife who learns she's to be murdered and Lancaster is the homicidal husband involved with the telephone. Beyond the plot structure, the classicism stems from the cool bloodlessness and lack of gore in the creation and depiction of savage and unrelieved terror. And Bette Davis does her bit for the chill-and-thrill genre in "Dead Ringer," playing a dual role no less. In this one she kills her twin sister and assumes her identity and, hopefully, her lush life, only to find herself in the hands of a blackmailing lover. The plot mechanics get a bit creaky but Miss Davis gives her all, in doubles yet.

And the fourth old pro is James Stewart, who saves "Take Her, She's Mine" from being just another placid dumb-daddy, smart-mommy, wow-teenagers bit of suds. The 1963 goingson of the young may seem slightly dated during these youth-in-turmoil days, but Stewart provides a kind of enduring bulwark for daddies to take comfort in.

Was it five years or five centuries ago? And who cares?

On May 19, "the Hawk" died of bronchial pneumonia at age 64. This memorial tribute includes a jazz session taped at Chicago station WTTW-TV shortly before Hawkins died. 



The making of a cop

Kent McCord's year with 'Adam-12' has changed his attitudes about policemen



For a kid just 26 years old, the chance to co-star in a TV series should have been a dream come true. Aside from the money and the opportunity to learn his craft, there's the fame to consider. Kent McCord considered all these things, but he still wasn't happy.

The trouble was the role. He was going to have to play a cop.

"I just don't like cops. I never had much trouble with them—just the usual kid-cop experiences, like being stopped and being asked where I was going—but they always seemed to be rousting people for no good reason. They never seemed to be there when you wanted them, and always around when you didn't want 'em."

McCord sits puffing on a cigarette, looking even younger than his years. With his hair cut short for his role as rookie policeman Jim Reed on Adam-12, he looks like an escapee from a 4-H Club. →



When I ask about the faint remnants of a small tattoo on his hand, he grins sheepishly. "I grew up in a tough, predominately Mexican-American neighborhood," he says by way of explanation. "You do it yourself with a needle and a thread dipped in ink. I burned out one of the tattoos on my hand, but I've still got a 'K' on my left arm."

Tattoos and teen-age gangs don't jibe with his boyish good looks. And, according to his Baldwin Park High School counselor, Sam Kerman, "Kent was a pretty good kid. Never any real problem. His only trouble was that he was a little lazy—in class and on the football field."

He wasn't too lazy, though—at least on the gridiron—to win a scholarship to the University of Utah. At the time he carried 235 pounds on his 6-foot-2 frame. He subsequently dropped 50 pounds: "I decided not to play football when I transferred to USC, so who needed all that weight?"

At the University of Southern California, he became friends with Rick Nelson. That led to bits on Ozzie and Harriet. Which, in turn, led to Kent's decision to forsake his plans to become a phys-ed instructor and to devote himself to acting on a full-time basis. In 1965 he got a contract at Universal. The most important thing he did in the first couple of years was a Dragnet called "The Big Interrogation," which employed, in addition to regulars Jack Webb and Harry Morgan, only Kent. According to producer Bob Cinader, "When it came to casting Adam-12, it took us 10 seconds to make our decision. Jack [Webb] had a real thing about Kent."

Says Adam-12's executive-producer Webb, "He's perfect. He's the right age, the right physical type—he's a composite of the younger police officer. Kent, I think, has all the attributes of a big star; he's all man, but he's got a boyish charm, and he's good-looking

without being pretty. And, like Marty Milner, he's a professional. They're totally devoid of any prima-donna tendencies."

Or, as Kent's co-star, Milner, sums it up: "He's a pussy cat."

Back on the set, I asked the pussy cat at what point he had begun to modify his antipolice feelings. "It was Cinader's idea that Marty and I ride in patrol cars for a while. I spent 14 nights riding around in a prowl car with a young officer named Mike Watters. It changed my attitude. I got to see the other side of the picture. You see, I had real qualms about glamorizing cops on the show, but riding around on patrol that way helped me get over that. A policeman, you discover, has to put up with a hell of a lot of abuse. A man in any other line of work would nail a guy who laid that kind of abuse on him. I know / would."

I met Officer Watters at the Hollywood division. He's 25, has four years on the force and could double for Milner. He had noticed McCord's initial antipathy to police: "Well, the first time we met we struck it off pretty good, but I did feel he was a little antipolice. But on the second night we went out on a drunk call, and the drunk tried to kick Kent in the face. I think that's when his attitude started to change-when he began to really see what we're up against. The first night I was apprehensive about what would happen if we got into a situation where I had to protect myself and him. But after the first night I got over it because he did everything right. I started to think of him as a partner, who'd do what he could to protect me-even though he didn't carry a firearm. The funny thing was that most people just accepted him; in fact, when we'd stop for coffee, people would see us-me in uniform, Kent in civvies-and ask him questions."

Apparently the experience went to Kent's head. When his home was

burgled, he started to stake out his own neighborhood. "Since they left suits but took the stereo, my guitar, my bow and arrows, some Levi's and all my velour shirts, I figured they were young guys. One day I saw a guy walking down the street, and he was wearing a pair of my Levi's, which I recognized because of a torn back pocket, and one of my velours. I followed him home. He had most of my stuff in his closet, but it turned out he was only keeping it for a friend of his, who by that time had already been thrown in jail for something else."

McCord recovered his goods but had to take precious time off from Adam-12 to testify in court. Groans Cinader, "I wouldn't mind if he got shot—that would be good publicity, at least. But cracking his own cases just wastes our time. I won't even let Kent or Marty ride around in prowl cars any more; with my luck, they'd wind up as witnesses in a case and I'd have to close

down the set for a week."

About the show, McCord admits, "I get impatient to see a development in the character of Reed. I want him to have more self-assurance in police matters. On the other hand, I talk to officers and they say it's just right, and that they were just like Reed when they were rookies."

But then they can't entirely appreciate the scope of his predicament. Mc-Cord not only has to portray a rookie, he is a rookie. As Milner points out, "Kent's come a long way this season. He's much looser now than he was in the beginning. You have to realize that he's probably done more acting this year than he did in his entire career up to this show."

McCord lives in a modest frame house off Hollywood Boulevard, with his wife of six years, Cynthia, and his 5-year-old daughter, Kristin. The morning I paid a visit, his wife, $a \rightarrow$

Happy Days® Raspberry Tobacco model, had already gone downtown to work. Kent, with an afternoon call, was lounging in a sweater, Levi's and moccasins. A Donovan record was spinning on his recovered stereo.

Away from the set he seemed more relaxed, and more eager to air a few grievances. "Universal is getting to be a drag. There should be some desire to take creative chances, but there's none at the studio. I expect Universal to build a bridge to the L.A. Zoo any day now, so people could tour both at the same time. I wouldn't be surprised if they got out of film making altogether, and just kept the actors around for the tourists to gawk at."

When I wondered if that meant he regretted being tied down to a seven-year studio contract, he replied, "I've been lucky. I've been an actor for eight years and I've never been out of work. But seven-year contracts are ridiculous; they're not worth the paper they're written on. Contract or no contract, if you're not producing, they'll drop you flat."

There's no bitterness in his voice. He's just a young man noting the facts of TV life.

"The show's been fun. We get out on the streets a lot, and I enjoy working on location. But I get terribly frustrated with the police restrictions—like, for instance, you can't put your hands in your pockets, so you wind up looking like a totem pole. But things have loosened up a little, and now we're getting to do it more like it really happens—rather than by the book. I think it's a mistake that we don't have more violence in the show. In the 15th episode I finally get to fire my gun. And, oh yes," he adds sarcastically, "I did get to shout at a lady once."

While he feels that he's brighter, more mature and quicker to learn than rookie Reed, rookie McCord admits, "We're really very much alike. I was married at 19, he was married at 20. I haven't been in the Army and Reed


has, and that's probably the only real difference between us." It's a big difference, though, for although McCord was never drafted, he lays it on the line in these terms: "I wouldn't have gone to Vietham. I discussed it with my wife and I told her I'd go to prison if that were the only alternative. She agreed with my decision."

He's high on Milner and Cinader but confesses that he gets nervous around Webb. "I don't believe there's a situation now that can be thrown at me that I can't handle—especially after working with Jack. He's a hard man to work for because he has such definite ideas and he makes such large demands of a performer. You've got to stand open and vulnerable as an actor, and if you're shot down, you stop standing open, you turn into a mechanic."

I told him what Mike Watters had said of Adam-12: "I think the show definitely helps police recruitment. It shows that cops are people. I think if it runs a long time it will make a lot of younger people, who might not otherwise have thought of it, consider law enforcement as a career."

McCord nodded. "I know. Judging by the fan letters, our largest audience seems to be among 10-to-15-year-olds. I don't want to be a propagandist for anything but my own feelings, and, hell, I don't want to be a cop. But I'm an actor and it's just a job. As Bob Cinader said when he hired me, 'We don't buy your mind; your thoughts are your own.'"

McCord may not be overjoyed at the prospect of being typecast as a clean-cut young police officer or having to keep his peace medallion tucked inside his police shirt or having to wear his hair cut short, but there's at least one consolation. Every night, Mike Watters drives by and shines his light on McCord's house—just to make certain the bad guys aren't after his velours again.

Fresh pineapple spear

Dissolve gelatine in boiling water. Cool to room temperature. Divide between 2 tall glasses. Fill 3/4 full with lemon soda. Add ice cubes and fresh pineapple spear.

ROSY THICK SHAKE

Makes one 2-cup serving, 80 calories per serving

1/2 cup noncaloric raspberry or

11/4 cup crushed ice

strawberry syrup 1 egg white

1 tbsp. nonfat dry-milk crystals 1 tsp. unflavored gelatine

1 tbsp, evaporated skimmed milk

1/4 cup boiling water

In a blender combine syrup, egg white and milk. Whirl at high speed 5 seconds. Add crushed ice and whirl another 10 seconds. Mix dry milk and gelatine, Gradually stir in boiling water. Stir until gelatine is dissolved. Add to blender and whirl another 15 seconds. Pour into a glass and serve immediately. Should be prepared just before serving or it will separate. Garnish with a fresh strawberry.

ORANGE SHERBET FIZZ

Makes 1 serving, 72 calories, plus 20 for maraschino cherry

In a tall glass combine 1 tablespoon thawed, undiluted frozen concentrated orange juice, 4 ice cubes, and enough noncaloric orange soda or ginger ale to fill glass 1 inch from top. Top with Orange Sherbet, To prepare 5 cups sherbet (1/2 cup, 44 calories) combine 1 envelope unflavored gelatine and 1/2 cup water. Place over low heat and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Combine 31/2 cups water, 1 cup nonfat dry milk crystals, 2 tablespoons liquid sweetener and 1 can (6 ounces) thawed, undiluted frozen concentrated orange juice. Stir in gelatine and pour into 2 ice-cube trays. Freeze until mushy; then beat until fluffy. Cover closely and return to freezer. Freeze until firm (about 4 hours).

CHOCOLATE FRAPPE

Makes 8 servings, 87 calories per serving

1 can (101/2 ounces) low-calorie chocolate topping

1 quart club soda, chilled

1 can (6 ounces) frozen concentrated orange juice, thawed and undiluted 1 envelope (1/2 a 21/2-ounce package) low-calorie whipped topping

Combine chocolate topping and orange juice. Divide among 8 glasses. Add club soda. Stir. Prepare whipped topping according to package directions. Spoon topping on drinks. Serve with a spoon.

TV turns to the boys in the underwear

A network hopes track-and-field stars will take up the sports slack

A four-time Olympic champion in the discus throw, Al Oerter of New York, was asked not long ago how public interest could be stimulated in his event. "The way things now stand," responded Al, "the discus attracts hardly anyone. I don't think it will draw until they let us start throwing at people."

Nevertheless, CBS began a new venture May 18: an 18-week series of track-and-field meets being shown live and on tape from various corners of the planet.

Track is not new to television. It has been done on the air for years, but only sporadically. Never before has anyone tried to offer it in concentrated dosages, for a reason easily understandable. As a spectator sport, it sells unlike the well-known breakfast food.

Like most amateur sports in America today, track is slowly being suffocated by professional competition, watched in the flesh and on TV. Sit down a moment and examine the picture of sports in this country. Pro football now begins in early August and carries all the way into late January. Basketball and hockey open in September and extend to late April or early May, by which time baseball is well under way with a schedule of 162 games, plus

play-offs, plus the World Series. Horse racing runs pretty much around the clock, and the golf tour never seems to stop, except maybe for Christmas. This overlap is growing, and the problem of drawing fans to the lesser events is further complicated by increased leisure time of the citizenry, which has money in its trousers and is indulging in such whims as boating, camping, fishing and golf.

Track is numbered among the marginal sports—those having no compelling interest among the masses. Bucking the competition that it does, it fails to capture the fancy of people in this country as it does, say, in Scandinavia, Germany, Australia and New Zealand. In the Soviet Union, a champion in the high jump excites the populace in the

way Joe Namath does here.

In undertaking its new track-and-field series, CBS is simply solving a problem. From May until the start of pro football, CBS is desperate for sports programming. NBC has baseball during that period and ABC is busy with Wide World of Sports and an extensive golf schedule. CBS has only the Triple Crown of racing and an occasional golf tournament—hardly enough for a four-month stretch.

Groping to fill this time, CBS the last two years got involved in a smashing game called soccer, the national sport of more than 200 countries. The feeling was that so many nations couldn't be wrong.

Concurring with the network was a string of promoters who envisioned football-style riches from the operation of a soccer league in North America. Franchises went for roughly \$25,000 each. Figuring to take mild operational losses for a few weeks, the promoters looked for a major appreciation in the value of the teams. After all, franchises in the American Football League cost \$25,000 in 1960, and, eight years later, were selling for \$10,000,000.

Why soccer, the world's most estab-

lished game, fell on its bladder here isn't known for sure, but the losses weren't light. In two years the owners dropped about \$20,000,000. In television losses, CBS bade farewell to roughly one million.

Undaunted by its setback in one offtrail sport, the network comes back gamely with another, arranging a worldwide schedule of track meets telecast from such places as Malmö, Sweden; Stuttgart and Augsburg, West Germany; London, Warsaw, Oslo and Toronto. Prime events in this country are also being carried. Foremost among them is the triangular meet in Los Angeles featuring the U.S., Russia and the British Commonwealth.

Since track is not the last word in viewer appeal, why is it running 18 weeks? "Mainly for three reasons," says Jack Dolph, director of sports for CBS. "First, we have that problem period from May 1 to Sept. 1. Second, track happens to be well-suited to television. There is very little dead time during a track meet. While a 10,000meter run is on, we can cut to the pole vault, or the high jump, or to other field events. Finally, we are counting on the residue of interest created by last year's Olympic Games. Many of the athletes competing in our meets will be familiar."


One factor in CBS's favor—the cost of commercial minutes during the summer is less than during the rest of the year because the audiences are generally smaller. Whereas hockey costs \$18,000 a minute during winter, rack sells for roughly \$12,000 a minute. If the series goes into 3,500,000 homes the first season, CBS will consider it a good start.

For the past few months, several groups have been discussing a protessional track circuit—with the idea of selling it to television. When promoters take note of what some sports are hauling in from TV, they begin to look for other sports on which to get fat. But

it was the dream of television gold that helped lead the soccer promoters to their doom.

Asked by track people if he would be interested in a pro circuit, Australia's Ron Clarke, holder of six world records in distance races and a major attraction, said his spectacular lack of interest would be surpassed only by that of the viewers. "Pro track week after week would make a bad show," he said, "because of the lack of variation. Track runs pretty much to form. TV fans wouldn't get very excited watching the same blokes winning several weeks in a row."

Of course, if the javelin guys start throwing at the distance runners, you've got a whole new ball game.



Rosemary De Camp

What ever happened to Judy, the good doctor's nurse, on "Dr. Christian"—the old radio serial that went on the air in 1937 and lasted 17 years? What ever happened to Peg, Jackie Gleason's wife on the pre-William Bendix *Life of Riley* TV series, circa 1949? What ever became of Margaret, the sister on *The Bob Cummings Show* for five and a half years?

Nurse, wife and sister are alive and well and living in a bougainvillaeabowered Spanish hacienda in Redondo Beach, Cal. They are Rosemary De Camp, who is also wife of Los Angeles County Superior Court judge John Shidler, mother of four girls in high school and college, and the TV mother of Marlo Thomas in *That Girl*, about whom "mother" says: "I think Marlo is just simply amazing to be in every shot and look good and to hire the people, see all the rushes, and sign

She worked with Orson Welles when he was thin

the checks! As for me, I must just be pleasant and be there."

Any character actress who has been around so long has to be older than Mae West, Lillian Gish and Gladys Cooper. "I'm so old," she says, "I worked with Orson Welles when he was thin!" That was on the old radio show "The Shadow." Even Gleason looked youthful 20 years ago. "Jackie was thin and good-looking and on the wagon."

Despite her 32 years in show business ("and never out of work, knock wood"), petite Miss De Camp is not so ancient and decrepit as she playfully suggests. True, she played Mrs. Cohan, mother of Jimmy Cagney's George M., in the 1942 flick "Yankee Doodle Dandy." And true, she played wife to George Murphy and mother of Ronald Reagan in the 1944 movie "This Is the Army." But Miss De Camp and

California's governor are actually contemporaries. "I think Ronnie's got a few months on me." ("Who's Who" gives Reagan's birthdate as 1911. Mature, maybe, but not really old.)

This "old" routine got started when Rosemary was quite young, and everybody knows what a little typecasting will do to a career in show business. It all began in 1941 with "Cheers for Miss Bishop," when she played a little old lady of 65 with rubber jowls courtesy of the Warner Bros. makeup department, and it's still going on in 1969—in Here Come the Brides she played a little old lady with specs, white wig and grandmotherly bonnet courtesy of Screen Gems.

Underneath it all is just your average middle-aged lady, although a good deal sprightlier than most. She has a houseful of active offspring and a dizzying schedule of activities, including four promotional tours across the country each year, something she's been doing -along with Death Valley Days commercials-for 17 years. Her hobby is firing copper enamelware in her home kiln, and she has a one-woman show of her work coming up at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. She has written newspaper columns and children's books, and is a more than competent fisherman.

Rosemary never wanted to be the star herself. "I always said I could last longer the other way. I've been a character actress from the beginning. The only thing remarkable is my survival. I've seen them come and go. As they grow older they have to keep trying to jack up the face, fix the eyes. But me, I just keep on playing the good woman. It's very dull but it's easier to survive."

She attributes her longevity to what she terms her "nothing face." As she puts it: "I've got a blah face that isn't particularly identifiable, so you don't notice me. I can do various things to make myself look a little more interesting, at least to me. I'm very good at

makeup, which is great for acting, but when you wipe off the paint there is nothing there."

Servicemen in World War II liked anyway. The 475th Squadron, USAAF, chose her as their screen favorite symbolizing "the girl next door or the wife that waits." There used to be a Rosemary De Camp Fan Club with chapters around the country and a magazine with the motto, "Rosemary De Camp-our candidate for stardom." One of the contributors wrote in: "It doesn't matter if she's somebody's mother or somebody's sister, or playing a scene with an Oscar-winner or a baby, Rosemary holds her own!" The publication regularly featured a chatty signed "Rosemarily yours," which typically read: "I'm now playing a very pleasant role, another one of those sympathetic, understanding characters who is always around, reacting quietly."

She was Sabu's mother. She was Ann Blyth's mother in her first singing musical at Universal. "I was everybody's mother." But her screen roles ended abruptly in 1953 upon the settlement of the Screen Actors Guild strike over getting a piece of the action when the studios sold blocks of old movies to TV. As a director of the Guild for 12 years, and eventual vice president, Rosemary sat across a negotiating table with the studio heads. "I never worked in a feature after that. But by then I was busy in television anyway, so it was all right."

For *That Girl*, Rosemary has to get up at 4:30 in the morning to leave Redondo Beach by 5:30 to get to Paramount-Cahuenga's Stage 8 ("Lucky old 8 of *The Dick Van Dyke Show*") by 6:15 to put on her makeup ("You have to get there earlier as you grow older") to be ready to shoot by 8 A.M. "As Marlo's mother, I'm simply a nice matron who lives in White Plains or Brewster, and if I did anything remarkable or looked remarkable, it would spoil the whole thing."


