



as we see it

■ In view of the Supreme Court's recent decision upholding the FCC's "fairness doctrine," some station operators may opt against broadcasting any controversial opinion whatever.

This would be unfortunate and, in our opinion at least, a violation of their "public interest" responsibility.

It is incumbent upon television, as the most pervasive medium of communication, to assume—or strive to assume—a position of leadership in improving physical and social conditions in the community it serves. Note the word "serves," for it is the operating verb for those who are granted the privilege of informing the public.

Opinion and controversy are intrinsic to a responsible medium. It is not to be expected that the owner of a television station—and his employees—will be endowed with all the background and all the wisdom necessary to achieve a better life for his station's viewers. But he is entitled to his opinion, should express it along with other opinion, and is, in our view, shirking his responsibility if he does not include controversial subjects in his program schedule.

The "fairness doctrine" holds that persons holding opinions contrary to those of the station management are entitled to be heard. As Mr. Justice White wrote, "... the First Amendment confers no right on licensees to prevent others from broadcasting on 'their' frequencies, and no right to an unconditional monopoly of a scarce resource which the Government has denied others the right to use."

Our most progressive and most powerful stations do express opinion and, of course, do invite contrary opinion from responsible members of the community. They will continue to do so. Our hope is that some day soon all television stations will serve as forums for constructive debate on how best to solve today's awesome problems.

NEIL HICKEY REPORTS.

CBS News special "A Day in the Life of the United States of America" is tentatively set for a December airing, with CHARLES KURALT describing what this country was like on the historic day of Apollo 11's moon landing. Producer PERRY WOLFF will have film from as many as 40 different locations around the U.S. to piece together a kaleidoscopic view of American life at a time (as one CBS staffer put it) "when all Americans were bound together in a single event."

NBC has tentatively scheduled its examination of the Pueblo controversy for Aug. 25 . . . College Football '69 is the title of ABC's 14-week series featuring highlights from the NCAA games. Kickoff date is Sept. 14 . . . WOODY ALLEN will have his own special on CBS Sept. 21.

Veteran actress LILLIAN RANDOLPH has signed on to play BILL COSBY's mother on his new NBC show. She was on "Amos 'n' Andy" for 21 years (chiefly as Madame Queen) and had an 18-year stint as Birdie in "The Great Gildersleeve" . . . ABC International says it has a heavy demand from Latin-American TV stations for HAROLD ROBBINS' The Survivors, which will star LANA TURNER and GEORGE HAMILTON this fall.

ABC News has a two-part Discovery '69 (Aug. 3 and 10) which is all about Switzerland . . . The fathers of two actresses on CBS's The Guiding Light (which recently marked its 18th year on TV) were on the old "Guiding Light" radio program in the 1930's. LYNNE ADAMS is the daughter of ROBERT K. ADAMS, and VICTORIA WYNDHAM of RALPH CAMARGO.

"Horton Hears a Who" is the title of the next Dr. SEUSS special for CBS. HANS CONRIED will narrate . . . DENNIS WEAVER, after a couple of seasons of Gentle Ben, is playing a villain in a movie called "A Western." It co-stars JAMES (Mayerick) GARNER, and the director is VIC MORROW, once of Combat!

Singer MICHELE LEE will be with GLEN CAMPBELL on his Dec. 17 outing . . . The highly rated ELVIS PRESLEY special will be repeated on NBC Aug. 17 . . . JOAN RIVERS is working on a movie script in her spare time away from That Show, her syndicated talk series . . . DUKE ELLINGTON will be a guest on DICK CAVETT's Aug. 8 program . . . PHYLLIS DILLER, NANCY WILSON and MINNIE PEARL are among LIBERACE's guests on his summer CBS series from London.

American Rainbow, a series of seven, one-hour children's specials, is being prepared by NBC for Saturday mornings next season. The programs are aimed at widening the horizons and adding to the knowledge of young Americans.

Livefrom the Moon

For two and a half hours, the world will watch the most awesome show ever

Probable landing site Sea of Serenity Sea of Tranquility Sea of Crises

In television, the word "special" is applied haphazardly to pre-emptive programming no matter how pallid or point-less. The most truly "special" television program in the medium's history, however, will begin when a 38-year-old civilian named Neil Armstrong climbs down a ladder from a spiderlike space vessel and gingerly places his foot upon the surface of the moon.

That precise instant—if a great deal of elaborate planning goes on schedule—will be visible to television audiences here on earth, making them participants in the crowning moment of man's utmost adventure of discovery.

TV's most special special—a live program from the surface of the moon—will last roughly two and a half hours. Armstrong and his colleague, Lt. Col. Edwin E. Aldrin, will produce and direct it, as well as be its only performers. Costumes and additional dialogue are by the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, Texas. The stars of the show will act their parts on the barest of stages: a tiny, barren patch of the inhospitable lunar surface.

Let us now peruse the script for this most remarkable of dramas. Recall that by the time the show begins, three astronauts (Lt. Col. Michael Collins is the third) will have traversed the quarter million miles from the earth, orbited the moon and divided their space vehicle into two parts: a lunar landing module (the LEM) and a command module, which stays in orbit around the moon with Collins at the controls. The LEM has descended to the moon's surface, and Armstrong and Aldrin have remained inside it for almost 10 hours-checking their equipment, eating, donning their pressure suits and even sleeping to store up energy for the ordeal ahead.

Finally, the emotional moment arrives—the two men throw open the LEM's door and stare outward at the moon's lonely wasteland. Armstrong, who is commander of the expedition, crouches and then backs out the doorway, easing himself and his bulky,

185-pound spacesuit through the narrow opening. (The suit weighs just over 30 pounds to Armstrong, since the moon's gravity is only one-sixth of earth's.) He stands on the LEM's "front porch" for a moment and then reaches to his left and pulls a lanyard which opens an external compartment near the spacecraft's base, exposing a small, specially designed black-and-white television camera aimed at the LEM's ladder and the moon surface beyond.

The show has begun.

Tens of millions of television screens on earth are alight for the first close-up of an extraterrestrial body. All is still for a moment, and then Armstrong begins backing down the ladder—slowly, slowly, slowly—the white suit with its bubble top and strange, hoofed galoshes retarding his movement. We see him reach the bottom, stand for a moment on the LEM's round landing pod, and then step to the surface of the moon.

His actions for the next several hours will be as scrupulously choreographed as a production of "Swan Lake." Armstrong takes a few cautious steps to establish that he can indeed walk on the surface without danger, and then makes a brief check of his spacesuit to be sure it's operating as expected. He then commences the single most important task of the entire moon-→

walk period: the collection of a sample of the moon's surface.

Armstrong detaches from his suit a metal stick with a small bag at the end of it. Using it like a golf club, Armstrong scoops up a bit of the lunar surface (his pressure suit makes it impossible for him to bend down), detaches the bag from the stick and places it in a thigh pocket of his suit. (Now, even if some misfortune terminates the mission abruptly and Armstrong is forced to hurry back to the LEM and blast off, the moon sample is secure.)

Aldrin, inside the LEM, passes down, via a simple, clothesline-like device, a still camera which Armstrong affixes to his chest plate. (He can now take still pictures simply by aiming his body and tripping the shutter.) Moments later. Aldrin comes down the ladder and joins Armstrong on the lunar surface. As Aldrin orients himself and checks out his pressure suit, Armstrong is having a look at the outside of the LEM to determine if there is any damage caused by the landing. He then approaches the live TV camera in its stowage box near the ladder, removes a small tripod, picks up the camera itself, and walks away from the LEM.

slow, Frankensteinian pace (caused by the restrictions of his pressure suit), Armstrong carries tripod and camera-which is still transmitting live pictures back to earth-to a point roughly 40-50 feet from the spacecraft. He raises the camera and slowly aims it about the lunar landscape, giving earthlings their first panoramic TV pictures of the moon.

Armstrong then places the camera on its tripod and points it back toward the spacecraft. (See right foreground of this week's cover.) The camera's wide-angle lens will henceforth observe the astronauts' activities as they go about their carefully prescribed duties during the rest of the lunar exploration.

While Armstrong was setting up the TV camera, Aldrin has been busy preparing the equipment they'll need to conduct further geological sampling. He also props up and unrolls what appears to be a window shade made of aluminum foil. This is a gadget designed to trap invisible particles of the so-called solar wind which passes over the moon. It will remain in place until the astronauts are ready to leave the moon, then be rolled up and placed on board the LEM to be brought back to earth for study.

Now Aldrin takes the still camera from his colleague and begins extensive photocoverage of the landscape and the LEM, while Armstrong-with tongs and a scoop which allow him to work in an upright posture-collects rocks and gravel and other loose geological specimens, and stows them in boxes for the trip home. He then makes an elaborate examination of the LEM's exterior and reports what he sees via radio to earth, as Aldrin takes still pictures of the entire inspection and the TV camera grinds on.

Now it is time to unload from another compartment of the LEM a pair of scientific devices which will be set out on the moon's surface and left behind as a kind of unmanned space station. One is a seismometer to measure the structure, strain and physical properties of the moon's interior, as well as meteor impacts and movement of the crust. The other is simply a reflector to serve as a target, in the vears ahead, for laser beams from earth which will be the most accurate measuring tape yet devised of earth-moon distances and fluctuations. This laser reflector also will help scientists develop a large body of new information about the structure and origin of the moon, about the nature of gravity and even about the size of the earth.

There follows another period of photographing and rock-sample collecting, including the taking of a core sample from just under the moon's surface. The astronauts also put down a gnomon—a small tripodal rod that will provide both a color scale and a standard of measurement for the teams of photoanalysts who will later pore over the moon pictures.

Soon it is time to begin the small "housekeeping" chores before drawing to a close history's first moon TV special. Armstrong and Aldrin weigh their geological specimens and pack them up for the trip home. Aldrin climbs back into the LEM and Armstrong starts hoisting up to him, via the "clothesline," the rock boxes and still camera. Armstrong takes a last look around the bleak moon landscape—at the seismometer and the laser reflector, at the television camera which is staring back at him from its tripod a few score feet away-and then slowly mounts the ladder and disappears into the LEM's doorway.

The first moon TV special is over.

The LEM will remain on the moon's surface for another 10 hours while the astronauts check out all their systems, jettison unneeded equipment, eat and sleep, and chat with their earth colleagues and Colonel Collins, who is still orbiting in the command module.

When it comes time for the astronauts to leave the lunar surface. the base of the LEM-with its landing pods, empty stowage closets and televisioncable connections-will remain behind. There will be no TV pictures of the actual lift-off from the moon (even though the camera is still in place on its tripod) because the TV transmitter is in the LEM's upper compartment (called the ascent stage), which simply will separate from the lower stage at the time of departure and be on its way to rendezvous with the orbiting command module. The TV camera will be switched off shortly after the astronauts re-enter the LEM.

The TV camera that will be abandoned on the moon was specially designed by Westinghouse's aerospace division to withstand the most horrendous physical conditions. It must, for example, survive the terrible vibrations of the Saturn V launching rocket, the shock of the moon landing, extremes of pressure and temperature, as well as possible meteoroid bombardment and particle radiation.

Its TV signals will be transmitted to earth via antennae on the LEM, or if that proves unsatisfactory, by means of a special antenna (designed by RCA) which looks like a transparent umbrella in a windstorm. The signals are picked up on earth by a world-wide communications network which has three receiving stations located strategically 120 longitudinal degrees apart (to give full, 360-degree coverage)-in the Mojave Desert, in Australia and in Spain. The signal is then sent to the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, where it is relayed to the commercial television networks for transmission your home screen:

Aside from the black-and-white TV pictures we'll get from the lunar surface itself, there's also a chance we'll be seeing some candid, color TV transmissions from inside the command module during its journey to and from the moon-just as on earlier Apollo flights. Neil Armstrong's reputation as a spaceman, however, is that of a single-minded, nerveless, businesslike operator who has little patience for what he considers the public relations folderol of unnecessary TV transmissions. So the betting is that we'll be seeing far less TV during this journey than we did when Col. Tom Stafford was piloting Apollo 10 last May.

But the live, two-and-a-half-hour television program from the lunar surface is a built-in and important facet of the Apollo 11 mission itself. Thus, American taxpayers are assured of a frontrow seat for the most emotion-packed moment of a drama which has so far cost them \$24 billion—the most expensive TV special in history.

"The Yankees, the first mechanicians in the world, are engineers, just as the Italians are musicians and the Germans metaphysicians, by right of birth."

—Jules Verne, 1865

That comment of the French author, more than a century ago, was coupled with his prediction that Americans would be the first men to land on the moon, that there would be three men in the spacecraft and that it would return to a splashdown in the Pacific Ocean. Not bad, I'd say, as a 100-year-old prediction.

Verne also envisioned television. I don't think he would have doubted that

the age of electronic broadcasting and the age of Apollo would coincide. They grew up together. Each is necessary to the other as man is to woman.

If all goes as planned, that period of midday July 20 to midday July 21, when Apollo 11 is on the moon, will be the most expensive and extensive television coverage in history.

And I believe it will be the most exciting and historic event that I will have reported in 37 years as a journalist. (I'm not really that old—I started while in high school.)

The space program seems to me to demonstrate—at about two and a half billion dollars a year—that particular combination which represents America at its best: pragmatism with the dogmatic objective, hard-headedness with a soft heart.

When the Russians first orbited Sputnik in 1957, you'll recall the official reaction of our government—it was not important, we were "not interested in an outer-space basketball game."

The initial shock wore off quickly and, quickly, we got into space, first with unmanned flight and then with our original suborbital flight, that of Alan Shepard. Parenthetically, Verne, in his predictions that we would be first on the moon, said that it would be so expensive a project that we would seek foreign aid and receive the bulk of it from the Russians. And in a sense we did get aid from the Russians, but it was in psychological prodding, which can't be measured in rubles.

It remained for that most romantic and tough-minded of our recent Presidents, John F. Kennedy, to spell it out to Congress, May 25, 1961:

'We are children of the space age

A noted news commentator looks back to Jules Verne and forward to the future

"I believe this Nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to earth."

It is as though he had given marching orders to television.

In the early days of space reporting, I had to learn for myself. Even after the unmanned flights, I remember the Shepard flight on a Redstone that was one-fifth the size of the escape rocket carried on the nose of the great Saturn that will launch Apollo 11.

Then, there was only a producer, a cameraman and me, standing in the snake-ridden marsh that was called

Cape Canaveral, and which is today known as the Kennedy Space Center.


For the flight of Apollo 11, more than 100 cameras will be employed and virtually every member of CBS News will be involved in around-theworld coverage. We have all come a long way from 1961.

And so, in an encouraging manner, has the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. In those early days, its attitude toward reporters was to ignore us. Today, as in the flight of Apollo 10, when the Lunar Module seemed dangerously out of control 13 miles from the moon, we are given absolute freedom to report the story,

> and a great flow of information from NASA. I would suggest that this freedom and the comparative reluctance of the Soviet Union to tell the facts until after the fact is an indication of the difference between an open and a closed society.

This combination of the television camera. which does not lie. and the Age Apollo seems to me the most dramatic coupling of events in man's history. It has sophisticated and educated our children to a world we thought existed only on the pulp pages of science fiction.

Along with millions of other Americans a decade ago, I flattered myself that I was with language. Today, my 12-year-old son, along with millions of other 12-year-olds, knows→

words I did not know then and new meanings for words I did. "Mylar," "retrofire" and "drogue" on the one hand; "burn" and "dock" and "Snoopy" on the other.

That's true of all of us, in or out of the space program. No matter how old we are, we are children of the space age. The executive producer of CBS News coverage of the Apollo flights is Robert Wussler. He made an interesting comment recently on this link-up of television and outer space—executive producers always make interesting comments, by the way, or it's back to a career as mining engineer.

"For years," Wussler said, "we've had a problem picking up [space] terminology. Now, in one flight, they've picked up ours. There was one point when an [Apollo 10] astronaut said, 'Hold on and I'll zoom in on California.' That kind of sums it up."

There are those cynical enough—and I'm one of them—to suggest that increased television from outer space is a kind of NASA ploy to see that the flight program continues beyond its scheduled flights. But there is more to it than that. I think that the astronauts understand now, as they did not always understand, an obligation to share their view of the universe with those of us who are earthbound. I think they want to show us tomorrow.

And as a commentator and taxpayer, I believe we are getting as close to 100 cents on the dollar as the nature of governing ourselves will allow. Those of us who covered the early space flights grew accustomed to the failures that pave the way to success.

At that time, much of the difficulty was finding out what was going on. In those days—so close, so far away—it seemed NASA's policy to say our men in space were choir singers. Religious preference aside, few of them are. They are essentially intelligent test pilots. They are among the most dedicated men I've ever known. And

they are in the business of selling a program to a country that feels the economic pinch.

Each space flight proves something, but it does not assure the future. I remember when Wally Schirra found himself caught in a near disaster on the Gemini 6 launching pad. He did not panic and the moment passed quickly. But for those of us who were there, the heart stopped.

I remember the tumbling of Gemini 8 and the wild gyrations of Apollo 10 and, most of all, the words of Gus Grissom to CBS News' Nelson Benton:

"There's always a possibility that you can have a catastrophic failure . . . This can happen on any flight. It can happen on the last one as well as the first one. So you just plan as best you can to take care of all these eventualities."

On Jan. 27, 1967, Colonel Grissom and two other astronauts died in a fire on the launching pad. At that horrible price, we learned. And it seems to me that the learning of space, and television coverage of that learning, are certainly worth any price you can measure in dollars.

After 20 manned space flights, recalling those days when you thought a Redstone was a big rocket, you see man head for that jewel, that greatest prize of all which is the moon.

As a correspondent, I am not much of a seeker of symbols. That is dangerous business. But it seems to me that this joining of technologies, of television and Apollo, demonstrates what is within our capacity as men to do.

In those short eight years since President Kennedy proposed a man on the moon, we have seen what man can do when he sets his mind to it.

When Apollo 11 reaches the moon, when we reach that unreachable star, we will have shown that the possibility of world peace exists, if we put our skill, intelligence and money to it; that the end of poverty and hunger exists,

if we put our skill, intelligence and money to it; that there will be an end to all but the final illness, if we put our skill, intelligence and money to it.

This is not romanticizing. In those early days of space, we talked about its exploration as a Jules Verne concept. Remember, this happened in the lifetime of a 12-year-old boy. The moon was distant when he was born, "nature's pale sleepless eremite." in the words of one poet; "a dead princess," in the words of another. Now it is so much "dirty beach sand with a lot of footprints on it." But in the short life of all our sons, we have looked over the mountaintop into tomorrow — thanks to Apollo, thanks to television. This mating is no sinister cabal. The deadliest peril we face is a world population seeking elbow room for itself. Most of you reading this article will remember what the search for Lebensraum once led to

My good friend and colleague, writer Arthur Clarke, predicted more than 10 years ago that man would be on the moon sometime during the summer of 1969. And when we worked together on the flight of Apollo 10, this man—whose flights of fancy resulted in such science fiction as "2001: A Space Odyssey"—dared suggest on television that the exploration of outer space was more significant than all of the great sea voyages in earth's history. Greater than Columbus, Magellan and all the Ponce de Leons put together.

For these were searches in our own limited environment. Today, in outer space, and in aquanaut searches of the sea, we are discovering climates potentially habitable to man, scarcely dreamed of in our past.

This strange and wonderful combination of computer, television and the space rocket makes it possible that mankind may find for itself that elbowroom it surely needs.

But who would you expect to believe that? Jules Verne?

Networks Gird For Nonstop Apollo 11 Coverage

If all goes well with Apollo 11, man will take his first walk on the moon shortly after 2 A.M. (New York Time) Monday, July 21—while millions of earthlings watch it on TV. Nonstop network coverage of the mission, however, is scheduled to begin 15 hours earlier, on Sunday morning; and last week TV's news producers were in a frenzy comparable, some said, to the hectic set-up days preceding last summer's political conventions. The toughest part: planning to plug a four-hour prime-time stage wait Sunday night after wiping out all regular shows.

Surprisingly, ABC rather than NBC appeared most obsessed this time with racing CBS for audiences. Both were busy lining up viewer-catching attractions for the moon-walk warmup. CBS had the prize catch: former President Johnson in his first interview since leaving the White House. Walter Cronkite taped it on July 5 at the LBJ Ranch. It will be aired "sometime" Sunday night, an indication that CBS sees it as a good viewer come-on. The network, incidentally, has an exclusive on Mr. Johnson's TV memoirs (as it did with Dwight D. Eisenhower) and hopes to elicit three or four conversations with him yearly. He'll be paid, but CBS won't say how much. As added Apollo show attractions, CBS will bring on ex-astronaut Wally Schirra and sci-fi writer Arthur C. Clarke ("2001: A Space Odyssey") to contribute expertise.

ABC, meanwhile, hoped to snare viewers with such sideshows as Steve Allen doing a medley of songs of the June-moon genre; Duke Ellington performing a concerto he composed to

celebrate; poet James Dickey reciting an ode to the moon landing, and a science-fiction panel moderated by Rod Serling discussing "Where do we go from here?" The network was also dickering for a live visit via satellite with a Soviet cosmonaut in Moscow and a promised powwow with astronaut Frank Borman, just back from his trip to Russia.

NBC, as well as the other two chains, expects to do a lot of ocean-hopping for satellite-relayed reactions from far corners of the earth. In their own New York back yard, the networks were preparing to help stage a massive "visual" in Central Park, where throngs will watch the moon landing on huge outdoor screens.

One ambitious ABC project—to let viewers phone collect from all parts of the country to ask questions about the Apollo mission—was in doubt. The phone company feared a wholesale jam-up of its lines.

Does a big brass bed suggest sex? Seems so. Such a bed was intended to be "the one continuing character" in a new ABC comedy series, Love American Style, starting in the fall, but some of ABC's "more conservative" affiliated stations have been so nervous about the bed's implications that it is now to be downplayed. "It will be seen when it's appropriate to the story," an ABC spokesman explained. "But we're not going to make a big thing of it."

The old Hollywood and the new are in a way epitomized in the course of big-star nonsense on one hand and sloppy sensationalized nonsense on the other.

The big-star item is "Saratoga Trunk," the kind of movie Hollywood allegedly doesn't make any more, what with Ingrid Bergman trying desperately to be a wicked Creole lady and Gary Cooper working away at being a roguish con man. It's all so lavish and so empty-headed a contrivance—both as fiction by Edna Ferber and as a vehicle for two box-office attractions—that you may well marvel that this sort of thing was very big-time entertainment a mere 23 years ago.

In contrast, the nouveau nonsense is "The Happening," a film that in 1967 was an unfortunate attempt to capture on the screen the rhythm and rhyme, if not the reason, of today's hipsters, swingers and hippies. Directed by Elliot Silverstein, who should be remembered for "Cat Ballou" rather than this mess, the film bears a vaque resemblance to "The Ransom of Red Chief," with Anthony Quinn a Miami-based Mafia type kidnaped by four mods. Presumably a take-off of gangster and beach-party movies, it's a tasteless travesty of movie-making and movie-acting by all concerned.

Other items could, of course, be added to the "old Hollywood" roster. You can wax nostalgic about "Westward the Women," because this 1951

item has Robert Taylor as the trail leader of a wagon trainload of bridesto-be heading for California, with Denise Darcel, Hope Emerson and Lenore Lonergan among the ladies and a plot as plodding as the wagon train. It's the fourth time around for this one as well as for "Taras Bulba," a colossal bit of silliness that has Tony Curtis passing as Yul Brynner's son and both of them as Cossacks embroiled with Poles in what purports to be based on Gogol's epic of the 16th century but is actually just another old Hollywood spectacular.

The old Hollywood doesn't do much better with 20th-century affairs either. "Quick Before It Melts" is about sex in the antarctic via love-starved Navy men on Operation Deep-Freeze; if you can manage a frozen smile in response you're ahead of the game. This was presumably a showcase for some new talents at the time and it's a pleasure to report that Robert Morse and George Maharis went on to better things.

But why make Hollywood the whipping boy? A French-German-Italian-British co-production, "The Dirty Game," doesn't even rate a frozen frown. In this creaky spy-story trilogy you can spot Robert Ryan and Henry Fonda (the latter as a Russian, yet) struggling against dubbed voices and international odds. Nobody, on screen or off, wins in this one.

APOLLO 11

Details of the Manned Lunar Landing and TV Coverage

As this issue went to press, July 16 was still the launch date for the lunar-landing mission. If the launch went on or near schedule, two Americans will be on the moon this Sunday-well ahead of the 1970 target date envisioned by President Kennedy.

The flight plan for a perfect mission calls for the Apollo capsule to enter lunar orbit on Saturday, July 19, at about 10 A.M. (PDT). On Sunday afternoon, the landing operation begins, with touchdown set for approximately 1:20 P.M. Then, shortly after 11 P.M. Sunday night the moment: astronaut Neil Armstrong, a civilian, leaves the "Eagle" lunar module (LEM) and becomes the first man to set foot on the moon. He is joined minutes later by Edwin Aldrin. while Michael Collins continues to circle the moon in the mother ship "Columbia." For complete details on the moon walk-and the astronauts' own TV coverage-see the story on page 6.

The lunar visit is set to end on Monday, just before 11 A.M., when the LEM lifts off from the surface. Ahead lie rendezvous with the mother ship, maneuvers to begin the trip home, and splashdown in the Pacific on Thursday. President Nixon is expected to be

aboard the recovery ship.

TV Coverage

The Apollo mission is incredibly complex. It is also a great adventure, perhaps man's greatest. For television, it presents a mammoth challenge-and opportunity-to exercise virtually every aspect of the medium.

Each network will provide mockups of the Apollo vehicles and equipment, simulations of the orbital mechanics of the flight, examinations of why we're going to the moon (including histories of manned space flight) and, to put the story in perspective, reports on the state of the earth at this historic juncture. Most of this coverage will be concentrated between Sunday morning and early Monday evening, when the networks plan at least 31 hours of continuous reporting. (Bulletins and progress reports will be provided throughout the mission as usual.) Some of the people you'll be seeing . . .

ABC: anchor men Frank Reynolds and Jules Bergman; astronaut Frank Borman; physicist Robert Jastrow, who has written a number of books about space; Rod Serling and a panel of science-fiction writers, including Isaac Asimov; and Steve Allen, with a piano essay on moon songs. Also: space travel as the movies have pictured it.

CBS: anchor man Walter Cronkite: former President Johnson, discussing his role in the U.S. space program; retired astronaut Walter Schirra: Arthur Clarke, author of "2001: A Space Odyssey"; and several entertainers, including Bob Hope, Orson Welles (who created a panic with his 1938 radio play about Martians invading the earth). Buster Crabbe (who played Buck Rogers and Flash Gordon in film serials). Keir Dullea of "2001" and Stan Freberg (with his space puppet Orville). Also: HAL 10,000, a special-effects device that uses nine projectors to simulate space travel.

NBC: anchor men Chet Huntley. David Brinkley and Frank McGee: astronauts Tom Stafford and Eugene Cernan; and Nobel Prize chemist Harold Urey, an expert on the formation of the solar system. Also: telescopes in Denver and Atlanta, with TV camera pickups, will attempt to spot the Apollo capsule as it circles the moon.

In addition to the telecast from the lunar surface, the flight plan lists color telecasts from the mother ship. The press-time schedule: Saturday at about 12 noon, Sunday at 10:50 A.M. (just before the moon-surface telecast), Tuesday at 6 P.M. and Wednesday at 4 P.M.

The executive producers who gineered what should be TV's finest hour: James Kitchell, NBC; Walter Pfister, ABC; and Robert Wussler, CBS.

In his July 5 article, "The Silent Screen," FCC Commissioner Nicholas Johnson writes: "Eric Sevareid has said of the pressures involved in putting together a network news show, 'The ultimate sensation is that of being bitten to death by ducks." He has not only taken this out of context but has placed it in a context of his own imagining. The line related to the endless little practical problems, such as timing, lights, makeup, prompters, cues, etc. It had nothing to do with any form of censorship-self-censorship, company censorship or sponsor censorship. For nearly six years I have been doing almost nightly broadcasts which involve opinion on the CBS Evening News. Not once have I been even faintly aware of any censorious pressures from any sponsor. Only once has a TV script of mine been kept off the air by reason of its contents; that was done several years ago and by an executive no longer with CBS News.


That what's-his-name is a very funny fellow

He waggles his head, his teeth gleam like headlights in a traffic jam, the wide blue eyes that belong under a baby bonnet grow wider—and whatever Paul Lynde says, his audience laughs. The viewers think that what's-

his-name is a very funny fellow.

"I don't understand why people don't remember my name," says Lynde (pronounced "Lind"). "Back in Mount Vernon, Ohio, my father had a butcher shop. His name was Hoy Lynde, and \rightarrow



everybody remembered it. When he answered the phone, they thought they were connected with a Chinese laundry."

Lynde's name should have become established by now. He has had featured billing in 10 movies, and this year alone his guest appearances on television have totaled 180 hours. His brand of relentless cheer has graced the *Tonight* show, *The Hollywood Squares*, the *Music Hall, Dean Martin* (and Martin's summer replacement, *The Golddiggers*), *The Jerry Lewis Show, That's Life, Bewitched, Art Linkletter* and *Jonathan Winters*.

In the past five years Paul Lynde has narrowly missed TV stardom via four projected series which had only one thing in common—they all died before reaching the air.

In 1964 CBS toyed with a series called Howie, in which Paul portraved the father-in-law of Will Hutchins. Lynde said then, "I don't have Will's appeal-mothers don't want to pinch me or put me in their purse." The next year spawned the pilot of The Paul Lynde Show. In that Lynde one. played a toy manufacturer who was driven up the wall because his children didn't like toys as much as he did. NBC assigned the show a dozen different time slots before it faded completely. In 1966 came ABC's Sedgwick Hart - Styles, Prince of Danger, a potential series that is still Lynde's favorite. A spoof of Sherlock Holmes, its title role was played by Lynde in such hilarious fashion that several brass hats termed it the funniest pilot they had ever seen.

Yet the wayward ways of the television jungle subsequently sent it to the shelves at 20th Century-Fox. "It's my fondest hope that someday somebody will blow off the dust and get it on the air," says Paul. "I like to think Sedgwick is not dead." He was so enamored of the show that ABC's idea for 1967, Manley and the Mob, left him

utterly disinterested. "I never did like it—it was a rank steal of *Get Smart*, and I kept telling them that *that* show was already on the air." Much to Paul's satisfaction, *Manley* joined the three earlier pilots in oblivion.

"Those years left me a shambles," he says. "I lived next to the telephone, fed on rumors, and died several deaths. I also lost my friends—'Oh, it's you' is not an endearing response to a phone call."

Despite the peace of 1969 (the first year in five during which he has not been constantly hanging on the horns of suspense) and annual earnings of \$150,000 for hopping into other people's shows, Lynde is discontented with his career. He worries that he is overexposed. And he worries that his talents will dissipate.

About the latter, he may have reason for concern. Unlike most established comedians, Lynde writes his own material and seems at his best when his humor appears extemporaneous. On The Hollywood Squares he has collapsed both audience and crew with his responses. Examples . . . Question: Why are motorcyclists so partial to leather? Answer: Because chiffon wrinkles so easily. Question: What do you call a leopard without spots? Answer: Completely cured. Question: Take some sugar, butter, chocolate and nuts. stir it all up and boil it in a pan and what will you get? Answer: Terminal acne.

His instant wit bubbles irrepressibly off-stage as well as on, but this is the sole likeness of Lynde the man to Lynde the performer. He is a worry wart assailed by self-doubt, convinced he is both unattractive and unfunny. He will be the last to believe that, in repose, he is a more than passably handsome man and a sophisticate of great charm in contrast to his professional image of a hay-kicker from the Midwest.

It was in the Midwest that Lynde accrued his bundle of insecurities. He

was "a fat kid"—in college he weighed 260 pounds—and his first jobs were as "a fat comic." After a childhood bout with peritonitis and seven months in a hospital, he had been fed unmercifully by his mother. "She didn't know there was a broiler in the oven. To her, salad was potato salad. I ballooned. I know I'm ugly when I work—friends tell me, 'Boy, you ought to stay off that tube—it doesn't do anything for you."

His self-deprecation may well stem from a father who lavished affection on Paul's three brothers, "Richard was the athlete. Cordy was the brain and Johnny was the baby. I was lost in the middle. I was so jealous of Johnny that I'd put him in a basket and try to get him mixed up with the babies in the maternity ward of the hospital next door. My teachers used to say-'Oh, you're such a silly goose'; my father was adamant in his disapproval of my interest in show business; my sisters said, 'Why do you make those faces? You make yourself so ugly.' My brothers made fun of my weight. I plucked so many chickens at my father's shop the kids at school called me 'the chicken plucker.' I guess I fought back by having delusions of grandeur. I used to vell things like 'Where's my gold bathrobe?"

Lynde covers the minor hurts with humor; about the more real tragedies of his life he is subdued. His favorite brother, Cordy, was killed in the Battle of the Bulge. His mother died shortly thereafter, and his father died the day after Cordy's body was brought home. The three funerals—within three months' time-followed by a year the wedding of a girl he had loved for a decade. "I was in love with Marilyn from the first time I can remember her, all through high school and college. She was an obsession. I've dated a lot since, but never had that same feeling. Friends tell me, 'You love, Paul, but you love sickly-not calmly enough.' It's the only way I know how to love."

Afterward, in New York ("a terrible place to be broke"), he struggled in show business. "When I said I didn't have a cent, I didn't. I used to get annoved with people who said they were broke when they had five dollars." When he finally went to work in night clubs, the bored cafe-society destroyed his self-confidence. "They sat with their backs to the stage. You'd think they'd turn around just once to find out if I had clothes on." When his depression deepened to the point he found himself being rude to friends, he went into psychoanalysis."The doctor's name was Sylvia, I told her she'd have a problem with me because Sylvia was my mother's name." But the sessions renewed his self-respect, and soon after came his role of Harry McAfee, the father in "Bye Bye Birdie"-the turning point in his career.

Since boyhood he has dreamed of becoming a serious actor, but the ambition has dimmed in these last few years. "I feel now it's useless to keep hoping. The way things are today, we live in a world that needs laughter, and I've decided if I can make people laugh, I'm making a more important contribution."

Lynde lives alone in the first home he has ever owned, a Spanish house which once belonged to Errol Flynn. He plans to restore the property to its original condition, and claims the house is such therapy that he is happier in his personal life than he has ever been. "Furthermore, when I'm 70, I'm going to retire and relax and eat. Just lie in bed and eat. I was a fat kid and I'm going to be a fat old man. They'll have to cremate me: I'm going to weigh 800 pounds and there won't be a coffin big enough to put me in."

Fortunately for "the world that needs laughter," Lynde is only 42, which assures us of many more years of amusement before he slackens into obesity and oblivion.

The small world of Miss Universe

Its narrow borders, guarded by American. 'mothers,' don't give a girl a chance to roam

Three billion four hundred and eighty million people inhabit the world for the moment (check your local hospital for a later count). Most of the girl-children among them are, for a brief moment in their growing-up years, eligible for a crown more universal than Charlemagne's. This international crowning takes place in Miami Beach (it will be telecast on CBS tonight, July 19) as the Miss Universe contest arrives at its dizzy, hopefully inspiring, end. If many of the contestants behave like perfect Pollvannas throughout, there are others made of sterner stuff who come for a duel in the sun-and get it.

They not only find themselves at war with other beauties but they have quite a struggle on their hands, too, with the American momma. Several dozen American mommas are recruited as unpaid volunteers, assigned to keep contestants out of trouble. The chaperon's job is to protect the title-seeker from everybody and everything.

"They used to give us hostesses brand-new cars to drive the queens in," one chaperon said. "When those cars went back to the garage, they were a wreck. People smacked into us, trying to get a look at the girls."

Never seen on the screen, the American momma—her style and her principles—becomes terribly important backstage. If the queen is in her bedroom, the queen's bodyguard is at her bedroom door. Should a boy friend prove intrepid enough to follow his girl from continent to continent, he finds himself outwitted by the pageant's security system. "Of course the boy friend can't talk to the girl in her room—not even in the lobby!" said Ingrid

Fine, a Norwegian-born executive type who helped organize the hostessing system. "For that week, the girl belongs to the pageant."

Hostesses are matched to the girls by languages ("My first year I had Miss New Zealand and Miss Arkansas and couldn't understand either one of them") and somehow they do manage to find a Turkish-speaking chaperon for the contestant from Turkey. If the chaperones suspect they are dealing with an underdeveloped country, they may try their idea of civilizing its candidate immediately ("This girl from Tahiti had coconuts on her bosom, no shoes, and she came on the plane like that—we finally got her to wash her hair and put it on top of her head").

Years after they had lost the struggle to keep their own daughters out of bikinis, the chaperones were trying to enforce a bikini ban on Rivieratrained beauty queens. That probably would have pleased the Greek clergymen who fought with police and went to jail back in Athens, trying to break up a Miss Universe preliminary. "Greece," their signs proclaimed, "Is Not Hollywood!"

A Miss Greece, who must have disagreed both with the clergymen and her American mommies, fooled a chaperon long enough to disclose herself at poolside in an exceedingly brief bikini. "Greece jumped in the water," her hostess said, "and I jumped in after her—with my clothes on. I had to get her into a one-piece suit."

When a beauty queen gains a mother, there's an American husband somewhere who is, for the better part of two weeks, losing a wife. While serving as a night-and-day bodyguard over the pair of beauty queens assigned to her, the chaperon leaves husband and family to shift for themselves.

Doesn't that drive the husband to his friendly neighborhood marriage counselor? "Oh," says Ingrid Fine, "the American male is very understanding."



Husbands who don't understand it can be heard grumping in the bars of Miami Beach.

The beauty queen may sulk, toooften she has thrown off the controls of parents years before, and now she finds herself absorbed into a henwell-meaning, house where middleaged matrons continually cluck over her while acting as interpreters, security guards and (if their presence is resented) jailers. "Nobody puts manacles on the girls," says the pageant's executive director. Herb Landon, while smoothly asserting that it's the tight protection system which gives Miss Universe "its high reputation" abroad.

In truth, the mommies sometimes lose the battle for utter decorum. They can be outtalked, outwitted and out-

charmed when a Miss Spain breezes in, demanding caviar and beer in bed, and finding a way to get it. It was another Miss Spain, in fact, who proved at the outset of the Miami Beach adventure that rules count for little when a swashbuckling beauty queen hits her stride. Ten years ago, when the city's first crop of chaperones was round-

ed up, then-operations manager Robert H. Oliver warned them against the possible transgressors — photographers looking for low-neckline shots, rich playboys who had tired of the girls in the local lounges. Then along came Miss Maria Teresa del Rio.

"When Miss Spain showed up," said an ex-hostess, "Oliver flipped. He did everything he told us not to do. His engagement to Miss Spain was announced at the coronation ball and off they ran to get married. She was absolutely adora-

ble and I could see why he'd flip over her."

It's natural, perhaps, for a contest which celebrates earthly beauty and heavenly flesh to insist on its high-mindedness. The Miss America Pageant demonstrates high-mindedness by insisting contestants show "talent" (the talent category, it is alleged, is satisfied if Miss Montana proves she can ride a horse).

Landon and other Miss Universe officials like to think of themselves as bandaging the wounds between nations. The executive director has suggested calling the girls "delegates," not "contestants," but the fogs of good feeling have sometimes prompted cosmic suspicions that the contest could be stagemanaged with an eye to propaganda

impact. In 1961, Miss Universe was Marlene Schmidt, who only months earlier had fled East Germany to freedom in the West. A Thailander became Miss Universe even as the world range with the charge that Americans were careless of the destiny of Asians and cruel with their lives. But then Apasra Hongsakula of Thailand (in childhood they had called her "Pook" for "Fatty") was nearly everybody's choice of the most perfect beauty queen who ever reigned. Pook was wonderfully obedient to her chaperon. Therese Beckman, and Therese was later invited to Queen Sirikit's palace-to attend Pook's marriage into the royal family.

"I thought there would be some subtle influence-and found none," said a pageant judge, the celebrated photographer Philippe Halsman. Chinese-American water-colorist Dong Kingman, a judge several times, said the only sneaky attempts at influencing judges are rather too obvious-"A plane-load of rooters comes from some country to make us think the crowd wants that girl-we try to close our ears." Columnist Earl Wilson bumped into a fellow judge after one pageant, found neither had picked the winner, checked into it a bit, decided the count was on the square but that the point-system made it too easy for "everybody's second choice" to come in first. That led to a reweighing of the pointscoring system. Rival contest promoter Ted Cohen criticizes the Miss Universe command for selling franchises "to the highest bidder-contrary to Miss America, which offers them to worthy organizations." In the pageant's Long Beach (Cal.) days, Peru's Gladys Zender sailed into the Miss Universe title and was crowned before it was discovered she was too young to be eligible—the error. was blamed on confusion, and it was comfortingly announced that Zender was the offspring of "a leading industrial family." She kept the title.

Aside from that embarrassment, perhaps the worst crisis the Miss Universe contest has faced came when Sweden's Margareta Arvidsson fought the momma system and won.

Margareta became the "Weeping Swede" in newspaper headlines but she was tempered Swedish steel all the way. The daughter of a sea captain, she had gone on a windy sea voyage shortly before coming to Miami Beach, the only girl in a crew of 40. That she needed an American momma as a bodyguard struck her as a very primitive notion and promoted a yell of pain heard 'round the world.

Like Catherine the Great, Margareta had a great sense of timing. She saved her yell for one second after the title Miss Universe had been delivered to her. Then she threw the management into a two-day tizzy by threatening to throw the title over. World journeys meant nothing if she was going to be treated as a captive princess.

The management decided she should have a chaperon handy as an aide but not as an unshakable guard. Ingrid Fine said Margareta's moans were the natural sounds of royalty coming into its own. "A born queen," she said.

What the clashes tend to prove is that beauty queens from overseas are often a far more cosmopolitan article than their American counterparts. ("My ambition?" said Brenda Blackler, Miss England of a few years back and runner-up for Miss Universe. "I'd like to play Elizabeth Taylor in the screen version of her life. That'd be juicy.")

Unlike beauty titlists who wander in from lowa or Mississippi with no experience to their name, Brenda had been the hostess of a television series in England and entered the beauty contest because "I was in a sort of don't-care mood—jumping up and down, very pleased." Before her chaperon could stop her, she added, "My father says, 'How can they choose a Miss Universe? She cahn't be the most beautiful girl in the world!" I'm not the most beautiful girl in England."



Second of three parts THE MAN ON THE 34TH FLOOR

The thermostat in suite 3435, a windowless conference room in CBS headquarters in Manhattan, reads 78 degrees-just warm enough to discourage total comfort. It is a Wednesday afternoon three days before Washington's Birthday, the date on which the network traditionally makes official its fall program schedule.

Around a bare circular table of polished walnut, plush designer chairs swivel with the Big Five of corporate management:



William S. Paley, chairman of the board since 1946; Dr. Frank Stanton, the sandy-haired Ph.D. who is president of CBS Inc.; cigar-smoking John A. Schneider, the "boy wonder" executive vice president and Paley's heir apparent; Richard W. Jencks, redcheeked president of the CBS Broadcast Group; and Robert D. Wood, recently installed CBS-TV president.

Situated among them are research director Jay Eliasberg, armed with a folder of statistical rating charts for every region of the Nation, and Mike Dann, mercurial senior vice president in charge of programming, the only participant wearing shirt-sleeves.

The imminent four-hour showdown is the culmination of dozens of smaller groupthinks, many of them as passionately animated as a psychological encounter group. No wonder. Some \$150-million in annual program revenues rides on this decision-making process.

"These meetings have the internal dynamics of a crucible," explains Marc Golden, former CIA agent and current director of program development. "The whole ball game is played in the winter. But you don't know the score until many months later in the fall."

The pressure has been mounting since the first of January. Everyone in the room, along with some 15 junior staffers, has spent the previous seven weeks analyzing weaknesses in the CBS lineup. Under the most rigid conditions, they have scrutinized those pilot films available for the 1969-1970 season, usually at either 11 A.M. or 4 P.M., hours when the flow of creative juices was thought to be at its maximum. No more than one show has been seen at a single sitting. If two or more executives watched a pilot simultaneously, they did so in stony silence, observing the front-office rule against any conversation while film was running. Secretaries stood guard at screening-room doors to prevent interruptions.

Additionally, all those assembled

have digested projected story outlines and read the composite reports of the Program Analyzer, an audience-testing device created by Dr. Stanton.

Now all eyes are focused on Dann, who stands before two outsized rectangular planning boards he designed. The seven prime-time half-hours between 7:30 and 11 P.M. are printed across the top of the larger Scheduling Board, while the days of the week are listed down its left-hand border. Reading from left to right, each network's current programs are listed on red, blue and tan magnetized cards that cling to its face.

mmediately to the right, one can scan the 14 magnetized cards on the Development Board, representing 14 new hour and half-hour shows—a CBS investment of \$5 million. Among the hour possibilities is Cutter's Trail, a bloodless Western similar to Gunsmoke, with emphasis on a family group headed by actor John Gavin. The Protectors is a drama describing the relationships among a mayor, police chief, district attorney and coroner in an American megalopolis.

Lost Flight concerns the passengers on an airliner that crash lands on a remote Pacific island and the way, like more sophisticated Gilligans, the survivors exist. U.M.C. (University Medical Center) could stimulate a new wave of doctor stories. Another card reads Jim Nabors, indicating a variety hour that CBS is committed to drop into the new schedule. After five seasons, Nabors has decided to abandon Gomer Pyle for this more imaginative format. The network has already allocated a \$200,000 weekly budget for the program.

maller cards adjacent to the hour entries designate the latest half-hour contenders in an area that has always been a CBS forte—situation comedy. None of these \$250,000 investments shows much originality. They all resemble entertainment that has pre-

viously appeared on stage, screen or television.

Houseboat, a series adapted from the Cary Grant-Sophia Loren movie, deals with a widower with four children who hires a maid to care for them. Instead of Grant and Loren, unfortunately, CBS has cast the unheralded Arthur Hill and Danielle deMetz.

e and Benjy is the latest "heart comedy" by the producers of Leave It to Beaver, the basic difference between the shows being the involvement of two families, one of them black. Then there is Barefoot in the Park, a "sitcom" featuring a young married couple, based on the hit Broadway play. Ironically, it stars Skye Aubrey, daughter of deposed CBS president Jim Aubrey, a controversial figure who was fired in apparent disgrace. Barefoot's chances are as likely as those of Aubrey's being invited to lunch in the executive dining room.

"The first show has to do with the couple buying a bed and the difficulties in getting it into their apartment and the bed being too small for both of them to fit into," Dann explains. "It's much too risque—especially for a 7:30 show. And that's our greatest need."

Other remote possibilities are a rural comedy starring Minnie Pearl (CBS is already oversaturated with this commodity) and the venerable Vernon's Volunteers, a slapstick story about a fire department, previously rejected as a midseason replacement last January.

A more likely prospect for a late-evening comedy spot, should one develop, is *The Governor and J.J.*—Dan Dailey and Julie Sommars bridging the generation gap between a politician and his daughter. Equally promising is *To Rome with Love*, about a teacher (John Forsythe) who moves to Romewith his three daughters.

"It's a My Three Sons kind of show which reflects the problems of a father with children," Dann reminds the gathering. The producer of *To Rome* with Love, coincidentally, also produces *My Three Sons*.

Pacing the synthetic white carpeting, Dann directs his attention to the larger, multicolored Scheduling Board as he explains his department's recommendations for change.

On Sunday night, Gentle Ben has suffered a noticeable decline in the ratings. Dann is unimpressed by a modest letter-writing campaign in which thousands of viewers have pleaded to "Save Gentle Ben." "There are only so many bear stories you can do," he says, gruffly. "With Land of the Giants and Walt Disney, two children's shows opposite it, why don't we try an adult form to give the audience a chance for more selective viewing?"

With that, he removes the *Gentle Ben* card from the board, tossing it on the floor.

The remainder of Sunday night seems viable. "Ed Sullivan, Smothers Brothers and Mission: Impossible are all working fine for us. We don't change."

Monday night seems just as stable. Gunsmoke, Lucy, Mayberry R.F.D., Family Affair and Carol Burnett all rank high in the Nielsen ratings, just as Lancer, Red Skelton and Doris Day do on Tuesday night. The CBS News hour lags way behind the opposition, but management policy makes its appearance on the schedule obligatory.

A twinkle comes to Dann's eye when he reaches the *Glen Campbell* card opposite Wednesday at 7:30. In a bold move the previous December, he had decided to cancel *Daktari* weeks before the customary "second season" and replace it with the singer from Arkansas in a musical variety show. This stratagem exemplified the highly specialized science of counterprogramming. Dann pitted Campbell against two Westerns, shows that attract older audiences, in an effort to charm the viewer who was not being satisfied in that time period.

Between the time of that move and now, the third week in February, weekly overnight Arbitron ratings ordered by Dann certified that Campbell's hit status was not ephemeral. "Glen Campbell turned around the whole season," Dann exults, ever mindful of the ratings race with NBC. Furthermore, the show has delivered a substantial carry-over audience to *The Good Guys, Beverly Hillbillies* and *Green Acres*, well-established programs following in its wake.

The 10 P.M. Wednesday period had also benefited from Dann's legerdemain. Hawaii Five-O seemed moribund on Thursday night at 8 late last year, winning only a 22-percent share of the audience and position number 80 on the Nielsen list. When Dann moved Hawaii to its current hour, it vaulted into the Top 20 the first week and has remained there ever since.

Thursdays from 7:30 to 9 had long been a major disaster area. Both Blondie, which opened last season, and The Queen and I, its woeful midseason replacement, had been written off as "creative failures" before they reached the air. The Queen and I card that Dann takes off the big board is joined by one for Jonathan Winters, who failed to attract significant audiences at 8 P.M. Only the Thursday Night Movies will be retained.

The Wild Wild West, Friday at 7:30, deserved a better fate. "Maybe it's not a big hit," Dann had earlier explained, "but it's a functional show. It gets a good circulation and it's profitable."

The CBS hierarchy, however, recently had become alarmed over the widespread criticism of violence on television and the increasing clamor for Federal regulation. The Wild Wild West thus became expendable. Its card is unceremoniously removed.

"On Saturday, Gleason's fine," says Dann, resuming his analysis. "My Three Sons, Hogan's, Petticoat and Mannix are also solid."

That leaves three and a half hours of

programming to replace: two blocks from 7:30 to 9 on Thursday and Friday, and Sunday night at 7:30 to 8. Dann confronts the toughest problem first.

"We have tried for three years to do something about Thursday and we have failed. We just can't lick 7:30 to 9."

That very dilemma was preying on his mind earlier in the day when he raised a pair of binoculars to his eyes and gazed at the Henry Moore sculptures in the Museum of Modern Art's garden 34 stories below. It was only then that he was able to conceive the solution—moving Family Affair from 9:30 on Monday to 7:30 on Thursday.

The idea appears to have considerable merit. CBS has received several hundred thousand letters from parents and school groups requesting that the program appear at an hour more accessible to younger viewers.

"How does it do in the Rocky Mountain time zone, where it is played at 7:30?" Schneider asks. Charts supplied by Eliasberg confirm that Family Affair is a bigger hit at 7:30 in Salt Lake City than it is elsewhere at 9:30 and that it attracts an extraordinary number of under-12 viewers. The swich is quickly approved, even though it violates an unwritten rule: Never Tamper with a Hit.

The strategy, of course, is to eliminate the rating advantage of the established 7:30 leader, NBC's Daniel Boone. "We really want to take Boone," Dann declares, ready to administer the coup de grace. He grabs the Jim Nabors card and places it on the schedule immediately following Family Affair. "In the weakest part of our whole schedule," he says, "we now have two of the biggest draws that exist on our network!"

Schneider then addresses himself to the resultant gap on Monday at 9:30. He complains that *The Doris Day Show* has not realized its potential, despite a healthy rating. He wants

future scripts to take Doris off the farm, glamorize her and involve her in more contemporary situations. "Not should the show be redone, but let's give her a new time period," he suggests. "I think she'd be very compatible just before Carol Burnett on Mondays." The change is made.

To fill the Doris Day vacancy on Tuesday at 9:30, Dann nominates his prime candidate for a late-evening family comedy, The Governor and J.J. By putting it there, he demonstrates his policy of protecting a newcomer with an established lead-in show, in this case Red Skelton.

To Rome with Love next falls into place as the substitute for Gentle Ben. gaining majority support for its potential appeal to the Sunday night family audience, where its opposition primarily appeals to children.

"" m worried about The Name of · the Game." Board Chairman Paley interjects, looking back on the loss of Pyle on Friday night. "Your vital point is 8:30 Friday night. If you can stop Name of the Game [a 90-minute drama on NBCl in the first half-hour. you'll retain the 8:30 audience when your movie starts at 9. If you lose 8:30, they'll stay with Name of the Game until 10."

Dann reduces this worry by shifting Hogan's Heroes from Saturday at 9 into the former Pyle position. "Same kind of show as Gomer," he declares. "Not as big a rating, but it was against NBC's Saturday Night at the Movies and Lawrence Welk, which takes all the oldsters. Hogan's can win, just like Gomer"

Noting the remaining hour's gap on Friday night, Dr. Stanton then asks: "What's the one new show that you have faith in more than any other?" Unanimously, it is U.M.C. Conveniently devoid of sex and violence, U.M.C. can be expected to gain support among both young and old viewers.

"The public appetite has always been

around for this," Dann comments, tentatively placing the card at 7:30 Friday. Whether accidents and operations are appropriate so close to the dinner hour becomes the subject of a vigorous debate. Its outcome: another place will have to be found.

The easiest spot on the board is Wednesday night at 9, currently occupied by the hugely successful CBS comedy block, Beverly Hillbillies and Green Acres. Their competition is the weakly-rated ABC movies and NBC's Music Hall, whose sponsor is not overly

concerned with big ratings.

"A new story form is always a big gamble," says Dann. "They're the least likely to succeed. But by putting U.M.C. at 9 o'clock and shoving back Beverly Hillbillies half an hour, we would be creating a hammock between two successful shows-the other one being Hawaii Five-O at 10 o'clock. That would really not be too much of a gamble."

Dann also knows that Hillbillies producer Paul Henning will not object to being evicted since he will be following Glen Campbell, a hit show with a similar audience. And Hillbillies, which Dann calls "the biggest hit in the history of broadcasting," had prospered in that identical position one vear earlier.

Next, the dislodged Green Acres is assigned the spot vacated by Hogan's Heroes, Saturday at 9-an ideal sandwich between Mv Three Sons and Petticoat Junction. With the switch of Hillbillies, a place has to be found for Good Guys. Friday at 8 looms as a possibility, if only something substantial can precede it. Nothing left on the Development Board arouses enthusiasm. Me and Benjy is not funny enough, Vernon's Volunteers is thought to be poorly executed. Barefoot in the Park belongs later in the evening.

"We're dead," Dann sighs. entire schedule will not work unless we have a strong 7:30 comedy." Reluctantly, it is decided to insert the ->

hour-long Lost Flight at 7:30 and move Good Guys to Sunday night, in place of To Rome with Love.

"Lost Flight can be a functional 7:30 form," Dann remarks, as the meeting concludes on a gloomy note shortly before 4 P.M. "It's not based on violence and it's all right for the kids." But everyone understands that his statement lacks conviction.

everal minutes after an anxietyridden return to his office, he gets a call from agent Ted Ashley.

"I think Get Smart is available," Ashley reports. A slippage in ratings has prompted NBC to cancel the four-seasons-old escapist comedy.

Dann has always admired *Get Smart*. He feels its comedy-jeopardy format is reminiscent of the best Bob Hope and Marx Brothers movies. There is also a precedent for his considering the acquisition of a faltering series from a rival network—he had salvaged *My Three Sons* from ABC and turned it into a durable Top 10 show.

"That's the key to a perfect schedule," Dann thinks to himself, in growing excitement. "That's the lock. That's my 7:30 show."

He immediately contacts network president Robert Wood and explains Ashlev's offer.

"Bob," he says, "I want to go after Get Smart."

"Do you think it's strong enough?" Wood asks.

"It tied My Three Sons when it was against it," Dann replies, drawing on his memory. "It's doing very well now. Not great. But Friday night at 7:30 we have 43 percent more children looking in. It's an ideal children's show."

"Go after it if you can get it," Wood instructs.

By the end of the day, Dann has closed the deal for *Get Smart* and transferred *Good Guys* back to Friday night at 8. He has welded together a potent, 90-minute block of the same variety of wild, farcical comedy, an

inspired departure for Friday night that involves \$35 million in prospective revenues. Several years before, a similar comedy block concept on Saturday night had ended the dominance of the NBC movies.

Dann goes to bed thinking that the schedule has been locked. At 1:30 in the morning, he receives another phone call from Ashley, informing him that it seems doubtful that series star Don Adams wishes to continue with *Get Smart*. When NBC had learned only hours before that the show had been purchased by CBS, two NBC executives descended on Adams' Beverly Hills home, offering him six specials for the fall season plus his own variety show. Adams indicated that he favored NBC's lucrative proposal.

At 2 A.M., wearing a pair of pajamas, Dann pads barefoot into the kitchen of his rambling, suburban New York home and places a call to Adams. For the next three hours, he tries to persuade Adams to continue with the series.

"My goodness," Dann argues, "if you're against *High Chaparral*, which has an older audience appeal, and *Let's Make a Deal* on ABC, we fully expect you to be a substantial success. It's an unopposed comedy area, the only game in town."

He also recites the increased numbers of younger viewers on Friday night and the financial advantages that could accrue to Adams, who owns 35 percent of the show.

"In this business, you should never give up a hit," he advises Adams, speaking in hushed tones so he will not disturb his sleeping family. "Gleason was the only man I know who walked away from a successful show—
The Honeymooners—and was able to survive in a different format. You are not a man of [that great] stature in the industry, no matter what your capabilities are. You can't assume that by going on an hour variety show you will

be just as successful."

Dann's impassioned philippics end at 4:55 in the morning.

"OK," Adams says. "Let me talk to my people and I'll get back to you."

Dann knows that Adams has scheduled another meeting with NBC at 10 A.M. "With a performer," he says later, "you must really get him to make up his mind at that moment. If you let him get away, he's subject to formid-

able pressures."

"Don, it's five of 5 in the morning," Dann retorts. "We want you. But at 5 o'clock we'll go another way. There's nothing more I can say that will influence you. You have to tell me right now. We have to announce our schedule today. I have to know one way or the other. I have no choice."

There is a pause.

"OK," Adams sighs. "I'll stay with Get Smart."

In his exhilaration over consummating the \$3.5-million deal, Dann cannot return to sleep. He takes a hot shower, shaves, and catches the commuter train to Manhattan for the 8:30 A.M. signing with Adams' agents.

"Right now, we figure we've got the dream schedule," Dann bullishly observes. "We go in confident that we will win the ratings as we have for 14 years. We have no real weak spots."

By Monday afternoon, the first day they go on the market, Get Smart, Hogan's Heroes and Good Guys are sold out to advertisers. The CBS vice president in charge of sales, on that same day, executes firm contracts for \$125 million-worth of business.

"Fifty percent of the reason for a program's success is where it's scheduled." Dann later explains. "To the professionals, we've got a hot schedule. We're practically sold out for the fourth quarter of 1969, the greatest quarter in the history of the company. We're hot on the street."

Next week: The Smothers' blowup. The tensions mount again.


