That old time religion brought up to date

How Christians and Jews
are developing new techniques for television

The major church groups—and even some smaller ones—have found a way to get their messages exposed to television audiences that aren't accustomed to watching the traditional Sunday morning religious programs.

The device is short films, anywhere from 10 seconds to one minute in length, supplied to the TV stations and networks as public-service spots.

The religious broadcasters have enlisted professional aid on a volunteer basis from members of their denomina-

tions who work in large Madison Avenue advertising agencies. The result is that many of these church spots show production know-how suggestive of the best TV commercials.

Not infrequently, stations drop these messages into 15 or 20 station breaks a week. As a consequence, although there is no way of accurately tabulating the total value of the air time being contributed, it's obviously running into millions of dollars per year.

One indication: the United Presby-

terians, who pioneered the TV-spot idea back in 1966 with a filmed "God is alive" rebuttal of the God-is-dead theory, recently distributed an animated cartoon that, in Detroit alone, got \$46,914 worth of air time in only one month on six stations.

Dollar figures, however, fail to tell the full story. The TV industry's Television Information Office claims that the broadcasters give more than \$1.2 million in air time and production costs *per week* to religious programming—meaning, for the most part, the Sunday morning series.

But these programs reach pitifully small audiences. The long-standing network series—ABC's *Directions*, CBS's *Look Up and Live* and *Lamp unto My Feet*, and NBC's *Eternal Light*, *Guidelines* and others normally settle for ratings that represent about half a million homes—a barely measurable response.

Brief messages can get much better exposure than that, which explains why so many churchmen advocate the spot approach. The Episcopalians, for instance, produced a film showing a viewer watching a movie on TV in which early Christians faced lions in a Roman arena. The tag line: "Being a Christian didn't used to be a spectator sport. It *still* isn't!" The Rev. Robert M. G. Libby, Episcopal radio-TV director, reports elatedly: "One station even ran our spot in the middle of a ball game!"

Surprisingly, dropping religious messages into the commercial companionship of corn flakes and toothpaste ads has aroused no reported objections either in church hierarchies or among parishioners.

"Sure," the Rev. Mr. Libby admits, "they're not very profound messages, but they get in and out quick, and make a point before anybody can tune out."

The point in most cases is what religious programmers call moral-ethical—it states a basic religious principle instead of relying on a go-to-church or

repent-and-be-saved message. "The stations are looking to us to come up with answers to today's problems," the Jewish Chautauqua Society's Sylvan Lebow observes. He also notes: "We have to try to be more *universal* all the time. We just can't blow our own horn much any more."

Lebow recently had a film crew in Prague, Czechoslovakia, shooting a spot titled "Stand Not Idly By." He described it as "a polemic against hate." "We're also doing a 30-second called 'Woman of Valor,'" he reported. "We're terribly sensitive about the image of the Jewish mother since 'Portnoy's Complaint.' And we're working on a 10-second spot on peace. *That* isn't easy."

Five or six spots can be turned out for what a typical half-hour film costs, and spots get sprinkled all over the schedule. "Over a year's time," says George Dessart of WCBS-TV, New York, "we may schedule a good church spot as many as 50 times."

It's not the content of the Sunday "ghetto" programs that has made religionists unhappy. It's the *hour*. "Some superb ones have been produced, addressed to the crying needs of our time," says Charles Reilly Jr., executive director of the National Catholic Office for Radio and TV, "but few, if any, have reached significant audiences."

Reilly is an aggressive opponent of the "ghetto." "Religion," he has griped, "is something that goes on radio and TV at 8:30 A.M. Sundays, to be jotted down in the public-service logs to show to the FCC."

Charles Brackbill Jr., a minister who oversees radio and TV for the United Presbyterians, also views the Sunday series as largely a waste of time. He persuaded his denomination to stop producing TV programs in favor of spots several years ago.

One of Brackbill's ideas is the widely talked-about "psychedelic poster" spot produced by satirist Stan Freberg. →

Since then Brackbill has gone in for animated cartoons. A recent cartoon on the Good Samaritan theme is a cowboy drama in the mod-art style of "Yellow Submarine." The credits appearing at the end: "Produced by the United Presbyterian Church . . . from an original story by Jesus Christ."

Reilly and Brackbill also advocate scrapping the Sunday series and concentrating instead on a few prime-time religious specials each year. Some network executives don't like the idea.

"Doing that," one network vice president snorted, "would be like herding everybody into Yankee Stadium for a big revival meeting one Saturday night and telling them to go their way the rest of the year." He questioned, further, whether it was his network's proper role "to push religion in prime time." Each prime-time religious special would, of course, necessarily pre-empt one episode of a popular regularly scheduled entertainment series. That would mean a loss of advertising revenue, but the networks would more likely object to the loss of audience: one low-rated prime-time show could cause a significant drop in a network's weekly rating averages.

The network people directly involved in producing the Sunday religious shows generally agree with these sentiments. The Sunday programs, says CBS's Pamela Ilott, "have an aggregate reach over a year's time far exceeding that of a nighttime special." Anyway, she thinks the Sunday series "can grapple with social issues" more seriously than any evening program would dare. A hard-hitting prime-time special, she feels, might be a flop if presented to an audience that expects an evening of pure, undemanding entertainment.

Nor are these networkers entirely enthusiastic about the spot idea. Says Wiley Hance, who turns out 39 *Directions* programs a year for ABC: "They're terribly slick and they fit in very well with the corn-flakes ads and all that.

But what do they say? How much religion is there in them?"

On the other hand, he suspects that the Sunday programs may have "done social action to death" and "maybe we need to get back to more spiritual inspiration. After all, people are desperately searching for answers."

George Heinemann, NBC's director of public-affairs programming, disagrees with these Sunday programmers. He has sold his network on scheduling church-produced spots *within* NBC programs—for the first time in any network's history. Up to this time, the only religious spots accepted by the networks (as contrasted with individual stations) have been those produced by the Advertising Council for an interdenominational group called Religion in American Life. Many church broadcasters consider these "terribly watered-down affairs," as one cleric put it.

To further help the churches "break out of those four walls" of traditional Sunday programming, Heinemann got NBC to schedule four hour-long religious specials for late Sunday afternoons in February, March and April. Each special, developed in collaboration with a major faith group, will examine a troubling aspect of modern life.

If these specials have impact, Heinemann hopes they'll serve as a pattern for further departures from the old religious norms. He is all for "filling Yankee Stadium" in TV terms. Some churchmen do have reservations about the trend to spots. Says the Rev. Reuben H. Gums, who distributes religious programs and spots for New York City's Council of Churches: "I've been in broadcasting 25 years and I don't subscribe to the industry's contention that as soon as a religious program comes on, everybody who is irreligious or of a different faith turns it off. Our mail indicates otherwise.

"And, yes, if we get a 30-second spot in the middle of *Laugh-In*, we'll reach zillions of people we'd never reach on

Sunday morning programs. But what good does it do, really? A few spots here and there aren't really enough. They'd have to be in saturation to make a strong impression. That's how goods are sold."

To make prime time, the religionists have got to be brief about it, too. Network outlets like WNBC-TV, New York, say they can give the churches a spot in peak viewing hours only if it is just 20 seconds long—little time in which to express a serious message.

Even so, just about everybody in church broadcasting has rushed to get into spots.

Recently the Episcopalians were working up half a dozen new ones aimed at children and "built around the Golden Rule." The United Church of Christ has come out with a series titled "The Filthy Rich" decrying water pollution, unsightly auto junkyards and other civic ills, with the tag line, "Who's cleaning up?" The Lutheran Council

has distributed a jolting one-minute film showing flashes of Vietnam warfare, street riots and atomic explosions as a small child plaintively recites the Lord's Prayer. The Catholics recently put marketing experts at the Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn ad agency to work drafting ideas for religious spots. At another major agency, Young & Rubicam, the same creative team that does Jell-O commercials works with the Jewish Chautauqua Society. Even the Mennonites and Franciscan Fathers have distributed spots.

Sometimes humor is employed to get a point across. One of the United Presbyterians' latest efforts is an animated cartoon depicting an Irish couple out house hunting. They look at a place they like, but the agent turns them away with thinly disguised bias. As they're leaving, a Negro couple arrive to look at the house. The disgruntled Irish husband tells them: "You Irish? 'Cause if you are—*forget it!*"

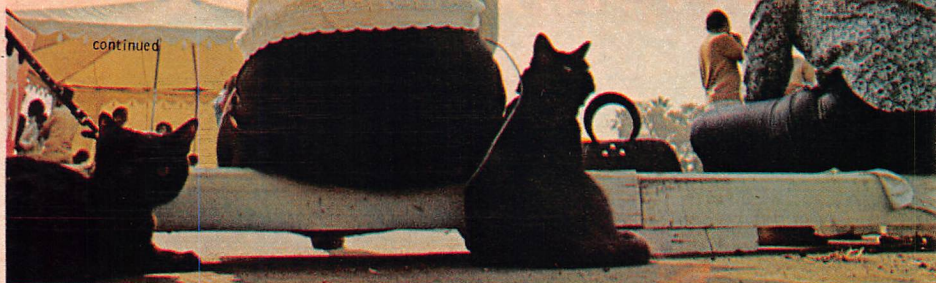


CAT CALL

Merv Griffin's Rating at the Cash Register Is the One That Counts

Is Merv Griffin "in trouble" at CBS because his late-evening talk show isn't giving Johnny Carson the slightest ratings worry yet? It depends on whom you ask. One rumor hath it the CBS brass are "mighty unhappy"—and that's why Merv is on his second trip to the West Coast since the show started last August. (Hollywood guest stars presumably juice up the ratings—although they didn't help Joey Bishop, whose just-canceled ABC series regularly came from Movieland.) But an authoritative source points out that, much as CBS might like to see Merv closing on Johnny, the network has purse-warming consolation: the Griffin show is sold out and "highly profitable."

Dean Martin's "family" Christmas show on NBC on Dec. 25 will offer one of those scenes of togetherness the newspapers so often label "in happier times." It will be a rerun of Dean's 1967 yule show—with everything jolly between him and the missus. Martin and the network will go ahead with the repeat showing, even though Jeanne, Dino's wife, has announced they will be divorced because he has met someone new.

President Nixon and his TV advisers obviously can read ratings charts. In calling his Dec. 8 news conference for an hour immediately following *Laugh-In* and *Here's Lucy*, they were playing the program-scheduling game like network pros. The pay-off in total audience (NBC estimated it at 65 million) probably was greater than Mr. Nixon could have achieved at any other

weeknight hour. For the networks' part, it was a matter of clearing whatever time the President asked for—in tight-lipped silence, whatever the cost in sponsor rebates for canceled shows. As for Mr. Nixon signing off the interviewing precisely on the half-hour, was he just accommodating the switch back to entertainment programs or was he subtly trying to head off network postmortems? Whatever his motive, ABC, CBS and NBC resisted a quick return to scheduled shows, but kept their "analysis" brief and gingery. Confining themselves mostly to summarizing the President's remarks, the newsmen ventured beyond this only in highly affirmative tones, such as Herb Kaplow's cautious estimate on NBC that Mr. Nixon was "very strong" and "tough" in his replies. Even so, 150 viewers phoned NBC in New York to ask why all this rehashing.

Sunday night, Nov. 30, was one of those times that exasperate the tube-watchers: two big specials were aired simultaneously. But such occasions do offer interesting tests of what TV fans' preferences are. In this case they overwhelmingly chose Peggy Fleming and the Ice Follies, sheer old-hat stuff (except for guest-star Jose Feliciano) over pop-artists Simon and Garfunkel. The latter, on CBS in the old Smothers Brothers spot, ranked 64th in popularity among the week's shows. The NBC ice carnival came in No. 2, topped only by the virtually untoppable Bob Hope. —Richard K. Doan

LAST OF THE SERIES

Your series on children and television was proceeding in a truly valuable and exciting manner. The reader learned of the hidden question-begging that has gone on in the use of the term "violence" incorporated in psychologists' reports; the ambiguous nature of the evidence so far adduced by all sides; the gaps between the theory and experiment. What was especially commendable—and rare—was the way in which your own conclusions were being related to their evidential grounds. What could be reasonably concluded was being concluded and nothing more. Thus, the reader was not merely being entertained (which he was) but truly informed and instructed. But now the series has ended in a dismal last article, inflated with gaseous opinion posing as fact, jerry-built arguments and tired old exhortations to the TV industry, reeking of long-decayed canards—all piled on top of a prose that has suddenly lost its previous toughness and pith.

It's that movies-to-do-last-minute-holiday-chores-by time again, with the networks offering little to distract the eye and/or ear and the goodies of the week arriving, appropriately enough, on Christmas Day and thereafter.

The goodies are, fittingly, family fare and, surprisingly, free of the sentimentality and contrivance that are the usual hallmarks of the genre. **Me and the Colonel**, a 1958 film based on the 1944 Broadway play "Jacobowsky and the Colonel," successfully observes the fine line between sentimentality and bad taste, both possible pitfalls of a work that jokes about war, refugees and anti-Semitism. Thanks to fine performances by Danny Kaye, as the gentle Jew, and Curt Jurgens, as the pompous Polish aristocrat, who join forces to flee the Nazi conquerors of Paris in 1940, it becomes a warm, poignant and very human comedy. The second delight is **Anna and the King of Siam**, a 1946 black-and-white nonmusical film that will come as a revelation for a generation brought up on "The King and I" as the ultimate version of the Margaret Landon book. Irene Dunne is lovely as the English widow turned governess and Rex Harrison creates a monarch of character and temperament as fascinating as the Yul Brynner model.

On the side of seasonal sentimentality there are two near-perennials. Frank Capra's gooey 1961 remake of his

1933 "Lady for a Day," now labeled **Pocketful of Miracles**, featuring Bette Davis under mountains of makeup, will have its fourth go-round, while 1954's **White Christmas** will have its fifth airing. At least the latter has 15 Irving Berlin songs and some lively hoofing by Bing Crosby, Danny Kaye, Rosemary Clooney and Vera-Ellen—but surely there are some fresher stocking stuffers somewhere on the Hollywood holiday shelf.

For a turkey, let alone pure stuffing, take **Duel of the Titans**, one of those made-in-Rome-with-minor-actors-and-leftover-Hollywood-sets spectacles. This one has Steve Reeves and Gordon Scott labeled Romulus and Remus for the occasion recapturing their homeland and splitting up over a girl. Their beefcake duel is as muscle-bound as the rest of the action, complete with Remus puffing his last with "Build our city, Romulus, for us." And that, kids, is why it's Rome and not Reme—the sort of hard fact you won't get out of the rerun of **For Those Who Think Young**, even though this piece of nonsense is set on a campus. The facts, hard or soft, of the week's unpreviewed minimovie, **Honeymoon with a Stranger**, involving a lady who wakes from her wedding night to find hubby gone, are unknown. And we're not sure we want to guess.

Eggnog, anyone? The joyous season is here, and believe us, some of the holiday specials the networks are unleashing are enough to drive you straight to the Christmas-party punch bowl.

Take, for example, "The Littlest Angel." Charles Tazewell's enchanting fable was so puffed up with production values and padded out with blah songs that the result was a distinctly unenchanted tale about an 8-year-old lad who goes to heaven and doesn't like the place. Frankly, we didn't blame him. Heaven was depicted as that Big Vaudeville Show in the Sky, with angelic choirs caroling tinny 1930s-type swing tunes. Architecturally, the celestial realm resembled an emergency ward carved out of dry ice. Some hereafter!

Young Johnny Whitaker (of *Family Affair*) was fine in the focal role, and could probably thaw an iceberg. As for all those responsible for vulgarizing a Christmas classic beyond recognition, may they gag on their sugarplums.

Our favorite fiddler, Jack Benny, concluded "Jack Benny's New Look" by bashing the TV camera with his violin. The cameraman, it seems, felt the closing credits took precedence over Benny's violin solo. Gregory Peck and George Burns were charming guests, and as for the "new look," it fortunately went no deeper than Mr. B's Edwardian jacket, bell bottoms and ruffles. Benny was his old hand-wringing, penny-pinching self—the parsimonious and petulant soul at odds with a world seemingly created for

the sole purpose of irritating him. And, as always, we got giggles galore, particularly when a penguin waddled on-stage and demanded payment for a past special. Ebenezer Scrooge (bless him!) would have loved it.

This week, music lovers have a double treat awaiting them in two CBS offerings, which we previewed. Both would be welcome any time of year, but are especially so right now—when we need them.

On Christmas Day, you can spend a relaxing hour as "S. Hurok Presents" an all-Tchaikovsky program. Cellist Mstislav Rostropovich, making his debut on American TV, performs "Variations on a Rococo Theme," and pianist Emil Gilels offers Concerto No. 1 in B Flat Minor. Quite an enjoyable concert, this, and one the kids should be encouraged to at least try. They may surprise you—as well as themselves—by joining in the audience's cheers of "Bravo!"

No such prodding should be necessary to capture a family audience for the annual telecast of "The Nutcracker." Once again, the viewer is swept away to a child's dream world, where toy soldiers spring to life, snowflakes dance, flowers waltz, carriages are cut from rock candy and cottages from icing. This production of the Tchaikovsky classic is exquisite, a tastefully staged fantasy of fire and frost, with Edward Villella, Melissa Hayden and Patricia McBride on hand to render the ballet to perfection.

Not long ago Lloyd Nolan, co-star of *Julia*, had this tale to tell:

"We were watching TV last night and a picture came on—starring me. It was the strangest thing. I couldn't remember ever having heard of the film before. I don't really believe I was in it—but there I was on the tube."

Not surprising, since Lloyd Nolan has appeared in more forgettable pictures—114—than he has the desire to count. For years Nolan, Akim Tamiroff, J. Carrol Naish and Lynne Overman were the B-picture moguls at Paramount, which operated on the theory that any tired story could be made fresh and new if the acting was artful enough.

"We had some of the damndest scripts I ever

saw," Nolan recalls with a smile. "Most of the time we couldn't figure out who was the star."

Even bad material could not stop Nolan—his performances were A if the pictures were B. "Lloyd can always make something out of nothing," says Barry Sullivan, a pretty fair actor himself, "and if you give him something good, he'll kill you."

Over the years Nolan has become a familiar figure. "He has instant recognition from a great mass of people in the United States and Europe," says Bernard Wiesen, associate producer and frequent director of *Julia*. "He comes on with a background of affection—people want to see everything he does."

Nolan's acceptance of the role of Dr. Morton Chegley in *Julia* was a pleasant surprise for Hal Kanter, its producer. "We heard he might be interested if the job was challenging and not too much work, and the pay enough—which meant a lot of money," Kanter says. "We sent him the scripts and he said he'd like to come in."

Nolan's agent, Bill Robinson, says it simply: "We wanted an awful lot of money and the absolute minimum of work. That's unheard of—most actors want the maximum amount of work they can get." Nolan's first contract limited him to 44 days of work a year in a limited number of episodes. Now he has agreed to work "a few more days."

"He's a complete pro in every sense of the word," says Kanter and everyone else. A publicist recalled a time when Nolan was posing with an actress for studio stills. The girl demanded that she be lighted from above. "That shows off my hair," she said, "makes it look kinda like a halo." After 15 minutes of this, Nolan spoke up softly. "Why don't we let the photographer do it, my dear? I'm sure he knows his job."

Kanter: "Every once in a while he'll suggest we can eliminate some words.

'I can say the same thing with a gesture or a look,' he says. Not many actors will do that. They're always after more words. Then, if they're lousy, they can blame the writer. Nolan is unique and he's got a unique billing on the show: 'Frequently starring Lloyd Nolan.' It appears in every episode whether he's in it or not."

Diahann Carroll says, "Aside from the fact that Lloyd is a nice human being to spend time with on a film set, I love the sense of professionalism he contributes to the atmosphere here. All of us consider ourselves lucky to have him around."

Nolan's actions on the set are reserved and quietly cordial. "He has created such respect that people treat him nicely and want to make him happy," says Bill Robinson. "He never tries to impress you but he can always get what he wants without fanfare."

"Nolan has great patience with the kids on the show," says Kanter, "and everybody knows that child actors are a pain in the neck."

Nolan himself says, "I'm a little standoffish with them. When I tell them to pay attention, they pay attention because I'm really not pally with them." Typically, he adds: "But they are darling kids."

For the new season, Kanter wrote a new character into the *Julia* script—Norton Chegley, Dr. Chegley's 92-year-old uncle.

"I sent a script to Nolan and he called me. 'I almost poked my eyes with my glasses every time I had to wipe the tears away, I was laughing so hard,' he said. 'Who's going to play him?' 'You are,' I said.

"For the first time since he's been on the show, he asked to see the dailies and he sat there chuckling all the way through. He told me, 'This is the first time I can remember laughing at myself on the screen.'"

Nolan has worked steadily as an →

actor since he left the Pasadena Playhouse for Broadway in 1928. He toured with "The Front Page," played with the Lunts in "Reunion in Vienna" and then got a hit, "Sweet Stranger." In that play, he met Mell Efid, an actress from Winston-Salem, N.C. They were married in 1933. From that union sprang a daughter, Mrs. Melinda Lightfoot, who is about to make the Nolans grandparents, and a son who died at 25.

Nolan was born in San Francisco. "My first real memory is of the San Francisco earthquake," he says. "I always wanted to act. My father was in the shoe business and he wanted me to go in with him, but I worked at the store in the summertime and found it very distasteful.

"At Stanford all I did was dramatics, but they didn't give any credit for that. Finally, the president and I had a little chat about my grades. 'Why don't you act?' he said. 'That's what you want to do most.'"

In early 1935, on the strength of the starring role in "One Sunday Afternoon," Nolan won a Hollywood contract and found the career that has kept him busy and made him rich. "One thing I've always had on the stage—and not always in real life—is authority," Nolan says. "Even as a kid I gave the impression of authority, even when I didn't know what I was doing."

He had two "unfortunate experiences with series TV." He followed William Gargan as the star of *Martin Kane, Private Eye*. "That was done live and it was no fun at all," he says. "Second-rate all the way. Then I went into *Secret Agent 7*. MCA had me tied up and made me do both shows. I did *Secret Agent 26* weeks and had to threaten to go to law to get out."

Nolan's most famous role was as Phillip Queeg in "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial" on Broadway. "I thought I knew a lot about acting," says Barry Sullivan, also in the play, "but Lloyd's so enormously good you can't help

absorbing something from his work. He turned in one of the two or three greatest performances of the American theater."

Nolan won an Emmy for a single TV performance of the play. "We both were nominated for the Emmy," Sullivan says, "and I voted for *him*. I'll bet Lloyd was a unanimous choice." Nolan also won the Donaldson and the New York Drama Critics' Awards as the outstanding Broadway actor of the 1953-54 season.

"The amazing thing was how he did it—he just seemed to walk through it, but he was always on the nose. He appeared only briefly at the beginning of the play and then came on in the second act for a 25-minute scene.

"He had a lounge chair backstage and after his first appearance he'd go to sleep. About five minutes before he was to appear, the stage manager would wake him up. Nolan would get up and put on his coat but leave his tie loose. Then, just on cue, he'd run up his tie and step on the stage—all set for that long, demanding scene."

Lloyd Nolan is a quiet man, a man with thinning gray hair, dark brown eyes and a deep voice which he seldom raises. He is trying to stop smoking. "I buy a pack of cigarettes at noon," he says, "and any that are left over at night I put under water. That way I don't have anything to smoke in the mornings." He is a sports fan and once had a golf handicap of 6. It is 16 now.

His passions are archaeology and travel, which, happily, mix. "I got started on a visit to Egypt in 1956," he explained. "You see so many things on a trip like that that you have to read so you'll know what you've seen. I spent a year on the Crusades, a tremendous period. The Crusades overlapped the Mongols, so I began to study them. It's an endless avocation."

Travel: "We've been to Europe at least once a year since 1956. Now we're taking shorter trips—we went to England just for the theater last spring.

I take a lot of motion pictures and we've got good pictures on Mexico, Angkor Wat in Cambodia, Japan, Hong Kong and Greece."

Mr. and Mrs. Nolan live in a large house on a meticulously landscaped site in Brentwood, a house with many modern paintings on the walls, many books and mementos of their many trips, and antiques in every room. "It's a pretty big house, but the rooms are not large," Nolan said. "Each bedroom has its own full bath. Mell and I sleep in separate suites. We always have—maybe that's why we're still married after 38 years.

"We have a cleaning girl who comes in twice a week and no other servants. Mell just loves to cook. She likes to give Sunday parties, and if the weather's nice we'll eat outside. Mell works herself to exhaustion and everyone says, 'You do these things so easily.'"

Television has made few changes in the Nolans' lives—except that Lloyd

Nolan is recognized by more fans than ever before. When he goes to his regular seat at Los Angeles Rams' games, the fans are there. "It makes me feel good," he says. "When someone says, 'Thank you for all the pleasure you've given me over the years'—that's an extra dividend.

"And it helps when we travel. It's like having a second passport when your face is recognized. When we go to restaurants, quite frequently the head waiter will let us right in. Mell used to dislike this—said it was unfair. Now that we're a little older, she likes it."

Bill Robinson summed it all up: "Most actors are emotional and kookie, and Lloyd is a decent human being, quite concerned with other people's thoughts.

"He's a gentle man and a gentleman. How many actors can you say that about? I've represented him 10 years and I don't even have a contract with him. That's unheard of!" END

When the Philadelphia Fire Department fights a multiple-alarm blaze, it requires a lot of equipment: hook-and-ladders, pumpers, a foam truck, rescue vehicles—and one television wagon. Since last March, the department has used closed-circuit TV as a fire-fighting aid. Laden with two cameras, two monitors, two video-tape decks and an assortment of electronic odds and ends, the department's mobile unit provides the fire commander with instant visual communication which is far more effective than the messengers and walkie-talkies previously employed. As a cameraman focuses on part of the blaze (left), the fire commander (bottom) gets a running progress-



report, and issues orders via radio. A technician inside the mobile unit records the coverage on video tape (above). Video tape adds another dimension to fire coverage. After the fire is put out, department officials take part in a Monday-morning-quarterback session. Like football coaches studying game films, they review the tapes to evaluate their fire-fighting strategy. New recruits can benefit from what the experts learn, because the tapes are used for training sessions. Unfortunately, so far there's no Emmy Award category for Best Black-and-White Documentary Coverage of a Three-Alarm Blaze. (END)



She dispenses wisdom and peanut-butter sandwiches

At the time she first sought work in America in the entertainment business, it occurred to Miyoshi Umeki that things were mixed up inextricably. She had come from Japan, where, as a vocalist, she had been successful doing popular songs in English, attired in pert dresses from the shops along the Ginza.

Debarking in the U.S., she got a spot on *The Arthur Godfrey Show*, where she was asked to wear a kimono and sing in Japanese. Billed in Japan as Nancy Umeki, she now was told to assume her real name of Miyoshi.

"I was confused," she recalls. "I had come to the United States because I loved American songs and didn't think that one who ate rice, drank hot tea and slept on a mat could do them with feeling."

Today, 14 years later, she isn't yet sure she has achieved her aims. In "Sayonara," she was cast as Katsumi, a fragile Japanese blossom who ate rice, drank hot tea and slept on a mat.

In "Flower Drum Song," she played Mei Li, a plain-Jane Chinese trying to hold the affection of her boy friend, a hip Chinese-American.

And now in the new ABC series *The Courtship of Eddie's Father*, she appears as a sedate Japanese housekeeper with the improbable name of Mrs. Livingston. She doesn't wear kimonos, but she doesn't sing "Melancholy Baby," either.

How Miss Umeki came to this part is a little fuzzy even to the show's

producer and chief writer, James Komack, who confesses that he considered 25 other women, none of them Japanese. Picturing Mrs. Livingston at first as a proper Southern lady, whose humor was unconscious, he offered the job to Minnie Pearl. She turned it down because of another commitment. Komack says he then gave thought to Roberta Sherwood, who played Mrs. Livingston in the motion picture "The Courtship of Eddie's Father," and to Jane Withers, Jo Stafford, Martha Scott, Kay Starr, Katy Jurado and Chita Rivera.

"Someone then suggested an Oriental," says Komack. "I answered, 'Who do you have in mind, Charlie Chan?' The man said, 'Miyoshi Umeki.' I said, 'Not on your life. I'm not writing any Oriental jokes.'"

To make a short story succinct, Komack the next day invited this shy, delicately beautiful lady to test for the part. She promptly informed him that she didn't test. If he didn't think enough of her ability, he could pass.

The producer was stunned, but not out of ideas. He said, "You don't understand, Miyoshi. I want you to test only to make sure *you* like the part."

Thus, Miss Umeki became Mrs. Livingston, whose personal background is never explained in the series. But she is nimble in her calling of scrambling eggs and running a vacuum cleaner for a young magazine editor and widower (Bill Bixby) and his precocious 6-year-old son (Brandon Cruz).

In the home in which Miyoshi was raised in Otaru, on the northern Japanese island of Hokkaido, she actually had little training for the part she now plays. Daughter of an unschooled but successful owner of an iron factory, located adjacent to the Umeki home, she and her eight brothers and sisters grew up in comfort, except for the factory noise next door.

"My mother wanted me to be very feminine," she recalls. "You know . . . sandals, kimono, dainty little dolls. But

the noise of the factory prevented anyone from feeling feminine. I had to go along with the rhythm. I took up tap dancing. Can you believe a Japanese girl tap dancing to 'The Merry Widow'? That was me at 8."

Otaru suffered little damage during the war, but the Umeki Iron Works closed upon the death of the elder Umeki in 1943. After the occupation army entered Japan, Miyoshi, left a moderate sum from her father's estate, got a job at a U.S. Air Force base on

Honshu as vocalist with the camp orchestra, which played at dances. From there, she moved on to the night clubs of Tokyo, from where she departed for America in 1955.

The part she subsequently got in "Sayonara" was incidental to the fringe benefits. "What appealed to me most about the script," she says, "was the scene in which Marlon Brando, who was best man at the wedding between Red Buttons and me, kissed the bride on the cheek. I couldn't believe that I would actually be kissed by Marlon Brando, and I could hardly wait to start the picture."

Of course, she won an Oscar as best female supporting actress for 1957, but this, too, we presume, →

was small booty, weighed against a buss by Brando.

The following year, Miyoshi married TV director Win Opie. They parted in 1965 after the birth of a son. Last year she married another television director, Randall Hood, father of three by a former marriage. He and Miyoshi occupy a modest two-bedroom dwelling today in North Hollywood.

Japanese women are renowned as devoted, hard-working wives. Has Miyoshi chosen American husbands for any reason in particular?

"If I lived in Italy," she says, "I would have married Italians. I believe in marrying people from the country in which you live. Besides I think a wife gets a better deal from an American husband than she gets from a Japanese."

"Do you mean you don't approve of the mistress system of Japan?"

"Japanese women learn to live with it, but I don't think I could take it."

"How do you feel when you watch the late shows and see how the Japanese are portrayed in the war?"

"I am not upset when I hear all that Jap, Jap stuff and when I see the Americans sneak up and wipe out a garrison while the Japanese are drinking sake. When I watch a show, I am concerned only with whether it is a good picture. Besides, in some of the late shows in Japan, the Americans are the bad guys."

"How do you explain our war films to your son?"

"I tell him that we are merely watching a movie and that there are many good Japanese."

If Miyoshi is the leveling influence on her own son, she serves a similar function in *The Courtship of Eddie's Father*, in which she dispenses wisdom, not to mention peanut-butter sandwiches, to the little man left to her care. No romance develops between Mrs. Livingston and Eddie's father, but he does get a clean house, along with tutoring in Japanese. You can't get

either very easily these days.

Bill Bixby has worked for years on television, but never under conditions quite matching those on this show. He is cast between a lady who first reads her lines in Japanese—and a boy who can't read at all. The material is recited to young Cruz and he memorizes it. From Japanese, Miyoshi translates back to English, making changes as she sees fit. A playmate of Eddie's is named Max Kelly. Miyoshi is supposed to introduce his mother to Bixby as "Mrs. Kelly." She reads the line, "Mr. Max's mother."

Never exactly sure what his cue is going to be, Bixby puts in a nervous day. Yet the producer gives Miyoshi wide latitude with the language, convinced she knows what is best for her. In one scene, involving the three principals, Bixby is explaining to his son pollination, by way of the bees. The boy asks unblinkingly, "Why don't you pollinate Mrs. Livingston?" The line originally written for Miyoshi was, "Would you excuse me? I have some work to do on the terrace."

But her version—the one that stayed in the script—read, "I think best two men be alone."

"Miyoshi is a fine, natural actress," says Kornack, "and agreeable company. Our only trouble with her in the beginning was trying to understand how she worked. In effect, she thinks Japanese and speaks English. After a while, we found it best not to monkey with her instincts."

The actress fosters no ambitions to live in her native land again. She returned five years ago after the death of her mother. Idly, she strolled about Otaru, visiting her old street. She found a new hotel where the Umeki Iron Works once stood. And a row of stores stood next door on the land that had been occupied by her home.

Without the noise from the factory, it wasn't, she decided, her neighborhood any more. She hasn't been back to Japan since.



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TO ROME WITH LOVE

Let us be frank. This is no Forsythe Saga. But the news is by no means all bad. There is, after all, no place like Rome, and this show even gives you an occasional look at it. We are, however, awfully tired of one particular view—which is of a circle with the same signs going on and off and the same cars going around and around. Maybe if we're good we could have another view some time. In any case, an excellent thing about this show is John Forsythe himself. This time he plays not a bachelor but a widower, with three girls—ages 16, 9 and 6. All precocious.

In the first episode, Prof. Mike Endicott (Forsythe) shepherds his doubting brood over to what was supposed to be an American-plan apartment, but Gino (Vito Scotti), a wily Italian cab driver, takes them instead to a domicile which is strictly European plan. It boasts, among other non-features, a joint bathroom in which there is, upon their arrival, a girl with no clothes on (Brenda Benet). Here the entire family is soon in the hands of not only Gino and his friends, but a wonderful Mama Vitale (Peggy Mondo), as well as a man who, understandably, is always trying to get into the bathroom.

Another episode featured a hippie American girl with a guitar (Darlene Carr), who dropped in on the Professor and explained, "I'm not a runaway, Papa Bear, I'm a sendaway." Her philosophy is that the world is full of wonderful people ("It's all in the vibrations you give out"), and before you

know it, she has the girls doing all sorts of dangerous things like reading Thoreau. In no time at all, too, she has 16-year-old Alison (Joyce Menges) out on the street corner and even, albeit at the Professor's suggestion, on the way to Spoleto. It was a fine idea, marred only by the ending—Alison returns, before ever getting to Spoleto, saying, "I hope she finds what she's looking for—what I have right here." We liked it better when 9-year-old Penny (Susan Neher) was complaining, "Isn't there something better than going through the same old routine day after day?" In another episode, the Professor is mistaken for an Italian by two American tourists (Joan Freeman, Reva Rose) and goes along with the gag for a night on the town—only to be caught at the end. This time it was Penny who had to straighten it all out ("He couldn't tell you, he didn't want to hurt you," etc.), and though it was clever, it didn't ring true. We'd prefer a new writer on the endings.

To Rome With Love is also marred by a mis- (or rather non-) use of the humorous talents of Miss Kay Medford. As Aunt Harriet, who says things like "Of course I understand, but it embarrasses me to say the word 'love'," she's wasted here. What saves it all is Miss Neher and Mr. Forsythe. Miss Neher is really extraordinary as Penny. As for Mr. Forsythe, he has an almost unbelievable ability to be both believably funny and believably touching at the same time, even when the script is beyond belief.

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
