


"THE VIRGINIA"


MAIN ENTRANCE == Ohio Street.



LADIES' ENTRANCE == Rush Street.






STATUE, "NYDIA, THE BLIND GIRL OF POMPEH." By Randolph Rogers. Main Hallway, in front of Passenger Elevators.




STATUE, "PULLING CORN-STALKS."








SIDEBOARD OF CARVED ENGLISH OAK.

Good Dining Room Service depends on the character of the waiters employed.


This picture was taken by the photographer one afternoon, when only a portion of the force were on duty, and is introduced here simply to show the class of waiters employed at "The Virginia."
