INTRODUCTION.

The Visitation pedigrees forming parts I and II of this volume were omitted from volume 144 of the publications of this society for the reason stated on page xi of the introduction to that volume. Their publication completes that of the northern visitations suggested as desirable by Dr. F. W. Dendy in his introduction to volume 122,

pp. xlv-vi.

The section of Harleian MS. No. 1171 here copied is thus described in Catalogue of the Harleian Manuscripts: "Part I of the Visitation book of the County of York as it was taken A.D. 1575 by William Flower Esq. Norrey, which has in some places the usual signs of the Original Papers . . . the word 'Entred' written at divers of the descents with red ink. . . . Certain hands subscribing to the pedigrees . . . a Cross made with red ink or other marks . . . set at divers Descents." It would therefore seem certain that these pedigrees are upon the loose sheets upon which they would be first written by the visiting heralds and afterwards copied into the appropriate book. William Flower, who was created Norroy King of Arms in 1562, is said to have been born in 1498, and so must have been an old man when he made his visitations of 1575. He was accompanied by his son-in-law, Robert Glover, who had been Somerset herald since 1571. Glover's services were much used by his contemporary Kings of Arms. His zeal, skill and unwearying diligence appear to have been recognized by the heralds of his own day as much as by those of later times, who owe so much to his work. That Flower did himself make this visitation seems certain; he granted arms to Anthony Gatonby by letters patent dated at Gatonby July 1575 (p. 7 below). He also granted arms and crest to Richard Jessop by letters patent dated 13 July 1575 (p. 72 below), whilst both he and Glover subscribe to the arms allowed to William Wycliff of Wycliff (p. 15 below). The pedigrees are mostly dated by the entry of the last generation, and in some the age of the heir in 1575 is given: thus, Marmaduke Constable was then one year old (p. 5 below) and William Gatonby ten years of age (p. 7 below). Three at least of the pedigrees are, however, later than this, and are apparently from Glover's visitation of 1584/85, then taken by him as Norroy's deputy. These are Catterick of Stanwix subscribed to by John Garth 12 August 1585 (p. 4 below), Freston of Warmfield which ends in John and William living in 1585, and Wandesford of Kirklington (p. 28 below) which is undated but seems to be of the later date. The pedigrees in the later folios of the manuscript are not so detailed as those on the earlier ones, and are very similar to those of the same families printed

in volumes 122 and 133 of this society.

Shields of arms and crests accompany many of the pedigrees, and in some, arms illustrating descents and alliances, are also given. Examples of these are Phillipp, p. 2 ff., Lassels, p. 17 ff., and Wandesford, p. 28 ff. The drawings, from which the illustrations of this part have been made, were specially drawn for this purpose some years ago, when an earlier publication was expected, by the late W. Harry Rylands. It is interesting to note the difference there is between the armorials in this visitation and those blazoned for the same families in that of 1480-1500, published in the 144th volume of this society. At the earlier date not a quartered shield is blazoned; each family is then given only its own proper shield, whereas the heralds of the later date blazon many quarterings, very different from the simplicity of the earlier armory: note for example the nine quarterings of Constable, the ten of Aske or the eight each of Metham, Ellerker and Willesthorpe, all of which compare with their single paternal shield of the previous century. The blazon also, which in the first visitation is usually given in full, is now indicated by small single letters placed upon the field and

The pedigrees forming part II are chiefly from MS. No. 97 at Queen's College; the additions from MS. No. 126 are printed in italics, whilst those from the Studley Royal manuscript are placed within round brackets. As stated on page iii of MS. No. 126 (see p. 73 below) this visitation was also made by William Flower and Robert Glover; the latter, by a curious error, is called Portcullis pursuivant of arms, an office he vacated in 1571. MS.

No. 126 contains also the visitation pedigrees of the county of Durham taken by the same heralds in the same year: this has been twice printed, first in a limited edition in folio published at Newcastle in 1820 by N. J. Philipson, and secondly by Joseph Foster in 1887 with the pedigrees of the visitations of 1615 and 1666 added. The North-umberland pedigrees, however, have not been published in full, though Foster included four of them, Delaval, Fenwick, Forster and Lawson with some additions and alterations in his Northumberland Visitation Pedigrees, Newcastle, N.D. In this volume he also included some of Northumberland, taken, the preface says, from Flower's Visitation of Yorkshire in 1575.


The title, list of pedigrees and note upon the "anciente arms" of Newcastle upon Tyne only appear in MS. No. 126, but no drawing is there given either of the arms or of the crest and supporters "annexed" to them by Flower by letters patent dated 16 August 1575. They are, however, roughly tricked in both Harleian MSS. Nos. 1171 and 1554; from the latter of these the illustration on

p. 74 has been copied.

The earliest example of the "anciente" shield of Newcastle upon Tyne, dating about the last quarter of

the fourteenth century, is that in painted glass in the north window of the chancel of St. John's church in that city, from which the accompanying drawing is taken. The silver castles are there shown upon a field of a deep rich red colour of striated texture.

There are only nine pedigrees recorded in the three manuscripts

leisure for the mere pageantry of arms.2 The itinerary of the heralds also shows that a very short time only was spent north of Tyne. The dated grants of arms show that they were in Yorkshire in mid-July (p. 72 below) and in Durham county from the end of July to the middle of September (see Foster's Durham Visitation Pedigrees, p. iii); as the grants made in Northumberland are dated in the middle of August (p. 86 below) not much time can have been spent there. It may also be that these manuscripts do not contain all the pedigrees taken; some additional ones (see p. 95 ff. below) are in Harleian MSS. Nos. 1171 and 1554, but as these are "continued and enlarged" by the pedigrees taken in 1615, it is difficult to be sure which are of 1575. Some of them which have not been printed before are contained in part III below. All the Northumberland pedigrees are authentic visitation pedigrees: details are carefully recorded, shields of arms and crests are drawn for each, and for some, arms illustrating alliances and historical extracts are given. The shield and crest of Lawson (p. 87 below) are apparently an addition to the original manuscript, the crest indeed is dated 1592.

The manuscript from which part IV is copied is also the work of that diligent herald Robert Glover, and was probably written about the last quarter of the sixteenth century; the folios containing the list of shields of arms here published "are paged separately and appear to have originally formed a separate tract."3 The greater part of the shields blazoned in it are copied from a much earlier roll. Dr. Craster, in his notes upon the forty-five shields of men of Northumberland contained in it, showed that they were those of men living in the first half of the fifteenth century, and he referred the original to "the second or third decade " of that century." The result of the study of all the shields by the present editor confirms that date, with, however, the qualification that there are also in it many shields of Tudor times contemporary with the probable date of its transcription by Robert Glover. Attention is drawn to these in the notes, but the following may here be named as examples: Oliver St. John (575) died in 1582; the son of Nicholas Baildon (503) was living at the visitation of 1585, and so also was the son of sir John Burton (500); whilst no. 245 gives the arms of

Thornton of East Newton granted in 1563. Some of the quartered shields are also almost certainly of sixteenth

century date.

The manuscript also contains, as Dr. Craster points out, many shields of the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries, such as Baliol (72 and 715), William de Forz, earl of Aumale (252), Lacy, earl of Lincoln (85), sir John Botetourt (260), Fulk Fitzwarrin (265), as well as many of those of the knights, companions of Edward III and the Black Prince, who fought at Calais and Crécy and in the later wars of the prince in Spain and Aquitaine: these and the early Knights of the Garter are well represented by sir Reynold Cobham (134), sir Walter Manny (476), sir Thierry Manny (452), sir Bartholomew Burghersh (487), sir Constantine Mortimer (573), sir John Lisle of Rougemont (4), and others whom it is not necessary to name here.

The shields are clearly and neatly drawn, and, with few exceptions, have the name of their bearer written above each, often with the addition of their Christian name as well as of their manor or place of residence. These details suggest that the original manuscript was the work of one familiar with the person whose shield he blazoned. The tinctures are indicated by small single letters or abbreviations: ar = argent (silver), b = blue (azure), g = gules (red), or = or (gold), v = vert (green), sa = sable (black), ermine is tricked, black spots on white. The Roman numerals in the margins refer to the folios of the manuscript; the Arabic figures before each name have been

added by the present editor to facilitate reference.

The roll is not free from mistakes, and these give the impression that Glover was not familiar with some of the shields he copied; the tinctures also are sometimes wrongly indicated, as though the original had been in colours which had faded and could not be properly determined. The names also are sometimes miscopied as if the original had become partly illegible and the transcriber had guessed at them. A more important defect is the wrong attribution of some of the shields; for example, the arms of Barton of Newton are given for "James Stranguish" (2), the shield of Manstone is attributed to the strange name of "Anary" (6), "Fitz Harry" (16) is correctly given but the name above the same shield later in the roll (711) has apparently proved a difficulty and appears as "ffeherr." Nos. 124 and 125 give two different shields to one curiously

called "Bertun Hucod," whilst, more unpardonable, the shield of Chamberlain (443) is given for sir Reynold Cobham, K.G., whose proper shield is correctly blazoned on no. 134. There are other wrong identifications named

in the notes which need not here be recapitulated.

The editor has tried to find some method in the arrangement of the shields, but has quite failed to do so: there is no attempt to arrange the shields as an ordinary nor alphabetically, nor in order of precedence or rank. Great historic shields are next to ones of little or no importance—thus the shield of lord Cobham of Sterborough, K.G. (134), is followed by that of the undistinguished family of Trollope of Thornley, co. Durham. Nor are they in any topographical order; they range in pleasant disorder from Land's End to Berwick Bounds, iumping from county to county in a very irresponsible way. The first folio is typical of many others; upon it are the shields of men from five counties, Sussex, Middlesex, Suffolk, Lincolnshire and Yorkshire; the sixteen shields upon it thus range from Beechy Head to Tees. A careful analysis of all the 752 shields shows, however, that there is a large preponderance of arms of the north of England, that is, of those counties north of Trent which form the province of Norroy King of Arms.

The manuscript contains numerous shields for which it is the only authority, and it is also valuable because of the many differenced or quartered shields it gives for different branches of the same family. Of these there may be mentioned here the five differing shields for each of the branches of Neville and Harrington, or the three

each for the Redmans and Radcliffes.

The editor regrets that there are many shields, as well as their bearers, which he has failed to identify. This is perhaps not surprising, as, apart from errors of the copyist, to do so would require an intimate knowledge of the pedigrees of families, some of little importance, of almost every county of England.

KAY OR CAY OF WODSAM AND DALTON IN COM. EBOR.



So blazoned for John Ingleby in Jen. The arms are those of the family of Ripley, Yorkshire. Pedigree FVY 282/3.

6. Anaray: sable a bend counter-embattled silver.

The name would seem to be a mis-reading by the copyist; the editor can find no family of the name. The arms as here are blazoned in Glover Ord. for the family of Manston. Manstone is near Leeds. An effigy with these arms is in Leeds parish church. (Yorks. Effigies by W. I'Anson, p. 70, fig. 75; also FVY 467.)

7. SALCLYFF: gules a lion rampant silver, over all two bars sable.

So blazoned for a Yorkshire family of the name in Pap., p. 76, without a reference.

8. Panell of Rason: silver a bend sable.

These arms are first blazoned for sir Ralph Paynel in the Parl. The name is from Pannall, a parish in the wapentake of Claro, West Riding. Rason is in Lincolnshire, where there are three parishes of the name, viz., Market Rasen, Middle Rasen and West Rasen, all in the wapentake of Walshcroft.

9. Sr. Peter Bucton: quarterly I and IV silver, II and III gyronny gules and silver, over all on a bend sable five martlets gold.

This should be I and IV silver on a bend sable three martlets gold; II and III gules a pile silver. (FVY 400.) In Harl. XVI, p. 4r, sir Piers Bucton of Bucton, Yorkshire, heads the pedigree there given. Buckton is in the parish of Bridlington, East Riding. See also no. 44.

10. No NAME: silver on a chief indented sable three fleurs-de-lis gold.

There appears no other record of this shield.

11. RAUF BLISWORD: silver two bars gules, in chief three roundels gules.

Blazoned for Blisworth of Yorkshire. (FVY 400.)

12. THOMAS LERBOURNE: silver a chevron between nine crosses patonce (6 and 3) sable.

Glover Ord. gives this shield for Lekebourne.

13. Edmond Darell of Sezay: azure a lion rampant gold, crowned silver, a cross crosslet fitchy gules on the shoulder.

According to the pedigree in FVY 29, Edmund Darell died in 1438. The arms are not recorded earlier than here. See AA, 3rd ser., III, 258, and Shirley's Noble and Gentle men of England, 7. Sessay is a parish town in the North Riding, near Thirsk.

14. Willā. Wolf of Suffolk: silver a chevron between three wolves' heads rased sable.

Blazoned, with a coronet around necks, in Glover Ord.

15. J. MOWBRAY: gules a lion rampant silver, a border gobony gold and azure.

The quartered coat of Gascoigne (SS 41, p. 14) bears these arms in III quarter with the border engrailed silver and vert for Mowbray of Kirklington. It is gold and sable gobony on the monument of Thomas Wentworth. (SS 41, 14 note.)

16. WILLM. FFITZHARRY: silver a cross engrailed sable.

So blazoned for Fitz-Henry of Kelfield, Yorkshire. (FVY 401 and 633.) Kelfield is in East Riding, a few miles from Selby. See no. 711 below.

17. No NAME: silver on a bend engrailed gules three leopards' faces silver.

The shield of Bolton of Yorkshire as quartered by Gascoigne. See FVY 238.

18. Bryan See de Grymsby: azure two bars wavy ermine.

The shield is differenced from that of de la Sea of Barmston and Ravenser Odd (Poulson's *Holderness* I, 195) by altering the bars from silver to ermine. Blazoned in Glover Ord. and in Con.

19. H. THIRKELD: ermine a maunch gules.

Or Threlkeld, whose name is from Threlkeld, Cumberland, who bore silver a maunch gules (Jen.), a shield differenced by change of colour from that of Hastings, under whom, from the time of Edward I, they held lands at Crosby Ravensworth, Westmorland. This shield is further differenced for a younger branch.

20. THOMAS HOLLAND: party per pale indented gold and gules.

Shield borne by the Hollands of Stevington, Lincolnshire, and of Kinton, Notts. (Pap. 1002.) They were of Estovening manor in Swineshead. Pedigree H, LI, p. 504 ff.

21. J. Derwentwater: ermine two bars gules on a canton gules a cinquefoil silver.

Blazoned with the field silver in Jen. for John Derwentwater. It is also given for him in Will. There is an account of the family in Hutchinson's Cumberland II, 227.

22. DNS. RICŪS. GOLDYSBURGE de Goldysburge: azure a cross patonce silver.

Blazoned for "Richard de Goldesborow" in Will. Pedigree of family FVY 369. His wife was Joan, widow of sir Henry Delaval of Seaton Delaval, whom he married before 26 April 1403. He died 10 Henry VI (1431/32). See NCH IX, pp. 145 and 168. See no. 149.

23. Sr. T. Surteyse: ermine on a canton gules an orle silver.

First blazoned in Jen. Armorial seals are nos. 2346-50 DS. The orle on the canton is taken from the shield of Baliol. Pedigrees FVD 293-95 and SD III, 234, IV, 168. Sir Thomas Surtees died 12 April 1435.

24. Sr. J. Baker: ermine on a chief gules three voided lozenges gold.

With the lozenges ermine the shield is blazoned for sir Edward Charles in Parl.

25. Sr. WILLM. WHITCHESTER: party per pale indented gold and vert.

There is no other record of this shield. He was of Whitchester and Benwell, Northumberland. His wife was Elizabeth, daughter of sir Thomas Grey of Wark. He died s.p. before 1424. See NCH IX, 145 and *ibid*. XIII, 225/26.

26. SR. RVC. HANSARD: gules three molets silver.

He was descended from Gilbert called Hansard, a brother of Robert, son of Meldred, who married the heiress of the Norman Nevilles. The shield is first blazoned in Glover, but there with estoiles in place of molets. Seals are SND, nos. 351-54. Sir Richard Hansard was of Walworth, co. Durham. He was aged eighteen in 1395. (SD III, 318.)

27. LOWTHER: gold six annulets sable.

This shield is first blazoned in Powell. It is derived from that of Vipont, lords of Westmorland. Pedigrees FCW 83/86; NBWC I, 428.

28. WILLM. SKARGILL: ermine a saltire gules.

This shield is so blazoned for him in Will. The family were lords of Scargill, parish of Barningham, North Riding, and of Thorpe Stapleton, near Leeds. For account of family see Her. and Gen. IV, p. 402 ff., and for full detailed pedigree PHY 292. Sir William Scargill was living 1435. This shield, probably for this man's great-grandfather, is beneath the battlements of the gateway of Bothal castle, Northumberland. (AA, 2nd ser., XIV, 288/90, and NM 22.)

29. J. Brokate: sable a cross patonce gold.

This shield was in the church of Bolton Percy for "Thomas Brockett," who died 1435. (FVY 424 and 425.)

30. PIERS TYLLYHAULF: gules a lion rampant silver over all a baston azure.

This shield is blazoned for this man's father, sir Robert Tilliol in Powell. Sir Piers Tilliol died 2 January 1435, the last of his ancient family. See *Ancestor IV*, pp. 88-100.

31. No NAME (? Fitzwilliam): quarterly I and IV silver a chevron between three crosses crosslet sable, a border sable; II and III silver two bars engrailed sable.

Quarters I and IV are given in Pap., p. 411, as the arms of Fitzwilliam of Lincolnshire, and, with the border bezanty. Glover Ord. blazons the shield for Fitzwilliam of Mablethorpe, Lincolnshire. The visitation pedigrees do not give these arms. See Genealogist IV, 23 and VI, 150. Quarters II and III do not appear to fit in anywhere in the pedigrees of the family. For bearers of these arms see Pap. 16. See H, L, pp. 355-57.

32. No NAME: azure two lions passant silver.

This shield is blazoned in Parl. for sir Ralph Goldington of Bedfordshire, and appears later for a family of Dale. Pap. 146 gives it without reference for Barnes of Essex and Camsille of co. Warwick.

33. RIC. DE WYSTON: silver a chevron between three roundels gules.

Pap. gives the shield without a reference for Wyxton, and a similar shield (with the roundels in chief) is blazoned in Jen. for John Wistowe.

34. DE Boyse: ermine a plain cross sable.

Blazoned for sir Robert de Boys of Suffolk in Duns. I and II.

- 35. Sr. WILLM. STANE: silver two bars engrailed sable.

 For Stanes of Essex so blazoned Pap. 16. Pedigree Morant's Essex I, 130.
- 36. Harington: sable a fret silver, a label of three points (gules).

This shield is blazoned for Nicol Haryngton in Will. One of the numerous shields of Cumberland families bearing this charge, probably differenced from the fretty shield of le Fleming. In 1375 he held the manor of Farleton in Westmorland. (NBWC I, 228.) See post no. 178.

37. Sr. Robert Harington: quarterly I and IV sable a fret silver, a label of three points (Harrington); II and III silver a saltire gules (Neville).

This is probably for the son of sir Wm. Harrington and his wife Margaret, daughter and heiress of sir Robert Neville. He was attainted 1485. The shield with the Neville quartering and two others is blazoned in Military roll of Henry VI. See also no. 690 below.

38. Rosse: quarterly I and IV azure three bougets gold; II and III barry silver and gules on a canton gules a cross patonce gold.

Quarters I and IV are for Ros of Ingmanthorpe in the West Riding, descended from Ros of Hamlake, whose shield they differenced by changing the colours. Quarters II and III are for Etton of Gilling. John Ros of Laxton, Notts. (a cadet of the Ingmanthorpe family), married the daughter and co-heir of sir Miles Etton of Gilling; the whole manor eventually came to their descendants. The shield here is therefore for Ros of Laxton. See Thornton's Notts., and Her. and Gen. VII, 536.

39. Robert Bruys: gules a saltire and a chief engrailed silver.

The shield of Bruce of Pickering, a younger branch of Bruce of Annandale, whose shield they differenced by engrailing or indenting the saltire and chief. This shield is blazoned for sir William Bruce in Borough. The arms are also on his effigy of circa 1346 in the church of Pickering.

40. J. ELLYRKAR: quarterly I and IV azure a fret and a chief silver; II and III gold on a bend sable three molets silver.

Quarters I and IV are for Ellerker of Risby; II and III for Hotham. John Ellerker, who heads the pedigrees in FVY 137; SS 41, p. 71, and in H XVI, p. 109, married the daughter of sir John Hotham.

41. Danyell: silver a pale indented sable.

Blazoned for Thomas Danyell in Jen. Ord., and for William Daniell of Beswick, East Riding, in SS 41, p. xxii. A different shield is given for this family FVY 124.

42. Nesfeld: silver a baston wavy between two cotises sable.

The editor is unable to identify this family. A different shield is given for Lancelot Nesfeilde in SS 41, p. xxv. Various members of the family occur in Yorkshire pedigrees, see FVY, pp. 177, 278.

43. J. FFAUKES: silver a voided lozenze sable.

Blazoned with the field ermine for Fawkes of Farnlev in FVY 100, and also for Fawkes of Woodhall in CVY I, 204/8. See also no. 751.

44. Peter Bucton: gules a pile silver.

See no. 9 above.

45. Sr. T. Weston, mr. of the hospytall of Rybston: azure three spread eagles bendways silver armed and beaked gold between two cotises silver.

Ribstone was a hospital of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem (Hospitallers) after the suppression of the Knights Templar. It was in the deanery of Aynstey, West Riding. Thomas Weston was appointed master in 1422. (VCH, Yorks., III, 262.)

46. Sr. Thomas Aylesbury: quarterly I and IV paly gold and azure, a border azure bezanty; II and III sable a plain cross silver.

This shield is not recorded elsewhere. It is apparently I and IV Basset differenced by change of colours. In Parl. sir Rich. Basset bore paly or and gules a border azure bezanty. II and III is probably the shield of Aylesbury blazoned for sir Robt. Aylesbury, Borough., azure a plain cross silver. Joan, daughter of Ralph lord Basset of Drayton, married sir Thos. Aylesbury; her grandson was named Thomas, and the barony of Drayton fell into abeyance between his daughters and the heirs of Knyvett. (Col. Top. et Gen. VII, 125.)

47. Sr. T. Chaworth: quarterly I and IV azure two chevrons gold; II and III silver an escutcheon in an orle of cinquefoils sable.

Blazoned as here for him in Atkinson's roll of fifteenth century. (G. I, 228, no. 25.) Quarters I and IV are so blazoned for sir Christopher Chaworth in Calais; II and III bear the arms of Calverley with the colours reversed. Pedigrees Hunter's South Yorks. I, 141; Thoroton's Notts. I, 198. See also FVY, pp. 455, 457.

48. Roger Thornton: sable a chevron and a chief indented silver.

For account of the Thornton armorials see AA, 3rd ser., XIX, p. 83 ff. The shield is blazoned for *Thornton* in the Military roll of Henry VI date. For pedigree see Hodgson's *Northumberland* II, i, 316.

Fo. 42v 49. Sr. RICHARD VERNON: silver fretty sable and a canton gules.

This shield is so blazoned for him in Atkinson's fifteenth century roll and in Will.

50. WILLM. DE LA VALE: ermine two bars vert a molet silver on the upper bar.

The same shield, also differenced by a molet, is in the chapel at Seaton Delaval. (AA, 4th ser., VII, 8.) The shield as here, without the difference, is blazoned in Jen. It is here probably for William Delaval of Seghill and Benwell, who died s.p. before 1441. (Pedigree NCH, IX, 168.)

51. LAURENCE ACTON: silver a lion rampant and a border engrailed sable.

The armorials of the Northumberland and Newcastle family of this name are confused; upon them see AA, 3rd ser., I, 120; II, 174; VI, 166. The fourteenth century seal of Richard of Acton bears a lion rampant on a field strewn with ac-orns. The Laurence Acton of this roll is presumably he who was mayor of Newcastle upon Tyne in 1432 and M.P. for the town in the same year. The contemporary evidence of this roll appears to be conclusive at least for his arms. (Pedigree NCH V, 467.)

- 52. Wodburne: silver a fess gules between three leaves vert.
- 53. RAUF STALEY: silver a chevron engrailed azure.

So blazoned in Glover Ord. for "Stayley" and for Askeby of Cheshire.

54. Hugh Strauley: paly azure and silver on a canton gules a martlet silver.

Blazoned paly silver and azure for "M. Sampson de Straveley" in Will. He gave evidence in trial Scrope v. Grosvenor (vol. I, 152). Glover Ord. gives it for Strelley. Yorkshire. The shield as here differenced by the canton charged with a martlet is not recorded elsewhere. Pedigree of Strelley of Strelley and of Woodborough, Notts., H IV, p. 19 ff.

55. J. STAFFORD: gold a chevron gules and a chief azure.

This shield is blazoned for "Nicol de Stafford" in Will. See also FVY 404. One of the many differenced shields deriving from that of the earls of Stafford, gold a chevron gules.

56. Samson Melvell: silver a griffin rampant sable, armed gules.

The shield of the family of Meverell of Staffordshire and Derbyshire. It is not blazoned in any of the printed rolls of arms. In the pedigree (H XVII, 98) Sampson Meverel is the son of ffran. Meverel of Throwly, Staffs. See also FVY 403.

57. J. Poole of Hertington: gold a stag's head caboshed gules a fleur-de-lis between the horns.

So blazoned for Poole of Bartington, Yorkshire. (FVY 403.)

58. Rauf Middilton: ermine on a canton gold a chevron gules.

Blazoned for "Midleton" in Glover Ord. The arms are also assigned to William of Midleton, bishop of Norwich 1278-88, by Blomefield. See also FVY 403.

59. Ric. Romondby: ermine a fess gules.

So blazoned for "Romundby" in Glover Ord. and FVY $_{404}$.

60. Bothall of Northumbland: gold an orle azure, upon it in chief three rings gold.

For Bertram of Bothal. It is the differenced shield of Bertram of Mitford, which in its turn is derived from the shield of Baliol. Blazoned without the difference in Parl., and for "Le Barone Bothale" in Jen. Ord. See AA, 3rd ser., VI, 182, and for pedigree HN II, ii, 39 and 125. The rings in chief were not used by the Bertrams of Bothal, and the editor cannot account for them here.

61. Ric. Copland of Santon: (silver) three bars and a canton gules, over all a bend azure.

This shield is given for sir John Copland in Glover Ord. and for Copeland of Santon Bridge FVY 401. There is a pedigree of the family in PHY 550.

62. Peter de la Hay: silver three escallops bendways gules between two cotises sable.

Blazoned with the escallops sable in Glover Ord. The de la Hays of Stainton, co. Durham, bore similar arms. (VCH *Durham III*, 344.)

63. RAYGATE: silver a bend lozengy azure.

So given in Burke without a reference. See Foster's Yorkshire Pedigrees, s.v.

64. Gray Epūs.: gules a lion rampant and a border engrailed silver a fleur-de-lis gules on his shoulder.

Gray of Heton (North Durham) and of Chillingham bore this shield without the difference. See DS 1113. Pedigree RND 326. First blazoned in Powell.

Fo. 43 65. Bassett: gold three piles gules.

This shield was borne by "Rauf Basset" in Charles. It appears with various differences in the early rolls of arms. For family see CP II p. r ff.

66. Sr. T. Poynnyes: barry gold and azure a baston gules.

This should be barry gold and vert, though it may be differenced by change of colour for a younger branch. The shield with colours gold and vert appears in the rolls of Edward III date. Eleanor, daughter and heiress of sir Richard Poynings, married Henry third earl of Northumberland, thus bringing the barony of Poynings to the Percys. (HP)

67. Sutton: gold a lion rampant azure, over all a bend gobony silver and gules.

This shield is blazoned for "sire Johan de Sutton de Holdernes" in Borough. He was summoned to Parliament from 1332-1338. He died in the latter year and was succeeded by his son John, who died s.p. 1361. (HP) Pedigree Poulson's Holderness II, 326.

68. Robert Conyers of Sokborne: quarterly I and IV azure a maunch gold; II and III gold a fess indented of five fusils sable.

Quarters I and IV appear for this family in the Edwardian rolls, and this quarterly shield is blazoned for this man in Jen. It was also in the cloisters of Durham cathedral, but with the quarters reversed. See *Durham Monuments*, p. 30. Pedigree SD III, 247. He died 1433. See no. 143 below.

69. J. Peyrchay: silver a cross patonce gules.

So blazoned in Jen. Ord. The shield is that of Vescy with the colours reversed. It is said to have come by the marriage of Robert Perchay, lord of the manor of Ryton, Yorkshire, with Joan, daughter and heir of John de Vescy. In Borough sir Walter Percehay bears the later shield of Vesci (gold a cross sable) on an escutcheon in dexter chief upon a shield of the above arms. (Pedigrees SS XXXVI, 114 and XLI, 86. See also VCH, No. Riding II, 448.)

70. Godfrey ffouliambe: sable a bend between six escallops gold.

This shield appears for this man in Will. For account of family see *Coll. Top. et Gen.* I, pp. 91-111 and pp. 333-361. Also *ibid.* II, pp. 68-90.

71. BALDYRSTON: silver a lion rampant purpure.

Blazoned for "Richard de Baldreston" in Jen. Ord. They were a Lancashire family. For manor see VCH, Lancas., III, 160 n. In volumes III, IV and V ibid., various members of the family are named. See also Abram's History of Blackburn 413; FVY 400.

72. BALLYOLL: gules an orle silver.

The shield of Baliol of Barnard Castle, so blazoned in the early rolls of arms. Pedigrees SD IV, 59; HN II, ii, 41. Seals SD, nos. 131/8.

- 73. Sr. J. Melton: azure a cross patonce voided silver.

 So blazoned for him in Jen. and Will. Pedigrees Hunter's

 South Yorkshire II, 162; Poulson's Holderness II, 199.
- 74. DARELL of Bylton: silver a fess gules and six fleurs-de-lis counter-coloured.
- 75. HAKASHYRE: silver a chevron engrailed ermine.

This shield is given for "Notyngham" in Jen., and without the engrailing on the chevron for "sir Walter Harnons" in Glover Ord.

76. Percy of Sneton: gold a fess indented of five fusils sable.

Blazoned for Arnold and Robert Percy in Charles and St. George; with the fusils *azure* it is blazoned in Jen. Ord. for Robert Percy of Sutton upon Derwent. It is the old shield of the Percy's, earls of Northumberland, differenced by change of colour.

77. ARTHINGTON of Yorkshire: silver a fess between three escallops sable.

Arthington is near Leeds. An account of the family is given in *Herald and Genealogist* VI, 132 ff. Pedigree FVY 272 ff.

78. HYLLYARDE: sable on a chevron between three stars silver three crescents gules.

The old shield of Hildyard of Riston as given in Nativity were azure three molets gold. The family of Winestead differenced this by placing a chevron between the molets (stars) as blazoned in Con. The above shield, further differenced, the editor cannot trace.

79. J. ASTON: per chevron sable and silver.

For Aston of Aston, Cheshire, so blazoned in Glover Ord. An account of the family is given in Burke's Extinct and Dormant Baronetcies, and a pedigree in Ormerod's Cheshire 1, 721.

80. T. Suardby: silver a bend cotised sable between six lions rampant sable.

Blazoned as here in Jen. Ord. for Sywardby. See also FVY 405.

Fo. 43v S1. HAWKSWORTHE: sable three hawks close silver.

This shield is not recorded elsewhere earlier than this roll. Hawksworth is in the West Riding, near Otley. There is a pedigree (later than this roll) in CVY I, 238 and Harl. XVI, 158.

82. Robert ffitz Roger de Claveringe: quarterly gold and gules a baston sable.

Lord of Warkworth and other manors in Northumberland, and of Clavering in Essex. For note upon shield see AA, 3rd ser., VI, 183 ff. Pedigree NCH V, 25 ff. This man died 1310.

83. J. AGLABY: silver two bars and in chief three martlets sable.

John Aglionby, so blazoned for him in Jen. Ord. The manor of Aglionby is in the parish of Warwick, Cumberland. There is an account of the family in NBWC II, 327.

84. Sr. J. Clyffon of Suffolk: checky gold and gules, a chief ermine.

This is the shield of Tatershall, for whom it is blazoned in many of the rolls of arms. The Clifton coat probably derives from that of Tatershall. It appears for Adam of Clifton in Jen. checky gold and gules a bend ermine, and in Powell checky with a border ermine.

85. Sr. H. Lacy: gold a lion rampant purpure.

Henry Lacy, earl of Lincoln and Salisbury (1250-1311), first blazoned for him in Falk. See OB II, 374.

86. LORDE WAKE: gold two bars gules, in chief three roundels gules.

Probably for Thomas lord Wake, whose wife was Blanche, daughter of Henry earl of Lancaster. The shield is blazoned in the Edwardian rolls.

87. LORD SCALLES: gules three escallops silver.

This shield is that of Dacre. Scales bore six escallops as blazoned for them in the rolls of arms from Falkirk onwards.

88. ROWLAND OF KYME: gules crusilly and a chevron gold.

First borne in the rolls by Philip of Kyme at Caer. There is a pedigree of the family in CP, VII, 356.

89. Sr. J. Salvayn: silver a fleur-de-lis azure, on a chief sable two molets gold.

Sir Gerard Salvayn, a Yorkshire knight, bore this shield, without the fleur-de-lis, in Parl. Sir John Salvayn is at the head of the pedigree in FVY 367.

90. Pulleyne: gules a fess silver between three birds gold.

This is an error; the shield of Pulleyne was, at the Visitations, azure on a bend between six lozenges gold each charged with an escallop sable five escallops sable. (SS 41, p. 13 and FVY 242, 280 and 645.)

91. Mydelton of Lansdale: silver on a saltire engrailed sable a molet silver.

The shield of the Middletons of Middleton Hall, Kirkby Lonsdale, Westmorland, differenced by the molet. There is an account of the family in NBWC I, 253 ff. Pedigree FCW, pp. 87-90.

92. Sheffeld: azure three sheaves silver.

The shield of Sheffield given in the rolls of arms is gules a fess between three sheaves gold, and sometimes with the colours reversed. The shield given here is not recorded elsewhere.

93. JOHN HOLME: barry gold and azure on a canton silver a chaplet gules.

The arms of Holme of Paul Holme in Holderness. There is a pedigree in FVY 152, and an annotated and more detailed one in PHY 270. The shield is not in the rolls of arms. See also AA, 3rd ser., III, 258.

94. Christopher ffulthorpe: silver a cross moline sable.

The shield of the family of Fulthorpe of Tunstall, co. Durham, and of Hipswell, near Catterick in the North Riding. Pedigree SD III, 126, and Visitations of Durham and Yorkshire. The arms are blazoned for Alan Fulthorpe in Jen. and Will.

95. Hugh Horleke: silver a chevron vair gold and azure between three men's heads couped sable.

This is not in the early rolls. The shield is that of Hulloch of Barnard Castle in modern times. (Pap. 446.)

96. Walter Griffith: azure crusilly and three spread eagles gold.

These are the arms of Somerville as on seal of Philip of Somerville (A.D. 1340) (DS 2271), and as given in Glover Ord. See also AA, 3rd ser., VI, p. 129. This shield without the crosses was quartered by the family of Ap Griffith after the marriage of Joan, daughter and heir of the above Philip, with sir Rees ap Griffith. (SND, nos. 337/340, and HN I, ii, p. 315.) This man is probably one of the family of Burton Agnes (Pedigree FVY, 524), but their shield was gules on a dance silver between six lions passant gold, three martlets sable as given for "Yse ap Griffith" in Will.

Fo. 44 97. J. PORTINGTON of Portington: gules on a bend silver three Cornish choughs.

Partington, near Hawden in the East Riding. Pedigree FVY 561, where no arms are given. Dugdale gives a quartered shield with these arms in the first quarter, see CVY II, 421 ff.

- 98. T. WINTER: silver on a bend sable three birds with raised wings gold.
- 99. WILLM. WALTON: gules on a chief silver a martlet sable for difference.

Blazoned in Glover Ord. without the martlet.

100. Gargrave: silver on a chief indented gules three crosses crosslet fitchy silver.

This is the shield of Otterburn of Otterburn as blazoned for John Otterburn in Jen. Ord. Gargrave of Gargrave, and after of Nostel, Yorkshire, married the heiress of sir Ralph Otterburn, and placed the above shield in the second quarter of his arms. (FVY 68.) The shield of Gargrave was lozengy silver and sable on a bend sable three crescents gold. (Military roll of Henry VI.)

101. Sr. J. Loudham: silver on a bend azure seven crosses paty gold (1.2.1.2.1).

Blazoned in Parl. for sir John Loudham of Derby, but with only three crosses on the bend. See Thoroton's Notts. III, 28.

102. SR. EDMOND TRAFFORD: silver a griffin rampant gules.

So blazoned for him in Ballard's roll of Edward IV. See VCH, Lancas., vol. IV, p. 332 and notes there upon the six sir Edmunds. For "the Trafford legend" see *The Ancestor*, vols. IX, X and XII.

103. Sr. RAUF LANGFORD: paly gold and gules a baston silver.

So blazoned for him in Ballard's roll of Edward IV date, and for "sir Nicol Langeford" in Powell.

104. Sr. RAUF RADCLIFF: silver two bends engrailed sable.

So blazoned in Glover Ord. for sir John Radcliff of Wodeshall. The differenced shield of Radcliffe of Radcliffe who bore silver a bend engrailed sable. See VCH, Lancas., V, 58 ff., and ibid., p. 13.

105. WYKERSLEY: silver a cross crosslet sable.

So blazoned for this name in Glover Ord.

106. ROBERT DOKINFELD: silver a cross humetty pointed and voided sable.

Blazoned in Glover Ord. for Dukinfield, a Cheshire family of Dukinfield Hall in that county. See also FVY 401, where the shield is blazoned in precious stones.

107. HYDE DE NORBERY HALL: azure a fess between three lozenges gold.

Blazoned in Ballard's roll of Edward IV but with a chevron in place of the fess. Norbury is in Cheshire. See Ormerod's Cheshire III, 810; FVY 402.

108. J. DORAND (later hand "Durant of Tongcastle this"): sable a fess danced gold in chief three fleurs-de-lis gold.

Durant of Tong, Shropshire. The shield does not appear in rolls earlier than this, but see FVY 401.

- 109. Ryc. Akton: gyronny gules and gold.

 Blazoned for "Okedon" in Pap. 809.
- 110. Lasy de Gaytford: sable a fess danced and in chief three fleurs-de-lis silver.

This is not a shield of any known Lacy family but a Durant coat as no. 108.

III. T. DOWNTON: barry gold and gules.

This is the well-known shield of Fitz Alan of Bedale (no. 175 below). The Downton arms are quite different. (See Burke.) The Downtons of Shropshire bore silver three piles sable each charged with a goat's head rased silver horned gold. (H XXVIII, p. 167.)

112. T. WARCOPPE of Lambersyde: silver a fess gules between three cushions ermine.

For an account of family see NBWC I, 554. This shield is not elsewhere recorded, the family usually bearing the cushions on the fess, the colours varying for each branch. It is one of the numerous Cumberland shields deriving probably from the cushions of Graystoke. See FVY, pp. 405 and 642.

Fo. 44v 113. DUFFELD of Yorke: sable a chevron between three doves silver beaked gules.

So given in Glover Ord. for Duffield of Coverham, Yorkshire. The shield of William Duffield, archdeacon of Cleveland, who died 1452, is, as here, in York minster. (FVY 430.)

114. ELIZABETH BOLDE of Barton: sable a fess indented of five fusils silver.

There appears no other record of this shield. The Bolds of Bold, Lancashire, bore silver a griffin sable. For Barton and Elizabeth Bold see VCH, Lancas., III, s.v.; Baine's Lancaster V, 24; H, XVIII, pp. 33/35; and FVY 400.

115. Multon: barry gules and silver.

Lords of Egremont and Gilsland and other manors in Cumberland. There is an account of family in NBWC II, 73 ff., and a pedigree in PHY 399. The shield is first blazoned for Thomas Multon of Egremont in Falk. See pedigree CDP 142.

116. HYLL of Somersetshire: gules a lion rampant gold, over all a bend gobony silver and azure.

The arms of the Somerset family are a chevron between three garbs, colours varied for the different branches.

117. MISPERTON: gules a bend fusilly silver.

An inscription commemorating Walter de Misperton was in the church of Kirkby next Fletham. (FVY 462.)

118. J. Welles: silver a chevron sable between three "wells" (?) gules.

This shield is not elsewhere on record. A shield like it is borne by a Hampshire family of the name.

- 119. J. STALBY: silver a chevron ermine between three escallops sable.
- 120. Sr. J. Salven of Kyllome: silver a crescent azure on a chief sable two molets gold pierced gules, a border engrailed gules.

The differenced shield of the Salvins of Newbiggin, Yorkshire. (FVY 367.) The editor cannot trace the bearer, but he may be the sir John Salvayn who was a younger son of sir Gerard Salvayn of North Duffield, who gave evidence in the Scrope v. Grosvenor case. Borough. gives the border indented and without the crescent for "sire Gerard de Salveyn." For other differences see FVY 404.

121. SARNSBERY: silver three fusils in fess gules, over all a baston sable.

Without the baston this is the shield of the Montagu earls of Salisbury. Probably the name is a mistake for Salisbury.

122. HORNEBY: silver a fess between three stringed horns sable.

The charges were borne by various families of the name with various differences. There is no record earlier than this for this shield.

123. Sr. GILBERT GAUNTE: barry gold and azure a baston gules.

The last sir Gilbert Gaunt of Folkingham, etc., Lincolnshire, died s.p. March 1297/98. (CP V, 626.) This shield is blazoned for him in Parl. See no. 717 post.

124. Bertun Hucod: gules a chevron ermine between three escallops silver.

Pap. 416 gives this shield, without a reference, for Milborne.

125. Bertun Hucod: azure on a bend silver three crosses patonce gules.

There must be some error in the name given for this suield and the one above. There is no such surname, and this shield is not elsewhere recorded.

- 126. Ryc. Burser: paly silver and azure a baston gules.

 The shield of Annesley as blazoned in Will.
- 127. Sr. WILLM. NORMANVILL: silver on a fess doubly cotised gules three fleurs-de-lis silver.

Blazoned for Ralph Normanville in Jen. Pedigree in FVY 348. See also Test. Ebor. II, 138. (SS)

128. Scyrlow: silver a cross of six interlacing bastons.

The shield of Skirlaw, bishop of Durham (1388-1405). It appears often on the cloister roofs at Durham (DM, pp. 53, 54 and passim), and also upon his seals (DS, nos. 3144-47).

129. Langley: paly silver and vert.

The shield of Langley of Langley, Yorkshire, afterwards of Sheriff Hutton, Yorkshire, and of Higham-Gobion, Beds. It was also the shield of Thomas Langley, bishop of Durham (1406-37), who differenced it with a silver molet. Pedigree SS XXXVI, 300. See also DS, nos. 3148-51, and DM, pp. 48/49. See no. 719 below.

- 130. Baron of Baynton of Wold: silver on a chevron sable three molets gules.
- 131. T. MOUNTENAY: gules a bend between six martlets gold.

Sir Thomas Mounteney bore this shield at Borough. Pedigree Hunter's *Doncaster* I, 55. See also FVY, pp. 340, 343 and 649.

Fo. 45

132. RAWDON: sable gutty silver on a chevron silver three bulls' heads caboshed gules.

There is no other record of this shield. The Rawdon shield bears pheons with various differences, as in Jen. See pedigree and note FVY 565.

133. Sr. Robert Laybourne: gules six lions rampant silver.

Blazoned in Calais, Parl. and Will. The family were of Cunswick, parish of Kendal, Westmorland. An account of the family is given in NBWC I, 144 ff. There is a pedigree in FCW, pp. 81/82. This shield may here be for that Robert who was M.P. for Westmorland 1422/23. See also FVY 44.

134. REIGNOLD COBHAM: gules on a chevron gold three stars sable.

For sir Reynold Cobham, lord Cobham of Sterborough, a founder of the Garter. (KG, plate XXXII.) The shield is also blazoned for him in Calais. See Memorials of the Family of Cobham (Col. Top. et Gen. VIII, 320 ff.); also CP III, 338 ff.

135. TROULOPE of Thornley: vert a stag's head caboshed, a border engrailed gold.

Pedigree SD I, pp. 92/93. The Visitations give for the family vert three bucks passant silver. This is probably their earlier shield. It is not recorded elsewhere.

136. MUNDEVILL: azure a fret gold.

Blazoned for Amondeville of Notts, in Glover Ord. See Thoroton's Notts. I, 360.

137. Belton: gold on a bend sable three hawks'-bells gold.

So blazoned in Glover Ord.

138. STOKYS: sable three spread eagles silver, a chief indented silver.

Given in Glover Ord. for Stokes of Essex.

- 139. ROSLYN: silver on a bend gules three buckles silver.

 Blazoned for Roscelyn in Glover Ord.
- 140. BAGULEY: gold a fess between three lozenges azure.

 Blazoned without the fess in Glover Ord. The above shield is not recorded elsewhere.
- 141. T. Bercar of Scarburge: gules on a cross patonce gold three annulets sable.

Given for "Barker" in Glover Ord.

142. ROGOR SALVEN modo Doffeld: silver on a chief sable two molets gold pierced gules.

The shield of the Salvayns of North Duffield in the East Riding, afterwards of Newbiggin (FVY 36) and of Croxdale, co. Durham (FVD 75). It is blazoned as here in Parl. and in later rolls.

143. Convers of Sokbourne: azure a maunch gold.

So blazoned for sir John and sir Robert Conyers in Parl. Sockburn is in co. Durham upon the banks of the Tees. Pedigree of family SD III, 245/49. For monuments in church see DM, p. 57 ff. See no. 68 above.

144. J. Newsome: azure on a fess silver three crosses crosslet gules.

So blazoned for "John de Newson" in Jen.

145. CLYTHEROWE: gules a saltire engrailed gold.

Fo. 45^v

Blazoned with the saltire plain for Robert Clyderow in Glover Ord. The engrailed saltire was one of the quarterings of Gascoigne borne for Clitherow of Salesbury, Lancs. (FVY 238.)

146. Bethome: azure a chief indented silver.

This shield is not elsewhere recorded, though Burke gives a similar one for Betham of Lancs. It may be for Betham of Betham in Westmorland. An account of this family is given in NBWC I, pp. 222 and 626.

147. T. CLYFTON: sable on a bend silver three crescents sable.

With the crescents gules this shield is given for "M. Nycol de Clyfton" in Will. It is apparently a differenced shield of Clifton of Clifton in Lancashire, who bore molets on the bend. See FVY 401.

148. Bastarde de Clarence: per chevron gules and azure in chief two lions rampant facing, gold, in base a fleur-de-lis gold.

The shield of sir John of Clarence, natural son of Thomas "of Lancaster," second son of Henry IV, and duke of Clarence; he was killed at Beaugy 1421. It is made up from the royal shield. (Sandford's Genealogical History, p. 311.)

149. Sr. Ryc. Goldysburge: quarterly I and IV azure a cross patonce silver; II and III silver three chevrons sable.

Of Goldsborough, Yorkshire. Pedigree FVY 369. This shield, but without the quartering, is blazoned for this man in Will. It appears as here in EL. For families who bore II and III see Pap. 549. See no. 22 above.

150. Baron of Whate: barry silver and azure in chief three lozenges gules.

This shield is not recorded elsewhere.

151. T. Lamtun: sable on a fess between three lambs silver, a rose gules.

The differenced shield of Lambton of Lambton, co. Durham. Pedigrees FVD 205/07; SD II, 174. The shield is not recorded earlier than here.

152. Bekard of Boleby: gold a saltire gules between four spread eagles azure.

Blazoned for "Sire...Becard" in Parl., and for Piers Becard in Jen. For another shield see FVY 400.

153. WILLM. THORNELL: gules two bars gemell silver on a chief silver an annulet sable.

The arms of Thornhill of Fixby, Yorkshire, differenced by the annulet. They are given for sir Brian Thornhill in Powell. Pedigree CVY, p. 79 ff. with notes.

- 154. DE LEHYLER: silver a fess between two chevrons vert.

 This shield is not recorded elsewhere. The name seems to be an error in copying.
- 155. LORD CROMWELL: quarterly I and IV silver a chief gules and a baston azure—Cromwell; II and III checky gold and gules a chief ermine—Tattershall.

For Ralph lord Cromwell of Tattershall (1398-1417). He was son of Ralph Cromwell and his wife Maud, sister and heir of Willm. Bernake of Tattershall. (CP III, 552.) This shield is blazoned for him in Will. as "Monsr. Rauf Cromwell le Sr. de Tatirshale," but there the quarters are reversed, Tattershall being I and IV.

156. OLYVER de Hyngham, Ingland: gold a cross patonce gules.

Hingham is in Norfolk. The shield is given in Will. and Glover Ord. for Freville.

157. RAUF CAUSTON: bendy sable and silver.
So blazoned for "Cawston" in Glover Ord.

158. Sr. A. Mounfort: silver crusilly gules and a lion rampant azure.

So blazoned for "sir Alisander Mountfort" in Powell. See VCH, North Riding, I, 316. Pedigree, with differenced shield, FVY 248.

Fo. 46

159. LORD MAULEY: gold a bend sable.

So blazoned for "sir Peres de Mauley" in Falk, as well as in later rolls for his successors. Pedigree CDP 132.

160. Sr. Robert Lowther: gold six annulets sable.

Blazoned for sir Hugh Lowther, probably this man's father, in Jen. Ord. Sir Robert Lowther was living 1425/26. See account of family in NBWC I, pp. 428/37. The shield is derived from that of Vipont.

161. Sr. Edmond Hastinges: silver three maunches sable.

Blazoned gold three maunches gules for Esmond Hastings in Jen. Ord. H XVI, 153 gives silver a fess between three maunches sable for Hastings of Rowesby, Yorkshire. See also FVY 402.

162. Sr. Robert Ughtred: quarterly I and IV gules on a cross patonce gold five molets gules; II and III azure crusilly and three palmer's staffs paleways gold.

Lords of the manor of Coxwold in the North Riding, held under the Colvills, whose shield they differenced by adding the molets to the cross. Robert Ughtred was living 1455. (VCH, North Riding, II, 14/15.) Shield blazoned in Parl. II and III are the arms of Burdon, see no. 193. See FVY 441/42 for same shield.

163. SIR J. LANGTON: gules a chevron ermine between three lions rampant gold.

Blazoned in the Military roll of Henry VI for . . . Langton, a (?) Yorkshire knight. See FVY 402.

164. Sr. J. Kighley: silver a fess sable.

A Lancashire family, and also of Keighley, Yorkshire. The shield is blazoned as here in Ballard's Edward IV roll and also in Jen. Ord. See also FVY, pp. 402, 645.

165. Sr. T. Talbott: silver three lions rampant purpure.

Of Bashall in Lancashire. Blazoned for members of the family in Parl., and for this man in Will. See also FVY, pp. 641, 643, 648 and 405.

166. ROBERT LAWRENCE: quarterly I and IV silver a cross raguly gules; II and III silver two bars gules in chief three molets gules.

Quarters I and IV are blazoned as here in Ballard's roll of Edward IV. The family were of Ashton, Lancs. Quarters II and III bear the shield of Washington. The editor cannot trace the connection. See also no. 593 post.

167. Sr. J. Bygotte: gold on a cross gules five escallops silver.

Blazoned for Ralph Bigod of Settrington, Yorkshire, in Glover and in later rolls. There is a pedigree of family in PHY 254 and FVY 595.

168. Sr. A. COVELL: gold on a fess gules three lions rampant gold.

The shield of Colvile. It is blazoned as here for "sire Thomas de Colevile" in Parl., and for "Thomas Colevile de Cokewold" in Jen. Ord. Coxwold is in the North Riding. See VCH, North Riding, II, 14.

169. J. LAYTON of Melsonby: silver on a fess sable between six crosses crosslet fitchy sable a cinquefoil silver.

The differenced arms of Layton of West Layton. The shield is given in Grim. for Thomas de Laton but without the difference. There is a pedigree of the West Layton family in PHY 450, and of branches in FVY, pp. 258/9 and FCW. For Melsonby see VCH, North Riding, I, 105 ff.

170. Sr. ROBERT MULCASTER: barry silver and gules a bend azure.

This shield is not recorded earlier than this. They were a Cumberland family originally. Pedigree Harl. MS. 1554, fo. 20.

171. Sr. NICHOLAS RADCLIF of Derwentwater: quarterly I and IV silver a bend engrailed sable; II and III silver two bars gules on a canton gules a cinquefoil silver.

He was a younger son of Thomas Radclyffe of Wymersley, and married *circa* 1417 the heiress of Derwentwater. (AA, 2nd ser., II, 138.) Quarters I and IV are for Radclyffe, blazoned for "sir James Radcliff del Tour" (Lancs.) in Glover Ord. Quarters II and III are for Derwentwater, blazoned for "John Derwentwater," the heiress's father, in Will.

172. Christopher Spencer: azure a bend engrailed and flory silver.

These arms do not appear elsewhere for the name.

173. HALYDAY: silver a cross gules between four fleurs-delis sable.

This shield is not recorded except for Fenton of Yorkshire. (Pap.)

174. Crofte: lozengy sable and silver.

Borne by "Nicholas de Crofte" in Ballard's roll of Edward IV. See VCH, Lancaster, IV, 101/2.

175. FFITZ ALLAYNE de Bedall: barry gold and gules.

So blazoned for Brian le Fitz Alan in Falk. and Caer. and in later rolls. There is an account of manor in VCH, North Riding, I, 293, and a pedigree in PHY 364. See no. III.

176. TALBOT of Devonshire: silver a chevron between three talbots sable.

Pap. 368 states that this shield was granted to Thomas Talbot, co. Devon, in 1584, a family descended from Talbot of Bashall, Lancs. The arms have evidently an older user than that though they are not recorded earlier than here.

177. Lascels of Eskyrke: silver three chaplets gules.

Fo. 46^v

Escrick in the East Riding, wapentake of Ouse and Derwent. These arms are blazoned for the family in Jen. Pedigree SS 144, p. 33; FVY 61.

178. Sr. M. Harington: quarterly I and IV sable fretty silver and a label of three points gules; II and III silver a cross patonce sable.

In Parl. "sire Michel de Haveringtone" bears the arms on quarters I and IV but with the label *gold*. He was of the Cumberland family of Harrington in that county. Quarters II and III bear the arms of Banastre, but the editor cannot trace the marriage. There is an account of the family in NBWC II, 50. See no. 36 above.

179. RICHARD HAUGHTON: barry sable and silver.

Of Haughton, Cheshire. The shield is not recorded earlier than this. Pedigree H XVIII, 121, and Ormerod's *Cheshire* II, 291.

180. STRYKLAND: sable three escallops silver.

Blazoned in Powell and Will. for Thomas and Walter Strickland. They were of Sizeagh in the parish of Kendal, Cumberland. There is an account of the family in NBWC, p. 88 ff. See also FVY 404.

181. Argham: silver a chevron between three birds sable.

This shield is borne as a quartering by Constable of Everingham, where it is given for sir Richard Argum, whose eventual heiress married sir Marmaduke Constable, living 1355. (FVY 178.)

182. ROBERT KYGHLAY: silver on a fess sable an annulet silver.

Blazoned without the annulet for sir Edward Kighley in Ballard's roll of Edward IV, and for William in Jen. Ord. With a fleur-de-lis on the fess it is for Lawrence Kighley in FVY 645. Pedigree Whitaker's *Craven*, 205.

183. R. Hupsall: gules a chevron between three molets gold.

This is an error; no. 184 is for Upsale. This shield is given by Glover for Anners of Cheshire as well as other families. (Pap. 460.)

184. R. Hupsall: silver a cross sable a fleur-de-lis sable in the quarter.

Blazoned for Upsale (sir Geoffrey and sir John) in Nativity and Parl. without the fleur-de-lis.

185. NEVILL of Wymigley (Wymersley): gold a fess indented of five fusils gules.

This shield is not in the printed rolls. In 1343 Philip Neville of Lincolnshire sealed with these arms (Drummond's Norman Nevilles, p. 34), and in Parl. sir Philip Neville of Lincolnshire bears silver a fess danced gules and a bend sable.

186. Beckwith of Clynte: silver a chevron between three hinds' heads rased gules.

Blazoned in Glover Ord. Pedigree FVY 280. Clint in parish of Ripley, West Riding.

187. WM. MOUGNE: silver a bend between six molets gules.

So blazoned in Jen. for "John Moyne."

188. LORD CAMOYS: ermine on a chief gold three roundels gules.

The field should be silver not ermine. Blazoned in Grim. and other rolls of Edward III and later. The shield here is for Thomas lord Camoys; died 1421. (CP II, 508.) See also nos. 253 and 716.

- 189. MULIENS: azure a chevron between three molets gold. Pap. 460 gives these arms for Muliens or Mullins. The shield is not in the printed rolls of arms.
- 190. Bradeley of Naunby: silver a chevron sable.

 See FVY 400.
- 191. J. DAWNEY: silver on a bend cotised sable three annulets silver.

This shield is as FVY 401. It is the coat of Dawnay of Carrick (Cowick), Yorkshire, and afterwards of Sessay. Pedigree FVY 80/81. See also Shirley's Noble and Gentlemen of England 304. For Sessay see VCH, North Riding, I, 447/48.

192. Kelke: silver a fess between three escallops gules.

This shield is not given elsewhere for this family. Pap. 681 blazons the shield without the fess for Kelke of Barnaby, Lincolnshire. But the Visitation arms are given as sable a bend flory silver for Kelke of Barnetby, Lincolnshire. See also FVY 444. (H, LI, p. 555.)

193. J. Burdon: azure crusilly and three "bourdons" gold.

Fo. 47

Blazoned as here for William Burdon in the Military roll of Henry VI and in Jen. See also DS, nos. 468/69, and AA, 3rd ser., I, p. 119. Pedigree SD III, 416.

194. WYLLOBY: gules a cross moline silver.

Blazoned for sir Robert Willoughby in Parl. and the Military roll of Henry VI. For note upon the arms of the family see AA, 3rd ser., III, 24I.

195. Aslaby of the Bisshopryke of Durham: gules three lozenges silver.

Of Aislaby, near Egglescliff, co. Durham. The shield is not recorded earlier than this roll except on the effigy of a knight of the family circa 1320, in the church of Egglescliffe. (AA, 4th ser., VI, p. 23.) There is an account of the family SD III, 201/2. See also FVY 262. The last of the family died 1410.

196. ROBERT PERVINGE: sable three molets and a border engrailed gold.

Given in Pap. 996 for "Perwinke," and in FVY 403 for Perwings.

197. HATFELD: Ermine on a chevron sable three pierced cinquefoils gold.

So blazoned in Glover Ord. and FVY 402. They were originally of Hatfield in Holderness. The family of Laughton in le Morthing bore the chevron engrailed. (CVY III, 326.) For Thomas of Hatfield, bishop of Durham, see AA, 4th ser., IV, p. 12.

198. Sr. J. Penyngton: gold a fess indented of five fusils azure a label of three points gules.

So blazoned for this man in Jen. Ord. Sir William bore the arms without the label in Parl. They were of Mulcaster, Cumberland. See NBWC II, 19 ff., and FVY 403.

199. Sr. Ric. Kirkby: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a cross moline gold.

So given for him in Will. There is a pedigree in SS XLI, p. 92, which is repeated in FCW, p. 71. For account of family see *The Genealogical Magazine* III, p. 494 ff.

200. Sr. Robert Bampton: silver a bend indented azure.

Given in Glover Ord. for this name, but the editor cannot

Given in Glover Ord. for this name, but the editor cannot identify the family. The family of Norfolk bore quite different arms.

201. Sr. T. Whytinge: silver fretty gules and a canton gules.

Blazoned for "sir Thomas Quitrige" in Glover Ord., and for "Whytryg" FVY 405.

202. Sr. WM. ESMONDE: silver a fess engrailed between three martlets sable.

This appears to be an error; the Esmonds, whether of England or Ireland, bore quite a different shield. The one here blazoned is given for the family of Osmunderlay in Glover Ord. as well as in FCW 97. They were an old Cumberland family long settled at Langrigg in that county.

203. Sr. J. Terreby: silver on a chief azure three bougets gold.

These arms with a star in base are given by Pap., p. 695, for this name. No reference is given.

204. Sr. J. OF ORTON: azure a lion rampant silver.

Blazoned for '' \sin John de Orton'' in Jen. Ord. Probably of Orton, Cumberland.

205. Sr. J. WARWICKE: vert three lions rampant silver.

These arms are given in FCW 139 for the family at the 1665 Visitation. They were of Warwick, Cumberland. See NBWC II, 327. This man was living temp. Edward IV, another John in Richard II's time. See also FVY 405.

206. Sr. T. Blenkansope: silver a fess between three sheaves sable.

So blazoned in Glover Ord. and in Jen. The family were of Blenkinsop, Northumberland. There is a pedigree in HN II, iii, 131. This was probably the Thomas who witnessed a deed in 1431. A rude effigy of one of the family is in the church of Haltwhistle. (AA, 4th ser., VII, p. 14.)

207. Sr. J. IREBY alias Middleton of Stokeld: silver fretty sable and a canton sable.

These arms are blazoned for "John de Irby" in Will. The same shield is given for "Pieres de Midelton" in Jen. Ord. John Irby was sheriff of Cumberland between 1388/95 for several years, as well as M.P. for the shire. There is an account of the place and family in NBWC II, 127 ff. For Middleton of Stokeld see FVY 286.

208. Sr. Christopher Moresby: sable a cross silver a cinquefoil silver in the quarter.

Blazoned for sir Hugh Moresby in Powell, and for "Xtopher de Apre'sby" (probably an error for this man) in Will. They were of Moresby, Cumberland. See AA, 3rd ser., III, 278, and FVY 403.

209. SR. H. MALTON: sable a lion rampant gold on a Fo. 47" border silver eight annulets sable.

Blazoned with the lion silver in Powell for sir Henry Malton.

210. Sr. J. Brune: silver a lion rampant azure billetty gules.

Blazoned with the colours reversed and gouts on the lion in place of billets for "sir Richard le Brune" in Jen. Ord.

211. SR. RICHARD DENTON: silver two bars gules in chief three cinquefoils sable pierced silver.

> So blazoned for him in Powell. The family was of Denton, Cumberland. See NBWC II, 318. Pedigree FCW 38. See nos. 219 and 282.

212. WILLM. STAPILTON: silver three swords gules the hilts to the centre.

> Blazoned for him in Jen. and in FVY 404 for "Stapleton of Edenhall." They were a Cumberland family, distinct from the Yorkshire family, who bore a lion rampant.

213. J. Eglesfeld: silver three spread eagles gules.

Blazoned for "John de Eglesfield" in Jen. They were a Cumberland family and there is a later pedigree in FCW 42.

214. WILLM. THANYTON: silver a cross sable fretty gold.

This name should be Thwaites, for whom, with the fret silver, the shield is blazoned in Jen. Ord. They were of Thwaites, Westmorland. There is a pedigree in FCW 133, and for a branch of Rydale, Yorkshire, in FVY 175.

215. WILLM. MARTINDALL: barry of six silver and gules and a baston azure.

> Blazoned for him in Jen., but there with the baston sable as in FVY 403. They were a Cumberland family. There is a pedigree in H, XXXVIII, 724. See also NBWC I, 410.

216. I. Blenerhaysett: gules a chevron ermine between three dolphins silver.

> So blazoned in Glover Ord. A Cumberland family originally of Blennerhassett and Flimby in that county. NBWC II, 109. Arms FVY 400.

217. WILLM. SWYNBURNE: sable a fret ermine.
As in FVY 405.

218. ROULAND VAUX: silver a bend checky gold and gules.

Blazoned for him in Jen. It is the shield of Vaux of Gilsland, and is given for Vaux of Triermain, Cumberland, in FCW, p. 136. See also NBWC II, 488.

219. WILLM. DENTON: silver two bars gules in chief three martlets gules.

So blazoned in FCW for Denton of Cardew, Cumberland. An incised slab at Ainstable, Cumberland, for John de Denton bears these charges upon the shield. (Foster's Some Feudal Coats of Arms, p. 76.) See also ante no. 211 and post 282.

220. T. Sandes: silver a fess danced between three crosses crosslet fitchy gules.

Blazoned for "Richard de Sandes" in Jen. They were a Cumberland family originally of St. Bees. Pedigree FCW 116 ff.

221. J. SALKELD: vert fretty silver.

So blazoned for him in Jen. They were a Cumberland family originally of Salkeld. Pedigree FCW 112. See also NBWC II, 122 and p. 100 above.

222. ROBERT HOTON: gules on a canton silver a bird sable.

This shield is given by Pap. 358 for Hutton of Cumberland; no reference is given. It is not the coat of either of the Cumberland families whose pedigrees are recorded.

223. ROULAND THIRLWALL: gules a chevron between three swines' heads rased silver.

So blazoned in Jen. He owned Thirlwall castle in 1415 (AA, 2nd ser., XIV, 15) and was living in 1433 (HN II, iii, 145). Two tombstones of the family are in the church of Haltwhistle with this shield upon them. (NC Proc., 4th ser., III, 134 ff. and plates.) The shield is derived from the canting arms of Swinburn, differenced by the chevron.

224. T. Delamore: gules a cross patonce silver an escallop silver in the quarter.

This shield is blazoned for John de la Mare in Jen. It is one of the quarterings given in FCW 136 for Vaux of Caterlyn. In the pedigree there, William de Vaux married the heiress of . . . Delamore circa 1479.

225. Sr. Mathew Whitffld: gold a bend sable between Fo. 48 two cotises engrailed sable.

So blazoned in Glover Ord. He was owner of Whitfield Tower, Northumberland, in 1415 (AA, 2nd ser., XIV, 19), sheriff of the county in 1433. See pedigree HN II, iii, 101 and p. 94 above.

226. NICHOLAS RIDLEY: gules a chevron between three falcons silver.

> The arms are those of Ridley of Hard Riding, Northumberland. For the arms of the Willimoteswick branch see p. 95 above. See also FVN, pp. 103/5. Pedigree HN II, iii, 339. There were three generations bearing this Christian name in the early fifteenth and late fourteenth centuries.

227. ALEXANDER FFETHERSTONHAUGH: gules a chevron between three feathers silver.

> The family are of Fetherstonhaugh castle, Northumberland. Pedigree HN II, iii, 354, and FVN 53.

228. T. Broughton: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a cross engrailed silver.

Blazoned for "John de Broughton" in Jen. They were of Broughton, Staffs. Pedigree Visits. of Staffs. (William Salt Society).

229. T. BARDEZAY: silver two bars gules and in chief a cross crosslet fitchy gules, on a canton gules a maunch silver.

> Blazoned in Glover Ord. for Bardesey of Lancashire. ? Bardesley near Ashton under Lyne.

230. T. LEWYNGTON: gold a saltire gules on a chief gules three boars' heads rased gold.

> These arms are not recorded earlier than this roll. The family were of Kirk Levington (Kirklinton), Cumberland. See NBWC II, 461.

231. WILLM. BYSETT: gules on a bend silver three escallops sable.

Given for sir William Byset in Glover Ord. John Wentworth of Elmsall married the heiress of Bissett. This shield is in quarter five of their arms. (FVY 378.)

232. Sr. J. Lancaster: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a lion passant guardant gold.

> John de Lancaster was one of the barons at Caer., where his banner was displayed. He also sealed the baron's letter of the Pope (1301). The shield is blazoned here for one of the Cumberland family of Rydale. See pedigree FCW 46.

233. J. Malerheyn: sable three collared greyhounds courant silver.

Given in Will, for Robert Maleverer. The family of Wodersome, Yorkshire, bore the shield of the tinctures here given. See FVY 200. The branch of Allerton bore the field gules.

234. Hugh Salkeld: silver a fret and a chief gules.

So blazoned for "sir Richard Salkeld" in Glover Ord. This shield is borne in the second quarter in the Visitation shield of 1615, FCW 112. See also no. 221 above.

235. Sr. Willā. Sandefforth: sable three lions rampant silver.

This shield is blazoned in Pap. for sir John Engleys or English, whose heiress married Edmund Sandford lord of Askham, Cumberland. The Sandfords thereafter seem to have adopted the arms of English, but in the Visitation pedigree of 1665 (FCW 115) they bear a quarterly shield: I and IV Sandford, II and III this shield. This sir William was lord of Askham 1391/92, and died circa 1415/6. (NBWC I, 425.)

236. Jo. Crakenthorp: gold a chevron between three molets azure.

They were lords of the manor of Newbiggin, Westmorland There were several of this Christian name in the early fifteenth century. (NBWC I, 367.)

237. WILLM. BLENKENSOPE: gules six annulets gold, a border engrailed silver.

So blazoned in Jen. Ord. His seal of A.D. 1415 gives the same charges. (Machell MS. I, 411.) The shield is derived from that of Vipont through Musgrave. For an account of the family see NBWC I, 382 ff. For Northumberland family see ante no. 206.

238. Robert Warcoope: sable a chevron between three covered cups silver.

So given in Jen. Ord. for Thomas de Warcop. They were of Warcop, Westmorland. An account of the manor and family is given NBWC I, 602. For the branch of Smardale see ibid. 554. Robert de Warcop was escheator 1421/22.

239. J. Helton: sable three annulets silver a chief (silver) fretty (sable).

In Jen. John Hilton of Westmorland bore sable three annulets gold in chief two saltires silver. The shield here given is differenced from this by the fretty chief. It does not appear earlier than here. The Heltons or Hiltons were of Helton, Helton Bacon, and Burton, Westmorland, and originally held under the Viponts, hence the annulets on their shield. For account of family see NBWC I, p. 353 ff. and 611 ff.; detailed pedigree Longstaffe's Darlington, after p. 374; also FCW 60/61.

240. J. WHELPDALE: silver three whelps courant gules collared gold.

These arms do not appear in the rolls earlier than here. The family were of Cumberland, and this shield was borne by Roger Whelpdale, bishop of Carlisle, 1419-23.

241. Robert Alanby: silver a chevron engrailed azure.

Fo. 48v

Borne by Thomas of Alanby in Jen. with a border engrailed azure. Alanby is in the parish of Bromfield, Cumberland. (NBWC II, 162, and VCH.) The branch of Etton, Yorkshire, bore a chevron between three chess-rooks. (FVY 122.)

242. F. Preston: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a cinquefoil gold.

The family were of Preston Richard and Preston Patrick, parish of Heversham, Westmorland. For an account see NBWC I, 212 and 239.

243. WILLM. SUTHAYKE: silver a fess danced gules.

The shield is given for numerous families in the printed rolls but not for any family of this name. (See Pap. II, 701.)

244. Sr. H. RETFORD: silver fretty sable and a chief sable.

Given for "Mous. Henri de Rydford" in Will., and for sir Henry de Radford in Glover Ord.

245. ROBERT THORNTON of Est Newton: silver a chevron sable between three thorn leaves vert.

Pedigree FVY 296, where this shield is given. The arms were granted to Robert Thornton of East Newton, Yorkshire, 4 October 1563.

246. T. AGLABY: quarterly I and IV silver on a chief azure three bougets gold; II and III silver two bars and in chief three martlets sable.

Quarters II and III bear the arms of Aglionby and are so blazoned in Jen. Ord. The family were of Aglionby in the parish of Warwick, Cumberland; there is a short account of them in NBWC II, 327. Pedigree FVCW, p. 1; see also FVY 400. Quarters I and IV the editor cannot identify.

247. PLAYS of Egtoun: silver a chevron between three roundels sable.

Given, without reference, for Place of Singleton, Yorkshire, in Pap. 464. Egton is in North Riding, near Whitby. For account of manor see VCH, North Riding, II, 343 ff. FVY 403 gives the arms for "Place of Aughton."

248. J. Ardington: silver a fess between three escallops sable.

Now Arthiugton in the West Riding. There is a pedigree of the family in SS XLI, p. 21. The colours there given are gold and gules.

249. STOKYS of Bykerton: silver a fess gules between three escallops azure.

Blazoned, with the fess checky gold and azure, in Glover Ord. Bickerton is in the parish of Bilton (Ainsty), West Riding.

250. Sr. F. HASRYHT: silver a chief indented sable.

Blazoned for "Harsyk" in Pap. with the field gold. "John de Harsick" bears it as here in Jen. Ord. His brass in Southacre church, Norfolk, A.D. 1384, bears the same arms on the jupon and shield. (Cotman's Sepulchral Brasses of Norfolk and Suffolk, plate x, p. 9.) For account of family see Blomefield's Norfolk VI, 77 ff.

251. VER: silver three pierced cinquefoils gules.

"Simon de Veer" bore this shield with the colours reversed in Charles, and with the cinquefoils ermine in Glover. It is also blazoned gules and silver in Jen. Ord.

252. Erle of Albamarle: gules a cross patonce vair.

Blazoned for "Le Conte d'Aumarle" in Glover. William de Forz, count of Aumale, lord of Holderness (1241-60). See CP I, 355.

253. LORD CAMOVS: ermine on a chief gold three roundels gules. (In a different hand: "on a chief gules three plates.")

Blazoned gold on a chief gules three roundels silver for "Le Sr. Camoyes" at siege of Rouen in 1418. The arms are not blazoned with the field ermine in any other roll. The shield is here probably for Thomas lord Camoys, A.D. 1383-1421. (CP II, 507.) See no. 716 below and no. 188 above.

254. Roclyf Modo Ingleby: silver a chevron between three lions' heads rased gules.

Blazoned for John and Robert of Rocliffe in Parl. and Jen. Ord. Rocliffe is in the West Riding, near Boroughbridge. Pedigree FVY, 383.

255. GOULSELL: barry gold and azure a canton ermine.

Blazoned barry gold and gules a canton ermine for "Nicoll Goushill" in Will. Pedigree SS 144, p. 103.

256. ROBERT NEVILL of Hornby: silver a saltire gules.

This is so given in Jen. Ord. for the same man. The colours are reversed from the shield of the Nevilles of Raby, earls of Westmorland. For Hornby see VCH, North Riding, I, 313 ff.

257. HOLTHORPE: silver on a bend between two leopards' faces sable three chaplets silver.

Fo. 49

258. ROGR. YOLTON: gules three bougets gold.

The shield of Roos of Youlton, Yorkshire, North Riding. For account of family and manor see VCH, North Riding, I, 89. Blazoned in both Glover and Jen. Ords. for Ros Yolton.

259. H. BARLAY of Wyston: silver on a bend gules three sheaves gold.

Given in Pap. 243 for Barley of Derbyshire. The Visitation pedigree gives a different shield for Barley of Barley. (*Genealogist*, N.S., VII, 4.) This is probably a Lincolnshire family.

260. BUTEROWTRE (?): gold a saltire engrailed sable.

This name should be Boutetort. The arms were borne by sir John Botetourt at Falk. and at Caer. as well as in Parl. (Pedigree CP II, 234.)

261. H. Moune: gold a cross engrailed sable.

The arms borne by sir John Mohun of Dunster, Somerset, at Falk. and at Caer. They are also blazoned in later rolls. See *Dunster and its Lords* by Maxwell-Lyte, p. 32 ff.

262. J. Massy: quarterly gules and gold a lion passant in the quarter, silver.

So blazoned for "Hamond Massy" in Jen. Ord. The shield is that of the family of Dunham Massey, Cheshire. See H XVIII, p. 169 ff.; Lanc. Ches. Hist. Socy, N.S., III, 59-158.

263. TRUMPINGTON: azure crusilly and two trumpets gold.

So blazoned in Parl, for "sir Giles Trumpington" of Cambridgeshire. Sir Roger bore the arms at Borough, with a label. The name is from Trumpington, Cambridge. In the church there is the fine brass of sir Roger Trumpington who died 1289.

264. Bassingburne: gyronny gold and azure.

So borne by "sir Warin de Bassingbourne" of Lincolnshire in Parl. In the same roll it is borne argent and gules for others of the name, and vair and gules in Charles.

265. FFITZ WARYN: quarterly per fess indented gules and silver.

Blazoned for sir Fouke Fitzwarin in Powell, for sir William in Borough., and in various of the other rolls. For family see CP V, 495 ff.

266. HARDCOURT: gold two bars gules.

So blazoned for sir John Harcourt in Parl., and for others of the name in other rolls, sometimes with the colours reversed. Pedigree of Staffordshire branch *Visits. of Staffs.* (Wm. Salt Socy.).

267. GERARD STILLINGTON: barry azure and silver and a baston gules.

This seems an error. The Stillington arms were gules a fess between three leopards' heads gold. (FVY 633.) The above is a Grey coat or for Gaunt of Lincolnshire.

268. G. DE LA WARDE: vair silver and azure.

Blazoned for Robert de la Warde in Falk. His banner with this charge was at Caer., and his seal upon the barons' letter to the Pope also bore it. He and his son Simon were summoned to parliament 1299-1334.

269. T. Ufflett: silver on a fess azure three fleurs-de-lis gold.

So blazoned for sir Gerard Ufflete in Parl. and Jen. Ord. There is a pedigree in Metcalfe's Visitation of Suffolk 172.

270. T. Pickwor: silver three picks gules.

Pap. 979 gives these arms for "Pickworth," without reference.

271. R. BINCHESTER: gules a chief embattled silver.

So blazoned in Jen. for Robert of Binchester. A Robert of Bynchester was guardian of the castle and honour of Richmond in 1326/27. (HN III, ii, 300.)

272. Wassingley: ermine on a chief indented gules three fleurs-de-lis gold.

Given in Pap. 574, without reference, for Washingley, co. Huntingdon.

Fo. 49^v 273. F. LE WALSE: gules two bars gemelle silver and a baston silver.

Blazoned for "monsr. Thomas Walshe" in Will., and for Welsh of Wanlip, co. Leicester, in Glover Ord.

274. ROBERT HASTANG: azure a chief gules, over all a lion rampant gold.

Of La Desirée and Badenhall, Staffs. A leader in the Scottish wars of Edward I. His arms are given in Duns. I and in later rolls. His seal appended to the barons' letter to the Pope bears the same charges. For his life see CP VI, 338.

275. Hugh Weryneg (?): gules two bars indented silver and azure (?).

These arms are given for "Hugh Freneyes" in Jen. Ord. The name here given seems to be an error of the copyist.

276. JACOB PIGOD: azure two bars gold in chief three bezants.

Blazoned for sir Baldwin Pigott and John of Doddington, Yorkshire, in Parl. and Jen. Ord. For Pigott of Clotheram see FVY 234.

- 277. WILLM. BIRTHOP: barry of thirteen party per pale argent and sable counter-coloured, a bend gules over all.
- 278. R. Hamarde: gules on a bend silver three chessrooks sable.
- 279. WILLM. LE BRUNE: azure a cross moline gold.

 So blazoned for "sir Morys le Brune" in Duns. I and in Parl. See Morant's Essex I, 99.
- 280. J. Traske: gules a fess between three hammers silver.
- 281. G. Wessington: gules two bars silver in chief three molets silver pierced gules.

Blazoned as here in Jen., and with the colours reversed in Will. There are pedigrees of different branches in PHY 140-45 and SD II, 40.

282. Christopher Denton: silver two bars gules in chief three molets gules.

The differenced shield of the Dentons of Cumberland. See ante nos. 211 and 219.

283. RAUF SPYGURNELL: barry azure and gold in chief a molet silver.

So blazoned for him in Duns. II and in Powell. There is an account of the family in Morant's Essex I, 148, 187.

284. Andrew Sackvell: quarterly gold and gules a baston vert.

Blazoned for him in Duns. I but with the baston vair. They were of Withyam, Sussex. Some account of the family is given in Col. Top. et Gen. III, 295 ff.

285. WILLM. STALINGBURGE: sable a chevron between three crosses crosslet fitchy silver.

Blazoned for him—"William Stallingburgh" in Jen. For "sir Walter Stallingborn" in Powell with the chevron engrailed and the crosses bottonny.

286. ROGER BRERTON: azure a bend between six molets gold.

Blazoned for "sire Willm. Bretoun" in Parl. amongst the Lincolnshire knights, also for "sir Robert Bretoun" in Borough. and for John in Jen. Ord.

287. Braybroke: silver six lozenges (3, 2, 1) gules.

Blazoned for "sire Gerald de Braybrok" with seven lozenges in Parl. amongst the knights of Buckinghamshire, and for Thomas with six lozenges in Powell.

288. F. Merworthe: azure a chevron between nine crosses crosslet silver.

Blazoned silver crusilly sable and a chevron gules for William and John Mereworthe in Planche.

Fo. 50 289. WILLM. BUTTELER: gules a fess gobony silver and sable between six crosses crosslet silver.

Blazoned for "sire Willm. le Botyler" of Shropshire, with the crosses gold, in Parl. In Duns. II it was borne as here by William Boteler. He was of Wem, Shropshire. (CP II, 230.)

290. RICHARD EGBASTON: silver a lion rampant gules, over all a baston sable.

Blazoned for him in Parl. and Borough, with the lion sable and the baston azure, and with a cinquefoil ermine in the latter and silver in the former.

291. ELY RICHMONDE: gules two bars gemelle and a chief gold.

Blazoned first in Glover for "Roald le Connestable de Richemund," and for sir Thomas de Richmonde at Caer. and in Nativity and Parl. According to pedigree in PHY, Elias de Richmond was living A.D. 1267/68.

292. J. DARCY: silver an escutcheon sable in an orle of cinquefoils gules.

Blazoned for sir John Darcy in Duns, I and in Borough. See CP IV, p. 50 ff., and pedigree in PHY 118.

293. Roger Appleby: azure six martlets gold.

Borne by sir Henry Appleby in Duns. I and in later rolls. The editor cannot trace this man, but a Roger Appleby appears as living *temp*. Edward II in PHY 466. They were originally of Appleby upon Tees.

294. MICH. HELAND: silver two bars between nine martlets gules.

The arms of Eland of Eland, Yorkshire. See pedigree FVY 606, also *ibid*. 645.

295. ALLEYN SAUNDESBY: silver fretty azure.

Blazoned as here for "sire Robt. de Sandebi" in Parl. amongst the Lincolnshire knights. Sir Thomas bore the same in Powell.

296. Andrew Chamberlayne: gules a fess between three escallops gold.

So borne by "sire Robt. Chaumberlein" of Lincolnshire in Parl. Sir Richard bore a chevron in place of the fess in the same roll.

297. JWAN LAW.: gold on a chief indented azure three bezants.

So blazoned for sir Thomas Lathom in Powell. See account of family and pedigrees, Col. Top. et Gen. VII, 1 ff.

298. RAUF WELBE: gold a griffin segreant vert.

Pap. 982 gives these arms for Wells, without reference.

299. ROLAND OF ATON: gules a cross patonce silver.

Blazoned for sir William Aton in Parl. It is the later shield of Vesci adopted by William, son of Gilbert Aton and his wife Margery Vesci. Pedigrees Tate's *Alnwich* I, 406; FVY 609; and Cl' I, 324. The editor cannot trace Roland.

300. Samson Stopham: silver a bend sable goutty silver.

Blazoned without the "gouts" on the bend for sir Willm. Stopham, a Yorkshire knight in Parl. In the same roll sir John bore the same shield with a label gold. See also FVY 404.

301. WILLM. BOKINGHAM: ermine three bastons gules.

With the field silver these arms are blazoned for sir Henry Botringham of Cornwall in Parl., and for others of the name in Glover Ord.

302. T. LUDHAM: silver three escutcheons sable.

Blazoned for sir John Loudham of Suffolk in Parl. and also in Powell. Thomas of Ludham was living 1382/83. (Genealogist V, 191.)

303. J. Maleverer: gules a chief gold and a bend checky silver and azure.

Blazoned for sir John Mauleuerer in Parl. and also in Nativity. In the pedigree of Mauleuerer of Allerton (FVY 67) this shield is borne in the second quarter, the first bearing the allusive arms of three greyhounds. There is a note upon the pedigree of the family in *Herald and Genealogist* II, 304.

304. WILLM. DE LA MORE: sable a cross silver.

So blazoned for this man in Jen. Ord.

Fo. 50v 305. Alane of Lindesay: gules a fess checky gold and azure between six crosses crosslet gold.

These arms were borne by sir Alexander Lindsay at Falk. The Scottish family, earls of Crawford, bore the fess checky silver and azure.

306. Adam Hentringham: quarterly silver and sable a bend gules.

Probably for Everingham of Lincolnshire. (Pap. 195.)

307. Hugh Stanton: silver a fess embattled counterembattled sable.

So blazoned for Henry de Staunton in Jen.

308. Willā. Kerdeston: gules a saltire engrailed silver, a label of three points gold.

Blazoned without the label for sir William Kerdeston in Parl., and with the label in the same roll and in Powell for sir Roger Kerdeston. They were of Kerdeston, Norfolk. CP VII, 190 and pedigree *ibid*. 199. See also Blomefield's *Norfolk* X, 112.

309. T. of Morbye: silver on a bend azure three molets gold pierced gules.

Blazoned with a label of five points gules for sir Robert de Morby in Glover Ord.

310. Sr. J. Cobham: ermine three crescents gules on each a bezant.

Blazoned for Thomas de Cobham in Jen., and for sir Hugh Cobham in Glover Ord. For the arms of the lords Cobham see no. 134 above.

311. LAURENCE CHANCY: silver a chevron gules, a border sable bezanty.

So blazoned for Thomas Chancy "baron de Skirpenbeckee" (Skirbeck, Lincolnshire) in Jen. Ord. It is also blazoned for sir Philip of Lincolnshire in Parl.

312. Godfrey Peres: quarterly silver and sable a molet gules in the quarter.

So blazoned for "sir Richard de Pereres" in Borough. and in Parl. amongst the knights of Leicestershire. See also FVY 242.

313. T. BACUN: gules on a chief indented silver three molets sable.

Blazoned with the chief plain for sir Edmond Bacon of Hampshire in Parl. The indented chief does not appear in the rolls.

- 314. Ed. Wandster: sable on a cross patonce gold a martlet gules.
- 315. ROGER HORSLAY: gules three horses' heads erased silver, bridled sable.

So blazoned for Robert Horsley in Jen. For Horsley shields see AA, 3rd ser., VI, 117, and for note upon them ibid. I, 177, also AA, 2rd ser., XIV, 290.

316. T. Busye: ermine on a chief danced gules two escallops gold.

This is a Bassett coat blazoned for sir Edmond Basset in Parl. and for others of the family in Glover Ord., all, however, with only two escallops on the chief. The editor cannot find a family of Busye, nor is any shield blazoned for any similar name in the rolls. The Bussy family bear quite different arms.

317. MILES BELLEWE: sable fretty gold.

So blazoned for John Bellewe in Jen. See Visits. of Devon, ed. by J. L. Vivian. There is an account of the Devonshire family in Burke's Commoners II, 532. See also H, VI, 22. These arms are in quarter five of the shield of Metham FVY 252. See also SS 41, p. 7.

318. Ed. Blankminster: silver fretty gules, a molet at the centre.

Blazoned for "sr. Richard Blancminster" in Nativity and with the fret azure for "sir Reinaud" in Glover. The arms do not appear in later rolls.

319. ROLAND DOUWEDALE: silver a cross moline gules.

Blazoned for "sir John Douwedale" in Parl. and also in Jen. There is an account of the family (Uvedale) in Col. Top. et Gen. V, 241 ff.

320. RAUF DE LA SUCHE: azure bezanty.

This shield, usually blazoned gules bezanty, appears in most of the early rolls. It is given as here for sir Roger in Powell, and for John in Jen. Ord.

Fo. 51 321. ALEXANDER CORBETT: gold two corbies sable, a border engrailed gules.

So blazoned for sir Roger Corbet in Powell.

322. Mane of Sutton: silver a cross patonce azure.

Blazoned for sir John de Sutton in Borough., and for sir Richard of Malpas, Cheshire, in Glover Ord. See Ormerod's Cheshire III, 761.

323. NICHOLAS CANTELOU: gules a fess vair between three leopards' faces reversed jessant fleurs-de-lis.

In Falk, sir Willm, de Cantelou bears the same arms but the leopards' faces are not reversed. It is also blazoned in Parl., but there without the fleurs-de-lis. See CP III, 111. The last Nicholas Cantelou died 1370/71.

324. Ed. ffolyette: gules on a bend silver three crescents sable.

The arms of Foliot lords Foliot were gules a bend silver as blazoned in Parl. and Duns. II. In Jen. Ord. Osmonde Foliot bore the bend between six crescents gold. The shield here given is also differenced from the early shield, but the editor is unable to identify its bearer.

325. WILLM. WYVILL: gules fretty gold a chief gold and a canton gules.

So blazoned for this man in Jen. It is the differenced shield of the family of Burton Constable, Yorkshire, who bore sable three interlaced chevrons vair and the chief without the canton. See FVY 380. The fret and interlaced chevrons are often confused with each other in blazon.

326. Walter Samson: sable a cross moline silver.

Blazoned for sir John Samson, a knight of Yorkshire, in Parl. and Powell with the cross *patonce*. William Samson bore it as here in the Nativity roll of Edward II. See also FVY 404.

- 327. J. HASKAM: gules a fess between three dolphins gold.

 So blazoned for sir William Askham in Glover Ord.
- 328. SR. RICHARD TURBEVILL: silver a lion rampant gules, crowned gold.

So blazoned in Planche and Jen. Ord. for Hugh de Turberville. They were of Dorset and Devonshire. Pedigree H VI and Visits. of Devon, by J. L. Vivian.

329. RAUF GRAY: gules a lion rampant and a border engrailed silver.

Probably for sir Ralph Grey of Heton and Chillingham who died 1443 and whose tomb and effigy yet remain in Chillingham church. It is first blazoned for sir Thos. Grey in Nativity. For armorial seals of family see DS, nos. 1108/13; SND, nos. 325/27 and 856/860. The shield was also borne, with the colours reversed, by sir Wm. Riddell of Northumberland in Borough. and Duns. I. The family of Heton of Northumberland bore the same charges vert and silver, but their shield is not on record earlier than Jen., and their earliest seal is 1347. (SND 399/402.)

330. Sr. Brian Stapleton: quarterly I and IV silver a lion rampant sable charged with a molet gules; II and III azure a lion rampant silver charged with a fleur-de-lis azure.

Probably for that Brian who was aged ten years in 1394. (SS 41, p. 2.) Quarters I and IV are blazoned as here for this man's father in Will. Quarters II and III bear the differenced arms of Peter Brus of Skelton. Miles Stapleton, who died 1314/15, married Sybil, daughter and co-heiress of John Bellew and his wife Ladrina, one of the co-heiresses of Peter Brus. (SS 41, p. 2.)

331. Sr. J. Markenfeld: silver on a bend sable three bezants.

So blazoned in Jen. Ord. Pedigree H XVI, 196; also SS 144, p. 129. This man is probably the father of Thomas Markenfield whose will was proved in 1497 and who lies on a high tomb in Ripon minster beside his wife Elenor.

332. J. ROWTHE: silver on a bend cotised sable three molets silver.

So blazoned for "monsr. John de Routh" in Will. The editor has not been able to trace the family. The arms differ from those given for Routhe of Pollington in FVY 570.

333. J. FFENWYCKE: silver a chief gules and six martlets counter-coloured.

The martlets on the field should be placed two and one. Blazoned for him in Will. His armorial seal is SND 286. Detailed pedigree NCH XII, p. 352.

334. Robert Rockley: lozengy silver and gules and a fess sable.

Blazoned as here in Will., and in different colours with various differences in the armorial rolls from that of St. George. The shield is probably derived and differenced from that of Fitzwilliam. Pedigrees SS 41, 76; FVY 343. See also Hunter's Doncaster II, 282, 286.

335. Bryan Sandforth: per chevron sable and ermine in chief two boars' heads rased gold.

The shield is that of Sandford of Sandford, Shropshire. It is blazoned with different colours in Jen. Ord. See Eyton's Shropshire IX, 424, and for other branches FCW 115 and Hunter's Doncaster I, 310, and FVY 404.

- 336. Sr. J. Budham: silver three escallops sable.
- Fo. 51v 337. WILLM. SWYNBURNE: per fess gules and silver and three cinquefoils counter-coloured.

For sir Will. Swinburn of Capheaton, Northumberland (c. A.D. 1,400-43). Pedigree HN II, i, 232. He owned the castle of Capheaton in 1415. (AA, 2nd ser., XIV, 15.) This shield is blazoned for him in Will. The Swinburn arms form an interesting example of the influences which caused changes in family shields. The earliest shield (c. 1240) of the family bore the canting charges of three swines' heads (Glover). In 1290 John Swinburn bore on a cross five sheaves of cunin, referring to his overlords, the Cumin lords of Tyndale. Finally the family of Capheaton adopted the shield here given, derived from the cinquefoil upon the shields of the Umfraville lords of Prudhoe and Tyndale. (Seals SD 2362/63; SND 740-49.)

338. ROBERT GILBERT: silver on a chevron engrailed azure three crosses moline gold.

This shield appears to be differenced from that of the Devon and Cornwall family, who bore roses upon the chevron. Neither shield is in the rolls.

339. ROBERT FFOKNYGGAM: silver a chevron between three pierced cinquefoils sable.

Folkingham of Barton, Yorkshire. Pedigree FVY 225; H, XVI, 129; Thoresby's *Leeds* 112; also FVY 466.

- 340. WILLM. GRAMORE: silver three lozenges gules.

 So blazoned in Pap. 967 without reference for this name.
- 341. Sr. Piers Dutton: quarterly silver and gules a fret gules upon the gold.

Blazoned for him in roll of Henry VI date. (Genealogist I, 227.) They were of Dutton, Cheshire. Pedigree H XVIII, p. 87 ff. Pedigree of Dutton of Cloughton FVY 241.

342. J. Wycliff: silver a chevron sable between three crosses crosslet gules.

Blazoned with the chevron gules, which is correct, in Grim. (Col. Top. et Gen. I, 328.) This man is probably the John who stands at the head of the pedigree in SS 41, p. 40. He was living in 1444. (CVY II, 353.)

343. RICHARD NORTON: azure a maunch ermine and a baston gules.

This is the shield of Conyers of Hutton Conyers, Yorkshire, differenced by the baston. The Norton pedigree is deduced from the family of Conyers of Sockburn. See SD I, clx and clxi; also PHY 108/9. This man was son of sir Rich. Norton of Norton Conyers, chief justice of the Common Pleas A.D. 1413 (who died 1420); he died 22 September 1438. (FVY 244.) For his tomb and epitaph see YRS XXXIV, 222.

344. J. Grene of Newby: silver a chevron between three fleurs-de-lis sable.

Newby, a manor in the parish of Topcliffe, Yorkshire. (VCH, North Riding, II, 76.) Little is known of the family, but the tombs of a Richard and Robert Green are in Topcliffe church (YRS XXXIV, 220) and the shield is given in Glover Ord.

345. Dīs. J. Bokingham, Lincolīn Epūs: gules a cross bottonnée gold.

He was bishop of Lincoln 1368-98. The shield is blazoned for the surname in Glover Ord.

346. MOLYNEUX: azure a cross moline gold charged with an annulet azure.

Blazoned without the annulet in Jen. and Ballard's roll of Edward IV date. For family see Foster's Lancashire Pedigrees and Baine's Lancashire IV, 216; Thoroton's Nottinghamshire II, 304; also FVY 403.

347. LAURENCE BAXBEY: ermine two bars gules.

As here given the arms are those of Mauduit and Hunter-combe. It is also given FVY 400 for Baxby.

348. WILLM. ELMEDAYN: silver on a bend sable three crescents silver.

Blazoned for this man in Jen. The family were of Elmeden, co. Durham. Pedigree SD III, 55. This is probably the Willm. Elmden who died 1447.

349. J. Baxbey: ermine on a chevron gules three bezants a label of three points.

This name should probably be Baxter, for whom the shield is blazoned in Glover Ord.; they were apparently a family of Notts.

350. HAUSTED: gules a chief checky azure and gold, over all a baston silver.

Blazoned as here for sir Robert Hausted at Duns. I. His son sir John, first baron, bore the bend ermine at Borough, and Duns. II. For account of family see CP VI, 402 and note.

351. J. SWILLINGTON: silver a chevron azure a label of three points ermine.

Blazoned with a fleur-de-lis on the chevron in Parl. for sir Hugh Swillington of Swillington, near Leeds, Yorkshire. There is an account of the family in *Herald and Genealogist* IV, 225 ff. See also YRS XXXIV, p. 23 ff., for the shields then in Swillington church. This shield appears there with others. See also FVY 405.

352. T. CLARELL: gules six martlets silver.

Sir Thomas Clarell of Aldwark, near Tickhill, Yorkshire. The heiress married sir Wm. Fitzwilliam of Sprotburgh, who died 1474. See SS 45, p. 247, and YRS XXXIV, p. 135 and note. The arms are blazoned in Glover Ord.

Fo. 52 353. RAUF PYGOTT: sable three picks silver.

Thus blazoned for Randolph Pigott in Will. The family were of Melmerby and Clotheram in the North Riding. Pedigree PHY, 518. Account of manor and family, VCH, North Riding, I, 222.

354. Sr. Andrew Hougard: sable a molet silver.

This shield does not appear in the rolls of arms. Pap. 689 gives it, without reference, with the field azure for the Norfolk family of Haggard.

355. ALEXANDER NEVILL of Goudaill: gules a saltire silver a molet for difference.

Gowdall is in the parish of Snaith, West Riding. The shield is only differenced by the molet from that of the main branch. The editor has not been able to trace the family.

356. RAUF HOTON of Hoton: gules a chevron between three tasselled cushions silver.

The differenced shield of Hoton of Hoton, Lancashire, who bore a fess gold between three cushions gold. Later it was the shield of Hutton of Marske, Yorkshire, and of the Durham family of the name.

357. ROBERT ROOS of Ingmanthorpe: azure three bougets gold.

The differenced arms of the lords Roos of Hamlake, of whom the lords of Ingmanthorpe were a younger branch. The shield is blazoned with many differences from c. 1240 onwards. For account of family see Thoroton's Notts. III, 207; Herald and Genealogist VII, 535. Pedigree FVY 569, where this shield is given.

358. Sr. Roger Warde: azure a cross patonce gold.

Blazoned for sir John Warde in Parl. and Will. Pedigree SS 144, 143. He was of Givendale, near Ripon. Will proved 10 August 1453. (SS 30, p. 165 and note.)

359. Sr. J. Godarde: ermine a cross patonce sable.

So borne by sir Hugh Godard of Cheshire in Parl. It is one of the quarterings on the shield of Blythe of Rotherham and Eltoft of Farnell FVY, 301, 321

360. MILES GEYNVILL: azure three horse-branks gold on a chief ermine a demi-lion rampant gules.

Blazoned for Geoffrey de Genevill in Nobility roll of Henry VI. For account of family and its origin see CP V, 628 and Genealogist, N.S., XXI.

361. ROLAND SUARDE: sable a cross flory silver.

So borne by sir Richard Syward in Falk., and for others of the family in later rolls.

362. JWAN GAMISTER: gold on a cross gules five molets gold.

This is the shield of Burgh of Galway as given in Pap. 659.

363. T. Heton: gules a lion passant silver.

So blazoned for "Thomas de Heton" in Jen. Ord. Probably of Heaton, Lancashire. See VCH, Lancas., V, 80 and passim.

364. ROBERT HARDISHILL (above shield "Ryvill"): ermine a chevron gules.

This seems to be an error; the shield is that of Touchet, for whom it is blazoned in various rolls. The shield of Hardeshull as borne at Borough. was silver strewn with martlets gules a chevron sable. See next shield.

365. J. RIVILL (above shield "Hardishill"): silver a chevron sable between ten martlets gules.

This is the proper shield of Hardeshull, see number 364 and 434 below. The editor cannot trace Rivill.

366. ALEXANDER BYLAND: gules a cross between twelve billets gold.

This shield is blazoned in Parl. and Jen. for sir Francis Villiers and also for sir Robert in the latter. It is not recorded for Byland, a name the editor cannot trace.

367. Rog. of Aredall: ermine a cross patonce gules.

This is the shield of Gower of Stittenham, Yorkshire. It is also blazoned for sir Walter Grandall of Yorkshire in Jen.

368. WILLM. PARYS: sable crusilly and a chevron silver.

So blazoned for him at Borough. and in later rolls. There is a pedigree in Blomefield's *Norfolk* VII, 116, and in vol. XLIII, p. 62, of Camden Soc. Pubs.

Fo. 52v 369. ROGER MALETT: sable a chevron between three buckles silver.

So borne by sir Robert Malet of Bucks. in Parl. It was also borne in quarters I and IV by Malet of Normanton, Yorkshire, at the Visitation of 1584/5. (FVY 326.) See also H XVI, 194.

370. WILLM. AVENELL: silver a fess between six annulets gules.

It is blazoned as here for sir William Avenel of Cambridgeshire in Parl.

371. OLIVER BACON: gules on a chief silver two pierced molets sable.

Blazoned for sir Edmond Bacon in rolls of Duns. I and II. They were a Norfolk family. Pedigree Blomefield VII, 165.

372. WILLM. TRUSSEBUT: silver a dance between three bougets sable.

Blazoned for this man as here in Powell. Sir Robert in the same roll bears the same shield with a label gules. See Arch. Ael., 2nd ser., III, 277.

373. T. LOVAYNE: gules a fess between ten billets gold.

Blazoned, but with the fess silver, for sir Thomas Loveyn in Borough.

374. J. LA MARLOU: gules a maunch silver.

This is apparently an error for John de la Mare whose shield it is. It is blazoned for him in the rolls from Charles onwards. He was summoned to Parliament 1299-1313; died 1315/16.

375. RICHARD BENEHALL: sable a bend between two cotises wavy silver.

Blazoned for sir Robert Benhall in Duns. I and Calais. Benhall and Benhall Sir Robert are in Suffolk, near Saxmundham. But the sir Robert Benhall of this latter place bore different arms. (CP II, 116.)

376. Laurence Crawell: silver a fess azure between three fleurs-de-lis gules.

Blazoned for "Carwell" in Glover Ord., a Norfolk family.

377. GUY DODINGSELD: silver a fess between three molets gules.

Blazoned with various differences in the rolls for "Dodingsells," sometimes with only one molet, sometimes with two in chief and also as here given.

378. ROLLAND PLASE: azure on a chief silver two chaplets gules.

Blazoned for William Plays in Powell and Jen. Rowland heads the pedigree in SS 41, p. 49, where the arms of Halnaby are given for the family. They afterwards appear to have used the arms of the baronial family named Playz instead of their own. See SD III, 236.

379. Peter Dottringe: azure a fess between two chevrons silver a label of three points gules.

This is the shield blazoned, without the label, for William Tendryng in Will., and for sir John Tendring of Suffolk in Glover Ord. The family were of Boxford, Suffolk. See Metcalfe's Visitations of Suffolk 181.

380. Roger Shepwast (beneath "Cifrwast"): azure three bars gemelle silver and a chief silver.

Blazoned for ''de Syffrewast'' in Charles and St. George. Glover Ord. gives it for ''Syferwast.'' In all these examples the chief and bars are gold.

381. H. Daundell: silver three bars gules each charged with three crosses crosslet gold.

Blazoned for Philip Daundelegh in Jen., and a very similar shield is given for sir Robert Daundely in Powell.

382. ALEN. TWYFFORD: silver two bars sable on a canton sable a cinquefoil gold.

Blazoned for sir John de Twyford in Duns. I, and also in that of Borough. Given for Robert in Will.

- 383. Philip ffolowell: barry wavy sable and silver a canton gules.
- 384. ROGER OF ASTON: silver a bend danced sable.

 So blazoned for him in Jen.
- 385. GERARD ALSTEBY (Ashtley): azure a cinquefoil ermine.

The undifferenced shield of Thomas lord Astley for whom it is blazoned in St. George and Powell. It is borne differenced by a border engrailed gold for Thomas Astley of Hill Morton in Will., and with a plain border silver for Ralph Astley. The name is from Astley in Warwickshire. The families of Hill Morton and Melton Constable were the chief cadet houses.

386. Roger Newburgh: bendy gold and azure, a border engrailed gules.

Blazoned for Robert de Newborough in Duns. II. The family were of Berkeley, Somerset, and of Wilts.

387. Emore Savage: silver six lions rampant sable.

Blazoned for "mons. Arnold Savage" in Will. and in Duns. II. For sir Roger Savage of Kent in Parl. The same shield is given for Savage of Worcestershire at the visitation of 1600, and of Tidbury, Gloucestershire, at the visitation of 1623, and for other branches at the later visitations of Worcestershire in 1634. See also Visitation of Wilts., ed. by W. Marshall, and of Worcester, ed. by Metcalfe.

388. OLYVER DYNANT: gules a fess indented of five fusils ermine and a border silver.

Sir Oliver Dynham was knighted after the siege of Calais in 1348. He was in the retinue of sir John de Chevereston, and had letters of protection, going abroad 5 June 1347. (Wrottesley's *Crécy and Calais*, p. 124.) The shield is blazoned without the border for "John de Dynham" in Will.

389. ARTHUR BELTOFT: silver a fret and a chief azure.

So borne by sir Roger de Beltoft of Lincolnshire in Parl. In Powell les armes de Beltoft have the field gold. FVY 400 with fret vert.

390. BRYAN DOBBENY: gules a fess indented of five fusils silver.

Blazoned for various members of the Daubeny family in most of the rolls from St. George to Glover Ord. The number of fusils varies from three to five, sometimes differenced by bearing small charges upon them, sometimes with these small charges borne in chief or with a baston over all. For account of family see CP IV, 93 ff.

391. Guy of Lyndford: gules a fret engrailed ermine.

This shield is given in Will. for "mons. John de Eynesford," who gave evidence in the trial Scrope v. Grosvenor (I, 162).

392. RICHARD OF COBHOME: gules three piles wavy gold.

This is not the shield of the lords Cobham; the Cobham arms were a chevron with different charges upon it for the various branches. See *Col. Top. et Gen.* VII, 343-45 and 354, also the rolls of arms. Sir John Mauduit bore the shield at Duns. I.

393. Walter Boys: silver two bars gules and a bend sable.

Blazoned for Arnold and Henry de Boys in Jen. Ord. The shield is that of the Lincolnshire and Leicestershire families of the name.

394. LAURENCE SWYNBURGE: gules three swines' heads silver.

This is the earliest shield of Swinburne. Blazoned as here for Adam de Swyneburne in Glover. The editor has not been able to trace this man.

395. J. GORNAY: sable a chevron between three bulls' heads caboshed gold.

So blazoned for sir John Gornay in Glover Ord.

396. JWAN HERON: gules three herons silver.

Blazoned as here for Roger and William Heron in Parl, and also in Powell. The earlier shield had the field azure as blazoned first in Glover and also in later rolls. Jordan Heron was of Hadstone, Northumberland, living *temp*. Henry III. Pedigree RND 304.

397. CLYBBURNE of Westmorland: silver fretty sable and a chief gules.

This shield does not appear in the rolls; it is blazoned in the dictionaries with the chief sable and three chevronels braced instead of fretty. The two charges are probably the same in origin. Cliburn is a parish in the north of Westmorland. There is a short account of the place and family in NBWC I, pp. 457 ff.

398. WILLM. LANCASTER Sokbred in Westmorland: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a molet gold.

Sockbridge is a manor in the parish of Barton, Westmorland. The family were a branch of the Lancasters, lords of Kendal, whose shield they differenced by placing a molet instead of a leopard upon the canton. See Caer. There is an account of the family in NBWC I, 400 ff., and a pedigree in FCW 75.

399. GEFFREY THIRKELD of Poterdall: silver a maunch gules and a border sable.

The shield is blazoned without the border in Powell, and with a label vert for William Thirkeld in Jen. The name is from Threlkeld, Cumberland. The shield derives feudally from that of Hastings. The border is here a difference for a younger branch. Patterdale is at the head of Ullswater in the parish of Barton. See NBWC I, 498.

- 400. RAUF WOLLINGTON: gold on a chevron sable three spread eagles gold.
- 401. EDW. BESSINTON: azure a pierced cinquefoil gold.
 So blazoned for sir Stephen Bessington in Glover Ord.

402. Willā. de Herll: gules a chevron silver between three shovellers.

So blazoned in Powell and Will. for sir Robert Herle. William, Robert's father, was lord of Herle (now Kirkharle), Northumberland, chief justice of the court of common pleas; died 1347. (HN II, i, 238; pedigree 239.)

403. J. DE BURES: silver on a bend sable three dolphins silver.

This shield does not appear elsewhere in the published rolls of arms. Pap., p. 238, gives it as one of the shields copied incorrectly into Glover Ord. and accepted as authentic because of that. It is not the shield of the knightly family of Suffolk, who bore ermine on a chief indented sable two lions rampant gold, Powell and brass in Acton church, Suffolk.

404. RAUF KENDALL: silver a bend vert and a label of three points gules.

So blazoned for sir Robert de Kendale of Herts. in Parl. See Cussan's *Hertfordshire*, parts 111 and 1v, 97.

405. ROBERT PALTON: silver six cinquefoils gules.

So blazoned for sr. Jon Palton in Powell, also for sir F. Paltoun of Suffolk in the Military roll of Henry VI.

406. Th. DE WODERINGTON: quarterly silver and gules a bend gobony sable and gules.

Differenced from the arms of Widdrington of Widdrington, Northumberland, by making their sable baston gobony. For seals of family see DS, nos. 2651-54. This man does not appear in the published pedigrees of the family. The shield is derived from the quarterly one of Fitz Roger, lords of Warkworth and Clavering.

407. R. Chamberleyn: gules a fess between three escallops gold a crescent on the fess for difference.

So blazoned for sire Robert Chaumberlein of Lincolnshire in Parl. In the same roll sir Richard bears a chevron in place of the fess.

408. J. Heveringham: silver a fess azure and a label of three points gules.

Blazoned for sr Jon. Everyngham in Powell and in the Nativity. They were lords of Birkin, near Pontefract, in the West Riding. The shield here given is that of Birkin. The old arms of the lords Everingham were gules a lion rampant vair. See SS XLI, p. 12.

409. WILLM. CUSANS: azure a bend fusilly silver.

So blazoned for sr. Peter Gussau in Glover Ord., and for William Cusance in Jen. Ord., who was one of the king's knights at Crécy and Calais.

410. H. DE SOTTHILL: gules a spread eagle silver beaked and armed gold.

Blazoned for "sire Henry de Sodhull" in Borough., and for sir John in Powell. Sothill is in the parish of Dewsbury, West Riding. Pedigree FVY 275, 331 and H XVI, 290.

411. WILLM. PERCIHAY: silver a cross patonce gules an escutcheon gold charged with a cross sable, in the quarter.

So blazoned for sir Walter Percehay in Borough. The shield is that of Vesci, with which family they were connected. The shield in the quarter is also that of Vesci, or, as stated in Borough., that of Aton. Pedigrees FVY 186; SS, no. 41, p. 86.

412. R. Percihay: silver a cross patonce gules a border indented gules.

Blazoned as here, with a lozenge in the quarter, for Walter Percehay in Jen. Ord.

413. DE WOODBURGE: barry silver and azure three lions rampant gules.

So blazoned for "Ralph de Wodeburgh" in St. George and Charles.

414. SWYNARTON: silver a cross floretty sable.

So blazoned for sir Roger Swinnerton in Duns. I, and for sir Thomas in Calais. The name is from Swinnerton, Staffs. Account of family, William Salt Society, N.S., III, 73 ff.

415. DE LONGEVILL: gules a dance between eight crosses crosslet silver.

Blazoned with the fess ermine for sir Gerard Longueville in Powell, and as here for sir John of Hunts. in Parl. The family were of Overton Longueville, co. Huntingdon. Pedigree Herald and Genealogist VI, p. 49 ff.

416. LITTELBERY: silver two leopards gules and a border vert.

This shield with the border does not appear in the rolls of arms. In Will. John Littlebury bore silver two leopards gules, which in Powell Robert differenced by a label azure. In Jen. Ord. the shield is differenced by a bend vert charged with three eagles gold. The effigy of sir Humphrey Littlebury in Holbeach church, Lincolnshire, bears two leopards only. (Stothard, Monumental Effigies, plates 75-76.) Pedigree G IV, 189 ff.

417. DE MANERS: silver a saltire engrailed sable.

"Sir Baudewyn de Maners" bore this shield in Duns. I. Henry bore the same arms in Charles.

Fo. 54

418. BOUTEVILLAIN: silver three crescents gules.

Borne by sir Robert Boutevilain of Northants. in Duns. I; also by William in Powell.

419. DE FFRANKE: vert a saltire engrailed gold.

Borne by sir William Franks in Powell and Jen. Ord.

420. J. Thwaytes: silver on a fess sable between three fleurs-de-lis gules, three bezants.

The shield borne by Thwaites of Remerstone, Norfolk. It is blazoned for them in *Derbyshire Pedigrees*; G VIII, 176.

421. FFERLAY: gules three molets gold pierced gules and a quarter ermine.

The shield is given in Pap., p. 995, for Hargill, Yorkshire, and for Westwood, co. Worcester.

422. Walter Eges: sable three escallops gold.

The shield is given in Glover Ord. for sir William Waldecot.

423. WILLM. DEVEREUX: gules a fess between three roundels silver.

This is probably an error, as the arms of Devereux of Lyonshall, Holme Lacy and Stoke Lacy, co. Hereford, bear the three roundels or plates in chief. The shield is so blazoned for various members of the family in Powell and Parl. (CP IV, 302 ff.)

424. ROGER FFANACOURT: paly gules and gold a canton ermine.

This is the shield of Basset of Drayton. At Borough. and in Powell sir Bartholomew Fanecourt sable a cross flory and a border engrailed gold. Another shield is given for Gerard in Jen. Ord., namely azure billety gold and a quarter ernine. Sable a cross patonce silver and a border engrailed gold is given for "sir Bartholomew Fanacourt" in Glover Ord.

425. No NAME: ermine on a fess gules three castles gold.

This shield is given for Comberton in Glover Ord. Pap., p. 786, blazons it for Carliton, quoting Harl. MS. 1386, fo. 65.

426. T. Newmarche: silver a fess indented of five fusils gules.

So blazoned in Powell and Parl. for sir Thomas Newmarch and for others of the family in these and other rolls. There is a pedigree of the family in H XVI, p. 223.

427. T. KYDDALL: quarterly I and IV sable a saltire embattled silver; II and III azure three bends checky gold and gules.

The arms on quarters I and IV are given for Thomas Kydeley in Will., and for Kedall of Lincolnshire in Pap., p. 1062. Quarters II and III are so blazoned for Solers or Solere in Glover Ord. See *Misc. Gen. et Her.*, 2nd ser., II, 96, for Kyddall.

428. WILLM. ELTHOFT: sable three chess-rooks silver.

This shield is not given in the printed rolls or in an earlier authority than this. In FVY, p. 301, the Visitation of 1585 gives this shield in the first quarter for Eltoft of Farnell in Craven; they were originally of Darlington.

429. RAUF DE BOSVILL: silver a fess fusilly gules, upon it an escallop silver, in chief five leaves slipt sable.

In Jen. Ord. Roger Bosvylle bears three trefoils or leaves in chief. The Visitation arms for Bosvile of Gunthwaite, Yorkshire, have three bears' heads rased in chief, whilst the Warmsworth branch bear three molets in chief. (FVY 338, 356.) See also SS 133, pp. 47, 54 and 208. They were a distinguished Yorkshire family with many branches, and later settled in Kent.

430. J. Manston: quarterly I and IV sable a bend embattled counter-embattled silver; II and III quarterly I and 4 silver a fess between three birds vert legged gules, 2 and 3 azure a lion rampant gold crowned silver.

Quarters I and IV are so blazoned in Glover Ord. for Manston. Quarters I and 4 in II and III are given in the same authority for Clyff; quarters 2 and 3 bear the arms of Darell. See no. 6 above.

431. J. Brerlay: silver a cross crosslet gules.

So borne by "sir Thomas Brereley" in Powell. A Yorkshire family of Killerby and Peckhall in Richmondshire. A branch were of Midridge Grange, co. Durham. See FVY 499; FVD 60; and pedigree in SD III, 313.

432. Sr. R. Waldgrave: per pale gules and silver a bend engrailed sable.

So blazoned for "sir Richard Waldegrave" in Powell. Pedigree H XIII, p. 307 ff.

433. Sr. T. Multon: barry gules and silver a bend azure.

The differenced shield of the Multons, lords of Egremont. It is blazoned as here for Thomas Multon of Frankton in Duns. II and also in Powell. The lords of Gilsland differenced by a label and omitted the bend. There is an account of the family in NBWC II, 73 ff.

Fo. 54v

434. Sr. J. HARDESHULL: silver a chevron sable between ten martlets gules.

Borne as here by him at Borough. and also in later rolls. He was son and heir of Wm. de H. of Hartshill, co. Warwick, by Juliane suo jure baroness Hache. He was on the king's side at Boroughbridge, and with prince Edward at Crécy. He was summoned to parliament 1341-50, and died before 18 June 1369. (CP VI, 391.) See no. 365 above.

435. Sr. J. Derwentwat: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a cinquefoil silver.

So blazoned for him in Jen. Ord. and in Will. For account of family see Hutchison's Cumberland II, 227.

436. Sr. Ad. Dergton: barry sable and silver a label of three points gold.

Without the label the shield is that of Haughton, Cheshire. (Pap. 54.)

437. Sr. Roger Swynerton: silver a cross crosslet, the ends patonce, sable.

This is the same shield as no. 414, though tricked in a different form. See note to that shield.

438. Sr. J. Weston: silver a fess sable and a border gules bezanty.

So blazoned for him in Duns. I. "Sire Johan de Weston le fiz" bore it at Borough.

439. Sr. WILLM. DABBENAY: gules a fess fusilly silver and a bend azure.

So borne by him at Duns. II. It is differenced from the shield of the lords Daubeny by the bend. See no. 390 above.

440. Sr. WILLM. CUSANCE: sable a bend silver and a label of three points gules.

A similar shield to this is blazoned for one of the same names in Jen. Ord., but there the bend is engrailed and an escallop is borne in chief in place of the label. See no. 409 above.

441. Sr. Willim. Buckmaister: silver fleuretty and a lion rampant sable.

Borne with the field crusilly in Borough. by "sire William Bukemynster" and fleuretty as here in Parl. by "sire Willame de Bocmonstre" of Lincolnshire (?).

442. Sr. T. Kerdiston: gules a saltire engrailed silver a label of three points checky gold and azure.

Borne as here but without the label in Parl., and for sir Roger with gold label in Parl. and Powell. They were of Kerdeston, Norfolk. See CP VII, 190, and Blomefield's Norfolk X, 112.

443. Sr. RAYNOLD COBHAM: gules a chevron between three escallops gold.

This is an error; for the correct shield see no. 134 above. These arms are those of Chamberlain, see no. 407 above.

444. Sr. Stephan Cosington: azure three roses gold.

So given for "Steven Cusintone" in Planche, and for "sire Willm. de Cosingtone" in Parl. See Surrey Arch. Colls. III. A seal of Stephen Cosington of 24 Henry VI bears charges as here.

445. Sr. J. DE Moules: silver two bars gules in chief three roundels gules.

Blazoned for "sir. John de Moyles" in Falk. The same shield is on the seal attached by him to the baron's letter to the Pope, and is given in most of the later rolls. He was summoned to parliament 1299 until his death in 1311. See CP, first edition, s.v.

446. Sr. J. DE SULLE: ermine three chevrons gules.

This shield does not appear in the printed rolls, but is blazoned for "Soules" in sir David Lyndsay's MS. of Scottish Arms, printed in facsimile, Edinburgh, 1878, and is so quartered by the earls of Douglas for Soules of Liddesdale. The seals of that family show barry a bend. See SND XXI, no. 720.

447. No NAME: silver two bars azure in chief three escallops azure.

The shield of Errington of Errington and Beaufront, Northumberland, as given in Jen. Pedigree NCH IV, 188. Also blazoned no. 752 below.

448. Morrys Berkeley: gules crusilly silver and a chevron ermine.

So blazoned for "monsr. Morys de Berkeley" in Duns. II, and with the crosses of slightly different shape in Will. See CP II, p. 116 ff. The name Maurice was that of six of the family between the twelfth and fifteenth centuries.

449. GILBERT ELYSFELD: barry wavy silver and sable, over all a lion rampant gules.

At Borough. "sire Gilbert de Elmesfeld" bore undé d'argent et de sable. The same arms are borne by "sir Gilberd de Elcheffeld" in Parl., differenced by a label gules, and by sir John "de Elcheffeld" oundee de argent e de sable. The lion over all does not appear elsewhere than here.

Fo. 55

450. Sr. Robert fferrers: vair gold and gules.

The original shield of Ferrers, earls of Derby, as blazoned in the early rolls of Henry III date. Later they adopted the voided lozenges of de Quincy as given for sir William Ferrers (of Groby) in Falk. Some of the younger branches continued to use the early shield with various differences.

451. Sr. J. RATLASDON: azure six escallops gold.

So blazoned for "Ratilysdown" in Powell and in Glover Ord.

452. Sr. Terry Manny: gold three chevrons sable.

This shield is given for "Manney" in Powell, and for "monsr. Terry Manny" in Jen. Ord. Thierry Manny was a brother of the famous sir Walter Manny, K.G. (Beltz, Memorials of the Garter, 111 ff.) See no. 470 post.

453. Sr. T. Wake: silver two bars gules on the first three bezants a border engrailed sable.

The differenced shield of John lord Wake of Liddesdale. It is blazoned as here for "sire Thomas Wake de Blithesworthe" in Parl. Blisworth, Northants. See Bridges' Northamptonshire I, 335, and Baker's Northampton I, 113; II, 239.

454. Sr. T. Saundford: silver on a chief gules a chessrook gold.

For the arms of Sandford of Yorkshire see FVY 404 and 424. See no. 335 above.

455. Bassingbourne: gyronny gold and gules.

This shield is borne vair and gules and silver and gules by different members of the family. It is borne as here by sir John of Hertfordshire in Parl.

456. Sr. T. Lucy: gules three luces paleways silver and a border engrailed silver.

The differenced arms of the Lucys, lords of Cockermouth. At Duns. II sir Thomas Lucy bore these arms with the addition of a label azure.

457. Sr. Gyles Bassingburn: gyronny silver and gules a label of three points azure.

So carried by him in Jen. Ord., but there with a baston azure instead of the label. See no. 455 above.

458. Sr. J. Dodingselles: silver a fess gules in chief a molet gules.

As blazoned in Duns. I and in Parl. for this man. There is a pedigree in Blomefield's Norfolk VI, 170, and in Thoroton's Notts. III, 37.

459. Sr. J. HINCLA: gules a chevron engrailed gold and a label of three points gold (?).

> "Sir Jon de Hyncle" bears this shield, without the label, in Powell.

460. Sr. Symond Bassett: ermine on a canton gules a molet gold.

> So borne by "monsr. Simond Bassett" at Duns. II. The many different shields borne by the various branches of the Basset family are given by Dugdale, *Usage of Arms*, ed. 1812, pp. 12/13. See also CP II, p. 1 ff.

461. Sr. Robert Herpingham: azure an escutcheon silver in an orle of martlets gold.

> Borne by sir Thomas Erpingham in Will., and with the escutcheon vert and the martlets silver by sir Thomas Erpinghani, K.G. (1401), and also in Parl. by sir Thomas of Norfolk. See Blomefield's Norfolk VI, 412.

462. Sr. J. Breus: silver crusilly and a lion rampant gules.

> This shield is given in St. George for William Gifford. It does not appear as a Brus shield elsewhere than here. It may be a differenced coat for a junior branch of Brus of Skelton, who bore silver a lion rampant azure.

463. Sr. RAUF LINGAM: barry azure and gold on a bend gules three cinquefoils silver.

So blazoned for him in Powell. The family of Lingen were of Radbroke, Gloucester, and of Sutton, co. Hereford.

464. Sr. Terr. (?) Linchefeld: gold two bars gules each charged with five lozenges on a quarter silver a crescent gules charged with four lozenges silver.

> The shield is nearly identical with that borne, with various differences, on the canton by Geargy or Gery of Royston, Herts. See Pap., pp. 35/36.

465. Sr. Emore ffossett: gold six bastons gules.

Fo. 55v So blazoned for "monsr. Amaun Fossad" in Duns. IIde goules ove six bendes d'or.

466. SR. WILLM. FFITZWAREN: quarterly per fess indented ermine and gules.

> The differenced shield of the lords Fitzwarren. This shield is blazoned for him in Powell and in Will. He was surnamed "Le frere" and summoned to parliament in 1342. Nominated K.G. circa 1349; died 1361. (CP V, 512; Beltz, Garter 96.)

467. Sr. A. NORTON: silver on a canton vert a lion rampant gold.

This bears, on the canton, the shield of "sire James de Nortone," who appears amongst the Hampshire knights in Parl. He bore de vert a un lion de or. The arms as here appear for "monsr. Thomas Norton" in Glover Ord.

468. Sr. Hamond Strange: gules two lions passant silver, a border engrailed gold.

The differenced shield of L'Estrange, lords of Knockyn, Shropshire, and of Hunstanton, Norfolk. The engrailed burder appears on the seal of Roger L'Estrange, lord of Ellesmere, attached to the baron's letter to the Pope (1301). It is blazoned for him in Planche and is therefore the difference of the Ellesmere branch.

469. Sr. Robert Crey: gold a cross sable a martlet sable in the quarter.

Sir Simon and sir John Crey of Kent bore gules a cross engrailed gold in Parl. and Jen. Ord. The shield here blazoned does not appear elsewhere.

470. Sr. Walter Manny; gold three chevrons sable a lion passant gold on the first chevron.

So blazoned for him in Duns. II. He was one of the most famous of the knights of Edward III; married Margaret, duchess of Norfolk, grand-daughter of Edward I; summoned to parliament 1347-71; K.G. 1359; died 1371/72. See no. 452 above.

471. Sr. Roger Ufford: sable a cross engrailed gold and a bend ermine.

The differenced shield of Ufford, earls of Suffolk. It is borne with many differences by various cadets of the family, but this shield with the bend ermine does not occur elsewhere. Detailed pedigree of Ufford Coll. Top. et Gen. II, 272/77. Sir Roger does not appear in it.

472. Sr. WILLM. CONSTABLE: quarterly vert and gules a bend engrailed gold.

Constable of Flamborough and after of Everingham, descended from the Constables of Chester, bore quarterly gules and vair a baston gold. The change of colour in this shield here given does not occur elsewhere in the rolls. See pedigree FVY 178/79.

473. Sr. Henry Hillory: sable a cross crosslet silver between four fleurs-de-lis silver.

Crosses crosslet and fleurs-de-lis are borne on the shields of the Hillarys both of Essex and of Leicestershire, but the editor cannot trace the above shield. 474. Sr. Rich. Peshall: silver a cross crosslet, the ends patonce, sable, in the quarter on an escutcheon gules a lion rampant silver.

In Will. monsr. Adam Peshale bears silver a cross fleury sable on a quarter gules a lion's head rased silver crowned gold. Sir Adam was sheriff of Staffordshire 1340/41. Sir Richard Peshale was his son by his second wife. (See G.E.C. Complete Baronetage, s.v.)

475. Sr. J. KYRKITON: gules three bars ermine.

So borne by him at Duns. II and in Powell. He was of Kirton in Holland, Lincolnshire. Summoned to parliament 1362-67; died 1366-67 (CP VII, 338.)

476. Sr. Thomas Perhe: ermine three dogs courant gules.

This shield is given in Glover Ord. for "Deach."

477. Sr. Otes Graunson: paly silver and azure on a bend gules three curled snakes (gold).

Sir Otho de Grandison. He fought at Crécy in the second division under the earls of Northampton and Arundel. He served continuously with the earl of Northampton (William de Bohun) during the war and was knighted at Calais. The snakes should be buckles as blazoned in Powell. See *Crécy and Calais* by Wrottesley, pp. 34 and 164.

- 478. Sr. Gerard Aldenhon: sable on a chief silver two pales gules.
- 479. Sr. Piers Beseld: gules on a chief paly silver and azure, a ring gold.
- 480. Sr. WILLM. BOTELER of Warington: azure a bend between six covered cups gold.

So blazoned for him in Parl. and in Powell. He was of Warrington, Lancashire. Summoned to parliament 1295-98; died *circa* 1328. The name came from his ancestor, who was butler to Ralph ''de Gernon,'' earl of Chester. (CP II, 230.)

481. Sr. WILLM. DEVEREUX: gules a fess silver in chief Fo. 56 three roundels silver.

So blazoned for him in Parl. and Powell. In the former he is placed among the Cheshire knights. The shield is differenced from that of the lords Devereux by reversing the colours.

482. SR. RAUF BLUETT: gold on a chief sable three roundels silver.

The editor cannot trace this shield in the printed rolls. A similar shield is given by *Burke* for Bluett of Devonshire.

L

483. Sr. Gervays Clyfton: sable a lion rampant in an orle of cinquefoils silver.

Blazoned as here for him in Powell. He was of Clifton, Notts. His seal of 1380 bears these arms. Account of family in G.E.C. Baronetage, s.v.

484. Sr. WALTER SELBY: barry gold and sable.

Blazoned for him in Powell. They were an ancient family originally of Biddlesdon, Northumberland. See pedigree NCH IX, 56.

485. Sr. A. Kyrioll: gold two chevrons and a canton gules.

Blazoned as here for Nicholas de Kyriel of Kent in Parl. He was summoned to parliament A.D. 1296. The same shield is given for others of the family in later rolls. Sir Thomas Kiriell, K.G., 1460, was of the same family.

486. Sr. Th. Broune: gules a lion rampant gold and a border engrailed silver.

This shield is given in Glover Ord. for Rydell or Ridell.

487. Sr. Bartholmew Burghersshe: gules a double-tailed lion rampant gold.

So borne by him at Borough, and at Calais. It is blazoned for others of the name in later rolls. This man is probably the second of the name; one of the great knights of Edward III; founder K.G.; died 1369. (CP II, 426.)

488. Thwenge of Gatt Hemyslay, Yorkshire: silver a chevron between three popinjays vert beaked gules.

Gate Helmsley is a parish in the North Riding, Bulmer wapentake; for connection of the family of Thweng with it see V.C.H., North Riding, pp. 139/40 and 141/42. The arms should have a fess not a chevron as here. They are so blazoned in the rolls from that of Falk.

489. FFERRERS of Denshire: gold on a bend sable three "ferrs" silver.

This shield is blazoned for sir John and sir William Ferrers in Powell. It is differenced from the early shield of Ferrers: vair gold and gules and a border of ferrs (horseshoes). This family were of Devon and Cornwall.

490. T. Lancaster of Brampton in Westmorland: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a molet gold.

Brampton is a manor in the parish of Barton, Westmorland. The Lancasters are said to have been a younger branch of the family of Sockbridge, whose shield they differenced by placing a molet in place of a lion passant on the canton. See no. 398 above.

491. WILLM. THWAYTE of Marston in Yorkshire: azure a fess between three stars gold.

> Marston in The Ainsty, Yorkshire. Pedigree FVY 93, where this shield is given for the family. See also SS 133, p. 99 and note.

492. Worswyke of Amondernes: silver a bend gobony silver and sable the silver charged with saltires gules.

> This should probably be blazoned on a bend sable three lozenges silver each charged with a saltire gules as in Jen. Ord. for Robert Worswick.

- 493. T. BLACKBURNE of Copmanura: silver on a bend sable a lozenge silver charged with a saltire gules. See FVY 400.
- 494. Percevall of Lyndlay: silver on a chief sable three eagles' heads rased silver.

This shield does not appear to be elsewhere on record.

495. WILLM. CLAPAM of Londisdall: silver on a bend sable three covered cups silver.

This shield is in the second quarter of the arms of Clapham of Beamsley, FVY 12; SS, no. 36, p. 43; and CVY II, 472, where it is said to be for Thornton; it is more likely to be the early shield of Clapham.

496. Dīs. Burī prepositus Scē Trinitatis Ebor: gules a cinquefoil silver impaling silver on a bend sable three molets silver pierced gules.

A cell of Benedictine monks in York belonging to the abbey of St. Martin, Marmoustier, Tours. (Not. Mon.) Probably the shield of the cell impaling that of the provost.

497. Thomas Lepton: barry gules and silver on a chief Fo. 567 azure three wheels gold ("the wheles be playne without pyks '').

> Of Kepwick, Yorkshire. There is a pedigree in FVY 214, where this shield is given. Thomas Lepton gave a charter dated at Kepwick in 1442/43.

498. Dīs. J. MILLM prior de Monisburge (? Newborough): gules a lion rampant silver, over all a prior's crutch gold, bendways.

The shield of Newborough priory, Yorkshire, being those of the founder (Roger de Mowbray) differenced by the crutch. In SS 41, p. 19, the crutch is placed in bend sinister. John Millom was confirmed prior 24 August 1437; died A.D. 1459. (Mon. Angl. VI. 317.)

499. FFRATER RICUS FFAUKES mister domus Scē Roberti: silver a cross the upright ends a crescent, the cross ends patonce impaling ermine a mascle sable.

A house of Trinitarian friars, Knaresborough. Richard Fawkes occurs as master 1449-54. Tanner, Not. Mon. XLVII, gives the arms of Richard of Cornwall for the friary. There is no other record of the shield given here. The impalement is for Fawkes. See also VCH, Yorkshire, III, p. 296 ff.

500. J. LACY of Halyfax parishe: silver six roundels sable.

The shield of Lacy of Cromwell-Bottom in the parish of Halifax, as blazoned for them FVY 330.

501. SLINGESBY of Scrvinge besydes Knarisburge: gules a chevron silver between in chief two leopards' faces silver in base a stringed bugle horn silver.

This shield is given FVY 112 in the second quarter of Slingsby, and called that of Scriven. William Slingsby of Stodley, living 1334, married Joan, daughter and heiress of Henry of Scriven, who were foresters of Knaresborough—hence the bugle horn.

502. J. Byrnand of Knaresborough: silver on a bend azure three escallops gold.

As blazoned in Constable's roll SS 41, p. xvi. See also FVY 401.

503. NICHOLAS BAYLTON of Baylton: silver a fess between three fleurs-de-lis sable.

In the parish of Otley, West Riding. Pedigree FVY 303. Nicholas, according to this pedigree, must have been living in the early sixteenth century.

504. WILLM. THORALD of Marston: gold two bars sable on a canton sable a bird gold.

Blazoned barry of six in Con. (SS 41, p. xvi). See also FVY 405.

505. Kersforth of Barneslay: silver a bend embattled sable between three butterflies gules.

Blazoned with a fess in place of the bend in SS 41, p. xiii. See CVY I, pp. 40/41, for pedigree. There a quarterly shield is given: I and IV azure two mill-rinds fessways silver; II and III as here. FVY 335 says arms can be seen in Barnsley church. The name is from Keresforth-Hill in township of Barnsley.

506. HARINGTON of Cartmell: sable fretty silver.

The name is from Harrington, near Workington, Cumberland. The shield is one of the large group of Cumberland shields bearing this charge. It derived originally from the shield of Huddleston, lords of Millom. It is blazoned as here in Duns. I and in Parl. See Baines, Lancaster IV, 648. For Cartmell see VCH, Lancaster III, 14, and for Harrington ibid., vols. III and IV passim.

507. Dodsworth of Stiliston: silver on a bend engrailed sable three roundels gules, each charged with a roundel sable upon which is a cross paty.

SS 41, p. xvi, gives the roundel ermine upon the gules. There are three pedigrees of Dodsworth in Dugdale's Visits. of Yorks., but all have different arms from these.

508. PRYOR of Monke Britton: sable three covered cups silver.

A priory of Cluniacs at Monk-Bretton in West Riding, near Barnsley. See SS 41, p. 77 note, and VCH, Yorkshire, III, p. 91 ff.

509. Sr. J. Burton of Kinslay: silver a bend wavy sable.

As blazoned in SS 41, p. 79 and in FVY, p. 7. Sir John's son Thomas was living 1585.

510. T. Womwell: gules a bend between six unicorns' heads couped silver.

Pedigree and shield as here FVY 365. Thomas Wombwell was living A.D. 1585. Wombwell is in West Riding, near Barnsley. The same shield is blazoned for Thomas Wombwell in EL.

511. KILLUM of Danby in Richmontshire: azure three covered cups gold.

Same shield blazoned in EL. Pedigree H XVI, p. 178, where they are described as of "Kyllom juxta Newarke." The name does not appear under any of the Danbys of the North Riding in VCH, North Riding. See also FVY 402.

512. GRAY de Barton in Rydall: barry silver and azure a bend gules.

Now Barton le Street in Ryedale wapentake, North Riding. The manor was granted to Richard de Grey (of Codnor family) in 1229, and remained with the family until 1598. (VCH, North Riding, I, 473.) The bend should be gobony gold and gules. Pedigree FVY 70. See also ibid. 639.

Fo. 57 513. Sr. Rich. Pykeringe: gules on a chevron silver between three fleurs-de-lis gold three roundels sable.

The arms of the Nottinghamshire family (Burke). See also kuights of Notts. in H, IV, p. 188. The shield is given for Pickering of Oswaldkirk FVY 403.

- 514. Chipley: silver on a bend gules three crosses patonce gold.
- 515. GILBERT SCARESBROKE: gules between two bastons engrailed silver three molets silver.

So blazoned for "James of Scarsbricke" in Ballard's roll of Edward IV. See Baines, Lancaster IV, 258, and VCH, Lancas., III, 196 and passim.

516. WILLM. LANGDALL: sable a chevron between three molets silver.

As blazoned in Con. Pedigree FVY 129.

517. ROBERT STODOW of Poklington: quarterly I and IV barry of eight gules and gold on a chief gold a molet sable; II sable on a saltire silver a slipt trefoil azure; III gules three greyhounds courrant silver.

The first and fourth quarters are as blazoned for "Stodowe" in Cou. Pocklington is in East Riding of Yorkshire. See also FVY, p. 435; Yorks. Arch. Jour. XXVI, 142.

518. LORD FFALCONBERG: quarterly I and IV gules on a saltire silver a molet gules; II and III silver a lion rampant azure.

Sir William Neville, eighth son of Ralph, earl of Westmorland, married Joan, daughter and heiress of Thomas lord Fauconberge. He was summoned to parliament from 1455 to 1461. He died 1462/63, when the barony of Neville of Fauconberge fell into abeyance. The arms are I and IV Neville differenced; II and III are Brus of Skelton adopted by sir Walter Fauconberge II, whose mother was eldest daughter and co-heiress of Peter Brus of Skelton. (CP, V, s.v.) The original arms of Fauconberge were gold a fess azure in chief three pallets gules. (St. George.)

519. J. Cartington: gules a fess between three cartwheels silver.

Shield bears the charges on his seal of 1469 (SND, no. 143), and as blazoned in Glover Ord. and EL. For account of family see AA, 2nd ser., XIV, 397. He died c. A.D. 1494.

Fo. 57*

520. SR. WILLM. WODRINGTON: quarterly silver and gules a baston sable.

So blazoned in Powell and Will. Of Widdrington, Northumberland. Pedigree HN II, ii, 230 ff.; FVN 125-126; and AA, 3rd ser., II, 178. See also no. 406 above.

- 521. T. Engs: gules a chevron between three fleurs-de-lis silver.
- 522. WILLM. CHORLEY: silver a chevron gules between three flowers vert edged azure.

Chorley, Lancashire. See VCH, Lancaster III, 25/7. The editor cannot find this shield recorded elsewhere.

523. Ric. of Aldburge: sable a fess silver between six

crosses crosslet gold.

Blazoned azure a fess silver between three crosses crosslet gold for William Aldeburgh in the Nobility roll of Edward II. See also effigy in Aldborough church. Pedigree FVY 279.

524. Sr. Richard Woodvill: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a spread eagle gold.

The editor cannot identify this shield with the family. The Woodville coat was silver a fess and a canton gules.

525. WILSTROPPE: quarterly I and IV azure a chevron between three lions passant silver; II and III gules strewn with cinquefoils and a maunch silver.

Quarters I and IV are so blazoned for John Willesthorp in Jen. Pedigree SS 144, p. 85. Quarters II and III are the arms of Acclom of Moreby, Yorkshire. The editor has not been able to trace the marriage. See SS 144, p. 85.

526. Gray of Therlowe: barry silver and azure on a bend gules three pierced cinquefoils silver.

So blazoned for Grey in Glover Ord. The differenced shield of Grey of Codnor.

527. Sr. Henry of Rytfforthe: per bend sable and silver a lion rampant counter-coloured.

Given for sir Henry Ratford in Glover Ord., and for Ritford FVY 404.

528. Peter Limesy: gules a spread eagle gold beaked and armed azure.

> So borne at Borough. by sir Piers de Limsey, and with various differences in later rolls.

529. J. DE MEWSE: azure three griffins passant gold.

Blazoned for "Geoffrey de Meus" in Duns. II with six griffins, and also in Powell. The shield here tricked is not recorded elsewhere.

530. DE CHERDSDON: gold on a bend gules three goats passant silver.

Blazoned for "John de Chevereston" with the field silver in Jen. Ord. He was in the retinue of John de Veer, earl of Oxford, at Calais and Crécy, and appears in the Pipe roll as of Northamptonshire. (Crécy and Calais, pp. 92 and 141.)

531. DE SALTMARKE: silver crusilly and three pierced cinquefoils gules.

Borne at Borough. by sir Piers de Saltmarsh. Pedigree FVY 100. See also ibid. 650.

532. COLPLAND: sable three ewers silver a molet silver between them.

The editor cannot trace a family of this name who bore this shield. Coupland of Cumberland bore silver two bars and a canton gold over all a bend azure. The Northumberland family bore a molet on a cross. Pap. gives the shield here for Cornwall and Butler, and a similar one for Warcop.

533. RODYRFFORTHE: silver an orle gules in chief three martlets sable.

The shield of Rutherford of Middleton Hall, Northumberland. Pedigree SS 122, p. 99 and NCH XII, 204.

534. MAULEY and BIGOD: quarterly I and IV gold a bend sable; II and III gold on a cross engrailed gules five escallops silver.

Quarters I and IV Mauley of Mulgrave; II and III Bigod of Settrington. On the death of the last Peter Mauley, Mulgrave went to Constance his sister, who was the wife of sir John Bigod of Settrington. (VCH, North Riding, II, 395.)

535. LORD SUDLEY: quarterly I and IV gold two bastons gules; II and III gules a fess gobony silver and sable between six crosses paty fitchy gold.

Quarters I and IV are blazoned in many rolls for Sudley; quarters II and III are for Boteler of Wemme, also given in early rolls. Thomas Boteler, nephew of John lord Sudeley, became vested in the barony, and in 1441 his son Ralph was created baron Sudeley. (HP 458.)

536. WILLM. SKERGILL: quarterly I and IV ermine a saltire gules; II and III azure on a fess silver three crosses crosslet gules.

I and IV for Scargill of Scargill in North Riding, Yorkshire; II and III bear the shield of Newsome of Yorkshire. See pedigree PHY I, 292 and also VCH, North Riding, I, 41.

537. Sr. ALEXANDER NEVILL: quarterly I and IV gules on a saltire silver a molet gules; II and III silver on a fess between three double-headed spread eagles sable two crescents silver.

The molet on the saltire was the difference used by the family of Thornton Bridge. Sir Alexander of that place married Catherine Evers. His will was proved 25 June 1457. See pedigree SD IV, 163 and FVY 611. Quarters II and III the editor cannot identify. A similar shield is given in Pap. 807 for Tasell of Suffolk.

538. RAUF ASHETON of Fyrton in Rydall: quarterly I and IV silver a pierced molet sable; II and III quarterly, I and 4 ermine on a fess gules three rings gold, 2 and 3 paly silver and vert.

He was son of sir John Ashton of Ashton-under-Lyne, who is of Fryton in 1482. Sir Ralph was knight-marshal of England under Edward IV, and acted as vice-constable at the coronation of Richard III. (VCH, North Riding, I, 507.) Quarters 1 and 4 of the grand quarters are for Barton. Ralph Ashton's wife was Margery, daughter and heiress of John Barton. 2 and 3 the editor cannot identify. Pap. 1018 gives the shield for Langley and Lawson.

539. Sr. T. of Rameston: silver a chevron and in dexter chief a pierced cinquefoil sable.

This is not the shield of Ramsden, and does not appear to be elsewhere recorded.

540. Sr. Ric. Hamerton: silver three hammers sable.

Blazoned as here in Jen. Ord. for Lawrence Hamerton, and also in FVY, p. 526, for Hamerton of Hellifield Peel. See also SS 133, p. 81.

541. Th. FFLEMYNGE of flournes: silver fretty gules and a label of three points azure.

A shield derived feudally from that of Huddleston, lords of Millom. It is blazoned for John Fleming, with the label vert, in Jen. Ord.

542. Edm. Waddisley of Otrington: silver a cross sable a martlet gules in the quarter.

South Otterington, a parish in Birdforth, North Riding. A moiety of the manor passed with Thornton-le-Street to the Waddesley's before 1439. Edmund was living 1433. (VCH, North Riding, I, 455; II, 50.) Wadesley of Yorkshire bore silver on a bend between three martlets gules three escallops silver. FVY 405 gives this as an alternative shield.

543. Shorthos of Burrobrigge: silver on a chevron between three escallops sable three crescents silver.

Boroughbridge in the West Riding. For earliest shield and crest see SS 144, p. 45. Burke gives the shield as here for Shorthose of Yorkshire. See also FVY 404.

544. REDMAN of Thornton in Lonsdalle: quarterly I and IV gules three cushions ermine a crescent for difference; II and III gules three squirrels silver.

Thornton, wapentake of Ewcross, West Riding, on border of Lancashire. Quarters I and IV bear the arms of Redman derived feudally from the cushions of the Greystocks. The arms are blazoned as here in Parl. and in Will. for sir Matthew Redman. Quarters II and III the editor cannot identify. Pap. 171 gives the shield for Martheby.

Fo. 58 545. REDMAN of Irby in Lonsdalle: quarterly I and IV gules three cushions ermine a ring for difference; II and III silver three stringed bugle horns sable.

Ireby in Lancashire, over the border, a few miles from Thornton.

546. J. CATRIKE of Stanwyke: I and IV silver on a fess engrailed sable three quatrefoils gold; II and III checky sable and silver and a border gules.

Stanwick St. John in North Riding, Yorkshire. The family of Catterick held the manor from the fifteenth century under the Knights Hospitallers. (VCH, North Riding, I, 129.) The shields are as blazoned in FVY 255. See also SS 144, p. 4.

547. Sr. J. Chewston: gold on a bend gules three chevrons silver.

This shield was borne by "sir John Cheveresdon" at Duns. II with the field gold and the chevrons ermine. See no. 530 above.

548. Sr. Nichol Boneville: gold on a bend sable three molets silver pierced gules.

So blazoned for him in Borough. Another shield is given FVY 639.

- 549. Sr. J. DE CHEMIRSTON: silver three bends gules.

 Blazoned for Bodringham or Botringham in the rolls of
- 550. Sr. RAUF DARMDELL: silver on a bend gules three lozenges gold.

551. Sr. J. Trussell: silver a cross patonce gules a label of three points azure.

So borne by sir William Trussell in Borough., and by sir John in Powell. At the Visitations Trussell of Notts. and Essex bore silver fretty gules on each joint a bezant a bordure azure. (H, IV, 28 and H, XIII, 359.)

552. Sr. Roger Cully: silver a chevron between three pierced molets sable.

So blazoned for Hugh de Cuilly (? of Leicestershire) in Jen. Ord.

553. Sr. F. Busom: silver three bougets gules.

Burke gives a similar shield for "Bussy," but it is not elsewhere on record. The shield here given is blazoned in the rolls for Trusbut and Ros.

554. Sr. J. Walys: gules three gemell rings silver over all a bend gold.

These arms are not recorded elsewhere.

555. Sr. EDW. BARD: gules three boars' heads rased ermine.

This shield is not recorded elsewhere for the family. Bard of Lincolnshire bore quite a different shield. (Coll. Top. et Gen. IV, 59.)

556. Sr. T. Ardern: ermine a fess checky gold and azure.

The arms of the Warwickshire family of Arden blazoned for them in Parl. and in later rolls. See Visits. of Staffs. (Wm. Salt Soc.); Drummond's Noble British Families, plates I and II; Dugdale's Warwickshire passim.

557. Sr. Symond Perpount: azure a chief checky gold and gules.

So blazoned in Powell for "perpownt" and for "Symon de Perpunt" in Planche. See Eyton's Shropshire I, 218, and Thoroton's Notts. I, 176.

558. Sr. Hugh Bukingham: ermine a lion rampant gules, over all on a bend azure three bezants.

The shield does not appear in the rolls of arms. It bears the arms of Buckenham or Bokenham of Norfolk.

- 559. Sr. J. Nougon: gules four gemell rings gold and a quarter silver.
- 560. Sr. J. Stormy: sable a lion rampant silver.

So blazoned for "sir John Sturmyn" at Calais. In FVY 177 and 196 William Sturmy, "lord of Dromanby" in Cleveland, bore this shield. Their heiress married sir Robert Constable of Barneby.

Fo. 58v 561. Sr. G. Hurshom: silver a lion rampant sable crowned gold, a border gules.

These arms are not recorded elsewhere.

562. WM. of Arghum: silver a chevron between three martlets sable.

Blazoned as here in Glover Ord. for "Argum." It is quartered by Constable of Everingham for Argum. See pedigree FVY 178.

563. J. Montgomery: silver a cross engrailed between four pierced molets gules.

Blazoned for sir John Montgomery in Jen. Ord. and in Glover Ord.

564. Sr. T. Kerdeston: gules a saltire silver, a border engrailed silver and a label of three points checky gold and vert.

These arms without the border and label are blazoned for sir William Kerdeston in Parl. He was summoned to parliament 1337-59. See account of family in CP, VII, 190. The shield as here differenced is not recorded elsewhere; it is probably that of sir Thos. Kerdeston who died 1447. (See pedigree *ibid.*, p. 199.)

565. Sr. Rauf Hanlowe: silver goutty gules a lion rampant azure crowned gold and a border engrailed gules.

In Duns. I sir John Hanlowe bore this shield without the border and with the *gouttes* gold. The same shield is also given for him in Parl. This is the differenced shield of a cadet branch not elsewhere recorded.

566. Sr. Rauf Sofolk: silver a cross patonce and crosslet (?) azure.

Not recorded elsewhere.

567. Sr. J. Molyns: sable on a chief silver three lozenges gules.

So blazoned for him in Powell, but with the lozenges conjoined. He was the first lord Molyns. Summoned to parliament in 1347; died 1371. (HP 325.)

568. Sr. J. Moigne: barry silver and vert.

Blazoned gold three bars vert for "sr. Jon. Moyne" in Powell.

569. Sr. RAUF BLUETT: gold on a chief gules three roundels silver.

570. Sr. Rich. Culcheth: gules a bend wavy silver.

The only shield on record for this family bears sable a griffin silver. Culcheth is a township in the parish of Winwick, Lancashire. Notices of the family are scattered in vols. III and IV of VCH, Lancaster.

571. Sr. J. Maxwell: silver a saltire sable and a border engrailed vert.

A Scottish shield not recorded in any of the English rolls of arms. The saltire was borne with many differences by various branches of the family, but with the border engrailed *vert* does not appear elsewhere than here.

572. Sr. Piers de la Mare: gules two leopards silver.

He was knighted at the capitulation of Calais in 1348, and then bore this shield. It is blazoned for others of the family in Parl. He was in the retinue of Henry earl of Lancaster at Calais, and served for lands in Oxford, Wilts. and Herts. (Crécy and Calais, p. 140.)

573. Sr. Constantine of Mortymer: gold fretty sable a label of three points vert.

This is an error. Sir Constantine Mortimer, son of William lord Mortimer of Attleborough, Norfolk, bore in Duns. I and at Borough. gold fleuretty sable. He was summoned to parliament in 1342. (HP 338.) Possibly the error is caused by confusion between fretty and fleuretty.

574. THE LORD MULLANS of Wilshere: gules three bars gold.

This seems to be an error. Lord Molines bore paly wavy gold and gules blazoned for John Moleyns in Will., and for lord Moleyns in Harl. MS. 2169. (Foster's Two Tudor Books of Arms, p. 17.)

575. Sr. Olyver St. John: silver a fess sable between three crescents gules.

This is the shield of Pateshull as borne by sir John de Pateshull at Borough., and by sir Walter in Powell. They were of Bletsho, and sir Oliver St. John was by descent lord Beauchamp of Bletsho. He was created lord St. John of Bletsho, Bedfordshire, in 1559, and died 1582. (HP 413.) The shield is not attributed to him elsewhere.

576. Sr. Robert Hopton: silver three bars sable on each bar three molets gold.

So blazoned for him in Jen. See SS 133, p. 32 and notes; also FVY 42.

Fo. 59 577. Sr. J. Beauchamp: gules a fess between six martlets gold.

The shield of the Beauchamps, lords of Powick, co. Worcester, and of Alcester, co. Warwick. Blazoned, with differences, in the various rolls of arms. This man is probably sir John Beauchamp, K.G., third son of sir William Beauchamp, created lord Beauchamp of Powick 1447. (CP, VI, 46.)

578. Katirall in Amdernes: azure three mascles gold.

So blazoned for Thomas Caterall in Jen. See SS 133, p. 77 and notes; also FVY, p. 291, where this shield is differenced by a baston.

579. Sr. J. Arundell: sable six "hirondelles" silver.

The canting arms of the family of Cornwall; they do not appear in the rolls of arms. There were many sir Johns, and it is not possible to say which is intended here. See Coll. Top. et Gen. III, p. 389 ff.; Shirley's Noble and Gentle Men of England, p. 276, and CP, I, p. 261 ff.

580. Pomeray of Devonshire: gold a lion rampant gules and a border engrailed sable.

So blazoned in Powell and Will. Pedigree H, VI, 216.

581. Wyndam of Norffolke: azure three lions' heads rased gold.

This shield does not appear elsewhere in the rolls. For account of the family see Blomefield's Norfolk VIII, 113. Pap. (931) gives them for Wyndham of Silton, Dorset.

582. T. Wastelyn: sable on a bend silver three lions' heads rased gules.

With different colours the arms are given for Weston in Glover Ord.

583. Sr. Wm. Bonvill: sable six pierced molets silver.

So blazoned for him in Will. Also in Atkinson's roll quarterly with three lioncels gold. He was of Sponton (? Spaunton in the North Riding), Yorkshire. (Genealogist I, 231 note.) See VCH, North Riding, I, 525, and FVY 639.

584. LORD HASTINGES: quarterly I and IV gold a maunch gules; II and III gules a bend silver.

I and IV bears the arms of Hastings of Elsing, etc., Norfolk, being the undifferenced arms of Hastings of Bergaveny blazoned in most of the printed rolls from Falk. onwards. II and III are for Foliot of Gressenhall, Norfolk. Sir Hugh Hastings of Sutton Scotney married, c. 1330, Margery, sole heiress of sir Rich. Foliot, whose arms as above were borne by him in Duns. I. CP, VI, 353.

585. WILLM. CORNOWE: silver a chevron between three stringed bugle-horns sable.

> This shield is blazoned in Harl. MS. 2169 for Thomas Cornew of Devonshire. (Two Tudor Books of Arms, ed. Jos. Foster.)

586. Sr. T. Beamond: vair two bars gules.

Blazoned for John Beaumont barry vair and gules in Will, and for Thomas Beaumont of Devonshire in the Harl. MS. 2169 (Foster op. cit.)

587. Sr. A. Laungstroier: ermine a chevron sable.

Pap. gives this shield for "Landstroder" without any reference.

- 588. Skydmore: gules three spear heads paleways silver.
- 589. RICHARD TWYERE: gules a cross vair.

So blazoned in Planche and in Harl. MS. 2169 (Foster op. cit.) for Twyer of Holderness. See Poulson's Holderness IĪ, 192.

590. WILLM. REDMAN of Tweselton in Lonsdalle: quarterly I and IV gules three cushions ermine a crescent for difference; II and III silver three swine (?) sable.

> Twiselton in the West Riding, near Ingleton. For I and IV see no. 544. II and III the editor cannot identify; the beasts are not certain.

501. Corthorpe of Corthorpe: gold a bend azure.

Given for Carthorpe in Glover Ord. Courthorpe of Sussex bore silver a fess azure between three stars sable. See Shirley, Noble and Gentle Men of England.

592. Berwicke in Kendall: silver three bears' heads sable muzzled gules.

> So blazoned for Hugh Berwicke in Ballard's roll of Edward IV date. See pedigree FVY 229.

593. LAURENS of Heland in Kendall: quarterly I and IV Fo. 59v silver a cross raguly gules; II and III lozengy silver and sable.

Quarters I and IV are blazoned for sir James Laurence of Asheton in Ballard's roll; II and III are given in Glover Ord. for Besome and Dalton, both of Cumberland. The editor cannot trace this family of Lawrence. See no. 166 above.

594. Urswike in ffornes: quarterly I and IV gules three cushions silver; II and III gold three pheons azure.

The Urswicke shield was silver on a bend sable three lozenges silver each charged with a saltire gules as blazoned in Will. The same arms are quartered by Fleming of Rydale for Urswick. (FCW 46.) There are notices of the family in VCH, Lancas., III-V. Quarters I and IV bear a Redman shield.

595. ALEXANDER DRAX: checky gules and azure on a chief silver a plume of three feathers gules.

Of Woodhall, Tickhill wapentake, Yorkshire. Pedigree FVY 342, and a short account of the later family VCH, North Riding, I, 229. No Alexander appears in either account.

596. DAVENTRE: ermine a cross gules.

In Jen. Ord. and Glover Ord. Robert Daventry bears this shield. See Baker's Northants. I, 309.

597. Sr. J. Mour: silver a fess dancetty sable and gules in chief a crown gold.

In Powell "More" bears the fess dancetty gold and gules between three spur rowells sable. There is no record of the shield here blazoned.

598. Sr. Richard Norwood: ermine a cross engrailed gules.

Sir John Norwoode bore the field silver in Duns. I but ermine in Planche. Stothard engraves an effigy of sir Richard Norwood in Minster church, Kent (1301), who bears these arms on his shield.

599. Sr. Edward Pembrig: silver a bend indented gules and a chief azure.

Sir John Pembrige bore in Duns. I the same charges but on an azure field with the chief gules and the bend silver. See Eyton's Staffs. II, 226.

600. SR. J. SUTTON: gold three chevrons azure.

Blazoned with the chevrons sable for sir John Sutton in Duns. II and in Will.

601. Sr. Piers Dovedall: silver a cross patonce gules on it a roundel. . . .

Blazoned for sir John Dovedale (Uvedale) in Parl. and Jen., but without the roundel. A Surrey family. See Surrey Arch. Collections III, 63-192.

602. Sr. OLYVER of Denham: gules a fess fusilly ermine and a border engrailed silver.

So given in Pap. 735, without reference. The shield is not in the rolls of arms.

- 603. Sr. Brian Thornhill: gules two bars ermine.

 So blazoned for him FVY 647. Pedigree *ibid*. 579 and CVY I, 29-83.
- 604. Sr. J. Mobrishale: silver a fess sable on a chief gules a leopard gold.
- 605. Sr. Rauf Cornwaill: silver on a fess sable three bezants.

So borne by Richard de Cornwall in Charles and St. George. There is an account of the family in *Genealogist III*, 225. See also Baker's *Northants I*, 415.

606. Sr. NICHOLL HEWIKE: gules bezanty and a lion rampant silver.

So blazoned for him in Powell. It is one of the quarterings borne by Malham of Elslack. See FVY 295; also Two Tudor Books of Arms, ed. Foster, 82.

607. Sr. J. Gyse: lozengy vair and gules on a quarter gold three molets sable.

A similar shield is given for sir John de Gyse (Buckinghamshire) in Parl., and for sir Walter in Jen. See H, XXI, 72, for Gyse of Gloucestershire, who there bear a different shield. See Foster, *Tudor Arms op. cit.*, 234.

- 608. Chawdys: ermine on a chief sable three pierced cinquefoils silver.
- 609. Lorens: Silver a leopard passant sable crowned Fo. 60 gold.
- 610. NEWTON: gules three chevrons silver in chief two escallops silver.
- 611. Massers: silver a bend engrailed between two cotises gules.

Given in Pap. 203 for Layford; no authority quoted.

612. Sr. RICHARD BEMETTER: gules a lion rampant and a border engrailed ermine.

Given in Pap. 120 without reference for Ridell.

613. ROBERT RUSSELL: silver on a bend sable three bezants, a chief gules.

This is apparently a shield differenced by the bend from that borne by Ralph Russell in Planche, namely silver on a chief gules three bezants. The editor cannot trace this particular family.

614. CLENELL: gold three pierced cinquefoils sable.

Clennell, near Harbottle, Northumberland. The shield does not appear elsewhere for the family, who, in the eighteenth century, bore azure a dexter arm and hand, vested, grasping a truncheon silver as carved upon tombs in Alwinton church. (AA, 4th ser., VIII, pp. 58/9 and plates IV/V.) The cinquefoils probably come from the cinquefoil of Umfraville, lords of Harbottle.

615. ROBERT CONSTABLE of Holdernes in com. Ebor: lozengy silver and sable each lozenge charged with a lozenge counter-coloured.

The shield, as here given, is not elsewhere recorded. FVY, p. 401, gives it without the counter-coloured lozenges, and it is so borne in the quartered shield of Constable of Cliffe. (SS XXXVI, 339.) See Poulson's *Holderness* II, 227/35; also Foster, *Tudor Arms*, p. 24, for Constable of Catfoss, a similar shield to this.

616. ESLINGTON: silver two bars and in chief three molets azure.

A manor on the Aln, near Whittingham, Northumberland. Blazoned as here in Jen. Ord. For account of family and manor see *Whittingham Vale* by D. D. Dixon, and AA, 2nd ser., XlV, 243.

- 617. BARALL: silver three bears sable.
- 618. Burell: azure three escutcheons silver.

The shield, with the field vert, of Burrell, lords Willoughby of Eresby, and of the families of Essex and Sussex. It is not recorded in the early rolls. See Sussex Arch. Colls. XLIII, pp. 1-43.

- 619. Medloms: (no colours expressed) . . . on a bend three bougets. . . .
- 620. Grey of Wyperden: gules a chevron between three lozenges gold.

Grey of Kyloe and Wooperton, Northumberland, bore the arms of Grey of Chillingham with a martlet for difference in 1615. (FNV 64.) The above shield is not recorded elsewhere.

621. BURONDON: sable three unicorns' heads couped silver.

These should probably be horses' heads as blazoned in Glover Ord. For arms of the Northumbrian family of Borondon (Burradon) see AA, 3rd ser., II, 174.

622. Crawsester: quarterly gold and gules a crow in the quarter.

For Craster of Craster, Northumberland. So blazoned for John Crawcestre in Jen. The seal of Edmond Craster A.D. 1323 bears the same. (SND 201/02.)

623. CORBETT: silver a "corbie" sable.

Blazoned with the field gold for Peter Corbet in Parl. and in Powell. The shield with one, two or three "corbies" is given in various of the rolls. The Corbets of Stanton and other manors in Northumberland bore gold three corbies sable. See Proc. N/C. Antiq., 4th ser., III, 95/6.

624. Collenwoode: silver three bucks' heads caboshed gules.

Collingwood, Northumberland. Blazoned as here in Glover Ord. At the Visitation of 1666 Collingwood of Eslington bore silver a chevron between three stags' heads rased sable. Collingwood of Great Ryle placed gold cinquefoils on the chevron. (FNV 32-33.) See also p. 97 above.

625. Heborne: silver three lamps sable.

Fo. 60v

Hebburn, near Chillingham, Northumberland. The shield is not recorded elsewhere for them. For account of the family see AA, 2nd ser., XVIII, p. 26 ff.

626. DOXFORD: silver on a bend sable three quatrefoils silver.

Doxford in the parish of Ellingham, Northumberland. The shield is not recorded elsewhere for the family. For account see NCH II, 312.

627. SALCOCKE: silver a chevron sable between three cocks gules.

A seal of Thos. Salcocke, SND 700, bears three cocks. See Yorks. Rec. Soc. XXXIX, p. 98 and note 1.

- 628. Pyis: gules three birds (pyes) silver, legs and wings sable.
- 629. TRRWYTT: silver on a bend sable three molets silver.

Not recorded elsewhere. The shield of Tyrwhit bears a chevron between three tirwhits. (AA, 3rd ser., vol. VI, p. 132.) See also pedigree of Tyrwhit of Lincolnshire gules three peewits gold, H, LII, 1017.

630. GARLAND: silver three garlands vert with flowers gules.

Not recorded elsewhere. See H, VI, 123, and Vivian's Visits. of Devon 390.

631. Lile of Gloceshrshire: gold a bend sable on a chief gules three lions rampant silver.

The differenced shield of the Lisles of Hants. At Duns, I sir John del Yle bore gold on a chief azure three lions rampant gold. Blazoned also for sir John Lisle of Hants. in Glover Ord.

632. Sr. Hugh fitz Symond: gules three escutcheons silver.

So blazoned for him in Powell. Pedigree H, XVI, 328. Sir Richard fitz Symon, a founder of the Garter, bore the same shield with colours reversed.

633. WILLM. TANKARD: silver a chevron between three escallops gules.

See pedigree SS 144, p. 46 and notes thereto. See also FVY $64\,\mathrm{r}$ and 645.

634. ROBERT Cros: silver on a bend sable a cross bottonnée between two crabs silver.

See FVY 401, where it is blazoned without the crabs.

635. HETON: vert a lion rampant and a border engrailed silver.

Of Heton, Northumberland, and so blazoned in Jen. See seals AA, 2nd ser., XXV, p. 68, and *ibid.*, 3rd ser., XX, nos. 399/402.

636. TWYFORD of Berwike: silver two chevrons sable on a canton sable a pierced molet silver.

Blazoned with bars in place of the chevrons for sir John de Twyford in Duns. I and in Borough.; also in later rolls. The editor cannot trace this family. The family, who bore bars, were of Leicestershire and Frostdyke, co. Lincoln. Pedigree (no arms) H, LII, 1016.

637. Hugh Husse: silver on a fess sable a lion passant silver.

Pap. gives this shield with the field gold for Hussey of Notts. and Wilts. It is given for sir Hugh Hussey of Flintham, whose daughter married sir Rowland Sutton, H, IV, 142.

638. ACTON of Newcastell: . . . a fess ermine and a label of three points. . . .

Not recorded elsewhere. The seals of the family bear a cross between four lions passant. See DS, nos. 26/27, and SND, nos. 5/6. Another seal shows a ramping lion on a field powdered with acorns, DS, nos. 24/25. See also note in AA, 3rd ser., II, p. 174, and no. 51 above.

539. CLIFTON: quarterly I and IV gules a lion rampant silver in an orle of molets silver; II and III silver a lion rampant sable.

This shield is made up of two distinct Clifton shields. I and IV is blazoned for sir Gervase Clifton in Powell, with molets in place of cinquefoils. The shield of Clifton of Clifton, Notts. Quarters II and III are blazoned with the field gold for sir John Clifton in Duns. I. There is an account of the family in Wotton's Baronetage.

640. Stephan Ellys: gold on a cross sable a molet between four crescents silver.

Blazoned with five crescents on the cross for sir Henry Ellis of Yorkshire in Parl. Three Yorkshire families bore these arms with differences. Pedigrees FVY 135, 328 and 515. See also CVY 278/82.

641. Lange: silver a fess between three stars sable.

Fo. 61

642. Trowlop: vert a fess between three bucks statant silver.

Vert three bucks courant gold (or silver) is the shield of Trollope of co. Durham. See SD, I, 92/3, also FDV 307. The shield with the fess is not elsewhere recorded. See no. 135 above.

643. Constable of ffrismers: sable a pierced cinquefoil between three crosses bottonnée silver.

Of Catfoss and Freshmarsh in Holderness. Pedigree FVY 306 and CVY III, 92. At these Visitations the shield is blazoned with the cinquefoil gold in an orle of crosses crosslet gold.

- 644. RICHARD ULLYSBY: silver a chevron gules gutty silver between three slipt trefoils vert.
- 645. Colwell of Northumbland: silver three chevrons sable bezanty.

Given in Glover Ord. for Colvile. The editor is not able to identify the family who bore this shield.

646. ADM. FFRANKE: azure on a chevron engrailed between three boars' heads rased silver a bird gules.

647. WARD: gules on a chevron gold three pierced molets sable.

The editor cannot trace a family of this name bearing these arms. Pap. 489 gives them for Carr of Yorkshire, etc.

- 648. ERYNDONE: sable on a bend silver three pierced molets sable.
- 649. J. Solton: silver a canton sable.

The name is an error for Sutton. Glover Ord. blazons the shield for sir Thomas Sutton of co. Notts. See pedigree H, IV, p. 142. It appears in the earlier rolls with the field ermine. (Pap. 354.)

650. J. Manners: gold two bars azure and a chief gules.

Of Etal, Northumberland. Shield blazoned for sir Robert
Manners in Nativity, and for John in Powell. Seals DS,
no. 1698; SND, nos. 500/1. For pedigree and account of the
family and of Etal see NCH XI, pp. 444 and 460. The
shield is derived from that of Muschamp, lords of Wooler,
who bore gold a chief azure.

651. Strouder: gules on a bend silver three eagles, wings raised, vert, legs gules.

Strother, a widespread Northumbrian family. Arms blazoned in Will. Seals see SND, nos. 729-33. Pedigree NCH XI, 132. The eagles should be *spread*.

652. ILDERSTON: silver three bougets sable.

The name is from Ilderton, Northumberland. The arms are first blazoned in Jen. Ord., and are derived from the bougets of the lords Ros of Wark. Seals SDT, nos. 1427/29.

653. Esselrykes: silver three hazel-leaves vert.

The canting arms of Hazlerigg or Heselrigg, originally of Fawdon, Northumberland, now represented by Heselrig of Noseley, Leicestershire. The arms do not appear in the rolls earlier than EL, and then with a chevron between the leaves. Seals SND 395/96. Pedigree of the family of Swarland NCH VII, 395.

654. Cheswike: gules a bend wavy silver.

Not elsewhere recorded. Probably the Northumbrian family (North Durham), whose pedigree is given RND 228.

655. HAGRĪSTONE: azure on a bend cotised silver three mascles gules.

Blazoned for Robert Haggerstone, with billets in place of mascles, in Jen. Ord. See note upon the shield in RND, pp. 224/25; also AA, 3rd ser., III, 289. Seals SND, nos. 343/44.

- 656. Darlinges: gold a bend wavy sable.
- 657. Samsone: gules three squirrels silver.

Fo. 619

- 658. Goswyke: vert a fess between three geese silver.

 Probably the canting arms of the Northumbrian family whose pedigree is given RND 182. Not elsewhere recorded.
- 659. RYDALL: silver a fess azure between three sheaves gules.

So blazoned for John Riddell in Jen. The Northumbrian family of the name bore the sheaves azure. Pedigree NCH IV, 284.

660. Sr. RICHARD FITZ SYMOND: gules a chief gold.

So borne by him in Duns. II. In Will. "monsr. Thos. Fitz Simonde" bore gold a chief gules. See no. 632 above.

661. Sr. Robert Grystley: vair gules and azure a bend silver.

The differenced shield of Gresley, who bore vair ermine and gules or sometimes silver and gules.

662. Sr. RAUF Belhous: gold a saltire lozengy gules and vert (? vair).

At Calais sir John de Belhuse bore a similar shield.

663. No NAME: silver three piles issuing from sinister base each ending in a fleur-de-lis sable.

With the colours reversed the shield is given in Jen. for Robert de Norton, and in Glover Ord. for John Norton.

664. No NAME: silver a fess embattled counter-embattled between three fleurs-de-lis sable.

The editor is unable to identify this shield. Pap. 754 gives a similar shield for Lynwood without reference.

665. Sr. George Gray: azure a chief silver and a baston gules.

The editor is unable to trace a family of Gray who bore this shield.

666. Sr. J. CHETWYNE: silver two chevrons gules.

Pap., p. 540, gives this shield for "Chetwyn" without reference. At Borough. sir John Chetwynd bore azure a chevron between three molets gold.

667. Sr. Robert de Berge: vair gules and silver a label of three points, azure, gold, azure.

Not recorded elsewhere. For the vair silver and gules shield see Pap. 1119.

668. Sr. Robert Cruse: azure a bend party indented silver and gules between six escallops silver.

Pap. 214 gives this, without reference, for Cruse of Devonshire. They were an ancient family of Morchard in that county. Pedigree Vivian's Visits. of Devon 256.

669. Sr. WILLM. BURTON: sable a chevron between three martlets silver.

Blazoned for him in Powell but with owls in place of martlets.

670. Sr. Michael Poninges: barry gold and vert a border engrailed ermine.

In Duns. II "monsr. Michael Ponynges" bore this shield. He was the brother of Thomas, who bore the undifferenced shield of Poynings barry gold and vert a bend gules. Arms quartered by Percy earls of Northumberland. See no. 66 above.

671. Sr. J. Denom: silver a bend sable fretty (or lozengy) gold cotised gules.

So blazoned for him in Powell.

672. Sr. J. Styton: gules a bend silver between six martlets gold.

So blazoned for sir John de Seton in Will, and in Glover Ord. He died 1396. (Pap. 210.)

Fo. 62 673. Sr. J. Colevill: gold on a fess gules three crosses crosslet silver.

Blazoned as here for him in Will., and with the crosses fitchy in Jen. Ord.

674. Sr. RAUF SCHIRLLE: paly gold and azure a canton ermine.

The colours should be gold and sable. It is the differenced shield of the Shirleys of Warwickshire, and is blazoned (gold and sable) with the canton as here for sir Ralph Shirley in Powell and Will.

675. Sr. RICHARD SCHELTON: silver on a bend sable three fleurs-de-lis gold.

Blazoned as here for sir Ralph Shelton in Glover Ord.

676. Sr. Walter Mongomere: gold a spread eagle azure beaked and armed gules.

Borne by sir William Montgomery at Borough., and by sir Walter at Calais.

677. Sr. WILLM. Bemond: azure a lion rampant gold, over all a bend engrailed gules.

This differenced Beaumont shield does not appear in the rolls of arms. In all the recorded shields, however otherwise differenced, the field is powdered with fleurs-de-lis. Pap., p. 72, gives, without reference, azure a lion rampant gold a bend compony gold and gules for Beaumont.

678. Sr. Richard Marton: bendy azure and silver a label of three points.

The differenced shield of Merton of Merton, Devonshire, and of Melling, Lancashire. Blazoned in Glover Ord.

679. Sr. Hugh Menill: vair silver and sable a border engrailed gules.

Blazoned for him in Duns, I without the border and with a label of three points gules.

680. Sr. Guy fferrers: vair gules and silver, a border engrailed silver.

The differenced shield of the Ferrers, earls of Derby, who bore vair gold and gules.

681. Sr. Roger Chetwynd: silver two chevrons gules, a border engrailed gules.

See no. 666 above.

682. Sr. J. Seint Quyntin: gules fleuretty silver on a canton azure a castle gold.

The editor cannot identify this shield. It does not appear elsewhere. The shield of St. Quintin was gold three chevrons gules and a chief vair.

683. Robert Grendur of Gloucestershire: gold a fess between six crosses crosslet gules.

The Grendon family of Gloucestershire's arms are silver two chevrons gules as borne by sir Ralph Grendon at Falkirk, and as blazoned in later rolls. The shield here given is blazoned in Glover Ord. for Glendor or Grayndor.

684. DE LA HAY of Herefordshire: silver the sun in his splendour gules.

So blazoned for John de la Haye in St. George. It is sometimes blazoned as an estoile.

685. Cokeyn of Peke: silver three cocks gules.

So borne by John Cokayn in Will. They were of Ashborne, co. Derby. There is an account of the Northants. branch in Coll. Top. et Gen. III, 437/61. See also Trans. Derbyshire Arch. Soc. III, 109. Pedigree with quartered shield Genealogist, N.S., VII, 69.

686. Sr. E. Betham de Kendall: quarterly I and IV silver a chief indented azure; II and III gold three fleurs-de-lis sable.

The arms in I and IV do not appear in the rolls of arms; quarters II and III with three fleurs-de-lis are given for Betham by Glover. The manor of Betham is near Kendal, Westmorland. There is an account of the family in NBWC I, pp. 223 and 626.

687. Sr. T. Cumberworth: checky gold and gules on a chief silver a lion passant sable.

So blazoned for sir Thomas Cumberworth in Glover Ord. In the pedigree of Constable (FVY 178) sir Robt. Cumberworth, who bore this shield, marries the daughter and heiress of sir Willm. Argum; their daughter married sir Marmaduke Constable, living 1355.

688. THIMBLEBY of Lincolnshire: paly silver and sable on a bend sable three molets silver.

In the Visitation pedigree the molets are blazoned in bend not on a bend. See pedigrees Visitation of Lincolnshire, Genealogist V, 114; VI, 285. For Yorkshire branch FVY 578.

Fo. 62v 689. Sr. WILLM. ARGOM of the Wald: silver a chevron between three martlets sable.

So blazoned in Glover Ord. There is a short pedigree in that of Constable of Everingham. (FVY 178.)

690. T. HARINGTON: quarterly I and IV sable a fret silver a label gules; II and III silver a saltire gules; impaling quarterly I and IV silver a cross patonce sable; II and III gules a slipt trefoil between three escallops silver.

Quarters I and IV for Harrington first appear in the rolls of arms in Duns. I; II and III for Neville of Hornby; the impalement the editor cannot identify. I and IV are the arms of Banaster; II and III those of Dacre. See nos. 36, 37, 178 and 506 above.

691. RICHARD WASTENES of Stow: sable a lion rampant silver.

So blazoned, but collared gules, for sir Wm. Wasteneys in Duns. I, and for Thomas in Powell. Ardolf de Wasteneys bore the lion double-tailed in Duns. II. See Visits. of Staffordshire 156 (Wm. Salt Soc.) and Genealogist, N.S., XIII, 174; XIV, 103.

692. Sr. Andrew Sakvill: quarterly gold and gules a bend azure.

Borne, with the bend vair, by Andrew Sackville in Duns. I, and by others of the family in later rolls. It was borne with the bend vair by Sackville, duke of Dorset. There is a pedigree in Berry's Sussex Genealogies, and notice of some of the family in Coll. Top. et Gen. III, 295.

693. NICHOLAS KETON of Keton: gold three leopards' faces sable.

Blazoned with the field silver for Ketton in Glover Ord.

694. THOMAS CLAY: silver three wolves rampant sable the two in chief facing each other (above shield iij wolfes rampant).

The shield does not appear in the rolls of arms nor elsewhere,

695. Sr. Th. Lathome: gold on a chief indented azure three martlets silver.

Blazoned, with bezants in chief instead of martlets, for sir Thos. Lathom in Jen. Ord. For account of family see Coll. Top. et Gen. VII, p. 1 ff.

696. Sr. A. LEYLAND: bendy silver and gules.

In Powell sir Thos. Leyland bore silver a bend gules cotised sable. The editor is unable to identify the family who bore the shield here given. The family of Lancashire bore quite different arms.

697. KENDALL of Rippon: per bend indented silver and sable.

The arms do not appear in the earlier rolls. At the 1575 Visitation of Durham, Kendal of Thorpe Thewles, co. Durham, bore this shield differenced by a molet. See FVY 402.

- 698. Sr. Richard Turiboke: gold on a chief intended azure three molets silver.
- 699. Sr. Edmond Saint Amand: silver fretty sable on a chief sable three roundels silver.

Aumary St. Amand, lord of Woodhay, Beds., bore this shield with a gold field and bezants in chief at Caer., as did others of the family in later rolls.

700. Sr. J. Lortz: azure a cross gold.

So blazoned for sir Henry Lortz (of Somerset) in Parl. and in Jen. Ord.

701. JAMES HUTTON: ermine a fess of five fusils gules pierced silver.

This shield is given in Burke for Hutton, and for Hutton of Holderness FVY 402.

702. Skypwith: barry silver and gules in chief a grey-hound courant sable.

These arms are not in the rolls of arms, though the family was an ancient one. (Shirley's Noble and Gentle Men of England 264.) Pedigree FVY 634. FVY 178 sir William Skipwith bears barry gules and silver and a canton silver.

703. Constable of fresmers: azure crusilly and a cinquefoil gold.

See no. 643 above.

704. J. Langton of Lincolnshire: quarterly gold and sable a baston gules.

Quarterly sable and gold a bend silver is given for Langton of Lincolnshire in Glover Ord., and with quarters II and III silver for Langton of Yorkshire. Pedigree of Langton of Langton, Lincolnshire. H, LI, p. 580, and LV, p. 1277. See also no. 734 below.

Fo. 63 705. THORNTON of ferlington: silver a chevron gules between three thorn leaves slipt vert.

The shield of Thornton of East Newton, Yorkshire, differenced by changing the chevron from sable to gules. The arms were granted to Richard Thornton of East Newton in 1563. (FVY 296.) See no. 245 above.

706. WILLM. RYLSTON: sable a saltire silver.

So blazoned for him in Will. Rilston is in the West Riding, parish of Burnsall. See Whitaker's *Craven*, 3rd ed., p. 518; also SS 144, p. 44 and FVY 404.

707. R. Trehampton: silver on a bend gules three bougets gold.

In Glover "Ralph de Trehampton" bears silver a bend gules, and in Jen. John bore three cinquefoils on the bend. There is no other record of the shield as here blazoned.

708. T. NEVILL of picall: gules a saltire ermine.

So blazoned for Robert Nevill of "Pykale" in Jen. Ord. A seal of Thomas Neville of early fourteenth century date also bears the saltire ermine. (SND, no. 583.) The Nevilles of Holt, Leicestershire, descended from the family of Pickhall, Yorkshire, also bore this shield.

709. WILLM. CHANCELL: quarterly I and IV ermine on a canton silver a saltire engrailed sable; II and III azure a fess between three fleurs-de-lis gold.

Quarters I and IV are blazoned for him (Chancellor) in Jen. Ord. He was bishop Langley's chancellor of Durham 1406-37. Quarters II and III are for Skelton. The arms as here are on the cloister roof at Durham. (See DM, p. 33, no. 84, and for family SD III, 329.)

710. WILLM. PERTE: silver on a bend azure five bezants.

The shield of Pert of Yorkshire was silver on a bend gules three mascles. See FVY 462 and Glover Ord.

711. FFEIIERR: silver a cross engrailed sable.

The shield is given in the rolls of arms for Conan of Kelfield and for Conan fitz Henry of Kelfield, Yorkshire. In Will. it is blazoned for Thomas fitz Henry, and in Glover Ord. for John Kelkfield. See no. 16 above.

712. THOMAS FFULTHORPE: silver a cross moline sable.

So blazoned in Will. for Alan Fulthorpe. The family were of Tunstall, co. Durham. Pedigree FDV 129 and SD, III, 126.

713. RICHARD RICHEMOND: silver a fess engrailed between six fleurs-de-lis sable.

See SS, no. 144, p. 124; also FVY 3.

714. JOHN BROUGHTON: silver two bars gules on a canton gules a cross engrailed silver.

Blazoned for him as here in Jen. Ord. The name is from Broughton, Staffordshire, baronets by Charles II. See Baronetage, G.E.C., s.v.

715. BAILLOLL: gules an orle silver.

The shield of the Baliols, lords of Barnard Castle. Blazoned with many differences in the rolls of arms from Henry III onwards. Pedigree SD, IV, 6o. For various shields see AA, 4th ser., IV, p. 22.

716. CAMOIS: silver. on a chief gules three roundels silver.

So blazoned for *Johan de Camoyes* in Planche. See CP, new ed., II, p. 506 ff. See no. 253 above.

717. GILBERT GAUNT: barry azure and gold a bend gules.

Blazoned in Parl., and for Gilbert de Gaunt of Swaledale in Jen. See *History of Richmond* by Clarkson, 309, and VCH, North Riding, I, 237-42. See no. 123 above.

718. PHILIP BASSETT: gold two bars nebuly gules.

So blazoned for him in St. George. Dugdale in his Usage of Arms, ed. 1682, pp. 19/23, gives the various differences used by the many branches of this family. See also CP, new ed., II, p. 1 ff.

719. Langley: paly silver and vert a molet silver on the second pale.

So borne by Thomas Langley, bishop of Durham, 1406-37. (See DS, nos. 3149-51.) The shield does not appear in the rolls of arms before Glover Ord., where, without the molet, it is given for Langley of Bedfordshire. See no. 129 above.

720. Sr. Henry ffenwyke: silver a chief gules and six martlets counter-coloured.

The arms of Fenwick of Fenwick, Northumberland, first blazoned in Will. The family divided into many branches. Sir Henry Fenwick owned Fenwick tower in 1415; was sheriff of Northumberland 1427-28; died before 14 Sept. 1459. See NCH XII; pedigree facing p. 352 and references there given. Seals SND, nos. 286/9.

Fo. 63^v 721. Appleyard of Heslington in Yorkshire: sable a chevron between three owls silver.

Differenced by change of colour, this shield is blazoned in FVY 146 for Appleyard of Burstwick Garth, who descended from the family of Heslington in the parish of St. Lawrence, Yorkshire.

- 722. EAWOOD of Yorkshire: silver three oak branches vert.
- 723. Boynton: ermine on a cross sable five bulls' heads couped silver.

Blazoned with the field gold in Glover Ord. It is the shield granted to sir Robt. Boynton by sir Wm. Aton after a dispute as to their respective right to it and after lord Percy had decided in favour of Aton. (Yorks. Arch. Jour. XII, 265; The Ancestor IX, 216.) The Boynton shield is gold a fess between three crescents gules.

724. Sr. RICHARD ROUKESBY: silver on a chevron sable between three rooks sable a molet silver.

Blazoned, without the molet, for sir Robt. Rokeby in Calais, and for Alexander and Thomas in later rolls. The molet is the difference used by the family of Mortham in FVY 128. See also PHY, pp. 407, 410, and VCH, North Riding, I, pp. 109-17.

725. Arden of Martyn: paly gold and gules on a chief gules three lozenges gules.

Blazoned for Arden with different colours in Glover Ord. Quartered by Creyke of Cottingham for Arden FVY 160.

726. BOURNAND of Yorke: silver on a bend azure three escallops silver a crescent for difference.

Blazoned for Birnand of Yorkshire in Glover Ord. See no. 502 above and FVY 401.

- 727. Sr. John Morren: gules three dogs passant silver between two bastons gobony silver and azure.
- 728. Sr. Gerard of Lancashire: azure a lion rampant silver crowned gold.

With the field ermine it is given in Pap. 71 for Fitz Gerard of Lancashire. See VCH, Lancaster, IV, pp. 142/3; the lion is there blazoned *ermine*.

729. Sr. RAUF SURTEYS of Dynsdale: ermine on a canton gules an orle silver.

Blazoned for Thomas Surtees in Jen. See seals DS, nos. 2342-51. Pedigree SD, III, 234. See also no. 23 above.

730. RAWCLYFF of Colthorpe: silver on a chevron between three lions' heads rased gules a molet gold.

So blazoned for ''John de Rowcliffe'' in Jen. Ord. Cowthorpe in West Riding, near Wetherby.

731. Sr. Christopher Moresby: sable a cross silver a pierced cinquefoil silver in the quarter.

So blazoned for sir Hugh Moresby in Powell. The name is from Moresby, near Whitehaven, Cumberland. Sir Christopher was the last of his name; his heiress married sir Jas. Pickering. (NBWC I, 98.) The shield is one of those of Cumberland families derived from the cross of Andrew Harcla, earl of Carlisle.

732. SR. RICHARD RADCLIFFE of Hewyke: quarterly of five I silver a bend engrailed sable an escallop sable in the chief; II gules bezanty and a lion rampant silver; III sable in base a bezant in chief a slipt lily silver; IV silver on a fess sable a molet silver; V sable a fess fusilly silver.

I Radcliffe of Hewicke and Elslack; II in Jen. Ord. for "sr. de Hewikes"; III ?; IV Keighley of Lancashire (Pap. 794); V Dawtry. Hewick is in North Riding, parish of Ripon. See FVY 295 and VCH, North Riding, II, 213/14.

733. Hamerton: silver three hammers sable.

So blazoned in Jen. See Whitaker's Craven, 134. See also SS 36, p. 354.

734. Sr. Rauf Langton: party gold and vert a cross moline gules, over all a bend sable.

So blazoned for "John de Langton" in Jen. Ord. See no. 704 above.

735. Sr. Thomas Talbot: quarterly I and IV silver three lions rampant purple; II and III silver a saltire engrailed gules.

I and IV bear the arms of Talbot of Bashall, Lancashire, and are so blazoned for sir Thomas in Parl. and Will.; II and III are the arms of Tiptoft. They do not appear among the many quarterings given with the pedigree in SS 36, p. 236 ff.; nor in CVY III, 8.

736. Sr. WILLM. GASCOYNE: quarterly I silver on a pale sable a conger eel's head gold; II gules on a saltire silver an escallop sable; III gules a lion rampant silver a border gobony gold and gules; IV vair gules and gold.

I Gascoigne as blazoned for sir William in Jen. Ord; II Neville of Oversley; III Mowbray; IV ? Ferrers. Pedigree PHY 116; FVY 384.

Fo. 64 737. THWAITES of Denton: silver on a fess sable between three fleurs-de-lis gules three bezants.

This shield is given in Burke for Thwaites of Derbyshire and of Norfolk. See FVY, pp. 453, 469.

738. FFYNCHAM: barry silver and sable a bend ermine.

So blazoned for Fincham of the Isle of Ely in Glover Ord. The same shield was also borne by the family of Norfolk. See Blomefield's *Norfolk* VII, 348 and 462

739. Cholmeleye, Ley of Stokhill: . . . in chief a helm . . . in base two sheafs . . . a sword . . . fessways between them impaling azure a fess ermine between three leopards' faces gold.

Cholmondeley's arms are gules in chief two helmets silver in base a garb gold. Pedigree FVY 219-221. The marriage with Lee does not appear in the pedigree. This is probably the shield of a younger branch.

740. Hurst of London; Ley: quarterly I and IV silver a portcullis azure; II and III azure a fess ermine between three leopards' faces gold.

I and IV the editor is unable to trace; II and III are for Lee. The pedigree of Hurst is not in the Visitations of London in H, XV and XVII.

741. BURDETT of Halythorpe in the countie of Lyncoln: azure a fess between three martlets silver.

FVY 242 gives these arms for Burdett. In Parl. and Jen. John Burdet bears azure two bars gold on each three martlets gules.

742. GEOFFREY PERRERS of Wynthorpe in Lincolnshire: quarterly silver and sable a molet gules in the quarter.

So blazoned for sir Richard de Perers in Borough., Nativity and Duns. I. See FVY 242.

743. Wescote of Lincolnshire: silver on a chief sable three covered cups gold.

This shield is not recorded elsewhere for this name. FVY 242 wrongly attributes the shield to Howe.

744. Perrers of Wynthorp and Wescote of Lincolnshire: quarterly I and IV quarterly silver and sable a molet gules in the quarter; II and III silver on a chief sable three covered cups gold.

See nos. 742, 743.

745. BURDETT of Halythorpe in the countie of Lincoln:
 quarterly I and IV azure a fess between three
 martlets silver; II quarterly silver and sable a
 molet gules in the quarter; III silver on a chief
 sable three covered cups gold.

See nos. 741-43.

746. Puleyn of Scotton: quarterly I (azure) on a bend between six lozenges (gold) each charged with an escallop (sable) five escallops (sable); II azure a fess between three martlets silver; III quarterly silver and sable a molet sable in the quarter; IV silver on a chief sable three covered cups gold.

I Pulleine of Scotton, Yorkshire; II Burdett; III Perers; IV Westote. Same shield is given with pedigree FVY 242/43. Ralph Pulleine married Jennet, daughter and heiress of John Burdett of Hollingthorpe and heiress of Perrers of Winthorpe, and of Westcote.

- 747. PARRYS: silver (?) a fess between three double lozenges sable.
- 748. RICHARD BANKE of Wixley: sable on a cross between four fleurs-de-lis a ring sable (?).

Banke of Quixley, Yorkshire. See pedigree FVY 270, where this shield is given.

749. Gascoigne of Mekysfeald Esquire: silver on a pale sable the head of a conger eel gold a molet sable in dexter chief.

See no. 736 above. Pedigree of Gascoigne of Micklefield FVY 297.

750. John Bozun: silver three bird-bolts paleways gules tipped gold in chief a molet gold (?).

Sir John Boson (of Norfolk) bore this shield in Parl. and Powell. See also H, Lincolnshire pedigrees, I, 167.

751. NICHOLAS FFAWKE: silver a mascle sable.

Fawkes of Farnley, Yorkshire. See pedigree FVY 100. The field of the shield should be ermine. See also no. 43 above.

752. Errington: silver two bars azure in chief three escallops azure.

See no. 447 above.
