TRENTON, Tuesday, October 23, 1792.

THIS being the Time and Place appointed by Law for the first Meeting of the General Assembly, the following Persons attended, to wit, Henry Berry, returned as one of the Reprefentatives of the County of Bergen; Elias Dayton, as one of the Reprefentatives of the County of Effex; John Runyon, Peter Vredenburgh and Thomas M'Dowell, as Reprefentatives of the County of Middlefex; Robert Blair, Henry Southard and William Wallace, as Reprefentatives of the County of Somerfet; George Anderfon, as one of the Repre-fentatives of the County of Burlington; Joseph Cooper and John Blackwood, as two of the Representatives of the County of Gloucester; Eleazer Mayhew, as one of the Reprefentatives of the County of Salem; Benjamin Van-Cleve and John Taylor, as two of the Reprefentatives of the County of Hunterdon; Elijah Townfend and Richard Townfend, as two of the Reprefentatives of the County of Cape-May; Joseph Stillwell, as one of the Representatives of the County of Monmouth; Silas Condict, Hiram Smith and John Wurts, as Reprefentatives of the County of Morris; John Burgin, Joel Fithian and Ephraim Harris, as Reprefentatives of the County of Cumberland; Aaron Hankinfon and William Helms, as two of the Reprefentatives of the County of Suffex. The The respective Certificates of their Election were read, approved, and ordered to. be filed. Benjamin Van-Cleve, Efquire, was appointed, agreeably to the Conflitution, to qualify Silas Condict, Efquire, who, being duly fworn; took his Seat accordingly, and the remaining Perfons being returned as Reprefentatives, and qualified by the faid Silas Condict, took their Seats in the House.

The Houfe proceeded to the Choice of a Speaker, when the Honourable Silas Condict, Efquire, was chosen, and accordingly placed in the Chair.

The Houfe proceeded to the Election of a Clerk, when Maskell Ewing was unanimoufly chofen.

Maskell Ewing attended, and, after taking the Oath of Allegiance, and also an Oath for the faithful Discharge of his Office, took his Seat as Clerk of the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Berry do wait on Council, and acquaint them that the Houfe of Affembly have this Day proceeded to Bufinefs, and have chofen the Honourable Silas Condict, Elquire, their Speaker. H

Refolved, That David Wrighter be Doorkeeper to the Houfe during the prefent Seffion.

"Ordered, That Meffrs. Cooper, Van-Cleve and Helmes, be a Committee to report a Draught of Rules and Regulations for the better Government of the House.

Ordered, That Meffrs. Dayton, Blackwood and M'Dowell, be a Committee to examine the Minutes of the last Sitting, and to report the Business that was referred or remains unfinished.

The Houfe adjourned till To-morrow Morning ten o'Clock.

. Wednefday; October 24; 1792.

The Houfe met.

Mr. Berry reported, that he had obeyed the Order of the Houfe.

Israel Hedden, returned as one of the Representatives of the County of Essex; John Sinnickfon and Thomas Clement, returned as two of the Representatives of the County of Salem; John Lacey and Thomas Hollinshead, as two of the Reprefentatives of the County of Burlington; and Thomas Lowrey, as one of the Representatives of the County of Hunterdon, appeared in the House, and prodiced the respective Certificates of their Election, which were read, approved, and ordered to be filed; whereupon, being duly qualified by the Speaker, they took their Seats in the Houfe; and, having rendered Excufes for their Nonofficial Sounds. Mr. Cooper, from the Committee appointed for that Purpose, reported a Draught of Rules and Orders to be observed in the House of Allembly as follows:

1. That the Speaker and any two Members be a fufficient Number to meet and adjourn the House from Day to Day when necessary.

2. That on Adjournments from Day to Day every Member attend precifely at the Time to which the Houfe was last adjourned, and for Default of a Quarter of of an Hour in any Cafe, he shall be subject to a Reprinand from the Chair, una less the House admit his Excuse.

That if any Member, while the Houfe is met, abfent himfelf from the Bufinefs thereof for the Space of a Quarter of an Hour, at any one Time, without Leave previoufly obtained, he fhall be fubject to the Cenfure of the Houfe unless his Excuse be admitted.

That if any Member neglect to appear at the Time appointed on the Adjournment at the laft preceding Sitting, or on any fpecial Summons by the Speaker, or having on any Occafion obtained Leave of Abfence, exceed the Term allow-ed, he shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Two Dollars for each Day of such Delinquency, and fo in Proportion for Half a Day; and if the Speaker fo neglect he shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Three Dollars for each Day; and fo in Proportion for Half a Day; and if any Member absent himself without Leave, he shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Four Dollars for each Day's Abfence, and fo in Proportion for Half a Day; to be deducted in every Cafe from the Certificate of Wages, unlefs the Houfe admit his Excufe.

That when the Houfe shall fend their Sergeant at Arms for any absent Member, the faid Member be answerable for the Expense, to be deducted from his Certificate of Wages as aforefaid, unlefs the Houfe allow his Excufe of Abfence. a a Birnh tat you.

3. That the Speaker take the Chair from Time to Time at the Expiration of the last Adjournment, and that he attend carefully to the Prefervation of Order and Regularity in transacting the Business of the House, but shall not engage in any Debate, or propose his Opinion on any Question, without Leave of the Houfe. the second second second

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4. That every Member attend strictly and constantly to the Business of the Houfe; and that no Member interrupt or difturb the Houfe by fpeaking to his Fellow Members, entering into a private Conference, or removing from Place to Place, while any Member is speaking, or the Clerk reading by Direction of the House; and that whoever offends against this Order shall be subject to a publick Reprimand from the Chair.

That every Member, when he speaks in the House, do stand up in his Place, and address himself to the Chair, and that he be uncovered unless he be of the People called Quakers.

That in all Debates and Proceedings the Members obferve the ftricteft Decorum, and particularly that they treat the Speaker with all proper Deference and Refpect; and that if any one use indecent Expressions, or utter any perfonal Reflections, or otherwife offend herein, he be cenfured according to the Nature and Aggravation of the Offence.

That the Clerk, reading or when giving Information upon any Subject by Order of the Speaker, do stand up in his Place.

5. That the Bufinefs of the first Meeting on each Day be conducted in the following Method, to wit, I To call the Members; 2 To read the Minutes of the preceding Day; 3 To receive the Reports of Committees; 4 To proceed on the Order's and promifcuous Bufinefs of the Day; and that the Bufinefs of the fecond Meeting be conducted in the fame Manner, except as to reading the Minutes.

6. That no Debate enfue, or Question be put on a Motion, unless it be feconded, when it shall be open to Debate, and the fame receive a Determination by the Question, unless it be laid afide by the House, or a Motion be made to amend it, to postpone it, to commit it, for the previous Question, or to adjourn. A Motion

A Motion to adjourn shall always be in Order.

The previous Queftion shall be in this Form: Shall the main Queftion be now put—It shall only be admitted when demanded by four Members, and, until decided, shall preclude all Amendment and further Debate on the main Queftion.

That, on a Motion for the previous Question, no Member shall speak more than once without Leave of the House.

A Motion for Commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all Amendment of the main Question.

If a Motion contain more than one fimple Question, any Member, upon Application to the Chair, may have it divided into as many Parts as there are distinct Questions if seconded in his Motion.

That every Motion shall, on Application of any Member to the Chair for that Purpofe, be reduced to Writing by the Perfon moving the fame.

That when any Motion shall be made and seconded, the Name of the Persons moving and seconding the same shall be entered on the Minutes therewith, if any two Members require it.

7. That no Member speak more than three Times, on the same Subject, in the same Debate, without the Leave of the House.

That all Questions of Order be determined by the Speaker, fubject to an Appeal to the House when demanded by four Members.

That when two or more Members rife to fpeak nearly at the fame Time, the Speaker do decide who shall speak first, and call him by Name, and that such Member then proceed unless the House interfere and adjudge otherwise.

8. That all due Freedom of Speech be fupported and maintained in the Houfe; that no Member be called to answer with Respect to any Thing spoken by him in Debate, respecting any Member, otherwise than in the House and before the next Adjournment, except the Member so spoken of spoken of spoken of spoken the that the Members consider themselves under the Obligation of Honour not to repeat, out of the House, any Thing uttered in Debate, which being known, may be likely to involve injurious Consequences to the Publick or any Individual.

9. That when any Question is stated, and by the House agreed to be put, no Member shall be at Liberty to with-hold his Vote without the Leave of the House.

That the Yeas and Nays be entered on the Question for passing every Bill, except the fame be unanimous.

Upon Call of the House, or taking the Ayes and Noes on any Question, the Names of the Members be called alphabetically.

That the Yeas and Nays be entered on every Question taken in the House, when moved for and seconded.

10. All Bills previous to their being engroffed, all Petitions, Motions and Reports, may be committed at the Pleafure of the Houfe.

That all Committees be chosen by the House, and not more than one Member of the Committee be nominated by any one Member of the House.

That the Rules and Orders of the Houfe shall be binding on Committees of the whole House, as far as they may be proper and applicable in any Cafe.

That when the Houfe order any Paper to be filed, it shall be confidered in Order to preferve the fame.

That when the House order a Petition or other Paper to lay on the Table, it shall be for the Confideration of the Members, and may be taken up and confidered at a future Time.

11. That

11. That no publick Meffage from the Council shall henceforth be received by this House in a private Way.

12. That the Rules and Orders of the Houfe be read over at the first Meeting on the Tuefday of each Week immediately after the Call of the Houfe, and also on the Qualifying of a new Member.

13. That the Title of a Bill be fubject to Alteration by the Confent of a Majority of the Houfe, after the enacting Claufes are agreed to, any Time before the Bill be engroffed.

Which Rules and Orders were read by Paragraphs, agreed to, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes.

A Petition from the County of Cape-May, praying that the Courts of Common Pleas and Quarter Seffions may hereafter be held in that County on the laft Tuefday in May inflead of the fourth Tuefday in May, was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

A Petition from Mendham, in the County of Morris, praying Liberty by Law to vote for Representatives in the Townships in which they refide, was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

Sundry Petitions from Debtors confined in different Gaols of the State, praying the Benefit of an Act of Infolvency, were read, and committed to Meffrs. Blair, Fithian and Helms.

A Petition from the County of Salem, praying that a Law may be paffed appointing Commissioners with full Power to view the Roads from the lower Parts of the State to the Cities of Philadelphia and Trenton, was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

Mr. Condit, from Council, informed the House that a sufficient Number of the Council met Yesterday, elected the Honourable Elisha Lawrence, Esquire, Vice-President, and proceeded to Business.

The Houfe adjourned to three o'Clock, P. M.

The Petition from fundry Inhabitants of the County of Middlefex, praying that a Law may be paffed to authorize the Juffices and Freeholders of that County to erect a convenient Court-Houfe and Gaol at fuch Place as a Majority of the County by Election may order, and to raife Money to defray the Expenses thereof, was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

The Report of Mr. Van-Cleve, on the Petition from the Juffices and Freeholders of Effex County, was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

The Bill, intitled, ' An Act for the Encouragement and Support of Agricul-' ture, and domeftick Manufactures,' was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

The Bill, intitled, 'An Act refpecting the Confinement of Perfons for Debt, ' with the Petition of William Metcalf,' was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

Ordered, That the further Confideration of the Report of unfinished Business be postponed.

The Houfe adjourned till To-morrow Morning ten o'Clock.

Thursday, October 25, 1792.

The Houfe met.

Ordered, That Mr. Blackwood do wait on the Council, and inform them that the Houfe of Affembly are ready to go into a Joint-Meeting to appoint a Governor and other Officers of the State, and do request the Council to appoint the Time and Place of Meeting.

Van-Cleve, Blair, Vredenburgh, Lowrey and Hedden, or any three of them, be a Committee to join a Committee of the Council to fettle the Accounts of the Treafurer; and that Mr. Blair do wait on the Council, and request them to appoint a Committee to join the Committee of this House for that Purpose.

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A Petition from Isaac Neale, defiring to be appointed to print the Laws of the State, was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

The Speaker laid before the Houfe a Letter from the Secretary of the Senate of the United States, accompanied with a Copy of the Journals of the Senate of the United States, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

The Speaker laid before the Houfe a Letter from the Treafurer, informing that there is in the Treafury a Number of fealed Bundles of cancelled Loan-Office Money, being Part of the Principal loaned in this State, certified by the Juffices and Freeholders to amount to the Sum of Four Thoufand Four Hundred and Twenty-three Pounds Ten Shillings and Six-pence; whereupon,

Ordered, That Meffrs. Taylor, Clement, E. THAT they have examined faid Books, and compared them with fuch Copies as were delivered to them, and find that the Day-Books contain Entries of Monies received and paid at different Periods, from the Time the faid Stevens came into Office to the Time of his leaving the fame, they therefore fuppofe them to contain all the publick Entries made by him as Treafurer, but many of those Entries appear to have been made fince the Dates under which they are placed, and fome of them altered by Interlineations with different Ink, &c.

That the Books produced as Copies do not contain an Account of Payments made by him after November 1780, and are fo very erroneous, particularly where they refpect Monies received by him, that they cannot be called Copies, and are confequently of no Ufe to the State. There are no original Ledgers produced, and those offered as Copies can be

There are no original Ledgers produced, and those offered as Copies can be of no Service in the Settlement without the Originals to compare them with, as they do materially difagree in many Inftances with the Day-Books, large Sums being entered as received in the Day-Books which are not credited in the Copies of faid Ledgers.

They beg Leave further to report, that they have particularly examined the Accounts between the faid Stevens and William Abbott, formerly Collector of Hunterdon County, and compared the Receipts given to faid Abbott with the Entries in faid Day-Books, but for Want of his original Ledgers they cannot determine whether the Order drawn on faid Abbott, in Favour of Azariah Dunham, has been credited or not; but if the faid Order has been credited, they find that the faid Collector has Receipts nearly to that Amount which have not been credited in the faid Stevens's Settlements with the Legiflature, although the greater Part are entered in his Day-Books.

They have alfo examined the Accounts between faid Stevens and Lucas Schenck, and Jonathan Combs, late Collector of Middlefex County, and find the fame Difficulty for Want of the original Ledgers, they having Receipts for confiderable Sums which are not entered in any of his Books nearly to the Amount of the Order drawn on Lucas Schenck in Favour of Azariah Dunham.

They are therefore clearly of Opinion, that the original Books now in the Hands of the Treafurer ought to be retained by the State, and the Copies returned to Mr. Stevens; and that he be required to produce his original Ledgers, that they may be compared with those offered as Copies. The Plea made by Mr. Stevens and his Counfel before the Honourable House of Affembly in November last, ' That he having intermixed his private Accounts in the ' Books with the Publick, he could not give them up without great Damage ' to his private Affairs,' is wholly without Foundation, as we have not found a fingle Entry made in the Books submitted to our Inspection of a private Nature.





EING the Time, agreeably to the Adjournment at the laft Sitting, for the Meeting of the Legislature, the following Members of the General Affembly met, to wit,

Mr. Anderfon, Mr. Berry, Mr. Burgin, Mr. Clement, Mr. Dayton, Mr. Hankinfon, Mr. Harris, Mr. Hedden, Mr. Mayhew, Mr. M⁴Dowell, Mr. Rattoon, Mr. Sinnickfon, Mr. Smith, Mr. Somers, Mr. Southard, Mr. Stillwell, Mr. E. Townfend, Mr. R. Townfend, Mr. Van Cleve, Mr. Vredenburgh, Mr. Wallace, Mr. Ward, Mr. Whilldin, Mr. Williamfon, Mr. Wurts.

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Thomas Little, Efq. whofe Excufe for Non-Attendance at the laft Sitting was received, attended the Houfe, and produced a Certificate of his having been duly elected a Member for the County of Monmouth, which was read, approved and ordered to be filed; whereupon, being duly fworn, he took his Seat; and having informed the Houfe the Reafons for his Non-Attendance at the laft Sitting, the Same was refolved to be fatisfactory. Ordered, That Mr. Anderfon do wait on the Council, and inform them that a Quorum of the Affembly have met this Day, and proceeded to Bufinefs.

Ordered, That Meffirs. Van Cleve, Dayton and Burgin, be a Committee to examine the Minutes of the last Sitting, and to report a List of fuch Business as remained unfinished.

Mr. Haring, from Council, informed the House that a Quorum of the Council have this Day met, and proceeded to Business.

The Houfe adjourned till To-morrow Morning nine of the Clock."

## Thursday, May 16, 1793.

## The House met.

The Speaker laid before the Houfe a Letter from His Excellency William Paterfon, Efq. in the Words following:

New Erunfwick, 30th March, 1793.

## GENTLEMEN of the GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

MY Acceptance of the Office of an Affociate Juffice in the Supreme Court of the United States, renders it improper that I fhould continue in my prefent Station. I have accordingly this Day delivered the Great Scal to the Henourable *Elifha Lawrence*, the Vice-Prefident, and Tomorrow I fhall go out of the State; fo that he may proceed to difcharge his official Functions without any Obffacle or Difficulty.——I now formally announce my Refignation of the Government; and in doing this my laft Act, I feel inexprefible Senfibility, mingled with the livelieft Emotions of Gratitude and Refpect for the Citizens of this peaceful and happy Land. Farewell, Gentlemen; and may the God of Heaven keep you in his holy Protection, finile upon your Endeavours to promote the Interefts of this State, and the Profperity of the Union at Large.

During the Recefs I granted Commiffions to all the Officers of the volunteer Corps of Horfe, Grenadiers and Light-Infantry, agreeably to the Dates of their refpective Certificates. Commiffions for the Officers of Artillery have not been iffued; and therefore it is neceffary to explain this Part of the Bunnefs. The Act paffed at the laft Seffion of the Legiflature declares, that no more than eight Companies of Artillery fhall be formed in the State; whereas Certificates of fourteen Companies have been already transmitted, and I have Ground to expect two or three more in Counties from which no Returns have yet been received. If the eight Companies that were first formed, fhall be entitled to Eftablishment, fill this Priority cannot be afeertained until all the Certificates fhall come to Hand. Befides, upon confidering the Act of Congress, it appeared to be their Intention, that the Artillery fhould be taken from, or, at leaft, apportioned among the different Brigades; and, therefore, that Regard mult be had to their local Situation. The Nature of the Thing feems to point out the Propriety of the Meafure, and to indicate, that they should be either formed from the Brigade, or fo fituated as to be conveniently attached to it. Thefe Reasons induced to a Postponement of the Business for your Coulideration and Decision.

Richard Cox, Efq. the Commiffioner appointed for the County of Burlington, declined to ferve; but of this he did not give me any Notice till the 19th of January; and as the 20th of the fame Month was the Time limited for enrolling fuch of the Militia as did not elect to enter into volumteer Corps, the Duties enjoined could not of Courfe be performed without an Enlargement of Time. The Urgency of the Occafion left no Room to hefitate, as to the Line of Conduct neceffary to be purfued. I accordingly appointed Jofeph Eloomfield, Efq. Commiffioner in the Stead of Mr. Cox;

• and

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and directed, that the Duties and Things preferibed to be done by the 2d of January, fhould be done by the 10th of March; and those prescribed to be done by the 20th of January, should be done by the 20th of April; and that, with this Extension of Time, the Act should, in every Respect, be obferved and carried into Effect. I hope that Mr. Bloomfield will be able to perform the Services defignated by the Act; and if he should, it will be necessary, on Account of the Duration as to Time, to adopt and ratify his Proceedings.

The Revision of the Laws, which I was authorized to make, is an Object of great Expectation, Utility and Importance. The Avocations of the Office to which I have been recently appointed, will, no doubt, interfere with and retard the Progreffion of this Work; and therefore it will be most adviseable to fubfitute fome other Perfon in my Stead. Whoever may conduct this Business, it is neceffary that the Legiflature fhould fpeedily decide upon an interesting Point, which will arife in the Exercise of revisionary Power. I allude to the Code of criminal Law. The Act authorizes the Revifer to felect and arrange all the Statutes of England or Great Britain, which, before the Revolution, were practifed, or, by the Conftitution, extend to this State. The System of penal Jurifprudence, which prevails in Great Britain, is complicated and fanguinary in a high Degree. It is written in Blood, and cannot be read without Horror. The Penalty in many Cafes rifes far above the Offence ; whereas Juffice, as well as Policy, requires, that the former should be proportioned to the latter. A full Conviction of the Impolicy, Inadequacy and Cruelty of the exifting System of penal Law, and of the Necessity of a thorough Reform, have constrained me to make the foregoing Remarks. If the Legislature concur in Sentiment, it will be eafy by a supplemental Act to enlarge the Powers of the Revifer, fo as to embrace the Object in View.

I have paid the third Instalment for one hundred Shares, fubfcribed on the Part of the State, in the Stock of the " Society for establishing useful Manufactures."
