VALEDICTORY ADDRESS

The class of 1990 salutes not just the name but the staff and students of Trafalgar Castle School. We, the graduates, are living proof of what true victory is. O! the joys, that came down shower-like
Of Friendship, love and liberty".

Indeed you see us here tonight as blossoms from those joys of friendship. Believe it or not we'll miss the anonymous cold splashes during a warm bath. The unexpected photographers who practised while we slept, ate or dressed. We definitely studied with total dedication. One just had to look at Main Hall's table in the morning. An infinite number of empty diet coke cans and snicker bar wrappings. With a new microwave there was a permanent odour of pop-corn. And of course our constructive 'study-hall periods'. So much so that homework was a never . . . ending task of course.

Now the time has come for us to go our separate paths. It will be sad without these friends but the memories we shared will strengthen us. How best can we say it but that we love them and will miss them deeply.

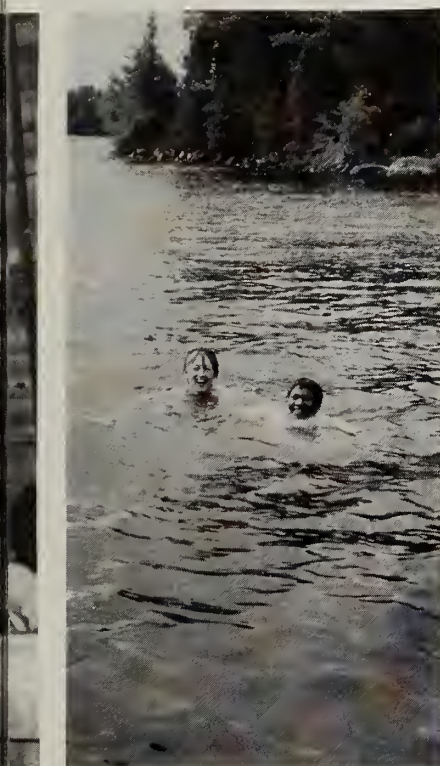

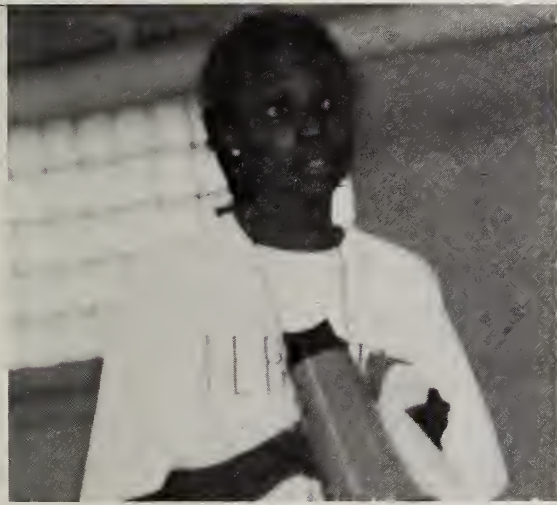

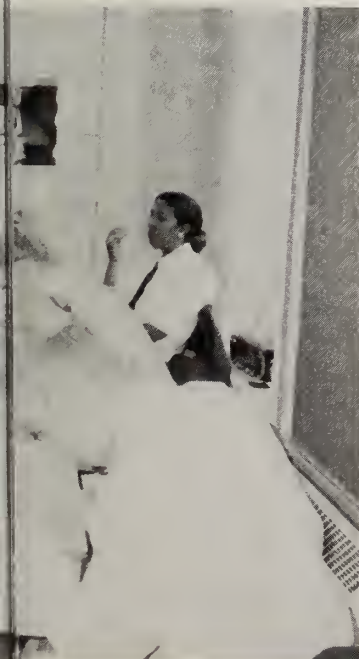
Bazaar

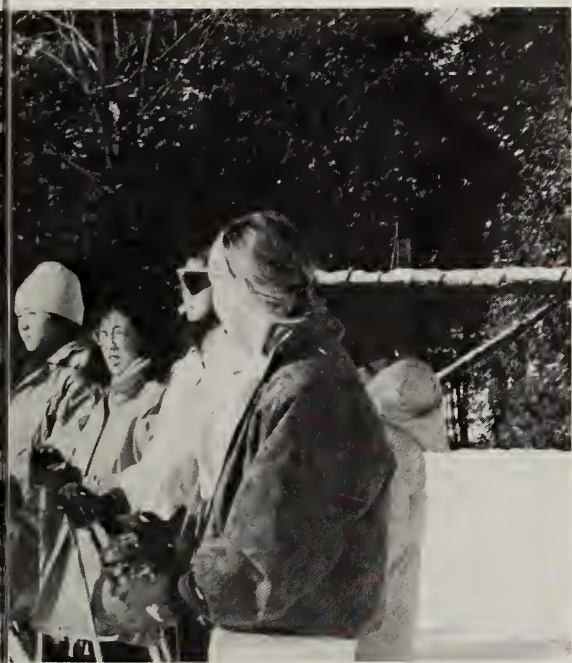

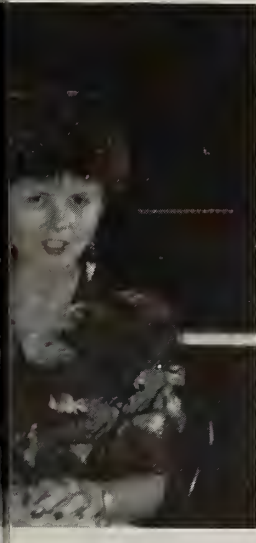


Senior Dinner

May Day

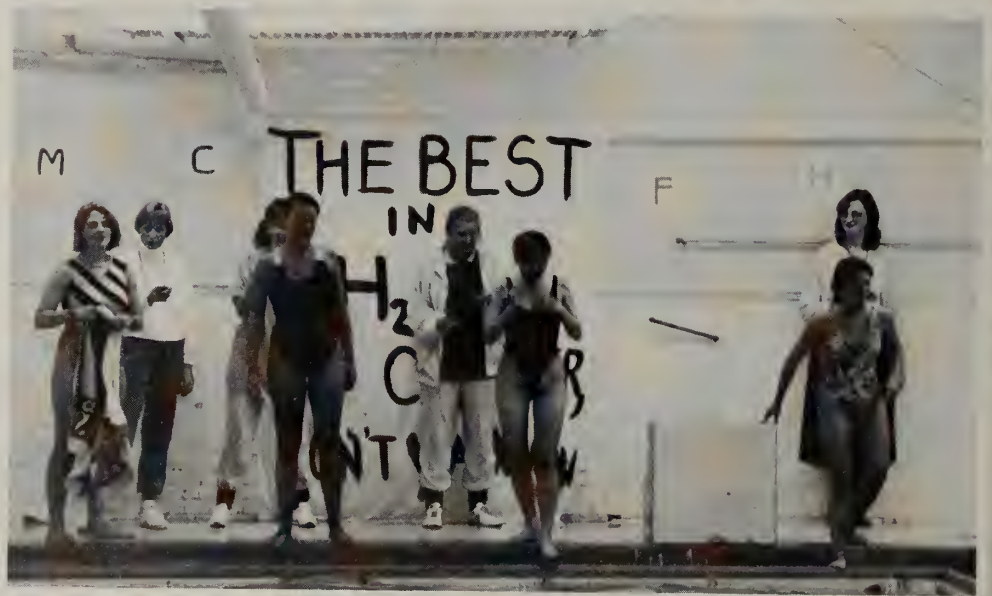

Trafalgar students sixth in stock market competition

A team of two students from Trafalgar Castle school in Whitby has won the Ontario, north and east, regional award in Wilfrid Laurier University's annual fall stock market competition.

The students are Jennifer Huang and Wendy Wong.

The team turned its original stake of \$100,000 into \$114,618.76 over a 12-week trading period that began in September.

The money was only imaginary but the competition wasn't as the team beat more than 150 others for the regional honour. The Trafalgar Castle team ranked 10th nationally among about 1,000 teams from more than 200 schools across the country.

A team from Hagersville Secondary School in Hagersville, Ont., increased its portfolio to \$255,442.88 to become the national winners in the fall competition.

The annual spring competition will be held in February.

The stock market competition began in 1968 as part of a first-year business program at WLU, was later played by high school students across Ontario, and then went national in 1983.

Now the largest annual competition involving Canadian high school students, its purpose is to give the contestants a realistic understanding of how the stock market operates in Canada.

Teams watch stock market quotations in daily newspapers and use electronic mail to send their buy and sell orders to the university daily. In return, they receive a transaction report that shows their status.

Sandra Kuehl, manager of the competition, said students gain a lot - whether or not their portfolio does.

"The competition provides students with fun and an incentive to learn about investing

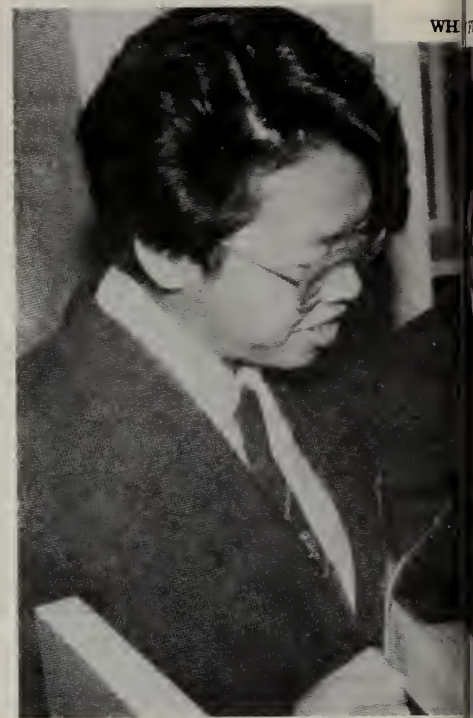
in the Canadian stock market."

Huang and Wong made the majority of their profits from short selling Ford Motor Co. of Canada Ltd. shares during a period of falling auto sales and extended collective bargaining.

The team from Trafalgar Castle will receive \$250 and a school trophy. The national winners will receive a cash award of \$500 courtesy of the Toronto Stock Exchange, individual plaques and a trophy for the school. One member of the winning team, judged by the teacher to have contributed most to the team, will receive a \$1,000 scholarship from Laurier.

National and regional awards for Ontario only will be presented at the annual awards luncheon next spring.

Other contest sponsors include RBC Dominion Securities Inc., Richardson Greenshields of Canada and Bell Canada.

Barbra retraces explorers' canoe route

On Victoria Day, a flotilla of canoes carrying 36 Lakehead University students is scheduled to cast off at Lachine, Quebec, on the first leg of a 3,400-kilometre journey that is to end Aug. 23 in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The flotilla will be retracing the historic "sea-to-sea" route followed by explorer Sir Alexander Mackenzie and *les voyageurs*, the famed fur traders who opened up much of the West beyond Quebec.

Among the students is 21-year-old Barbra Segal of Oshawa, who this fall will enter her fourth year in the universi-

ty's outdoor recreation, parks and tourism program.

"I'm really excited about being on this expedition because I'm also learning something about the history of Canada at the same time," Segal said before departing on the expedition led by Dr. Jim Smithers, Peter Labor and Phil Boswell, all of Lakehead University.

A 1988 graduate of Trafalgar Castle School in Whitby, Segal said she's also happy to be a part of her course at Lakehead, which encourages students to stay and complete high school.

"Learning can be difficult at times and for me, school has always been a battle. But by persevering, the end result is worth the effort because I'm doing well in my studies," she said.

Segal and her fellow students won't spend the next three months just paddling and camp-

ing out under the stars along their route, which goes up the Ottawa River to Lake Nipissing, then down the French River to Lake Huron and across Lake Superior to the Grand Portage near Thunder Bay, site of Lakehead University.

Plans call for the flotilla crews to stop off at more than 50 communities along the route, including historic Old Fort William (at Thunder Bay).

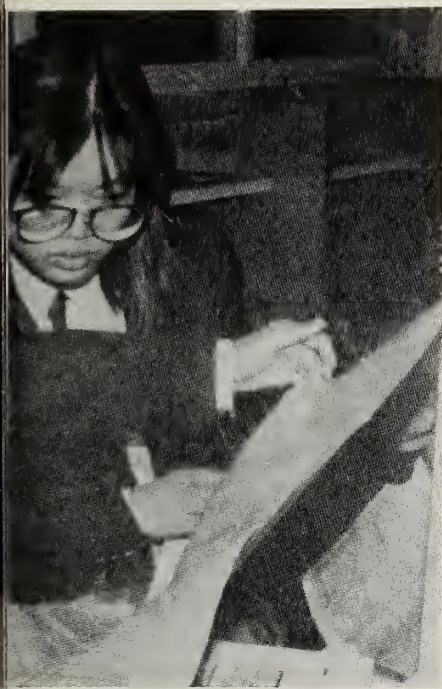
At each community, the students are to present educational pageants to elementary and high school students depicting events along the route and in the life of Mackenzie, who searched but never found the Northwest Passage.

In fact, stress will be placed on the fact that Mackenzie, who made a grievous navigational error on one of his first great trips, realized his own short-

comings from an educational standpoint and returned to England for more schooling.

And that, of course, falls right in line with the philosophy behind the federal government's Sea-to-Sea program, which focuses on a "stay-in-school" approach for students across the country.

With Mackenzie as their historical guide, so to speak, the current expedition (and one of 25 Lakehead students down the Mackenzie River to the Arctic Ocean in 1989), also marks the bicentennial of Mackenzie's great explorations. Lakehead University spokesperson Annette Graham told The Times that the series of canoe journeys will culminate next year with re-enactment of Mackenzie's most famous journey in 1792 across Canada to the Pacific Ocean near Bella Coola, B.C.

Trafalgar Castle School cherishes its May Queens

Most feminists feel a bit queasy when they see a young woman, dressed in a ball gown, with a bouquet of flowers, a tiara perched on her head and a smile plastered on her face.

This silly tradition of choosing queens to be put on a pedestal... well, it's right out of the dark ages.

But there's one place where nothing less than a queen seems appropriate.

For some reason, time within the gates of the Trafalgar Castle School has stood still. On the long walkways, under the arches of splendid old trees in the cavernous mahogany hallways,

for just one day a year, a queen in a full-length gown with a pretty smile and a bunch of roses is right in synch with the old-world charm of property.

Maybe that's why, since 1907, every spring the school continues its tradition of choosing a May Queen. This year, the Queen for the graduating class is Catherine Inglis, a Pickering student who plans on studying political science at the University of Toronto next year.

Inglis was elected by her co-students to be a model of truth, virtue and loveliness, or as the school motto goes: Veritas, Virtus, Venustas.

The school is one of two in Canada that still observes the May Queen tradition, brought over from England at

the turn of the century.

Inglis is very gracious about the honor, overseeing the May Day Festivities with a relaxed joy in all that is happening around her, May Pole and ethnic dances, choir performances, an auction for the school and sale of food from various parts of the world.

She is at the beck and call of every member of the campus, who cajole her, "Catherine, you're the Queen — you have to eat a won ton!"

A tiny girl in a pink dress holds her hand and follows her everywhere, and she patiently smiles for dozens of photographers. Teachers stop to say hello, and she speaks with them all very warmly.

It will be a difficult day to forget.

Certainly it was for Phyllis Dowling McCants. McCants, who was the May Queen in 1961, flew in from Virginia for the 30th anniversary of her May Day.

"I was the first black May Queen at the school. My family came up from Bermuda for the occasion. It was a great honor, especially since the students elected me."

Dowling McCants said she hadn't thought of her day as May Queen in years, until her husband reminded her a couple of weeks ago.

"He said it had been 30 years. I said 'No!' So I called the school. I was really excited when I decided to come."

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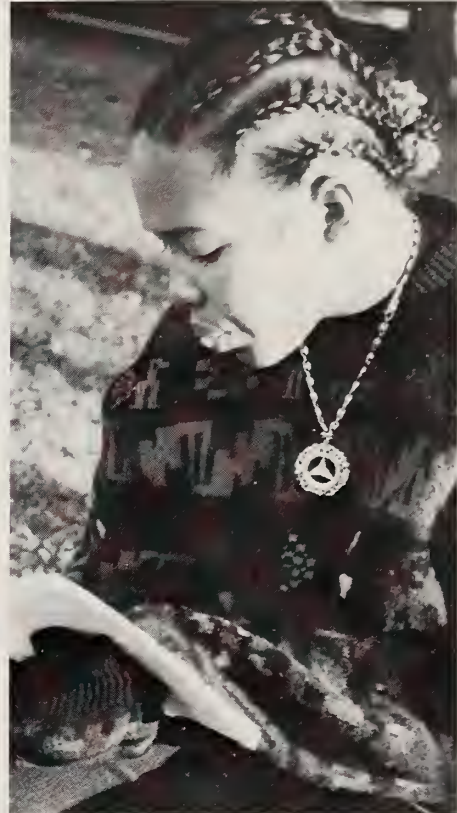
