A Legacy of Life in Rochester Daniel "Tuck" Hartley and His Wife Are Vital Part of Town's Rich Past

Rochester certainly has its share of legendary family names. Among the most prominent is the Hartley family, whose roots span almost the entire history of the scenic, rural town.

And like all historical legacies, the Hartley family boasts two interrelated and strikingly familiar landmarks which share a common name — one in human and one in structural form.

The historic façade of Hartley's Garage still stands on Pine Street, impervious to the many coastal storms and hurricanes that are typical to the area. Its founder and namesake, Daniel "Tuck" Hartley, remains as solid and sound as the thriving gas station and auto garage business he built up nearly a half-century ago.

"In 1947 the garage was built and I moved in on January 1, 1948. They poured the cement in November and I kept on the project until we moved in," Mr. Hartley said during a recent interview. "It

was always known as Hartley's Garage until I sold it (in 1983)."

The full-service Gulf gas station and garage, now owned by Cranberry Associates, once catered to innumerable customers in the tri-town area and specialized in everything from car and boat repair to painting buses — a natural sideline for Mr. Hartley who also worked as a part-time school bus driver.

"Now that I think of it, the trouble was I had too many jobs," he said. "I had a lot to do all the time and worked long hours. I drove a school bus besides running the garage ... and sold John Deere farm and commercial equipment."

As if those jobs weren't enough to keep him busy, Mr. Hartley also served as a volunteer fire fighter for the Town of Rochester, where he worked as both Assistant Fire Chief for ten years and Fire Chief for another decade.

He first became involved with the


department as a young teenager after his father was injured and became unable to do any strenuous work.

"My father, Daniel E. Hartley, was a Fire Warden, and he was (injured) so I started around 13 years old with the Fire Department," he said. "I started was with the fire department when all we had to use were hand extinguishers and pump tanks."

Mr. Hartley also takes pride in the fact that he was the first to suggest using the existing building — once site of the Waterman School — as the town Fire Barn during a Town Meeting in the early 1950's.

"I fathered the idea to change the school into the fire station," he said. "They were going to junk the building and I thought it would be a perfect place for the fire station. Although most people didn't agree with me at first, (Town Meeting) unanimously passed the motion and many people thanked me after that."

Over his 81 years of life in Rochester, Mr.

Hartley has been privy to many changes as the town has grown and developed. And like many of the town's more "traditional" residents, there are things he both welcomes and resists.

"Well, take my business," he said. "We used to have five gas stations in Rochester, now we have just one.

"I've seen a real lot of changes in Rochester over the years. I remember when I was 10 or 12 years old, there was only one town road in Rochester - that was Route 105. And only one house had electricity — that was Eastover Farm ... it wasn't even public electricity, they had their own generator."

Having grown up in Rochester as a tightlyknit, mostly-residential community, it's understandable that Mr. Hartley thinks things are developing too fast, especially in terms of population.

"I liked Rochester mostly because it was a small town," he said. "Now it's getting overpopulated. I don't know what they're going to do about it."

"The problem is they need a study committee to determine the future growth of the town," agreed Mr. Hartley's wife, Alice. "The town is becoming too full of residential buildings — homes — which causes an increase the school population and the need for higher taxes to pay for them. The town needs more commercial areas to offset these expenses."

Mrs. Hartley speaks from experience when she discusses the need for increased funding for schools, having worked as a teacher both in the district (Old Rochester Regional High School) and in





Dartmouth.

Though the years have taken their toll on the couple - in particular Mrs. Hartley who has been ill of late — they remain comfortable and content to spend their retirement years together in the town where they were raised, met and nurtured a family of their own.

Their only daughter, Judith M. (Hartley) MacKinnon, now lives in Marion with her husband, William, and son Daniel. Their granddaughter, Lauren, lives in Peabody, MA.

Having just turned 81 this past February 6, Mr. Hartley shares a birthday with two other wellknown personalities — one local and one national. Mattapoisett insurance businessman Giles Dunn and



Selectman Paul Lambalot was delayed in Buffalo, NY.

First on the agenda was a motion to establish a standard policy concerning the reimbursement of motor vehicle expenses for town employees for business use. The standard mileage rate is determined by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for the business use of motor vehicles, parking fees and tolls to be added to standard mileage. The policy will take effect July 1.

Next a meeting with Town Accountant Joseph R. Bolton regarding an analysis of Mattapoisett's current fiscal 1993 Operating Budget. Budgeted revenues and expenditures to date were compared to last year's amounts as of December 31, 1992. Out of the \$753,067 in committed Local Receipts, the Town has received \$330,837, or 44 percent of what is expected. Mr. Bolton stated that the numbers are low due to the timing of the commitments. Out of the \$899,908 in committed Enterprise Receipts, the Town has received \$446,760, or 49.6 percent of what is expected. Out of \$8,759,629 allotted for Operating Expenses, \$4,494,019, or 51.3 percent of the budget has been expended.

Selectman Mahoney closed this portion of the meeting with Mr. Bolton by stating, "Well done." Mr. Bolton requested a 5 percent increase in salary for fiscal 1994 to be considered by the Board. The Board will take this increase into consideration.

The meeting continued with the signing of the payroll and bills followed by the signing of leases, permits, and correspondence. Permission was granted to ComGas for the installation of a new gas service at Alderberry Lane for 5 Winterhill Road.

The review of incoming correspondence included:

• Charles A. Morgan and Cecile Callahan expressing their interest in filling a vacancy on the Personnel Board. Appointments will be made at next week's meeting.

• Mr. Dennis F. Luttrell, Executive Director of the Buzzards Bay Action Committee (BBAC), submitted the committee's Annual Report. Mr.



There being no further business to come before the board, the meeting was adjourned at 8:00 pm.

Marion Selectmen's Meeting February 16, 1993

A meeting of the Marion Board of Selectmen was called to order on Tuesday, February 16 at 7:02 pm. Since Chairwoman Loretta B. Schaefer was not present, Selectman James S. Dougall called the meeting to order and presided over throughout. Also present were Selectman Edwin "Ted" Pratt Jr., Executive Secretary Ray E. Pickles and Secretary Helene Craver.

After approving a liquor license and eight credit memorandums, the board unanimously approved the following twelve people to serve on the Music Hall study committee as requested at last week's meeting: Claude Miquelle, Ellen Stone, Jonathan E. Dickerson, Ann R. Washburn, Charles Cann, Clayton Hagy, Joan Ten Eyck, William R. Washburn, Trudy Kingery, Warren L. Washburn, Brenda Gibbons, Jane Babbit, and Danielle Coffin.

Chairwoman Schaefer, who will also sit on the committee, will call the first meeting at a future date.



The committee will look at ways of utilizing and repairing the Victorian-style building which was built in 1891 and became town property in 1936.

The board also unanimously approved the following:

• a final water reading bill of \$540.88

• a real estate tax refund for \$436.81

• four motor vehicle excise taxes, totaling \$123.41.

Selectmen next entertained a recommendation from Town Clerk/Treasurer/ Collector Helen G. Westergard via memo of the purchase a bond for \$1,940,000 to be used for construction and improvements on the Perry Hill wells (north and south) as approved by the 1992 Annual Town Meeting. The low bidder on the bond, at 4.3546 percent, was Kidder Peabody & Company. Selectman Pratt moved the bond purchase, which was seconded and made unanimous by Selectman Dougall.

Both Selectman Dougall and Selectman Pratt were very proud of the fact that the Town of Marion was able to purchase bonds at such low interest rates due to its A-1 Bond Rating. Marion is one of the few municipalities in the state with a perfect bond rating.

"Now is the time to borrow money," Mr. Pratt said. "We have a great window of opportunity considering the economic climate and our bond

status."

The board next approved the minutes of the February 9 meeting and signed the warrants and correspondence for the week.

Selectman Dougall reported for Department of Public Works (DPW) Superintendent Robert Zora that work is progressing on Point Road and the department is also tackling the continued problems with town lagoons in the aftermath of excessive rainfall throughout the month.

The DPW is also continuing their reading of residential water meters throughout Marion. "We're going to read all the meters in town over the next three years," Mr. Dougall said. "We started last year and need to make sure that they're all functioning properly."

At 7:15 pm, Cable Advisory Committee Chairman Al Winters came before the board to update them on the progress they've made in dealing with Continental Cablevision in preparation for their contract renewal in 1994.

"We've been looking especially at the use of an I-NET (Institutional Network) to be installed in municipal departments and particularly to link the schools," Mr. Winters said. "With the system, we could transfer either video or data signals between departments and even set up a remote surveillance

system for the police department."

Selectman Pratt agreed the new technology is something the town and region should look at more closely and take advantage of in the next contract negotiation with Continental Cablevision. "One of the things many town departments don't think about are the possibilities of cable television in the future," he said. "In a way, the Cable Advisory Committee should begin educating the town (departments) on the best ways to use these advancements in the future."

Mr. Winters also agreed that the area schools — including ORR and Tabor Academy — can be hooked into the I-NET system, but if they aren't willing to share information on mutual basis, he would recommend not linking them to the network.


"If any of the schools aren't willing to come back with a sharing plan," he said, "we might have to look at a different way of developing the system because we're going to have to pay for much of the equipment and installation."

Finally, Mr. Winters presented a cable questionnaire which will be mailed to 2000 post office boxholders in Marion. The questionnaire will give the committee a better sense of how residents view Continental Cablevision's service to the town and also help the group gauge what changes and/or improvements need to be made in the service now provided.

"We just want to see what residents like and dislike about Continental Cablevision and then use the information in negotiating the contract renewal," Mr. Winters said.

Mr. Pratt suggested adding a question about computer modem/data exchange systems which would give the committee an idea of those who would be interested and capable of utilizing such a system in the future.

The contract renewal with Continental Cable — which expires in June, 1994 — could be entered for a maximum of 10 years by law, according to Mr. Winters. With the proposed advancements in optical





wiring and I-NET, Mr. Winters said the company probably isn't going to want a contract less than 10 years due to long-term improvement costs.

Both Selectman Pratt and Selectman Dougall recommended that Mr. Winters and the committee stay the course and try to keep the base cable rates as low as possible. The board also unanimously moved the questionnaire which will be mailed out to residents within the next month.

Under incoming correspondence for the week, Selectman Dougall cited a letter from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), which approved the Town of Marion as an "Approved Municipal Recycling Program." This certification — of which both Mattapoisett and Rochester are also eligible — exempts the towns from trash inspections of metal and glass before being sent to SEMASS.

A letter was sent from the Buzzards Bay Action Committee (BBAC) advising the board that the group's Annual Report is now available and bringing Selectmen up to speed on what has transpired over the last year.

Selectman Pratt, who serves on the committee, explained that the group has made great strides throughout the past year. "We'll have over \$200,000 made directly available to towns in grants," he said. "The town has also received a \$25,000 grant for a Water Treatment Facility at Silvershell Beach. The Buzzards Bay Action Committee has been of significant benefit to the town ... it's an excellent example of what towns can do by joining forces."

Mr. Dougall asked if any progress has been made in hiring a Regional Health Agent for the area. Mr. Pratt said he had received responses from everyone except Mattapoisett and would contact

them later this week.

There being no further business to come before the Board of Selectmen, they went into session as the Board of Health to first take up a 7:45 pm Sanitary Code Hearing for the Biner property located at 86 Hammett's Cove Road.

Present for the hearing was William Saltonstall, Architect of the proposed project to construct and addition to the Biner home. The property owners requested a variance from the Marion Sanitary Code flow rate to reduce the size of the leaching field within 100 feet of the harbor.

"There's not a whole lot to add since the last time I came before the board," Mr. Saltonstall said. "I've been tracking the ground water where the leaching field was tested and I think we're seeing a very wide separation here. I think we're seeing a greater distance from the waterfront than previously thought."

"I think the biggest concern here was the proximity to the harbor," said Mr. Dougall. "I know this property and there's a good runoff available."

Mr. Pratt agreed. "I think it's a good plan as presented and I move the variance," he said, which was seconded and made unanimous by Selectman Dougall.

Lastly, Selectman Pratt advised the board that they had received information from the Center for Disease Control on a variety of programs now readily available to help stop the spread of disease in area towns. Working through the Marion Visiting Nurses Association, Mr. Pratt hopes to see some of these programs, which deal with everything from AIDS to domestic violence, implemented in the months ahead.

This information, in addition to copies of the Marion Sanitary Code and other noteworthy items for the Board of Health are being put together in a notebook for the incoming members of the town's new Board of Health later this year.

There being no further matters to come before the board, they adjourned at 8:03 pm.

The Buzzards Bay Project and the Coalition for Buzzards Bay have jointly released the first water quality test results based on data collected last summer by Citizens' Water Quality Monitoring Program volunteers. These results are being hailed as an important step in prioritizing areas for nonpoint source pollution management, as recommended in the Buzzards Bay Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan.

Among the 89 sites evaluated for dissolved oxygen, the stations with the worst (lowest) mean oxygen concentrations were Barlows Landing (Bourne), Acushnet River (New Bedford Inner Harbor), and Upper Aucoot Cove (Marion). The







Book Review

A Violent Act

• Alec Wilkinson, Alfred A. Knopf, \$22

When 40-year-old Mike Wayne Jackson finally went off and killed Tom E. Gahl, his new probation officer, then two others in his flight from Indianapolis to Wright City, Missouri, it was a shock for those who knew him, but not a surprise.

And although his murderous rampage would make him the most sought-after criminal at large in America on September 22, 1986, Jackson's crimes were probably no great surprise to millions of newspaper readers across the country either. Things like this happen every day in America. Anxious, desperate, ignored men meet a breaking point. It is, sadly, almost run of the mill.

Alec Wilkinson's account, however, is anything but run of the mill. Wilkinson explores the slaying of Gahl and Jackson's desperate flight, the 11-day hunt for him in the fields and farms of Missouri, Gahl's family's grief, and all the other thoughts and acts that rippled out from that initial killing. His book is, quite simply, the best true crime book I have read in at least a decade. In fact, this slender volume is so good that it easily surpasses the usual limitations of the true crime genre and begs for comparison with such powerful literary works as *In Cold Blood*.

Not that A Violent Act is actually like In Cold Blood. No, though it shares the drama, sheer readability, and sorrow resonance of truth of Truman Capote's book, Wilkinson's book is completely his own. And like any truly original work it defies easy summary or description. The power of A Violent Act is in the telling.

Act is in the telling. Never straying from the solid specifics of the events and often using the accounts of witnesses and participants to telling effect, Wilkinson recreates the heightened awareness and the strange disassociation that attend uncommon events, and the painful struggle to reassemble lives in the wake of those events. A Violent Act is about something more than just the complicated acts of criminals and victims. It charts the terrain of human grief.
