At the present time we have only one phone (826-0880) for the whole non-broadcasting staff and you're likely to get only busy signals if you call us. Try to bear with us for the next couple of months—we'll be crowded, hot and probably trigger-tempered. It will be great to be in a new permanent building but living conditions will be difficult at first.

Miss Kaufman has had several exhibitions of her work in and around New York. She is currently working on a book and will have a one-woman show, entitled "Crisis and Hope in the City" at the Interchurch Center at Riverside Church opening August 5.

JULY PROGRAMMING

Programs for July are a mixture of important items that were not broadcast during May or June due to the extended length of the Marathon and some new items that were produced despite it.

Bill Schechner, who has been working in the Washington Bureau, will become a member of the New York staff this month and you will be hearing from him on **Public Affairs** Specials.

Because the Supreme Court has recessed, there will be no Judicial Review programs until the Court reconvenes. Its summer replacement (which may well become a regular program) is Military Monitor, a twice-a-month look into the doings of the Pentagon.

On July 7, the News and Public Affairs Department will inaugurate what we hope will be a continuing series of programs done live in cooperation with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. The first program, Resistance and Exile, will be a kind of celebration of the one-hundred-and-ninety-third birthday of the United States of America.

From the Drama and Literature Dept. in July comes a Mind's Eye Theatre production, an experimental flight by the Word Players into the realms of chance. Done in its usual style of orchestrated voices, the readings are all on chance read by chance, the mechanics of which (a kind of tape wheel of fortune) are completely audible to the audience. In fact, the entire hour-tape is totally unedited, and process becomes a part of the creation.

The department notes also a CBC production on the great seal hunt which caused a stir some months ago, Business or Brutality?, to be heard on July 5; and a program concerning the continuing war of the artist against the art establishment, Open Hearing of the Art Workers Coalition, to be heard July 12. Finally, they would like you to notice The Asian Shore, a long short story read in two parts by the author Thomas M. Disch. His recent novel, Camp Concentration, caused a stir in England and America; Punch said that it was "literate and stylish as well as convincing and exciting" and WBAI's Martin Last said "there is a lapidary quality here, a word/jewel maker at work." This new story of Mr. Disch's is unpublished as yet; a literary "premiere" for listeners.

The Music Department has rescheduled the day-long series of concerts by M. S. Subbulakshmi that were not heard because of the Marathon, as well as the **Tribute to Sonny Boy Williamson** and **Boogie**, **Chillun**. Music has also rescheduled this month the series of **Evenings on the Roof with Harry Partsch** that were heard here a few years ago.

The Music Department's replacement for Elisabeth Vandermei's Sounds of Today is entitled—for this month only—New Jazz Sounds; in August, and from then on, its name will be Jazz, ETC. Eric Raeburn, the producer and presenter of the program, informed us—a little too late for listing in the program schedule—that his first two programs this month will feature a) Pharoah Sanders and his new album, Karma; and b) a memorial to John Coltrane on the anniversary of his death. Eric, who was asked by Elisabeth to take over her program when she left New York, has done Saturday afternoon jazz programs for the station in the past and has taught courses on Contemporary Jazz in the Experimental College of Queens College.
