


THE FUTURE OF HOUSEWORK

WBALLS on the air 24 hours a day, broadcasting at a frequency of 99.5 MHz. Our transmitter is located in the Empire State Building, and we broadcast with an effective radiated power of 5.4 kw (horizontal) and 3.85 (vertical). Power equivalent to 50 kw at 500 feet. Our Antenna stands 1223 feet above average terrain, and 1515 feet above sua level. The studios are located at 359.E. 62nd St., New York, N.Y. 10021. Subscriptions and donations may be sent to WBAL, P.O. Box. 12345, Church Street Station, New York, N.Y. 10249. Business inquiries may be made by calling during working hours at (212) 826-0400. Our usual on the air number is (212) 371-5200. WBAL is owned and operated by the Pacifica Foundation, a non-profit corporation operating four other stations in Washington, D.C., Los Angeles, Berkeley and Houston.

As usual most of the news from the bowels of 'BAI is bleak, with a couple of notable eceptions. And, in keeping with listener-sponsored tradition, the bad news is financial,

the good news is programmatic.

Once again in 1977 your listener-sponsored dollars have made it possible for WBAI to be the recipient of the nation's highest honors in non-commercial broadcasting. This year's "Major" Armstrong award, went to Celeste Wesson, WBAI Public Affairs Director, and Sara Fishko, an unpaid toiler, for their documentary "Breaking the Blacklist." It is not surprising, for year after year WBAl and the other Pacifica stations win most of the major non-commercial broadcasting awards. But it is a re-affirmation of the fact that high quality cannot be bought by the highest bidder; rather it is the product of an atmosphere of political and artistic freedom. It is an atmosphere that you keep alive, albeit barely, through

your support.
Which neatly brings us to the next topic—the Fall Minithon, subtitled "The Agony and the Ecstasy." Again this year our goal is \$100,000. As you've heard during our Minithon, we have new subscription rates: \$20 for one year, \$10 for a half year, and \$30 for two subscriptions. We thank those of you who have subscribed and remind those of you who pledged support to honor your pledges.

Once again this year WBAI has been awarded a one hundred thousand dollar "Development" grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. Though not to be used for general operating expenses, this grant does somewhat lighten the load by making available

money for promotion, advertising, publicity and audience development.

Finally, a progress report on the "church," subtitled "WBAI on the Run." As you probably know, an adverse ruling by the New York City Real Estate Tax Commission earlier this year has left WBAI with the added financial burden of nearly \$150,000 in back taxes (dating to 1970), as well as current and future taxes. This, combined with our other debts and continually spiralling costs have made the continued occupation of our current site at 359 East 62nd Street financially prohibitive. We are currently in the process of negotiating the sale of this building, settling the back tax debt, and relocating in less expensive quarters. Several sites are being considered, and we will keep you informed of progress. We do not anticipate that this move will cause an interruption of broadcasting.

As always we are most grateful for your support, and hope that our programming remains worthy of it.
