

WBAI'S New Station Manager Vincent Thomas

WBAI's new station manager. Vincent Thomas, has a long and varied history in both commercial and non-commercial radio —an asset to the varied programming of the station

station. Thomas, a graduate of Brown Univer-sity, got his start at WBRU, the oldest col-lege radio station in the country. During the early seventies, WBRU was known throughout the southern New England area as a progressive rock station, reflecting anti-victorm Was convincent and left of centi-Vietnam War sentiments and left of center attitudes. With a combination of progressive rock

With a combination of progressive rock and Afro-American musical traditions, Thomas created a program format which included news and public affairs and con-tinues to this day. Although most of his contemporaries have moved onto commercial radio. Thomas prefers public radio because it af-fords a "chance for creativity and has a creater commitment to alternative progreater commitment to alternative programming." "I wanted to be associated with a radio

station like Pacifica, which operates under the assumption that people are literate and intelligent, no matter what socio-economic background they come from." says

Thomas continued about the station's lis-tenership. "WBAI listeners do not have to be anesthetized to listen to the radio. They listen attentively, aggressively and they par-ticipate. The station is an important companion to them."

panion to them. Recent antics by the Federal Communi-cations Commission, have chilled broad-casters as to what people can or cannot say on the radio. Thomas says that the progres-sive and left interests have to "actively engage the Right on such issues as the First Amendment."

"Records have been censored, in a sense because of labelling, books have been banned in Georgia. I think we have to de-

banned in Georgia. I think we have to de-bate the Right by writing letters and speak-ing out for our right to say whatever the hell we want to say," Thomas said. Thomas' experience as a producer, edi-tor, reporter and news director will un-doubtedly help him find his way around WBAI and he has ideas as to the direction the station will take. "I'd like to take a leadership role in terms of the audience building concent in public

of the audience building concept in public radio nationally. The important thing is that public radio stations have to cooperate in order to expand the audience pool " says Thor

"That means, on a certain level, we should not be competing with other public radio stations, but discussing and complementing our programming to broaden that audience pool," Thomas continued. Speaking on his role as manager of WBA1, Thomas said, "I'd like to provide the kind of atmosphere to attract the most

interesting and engaging people who want to communicate information, culture, poli-tics and unique entertainment."



With Walker in Nicaragua

I started translating Ernesto Cardenal's poetry seventeen years ago. I was twenty at the time, and he was forty-five. Since then I have worked closely with him on several projects, including the publication of my translation With Walker In Nicaragua and Other Early Poems, 1949-1954 (Wesleyan University Press, 1984). My early work as a translator led to an active interest in the interpenetration of the American literary ex-perience and Latin American poetry, for 1 leapt into translation-Cardenal's Oracion Marilyn Monroe Y Otros Poemas dellin: Ediciones La Tertulia, 1965); (Medellin: that is, "Prayer For Marilyn Monroe And Other Poems"—just as I was discovering the extraordinary range of this literature the extraordinary range of this hierature and its marked influence on contemporary Anglo-American poetry. Furthermore, my scholarly studies—diggings—in this rela-tively unexplored field have led me to the wonderful tradition that lies behind all my translations of Latin American poetry. This reddition Culture Ren. tradition (pioneered by William Cullen Bry-ant!) gives me a sense of belonging to a great family of pan-American translators. Most important for me, it validates the translation work that I do.

The first translations of Latin American The birst translations of Latin American poetry did not, as many may assume, ap-pear in the 1960s, the decade that saw Neruda, Vallejo, Paz and others begin to flourish in English, largely through transla-tions made by poets—the decade that heard the echo of the "boom" in Latin American literature. Nor is it true that the flourish of translations during the Second World War marked the first period of interest in poetry from Latin America. Surprising as it may seem, the first significant period of interest took place during the decades before the Civil War, beginning in the 1820s when Bry-ant was North America's leading Hispanist and the first of what has become a long line of poet-translators attracted to Spanish-language verse from the "other America."

Bryant was a true pioneer in American letters. Not only did his own poetry break new ground, he was the first to translate Latin American poets and to draw attention to them. Unlike other important translators of Spanish literature, notably Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, Bryant was immediately curious about any poem written in New Spain. He translated the Cuban poet Jose Maria Heredia, whose Byronic expres-sion of the American landscape, as in his much- celebrated ode to Niagara, attracted Bryant during the mid-1820s when he was getting a foothold in New York City and es-tablishing himself as a writer.

What still amazes me is that, until translating "Con Walker en Nicoragua," like most people I didn't have much of an idea who William Walker was. I had never been taught about him, nor had I ever seen more than a short footnote about him. This more than a short loothole about him. This chapter of Americah history, it dawned on me, had been swept under the rug, and for obvious reasons, given U.S. relations with Nicaragua and with Latin America in general, Only now, in newspaper and maga-zine articles and in new books, are we being reminded of this shady past, which lies be hind the grim headlines about U.S. involvement in Nicaragua today. (The story of Wiliiani Walker, known in his day as the "Grcy-Eyed Man of Destiny," is even being made into a Hollywood movie.) As the rele-vance to unfolding events charged the histo-ry of "With Walker in Nicaragua" with even greater significance, not only did the beauty of the poem itself inspire me to make my translation, the urgent need to bring this history to the attention of Americans (that is, North Americans) inspired me further, for in our correspondence Cardenal had confirmed my suspicion that Walker was the father of U.S. intervention in Nicara-gua. Indeed, Walker and his fellow "filibusters" (whom Bryant quickly denounced

in the Evening Post as "desperadoes" and "land pirates") prefigure Reagan's contras.

He later translated the Cuban poet Diego Gabriel de la Concepcion Valdes (nseud, "Placido") and the Mexican poet Jose Rosas Moreno, one of whose verse fables he published on the opening page of the first issue of *St. Nicholas*, the popular monthly measures for shiften

issue of St. Nicholas, the popular monthly magazine for children "Con Walker en Nicaragua." one of Ernesto Cardenal's earliest documentary poems, was written in 1950, soon after the young poet had returned to Nicaragua fol-lowing his studies abroad in New York and Europe. He composed the poem on the eve-to resche of Nicaragua's celebration of so to speak, of Nicaragua's celebration of the centenary of its triumph over William Walker in the Filibuster War of 1855-57. Walker in the Filibuster war of 1835-57. But I wasn't motivated to translate the po-em until 1980. I had been translating Cardenal's poetry throughout the 1970s, working mostly on his more recent poems. My inspiration to do "With Walker in Nic-aragua" was initially the result of seeing the cargomergent for a new fellowship proaragua³⁴ was initially the result of seeing the announcement for a new fellowship pro-gram for literary translators, which the Na-tional Endowment for the Arts had just in-stituted as part of the growing recognition of the art of translation in this country. So I looked at the body of untranslated poems by Cardenal—mostly his early work—and selected enough of them to produce a book-ength mauscript. Then I dashed off my selected enough of them to produce a book-length manuscript. Then I dashed off my proposal to the NEA, including a fragment of "With Walker in Nicaragua" and other sample translations: "to collect the early poems Cardenal published in various an-thologies, and fo make the first English translations of them." I also noted that thologies, and to make the first English translations of them." I also noted that "these poems demonstrate history on an epic scale, offering Cardenal's penetrating vision of the Americas, especially the his-torical ties between the United States and Nicaragua." Little did I know at the time how relevant my translation would be, giv-en the U.S. policy of intervention that fol-lowed the Sandinista triumph in 1979!



WBAI TO MARK THE CENTENNIAL BIRTHDAY OF MARCUS MOSIAH GARVEY Jamaica in 1914 and started the United Ne-

August 17th will mark the anniversary of the birth of one of the great sons of the Caribbean, Marcus Mosiah Garvey—a leading African thinker whose impact is still being felt worldwide.

Garvey was born on the island of Jamai-ca, not far from the place Christopher Co-lumbus landed when he "discovered" the island. Garvey was from poor peasant stock, coming to know hunger and deprivation at a tender age

Due to financial difficulties, Garvey left school at 14 to become an apprentice to his godfather who was a printer where he later became involved in union activities.

Using his skills as a printer after a bitter printer's strike for better wages, Garvey ed-ited his first periodical—The Watchman. The publication soon collapsed because of the lack of capital. Around this time, Garvey met Dr. Robert

Love who devoted much of his time and money towards improving the conditions of the poorer classes. It was Love who was the

source of inspiration for Garvey and im-parted with him the idea of traveling and seeing conditions elsewhere. So in 1909, Garvey left Jamaica for Costa Rica where he worked on a plantation as a timekeeper. It was through this first hand experience that Garvey saw the plight of lack workers. From Costa Rica, he went on to Panama

and was almost sickened by the destitute and pitiful conditions of Blacks building the Panama Canal. Garvey then went on to vis-

it Nicaragua, Ecuador, Honduras, Colum-bia, Venezuela and later to England. While acquiring an insatiable thirst for African history and meeting various Afri-can scholars of the time, Garvey returned to

gro Improvement Association. The UNIA purpose was to unite Africans into one great body and to establish a country and government of their own. These ideals were embodied in the UNIA motto 'One God' One Aim! One Destiny!'

The oppressive conditions of African-Americans during and immediately follow-ing World War I, was marked by the rise of the Ku Klux Klan and the burning and lynching of Blacks throughout the South. It was during this time that Garvey visited

the U.S., for the first time to meet and talk with Black leaders, who more times than not disappointed Garvey. Yet they did not

ampen his spirit to go out and organize the African-American. By 1919, Garvey had established some thirty branches of the UNIA and claimed over two million members. It was also dur-ing this time that "The Negro World" appeared on the seen and was dedicated solely to the interests of the African.

Garvey, understanding that Blacks had to become economically self-sufficient be-gan to acquire properties and various enterprises, including a steamship called the "Black Star Line." As with all leaders, Garvey made many

opponents which reached a feverish pitch by 1923. Letters from Black leaders to the U.S. Attorney General urged him to prosecute Garvey. He was convicted of mail fraud and sentenced to prison.

Garvey's story does not stop there. Tune in on Aug. 17th from 7:30-11:30, as Lloyd D'Aguilar, Samori Marksman and Malika Lee Whitney examine the life, times and legacy of the Honorable Marcus Mosiah Garvey.


