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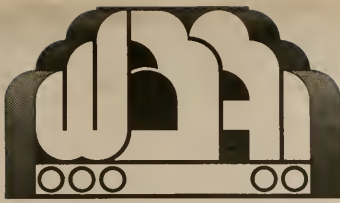

"THE AFTERHOUR"

The doors open to The Afterhour every Thursday morning (or Wednesday night, depending on your frame of mind) at 3 am. It is a space of diversity, spontaneity and no hierarchy. It is a space of experimentation.

Traditionally in New York, radio stations have separated audiences with rock stations, jazz stations, Latin stations, disco stations, etc. And, these audiences in terms of radio, never meet. Now, a meeting place has been created, "The Afterhour." At The Afterhour, a diversified field of music will be presented mixed, with the sensitivity and respect to the differences in the art forms. The Afterhour will also be a space to share information. Five minute highly produced documentaries on local, national and international affairs, will be inserted throughout the program. And, the audience will be invited to join in the grove of this electronic space by calling up live on the radio.

This program is breaking away from the traditional European forms of broadcasting. It will not be a man going on the air for an hour and a half speaking on the civil war of the U.S. But, a program with much more poetry. The Afterhour is a meeting place for the working class both in spirit and in sound. If The Afterhour, because of the language and culture is to much for your sensitive system, then don't come.

The Afterhour is free and the doors open every Wednesday night/Thursday morning at 3 am. It's located on the corner of 99.5 fm and the host of The Afterhour is Marcos Miranda.

PACIFICA REPORTS

There is a Bill in Congress which would prohibit this Program Guide from carrying paid advertising. The Bill, known as the Bauman Amendment has passed the House of Representatives and will come up for a vote in the Senate next month. One may well ask why Congress cares whether a Pacifica Program Guide carries advertising or not. In fact, the advertising which can help make this publication self-supporting may be a civilian casualty in the battle between the armies of Public Television on one hand and an unlikely coalition of media reform groups and commercial magazine publishers on the other hand.

The Bauman Amendment was prompted by the emergence of a well produced magazine called *The Dial*, which is a program guide for four flagship stations of the PBS network (WETA, WTTW, KCET and WNET). *Dial* contains program listings for each of those stations, together with articles and comments on theatre, the arts, book reviews, etc. *Dial* is making a strong pitch to advertisers on the basis of the guaranteed circulation it can offer (the stations' thousands of members).

Commercial publishers are not the only people concerned with the movement of public television into "free enterprise" income generating activities. Writing in the July 28 issue of "Access" (published by Ralph Nader's National Citizens' Committee on Broadcasting, NCCB), Berkeley sociologist Richard Bunce:

"A number of public stations are moving to reduce their dependence on public sector funding. They plan to develop as commercial enterprises over the next decade, using their public broadcasting facilities as a base."

Bunce points, in addition to the emergence of *Dial*, to KQED's plan to lease its second channel to pay television. Channel 32 (KQEC) was once intended as a minority access and training station.

Public television wants to start to sell its programs. Speaking at the annual meeting of public television stations, PBS President Larry Grossman said:

"We must mine a new source of income. . . . We must use our public funds as a nucleus of quality service, and we must leverage those funds through vigorous and imaginative marketing of our programs and services in the private sector."

Groups such as the NCCB, the National Task Force on Public Broadcasting and progressive trade unions concerned with media issues such as AFSCME and the Machinists'

Union see the move into commercial-like activities on the part of public television as, in part, a response of the public television system to the recent reforms in the law requiring greater access and community accountability on the part of Public Broadcasting.

Pacifica has served in many ways as a model for advocates of a responsible and responsive public broadcasting system. Faced with the Bauman Amendment, it has to point out to its friends in the media reform movement that a bazooka-like approach to public television's growing commercialization can harm listener-sponsored community radio unintentionally. What is needed is a carefully thought out program which enhances the accountability of all non-commercial broadcasting.

Dial seems intended as a profit generating enterprise which will free its sponsoring television stations from dependence on public funds and the responsibilities that entails. As written, the Bauman Amendment would also prohibit this Folio from supporting itself with local advertising. An amendment limiting the use of advertising in a program guide to the cost of the guide itself would be much more appropriate.

Congressman Bauman added his Amendment as a rider to the Appropriations Bill funding CPB (Corporation for Public Broadcasting) for next year. This was the bazooka approach.

Normally, policy matters are considered by Congress after publicly announced hearings and broad public debate. Next year, a new public telecommunications funding bill will have to be enacted to continue the mandate of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. This is a perfect context for considering reforms in the public broadcasting system. That process allows a shaping of the reform to meet the problem and can avoid the kind of over-kill involved in the Bauman Amendment.

The Appropriations Bill to which the Bauman Amendment is attached is entitled the "Labor H.H.S. Appropriations Bill" and is now before the Senate Appropriations Committee. Supporters of the Folio can write the Chair of the Committee, Senator Hollings, or to Senator Warren Magnuson (often referred to as "the father" of public broadcasting). 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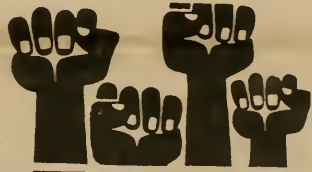
