Dear Sir

When bidding on Oct. 25th to deliver bronze one cent coin blanks I inserted a paragraph agreeing to deliver, in addition to the 50,000 lbs. specifically named, further quantities within a year up to 250,000 lbs.

In response you ordered from me 50,000 lbs. of bronze blanks but said nothing about any further quantity, and I understand that you had no instructions from the Director upon the subject of such further quantity; though in instructing you concerning my bid of Oct. 20th to deliver nickel – copper blanks be directed you to avail yourself of the option given to take from time to time if needed a similar 250,000 lbs. of supplementary nickel – copper blanks.

Copper has risen, since my bidding of Oct. 25th, about 5 cts. per lb., while, in the absence of any indication from you as to your pleasure concerning the additional 250,000 lbs. I have not felt authorized to purchase copper therefore.

You will perceive that you silence for more than six weeks brings me into a difficult position, and I now respectfully ask: First what in your judgement is my duty in regard to further deliveries, not yet ordered, on account of the option given Oct. 25th but not by you responded to or noticed in any communications to me, and Secondly what is your pleasure in the matter.

You will understand that I am not seeking to evade any just liability, but our desire of knowing where I stand.
