

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
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
PSALMES OF DAVID

Beatus vir. Pfal. I. T. S.


This Psalme is set sirst as a Preface to exhort all godly men to study and medicate the heavenly wifedome : for they be bleffed that fo doe, but the wicked contemners thereof at length shall come to misery.





Lord, doth fethis whole delight: And

in thatlaw doth exercise himselfe both



day and night.

He shall be like the tree that groweth fall by the waters fide,

Which bringeth forth most pleasant fruits in her due time and tide.

Whose leafe shall never sade nor fall, but flourish still and stand,

Euen to all things shall prosper well, that this man takes in hand.

So shall not the vngodly men, they shall be nothing so: But as the dust which from the earth,

the wind drives to and fro. Therefore shall not the wicked men, in judgement stand vpright: Nor yetthe finners with the just,

shall come in place or fight.

For why?:he way of godly men, vnto the Lord is knowne, And cke the way of wicked men. shall quite be overthrowne.

Quarefremuerunt. Plal ij. T.S. Danid reinyceth that alben enemies and worldly power rage, God wil advance his bingd me enenso the fartbest end of the world. Therefore be exhortesh Princes humbly to Submit themselves under the same. Herein is signified Christ and his bingdome.

Sing this at the 1. Pfalme.

Hy did the Gentiles tumults raife, what rage was in their braine? Why did the Icwish people muse, feeing all is but vaine.

The Kings and tulers of the earth, conspire and are all bent Against the Lord and Christ his sonne,

which he amongst vs sent.

Shall we be bound to them fay they, Ict all their bonds be broke: And of their doctrine and their law, let vs reject the yoke.

But he that in the heaven dwel'th, their doings will deride, And make them all as mocking stockes,

throughout the world so wide.

For in his wrath the Lord will fay, to them upon a day,

And in his fury trouble them, and then the Lord will fay.

I have aunointed him my King vpon my holy hill,

I will therefore, Lord, preach thy law, and eke declare thy will.

For in this wife the Lord himfelfe, did say to me I wot, Thou art my deare and onely forme, to day I thee begot:

All people I will gine to thee, as heyresat thy request, The ends and coasts of all the earth by thee shall be possest.

Thou shalt them bruise even with a mace, as men under soot trod:

And as the potters sheards shalt breake them with an iron rod.

to Now ye O Kings and rnlersall, be wife therefore and learn'd, By whom the matters of the world be judged and differn'd.

II See that ye ferue the Lord aboue, in trembling and in feare: See that with renerence ye reloyce

to him in like manner.

12 See that ye kiffe and eke cinbrace his bleffed fonce, I fay,

Lest in his wrath ye suddenly perish in the mid way.

13 If once his wrath neuer fo small shall kindle in his brest,

O then all they that trust in Christ, shall happy be and blest.

Domine quid. Pfal. iij T.S.

David driven out of his kingdom by his fon Abfalom, was greatly tormented in mind for his finne. Therefore he calleth upon God, and is bold in his promifes against the terrour both of enemies and present death. Then hee reisyceth for the victory given to him and the Church, over their enemies.

Danid perfecuted by Saul, callet bupon God with affured trust, reproueth his exemies for resisting his dominion, and preferreth the fauour of God before all treasure.

God that art my righteousnesse, Lord heare me when I eall, Thou hast set me at liberty, when I was bound and thrall.

2 Haue mercy (Lord) therefore on me, and grant me my request, For vnto thee vncessarly

For vnto thee vnceffantly to cry I will not rest.

3 O mortall men how long will ye my glory thus despise? Why wander ye in vanity, and follow after lies?

4 Know ye that good and godly men the Lord doth take and chuse:

And when to him I make my plaint

And when to him I make my plaint, he doth me not refuse.

5 Sinne not but fland in awe therefore, examine well your heart, And in your chamber quietly

Verba mea auribus. Pfal. v. T.S.

Dand perfecuted by Doeg and Achieophel, Sauls flatterers, calleth upon God to questh their malue Then affured of fuccesse, he concessed comfor:.

Sing this as the 3. Pfalme.

Notine thine cares vnto my word, O Lord my plaint confider:

And heare my voice, my king, my God, to thee I make my prayer.

Heare me betune, Lordrarry not, for I will have telpect,

My prayer carly in the morne to thee for to direct.

And I will trust through patience, in thee my Godalone, Thou art not pleas'd with wickednesse and ill with thee dwelsnone.

And in thy fight shall never stand, these furious fooles O Lord,

Vaine workers of iniquity, thou half alwaies abhord.

The lyers and the flatterers, thou thait destroy them then: And God shall hate the bloudthirsty and the deceitfull man.

Therefore will I come to thy house, trusting vpon thy grace,

And renerently will worship thee, toward thine holy place.

Lordleade me in thy right cousnesse for to confound my foes,

And eke the wayes that I shall walke, before my face disclose.

For in their monthes there is no truth, their hearts are foule and vaine:

Their throat an open Sepulcher, their tongues doe glose and faine.

TO Destroy their false conspiracies, that they may come to nought: Subuert them in their heapes of finne, which have rebellion wrought.

Domine neir. Fore.Plal.vi T.S.

Davidsor his sinner selt Gods hand, and conceived the horror of enertasting death. Therefore be desireth forguenes, and not to die in Gods indianation. Then sodainly feeling Gods mercy he rebukesb bis enemies who reioyeeth at his affliction.

Sing this as the 1. Pfalme.

Ord in thy wrath reprone me not, though I deserve thine ise:

No yet correct me in the rage, O Lord Ithee defire.

For I am weake, therefore O Lord, of in rey me forbeare,

And leale me Lord, for why, thou knowest my bones doc quake for leare.

My foule is troubled very fore, and vexed vehimently.

But Lo. d how long wilt thou delay, to cure my milery.

Lord turne thee to thy wonted grace, my filly loule vp take:

O saue me not for my desert but for thy inticies fake.

For why? no man among the dead, remembreth thee one whit:

Or who shall worship thee O Lord. in the infernall pit?

So g: ieuous is my plaint and mone, that I waxe wondrous faint,

All the night long I wash my bed, with teares of my complaint.

My fight is dimme and waxeth old with anguish of my heart,

For feare of those that be my foes, and would my foule subuert.

But now away from me all yee that worke iniquity.

For why? the Lord hath heard the voice, of my complaint and crie.

He heard not onely the request, and prayer of my heart:

But it received at my hand, and tooke it in good part.

10 And now my focs that vexed me, the Lord will foone defame.

And fuddenly confound them all, to their rebuke and shame.

Domine Deus Plal. vij. T. S

Danid salsely accused by Chus Sauls kinsman, calleth to God to be bis defender. First, for that his conscience did not accuse him of any exull towards Saul, next, that it to ushed Gods olory to award sensence against the nicked, and so upon Gods mercies and premises hee waxesh bold, threatning that it Ball fall on their owne necks, that which his enimies purposed for others.

Sing this at the 3. Pfalme.

Lord my God I put my trust, and confidence in thee: Saue me from them that me purioe,

and eke deliuer mee. Left like a hon they me tare, and rent in pieces small,

Whilst there is none to succour me and rid me out of thrall.

'O Lord my God if I have done, thething that is not right, Or elie if I be found in fault, A 3

or guilty in thy fight. Or to my friend rewarded cuill, or left him in distresse: Which me purfued most cruelly,

and hated me caustesse.

Then let my foes pursue my soule, and eke my life downe thrust Vuto the earth, and also lay mine honour in the dust. Start vp O Lord, now in thy wrath,

and put my foes to paine:
Performe thy kingdome promifed,

tome which wrong fustaine.

Then shall great Nations come to thee, and know thee by this thing, If thou declare for loue of them,

thy selfeas lord and King. And as thou art of all men Judge, O Lord now judge thou mee: According to my righteousnesse,

Lord cease the hate of wicked men, and be the inst mans guide,

10 By whom thefecrets of all hearts, are searched and descride.

11 Itake my helpe to come of God, in all my paine and smart, That doth prescrue all those that be, of pure and vpright heart.

12 The iust man and the wicked both God judgeth by his power: So that he feeles his mighty hand,

euen cuery day and houre. 13 Except he change his minde I die, for even as he should smite

He whets his sword, his bow he bends, aiming where he may hit-

14 And doth prepare his mortall darts, his arrowes keene and sharpe.

For them that doe me perfecute, whilft he doth mischiefe warpe. 15 But though that he in trauell be, of his divelish forecast:

And of his mischiese once conceived, it brings forth nought at last:

16 He digsa ditchand delues it deepe, in hope to hurt his brother: But he shall fall into the pit,

that he digg'd vp for other. 17 Thus wrong returneth to the hurt, of him in whom it bred,

And all the mischiefe that he wrought, shall fall vpon his head.

18 I will gine thanks to God therefore, that judgeth rightcoully, And with my fong will praise the name, of him that is most hie.

Domine Deus meus. Pfal. viij. T. S.

The Prophet considering the excellent liberality and fatherly providence of God towards man, whom he made as is were God over all his works, onely ginesh thanks, and is astonied with the admiration

Sing this as the 3. Pfalme.

Godour Lord how wonderfull, are thy workes enery where? Whosefame surmounts in dignity, aboue the licauens cleare.

Euen by the mouth of fucking babes, thou wilt confound thy foes.

For in those babes thy might is seene thy graces they disclose.

And when I fee the heanens hie, the workes of thine owne hand:

The funne, the moone, and all the stars, in order as they fland.

What thing is man Lord thinke I then, that thou doest him remember, Or what is mans posterity. that thou doeft him confider?

For thou hast made him little lesse, than Angels in degree;

And thou hast crowned him also,

with glory and dignity.
Thou hast preferred him to be Lord, of all thy works of wonder: And at his feet haft fet all things, that he should keepe them vnder-

As sheepe and near, and all beasts else, that in the fields doe feed, Fowles of theayre, fish in thesea, and all that therein breed.

Therefore must I say once againe, O God that art our lord:

How famous and how wonderfull, are thy workes through the world.

Confitebor tibi. Plal. ix. T. S.

Danid givesh shankes for his manifold victories recesued, desireth the same wonted helpe againe, against his new enemies, and their malitions arrogancy to be destroyed.

Sing this as the 3. P (alme.

I will fine land and I will fing laud and praise, And speake of all thy wondrous workes and them declare alwaies.

I will be glad and much reioyce, in thee OGod most high, And make my fongs extoll thy name about the starry skie.

For that my foes are driven backe, and turned into flight: They fall downe flat, and are destroide,

by thy great force and might. Thou hast revenged all my wrong, my griefe and all my grudge: Thou doeft with ruffice heare my cause, most like a righteous Judge.

5 Thou doest rebuke the heathen folke, and wicked so confound:

That afterward the memory, of them cannot be found.

6 My foes thou haft made good dispatch, and all their townes destroi'd: Thou hast their same with them defac'd,

through all the world so wide.

7 Know thou that he which is aboue, for enermore shall raigne,
And in the seate of equity,

true inflice will maintaine.

With inflice he will keepe and guide the worldand enery wight:

And so will yeeld through equity, to eucry man his right.

9 He is protector of the poore, what time they be opprest:

He is in all advertity, their refuge and their reft.

their reruge and their relation All they that know thy holy name, therefore shall trust in thee:
For thou for fakest not their suite,

in their necessity.

11 Sing Psalmes therefore vnto the Lotd, that dwells in Sion hill:

Publish among all nations, his noble acts and will.

of those that be opprest,
Forgetting not the afflicted heart,
that seekes to him for rest.

13 Haue mercy Lord on mee poore wretch, whose enemies still remaine,

Which from the gates of death art wont,

to raife me vp againe.

14 In Sion, that I may fet forth
thy praife with heart and voyce,
And that in thy faluation Lord.

And that in thy faluation Lord, my foule might still reioyce.

15 The heathen flicke fast in the pit, that they themfelues prepar'd, And in the net that they did fet, their owne feet fast are snar'd.

16 God shewes his judgements which are for every man to marke: (good,

When as you fee the wicked man lietrapt in his owne warke.

17 The wicked and the finnefull men, goe downe to hell for euer, And all the people of the world,

that will not God remember.

18 But fure the Lord will not forget, the poote mans griefe and paine,
The patient people neuer looke,

for helpe of God in vaine.

19 O Lord arife less men premile, that be of worldly might: And let the heathen falke receive

their judgement in thy fight.

20 Lord finike fucl terror, feare and dread, into the hearts of them,

That they may know affiredly, they be but mortall men.

Vt quid Domine ?Pfal.x. T. S.

He complayneth of all the wrongs which worldly men repeated of their property, who therefore without all feare of God thinke they may doe all things uncontroled. He cattesh for remedy against such, and is comforted with the bope thereof.

Sing this as the 3. Tofalme.

Hat is the cause that those O Lord, art now so sar from thine, And keepest close thy countenance

from vs this troublous time?

The poore doe perish by the proud and wicked mens defire, Let them be taken in the source.

Let them be taken in the snare, that they themselves conspire.

For in the luft of his owne heart, the vingodly doth delight, So doth the wicked praife himfelfe,

and doth the Lord despight.

He is so prood that right and wrong, he settethall apart,

Nay, nay, there is no God, faith he, for thus he thinkes in heart.

Because his waies doe prospet well, he doth thy lawes neglect,

And with a blaft doth puffe against fuch as would him correct.

Tush, tush (faith he) I have no dread, lest mine estate should change,

And why? for all adjertity to him is very strange-

7 His mouth is full of curfednesse, of fraud, deceit, and guile, Vader his tongue doth mischiefe sit,

and travaile all the while.

8 Hee lieth hid in waies and holes, to flay the innocent,

Against the poore that passe him by, his cruell eyes are bent.

And like a Lion privily, lieth lurking in his denne, If he may fnare them in his ner,

to spoile poore simple men.

10 And for the nonce full craftily,

he crowcheth downe I say,

11 So are great heapes of poore men made
his strong power his prey.

12 Tush, God forgetteth this (saith he) therefore I may be bold:

His countenance is cast aside, he doth it not behold.

12 Arise O Lord, O God, in whom the poore mans hope doth rest, Lift vp thy hand, forget not Lord, the poore that be opprest.

14 What blasphemy is this to thee, Lord dost thou not abhorre it,

To heare the wicked in their heart fay, tush thou car'st not for it.

15 But thou feest all this wickednesse, and well dost vnderstand,

16 That friendlesse and poore fatherlesse, are left into thy hand.

17 Of wicked and malitious men, then breake the power for euer: That they with their iniquity,

may perish allt ogether.

18 The Lord shall raigne for cuermore, as King and God alone: And he will chate the heathen folke, out of his land each one.

19 Thou heav'st O Lord the poore mans their prayers and request: (plaint,

Their hearts thou wilt confirme vntill thine eares to heare are prest.

20 To judge the poore and fatherlesse, and helpe them to their right, That they may be no more opprest, with men of worldly might.

In Domino confido. Psal xj. T.S.

This Pfalme sheweth first what affants of temptation and anguist of mind hee sustained in persecution. Next hee resoyeeth that God fent him succour in necessity; declaring his instice, as well in governing the good and wicked men, as the whole world.

Sing this as the z. Psalme.

Trust in God, how dare yee then, fay thus my foole votill, Flie hence as fall as any fowle, and hide you in your hill?

Bchold the wicked bend their bowes, and make their arrowes preft,

To shoote in secret and to hurt the found and harmeleffe breaft.

Of worldly hope all stayes are shrunke and clearely brought to nought: Alas, the instand righteous man,

what cuill hath he wrought? But he that in his Temple is, most holy and most hie,

And in the heattens hath his feat of royall maiesty.

The poore and simple mans estate, considereth in his mind: And fearcheth out full narrowly,

the manners of mankind.

And with a cheareful countenance the righteous man will vse, But in his heart he doth abhorre, all fuch as mischiefe mute.

And on the finners casteth snares, as thicke as any raine,

Fireand brimstone, and whirlewinds thicke, appointed for their paine.

Yee see then how a righteous God doth righteoufiicsse embrace:

And to the just and vpright man. showes forth his pleasant face.

Saluum me fac. Pfal.xij. T. S.

The Prophet seeing the miserable decay of all good order, desireth God speedily to send reformation. Then comforted with the assurance of Gods helpe, and promises, concludeth, that when all orders are most corrupted, then God will deliner his.

Sing this as the 3. Pfalme.

I Elpe Lord, for good and gorlly men doe perish and decay, And faith and truth from worldly men is parted cleane away.

Who fo doth with his neighbour talke, his talke is all but vaine:

For every man bethinketh how to flatter, lie and faine.

But flattering and deceitfull lips, and tongues that be so stout,

To speake proud words, & make great brags, the Lord foone cut them out.

For they say still, we will preuaile, our tongues shall vs extoll,

Our tongues are ours, we ought to speake, what Lord shall vs controll?

But for the great complaint and crie, of pooreand men opprest:

Atife will I now, faith the Lord, and them restore to rest

Gods word is like to filuer pure, that from the earth is tride,

And hath no lesse than seven times in fire beene purified.

Now fince thy promise is to helpe, Lord keepe thy promise then, And fane vs now and euermore,

from this ill kind of men. For now this wicked world is full, of in schieses manifold:

When vanity with worldly men so highly is extold.

Vsquequò Dom .Psal. xiij T.S.

Danidas it were, ouercome with affliction, flieth to God bis onely refuge, and encouraged through Gods promises, he conceineth considence against extreame horrors of death.

How long wilt thou forget me, Lord, finall fineuer be remembred? How long wilt thou thy vifage hide, as though thou wert offended?

In heart and minde how long flul I with care tormented be?
 How long eke flul my deadly focs

thus triumph ouer me?

Behold me now, my Lord, my God, and heare me fore opprest.

Lighten mine eyes, left that I fleepe as one by death posses:

4 Lest that mine enemies say to me, behold, I doe preuaile:

Lest they also that hate my soule reloyee to see me quaile.

5 But from thy mercy and goodnesse my hope shall neuer start:

In thy reliefe and fauing health right glad shall be my heart,

6 I will give thankes vnto the Lord, and praifes to him ling,

Because he had heard my request, and granted my wishing.

Dixit infipiens. Plal. xiiij.T.S.

He describe to the wickednesse of men growne to such licentionsnesse, that God was brought to viter contempt: for which, albest he was greatly griested, yet perswaded that God would redresse it, hee is comforted.



They went all wide and were corrupt, and truely there was none

That in the world did any good,
I say there was not one.

4 Is all their judgement fo farre loft, that all worke mitchiefe full, Eating my people even as bread, not one to feeke Gods will?

5 When they thus rage, then fuddenly great feare on them shall fall:

For God doth love the righteous men, and will maintaine them all-

6 Ye mocke the doings of the poore, to their reprochand shaine,

Because they put their trust in God, and call upon his name.

7 But who shall give the people health, and when wilt thou falfill

Thy promife made to Israel from our of Sion hill?

8 Euch when thou shalt restore againe such as were captine led,

Then I2cob shall therein reioyee, and Israel shall be glad.

Domine quis. Psal.xv. T.S.

Here is taught why God chofe the lewes to be his peculiw people, and placed his Temple among them, which was that they by lunng verightly might wisnesse that they were bus special and holy people.

Sing this as the 3. Pfalme.

Or who shall inhabite still,
Or who shall inhabite still,
in thy most holy hill?

2 The man whole life is vncorrupt, whose workes are just and straight. Whose heart doth thinke the very truth, whose tongue speakes no deceit.

3 Nor to his neighbour doth none ill in body, goods, or name:
Nor willingly doth moue falle tales which might imparte the fame-

4 That in his heart regardeth not malicious wicked men:

But those that love and seare the Lord he maketh much of them.

5 His cash and all his promifes that keepeth faithfully,

Conferua me. Pfal. xvj. T. S.

Dauid praieth to God for succour, not for his workes, but for his faiths sake, protesting that he hateth all Idolatry, taking God onely for his comfort and selicity, who suffereth his to tacke nothing.

Sing this as the 14. Pfalme.

Ord keepe me; for I trust in thee, and doe consesse indeed,
Thou art my God, and of my goods,
O Lord, thou hast no need.

2 I give my goods vnto the Saints
that in the world doe dwell,
And namely to the faithfull flocke
in vertue that excell,

They shall heape forrowes on their heads, which runne as they were mad,

To offer to the idol gods, alas, it is too bad.

4 As for their bloody factified and offerings of that fort, I will not touch, nor yet thereof my lips shall make report.

5 For why? the Lord thy portion is of mine inheritance:

And thou art he that dost maintaine my rent, my lot, my chance.

6 The place wherein my lot did fall, in beauty did excell?
Mine heritage affign'd to me doth please me wondrous well.

7 I thanke the Lord that caused me to understand the right:
For by his meanes my secret thoughts

docteach me every night.

8 Her the Lord still in my fight, and trust him over all:

For he doth stand on my right hand, therefore I shall not fall.

Wherefore my heart and tongue also doe both rejoyce together:

My flesh and body rest in hope.

My flesh and body rest in hope, when I this thing consider.

Thou wilt not leave my foule in grave, for Lord thou loveft me:

Here he complainesh to God of the crueil pride and arrogancy of Saul, who raged without any cause; Therefore he desireth God to renenge his innocentic and deliner him.

Sing this as the 3. Pfalme.

Lord give care to my infleance, attend when I complaine:

And heare the payer that I put forth with lips that doe not faine.

2 And let the judgement of my cause,

proceed alwaies from thee And let thine cies behold and cleare this my fimplicity.

3 Thou hast well tri'd me in the night and yet could'st nothing finde,
That I have spoken with my tongue that was not in my minde.

4 As for the workes of wicked men, and pathes peruerfe and ill,

For love of thy most holy name I have refrained still.

Then in thy pathes that be most pure stay me Lord and preserve, That from the way wherein I walke

my steps may neuer swerue.

For I doe call to thee O Lord, furely thou wilt me aide,

Then heare my prayer, and weigh right well the words that I have faid.

7 O thou the Saniour of all them that put their trust in thee, Declare thy strength on them that spurne against thy maiesty.

8 O keepe me Lord as thou wouldst keepe, the apple of thine eie,

promised to heare our prayers, and grant our requells which we shall make to thee in the name of thy beloved Son lefus Christ our Lord, who hath also commanded vs to affemble our selves together in his name, with full affurance that he wil not onely be amongst vs, but also be our Mediator and aduocate towards thy Maielty, that we may obtaine all things which shall seeme ex. pedient to thy bletled will, for our necessities, Therefore we beseech thee most mercifull Father, to turne thy louing countenance towards vs, and impute not vnto vs our manifold offences, whereby we jully deferue thy wrath and sharpe punishment, but rather receive vs to thy mercy, for lefus Christs sake, accepting his death and passion, as a suffrecompense for all out offences, in whom onely thou are pleased, and thorough whom thou can't not bee offended with vs. And feeing that of thy great mercies we have quietly palled this night; grant (O heavenly father) that we may be flow this day wholly in thy service, so that all out thoughts, words, & deeds, may redound to the glory of thy name, and good ensample to all men, who seeing our good works may glorific thee our heavenly father.

And forasmuch as of thy meere fauour & loue thou hast not onely created vs to thine owne similitude and likenesse, but also hast chosen vs to bee heires with thy deere Sonne lesus Christ, of that immortall kingdome which thou preparedst for vs before the beginning of the world, we beseech thee to increase our faith and knowledge, and to lighten our harts with thy holy spirit, that we may in the meane time line in godly connersation and integrity of life, knowing that Idolaters, Adulterers, conetous men, contentious persons, drunkards, gluttons, and such like, shall not inherit the Kingdome of God.

And because thou hast commanded vs to pray one for another, we doe not onely make request O Lord for our selues & for them that thou hast already called to the true vnderstanding of thy beauenly will, but for all people and nations of the world, who as they know by thy wonderfull

works that thou att God ouer al; so they may be intlructed by thy holy Spirit to beleeve in three their onely Saujour and Redeemer. But forasmuch as they cannot believe except they ficare, nor cannot heare, but by preaching, and none can preach except they bee fent: therefore O Lord raile up faithfull diffributers of thy Mysteries, who setting apare all worldly respects, may both in their life and ductrine onely feeke thy glory. Contrarily confound Sathan and Antichrist, with all hirchings, whom thou hast already cast off into a reprobate sense, that they may not by Sects, Schismes, Herefies and errours, disquiet thy little flocke. And because O Lord we be falne into the latter daies and dangerous times, wherein ignorance hath gotten the vper hand, and Sathan by his ministers feeks by al meanes to quench the light of thy Gotpell, wee beseech thee to maintaine thy cause against these rauening Wolves, and strengthen all thy servants whom they keep in prison & bondage. Let not thy long suffering be an occasion either to increase their tyransy, or to discourage thy children; neither yet let our fins and wickednes be an hinderance to thy mercy, but with speede O Lord consider their great mitenes. For thy people lirael many times by then fins prouoked their anger, and thou punishedst them by thy sust judgement, yet though their sinnes were nener so grieuous, it they once returned from their iniquiry, thou received them to mercy. Wee therefore most wretched sinners, bewait our manifold lins, and carneftly repent vs of our former wice and vingodly behaulour towards thee, and whereas wee cannot of our selues purchase thy pardon, yet wee humbly beseech thee for lefus Christs sake, to shew thy mercies vpon vs, and receive vs agains to thy favour. Grant vs deere Father these our requests, and all other things necessary for vs and thy holy Church, according to thy promise in letus Christ our Lord, in whose name wee beseech thee as hee hath taught vs, faying:

A Prayer against the Deuill and his mamfold Temptations, made by S. Augustine.

Here wanted a Tempter, and thou wast the cause that hee was wanting, there wanted time and place, & thou wast the cause that they wanted. The Tempter was present, and there wanted neither place nor time: but thou heldest me backethat I should not consent. The Temp-

tercame full of darkenetle as hee is: andthou diddell harden me that I might despise him. The Tempter came armed, and that throngly: but to the intent he should not ouercome me, thou didst restraine him, and strengthen tnee. I empter came transformed into an Angell of light, and to the intent hee flould not deceive me, thou didft rebuke him; and to the intent I should know him, thou didst enlighten me. For lice is the great red Dragon, the old Serpent, called the Deuill and Sathan, which hath feauen heads and ten hornes, whom thou hast created to take his pleasure in rhis huge and broad sea, wherein there creepe liuing wights innumerable, and Beafts great and small, that is to fay, diuers forts of Fiends, which practile nothing elle day and night, but to goe about feeking whom hee may deuoure, except thou refull him O Lord lesus. For it is that old Dragon, which draweth downe the third part of the Starres of Heauen with his taile, and casteth them to the ground, which with his venome poyloneth the Waters of the earth, that as many men as drinke of them may dye, which trampleth vpon Gold, as if it were myre, and is of opinion that lordan shall runne into his mouth, and which is made of fuch a mould, that hee feareth no man, And who shall saue vs from his chops O Lord lefus, who shall pluck vs out of his mouth fauing thou O Lord, who halt broken the head of this great Dragon? Helpe vs Lord, spread out thy wings ouer vs O Lord, that wee may flie vnder them from the face of this great Dragon that pursueth vs: and fence thou vs from his hornes with thy shield. For this is his continual endeuour, this is his only defire to deuour the foules which thou half created. And yet fuch is our great madnes O Lord, in that whereas wee fee the Dragon continually in a readinesseto deuoure vs with open mouth, wee neuerthelesse doe sleepe and reioyce in our owne flothfulnesse, as though wee were out of his danger, who defireth nothing elfe but to defire us. Our mischieuous enemy to the intent to kill vs, waicheth continually, and neuer fleepeth, and yet will not wee awake from fleepeto faue our selucs. Behold he hath pitched infinit lnares before our feete, and filled all our waies with fundry traps to catch our fouls. And who can escape O Lord lesus, so many and great dangers? Hee hath laid inares for vs in our riches, in our pouerty, in our meate, in our drinke, in our pleasures, in out fleep, & in our waking He hath fet fnares for vs in our words, and our workes, and in all

our life. Butthen O Lord, deliner vs from the net of the fewlers, and from hard words, that we may give praife to thee faying: Bleffed beethe Lord, who hath not given vs vp to be a prey for their teeth- our foule is delivered as a Sparrow our of the fewlers net, the net is broken, and we efcaped.

The confession of the Christian faith.

Relecue and confesse my Lord God eternall, infinite, vinneasurable, incomprehensible and inuisible, one in substance, and three in person, Father, Sonne, and holy Ghoss, who by his Almighty power and wisedome, bath not onely of riothing created heaven and earth, and all things rherein contained, & man after his ownelmage, that hee might in him be glorisied, but also by his satherly providence governeth, maintaineth, and preserveth the same according to the pur-

pose of his will.

I beleeue allo & confesse lesus Christ the onely Sauione and Messias, who being equall with God, made himselle of no reputation, but tooke on him the fliape of a feruant, and became man in all things, like vnto vs, except sinne, to alfure vs of mercy and forgiueneile. For when through out father Adams transgression, we were become Children of perdition, there was no meanes to blinges from the yoke of finne and damnation, but onely refus Christ our Lord, who giving vs that by grace, which was his by Nature, made vs through faith the children of God, who when the fulnelle of time was come, was conceived by the power of the holy Ghost, borne of the Virgin Mary (according to the flesh) and preached in earth the Gospel of saluation, till at length by Tyranny of the Priests, hee was guiltlesse condemned under Pontisu Pilate, then President of lury, and most slanderously hanged on the Crosse betweene two Theeues as a notorious trespasser, where taking vpon him the punishment of our fins, he delivered vs from the curle of the law.

And forasmuch as he being onely God could not feele death, neither being onely man, could ouercome death, hee ioyned both together, and suffered his humanity to be punished with most cruell death, feeling in himselfe the anger and seucre ludgement of God, euen as he had been in extreame torments of hell, and therefore cried with a loud voice: My God, My God, why bass thou forsaken mee? Thus of his mercy without compulsion, hee offered up himselfe as the onely sacrifice to purge the sinnes of all the World, so that all other sacrifices for sinne are blasshemous, and derogate from the sufficiency hereos.

Which death albeit it did sufficiently reconcile visto God, yet the Scriptures commonly doe attribute our regeneration to his resurrection. For as by rising agains from the grane the third

day, he conquered death, euch fothevich ry of our faith flandeth in his refuirech in, and therefore without the one wee c anothele the benefits of the other. For as by his death finne was taken away, so our righteoustetie was restored by his refurrection. And because I.ee would accomplishall things, and take possession for vs in his kingdome, hee ascended into heaven to enlarge the same kingdome by the abundant power of his spirit, by whom we are most assured of his continual! intercession towards God the Father for vs. And although hee bee in t.eauen as rouching his corporall presence, where the Father hath now fet him at his right hand, committing vnto him the administration of all things, as wellin heauen aboue, as in the earth beneath, yet is hee present with va his members, even to the end of the world, in preserving and governing vs with his effectuall power and grace, who when all things are fulfilled which God hath spoken by the mouth of all his Prophets since the world began, will come in the same visible forme in the which hee ascended, with an vnspeakeable maiesty, power, and company to seperate the Lambs from the Goats, the elect from the reprobate. So that none whether he be aliue then, or dead before, shall escape his indgement.

Moreouer, I beleeue and confesse the holy Ghoff, God equall with the father and the fonne, who regenerateth and san aifeth ve, ruleth and guideth vs vnto all truth, perswading most af-furedly in our consciences, that we be the children of God, Brethren to Ielus Christ, and fellow heires with him of life euerlatting: yet notwithstanding it is not tofficient to beleeve that God is omnipotent and mercifull, that Christ hath made latisfaction, or that the holy Ghost hath his power and eff. at, except wee doe apply the same benefits to vs which are Gods elect. I beleeue therefore & confeile one holy church; which as members of lefus Christ the onely head thereof consent in faith, hope and charity, vling the gifts of God, whether they be temporall or spirituall to the profit and furtherance of the same, which Church is not seene to mans eye, but onely knowne to God, who of the loft sonnes of Adam, hath ordained some as vessels of wrath to damnation, and hath chosen others as vessels of his mercy to bee saued. The which in due time hee calleth to integritie of life, and godly conversation, to make them a glorious Church in himselfe. But that Church which is visible and seene to the eye, hath three tokens and markes whereby it may be knowne.

First the word of God contained in the old & new Testament, which as it is about the authority of the same Church, and onely sufficient to instruct vs of all things concerning saluation, so is it left for all degrees of men, to read and vnderstand. For without this word, neither church, Councell, or Decree, can establish any point

touching faluation,

The lecond is the holy Sicraments to wit, of Baptiline and the Lords Supper, which Sacraments Christ hath left viito vs as holy signes and feales of his promifes. For as hy Baptiline once received, Islignified that we (as well Infants, as others of age and discretion) being strangers from God by originall finne, are received into his family and congregation, with full affurance, that although this toute of finne lye hid in vs, vertothe elect is stall not bee imputed : so the supper declareth, that God as a most provident facher, doth not onely feed our bodies, but alfo spiritually nourished our soules with the graces and benefits of lefus Christ, which the Scripture calleth eating of his fleth, and drinking of his blond, neither must we in the administration of these Sacraments follow mans fantalie, but as Christ himselse hath ordained, so must they bee ministred, and by such as by ordinary vocation are thereunto called. Therefore who so zuer reserueth and worshippeth these Sacraments, or contrariwise contemneth them in time and place, procureth himselse damnation.

The third marke of this Church is Ecclesia-slicall discipline, which standeth in admonition and correction of saults. The finall end whereof is excommunication by the consent of the church determined, if the offender bee obtinate. And besides this Ecclesiassicall discipline, I acknowledge to belong to this Church a politicke magistrate, who ministreth to every man instice, defending the good, and punishing the cuill. To whom wee must render honour and obedience in allthings which are not contrary to the word

of God And as Mofes, Ezechias, lofias, and other good rulers purged the Church of God from Superflition and Idolatrie, to the defence of Christs Church appertaineth to Christian Magilltates against all Idolaters and Heretickes, as Papilts, Anabaptills, with fuch like limmes of Antichriff, to root out all doctrine of Dinels and men: asthe Maile, Purgatory, Limbus Patrum, Prayers to Saints, and for the dead, Free Will, diffination of meates, apparell, and dayes, vowes ol lingle life, presence at Idoll Service, mana merits, with such like, which drawe vs from the fociety of Christs Charch wherein standerli only remillion of fins, purchased by Christs bloud ro all them that beleeue, whether they be lewes or Gentiles, and lead vs to a vaine confidence in creatures, and trust in our owne imaginations, The punishment whereof although God often times deserreth in this life, yer afrer the generall resurrection when our soules & bodies shall rise againeto immortality, they shall be damned to vnquenchable fire, and then we which haue forfaken all mens wisedome to cleaue vnto Christ shall heare the joyfull voyce: Come ge bleffed of my Father, inherit the Kingdome prepared for you from the beginning of the world : and to shall goe triumphing with him in body and foule to remaine everlastingly in glory, where we shall see God face to face, and shall no more neede to infruct one another, we shall all know him from the highest to the lowest. To whom with the Sonneand the holy Ghost, be all praise,

honour, and glory, now and euer,
So be it.
