

The prices printed in this list are based upon present market conditions, and are for immediate acceptance, subject to change without notice and stock being unsold. All goods are offered f. o. b. West Grove; packing at cost or free for cash with order. We sell 250 or more at the 1,000 rate and 25 or more at the 100 rate.

Orders are booked with the understanding that they shall become void should injury befall the stock from flood, error in count, drought, fire, or other causes beyond our control.

Shipments travel at purchaser's risk, and in the absence of definite instructions from the buyer, stock will be forwarded according to our best judgment without assuming responsibility.




