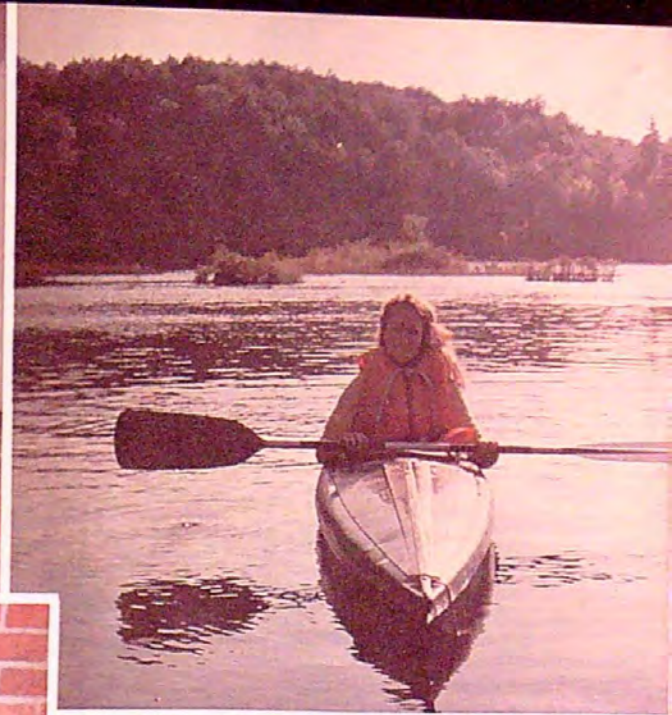

Beyond the shallow shell.



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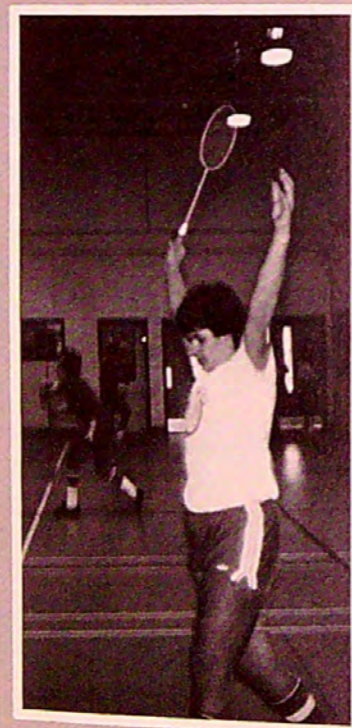
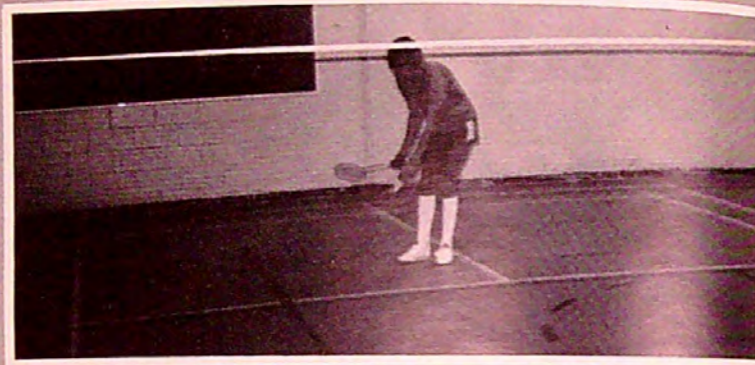

DIRECTOR-GENERAL'S ADDRESS

This is my first opportunity to address the students, parents, and faculties of two West Island Colleges who, although separated by 3300 kilometers of geography, share a common heritage. The editorial staff of Voyages '83 has dedicated this ninth edition to the theme "reaching out". Coincidentally this year, the school has "reached out", broadened its sphere of influence and, within educational and social parameters, demonstrated by its actions that the geography, the politics, and the cultures which perpetuate Canadian regionalism are easily transcended when addressed within a well defined and well delivered curriculum.

Long before a school becomes a group of students, a building, rows of desks, an alma mater, or a faculty, it is, above all, an idea. Parents, students and faculty have willingly embraced a set of ideas which are West Island College. We call it our philosophy and one of its tenets is learning through participation to become a contributing member of the broader community to which we belong. It is, in essence, "reaching out", a firmly entrenched component in West Island College's learning experience.

Montreal and Calgary are linked by enthusiastic hearts and hands which themselves make a statement about our young adults and their schools: ... Southwood Nursing Home, Gary Taylor Center, Clinton Ford Elementary, Cedar's Cancer Fund, Special Olympics ... Each West Island College student has on more than one occasion involved himself in programmes for senior citizens, programmes for the mentally handicapped, programmes for the physically handicapped, programmes for research in cancer, heart disease, muscular dystrophy and diabetes. Our young people have become positive forces in their own communities; they have given time; they have raised tens of thousands of dollars; they have "reached out" and given. It is one thing for the school to espouse a philosophy - that is relatively simple; it is the delivery which we find challenging and exciting. Our young people care and have shown it. In so doing others have benefitted greatly and they, the students, have learned much in the process.

I was recently impressed by the fact that Claude Taylor, in his address in the March 1983 issue of EN ROUTE magazine paused to laud the spontaneous and giving spirit of Air Canada employees in Toronto and Halifax who had taken on volunteer projects. It was not so much the quantity of the giving nor the specific nature of the giving that impressed me but rather that a man who measures much of his success in P and L, billions of dollars and billions of miles had the sensitivity, the values and the time to acknowledge another "reaching out". It must be important; successful people believe in a sense of responsibility to their broader community.

Needless to say, I am delighted that our yearbook staff has chosen to acknowledge those accomplishments. It signals the acquisition of values which I personally cherish. Risking the abuse of this year's thematic expression I wish to close by encouraging all of our students and particularly our 1983 grads to:

"Reach out" and give,
"reach out" and take, and remember, particularly,
that everything is within your "reach".


I wish to express thanks for the fine work of this year's faculty, to compliment the achievements of our students, and to thank our parent community for their active support. Each component of our educational triangle has worked steadfastly to make our school uniquely successful.

ALLOCUTION DU DIRECTEUR GÉNÉRALE



Pour une toute première fois, j'ai le plaisir de m'adresser à deux Collèges de l'Ouest de l'Île qui, malgré une séparation géographique de quelques 3300 kilomètres, partagent un héritage commun. L'équipe de rédaction de VOYAGES '83 a dédié cette neuvième édition au thème de "l'aide bénévole". Cet esprit d'ouverture du coeur et des bras et l'appui accordé à une participation active dans sa communauté coïncident, en 1983, avec l'épanouissement de notre collège. Nos bras s'étendent de Montréal à Calgary, où par nos démarches en éducation, nous avons démontré que nos différences politiques, géographiques et culturelles perdent de l'importance à travers un curriculum qui est bien pensé et bien exécuté.

Chaque étudiant, à plusieurs reprises, ne manque jamais une occasion de participer aux programmes des gens de l'âge d'or, aux programmes pour les déficients mentaux et/ou physiques et aux programmes pour la recherche médicale. Nos jeunes sont devenus des forces positives dans leurs communautés; ils ont donné de leur temps; ils ont gagné et donné des dizaines de milliers de dollars, bref, ils ont donné. L'école peut facilement rédiger une philosophie; le défi se trouve dans son exécution et dans le plaisir de la réussite ce qui lui confirme sa valeur. Plusieurs ont profité des dons de nos jeunes, cependant, eux aussi ont profité car leurs expériences ont été des expériences d'apprentissage.

Chers Gradués,

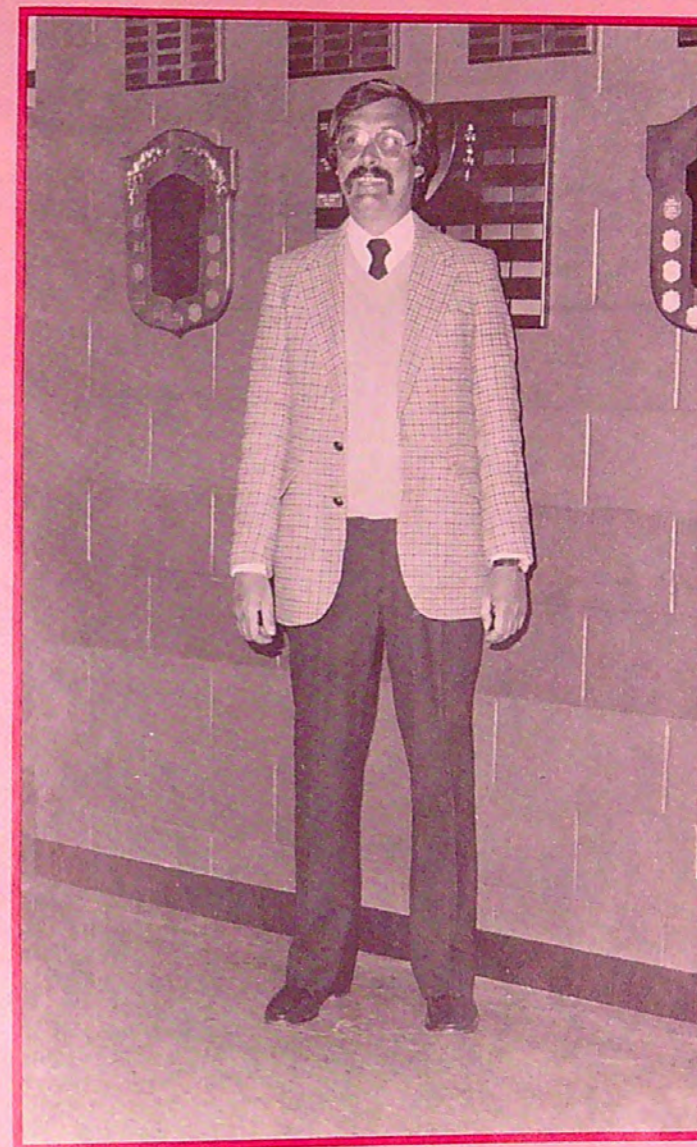

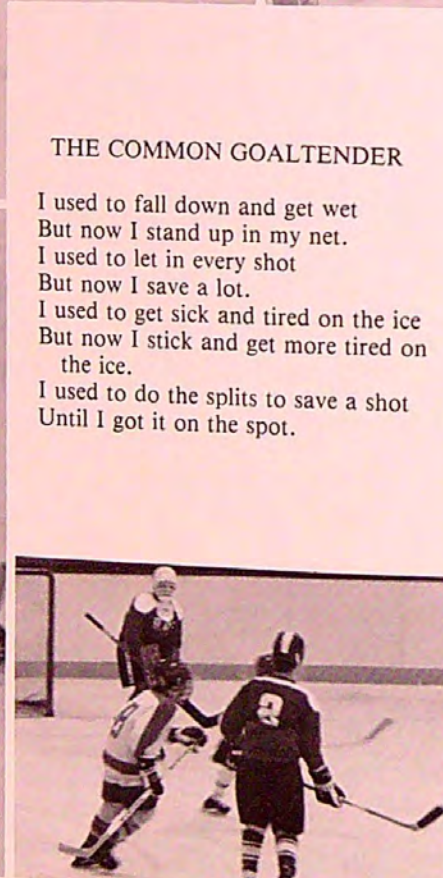


GRADE SEVEN HOCKEY

GYMNASTICS DISPLAY

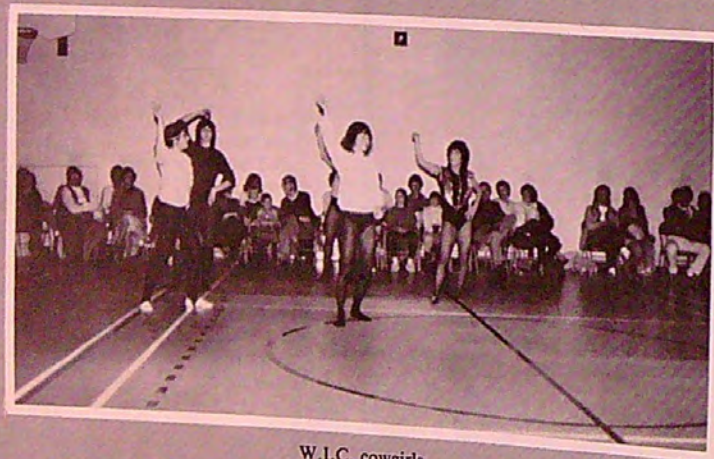

The career orientation programme is designed to provide graduating students with an idea of what the "real" world holds in store for them. The various aims of this program are:

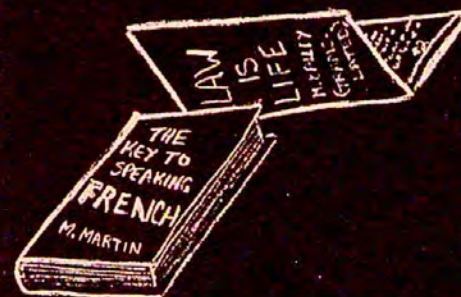
- To aid students in making the right career choices.

- To allow students to talk to people already established in the field of their choice.
- To improve self-confidence.

Career orientation this year had two different sections. In November, professionals from many different walks of life conducted seminars to familiarize the students with the varying industries and professions. Fields such as Computers, Journalism, Medicine, Communications, Engineering, Business, Marketing, Accounting, Dentistry, and Law, were discussed by people like Mr. Victor Cormier, (computers) Dr. Nicholas Steinmetz, (medicine) Mr. Dennis Pantis, (communications), to mention but a few. 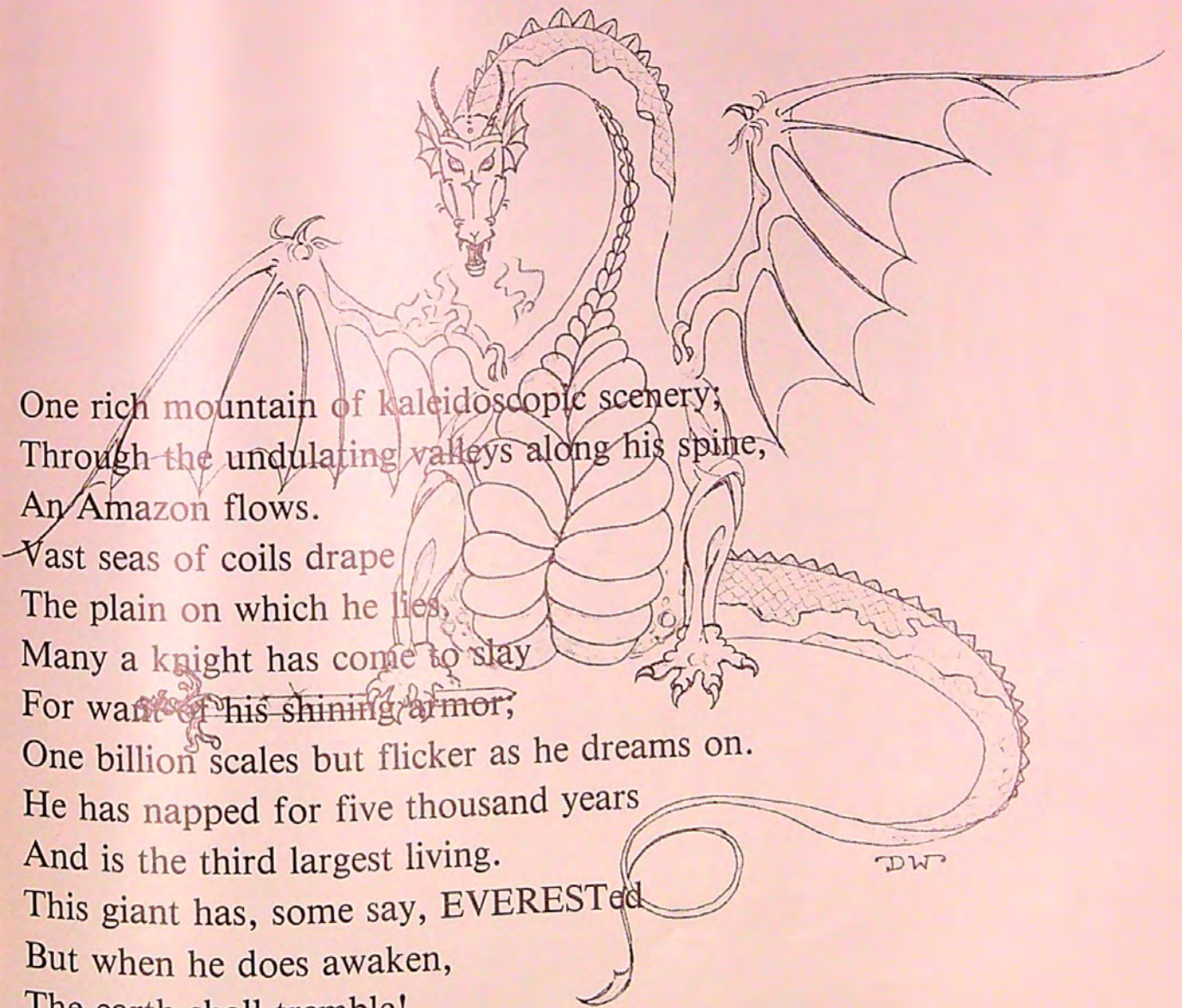
SPRING

hissing the echoes of his passing.



THE SEASON OF SNOW

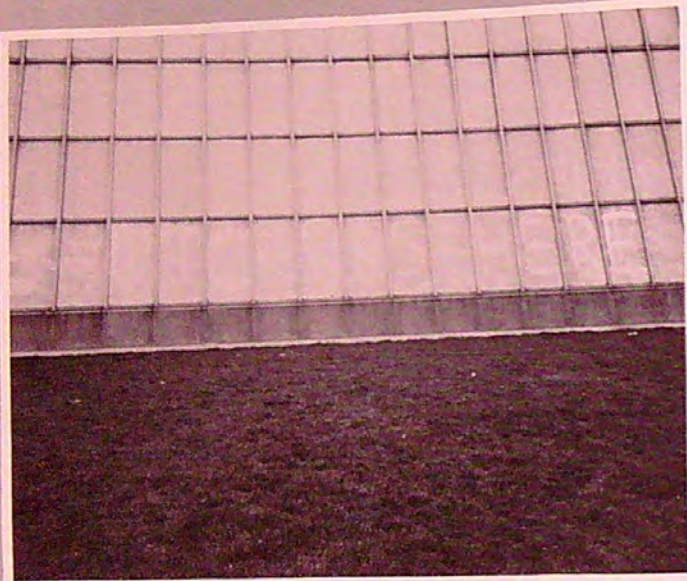

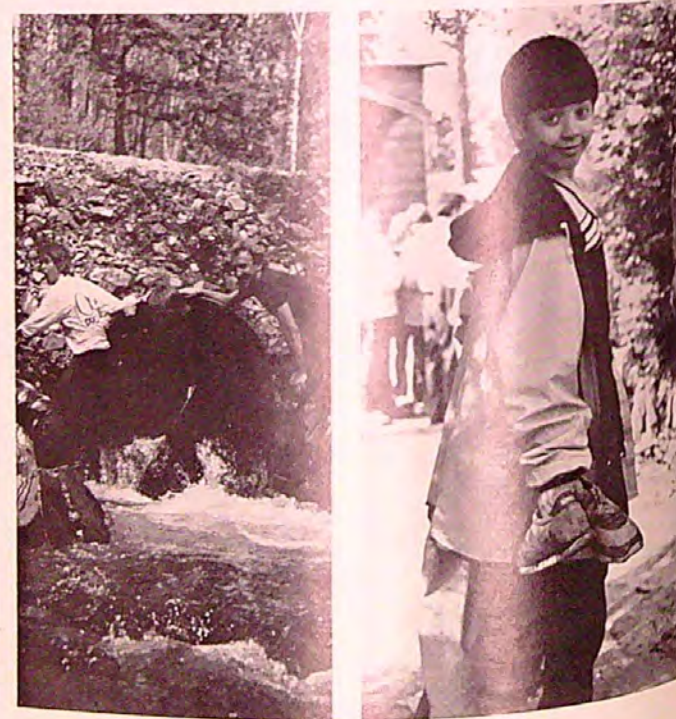

QUATRE JOURS DANS LES BOIS

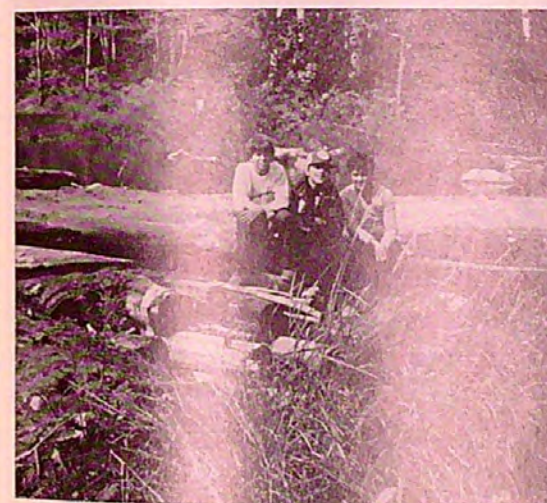

W.I.C.'S FUTURE NOBEL LAUREATES

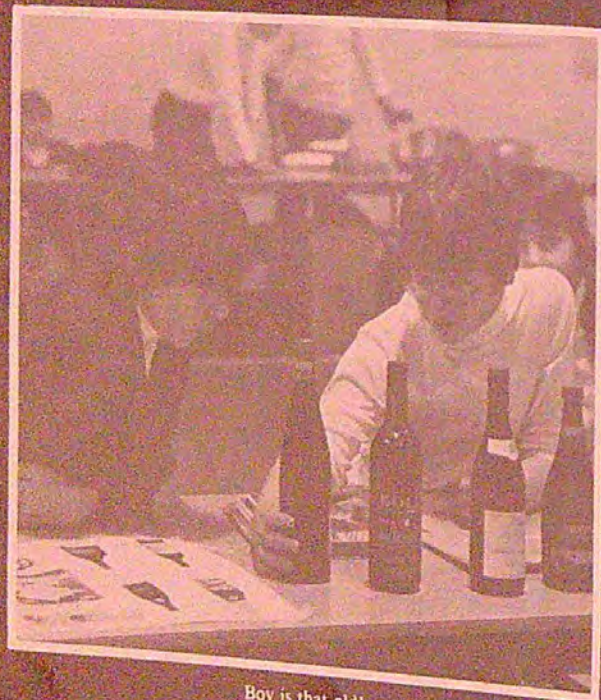

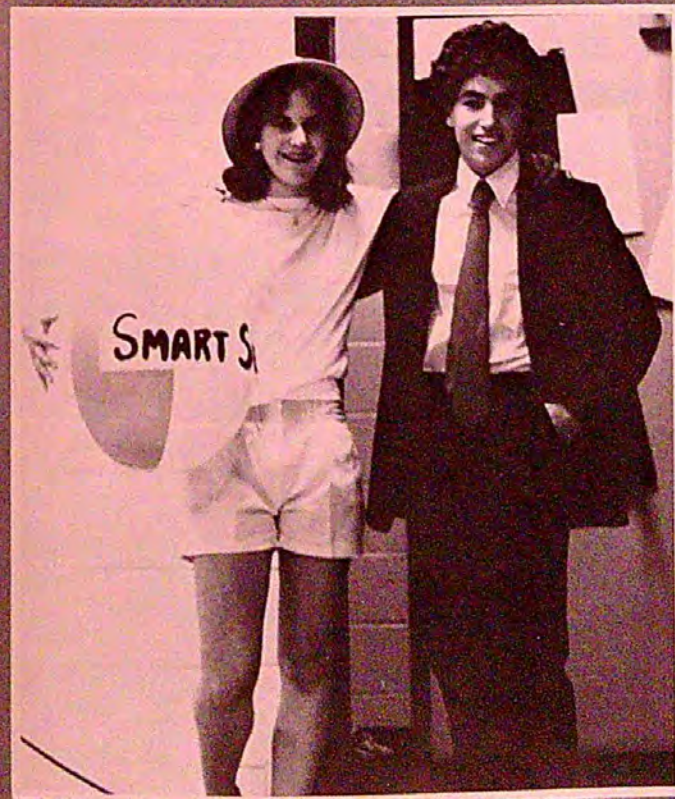
