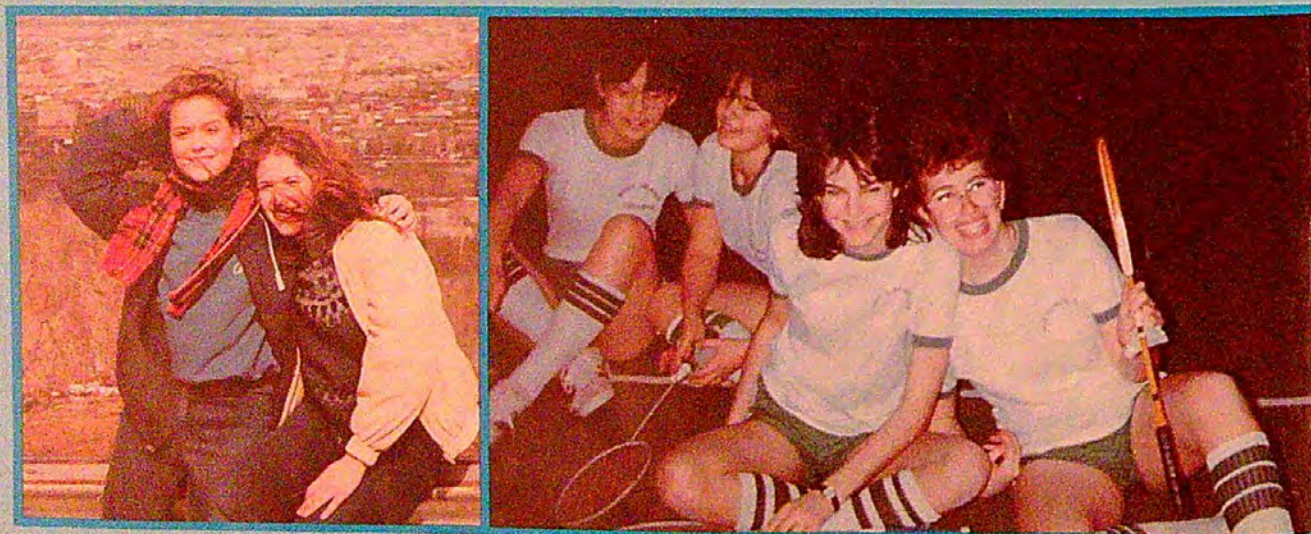
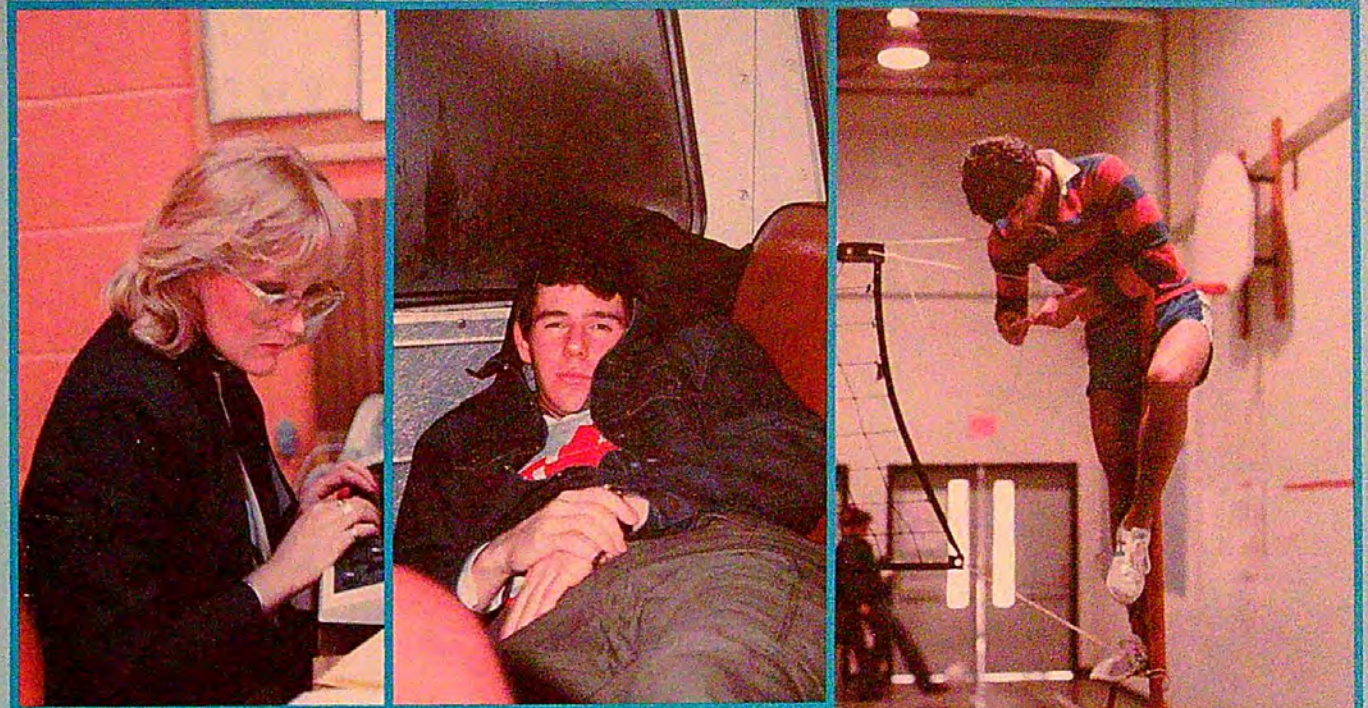
It is dedicated to the passing of time. Let us protect and preserve the past, understand and appreciate the present, while we grow and learn to improve the future.

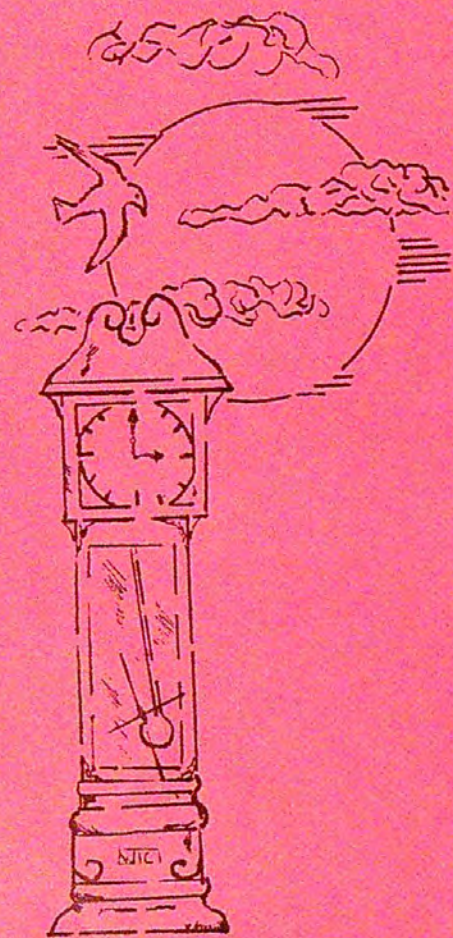

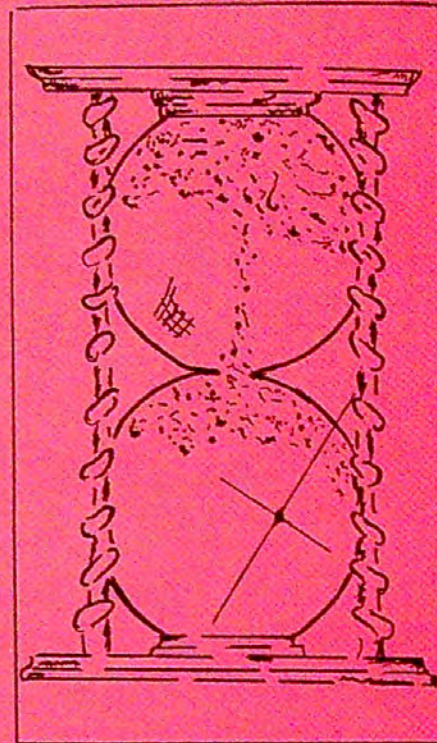
## THEN AND NOW

Arvind Seth was named most improved player. Special thanks to team captain Trevor Beggs, and Mlle. Lalonde, without whom our club wouldn't have been so great.

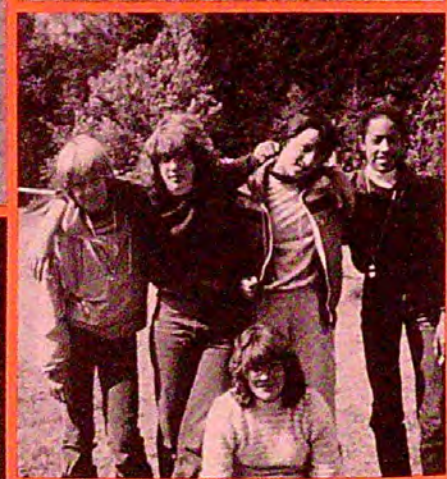
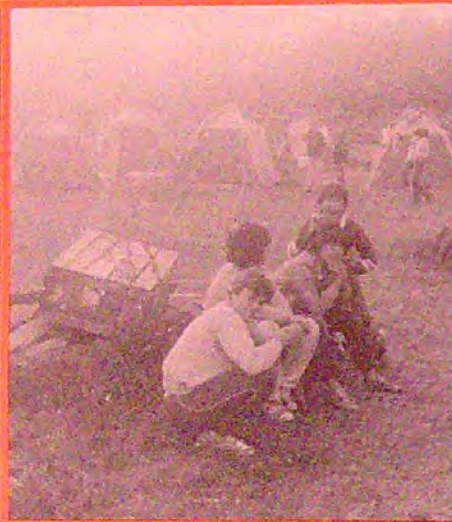
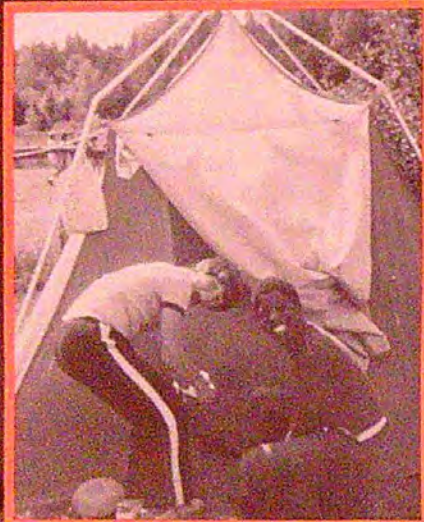

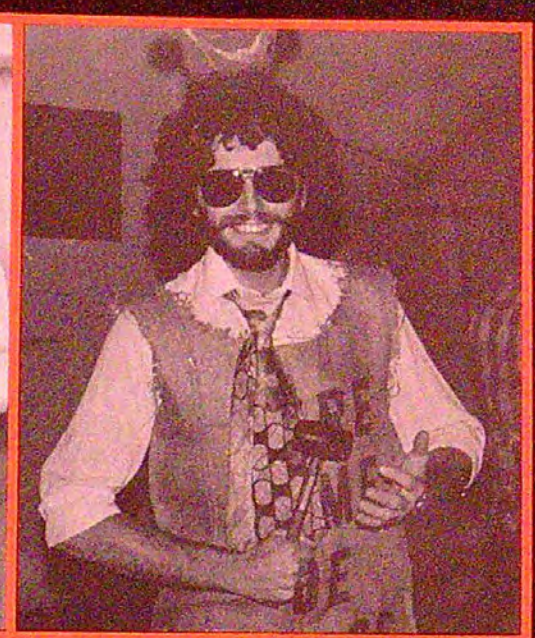


## THE EXPERIENCE

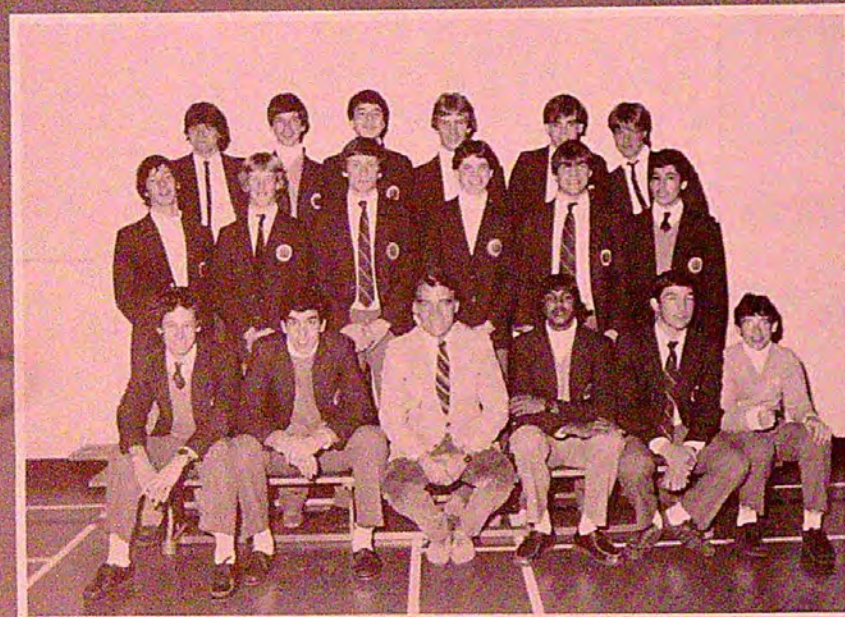
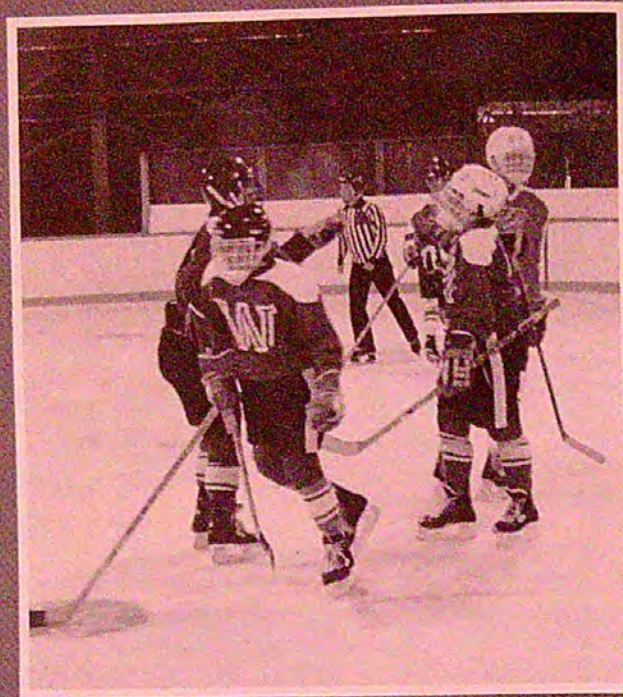
Unfortunately, due to a lack of experience, our victories were rare. Despite all the elements against us, we did demonstrate a large amount of pride and prestige in every game we played.

On behalf of the whole team I would like to thank our coach Mr. Barontseff, for all his efforts, the administration for their tolerance and support, and to all our faithful fans.

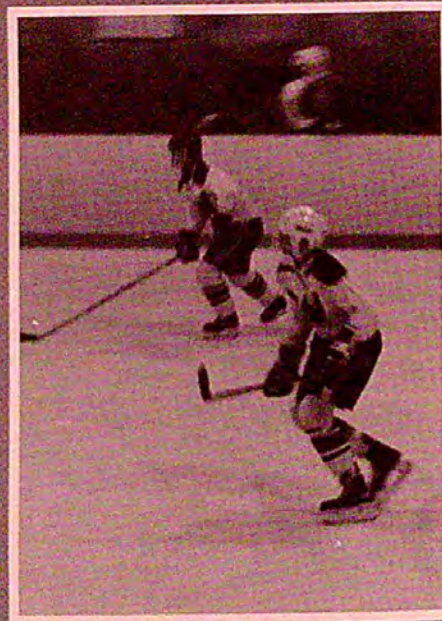

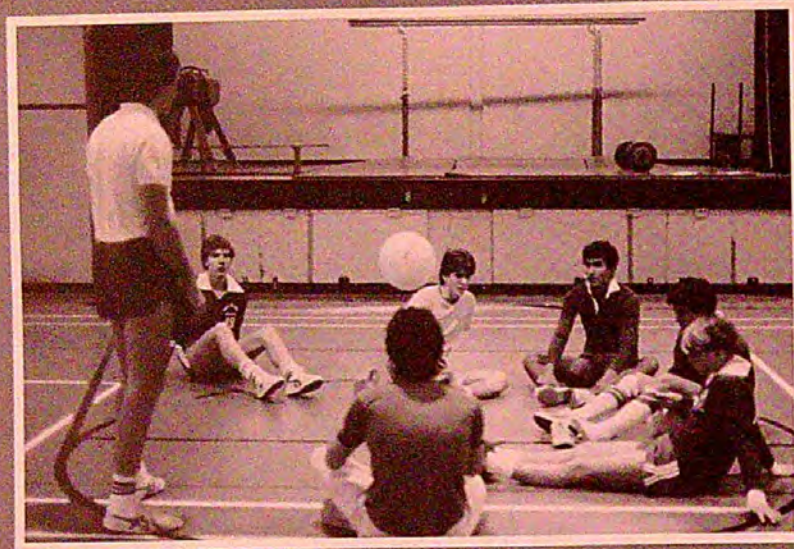
## BOYS' MIDGET VOLLEYBALL

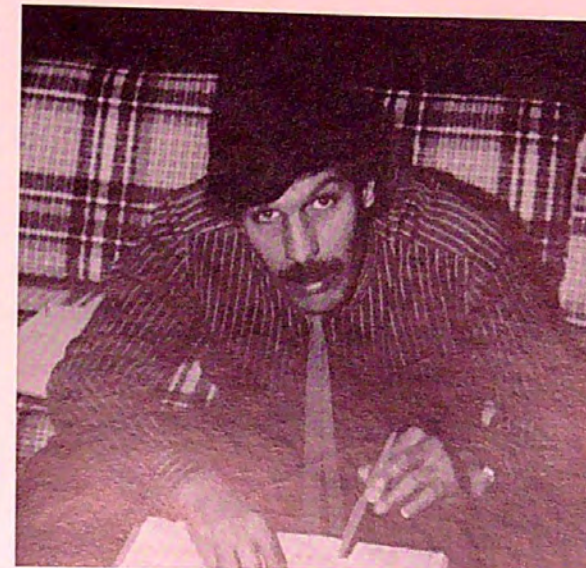

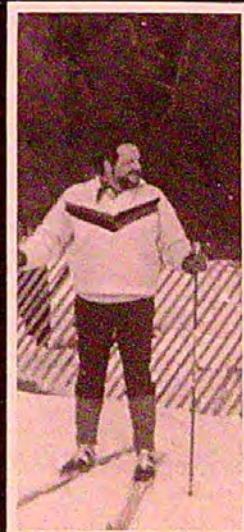


## WILVAKEN

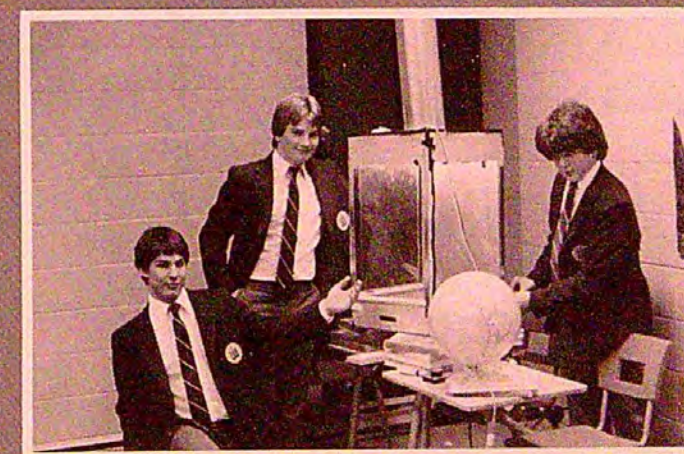
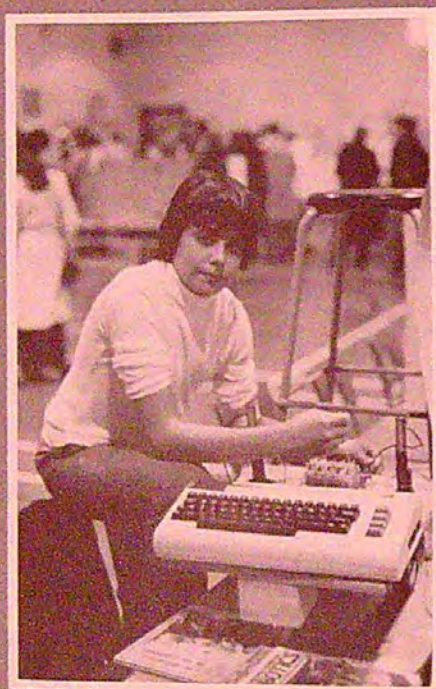

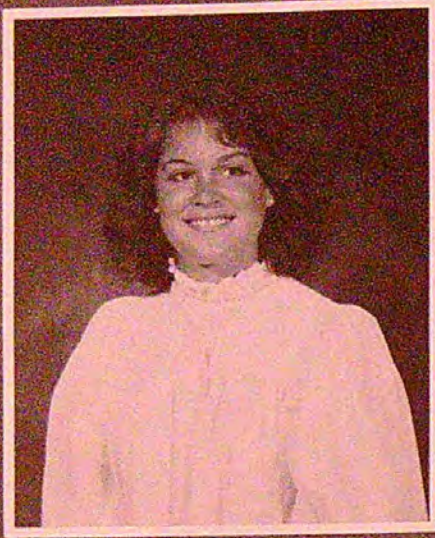

To Michal Olenecin who did the photography, even though he didn't always want to --

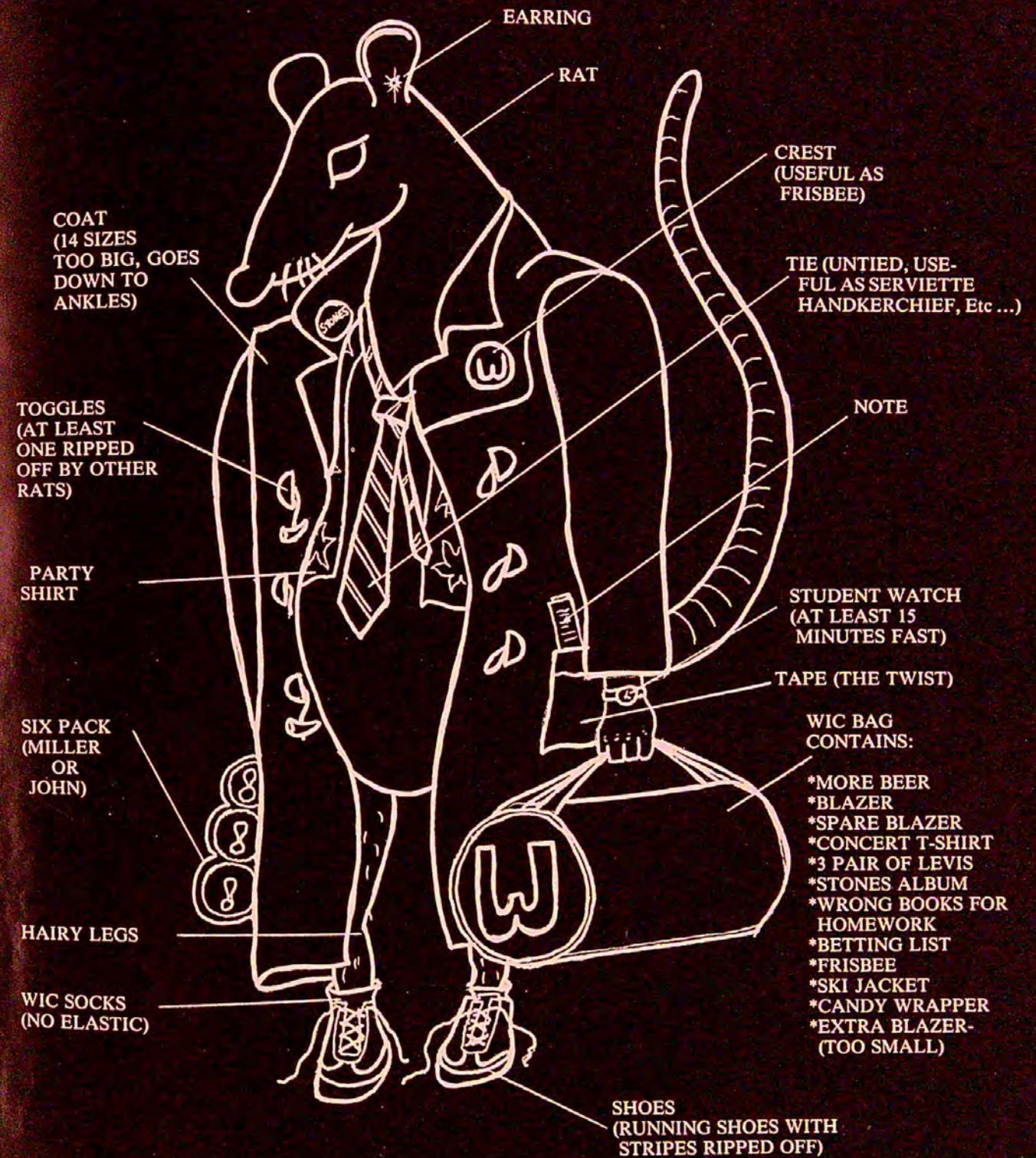
To Karen Gropper who kept track of the sports activities - Karen you're so organized!

## CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

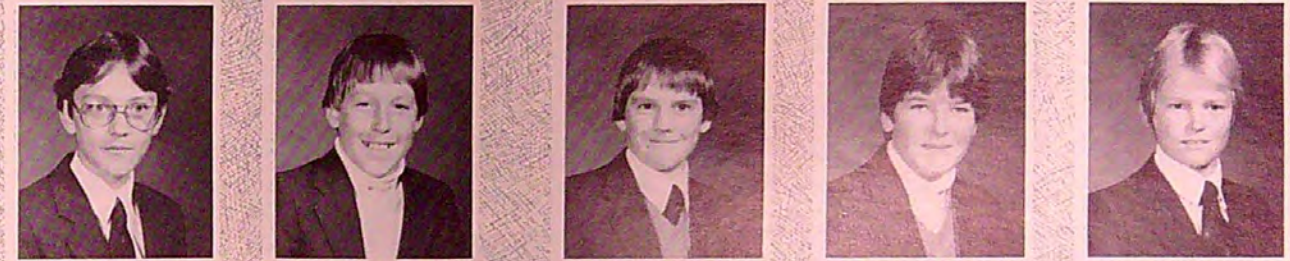
