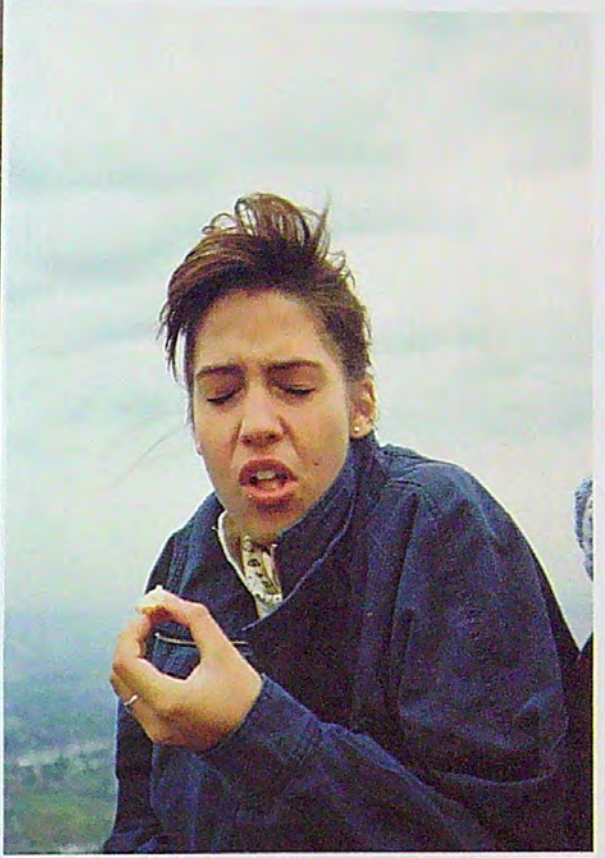
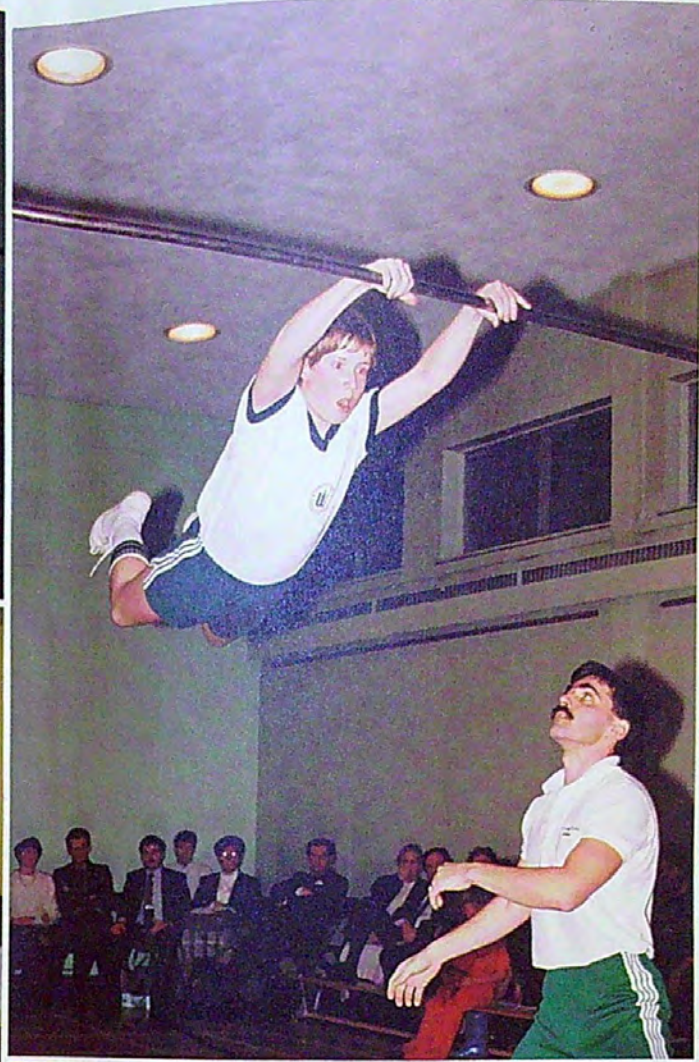

DIRECTOR GENERAL'S ADDRESS

Dear friends/Chers amis,

Each year when I am asked to submit an address for our yearbook, I am reminded of what it is like to be a student. The experience serves me well since it generates a great deal of empathy.

Here I am and it is January; I am already two days late and in trouble with our advisor. A blank sheet of paper is before me and inspiration is not in concert with something - maybe my bio-rhythm. The year is not half over yet, like the assignment to complete a novel study without reading the novel, and still I must say specific yet innocuous things. How? What if I'm overtired and distracted; I still have to get this done. After considerable effort and time, will my piece be read with care and interest, or read at all? You see, the trials of student life remain with us for much longer than one might think . . . perhaps for life. The consolation of course, is that we can forever be reminded of and appreciative of each other's dilemmas.

In that context my empathy for students, staff, and parents assures my appreciation of and respect for your responses to the many challenges you encounter. At W.I.C., we seem to fare better than most; achievements are numerous and qualitative; initiative, creativity and tenacity are lent to intelligence and, together, produce uniquely positive distinction.

So . . . , thank you, students, parents, staff, and friends for such distinction; this chronicle, our time together in this place, the events of that time, unite us in a way which is unique. Unique distinctions and distinctive memories which are happily permanent and neutralize the ravages of time. While the events of life are so frequently dominated by time, memories are held harmless. We hold and cherish them (memories) like paintings, secure in the knowledge that the artist (time) has finished his work. We return and look again, often discovering new meaning and value.

At this point in such a discourse I would normally close and direct my efforts to a comparable French translation. But you see, that's rather silly; our audience, the W.I.C. audience, is comfortable in both of our official languages and more important than translation is the manifest expression of that comfort.

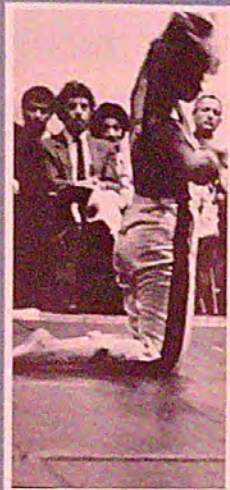
The Big Event

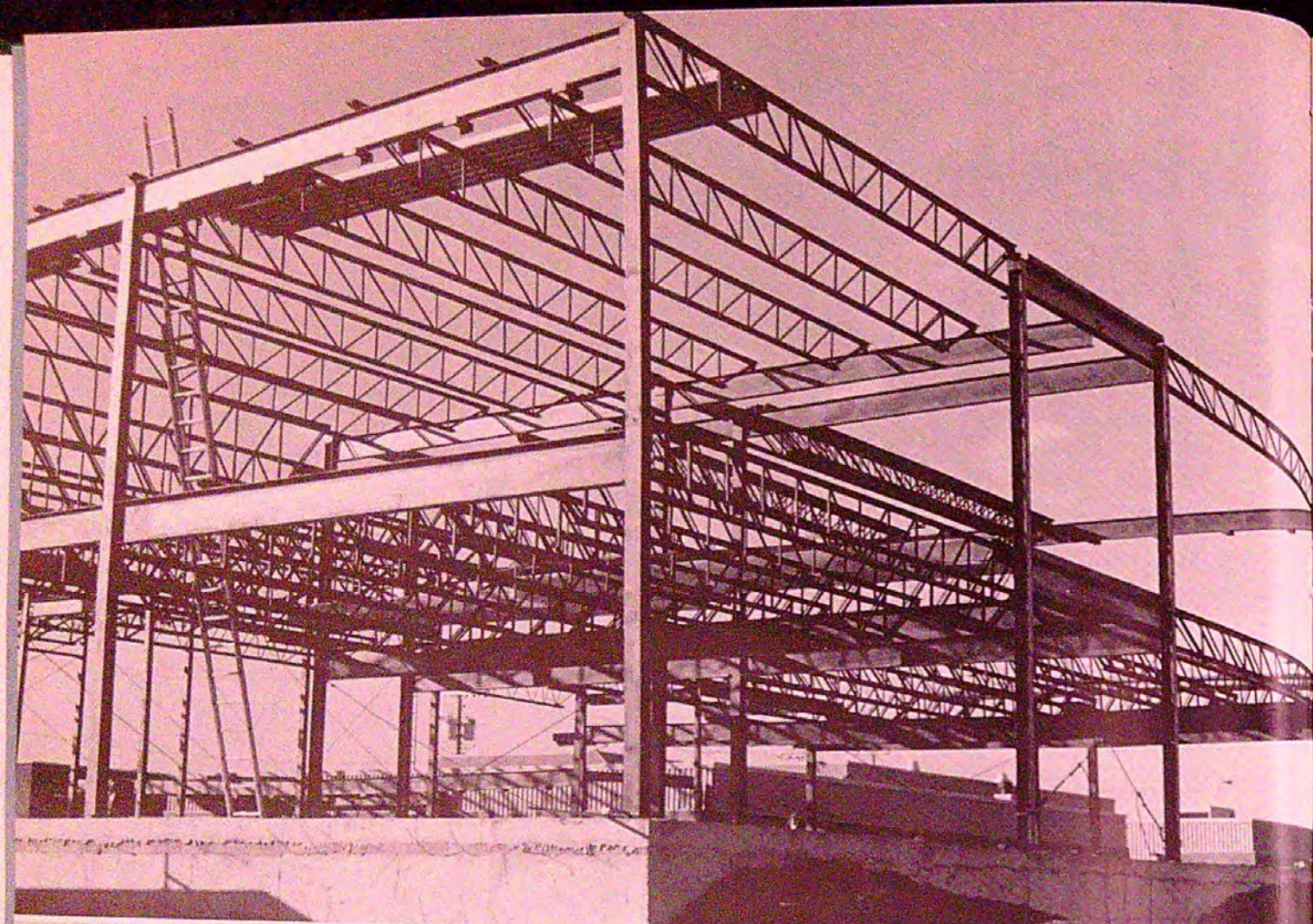
Grade 10 Calgary


Dear Graduates,

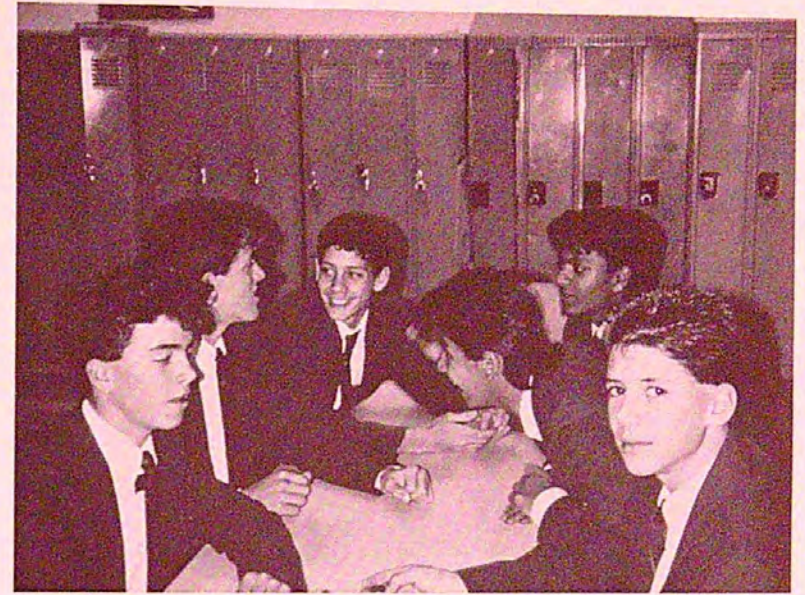

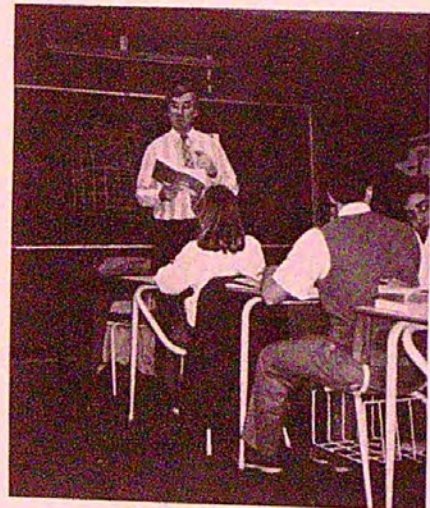

In closing, I would like to express my congratulations to each of you. I wish you many successes in your future careers, and look forward to seeing you again.





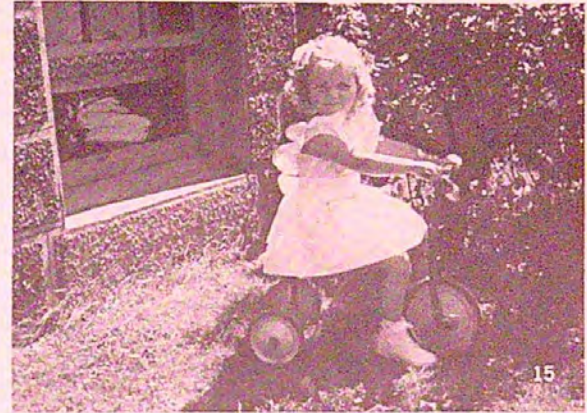
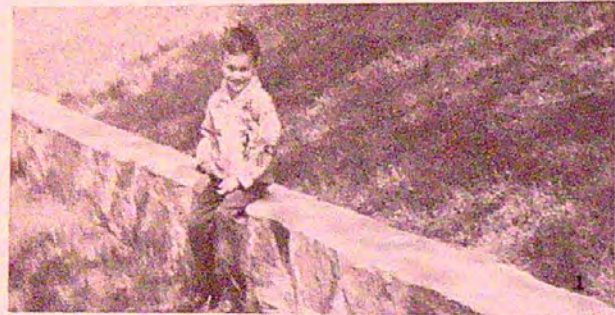

Although the first of its nature at the Montreal campus, it represented another in a series of such conferences undertaken by West Island College; participants during the past twelve months now exceed 1000 students from over 25 nations. SECONDAIRE IV EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION

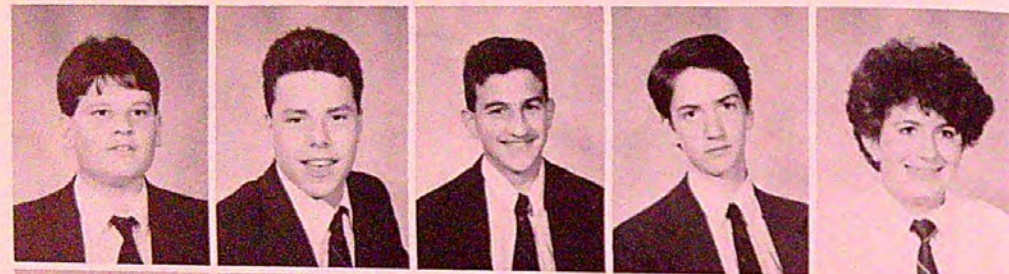

JUVENILE SOCCER . . . CHAMPS AGAIN!!

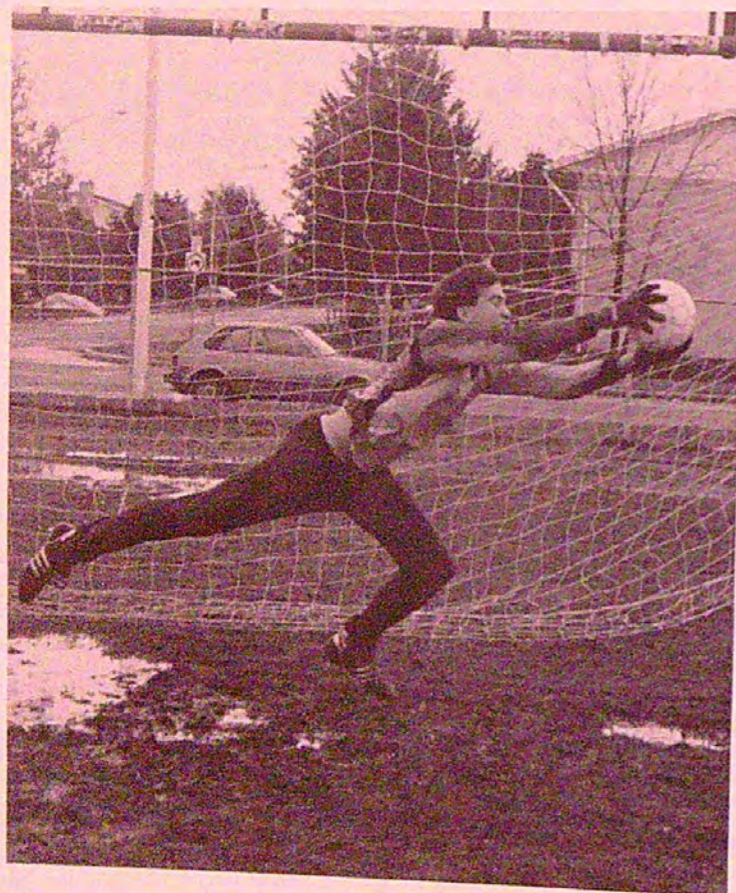

Corey Collard's house served as the juvenile abode away from abode. No wonder we were always a little slow in the early games of weekend tourneys.

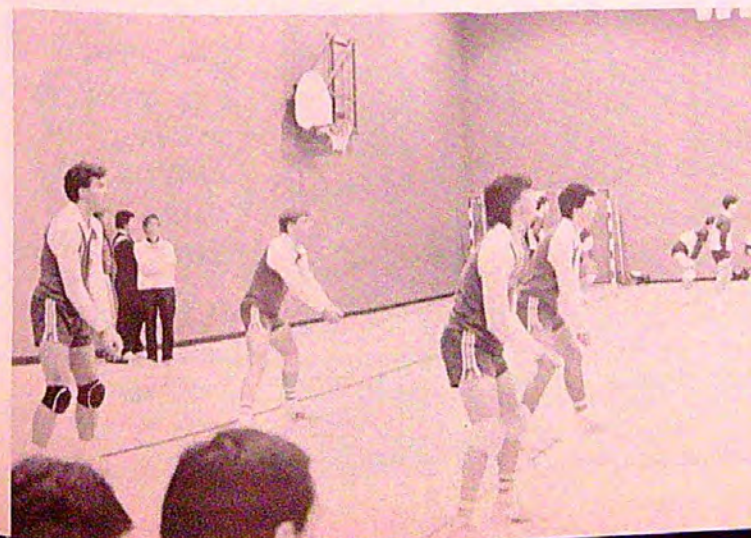
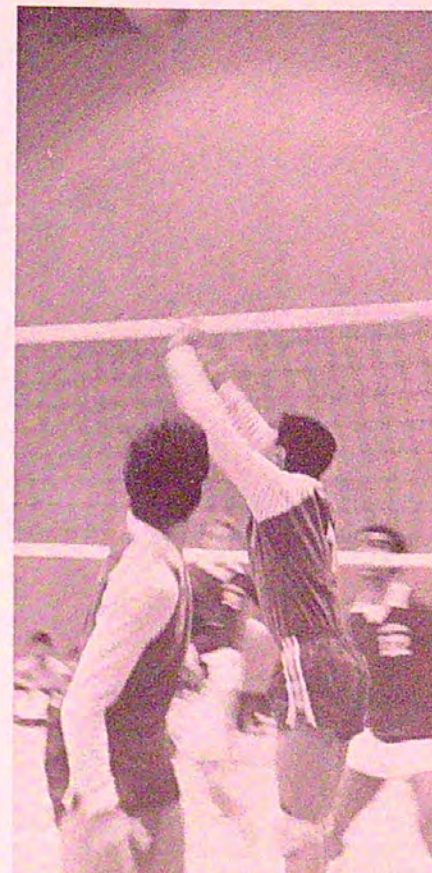

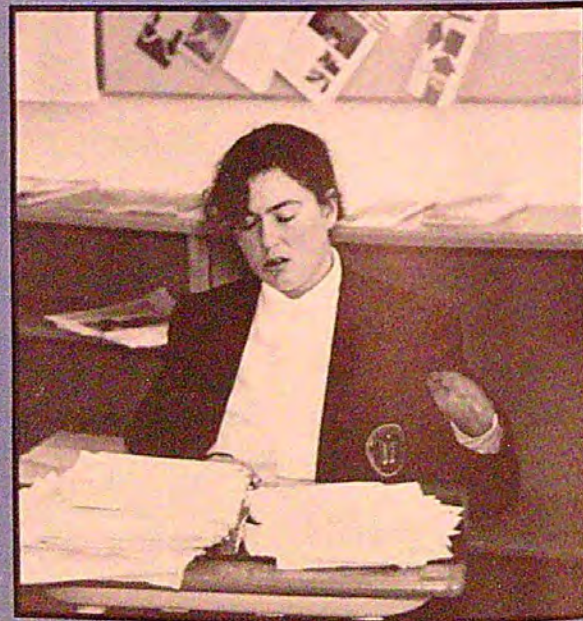
YEARBOOK COMMITTEE

The students have had another exciting year, participating in the Students Council activities. The year 86/87 was busy with dances, airbands and a variety of activity days.

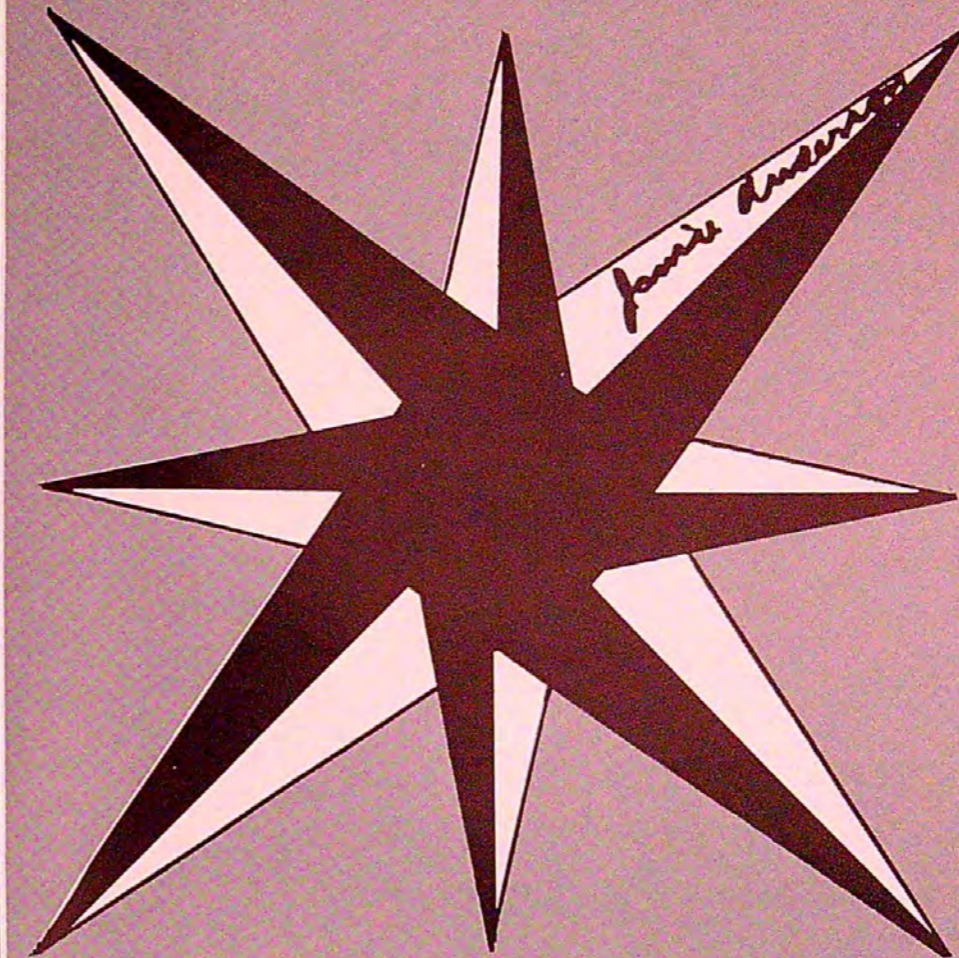
We have had two major fund raisers: candy grams, raising \$60.00 for the '87 Grad class and the food bank, raising \$1500.00 for the less fortunate.

VALEDICTORIAN'S ADDRESS

Mr. Davies, Mr. Martin, Mrs. Horn, honoured guests, faculty, parents, and . . . finally . . . fellow graduates:
