HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS

I would like to take this opportunity to share one last message.

I was very fortunate to have my grand-parents living right next door as I grew up. When I was eight years old, my grand-father spent several weeks teaching me how to make wooden barrels.

This involved the shaping of the stays, making metal hoops and assembling all the pieces. I remember a great number of attempts were needed before I had any real success. The first simply fell apart, the second did not hold water, the third did work but suffered a terrible lean. I was in awe of the skill and knowledge my grand-father possessed but, eventually, after a great deal of trial and error, I succeeded in my barrel-making.

About 20 years later, I found myself building barrels again, but this time it was in senior physics lab at university. These barrels certainly represented the advance of 20 years from 1956 to 1976; Instead of wooden staves, we were using strong magnetic fields to contain plasmas that were too hot to be held by any known materials.

Neither my grand-father nor myself could have imagined magnetic barrels when he set out to teach me his skills.

Neither your parents nor your grand-parents, nor teachers can imagine what skills you may require 20 years from now, or 20 years from that, but you have been prepared. It's not the skill of barrel-making that remains with me some 35 years later, but the values shared in the process: values such as perseverance, patience and the willingness to fail. Good values are universal and timeless and it is these values that will carry you into the future.

Should you find yourself in a new, bewildering situation, you need only look for the values shared by your parents, grandparents, teachers, friends and neighbours. As time passes, you will come to treasure them.

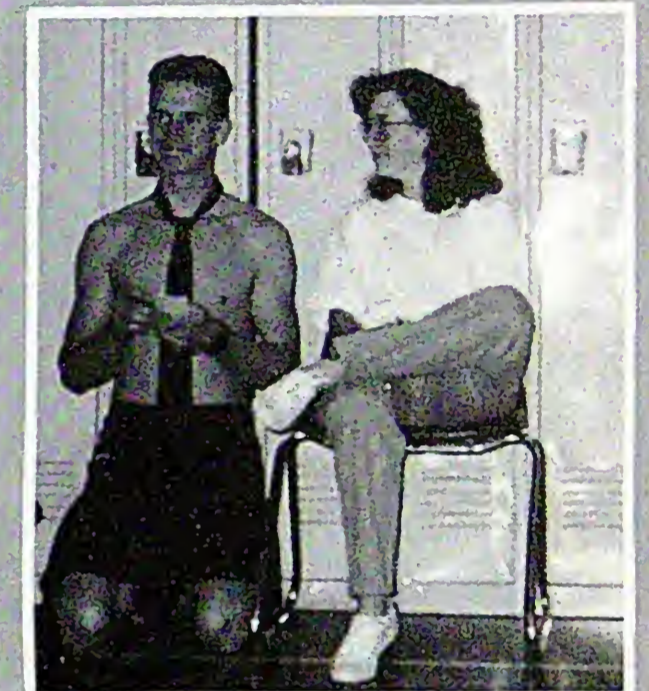
PREFECTS

But above all else:

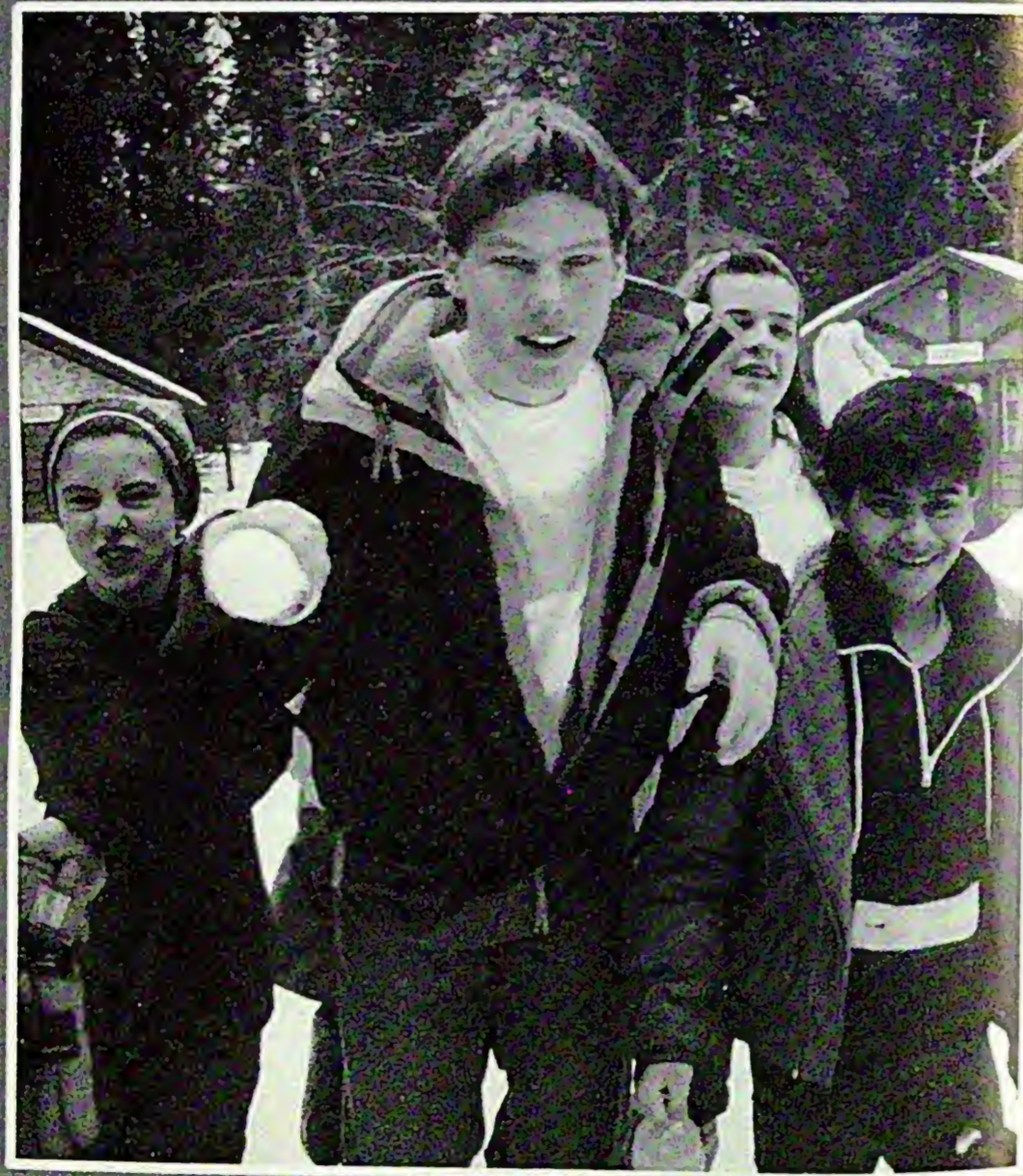
