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THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS - JUNE 1993

Every year, at this time, I am afforded the opportunity to speak to our graduating classes. It is understood that what I have to share with you should, as much as possible, be unique to you, reflect your achievements as graduates, and leave you with an idea or two which, hopefully, is worth remembering.

After twenty years of celebrating this moment, recognition of twenty unique groups, twenty wonderful years of achievements and, maybe, twenty years of ideas or messages, I have concluded that I might well have made my life simpler.

You are what you are and what you take from your experiences; what you do with your abilities and what you achieve can only be nurtured, it cannot be given.

West Island College specializes in nurturing and, in writing our objectives as a school, I have been careful to say, among other things, that you have the ultimate responsibility for learning and that, today, we are celebrating a beginning rather than an end. Your families and their love for you can only provide the nurturing which is reflected in your values, your confidence, and your opportunities. Only you can determine the outcomes. It is clear that, as a group of young people, you have shared certain advantages of family and school. As a consequence it is fair to expect that you will enjoy a head start in the many opportunities life has to offer.

I didn't discover my own uniqueness until I was a few years older than you. When I was seventeen, it was much more important to suppress my differences and practice group values, find comfort in belonging and seek collective approval. It wasn't long, however, before I discovered my own individuality and that, in itself, was exciting but not always comfortable. I also discovered that I could celebrate and admire differences in others - friends who could do things that I couldn't.

Today, I am old enough to, from time to time, receive praise for the things I have done; the creation of learning opportunities which serve or have served young people such that their lives and the lives of those with whom we share this planet shall, in some small way, be improved. People ask me if I ever reflect upon my achievements, if I ever celebrate my life's work. The answer is, and very honestly, "well no, not really, I'm too busy enjoying what I'm doing to give much thought to that. I'm too interested in making another dream come true to think about what has gone by. I love celebrating what can 'be' rather than what has been."

This is not to say that we shouldn't stop to enjoy the fruits of life's labours. It does say, however, that life's journey is far more exciting and rewarding than life's end . . . and, of course, each of our journeys is unique.

Sir Francis Chichester, nearing what most of us would consider the later years of life, struck out in an 18 meter ketch to sail, single-handedly around the world. This may not be your dream, nor, necessarily would it be mine, but his response to those celebrating his accomplishment was, - "the thrill is in the journey and the hardship, not in tying up at the dock."

I would like to speak for a moment about dreams and vision. The most successful of those whom we meet in life have learned, and I underscore learned, to dream and then to do, to see opportunity when those around them see failure, to rise when others fall. Life consists of only 10% of what happens to us and 90% of how we respond to those circumstances. When I was in high school and university, I was active in a number of activities including sports, politics, writing and acting. Long after I played in George Bernard Shaw's *Pygmalion* and *School for Scandal*, I discovered something he had written which explained, I believe, why I enjoyed him so much:

"People are always blaming their circumstances for what they are. I don't believe in circumstances. The people who get on in this world are the people who get up and look for the circumstances they want and if they can't find them - make them!"

Well, my young friends, get on with celebrating the journey, celebrate your beginnings, dream whatever you dare to dream but dream and do. Look to make your own circumstances and cherish the moment. Don't wait to celebrate arrival at a destination, get the most out of the journey. Yours is unique.

You can see now why I have concluded that, after twenty years, this message is unique no matter what I say because it is, after all, whatever it is to you, whatever it is you do with it. It is your experience to keep.

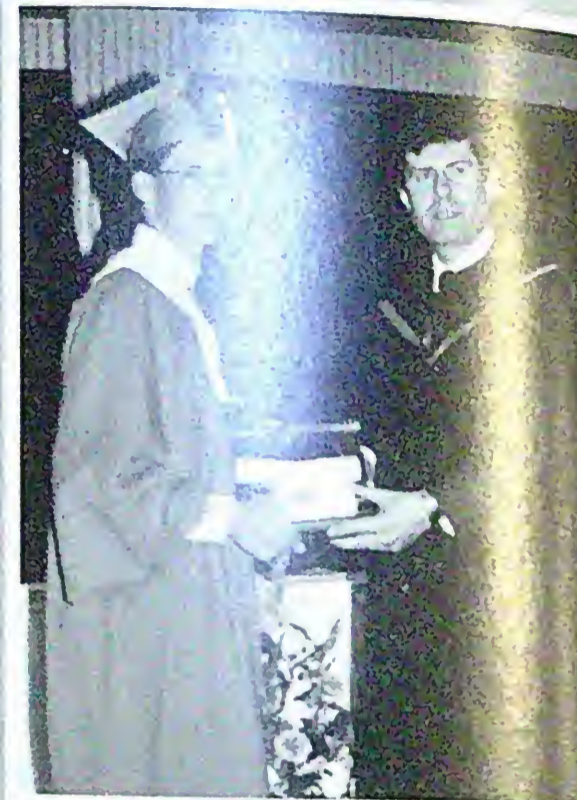

HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS

Excerpts from the 1993 Graduation Address by Perry Bedard



... More seriously, I want to talk about time. All of you know that a year is determined by the time it takes for the earth to travel in an elliptical path around the sun. Each of you recognize how much we are affected by the increments we have chosen that divide the earth's journey. The seasons, months, weeks and days regulate our activities. Probably every one of us here this evening is wearing a time device that gives an accurate read out of the hours, minutes and seconds that make up our lives. In physics there is a strongly pronounced emphasis on the accuracy of time.

My thoughts, though, are not about this precise physical breakdown of time into tiny packages. I would like to talk about a different clock, one that is perhaps, for us tonight, a more significant measure. To give it a name - something I might expect you to know for an exam - let's call it cultural time. Cultural time is different for everyone and it affects different people in different ways. Let me explain. When you were born your cultural time began and your clock struck one. But at the same time, the clock gauging your parents' cultural time struck a different number. Ignoring your first steps and your first words, a more important event occurred, you became toilet trained. Your time may not have been affected - but your parents certainly celebrated that moment and moved their clock ahead one notch. First day at school, last day at school, today. - All of these are important gradations or moments in cultural time.

I certainly can't prove it, but I believe that these cultural moments take on greater significance for us when we share them with others who are important to us. Out there in our audience, there are proud parents - their cultural clock has just moved ahead by another stroke. There are also proud grandparents watching. Their clock has progressed, by two strokes, one for you, and one for their children.

... Six years ago - using a universal clock, not a cultural clock, I joined a group of you on your first experiential trip. I am sure you recall Camp Chief Hector and our day hike up Mount Baldy. For that hike, Miss Morin took the lead and I, likely because I was the oldest, and least fit, took the rear. As is always the case in these trips, a cluster of you moved ahead and a cluster gathered behind. I have never been certain if you stayed behind to give me the chance to keep up or were you as tired as I was? We came to a point on the trail where a new fire road had been constructed in such a way that there was no clear path to follow. We agreed to rest for a while before looking for the trail and just as we were about to get started, one of you having already surveyed the area shouted out "Follow me, I know the way". That moment has been lingering about in my memory and surfaced again last weekend when I made these notes.

What powerful words!! Follow me, I know the way. *Suivez-moi, je connais le chemin.*
Terry Fox didn't say these words, but his courage and determination called out to all of us: "Follow me, I know the way" *"Suivez-moi, je connais le chemin"*.

Roberta Bondar didn't use this expression, but her example to all the young women of Canada echoed from far off in space: "Follow me, I know the way". *"Suivez-moi, je connais le chemin."*

All of us gathered here to pay tribute to you tonight believe your future has no boundaries. I'm sure she'd join me in offering these challenging words of encouragement to you this evening. As you move on from the classrooms and hallways of West Island College we hope that one day, you, will look back to those of us gathered here this evening and say: "Follow me, I know the way."

BOARD OF GOVERNORS' ADDRESS

Excerpts from WIC Grad 1993 Chairperson Speech by Zina Rosso Barniech

It was twenty years ago today, Sgt. Peppers' Band began to play. They've been going in and out of style, but they're guaranteed to raise a smile. And, ... It was thirty years ago today, I began to graduate.

I've gone through an awful lot and I'm here with you to share some thoughts. Before the Beatles' Sgt. Peppers' record album came out I graduated from high school, St. Ann's Academy, Victoria, B.C., in 1963. As an aside, Prime Minister Kim Campbell also attended my alma mater, St. Ann's Academy. I wish I could tell you I taught her everything she knows. Who knows ... there may be a future Kim Campbell or Pierre Trudeau in the WIC graduating class of 1993. We're keeping our eyes on you.

My class of '63 is celebrating a 30 year reunion this year. Our class doesn't let special occasions like this go by without celebrating ourselves as individuals, and as a community with the same educational roots. We've kept many close friendships within that class. We've seen each other grow, work, change careers, marry, raise families, in sickness and in health and, yes, I feel 'til death do us part. The bonds formed during those school years are strong and caring. And I've come to value that common history, that common experience which we reflect upon and laugh about - a lot of laughing about. You may share a few laughs with old friends in the future about your WIC days. Perhaps you'll remember West Island College's Rugby Team and it's now famous string of victories.

One of my Victoria classmates lives here in Calgary and we've done some professional work together. It's a small world, nurture your relationships. I hope you, the Grade 12 class of '93 will keep a strong and caring relationship which you can celebrate 30 years from now. I'd like to be a fly on the wall at that one.

Graduation is one of those significant major transitions. It marks a transition from a high school environment protected from that "boiling and boisterous part of life" (as John Locke said) to a new place of study or work for the next while. This is a vital and opportune time which can be a source of creativity that we all long for in our lives. I'm happy to celebrate this graduation, this ritual passage, this transition with you.

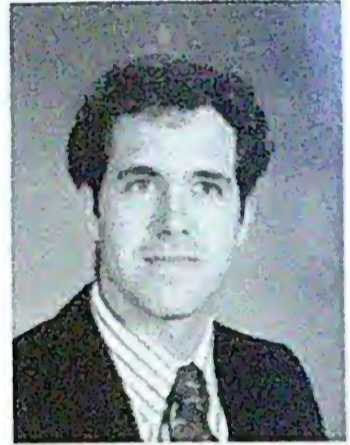
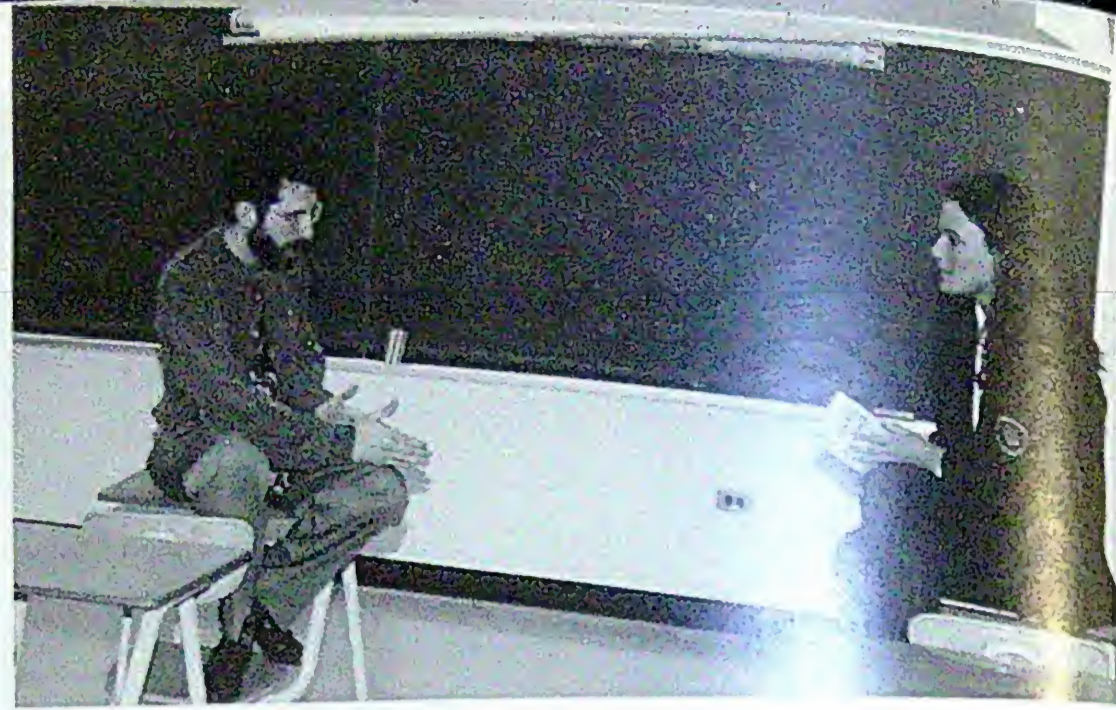
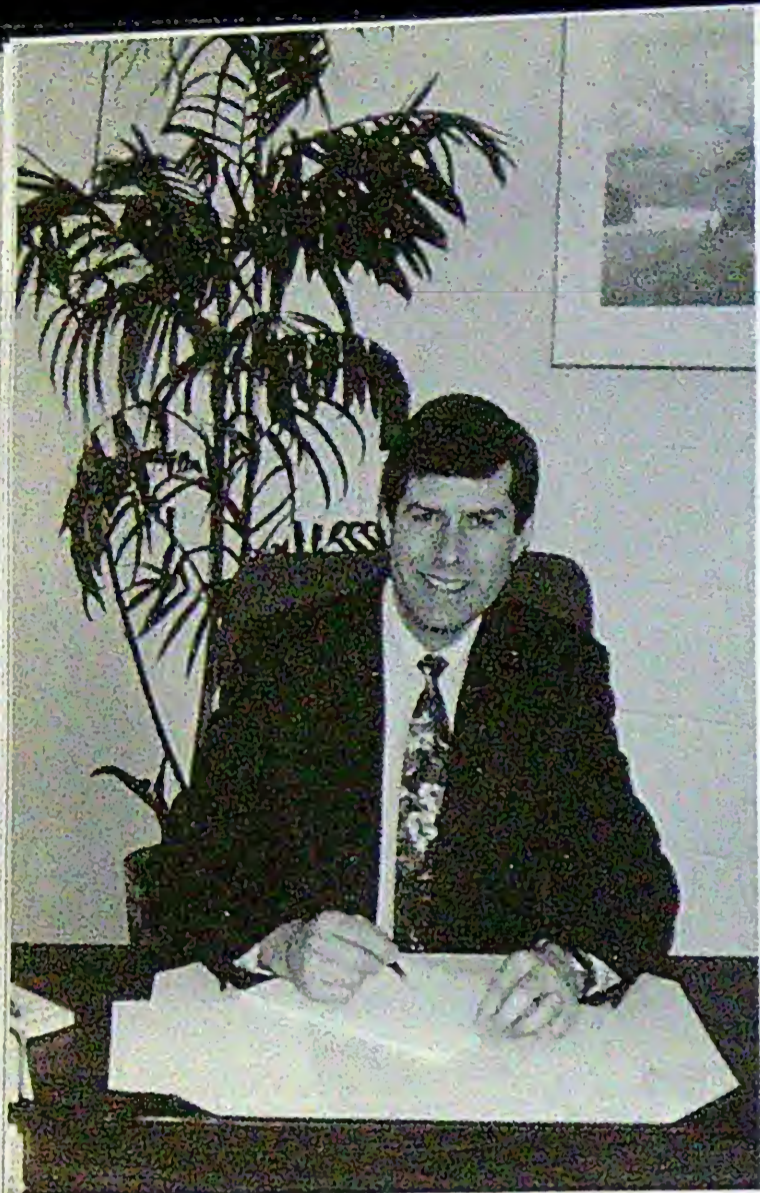
First, as you relate to yourself, your old high school self-image can now be challenged and enhanced positively in a new environment. This can be a time for self-renewal. Secondly, as you relate to others and the community, it is a chance to look at things with new eyes and to see possibilities that were invisible before. Thirdly, this transition is part of a lifelong developmental pattern. That is, in letting go of an outlived world and discovering a new one, you will grow. Each reality each sense of self, can be a little more complex and more fully developed than the last.

As you begin to explore new territory inwardly and outwardly, don't be harranged by old negative inner voices. Rather learn to develop your *positive* inner voice so that you have the courage to be open and to learn to live your new life with strength and integrity. There are no easy magic formulas in your new world; the old values of being true to yourself, passionate commitment, and consistent work are the qualities that make for success in any endeavor. I remember the old saying 10% inspiration and 90% perspiration.

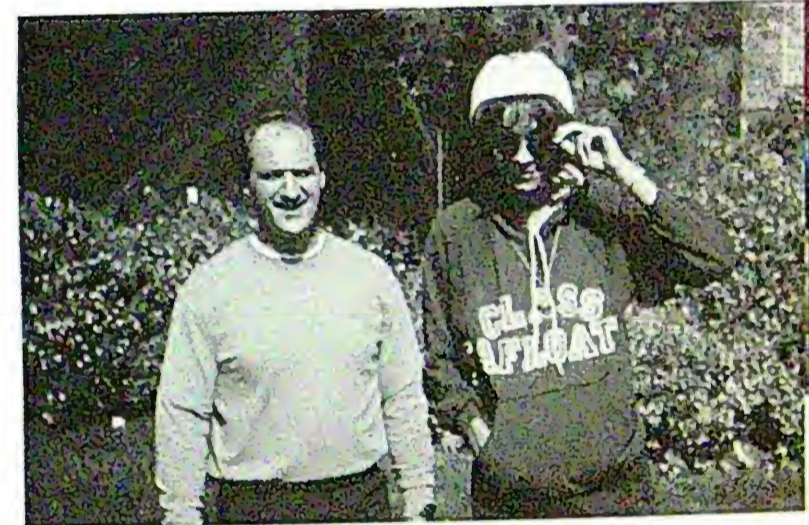
... And give yourself a break be kind to yourself because new territory means that you have to make mistakes while you're learning. You will meet many people on your journey. Thousands of students who are graduating in Calgary, all over Canada and abroad will be going through a similar process. Keep an eye out for them. They need your support just as you need theirs. I hope that from this you develop a deep appreciation of your past and of your future potential.

As chairperson of the West Island College Board of Governors it is a sincere pleasure to congratulate each member of the graduating class of 1993 on this most special day. And I'll sneak a special wish for my son, Dean, who helped me with my speech as did my daughters, Lianne and Nadia. I also feel a bond to many of you in Grade Twelve as I've watched you growing from bright kindergarten children running around playgrounds to beautiful young people running around in cars. With pride and joy, on behalf of all WIC parents and the board here I give warm wishes to all our sons and daughters.

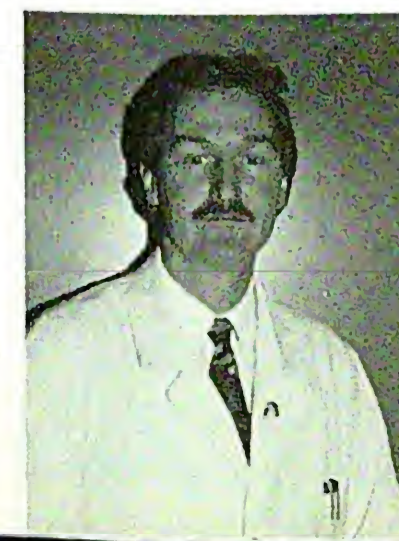
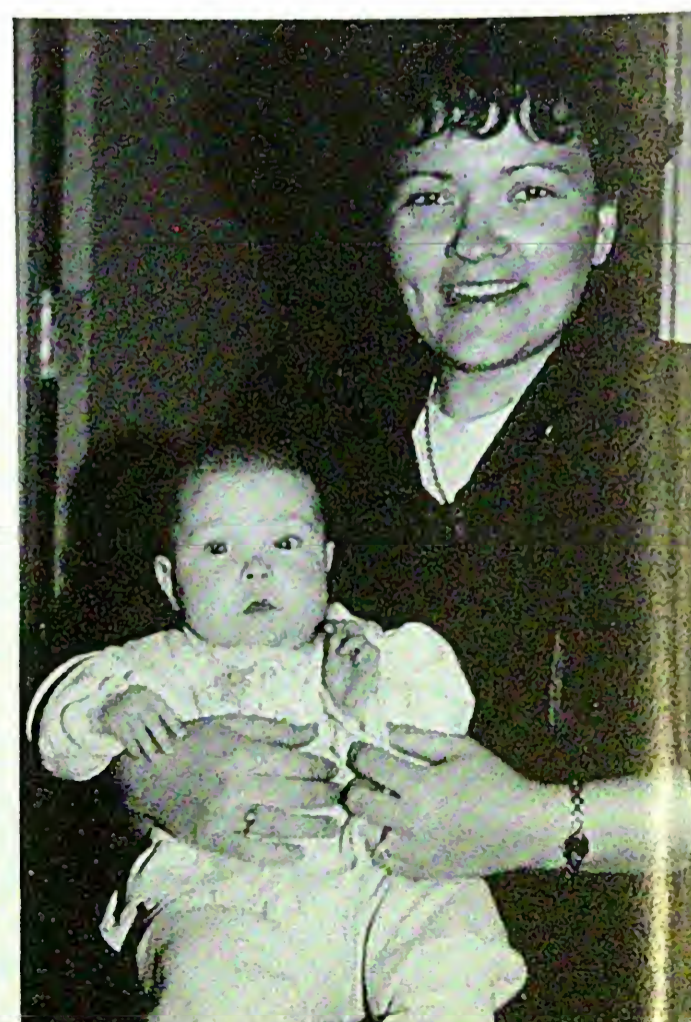




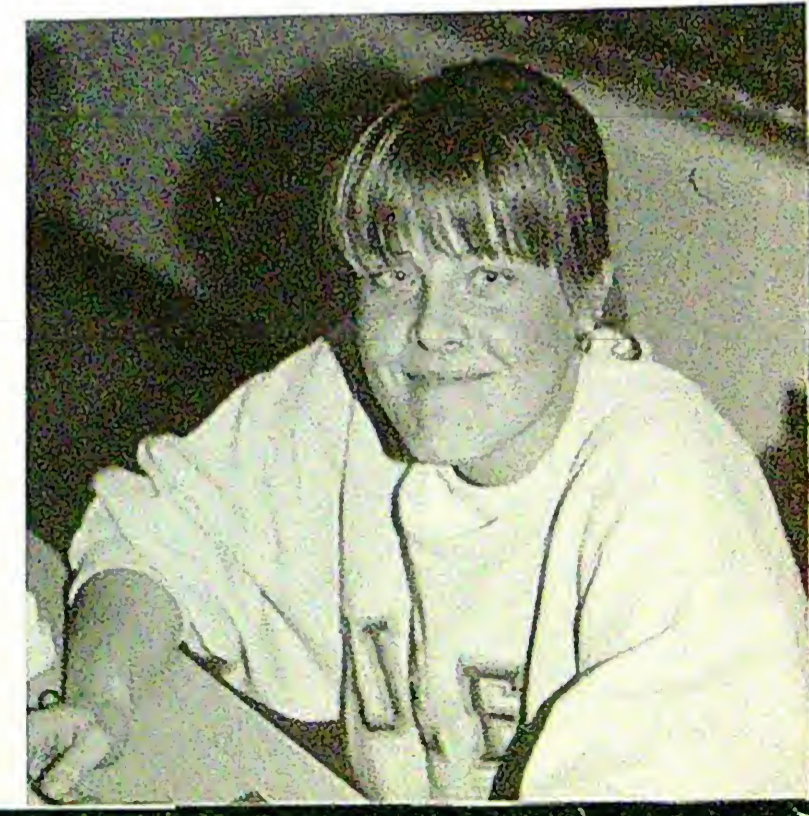

ACADEMICS - THE FIRST PRIORITY

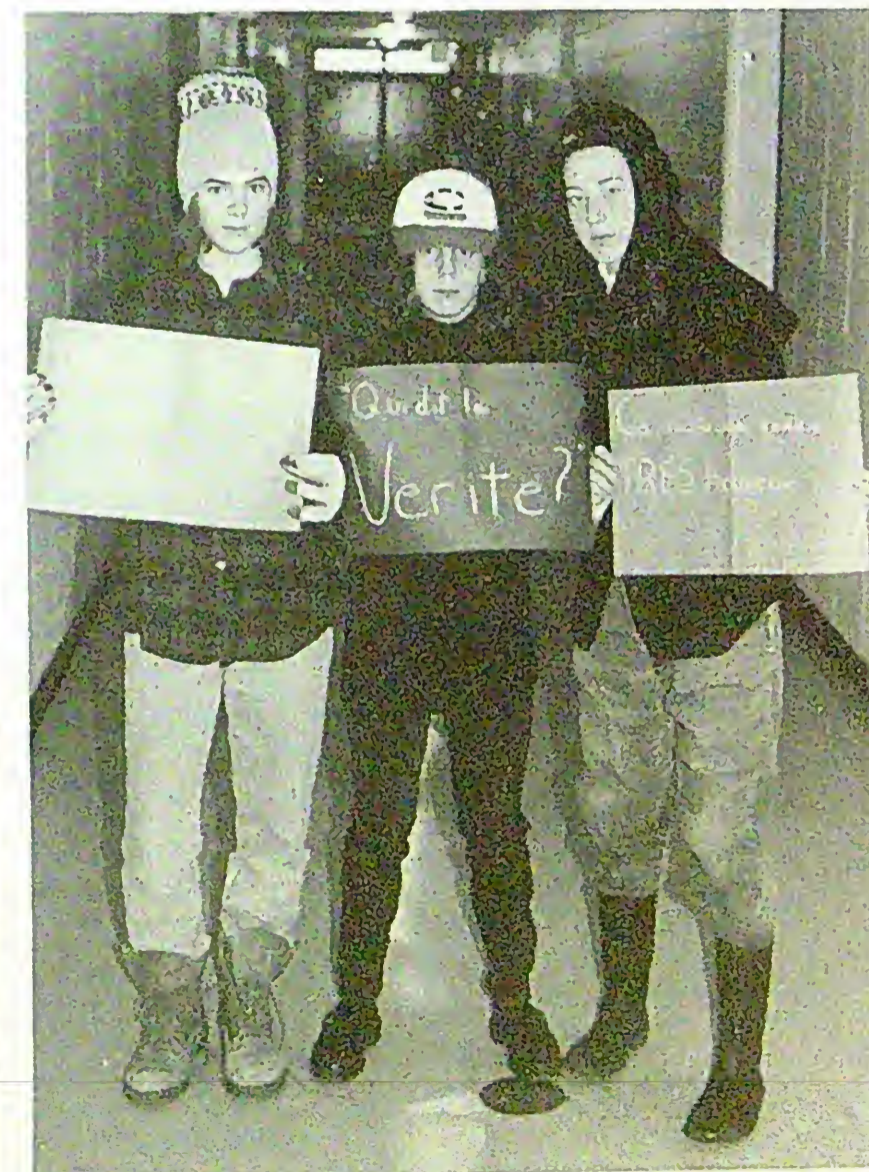

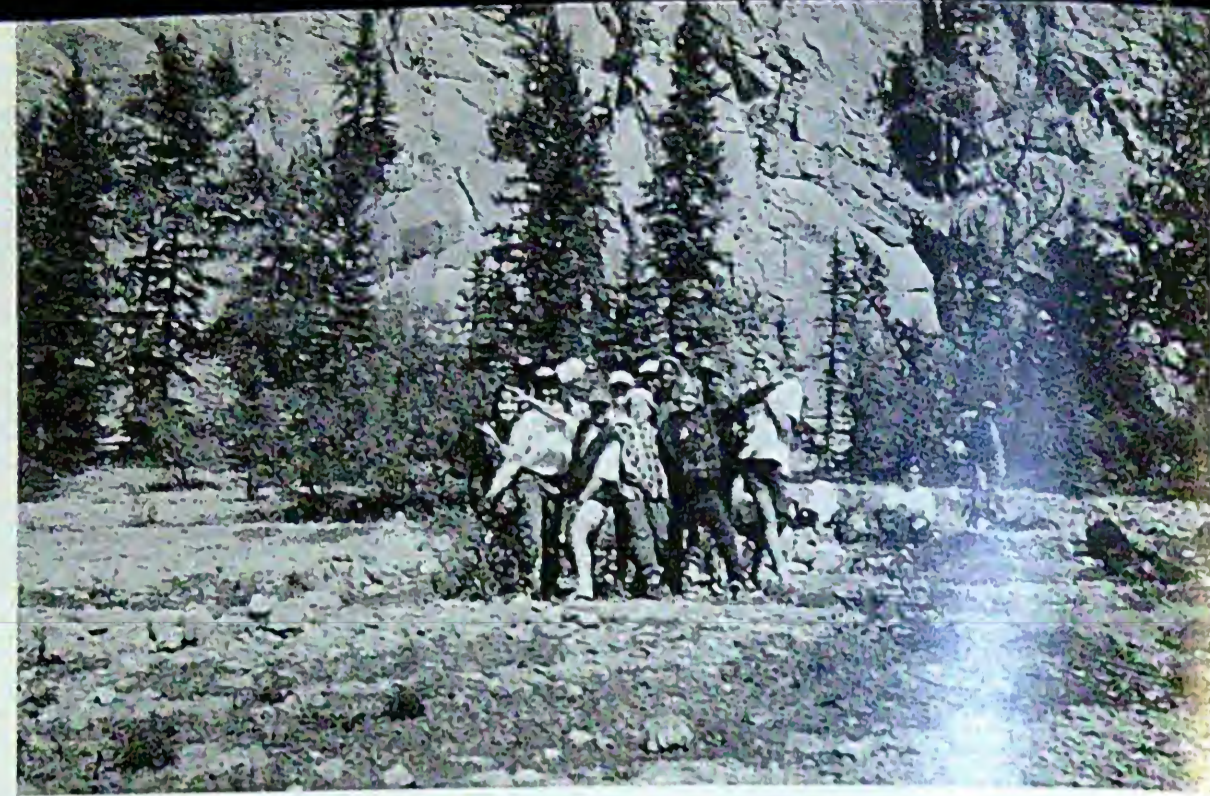




ACTIVITIES - SECOND TO NONE

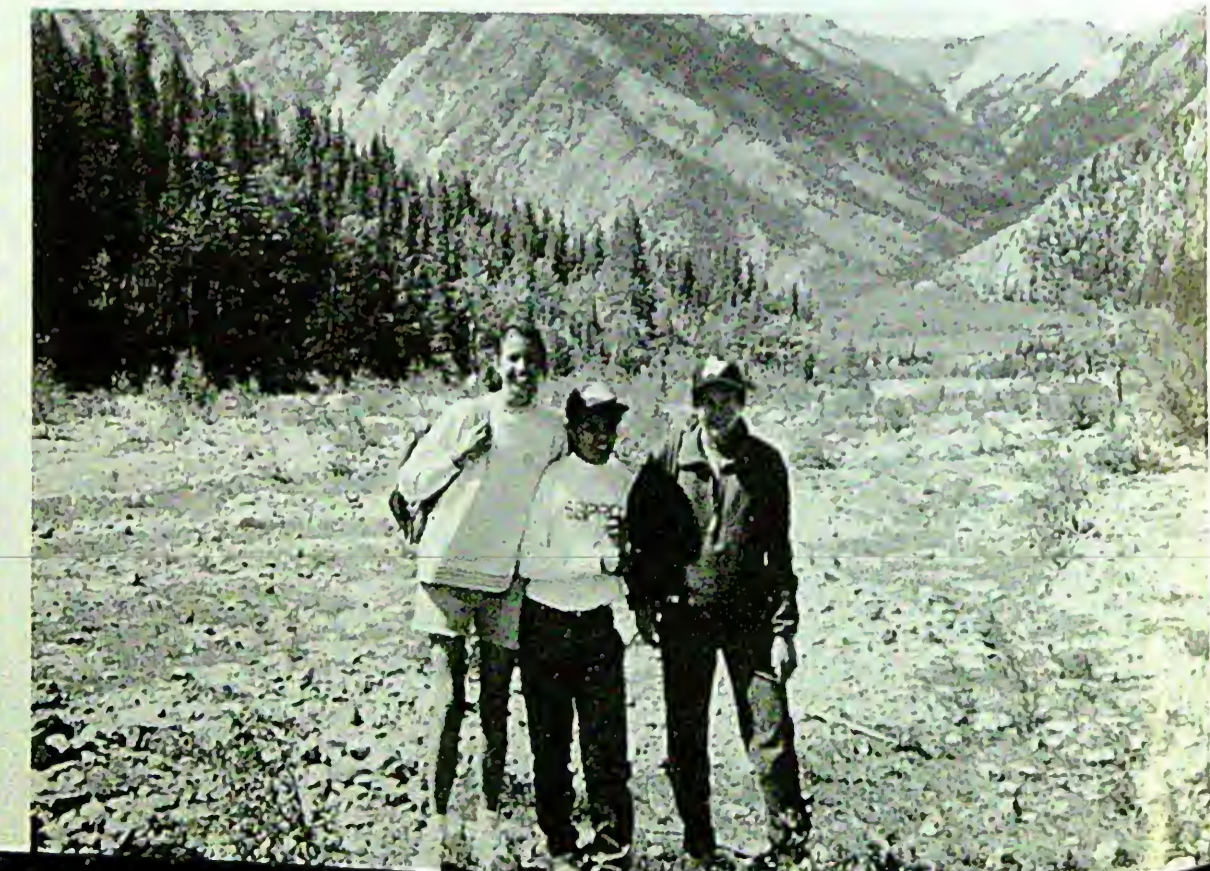
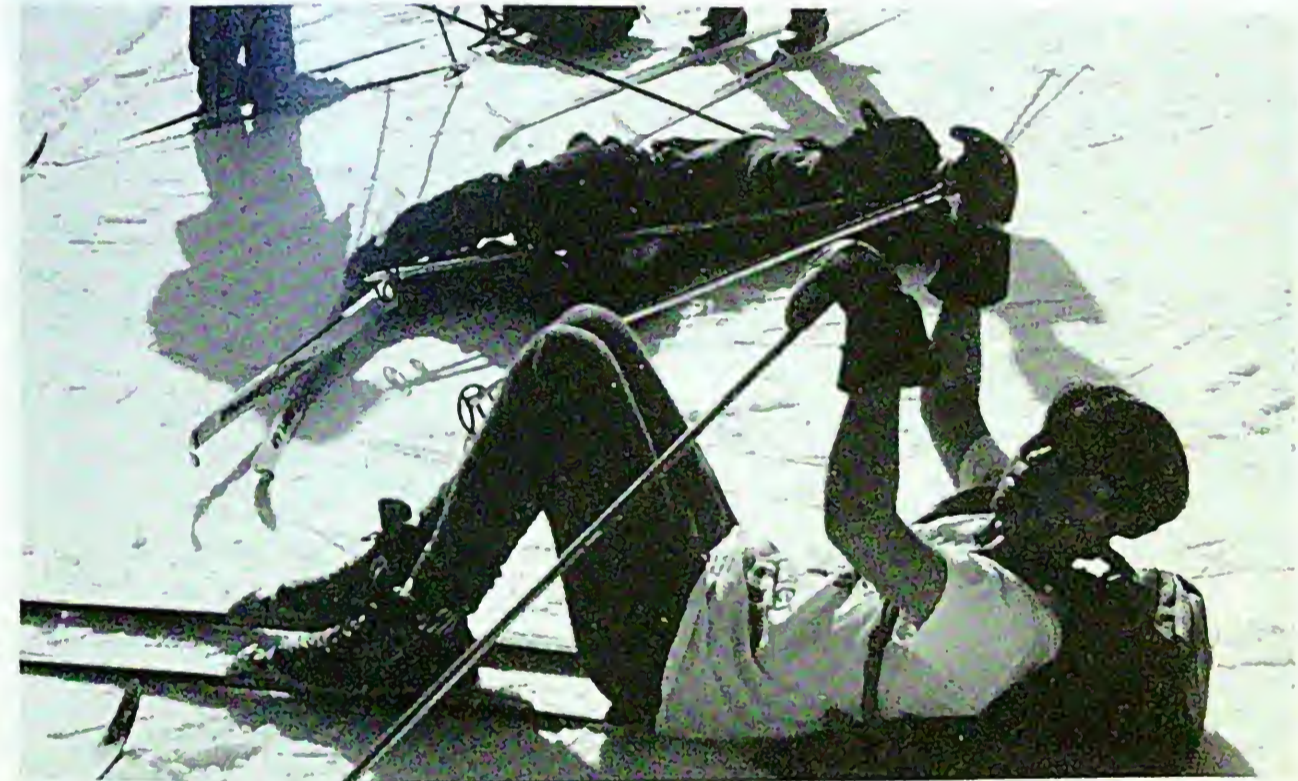
EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION AND CLASS PHOTOS:

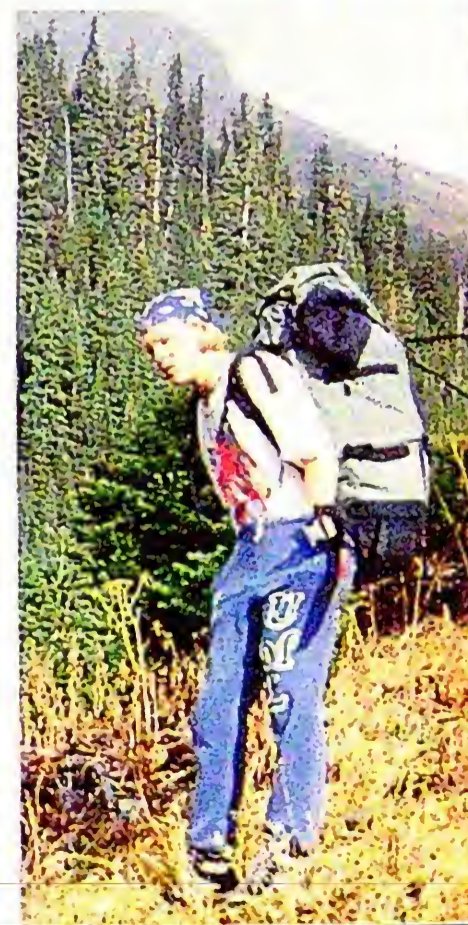
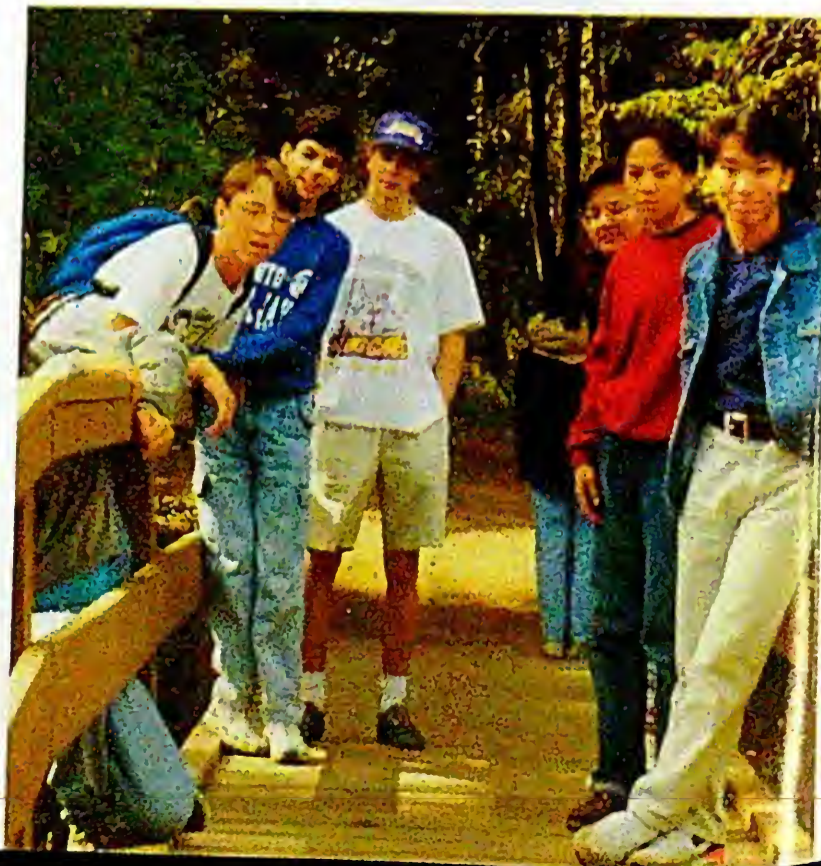
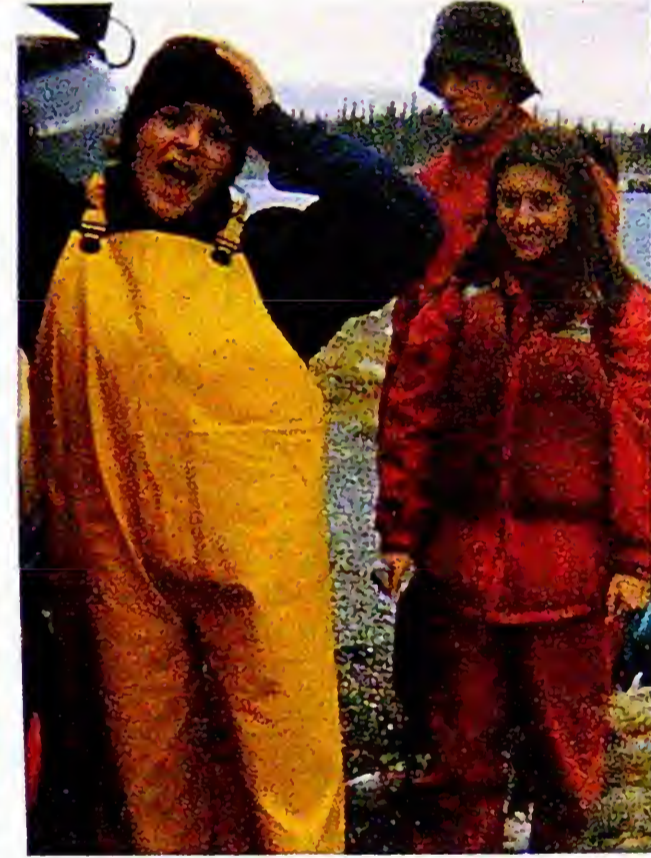
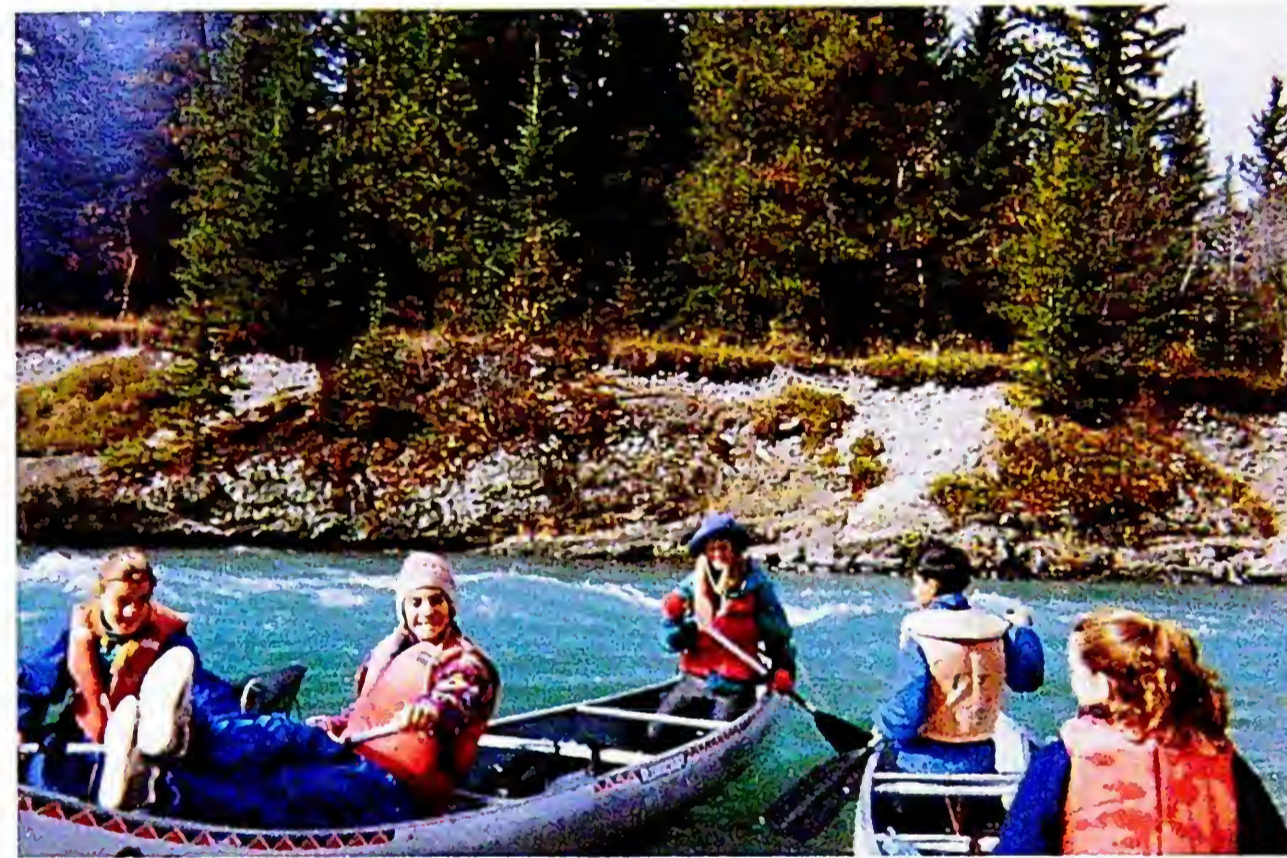




VIEWPOINT:

Senior Experiential Education

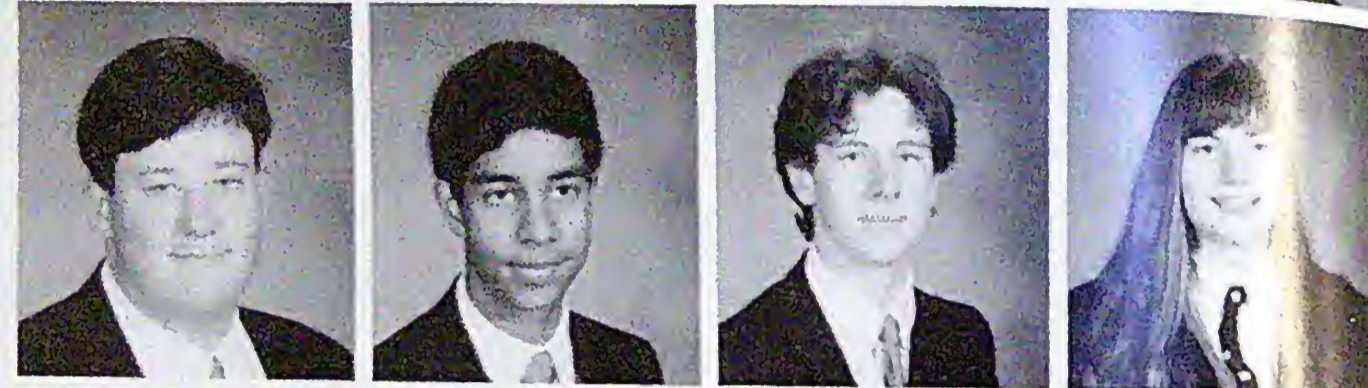

From the Seniors

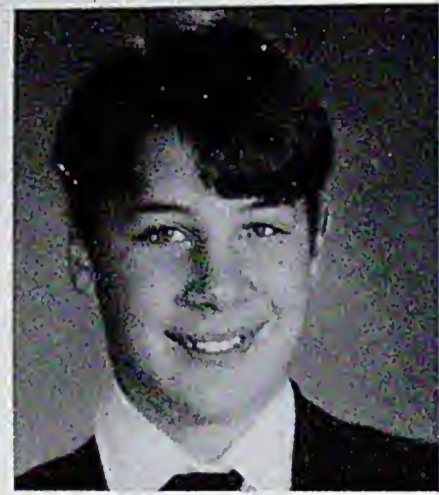

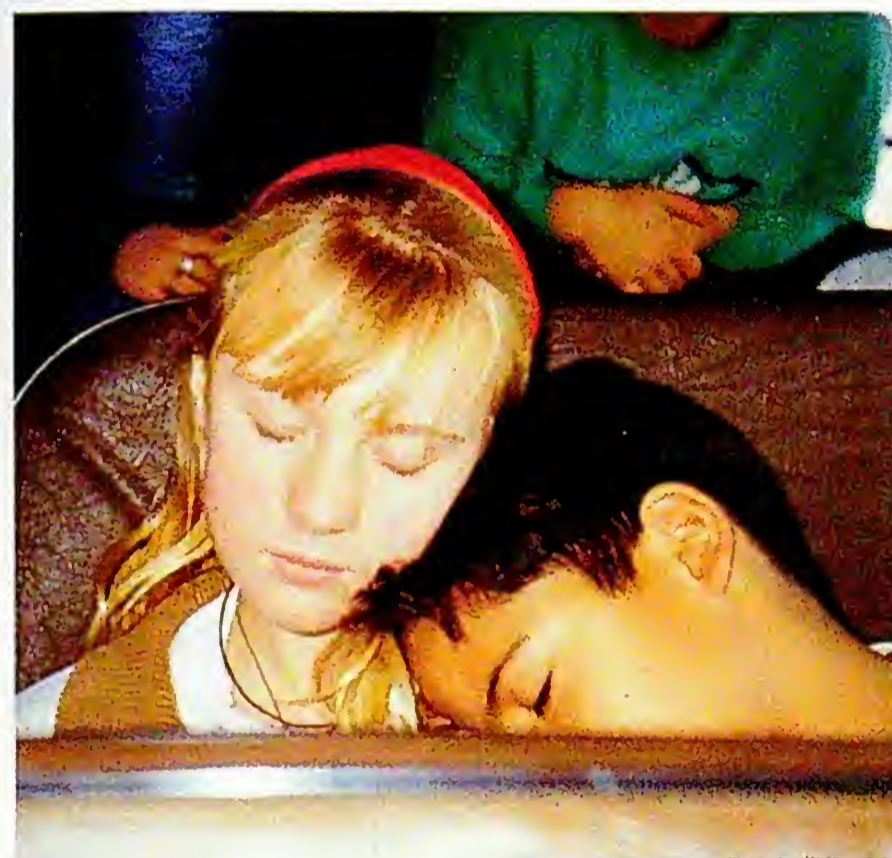
VIEWPOINT:

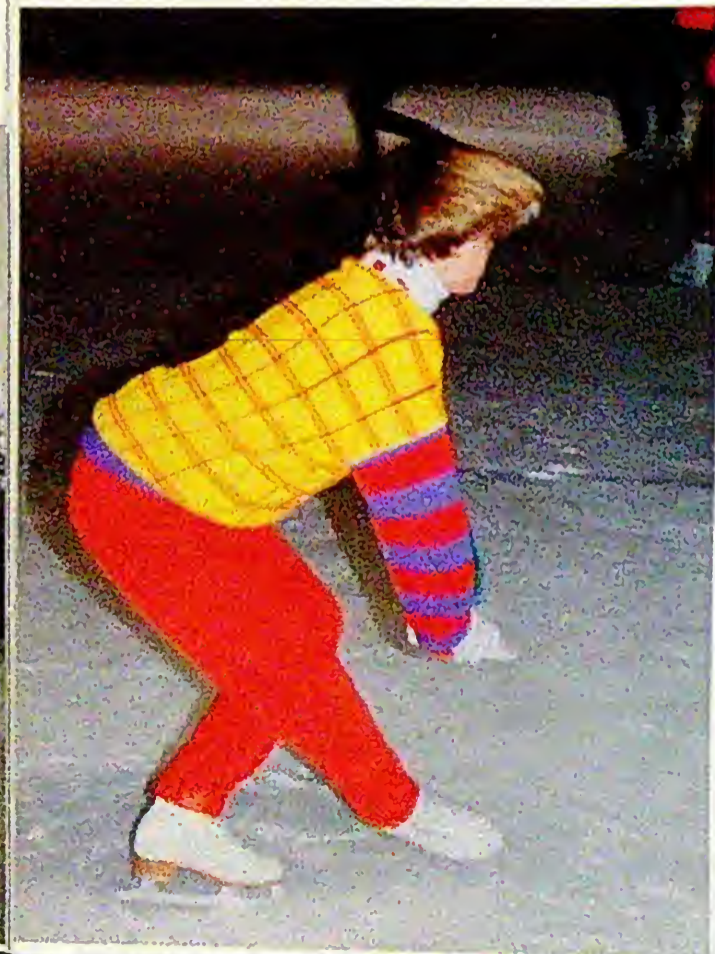
Surprisingly though, we did manage to get our lives together (sort of anyway). The cliques and couples had formed and disintegrated as does so much in life . . .



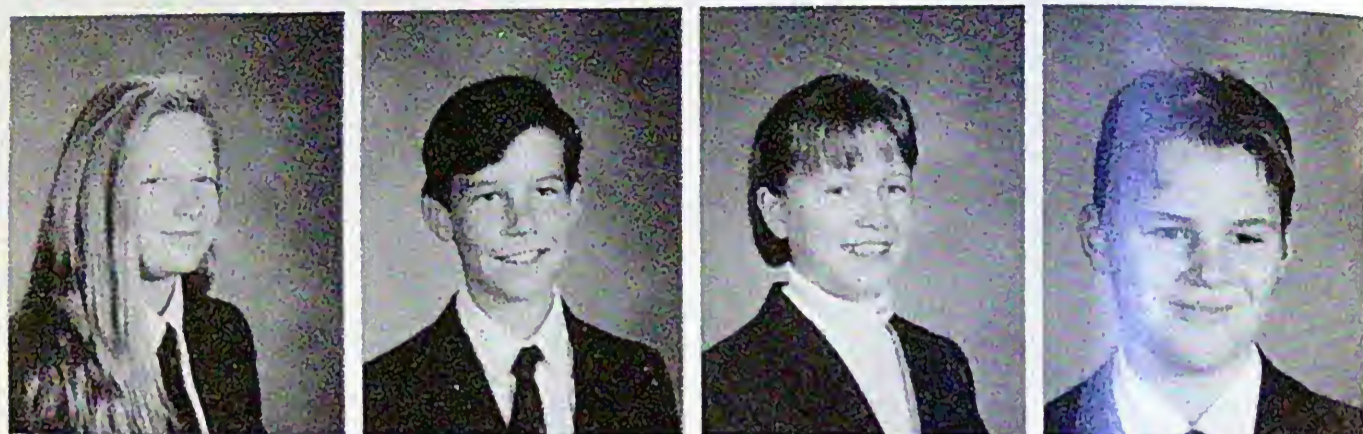
EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION:

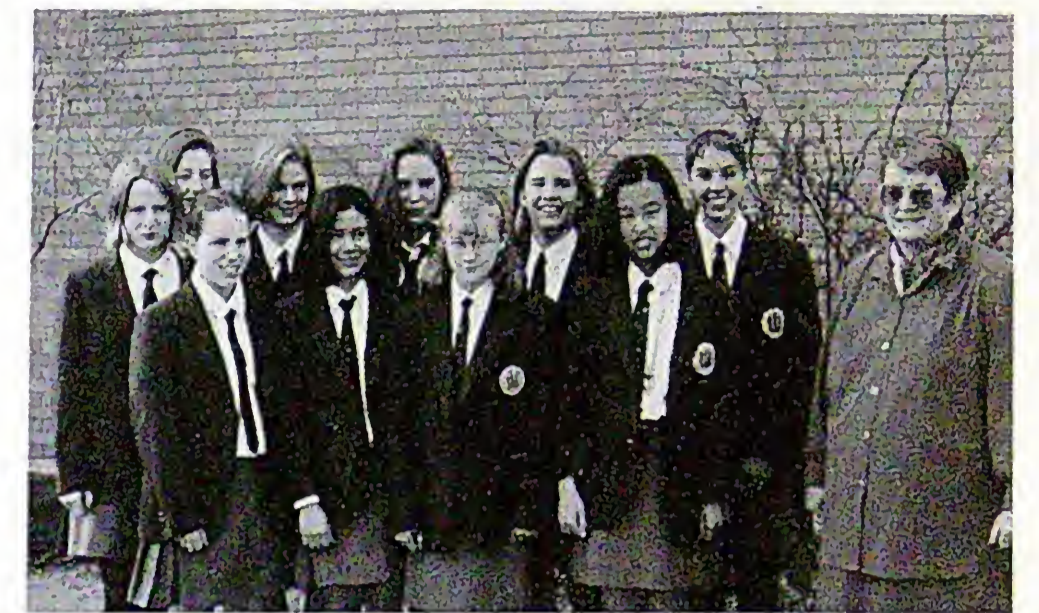
... We can all agree that our growth to maturity came to a climax in our final days ... congregated around one single chess board discussing each move.

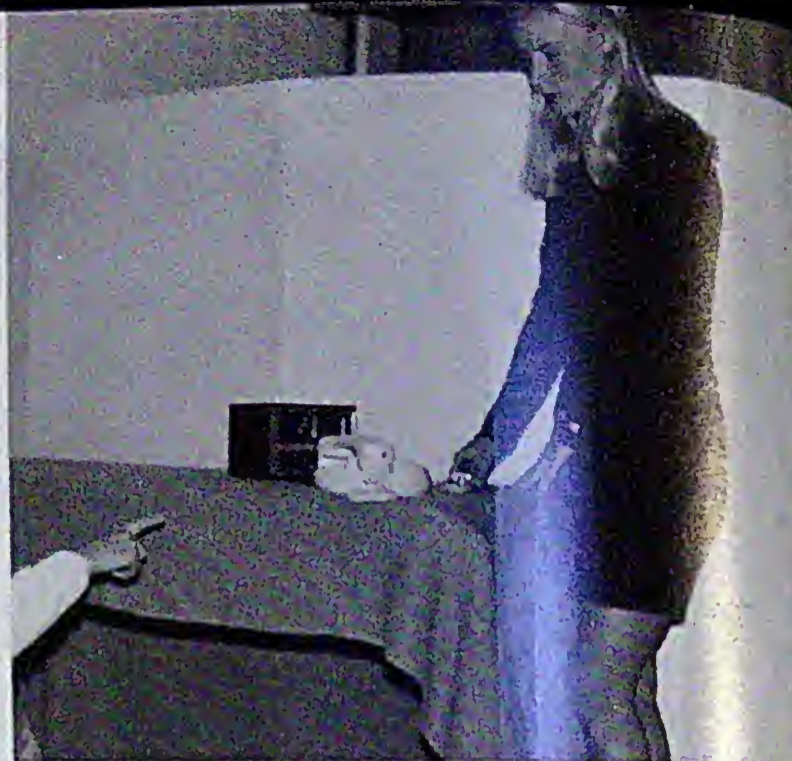
THE PACIFIC RIM - LIVE!

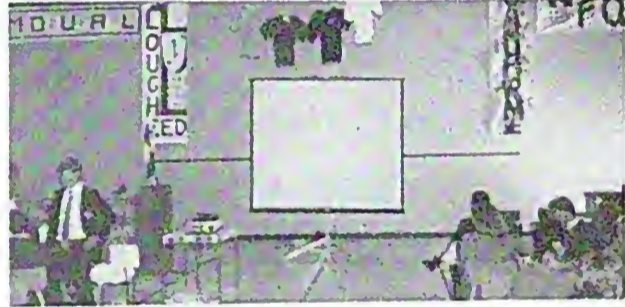
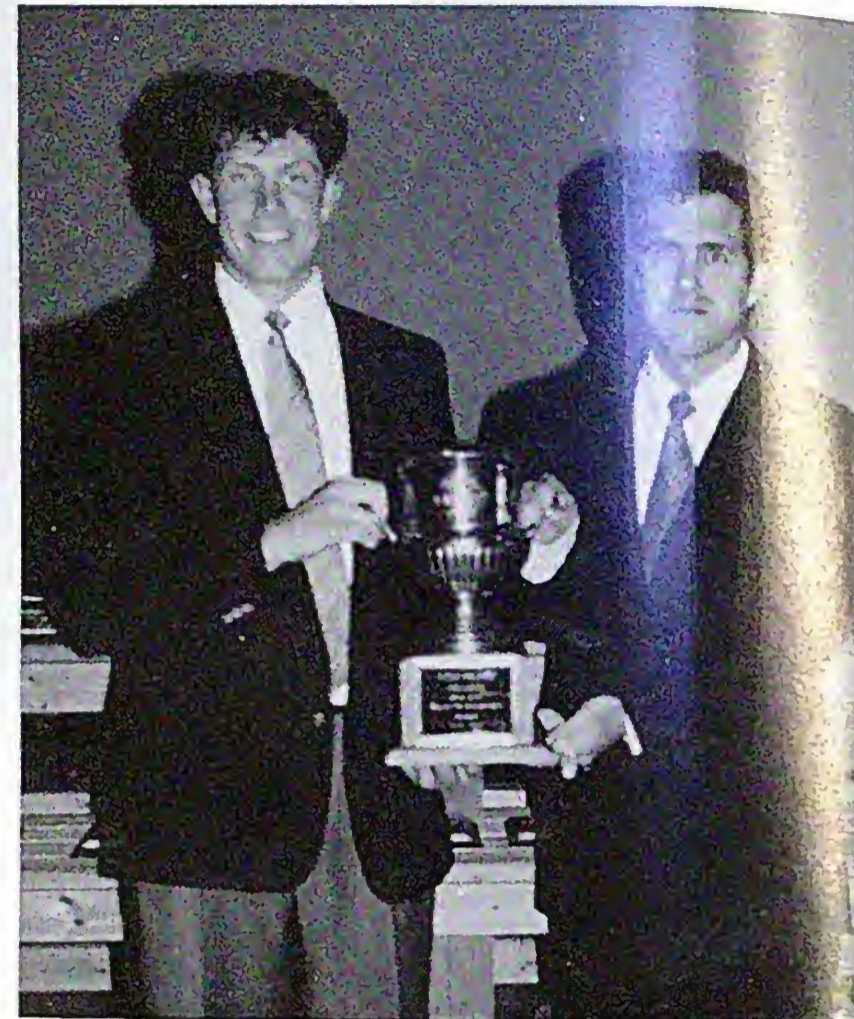
WEST ISLAND COLLEGE ATHLETIC AWARDS

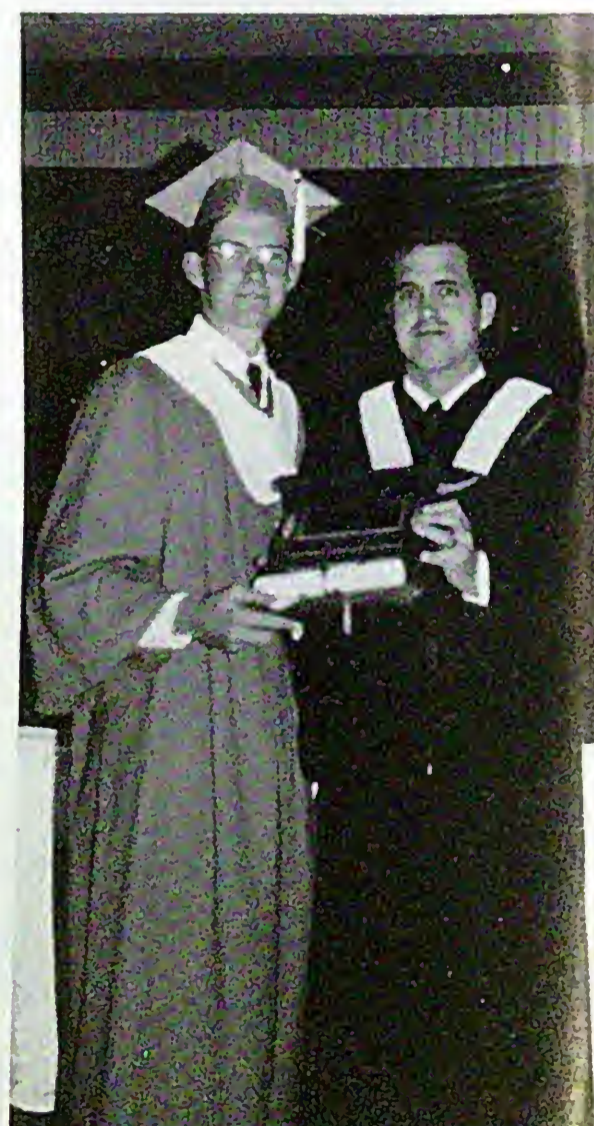

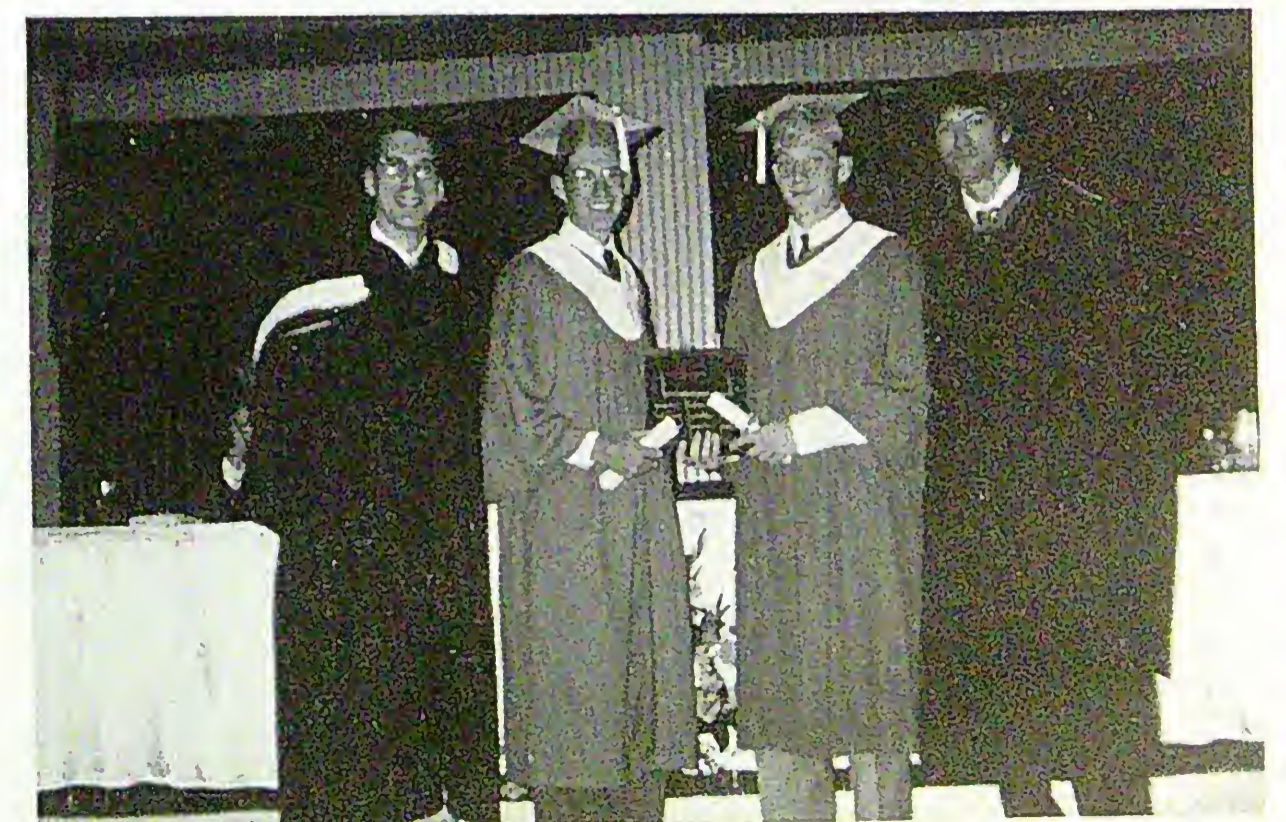
WEST ISLAND COLLEGE GRADUATION AWARDS

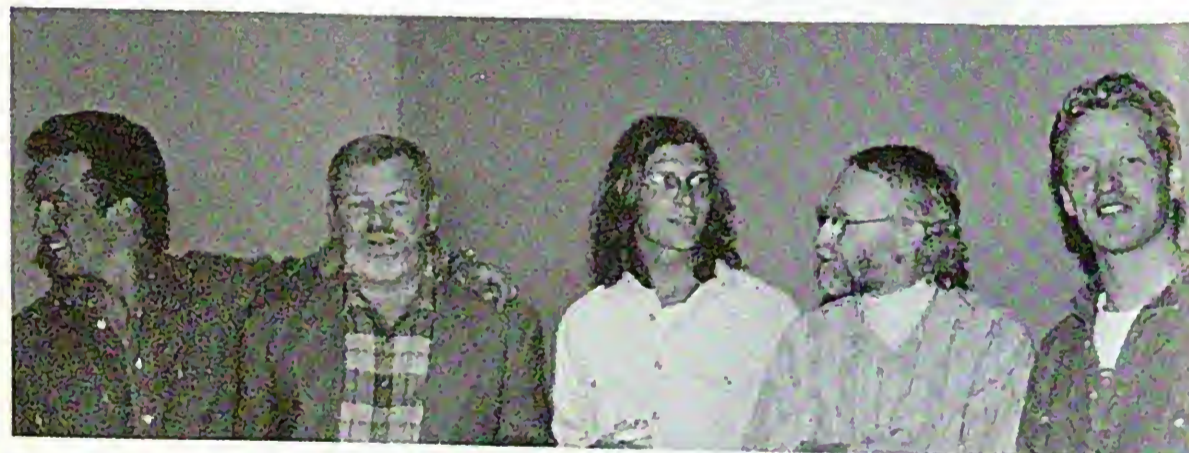

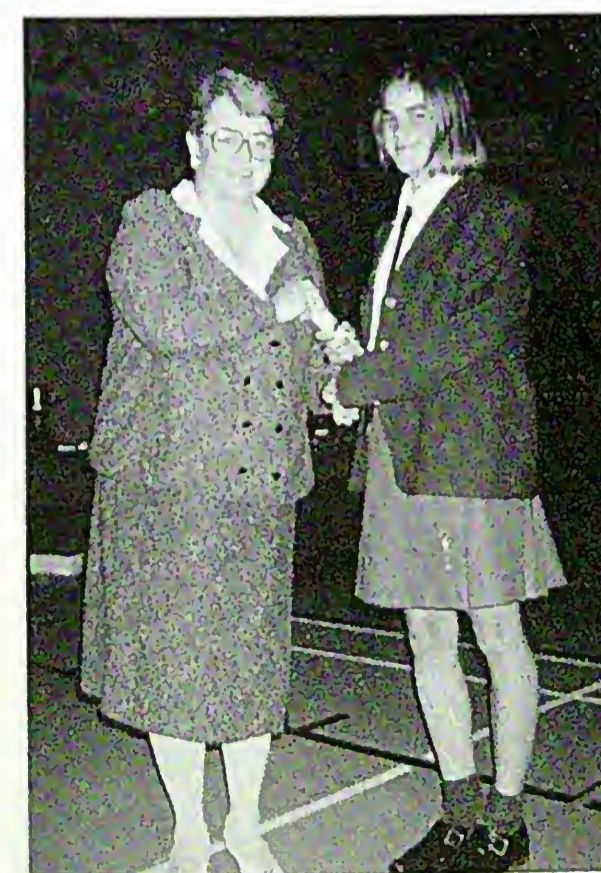


UNDERGRADUATE AWARDS EVENING

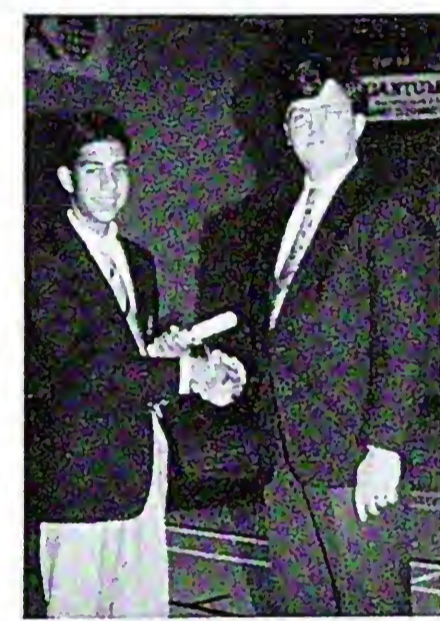
