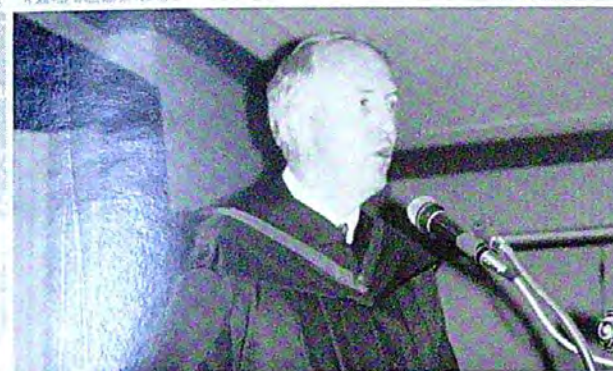

Director-General's Address 1996

If West Island College has provided you with anything, it has been the opportunity to prove that you alone can make a difference. We are convinced that your experience with us has forced you to stretch yourselves to new limits and to discover and use your God given abilities. We are convinced that the experience which you have shared with each other has taught you that you, alone, are responsible for your learning and your personal growth. You have been a part of an educational experience which, because of its uniqueness, has produced unique young leaders, whose contributions to their society will be seen, heard and felt by those who have the good fortune to be members of that society.

This year, I had the privilege of meeting and spending a few days with one of the most remarkable persons I have met in my life. As I grow older, it is amazing to me how clear it is that there is just so much more to learn. Dr. Jane Goodall went to the shores of Lake Tanganyika, in Western Tanzania, in 1960. She is credited, amongst other things, with having undertaken one of science's most successful long range studies. Her work with the Gombe Stream chimpanzees and in other sanctuaries is legendary. Sitting with a scientist of such incredible renown is humbling to say the least. I'm sure that I didn't ask all of the questions that I might otherwise have been inclined to. Jane Goodall is a magical, magical, magical person. She made me feel at ease immediately; we moved easily from topic to topic and issue to issue. The key, for me, was to ask the best questions I could ask and be the best listener I could possibly be. And Jane made it easy. She is warm, she is funny, she is direct and she is simple.

The closeness of West Island College's philosophy and Jane Goodall's philosophy is remarkable. If you were to ask Jane what is most important in life, I believe that she would answer something like: "Only when you understand something, can you care about something. And only if you care about something, will you do something for, with, or about that something". Jane Goodall says: "Understand, engage and act". This school wants nothing more for its graduates. It has been our responsibility to help you understand whatever experience, concept or activity you have undertaken. It has been the responsibility of the school to teach and your responsibility to learn. The product of that process is, really, "understanding". The school is also saying: "Now that you understand, you must begin to care. Programs such as Outreach, Civics, Moral Education, Extra Curricular Activities and Physical Education don't always generate the respect that is their due. And that's probably because they require you to care and they require you to engage, and they require you to act. It's what Jane Goodall would have you do, it's what West Island College would have you do.

In this school you have been prepared to forge new beginnings. Doing what you want to do will make you happy and if you are happy you are likely to find success. So chart a course for yourself, pursue it with gusto, reach for stars, bring passion into your life. Dream, dare and do. I wish you every success possible.

The following story provides a meaningful lesson about life. Three youths came before a master named Halcolm to ask how they might further increase their knowledge and wisdom. Halcolm sensed that they lacked experience in the real world, but he wanted to have them make the transition from the seclusion of their studies to the outside world in stages.

During the first stage he sent them forth under a six-month vow of silence. During those six months they wore the identifying garments of the muted truth-seekers so that people would know they were forbidden to speak. Each day, according to their instructions, they sat at the market in whatever village they entered, watching but never speaking. After six months in this fashion they returned to Halcolm.

"So" Halcolm began, "you have returned to us from your journey. Your period of silence is over. Your transition to the world beyond our walls of study has begun. What have you learned on this your first journey?"

The first youth answered, "In every village the patterns are the same. People come to the market. They buy the goods they need, talk with friends, and leave. I have learned that all markets are alike and the people in markets always the same. I have learned that all things are ultimately the same from place to place."

Then the second youth reported, "I too watched the people come and go in the markets. I have learned that all life is coming and going, people forever moving to and fro in search of food and basic material things. I understand now the simplicity of human life."

Halcolm looked at the third youth: "And what do you have to tell us?"

"I saw the same markets and the same people as my fellow-travelers, yet I know not what they know. My mind is filled with questions. I kept wondering where the people came from and where they went. I pondered what they might be thinking and feeling as they came and went. I reflected on how they happened to be at this market on this day, who they left behind, and who came with them. I wondered how today was the same or different for them. I have failed, master, for I am filled with questions rather than answers, questions for the people I saw. I do not know what I have learned."

Halcolm smiled: "You have learned most of all. You have learned the value of being able to ask questions. You have learned the importance of finding out what people have to say. You are ready now to return to the world, this time without the vow of silence."

"Go forth now. Go forth and question. Ask and listen. The world is just beginning to open up to you. Each person you can question can take you into a new part of the world. For the person who is willing to ask and listen the world will always be new. The skilled questioner and attentive listener knows how to enter into another's experience."

I extend to each of you my heartfelt wishes for health and happiness along the way. We have been agents of change for each other and none of us will, ever again, be what we were. We are all better for the experience of having been a part of each other's lives. We understand, we care and we will act.

Headmaster's Address

This year has been an interesting and fulfilling one for all of us at the College. All facets of school life have seen improvement and, consequently, we have all been winners.

The College fielded teams in six sports this year. League Championships were won in Junior and Senior Girls' Basketball, Junior Boys' Basketball and Senior Boys' Seven-A-side Rugby. In addition our Senior Girls' Badminton Doubles team made it to the Provincials and athletes made it to the City Finals in Track. One must consider that this all comes from a school population of 230 students and is, therefore, all the more remarkable. Another pleasing element of the athletic program was the level of participation in intramural sports. Fifty percent of all students took part in intramurals - a truly significant statistic.

Student leadership also took a leap forward this year. The inclusion of student elected leaders in the Prefect Board, the spreading of leadership to the Junior grades and the increased profile and mandate of student leadership roles were all successful forays into the realm of leadership density. Students began to recognize that control of one's life is the key to happiness, but that responsible behaviour is the key to control. We are not there yet, as a group, but this year progress was certainly made. We must continue to provide students with leadership opportunities and must help them to assume the responsibility which accompanies the role of leader.

The core of our school is its academic program. This year we introduced Advanced Placement programming, new Outreach and Co-op Programmes and some new Senior High School options. I believe we have improved our school as a consequence and look forward to doing even more next year. Plans for a music program are unfolding, as is the expansion of our Advanced Placement offerings. Psychology and Spanish continue the growth of senior options and enrichment in Junior Science and Mathematics will allow us to meet the needs of more of our students. Progress dictates that, as we look ahead, we must also look back. I am proud of where we have come from; I am excited about where we are heading.

I would like to thank everyone for contributing to our mission. To the parents I extend my gratitude for your support; to the students my appreciation for your co-operation and hard work; to the staff my acknowledgement of their professionalism and steadfast loyalty and to my colleagues, Darren and Tina, my sincere thanks for your humour and magnificent collaboration.



Board of Governors' Address

Speech to West Island College Graduating Class,
June 14, 1996

Good evening ladies and gentlemen, honoured graduands. It is a great pleasure for me to be here this evening for a number of reasons. The first is to represent the Board of Governors in paying tribute to the graduating class of 1996 and to recognize all your hard work and achievements. The second is to re-confirm the Board's commitment to work together with staff, teachers, parents and most importantly the students of West Island College to help achieve the School's motto - "Praestantiam Consectemur - the pursuit of excellence". The third reason is a personal one. I feel a special affinity for the 1996 graduating class because, like you, this is my first graduation ceremony.

When I graduated in 1975 with an MBA from the University of Alberta, my father gave the key note address to my graduating class. At the time of his speech he was only three years from retirement after having spent almost 40 years working in the North American petroleum industry. My father made a number of predictions in his speech that were intended to apply to my generation but I believe they also apply to yours. I would like to share some of his thoughts with you this evening. This is some of what he had to say . . .

"The future will not be easy. It is certain that a period of change is imminent - a period that will be influenced by a new and different set of economic pressures and restraints giving rise to complex conditions requiring new and different solutions. In short, you are facing the future at the beginning of a completely new economic trend. By comparison, the future you face is not too different from the one I faced in the late 1930's.

Had someone been able to predict the things that have happened, the (Second World) war, the discovery of oil on many fronts yet an energy crisis, the confused mixture of recession and inflation - things that really don't make sense, I am sure I would not have believed it.

The years ahead will hold many interesting and significant developments. I believe that research will find a way to control cancer and heart disease and certainly gerontologists will find ways to prolong life. However, I must hasten to say that the days ahead are for the young and energetic. Scientists will find ways to reap bountiful harvests from the oceans in the form of fish, plants and algae. The development of new forms of energy or more efficient use of what we have is possible. I believe that new control systems and new management systems will be devised that will help simplify our lives - systems based on new skills that you have learned. I believe enormous mass transportation systems will be put in place requiring detailed advance planning and concentrated operational management. Intricate world-wide communications systems will be developed. I believe the computer will really come into its own during your active years. So far we have discovered only that the computer has great potential. The search for ways to harness this tool has only begun. In time it will form a storehouse for all useful knowledge ready to provide that knowledge with the flick of a switch. It will be you who will master its use and begin to put it to work for mankind!"

While some of his predictions have not yet materialized, he was almost prophetic about the development of the Internet and the extent to which computers have become a part of our everyday lives. Well, what about your future and the challenges you must face? I have been a professional analyst, forecaster and strategic planner for over 20 years and I can tell you there is not much I can add to what my father said more than 20 years ago.

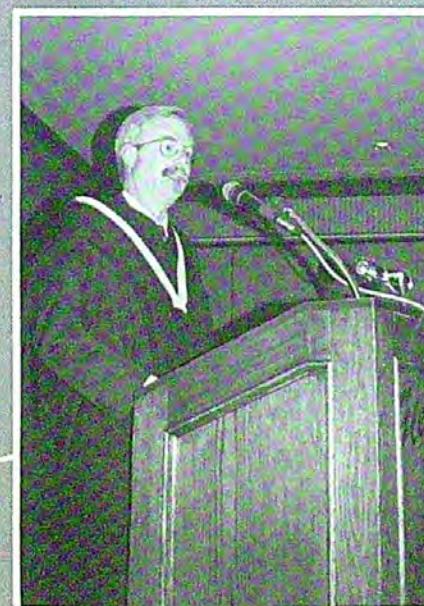
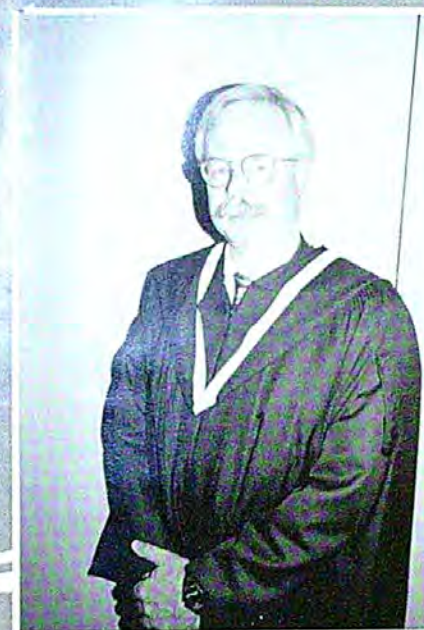
So, given the back-drop of continuing change and perhaps uncertainty, what advice can the Board of Governors give you to guide you in your future, particularly something you might not have already heard a thousand times before. If there is anything, it is this . . .

There are many important foundations for life - not the least of which are education, experience and motivation. Motivation, whether it is natural for you or something you must develop, can be your "ace-in-the-hole". When it doesn't seem like your education and experience are going to get you across the finish line for that new job, the highly motivated person will always get recognized. Therefore, be determined in your efforts!

Education and experience have certain elements in common but there is also a fundamental difference. For example, education is what you get when you study for an exam, experience is what you get when you don't. Not only did all of you get educated here at WIC, my guess is that most of you got a little experience at one time or another. To my way of thinking, education is really about knowledge and understanding. But above all, it is about the ability to think creatively - to look for creative solutions to the problems of today and tomorrow. Regardless of what your future careers may be, always maintain a desire for further learning - if not, others will surely pass you by. Education by itself would be incomplete without experience - and I don't just mean varied job experiences but life experiences as well. In my opinion, one of the greatest educators is travel - and with it the associated opportunity to experience other cultures and ways of thinking. Science and technology may provide us with our standard of living but it is a passion for the arts, music, literature, the environment and all things spiritual which gives us our humanity.

My father concluded his speech by symbolically surrendering the torch to my generation. Well it is difficult to surrender the torch when most of us on the Board expect to carry it a few more years. However, we look forward to the day when your knowledge, your understanding and your enthusiasm will contribute to helping all of us share in the responsibility of making this world a better place to live.

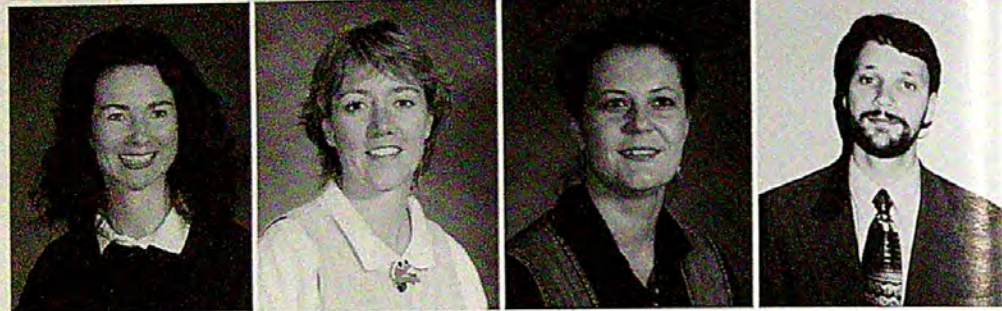

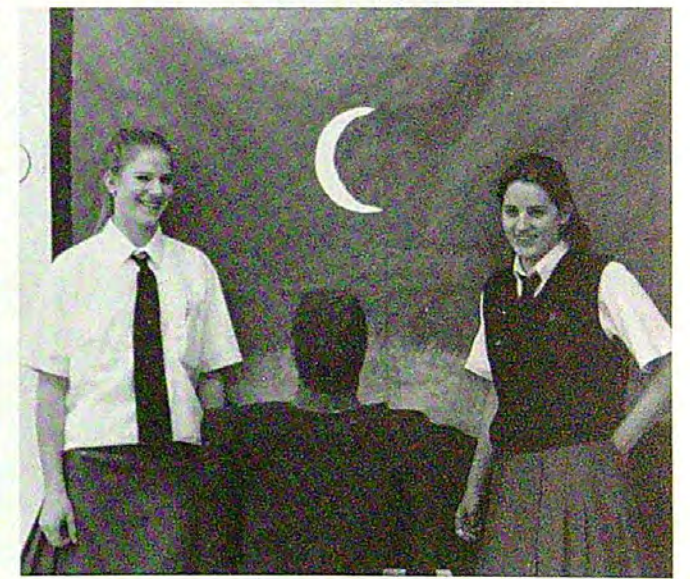
Special Art Candida

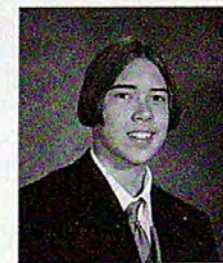

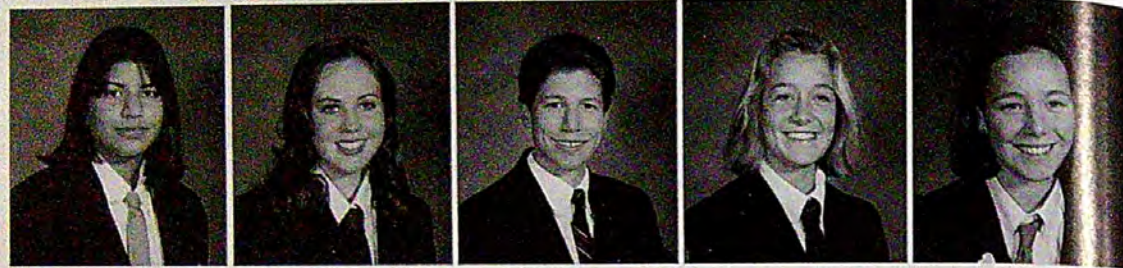




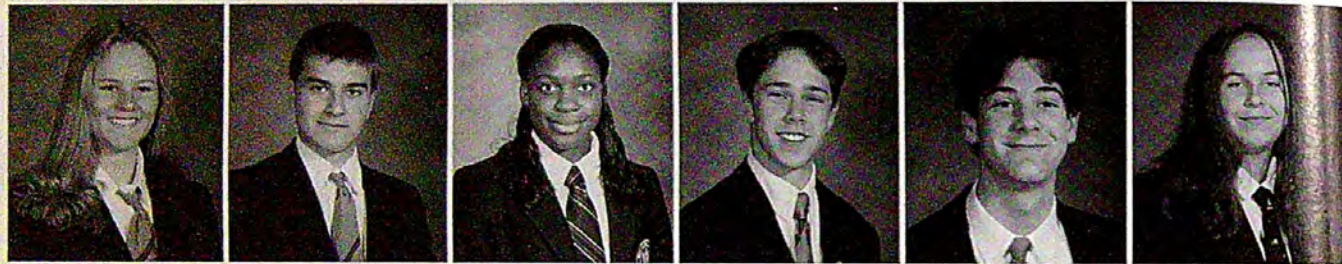
Senior Mountain Biking, Performing Arts And Canoeing

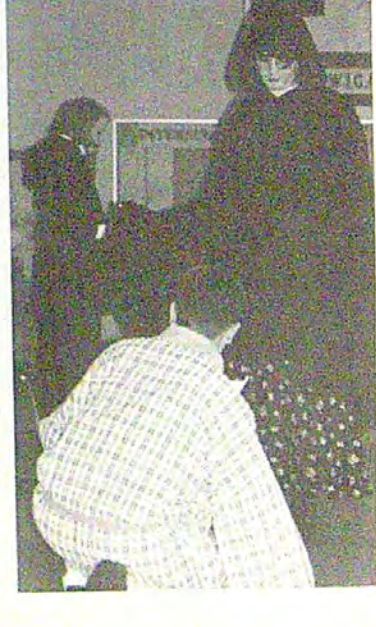
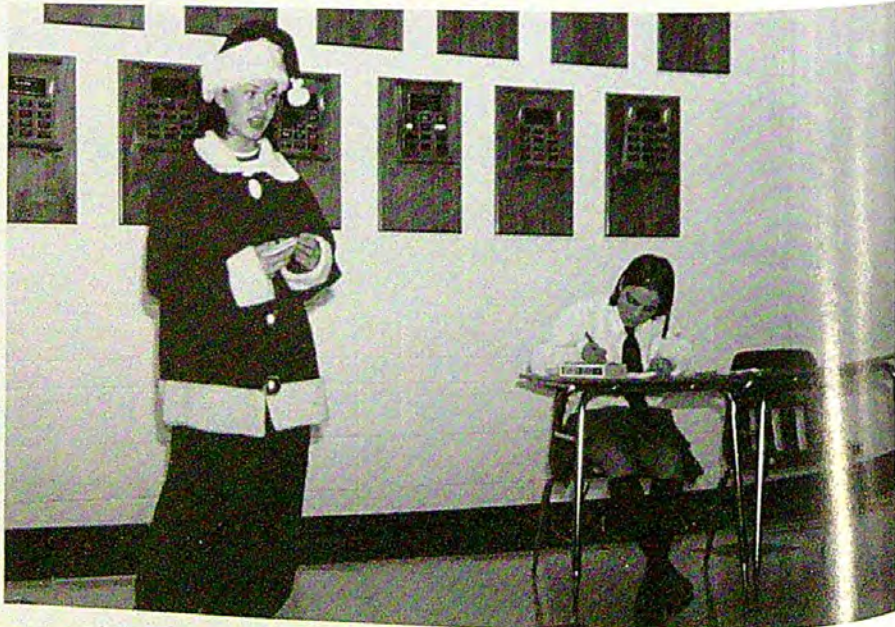
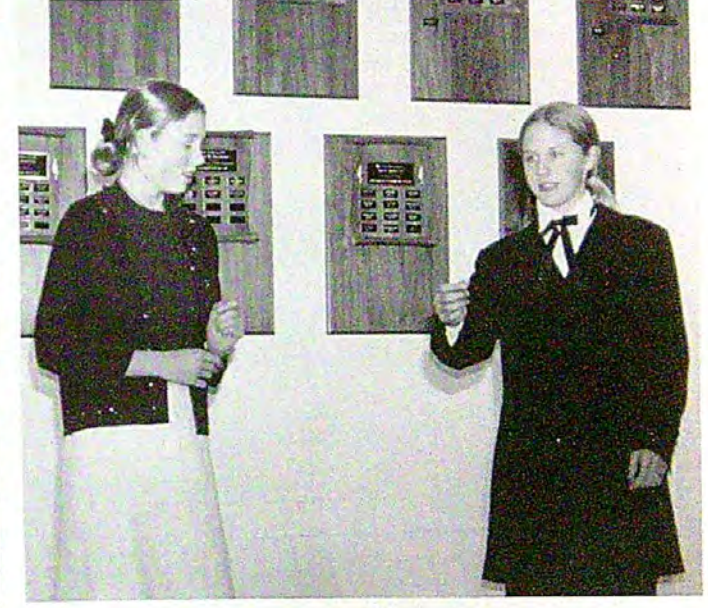
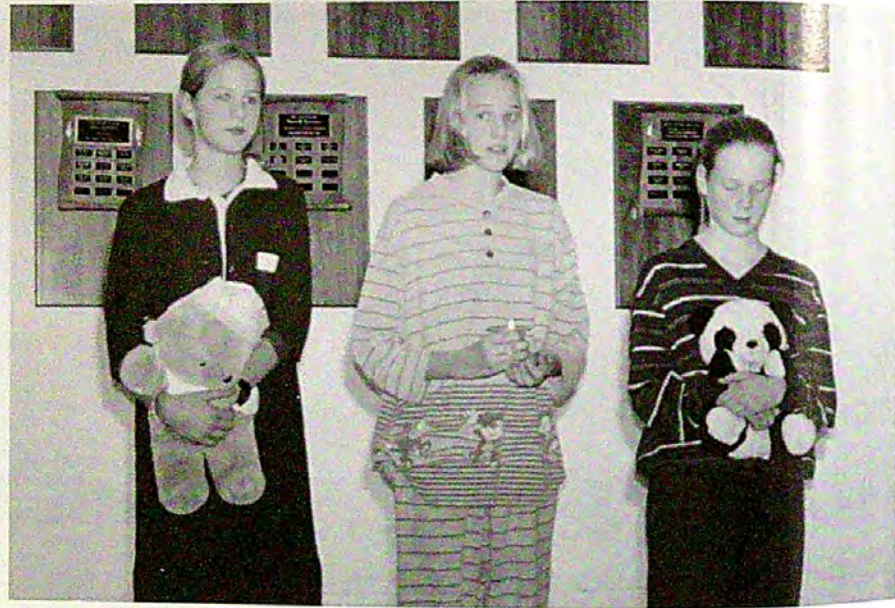
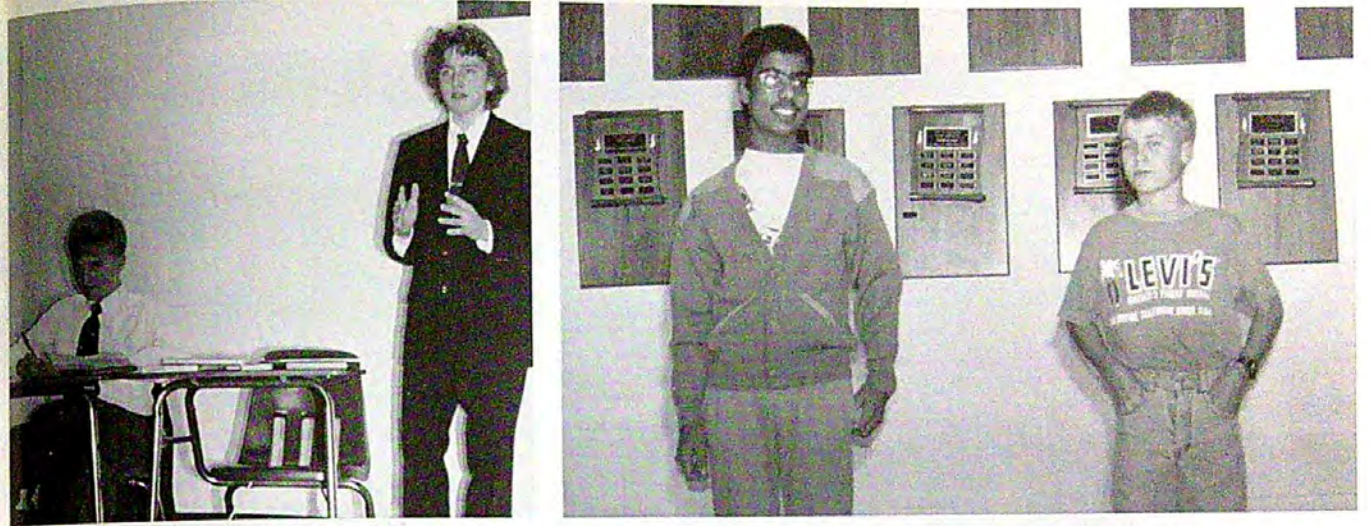
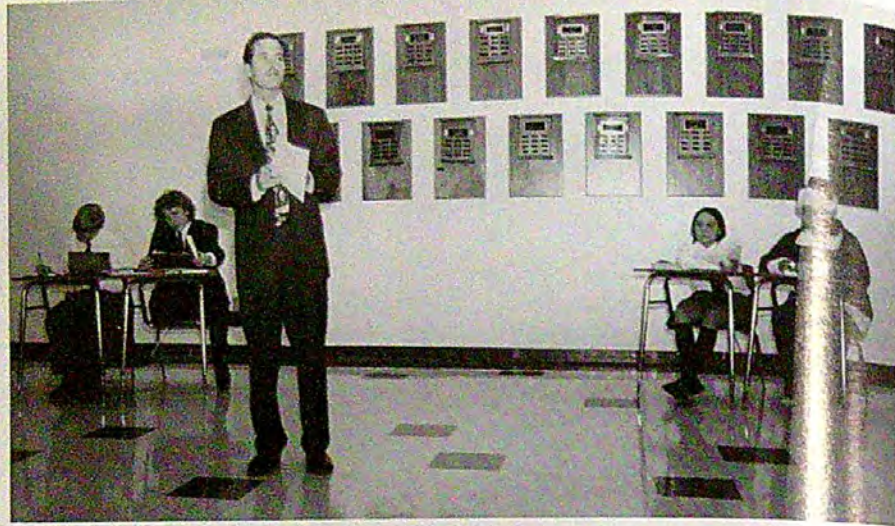


Model United Nations

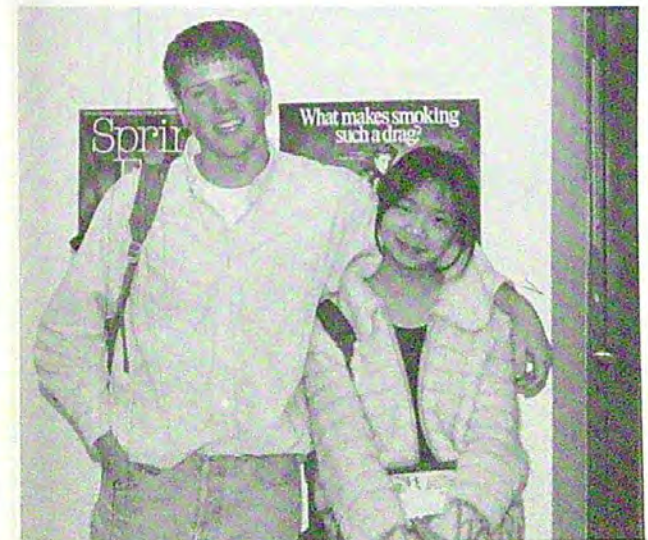
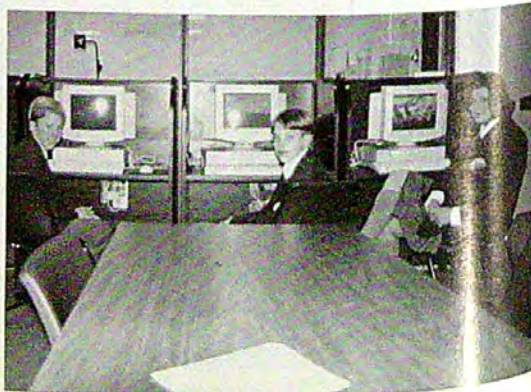
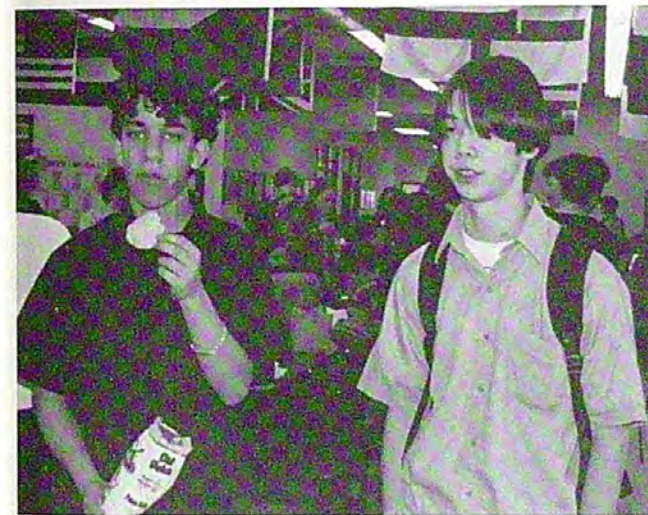
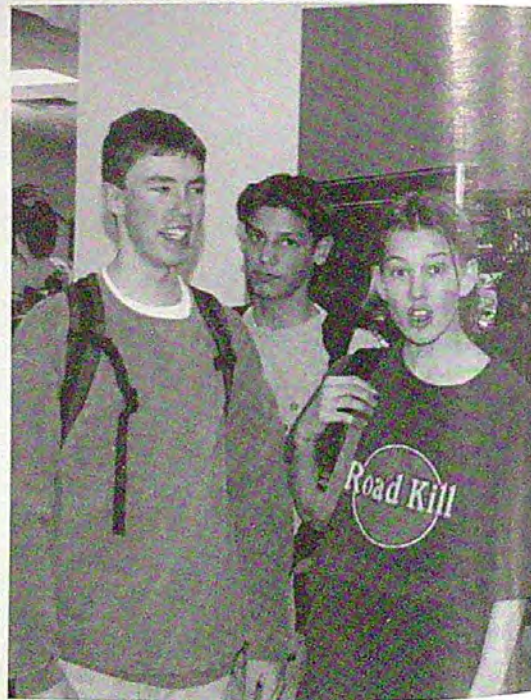




The Halls of W.I.C.

This past year if you were to travel the halls of W.I.C. you would see W.I.C.ers trying to finish their homework. Then there were those who decided that they would be individuals and sit around.

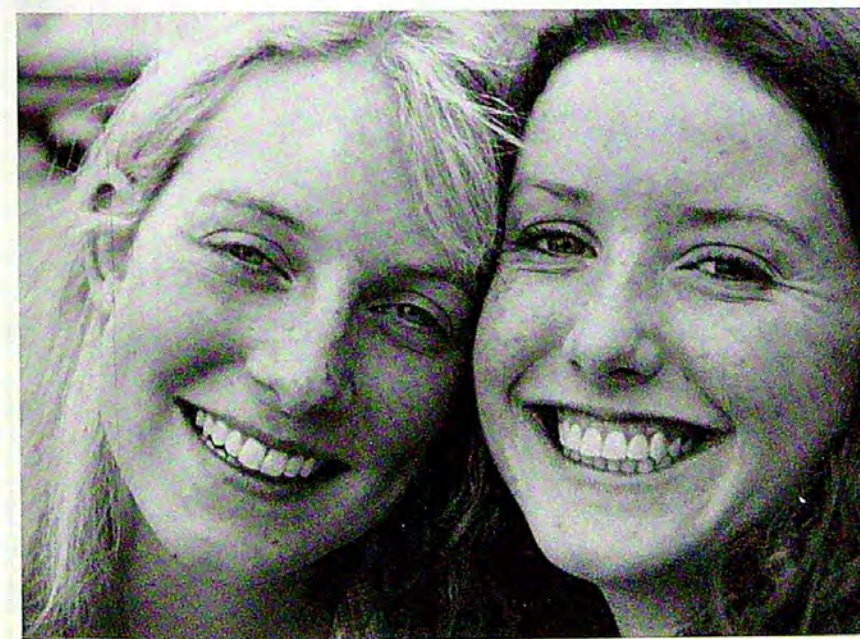

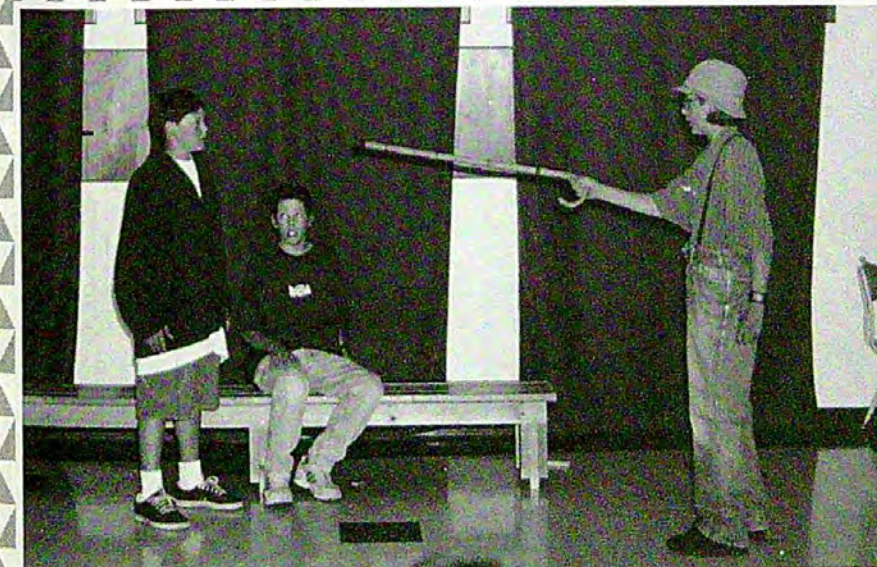
Western Spirit Day Candid

Introduction



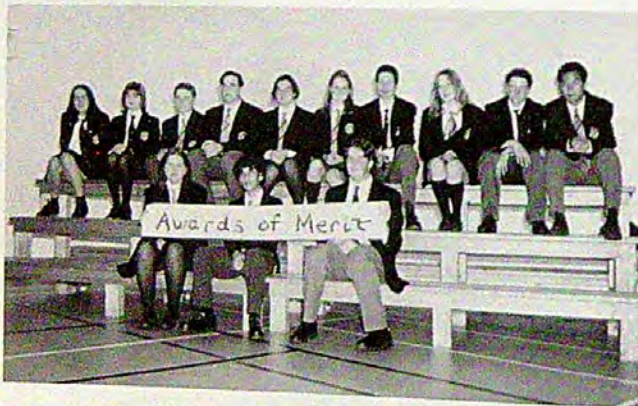

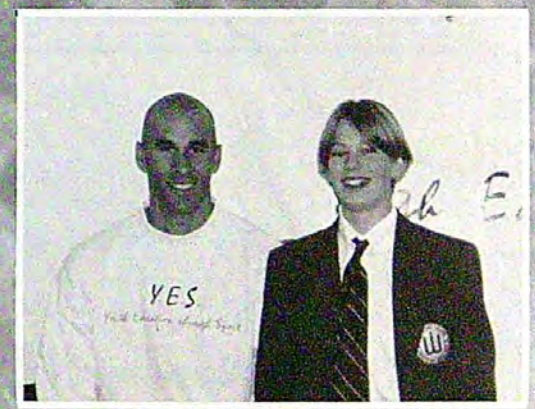
