BE KIND AND BE WELL

The goal of this year's student leadership was to create a kinder and gentler WIC. In the midst of the motif lies the experience of our children. Three years ago, some of those we honour in departure today, were in the midst of difficulty. Their struggles had me respond with the story that follows. Many of you liked it. It reads differently three years later. However, as I said then, I believe that the child is the question that the future has not yet posed. I hope that the answer our students gave this year was as much of a pleasure to you as it has been to me.

Two thousand years ago people who spoke Latin called kids with too many questions puerile, actually the puer. This modifier probably meant kids who just don't quite listen. In contrast lay the senex, or senile elder, always waiting for the youth to grow up and be the way we are. The elders' gift lay in their understanding of what learning always strives for, enlightenment. Being an elder had one risk, presuming to have final immutable knowledge in hand, or head, before meeting the child. The lesson, for each of us, is that we never have the answer before we meet the child who will pose the question. To tell the story another way:

In a kingdom long ago there was a man who traveled from the farthest city to the nearest town. And as he went he traded things – a pair of shoes for a piece of gold, a parrot for a bolt of silver cloth – until he was more rich than he had ever dreamed possible. The people thought a man who had so many things must be wise, and no matter where he went they followed him, asking questions.

"Our baby cries," said one. "What shall we do?"

"My father went to war. How will we live?" said another.

But though the traveling man could fetch goods from his sack and add up sums, he could not answer their questions.

One day he met an old woman who carried a wooden box. "Inside this box," she said, "are answers to all things."

The traveling man whistled, "I have seen many things," he said, "but I would give all I have to open that box."

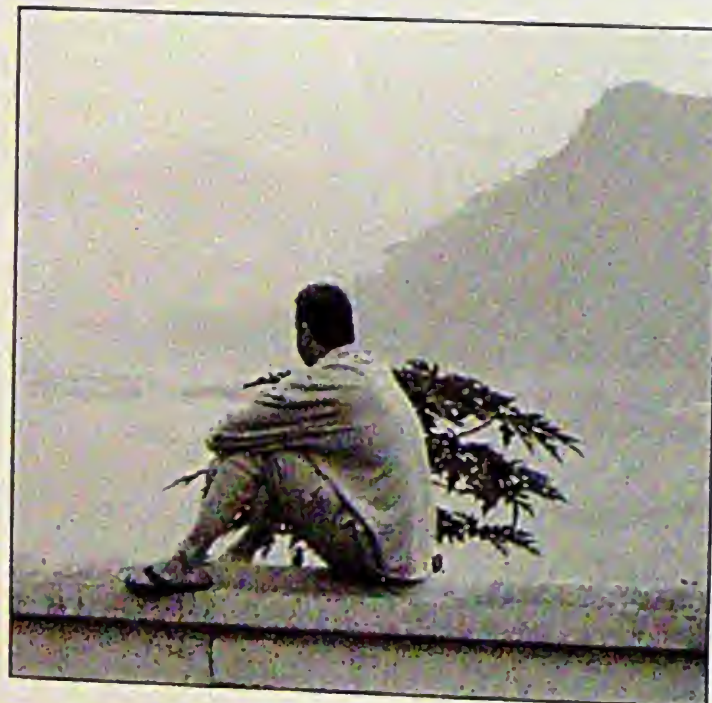
"Done," said the old woman.

Mr. Scott

My name is Michel Scott. I have been the Chair of the Board of WIC for the last year, and I am here on behalf of the Board making this address. But, tonight, I am mostly here as the proud parent of one of the graduates. My daughter Mylène is part of the graduating group. This is now my second experience as our son graduated from WIC a few years ago. Many of the parents that are here tonight I know personally and some I have worked with or done business with and I am sure that we share similar feelings as our children reach this important milestone. It is a crossroads for our children as they enter young adulthood and increasingly make their own decisions. I will admit that it is a daunting task to come up here and make this address. Daunting in the sense that it was a few years ago when a previous Chair - Stuart Allan - came before this group to give his address and became somewhat of a legend by raising the notion that we should be "planting seeds to grow trees under whose shade we may never sit". It is a great saying in its own right but it also became the theme of our fundraising effort this past year. I will tell you right now I cannot duplicate nor top that! But I will talk of things that come to my mind as I see my daughter reach this point and move on in her life. I have seen things in my daughter and her friends here at WIC that I believe equip them well for the future. I see passion in their undertakings; I see multi-disciplinary interests. I also see a multi-ethnic group open to the rest of the world. As our children, now young adults, end their days at WIC, they must make some tough decisions. Some of our children will move to distant cities; some may not. Some of our children have a clear vision of what their next steps are. Some may know precisely what career or studies they want to pursue. Some may not have as clear a vision and prefer a more general type education before making specific choices. Some may choose to pause before embarking on higher education. Any and all of these choices are good. You young adults have to be reminded that time, experience and maturity will guide you and give shape to what is right for you better than you can imagine right now. As you try to determine your future, it is critical that you let what you are passionate about drive you. That will ensure that you always have fun at what you do and if you enjoy what you do, you will excel at it. I'm sure that you have seen or can think of someone in your surrounding that you would say is highly successful and, invariably, these are people that love what they do and enjoy doing it and would not do anything else. You may also find yourselves in situations where you need to ensure that your head and your heart are properly aligned in your future activities. Another way of saying that is you will have to judge if what you do in the future is compatible with your values and the principles you hold dear. That will be important to ensure that what you do is fulfilling for you, allows you to maintain your integrity and makes you happy and proud of yourself. Your class has displayed an openness to the rest of the world. Our world is getting smaller so it makes a lot of sense that this next generation would value that. But in the world that you face, openness to others including your colleagues and the people around you, is also increasingly important. Our society, and particularly the business world today, requires us to work cooperatively with those that surround us to seek better and more creative solutions. Education is the key tool, the main ingredient to achieve what we have talked about so far about in terms of balancing your future activities, your passions, your interests and your integrity. Education will let you choose your future path. It will open doors for you and it will give you an ability

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to make choices and find what fits best for you. What fits best for you though will be different for each of you and it may mean many things but if you are to excel at what you do, you need that ability to exercise choices to direct yourselves to those things you enjoy and derive fulfillment from. Another way to look at this is that education means freedom. Doing what you enjoy is not work. As well, education can never be taken away from you. You can lose your car, your house, your fortune but it is your insurance policy as you can always count on it to rebuild. It is also something that with time and experience you will add to and become an even more valuable asset to society. WIC has been an important instrument to bring you to this point. At WIC, you have learned about values, work ethic, about discipline and method. WIC has a human development dimension, it is also about community and, of course, it is about learning and academic achievement. WIC has its own culture and way of doing things. The uniform is a good example of that. (Believe or not but one day you young students will look back on your days at WIC and talk about it to your grandchildren - and you will tell them how tough it was in your days, you even had to wear uniforms. In my days, my dad used to tell me that he had to walk 10 km to school every day and it was uphill both ways!). At WIC, you have been asked and pushed to excel. The College's motto says it all: (Praestantiam Consectemur - In pursuit of excellence). Academic performance is valued and rewarded at WIC and it is ingrained that pushing forward to higher education is the normal course. Many of you have also been exposed to international travel through WIC and WIC does a great job at that. All of these things are critical elements as you face the future and as a parent I am grateful to WIC for the preparation that you have received here. On behalf of the Board and on behalf of the parents and on behalf of the students I would like to express our thanks first to the whole faculty. I see a lot of very motivated teachers and leaders here; people who are devoted - passionate might I say - about what they do and who truly enjoy what they do otherwise they would not be as good as they are at it. My second set of thanks go specifically to Nigel McCarthy and Boyd Belisle who have taken on additional responsibilities over the last two years at the school and have helped in providing the leadership that characterizes WIC. Of course our thanks also go specifically to WIC's fearless leader, Jack Grant, who sets the tone for the whole organization and under whose leadership the school has thrived, grown and succeeded so well. He is a man of many talents and we are very happy and fortunate to have him guiding this important step in the education of our children. I also want to thank the WIC Board of Directors for the work they have done this year and, for many, over a number of years. And I must also thank Mike Tims and Sam Koliass for their fund-raising over the past year. Though we have not gone through it tonight, much was accomplished this year at school in terms of expanding the facilities. As I close, I cannot help but reflect when I look at this group of graduates that you are our future leaders. We know that, as parents, but you, as young adults, have to remind yourselves of that as well. You can aspire to and you can realize very big things, you can have ambitious goals as you have been well prepared to do so. And you should go forward with the knowledge that all of your families and friends that are here with you and those that could not are very proud of you, that we will encourage you, support you, that we will be there for you and, above all, that we love you. 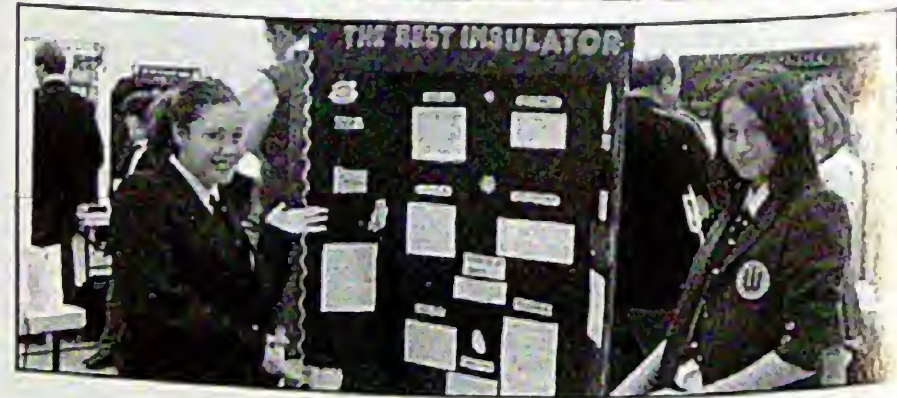
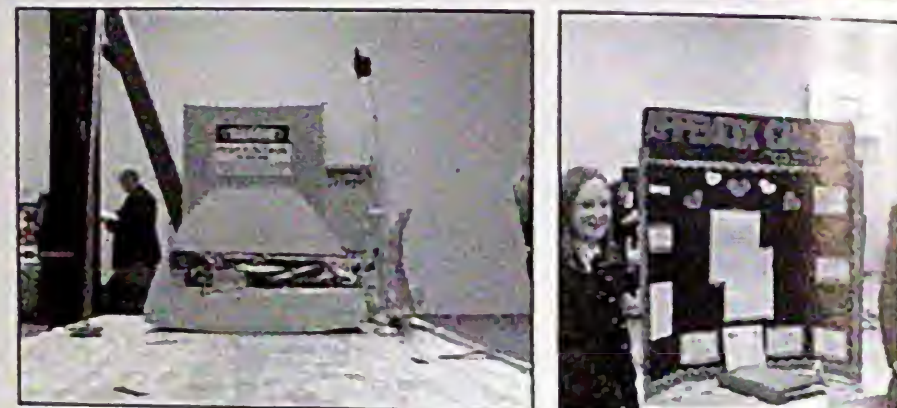


Science Fair

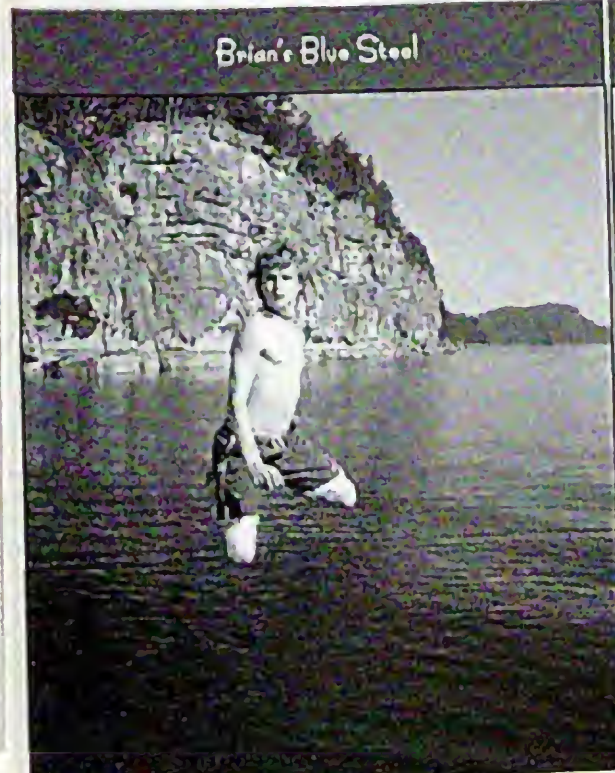
SEA PROGRAM

CHINA AND TIBET

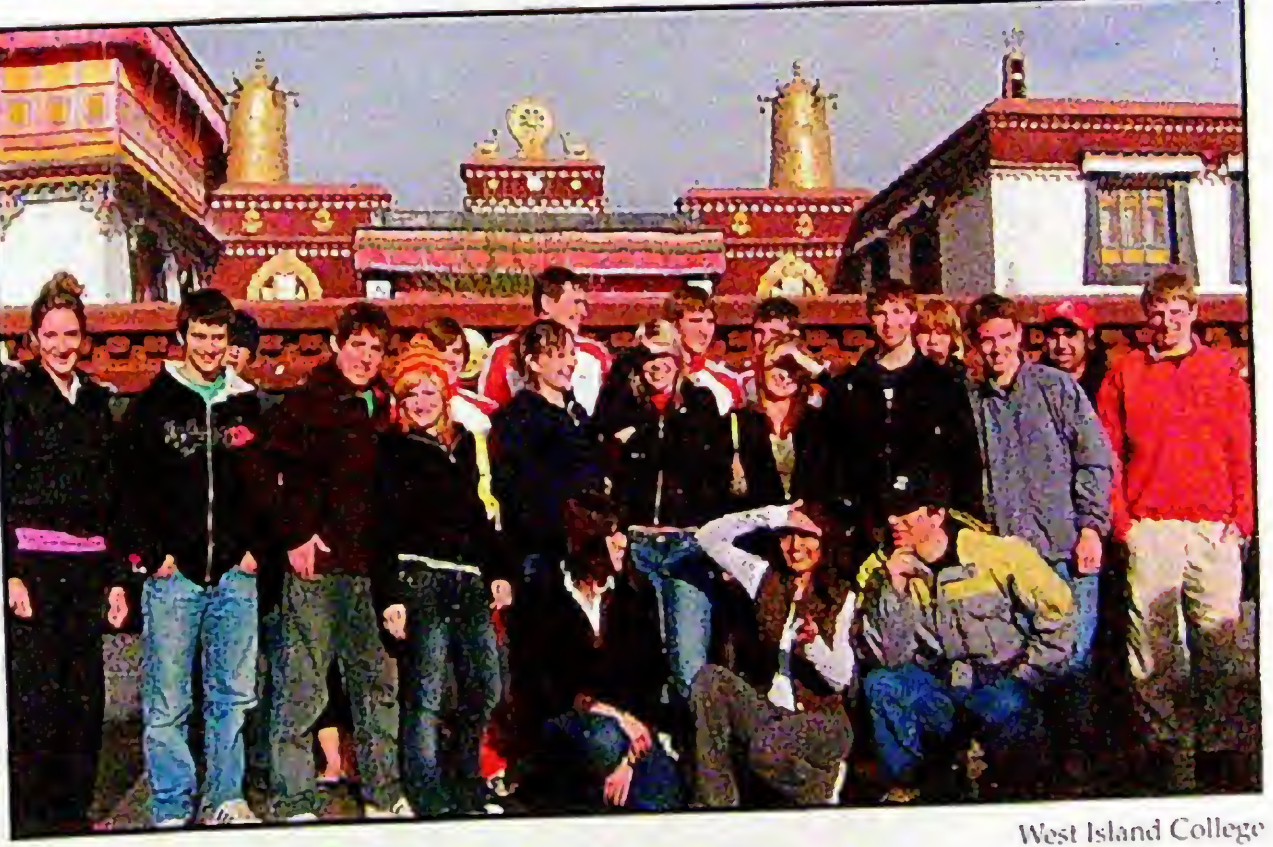

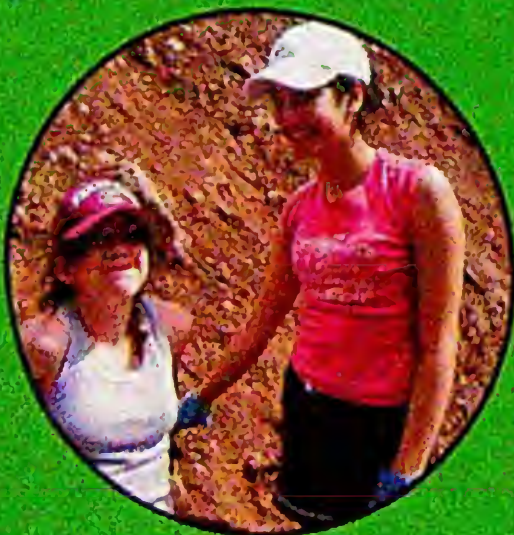
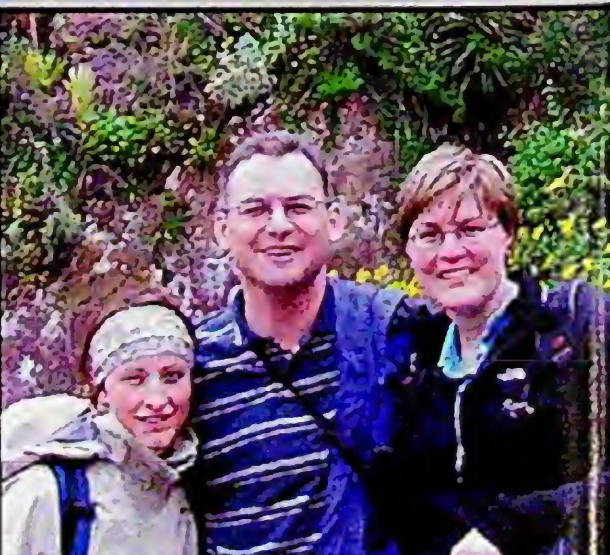


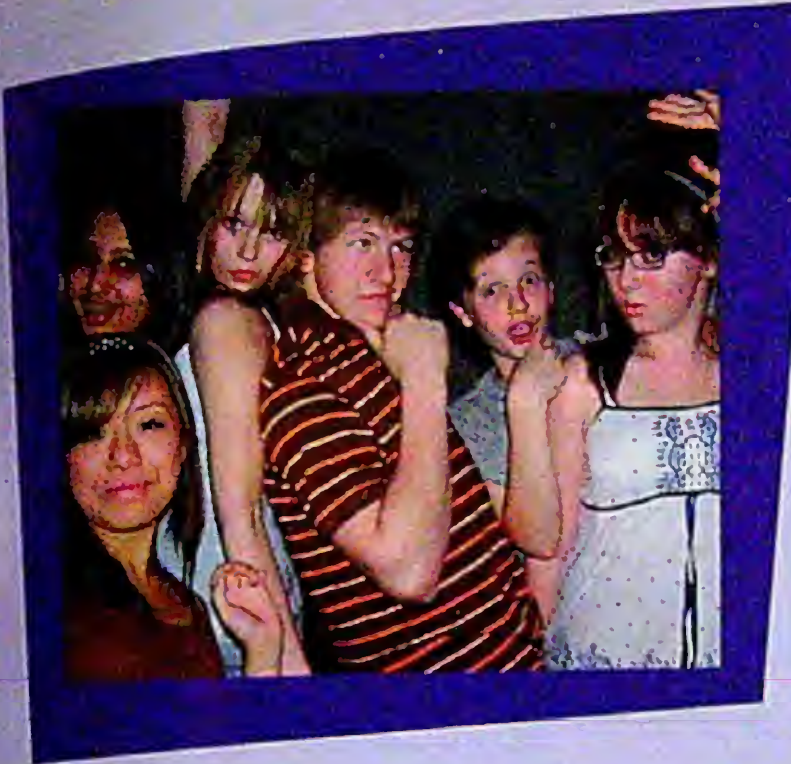


Peru Travel Studies 2006

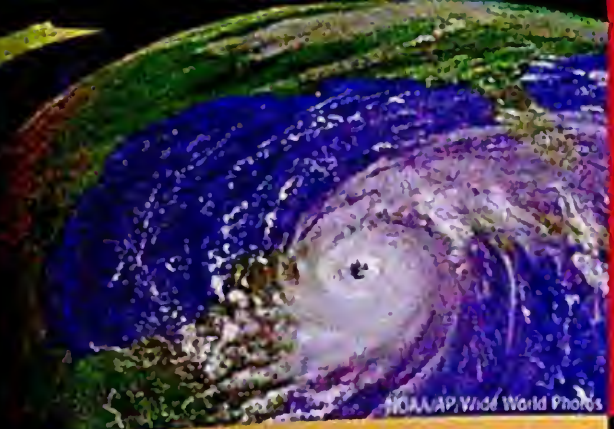
- 25 Hurricane Katrina strikes Florida.
- 28 Mandatory evacuation of both New Orleans and Mississippi is ordered as Katrina becomes a Category 5 storm in the Gulf of Mexico.
- 29 Downgraded to a Category 4 storm, Katrina hits land. 1.3 million homes and businesses lose electricity in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. 30 levees are breached, flooding New Orleans and leaving 100,000 people stranded. After slow government response, civil unrest and looting begins.
- 31 President Bush surveys the damage.

September

- 1 30,000 U.S. National Guard troops are deployed. Gas prices spike to as high as \$5 per gallon in the U.S., and \$1.34 per litre in Canada.
- 2 President Bush visits Louisiana and signs a \$10.5 billion relief bill. Nearly 154,000 evacuees arrive in Texas.
- 4 The New Orleans Superdome is evacuated.
- 6 President Bush and Congress pledge to investigate the flawed disaster response.
- 9 Government-issued debit cards are distributed to evacuees. The program fails and is ended days later.
- 12 Mike Brown, head of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, resigns. Flooding is down to 50 percent in New Orleans.
- 14 New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin announces a phased repopulation plan.
- 15 New Orleans begins to reopen. Katrina is named the most destructive hurricane in U.S. history.
- 20 Louisiana Governor Kathleen Blanco declares a state of emergency as Hurricane Rita strengthens off the coast.
- 22 Rita hits the Louisiana coast and heads for Texas.
- 23 Thousands evacuate eastern Texas and the 9th Ward of New Orleans floods once again after levees are overrun.

October

- 24 Hurricane Wilma hits southwest Florida.

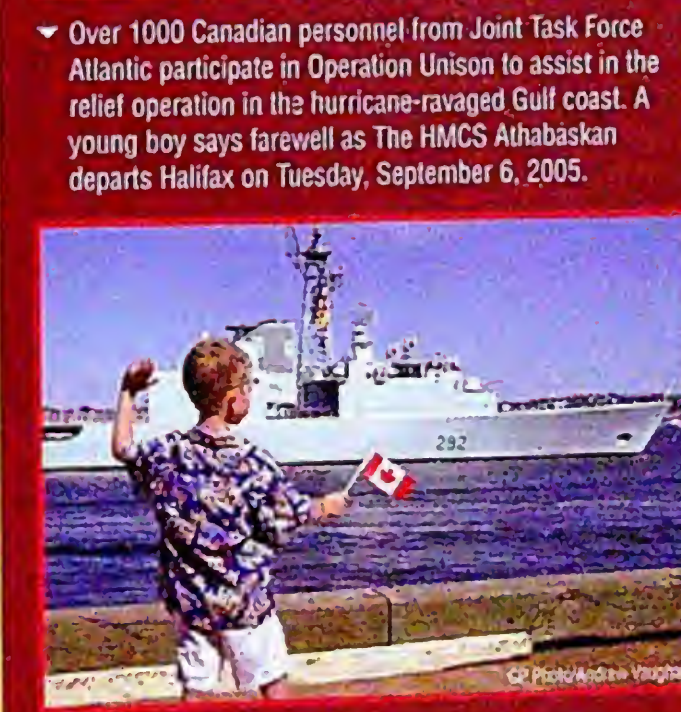

JetsGo has ceased all operations

On August 3rd, an Air France jetliner attempting to land at Toronto's Pearson International Airport overshot the runway, smashed into a gully and burst into flames. All 297 passengers and 12 crewmembers survived the crash.

JetsGo, the Montreal-based airline ceased operations on March 11th stranding thousands of frustrated travelers. Less than one month later, the discount airline officially declared bankruptcy.

During rush hour on July 7, London is hit by terrorist attacks. Bombs strike one bus as well as the city's underground trains, leaving 56 people dead and 700 injured.

Michaëlle Jean is sworn in as Canada's new Governor General on September 27th in Ottawa, taking over from Adrienne Clarkson.



Britain's Prince Charles and long-time companion Camilla Parker Bowles wed on April 9, 2005 in Windsor, England.

Justice John Gomery holds a document during the "Gomery Inquiry" relating to the Federal Sponsorship Scandal in which government officials were implicated in a scheme of illegal kickbacks.

17 Camrose, Alberta miners crowd around the news of their winning Lotto-6-49 novel lottery on October 27th. The \$51 million dollar win is the largest in Canadian history.

Methamphetamine use becomes a national crisis as death-related crimes skyrocket across North America. Pharmacies begin to remove pseudoephedrine products from shelves in an effort to control production.



Violence in Iraq continues to cost lives. Since the war began in March 2003, over 27,700 Iraqi civilians and 2,300 coalition troops have died.

On January 2, 2006, an explosion at the Sago Mine in Tallmansville, West Virginia, traps 13 miners 260 feet below the surface. Sadly, only one of the miners is pulled out alive.

On Monday, January 3rd Canadians headed to the polls for the second election in 2 years. The end result: people voted for change, and elected Stephen Harper's Conservative Party to a minority win.

05-06 Science and Nature

▶ A global pandemic is feared as the avian flu claims 73 lives in Asia by the end of December and threatens to spread across the world.



▶ After seven years and 2.88 billion miles, NASA's Stardust capsule lands in Utah carrying dust particles from the tail of the comet Wild 2. Scientists believe the samples hold clues to the formation of the Solar System.



▶ Bottled water and its lack of fluoride are being cited as contributing factors in the rise of tooth decay in children.



▶ According to recent research, chocolate can be a healthy treat thanks to its high content of flavonoids, which help maintain good circulation and reduce blood clotting.



▶ A vaccine that may potentially fight recurring breast cancer cells is hailed as the first step toward preventing the disease. British Columbia is the first province to approve and cover the cost of the drug for all eligible breast cancer patients.



▶ The Sichuan Wolong Panda Protection and Breed Center in China deals with a baby boom — 16 pandas, including five sets of twins, are born between July and November 2005.

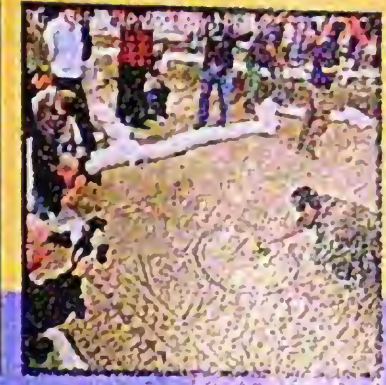
