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# Resume and Outlook

Never probably in the entire history of the motion picture industry was a period stressed with such difficulties as that which developed during the year ending August 30th, 1921.

The business depression, the result of the return to normal conditions following the war period, finally hit this industry. And with this came a blow from which even the strongest of organizations recovered only after serious financial stress. This applied to every branch of the industry.

This was particularly true with exhibitors whose expansion had been so rapid and whose finances were spread so thin that it was with grave difficulty that some of them weathered the storm. In addition to this, general business conditions resulted in depression in various sections which at times reduced business to 40 and 50 per cent of normal, and it caused many houses to shut down completely from the early part of the summer until almost the beginning of this new season.

With the advent of the new season, although business responded in some sections, it became apparent almost from the start that ordinary routine made program pictures were scheduled to a disappointing gross. This because so many large, important, or spectacular productions were offered in the early part of the season that to feed the demands with unusual pictures became almost an impossibility. The much discussed "fewer and better pictures" failed again to materialize to an extent at least sufficient to justify. So much so has this been proven at this very early period of the new season that many exhibitors were planning the inauguration of unusual moves with which to attract their failing public. As a result, a number of stars not actually working made personal appearances and are scheduled to make more in an effort to bring back a cheerful box office condition. Victor Herbert and other well known composers and artists were also pressed into service in the desire to attain the same result.

One of the outstanding developments of the year was the arrival in this country of several notable foreign productions. Of these "Passion," "Deception," "Judgment" and "Theodora" were the most conspicuous. There came also a flood of foreign made productions, the great percentage of which were utterly unfit to interest an American audience. At times it looked as though the "foreign invasion" might prove important, but this rapidly faded away. In connection with the foreign situation, it is of interest to note that Famous Players extended its activities to make productions in England, Germany and France. In Germany, Adolph Zukor formed a strong organization, taking away from the U. F. A. a number of its most important officials and directors, including Pola Negri and Ernst Lubitsch. Albert A. Kaufman was given charge of the German productions. Samuel Goldwyn engineered an interesting deal with Italian producers and Carl Laemmle of Universal made an extended trip for the purpose of investigating whether or not Universal should go into the production field, especially in Germany. As a result of this, it is quite likely that several productions will be made by Universal abroad. William Fox is also active in the foreign field and will make productions in Italy and England during the current year.

It would take a prophet and a seer as well to anticipate the happenings of the coming year in the motion picture industry. It is a fact that production costs have been greatly reduced since this time a year ago. It is also a fact that more business-like methods are to be found in practically every important organization. But at this writing general conditions are far from what they should be, so far as the exhibition field is concerned. A number of important exchange men and exhibitors are inclined to the view that before business resumes the healthy condition of 1916-1919, that lower admissions must come. As an offset, there are a number who believe that this cannot be done because of overhead costs and incidentally

argue that reduced admissions in themselves will not be sufficient. An authority in the trade pointed out to the writer that it was his belief that the public had been fed upon too many big and important pictures to ever allow them to be satisfied with the average run of production and in that manner the public had been spoiled; spoiled at least for the average picture entertainment which the usual company makes. He strengthened his argument by discussing the huge sum taken in at the box office by the large and important pictures, such as "Way Down East," "Over the Hill," etc.

The tightening of finance, both East and West, had its effect in a measure upon independent productions. There were consequently less important productions placed on the market than was to have been expected from the indications of a year ago.

Many important changes occurred in various organizations during the year, most notable of which was the control of Pathe Exchange secured by Paul Brunet and his associates. The control of this company had hitherto been held by the French parent organization. "Al" Lichtman resigned as director of sales of Famous Players and was succeeded by Sidney R. Kent. Later he became general manager and director of sales of Associated Producers, and when that corporation merged with Associated First National Pictures, he remained in charge of the sales of Associated product.

Felix Feist resigned as sales manager of Goldwyn and was succeeded by A. S. Aronson. Feist joined the Joseph M. Schenck organization and was placed in entire charge of sales. F. B. Warren, upon leaving Associated Producers, subsequently formed the F. B. Warren Corporation a distributing organization of which F. C. ("Wid") Gunning is treasurer and active head. Upon this occasion Wid retired completely from this publication.

Arthur S. Friend resigned from Famous Players to become interested in several independent producing organizations, and Charles R. Rogers, upon leaving Select, became sales manager of Robertson-Cole. George B. Van Cleave became general manager and subsequently resigned that post with Cosmopolitan. Arthur S. Kane added to his activities by reorganizing Associated Exhibitors and taking an important place in that organization. The Stoll Film Company of England started a distributing organization in the United States and subsequently closed it.

The year was also marked by the first productions of Hugo Ballin and by the appearance of Rudyard Kipling's work on the screen, "Without Benefit of Clergy." Charlie Chaplin established a new high cash record of obtaining \$800,000 from Associated First National for "The Kid." "Passion," shown at the Capitol, established the high record of \$100,000 during the first two weeks of its showing.

Kessel and Baumann, partners for many years in various enterprises, came to a parting of the ways, and New York State was afflicted with a Board of Censors. The year also marked the untimely end of George Loane Tucker, producer of "The Miracle Man." He died in June, to the regret of every lover of good pictures. The laboratory men in and around New York finally straightened out their difficulties with George Eastman of the Eastman Kodak Company and Jules E. Brulattour, and while there was talk of the National Booking Company being revived, nothing definite happened. Richard A. Rowland resigned from the presidency of Metro, to become effective around January 1st. The proposed Motion Picture Day, suggested by Charles C. Pettibohn, resulted in nothing. One of the memorable events of the year, especially in New York, was the holding of the first film golf tournament in the history of the industry, under the auspices of WID'S DAILY. And to make life cheerful, Senator Myers of Montana filed a bill seeking an investigation of this industry because of its activity in politics.



# The Days of '49 in California Moving Picture History

Edward Muybridge Makes World's First Moving Pictures and Projects Them On a Screen

Edward Muybridge, of California, was the first cinematographer to project moving pictures, his own, on a screen from revolving glass plates. That was in 1877. The world's first moving pictures for screen exhibitions were made in California by Mr. Muybridge in 1872.

After Muybridge showed the way, C. Francis Jenkins, of Washington, D. C., on June 6, 1894, gave the world's first projection of moving pictures from celluloid film on the wall of a jewelry store in Richmond, Indiana.

On March 5, 1896, Thomas A. Edison agreed to manufacture the Jenkins machine with improvements made by Thomas Armat under the name of the Edison Vitascope.

Muybridge, of California, invented the projection machine, Jenkins perfected it, and Thomas Edison first manufactured it in large numbers with added improvements of his own.

Not only is California the center of the world's moving picture industry, the state where two-thirds of the world's pictures are made, but it was in California that the first moving pictures, made in California, were thrown upon a screen by a projection machine.

The first moving pictures to be thrown upon a screen were made in the summer of 1877, on the Sacramento race track, in the presence of Governor Leland Stanford, by Edward Muybridge, an Englishman, living in California, and employed by the United States Government Geodetic Survey service.

The pictures, which showed a white horse running against a specially constructed black fence as a background, were made by a battery of 24 cameras, placed in a row, the shutters of which were operated by threads placed across the track at intervals and snapped by the horse as it galloped.

The projection machine which threw these moving pictures on a screen was also invented by Edward Muybridge. The world's first projection of moving pictures on a screen also took place in California, in a studio, the world's first moving picture studio, built by Governor Leland Stanford for Mr. Muybridge.

This studio stood, until a few years ago, on the site of Governor Stanford's race-course at Palo Alto, California, where now stands Leland Stanford University.

Previous to Edward Muybridge's invention of the "Zoopraxoscope," which threw pictures on a screen by means of an oxy-acetylene light set up with a condensing lens, there were no projection machines. Muybridge's projection machine consisted of a large glass disk with reproductions of photographs set along its margin. Each photograph showed a slight progression in movement.

Moving photographic prints had been shown, to one person at a time, in a stereoscope or "peep hole machine" in 1860 by Dr. Lellers of Philadelphia, but it was Muybridge who first showed moving pictures to an audience of more than one person.

Muybridge's first audience consisted of more than a hundred wealthy Californians: racing men who were invited to the world's moving picture premiere by Governor Leland Stanford.

Before he showed his first moving pictures to the world's first moving picture audience, Muybridge obviated the blurring of his pictures when they were rapidly revolved before the lens by placing before the picture disc another metal disc.

When the two discs were revolved in opposite directions, apertures in the metal disc coinciding with the glass disc's pictures completely gave the idea of motion by reason of the persistence of vision.

Muybridge of California was the inventor of the modern projection machine. It remained for others to substitute a strip of film for the revolving glass disc and to perfect Muybridge's primitive shutter.

Several years later, "the grandfather of moving pictures," on February 27, 1886, took his now perfected Zoopraxoscope to Thomas Edison, the inventor of the phonograph, and asked him if the Zoopraxoscope and the phonograph could not be synchronized so as to give the world its first "talking pictures."

Even in 1893, at the World's Fair in Chicago, Muybridge carried off the honors. Muybridge was able to project his pictures on a screen in Zoopraxical Hall. The best others could do was an improved "Peep-Hole Machine" which showed moving pictures on celluloid film, but which, nevertheless, could be seen by only one person at a time.

It cannot be contested that Muybridge of California was the first maker of moving pictures to throw them upon a screen. Until Muybridge came only one person at a time could view the stereoscopic peep shows. Muybridge gave the world's first screen exhibition to a number of persons.

Muybridge's moving pictures and projection machine were awarded honors in France in 1881 when they were shown to a large group of foreign scientists in the laboratory of Dr. E. J. Marey.

Upon Muybridge's return to America he was given a studio 120 feet in length by the University of Pennsylvania on what is now Hamilton Walk of the University of Pennsylvania campus.

Muybridge also took the first instantaneous photographs in history. Many of them were made, to the astonishment of the world's photographers at that time, at an exposure of one six-thousandths part of a second. Even today there are few shutters which can equal the speed of the Muybridge shutter of 1882.

Here are some of the earliest moving pictures made by Muybridge in California:

"Leland Stanford Athletes in Action."

"The Movements of the Raccoon."

"The Movements of the Baboon."

"The Ostrich Farms of California."

"The Movements of the Sloth."

"How a Hog's Back Wrinkles."

"The Beating of a Dog's Heart."

In making "The Beating of a Dog's Heart," Mr. Muybridge's camera was placed close to the chest of the animal, which had been anesthetized and cut open by Dr. Edward Reichert. Muybridge was the first cinematographer to throw scientific pictures on a screen.

To the Chicago World's Fair in 1893 Muybridge brought 20,000 original photographs on revolving glass plates and before tens of thousands of people during that summer projected his moving pictures of animal movements.

Before special audiences of scientific men he showed views of persons afflicted with locomotor ataxia, lateral sclerosis and kindred diseases.

Soon afterward Muybridge of California, then an octogenarian, died. He gave up more than twenty years of his life to advancing the science of moving pictures.

He was the first man to make instantaneous photographs, the first to project moving pictures on a screen so that the idea of continuity of motion might be conveyed to the observer. True, the motion was crude, jerky and spasmodic—but so were moving pictures even as late as 1906.

Muybridge began his work to prove to Governor Stanford that a racing horse going at a certain rate of speed was at successive points in his stride clear of support from the ground, but he finished by giving the world its first moving pictures on a screen.

#### **T. S. Tally, First Los Angeles Exhibitor**

Thomas S. Tally, the present owner of Tally's Broadway Theater, Los Angeles, was the first Los Angeles exhibitor. Early in April, 1897, eleven years before Col. Selig established the first producing studio in Los Angeles, and a few years after the death of Mr. Muybridge, Mr. Tally exhibited the first moving picture seen on the Pacific Coast.

The picture was a 300-foot release, "The Black Diamond Express." Mr. Tally exhibited it himself with an Edison Vitascope on a screen in the rear of his phonograph parlor which was then located at 311 South Spring Street.

The projection was made through a tunnel of wood and black canvas which occupied the center of Mr. Tally's phonograph shop, which Mr. Tally did not wish to darken during the "screening" for fear that prospective talking machine purchasers might be frightened away. The picture was viewed from the rear of the shop, which had been made over into an auditorium with chairs for 300 people.

#### **"In the Sultan's Power" First Moving Picture Made in California**

The first moving picture scenes for a photo-drama to be filmed in California were made by Col. William N. Selig, of Chicago, who sent a company from the Windy City to Los Angeles early in 1908 to film the water scenes of "The Count of Monte Cristo." The interiors of this picture were made in Chicago.

The first moving picture to be filmed in its entirety in California was "In the Sultan's Power," and this picture, too, was made by Col. Selig. Hobart Bosworth played the leading role and Stella Adams, Frank Montgomery and Tom Santschi took important parts. Frank Boggs directed.

Director Boggs, who some months later was killed by a Japanese religious fanatic, was accompanied west by James L. McGee, who is still with the Selig Company; by James Crosby, manager of the company; Harry Todd, for many subsequent years with Essanay; Gene Ward and Mrs. Boggs, who was known professionally as May Hosmer.

"In the Sultan's Power" was made in the first Los Angeles studio, an old mansion at Eighth and Olive Streets. In the "back yard" of the old house interior sets were put up. No artificial light was employed, all interiors being filmed with sunlight.

#### **New York Motion Picture Company**

The New York Motion Picture Corp. was the next company to send a unit to the coast. This company reached Los Angeles the day after Thanksgiving, 1909.

The company was under the direction of Charles K. French. Fred Balshofer was Mr. French's cameraman. The company had produced eighteen single reel Bison brand pictures in New York before coming west and had been organized by Charles O. Bau-mann, Adam Kessel and Mr. French in New York in April, 1909.

The original Los Angeles Bison Company consisted of Art Acord, James Youngdeer, "Princess" Red Wing, Barney Sherry, Charles Avery, Jule Darrell, Evelyn Graham, Bill Gibbons, Fred Balshofer, Buster Edmonds, Phyllis Daniels, Marien Sayres, Madeline West, William Daniels, Margaret Favor, Edna Maison, Jess McGraw, George Gebhardt, Jack Conway, Howard Davies, Charles Inslee, E. H. Allen, Milt Brown, Frank Mont-gomery and Messrs. Smyth, Edmonds, Hartigan and Stanley.

The first Bison pictures were made in Edendale on the site of the Keystone studio, a block away from the Edendale studio of the Selig company. The studio consisted only of a horse corral and a stage. The Bison company made only western pictures.

For the same ground that the Sennett organization occupies today Mr. French paid \$40 a month rent. His stage occupied a space 18x18 feet. Some of the early produc-tions were made for as low as \$112 a picture. Mr. French, who was general manager, director, secretary and treasurer of the organization, was limited to \$300 on a picture, and in no case was this sum exceeded.

The actors and actresses in stock, such as Sherry, Youngdeer and a few others, re-ceived \$35 a week. Extras got \$5 a day. Cowboys were paid \$3 a day.

Under normal conditions the old Bison company turned out a one-reel picture in two days and sometimes finished a picture between sun-up and sun-down. From November, 1909, to July 17, 1910, the Bison company, under Mr. French's direction, completed 185 pictures, or approximately one picture every day and a half.

#### **Biograph Company Third Pacific Coast Arrival**

The third company to come to Los Angeles was the Biograph unit, which arrived in January, 1910, and remained thirteen weeks. Biograph erected a studio at Pico and Georgia Streets. Offices, developing and printing quarters were at Washington Street and Grand Avenue when the company first arrived.

The first picture made was "Ramona," which because of the California locale of the story required a visit to the Pacific Southland. "Ramona" was the most expensive pic-ture put out by any manufacturer up to that time.

The original Los Angeles Biograph company consisted of General Manager Ham-mer, D. W. Griffith, Mack Sennett, Arthur Johnson, Owen Moore, Mary Pickford, Flor-ence Lawrence, Marjory Favor and Lee Dougherty. D. W. Griffith was the director.

#### **Essanay Comes to Coast in October, 1910**

Next to arrive in California was the Essanay company of ten players which left Chicago on August 15, 1910, under the leadership of Gilbert M. Anderson. The com-pany stopped over at Golden, Colorado, sixteen miles from Denver, but late in October pulled up stakes and went to Los Gatos, California.

At Los Gatos they encountered five weeks steady rain. Not a foot of film was exposed. When the forty-day flood finished the Essanay people got to work, and spent a busy nine weeks at Los Gatos making up for lost time.

The Essanay company finally quit Los Gatos for their real "farthest west" at Red-lands, Santa Monica, on the Pacific Ocean. Santa Monica's first picture was Essanay's "Tag Day." In this picture Augustus Carney, Arthur Macklin, Harry Todd, Fred Church, G. M. Anderson, and William Russell (since deceased) played the leading roles.

Thereafter the Essanay company moved to San Rafael, to Lakeside, near San Diego, to Hollywood and again to Niles.

#### **Kalem Comes West**

On December 11, 1910, Kenean Buell brought a Kalem company to Los Angeles which previously had been working in Florida. A studio was opened in Verdugo Canyon, Glendale.

Late in 1911, P. C. Hartigan opened a Kalem studio at Santa Monica. This was afterward abandoned. In September, 1913, Carlyle Blackwell opened the Kalem studio in Fleming Street, Hollywood.

#### **Nestor Opens First Hollywood Studio**

David Horsley's Nestor Company, it is generally agreed, was the first to open a studio in Hollywood. Mr. Horsley, in October, 1911, rented buildings for studio purposes at the corner of Sunset Boulevard and Gower Streets.

Later Mr. Horsley brought to Hollywood the Thomas Ricketts company, produc-ing dramas; the Milton Fahrney company, producing westerns; and the Al E. Christie company, producing comedies. On May 20, 1912, the Nestor company was merged with Universal.

#### **Vitagraph Treks Coastward**

Right on the heels of the Nestor company came the Vitagraph unit. The Vitagraph players left Brooklyn October 23, 1911. A stop-over of two weeks was made at

Colorado Springs and at the Grand Canyon. Los Angeles was reached on November 23, 1911.

The Vitagraph company consisted of Rollin S. Strugeon, director; Charles Bennett, Anne Schaefer, Tom Fortune, Robert J. Thornby, Helen Case, Tom Powers, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Burns, Robert Burns, Walter Straddling, cameraman; and Alfred Ziegler, assistant cameraman.

Mr. and Mrs. William T. Rock, who had been on the coast for some time, welcomed the Vitagraph players and brought them to the studio which they had engaged on Ocean Avenue, Santa Monica.

### Universal Makes its Western Debut

Universal may be said to have established itself on the coast when it took over the Nestor studio on May 20, 1912. On July 12, the Universal purchased the property across the street from the Nestor acreage. This was later the home of the L-Ko comedy company.

In August, 1912, William H. Swanson, then treasurer of Universal, leased 1,299 acres, now known as "the back ranch" at the end of San Fernando Valley, adjoining Griffith Park. In August, 1914, Universal gave up this property and moved to the present site of Universal City.

Preparations for this move began in May, 1913, and on March 15, 1915, Universal City was formally opened. Early in 1915 the Universal again bought back the "back ranch" which it still holds.

### Other Companies Flock to Hollywood

In September, 1912, Mack Sennett and a small company, including Mabel Normand and Ford Sterling, which had been organized on July 4, 1912, came to Los Angeles. The Sennett company took over the studio which had been used by the original Bison company.

Famous Players began work in Los Angeles in 1912, when Edwin S. Porter brought a company to the coast to produce "Tess of the Storm Country," in which Mary Pickford was starred. The Lasky company, later merged with Famous Players, started work in Los Angeles early in 1914. At about the same time David W. Griffith brought Reliance-Majestic company west.

James Youngdeer made pictures for Pathe in 1912; Thauhouser opened a plant late in the same year; Lubin sent a company west under Capt. Wilbert Melville in 1913, and the Balboa and Albuquerque companies also commenced operations about the same time. In the latter part of 1913 Bosworth, Inc., commenced making pictures.

When the Great War broke out the pioneer days had passed. The studios were well established. System had replaced haphazard methods of production. The days of crude sets and cruder acting were gone. Photography and direction had improved marvelously. The Los Angeles studios were "all set" to win the world's markets.

At the present day there are 49 studios in and around Los Angeles, and about 175 producing units are at work. Los Angeles "houses" about 20,000 picture people. In 1920, the studio payrolls amounted to about \$40,000,000. About \$20,000,000 was spent, most of it in Los Angeles, for studio equipment and supplies. The total investment in studios runs into the hundreds of millions of dollars.

### CENSORSHIP

The annual report of the Censorship Committee of the N. A. M. P. I. (National Association) shows that nearly 100 measures relative to censorship were introduced in 37 states during 1921. In 33 of these states all this legislation was defeated. Bills were passed in New York, Massachusetts and Florida. In Florida all pictures passed by the National Board of Review are acceptable to the state. In Massachusetts a referendum will be voted upon by the people of the state in November, 1922, to determine whether or not the censorship legislation passed shall stand.

California: Three bills defeated.  
Colorado: Bill died in committee.  
Connecticut: Two bills defeated in Senate.  
Delaware: Bill not reported when legislature adjourned.

District of Columbia: Proposed censorship defeated. Several new regulations adopted defining type of pictures considered fit for exhibition.

Florida: Reported above.  
Idaho: Bill defeated in committee.  
Illinois: Two bills submitted. Legislature adjourned without action.

Chicago: Police supervision defeated.  
Indiana: Six bills introduced but action taken upon none excepting where they were defeated in either the House or the Senate.

Iowa: Bill died in Senate after passing House.  
Maine: Senate bill died in committee.

Massachusetts: See above.  
Michigan: Bill died in Senate after passing House.

Minnesota: Bill indefinitely postponed.  
Missouri: Bill died in House after passing Senate by one vote.

Montana: Bill killed in House.  
Nebraska: Ten bills, censorship and blue law, were killed through intervention of Gov. McKelvie.

New Hampshire: Bill killed in House.  
New Jersey: Bill killed in Senate.

New Mexico: Position of Governor caused bill to die.

New York: See above.  
North Carolina: Bill dies in House after passing Senate.

North Dakota: Bill providing for censor boards for cities of state failed to pass.

Ohio: McCoy bill providing change from present censorship and which if passed would have prevented 50% of pictures from being shown, defeated.

Oklahoma: Four bills defeated.  
Oregon: Three bills defeated in Senate.

Rhode Island: Censorship bill died in committee.

South Carolina: Two bills defeated in Senate.  
South Dakota: Bill defeated in House.

Tennessee: Bill defeated.  
Texas: Two bills defeated.

Utah: Bill defeated in House.  
Vermont: Bill defeated.

Washington: Proposed measure dies in committee.

West Virginia: Drastic measure defeated.  
Wisconsin: Bill defeated in Senate.

Wyoming: No action taken on bill presented.

#### Blue Laws

South Dakota: Favored Sunday showing on test.

Minneapolis: Waterville city council proposed measure defeated.

Connecticut: Bill seeking to repeal present statute covering local option upon question of Sunday exhibition defeated before Judiciary Committee of legislature.

Colorado: Bill seeking repeal law and legalized Sunday exhibitions died in committee, but existing bill is practically inoperative.

Ohio: Effort to secure legalized Sunday exhibition failed.

District of Columbia: Measure introduced by Senator Myers, Montana, to prevent Sunday showings, not acted upon by Oct. 1, and bill expected to die.

A number of small towns throughout the country, especially in California, Nebraska and New Jersey, have adopted Sunday closing measures.

were the generous numbers, the morale of the delegates and the statesmanlike qualities of the various local leaders were a special source of gratification to all of us. The policy of conservatism and modification which we inscribed for the standards of our organization from the very beginning have more than justified themselves. I think the atmosphere in the Industry has been cleared and cleansed as well at Minneapolis; men, interests and institutions within the industry were properly appraised and many false conceptions and unfounded beliefs disappeared forever.

The Motion Picture Theatre Owners of America were founded as an institution primarily for self-protection. While I have any influence in the councils of the Organization, all our programs and all our policies will stay strictly within the four corners of the protection plan. All ideas and all projects and propositions will be tested by that standard alone. To be accepted in any form, they must serve the purposes of protection and be subordinate to that purpose.

The deep sources of strength from which this Organization has grown into the most powerful body politic within the Industry lie in the natural desire for the protection of our investments. The numerical growth of the Organization has, of course, impressed itself upon me every day in the year, but the vastness of the work which lies within the scope of Organization has not only impressed but appalled me and my associates. More and more, do we realize that we are not merely purveyors of amusement, but public servants in charge of a great public trust.

Speaking of the achievements of the year, I can only refer to what I said in my annual message which I realize was quite a lengthy document and still not long enough to do justice to the subject.

The profound change that has come over the attitude of leading groups in the producing field is a matter of history. I do not desire to go into

The seeds planted at Cleveland have grown to a splendid tree which bore good fruit at Minneapolis. Of course, the numbers in attendance were highly gratifying. It was the consensus of opinion that no such numbers had ever attended a convention of motion picture exhibitors in the history of our Industry.

Gratifying, however, as

personalities, but I think I am strictly within the facts when I say that today the humblest exhibitor, yea, even the poor widow in a remote corner of New England, enjoys the protection of our organization and no individual, or groups of individuals, is strong enough to inflict an injustice upon any of our members without swift punishment and proper redress.

The big problems we have to solve this year are the securing of a uniform and more equitable contract than the one now in use, and the elimination of waste in our Industry in order that film rentals will be made lower for the exhibitor.

A new type of motion picture theatre owner has been developed within the past year; a type which is able to accept and sustain responsibility; a type which realizes that internal peace is the first prerequisite to all favorable progress in the Industry.

The Motion Picture Theatre Owners of America pursue no object the attainment of which is in the slightest degree inconsistent with the best welfare of the Industry at large.

## Banking Plus Distribution

The Industrial year in motion pictures beginning in September, 1921, is going to bring the bankers and financiers who have put millions of dollars into production and distribution to their senses.

In the past bankers and financiers have ignored the biggest element in this industry. Skilled distribution and merchandising is today the biggest and most important phase of the motion picture business. Sane operation has been utterly lacking. The men who have poured untold fortunes into distribution deficits will in the coming year realize more than ever before that distribution is a specialists' function and the financiers who have financed production henceforth are going to know in advance that the producers whom they finance are committed to a sane, temperate and capable distribution organization. From a banker's standpoint the maintenance of a dozen or more national distributing systems in the motion picture industry—three-quarters of which are inefficient and wasteful—is criminal and indefensible.

This industry is heading rapidly to the point where all of the national distribution of the fifteen existing companies can be and will be handled by not more than three national distributing organizations. The men now operating inefficient distributions will bitterly resist this change but they will be overruled by the bankers who financed their companies who are going to no longer tolerate the duplications of the present system.

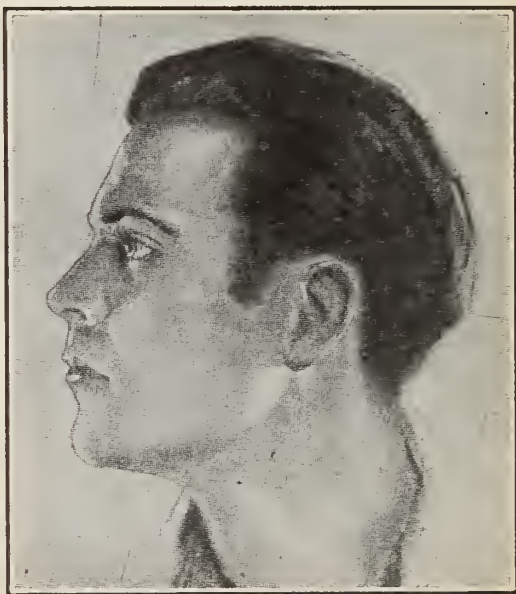

## Too Many "Movies" Too Few Pictures

In the coming season, the motion picture industry will very likely plough its field less extensively and more intensively than in former years. Too many "movies" have been made and too few motion pictures. The mushroom growth of the industry has developed the quantity idea of production; but in the new year, a higher general average of artistic excellence will be found in American-made photoplays.

One of several stimuli that our own productions have received is the re-birth of artistic competition with foreign films. Through such pictures as "The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari" which disclosed an entirely new phase of the cinematographic art, we have been led to examine our native product with a genuinely critical eye.

Though we may not follow the radical trail blazed by foreign film producers, we cannot fail to be influenced by it.

The tonic effect of the introduction of foreign films is not to be measured at this time, when American production has been somewhat curtailed. The few very good films that have been imported will have practically no effect on the American market or on the players, who believe they are being discriminated against. The fact is that the majority of foreign films cannot be given away in America, they are so far below the general average of our photoplays.

There is another influence that may be felt in the motion pictures to be produced during the coming year. That is the application of censorship laws in existence in some states. Censorship is not likely to become a national institution; its attendant evils are too manifest and involve the principles of freedom of speech and of the press to such an extent that any move for suppression is likely to be defeated. Producers, however, will adjust themselves to the limitations imposed by state laws, but not without some friction, due to the differences in the various statutes.

## One Set of Standards

Everybody in the industry has a solution of the censorship question. With New York a censorship state and with Massachusetts voting on the referendum and possibly joining hands with Kansas, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Ohio, and considering the further fact that the territory distributed from shipping points in these states and the city of Chicago, which also has a censorship board, we will have more than half of the theatres in the United States showing censored pictures. There is no need to deceive ourselves. Censorship has passed the half way mark "by states and municipalities." It is now time to "reform the reformers" and "censor the censors." If more than half the theatres in the country are showing pictures censored by censor boards which do not agree with each other and have different sets of standards, regulations, etc., we may as well have one national board with one set of standards so that the producer, distributor and exhibitor may know what he can make, distribute and exhibit, and not be subject to the whims and fancies of a lot of people who do not know anything about pictures or the business in general.

I can hear the old argument against a national board now sounding in my ears: "A national board would not do away with state boards and would not prevent other states from setting up their own censor boards." Of course it would not. A national board can not take away from any state their right to police regulation or their right to set up an additional or different standard if they see fit, but what are we doing now to stop these other states who do not have censorship in setting up more boards. At the worst we would only have one more board by having a national board and this national board might and would, in my opinion, if it is intelligently handled, stop other states from passing censorship laws. I mean by this board a national board of regulation for motion pictures for public exhibition and visual education. I would suggest a commission of three to be appointed in the same manner that Presidents of the United States have appointed other commissions. That is, one person to represent the government, one to represent the industry affected, and one to represent the public. Let this commission be of such high character that it will naturally overshadow the set of brains which we find on any ordinary state or municipal censor board. Let this commission, which will have one man from the industry on it, work out a sensible solution, have it passed nationally and recommend it to the various states.

President Harding said in his speech to the theatrical and motion picture folk in Marion, Ohio, last August that in his opinion "one set of standards was sufficient for the American people." If the President of the United States

# The Foreign Invasion

Inquiry directed to the leading executives of the industry with reference to what effect the so-called foreign "invasion" has had upon the industry results in many interesting expressions, the bulk of which however, indicate that America has no need to fear the showing of foreign pictures.

## Worry Not Justified

Too much worry and thought has been devoted to the so-called foreign invasion. If there is merit in a foreign production there is no reason why the exhibitor should not show it. The introduction of foreign stage plays has not ruined our native drama; neither will it harm our screen. If it is an incentive to American artists all the better. To date we have had a few productions, the cream of foreign manufacture. Coming at an off period, it seemed as though these might be partly responsible for a falling off in production activities. There have not been enough of them to make any impression on the number of productions necessary to feed the theaters of America. Let the foreign producer offer his wares in America, else the reaction on our export trade will entail a greater loss than the introduction of a few foreign films on the American screen.

## No Cause for Alarm

We are sending over 600 productions abroad every year, and so far this year we have shown about a half dozen foreign pictures in America. There is no real cause for alarm. Now that the war is over and considering the further fact the old "Patents company" has long since been dissolved, there is no legitimate reason for us to believe that we have a corner on the motion picture business or the art of making them any more than that we should presume we have the exclusive right to make any other commodity in America. We derive about 35% of our revenue on motion pictures from the foreign market today. The whole world needs trade stimulation between the various nations in every line of commodity, motion pictures included. We can not take the inconsistent position of shaking hands with the foreign buyer with one hand on the purchase of our goods and shoving him away with the other hand with the merchandise which he has to sell.

The faith which I have in the American producer is sufficient to keep me from fearing any serious competition for years. We need trade; competition is the life of the trade. It may be that we will make better pictures if we have a little healthy competition. Who's afraid?

## Censor Board Standards

### Standards of the Ontario (Can.) Board of Censors, 45 Richmond St., W., Toronto

No picture will be allowed which shows a successful balking of the law.

The board will use judgment in eliminating unwarranted display of foreign flags, and will also call for a respectful presentation of all British flags.

All pictures showing animals being treated unkindly, tortured or killed will be condemned.

Pictures which deal with firearms or display of knives or guns may be eliminated or cut.

Shocking and unnecessary details of deeds of violence and struggle scenes will be cut out. This also applies to the rough handling of women, children, the aged or infirm, and close-up views of horrid, bruised or mutilated faces, or faces showing agony and suffering; also the struggles of drowning people and close-up views of dead people's faces floating in the water.

Constructive suggestions which might be conducive to producing lawlessness or crime, e. g., methods of safe cracking, picking locks, raising cheques, robbing houses, molesting persons, etc.

In no instances will suicide or incentives to such be shown.

Close-up scenes, prolonged or instructive scenes of murder, or showing of executions will not be allowed.

Each question of costume or taste must be considered on the basis of morals. Pictures of women almost wholly dressed, but displaying a lavish amount of lingerie, are startling. The same, is true of excessively low-cut gowns. Under no consideration will the board pass any pictures containing incidentally or extensively the nude form.

Burlesques or scenes of ridicule of clergy, Salvation Army or any other religious work will be eliminated.

All pictures must be kept clean from suggestion, vulgarity and profanity.

Scenes in houses of ill-repute and scenes of debauches will be cut out, also any instructive details of gambling, etc., will be eliminated. Undue and unnecessary drinking scenes will be eliminated.

Fifty per cent of all serials must be shown at one sitting.

The board will insist that sex problems be treated with seriousness and reserve.

Constructive suggestions of the use or means of illegitimately procuring habit-forming drugs, narcotics, poisons, etc., will be eliminated.

Instructions prohibit the display of any advertising which shows scenes of violence, display of guns or knives indicating shooting or stabbing, nudity, vulgar display of women's forms, objectionable titles regarding sex relations, or any eliminations that have been made by the board.

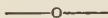

### Kansas State Board of Review Standards, Old City Hall, Kansas City, Kan.

Pictures should be clean and wholesome, whether for entertainment or amusement, and all features that tend to debase morals or influence the mind to improper conduct should be eliminated.  
 No comedy which ridicules any religious sect or peculiar characteristics of any race of people should be shown.  
 The dress of comedy characters must be condemned when used for evil suggestion.  
 Infidelity to marriage ties must be condemned.  
 A display of nude human figures must not be shown.  
 Bar-room scenes, with drinking, gambling and loose conduct between men and women, should be eliminated when possible, and at all times should be abbreviated, as also social drinking and cigarette smoking.  
 Crimes and deeds of violence, with an undue use of guns, revolvers and knives, and criminal methods, such as give instruction in the committing of crime through suggestions, should be eliminated or abbreviated.  
 Prolonged and passionate love scenes, when suggestive of immorality, will not be allowed.  
 Prolonged scenes of roadhouses, dance halls and houses of ill-fame must be eliminated. Vulgar and suggestive dances by semi-nude dancers, especially those of the underworld, must not be permitted.  
 Pictures having for their theme white slavery and the allurements and betrayal of innocence will not be approved.

### Police Standards of District of Columbia

Moving pictures are forbidden:  
 In which sex relations are shown or depicted in a manner tending to the corruption of morals.  
 Or which are based upon white slavery or procurement of women.  
 Which depict nude persons, except children, or persons so nearly so as to shock ordinary sensibilities.  
 Which show undue demonstrations of passionate love or scenes of vice.  
 Which use titles and subtitles containing salacious suggestions or use in connection therewith advertising matter, photographs or lithographs of this character.

### Pennsylvania Standards

The board will condemn pictures, and parts of pictures, dealing with "white slavery." The procurement and prostitution in all forms of girls, and their confinement for immoral purposes, may not be shown upon the screen, and will be disapproved. Views of prostitutes and houses of ill-fame will be disapproved.

Pictures and parts of pictures which deal with the seduction of women, particularly the betrayal of young girls, and assaults upon women, with immoral intent, will be disapproved.

Prenatal and childhood scenes and subtitles describing them will be disapproved.

Pictures and parts of pictures dealing with the drug habit, e. g., the use of opium, morphine, cocaine, etc., will be disapproved.

Scenes showing the modus operandi of criminals, which are suggestive and incite to evil action, such as murder, poisoning, house-breaking, safe-robbery, pocket-picking, the lighting and throwing of bombs, the use of ether, chloroform, etc., will be disapproved.

Gruesome and unduly distressing scenes will be disapproved. These include shooting, stabbing, profuse bleeding, prolonged views of men dying, and of corpses, lashing and whipping, and other torture scenes, hangings, lynchings, electrocutions, surgical operations and views of persons in delirium or insane.

Studio and other scenes, in which the human form is shown in the nude, or the body is unduly exposed, will be disapproved.

Pictures and parts of pictures dealing with abortion and malpractice will be disapproved. These will include themes and incidents having to do with eugenics, "birth control," "race suicide" and similar subjects.

Stories or scenes holding up to ridicule and reproach races, classes or other social groups, as well as the irreverent and sacrilegious treatment of religious bodies or other things held to be sacred, will be disapproved. The materialization of the figure of Christ may be disapproved.

Pictures which deal with counterfeiting will be disapproved.

Scenes showing men and women living together without marriage, and in adultery, will be disapproved. Discussion of the question of the consummation of marriage, in pictures, will be disapproved.

The brutal treatment of children and of animals may lead to the disapproval of the theme, or of incidents in film stories.

The use of profane and objectionable language in subtitles will be disapproved.

Objectionable titles, as well as subtitles of pictures, will be disapproved.

Views of incendiarism, burning, wrecking and the destruction of property, which may put like action into the minds of those of evil instincts, or may degrade the morals of the young, will be disapproved.

Gross and offensive drunkenness, especially if women have a part in the scenes, will be disapproved.

Pictures which deal at length with gun play, and the use of knives, and are set in the underworld, will be disapproved. When the whole theme is crime, unrelieved by other scenes, the film will be disapproved. Prolonged fighting scenes will be shortened and brutal fights will be wholly disapproved.

Vulgarity of a gross kind, such as often appear in slapstick and other screen comedies, will be disapproved. Comedy which hurlesques morgues, funerals, hospitals, insane asylums, the lying-in of women and houses of ill-fame will be disapproved.

Sensual kissing and love-making scenes, men and women in bed together and indelicate sexual situations, whether in comedies or pictures of other classes, will be disapproved. Bathing scenes which pass the limits of propriety, lewd and immodest dancing, the needless exhibition of women in their night dresses or underclothing, will be disapproved.

Views of women smoking will not be disapproved as such, but when women are shown in

suggestive positions, or their manner of smoking is suggestive or degrading, such scenes will be disapproved.

That the theme or story of a picture is adapted from a publication, whether classical or not, or that portions of a picture follow paintings or other illustrations, is not a sufficient reason for the approval of a picture or portions of a picture.

Themes or incidents in picture stories, which are designed to inflame the mind to improper adventures, or to establish false standards of conduct, coming under the foregoing classes, or of other kinds, will be disapproved.

Banners, posters or other advertising matter concerning motion pictures must follow the rules laid down for the pictures themselves.

## New York Standards

At the time this volume went to press the New York Commission (Censor Board) had not agreed upon any set of standards relative to rejection of pictures.

A statement issued by the Motion Picture Commission of the State of New York said that it "has not established any fixed rules or standards for the judging of pictures except those prescribed by the statute creating the Commission.

"The Commission has deemed it wise not to attempt to formulate fixed standards or rules for the reviewing of pictures, but rather to examine each picture on its merits to determine whether the film, or any portion of it, violates any provisions of the statute."

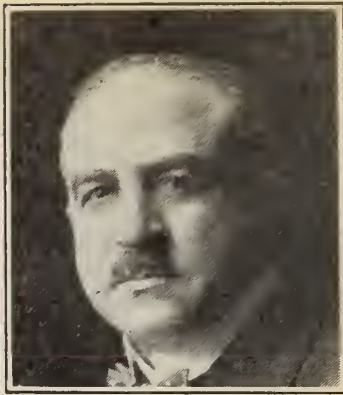

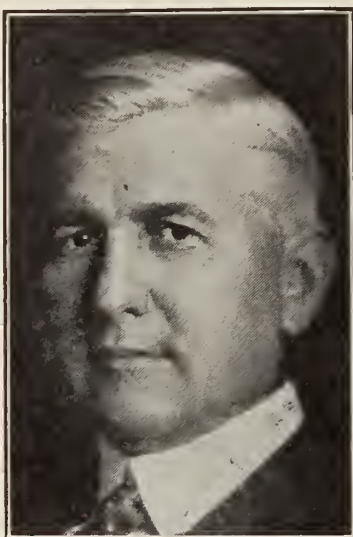

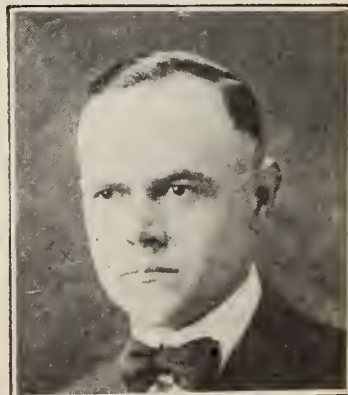

With a view of eliminating all censorship troubles in the future, and after a thorough discussion with our production department at the coast regarding the standards of the various censorship boards, we have mapped out a program whereby our forthcoming serials simply will not suffer from the most rigid censorship imaginable, but will be the kind that every red-blooded boy, as well as a large percentage of adults, demand today, stories in which the heroes are clean-cut athletes of unimpeachable character and who embody all the sterling qualities of American manhood.

To substantiate our belief in stories of this kind, we will release six serials during the season of 1921-1922.

## No More Bucket-of-Blood Serials

It is our opinion that there will always be a market for good "continued-in-the-next-issue" type of pictures, or the photoplay serial, as we know it most commonly today.

The continued story has always proven itself essential for the make-up, prosperity and popularity of our weekly and monthly magazines. And I believe with that as a basis for my reasoning, and so long as the average man, woman, boy and girl enjoys the continued story in printed form, they will enjoy the photoplay story in its present chapter form. Serials are as essential in film form as they are in the magazines, and I know beyond the question of a doubt that many theaters are doing the biggest business on the dates on which they run serials.

Of course that same law that governs consistent and profitable selection for every other commodity we have today—the law of quality selection—must be reckoned with when we talk serial popularity and prosperity. The very cheap, bucket-of-blodd type of serial is almost a thing of the past, as the censor boards in many states will not tolerate them, and I look for a bigger business than ever before on the high class serial during the coming year.

## Make Proper Selections and Exploit

About three years ago I predicted that the time would come when the super-feature serial would be booked in some of the best houses in the country, and I think this prophecy has come true, in view of the fact that such serials like "The Lost City," "The Son of Tarzan" and one or two other super-serials were booked into some of the biggest houses in the country.

I have watched carefully the results of the bookings of serials in these houses and I have come to the conclusion that a theater which depends largely upon a transient trade and is not a "neighborhood house" has not successfully been able to exploit a serial.

I maintain, however, that even in these houses, if the serials are properly selected and the proper exploitation given them, and as much attention paid to their presentation as is given to features, that they will give absolute satisfaction to the patrons of the theater and prove profitable to the managers.

There is no doubt in my mind that serials will continue to be popular provided, of course, as I have said before, that the producers do not base their serials upon a story that is without merit, and do not go to extremes in portraying sensational situations.

As long as the popular magazines continue to find serials acceptable to their readers, in my opinion, just so long will serials prove popular in motion picture theaters.

## OHIO BOARD OF CENSORS

A Statement from Mrs. Maude Murray Miller

"Ohio was the first state in the world to have a Board of motion picture censors, and having no precedent, we worked out our system of censorship as seemed best in our judgment. We have tried to keep obscene films out of Ohio, and to raise the tone of that popular form of entertainment. Naturally we have not pleased everybody, because that would be impossible. Ohio has a population of more than six millions of people, and while some have thought us too lenient in our censorship, the motion picture men at times have thought us too drastic. However, we have, perhaps, kept as good an average as any other state, and the motion picture men of Ohio are our staunch friends and supporters.

"There is no doubt now of the success of censorship in Ohio. Pictures have been cleaned up and passed with satisfaction to the people and to the men submitting the films, when without such eliminations as ordered by this Board the pictures would have been unsuited for exhibition in this state. The better class of motion picture men declare themselves in favor of state censorship, and say their business is better than before we had this law. Larger and finer theatres are being built each year, which is a good test of the law.

"We pass on an average of about 35,000 reels annually, bringing into the state that many dollars, as the censorship fee is \$1.00 for each reel of 1,000 feet. Last year we approved without eliminations 24,395 reels, approved with eliminations 4,176 reels, and rejected totally 175 reels. The percentage of pictures submitted to us last year was smaller than in previous years. The cause of this was that fewer pictures were made, and the owners were taking more prints of their feature films.

"The total expenses of our Board for last year were \$20,000,000, all of which was paid for through censorship fees, the state being at no expense whatever. All surplus funds over our expenses are turned into the state treasurer."

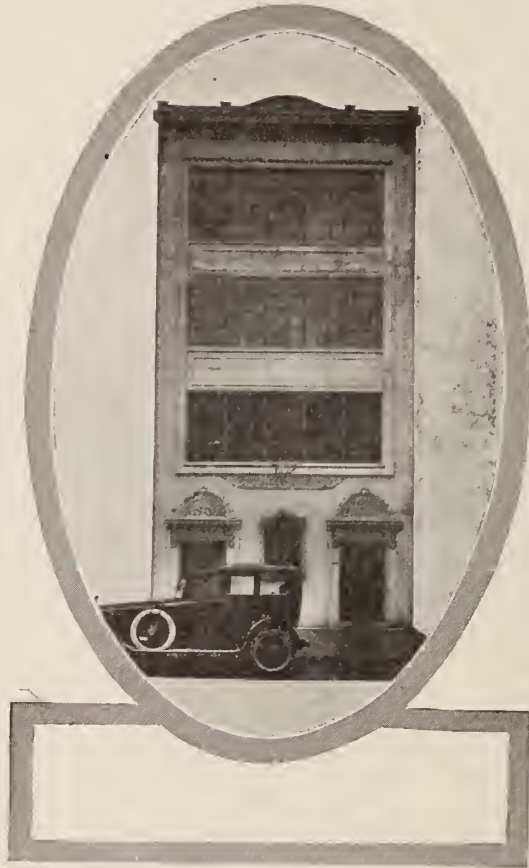

Exhibitors who do not desire to pay music tax should remember the following:

1st. Absolute instructions should be given to those in charge of the theater music as to just whose music should be made use of and that if there is any doubt the music should not be used until the facts are known.

2nd. Cue sheets and scores offered for sale or distributed should not be used by those who do not wish to pay the tax unless the statement is made and guaranteed that the music recommended is not subject to tax. Where scores are sold or rented a guarantee should go with each copy that all liability is assumed by the publisher should trouble arise.

3rd. Every theater man not wishing to pay the tax should see that his library of music contains

only selections which are issued by those companies whose music is tax free and are non-members of the society.

4th. When those in charge of the music supply the music for the theater the theater owner should instruct and demand that non-taxable music only should be played, and when cues are supplied see to it that the musicians substitute non-taxable music wherever taxable music is specified. The theater owner is liable if this is not done.

Trouble and lawsuits may result from the use of music inadvertently used which is taxable, therefore too much care cannot be used. Spotters may be in the audience or other methods used for locating houses using taxable music.

Some houses believe that the tax is so small that it is better to pay it than fight and go to the trouble of inspecting all music. This is an open question to be settled by each theater owner individually or by the united action of the theater owners' organization. If the tax is to be fought it must be done by united action of theater interests.

A warning should be given to every maker of cue-sheets and every maker of scores that he owes it to the theater to label every cue—stating whether or not it contains taxable music and if so each of the selections should be so labeled.

# The Director of 1922

"The Survival of the Fittest!"

That will be the director of 1922-3 and THEREAFTER.

He will be one of those sterling artists whose works will have STOOD FOR SOMETHING. And continue to stand:

For the best there is in motion pictures!

He will be one who, in the year passing, a period generally conceded to have been the most difficult to survive in film history, looked for and found a reason for the situation which was the result of LACK. Lack of knowledge, lack of ability, lack of thriftiness! And made up his mind to HELP adjust the gigantic problem by donating the best there was or is in him to the cause.

He will be the "oak tree" type, his sturdy growth being founded upon the same amount of invisible strength, such as the famous tree with the roots extending into the earth in proportion to distance the trunk extends into space; a dependable personage who, despite inconvenient reverses in circumstances, perhaps, will rise determinedly to greater heights and "count his blessings."

He will be the kind of director who may have been "at liberty" many months, and yet, for the ultimate good of his chosen profession and endeavors, will be thankful that rather than having been engaged in the making of pictures which would NOT have stood as a monument to his individual talents, as well as to the progress of the art, he has been making none at all!

For the director that will remain and who has "weathered the storm" will have realized that the "garden of motion picture production" needed "weeding," that in the "patch" where directors thrive (some springing up over night) the process of elimination was both necessary and inevitable.

No tender of any branch of the industry of agriculture would be so foolishly optimistic that he would expect to continue producing the same fine specimens of organism year after year, without "weeding"—without ejecting the upstarts of too rapid and unfounded growth, for those intruders, when not methodically "weeded out" in time crowd the most valuable yield to stagnation.

But agriculture is as old as the world itself. Motion pictures WERE new.

Gardeners have had authorities to consult, books to read ament their problems, while directors and producers had nothing but wasted film.

The future generation of motion picture makers, will, therefore, reap the harvest of sacrifices of current months, profit by the experience of those gone before and the result of failure to "weed" out the incompetent will serve as ready reference.

The director of the future will be one who takes the making of pictures as seriously as the agriculturist takes his work, and he will be the kind of director that will not be nor cannot be "weeded out."

This process of elimination, although it has wrought hardships upon many, has been a house cleaning time for directors. It has been a time when a brotherhood among them has been of worth. It has brought the real thinkers closer together, and placed a wider chasm between the so-called director and the one who has earned the distinction of his title.

"History repeats itself!"

Six years ago, envy, malice, hatred and unjust criticism was responsible for the most active men then engaged in the direction of motion pictures forming an organization. A different kind of extreme promoted that joining of hands, but the MOTION PICTURE DIRECTORS ASSOCIATION has stood; proven a factor worthy of its identity, increased in membership, broadened in activity and been accounted as one of the important milestones of motion picture history.

The Los Angeles Lodge, in the year passing, has subscribed to and started to erect a \$200,000 "home"—a Club House, a "clearing house." The New York Lodge already had comfortable quarters, but the membership has soared and the interest has been unprecedented.

That organization of directors concede a genuine director one who has made a picture that will STAND. If one picture a man has made silently declares his ability, subsequent failures cannot rob him of laurels won. These men recognize conditions. They have all had to work under adverse circumstances, sometimes, some where, regardless of their present standing.

A member of that worthy body of men must be an "oak tree"—not a "weed." Not one who thinks it is "easy money," that he can waltz in, mis-direct one or two pictures, crowd someone out who has EARNED a reputation, and "get away with it," for "weeds" are not eligible to membership.

Among the younger men, young in the art of direction, there may be "acorns" today, but they are the "oak trees" of tomorrow, and it is the "oak tree" type of director who in years to come will stand for "THE PROGRESS OF THE ART."

## D. W. Griffith On "The Past—and the Future"

The article by the world's premier director producer, appearing in that issue, is, because of its importance, reprinted below. Mr. Griffith said:

"The director of the past: ingenious, hard working. With few mechanical aids; and little understanding. Striving for an end which often he could not foretell. Glad of the opportunity to do; appreciative of the slightest understanding.

"The director of the present—perhaps very similar to the director of the past—a much troubled brick-layer, using about fourteen hours a day to place the bricks to the best of his ability.

"The director of the future—let us look into the far, far future. Limitless his opportunity.

"The world's understanding his for the performance. Silent tho' the screen be, it is the silence of thunder. Portentous the power of the screen, so that of the director. And woe be that his art shall fall in the control of the wrong men—the wrong kind of men.

"For the power of the screen is greater by far than that of any other instrument.

"Because of this the director of the future must be a thinker. A greater thinker than he has ever before been. His must be knowledge of much. The world's ambitions; the world's aims; the hearts of humanity; the understanding of genius.

"The patience of a master; the strength of a Hercules. Thematically the world's truths will be suggested by the art of the director.

"Through the power of suggestion he will reach vast and great distances. Into the hearts of men he will travel. And multitudes will be glad because of him and his work. And be happy.

"far as we have travelled, so further we will go. Unhindered by censorship the art of the director will reach limits now unknown, undreamed of. Barred by censorship his art will wither."

## NATIONAL MOTION PICTURE LEAGUE

This ever increasing demand stimulates the production of wholesome films. The lists are also sent to producers of motion pictures and managers of theaters and are published in various magazines and newspapers.

The publicity now reaches millions of readers, according to a leaflet issued by the organization.

The organization is supported entirely by its membership and by donations from persons not interested financially in the Motion Picture Industry, and by sale of its Bulletins.

## THE N. A. M. P. I.

In his report as to the activities of the Association during the year, Executive Secretary Frederick H. Elliott said that the membership consisted of 193 companies and individuals. He recommended a permanent committee to be known as the Committee of Public Relations, to foster a closer and more harmonious co-operation between the industry and social, civic and educational women's organizations in the various states.

During the year, the Association gathered data showing the personnel of legislatures, Congressional representatives, etc. The record of each legislature on censorship and Blue Law measures is being compiled. A questionnaire will be sent to Congressional and legislative candidates seeking their views on censorship and Sunday closing.

The successful handling of the Hoover drive and the adoption of production standards were referred to; also the tremendous growth of the non-theatrical picture business.

During the year, censorship battles were fought in 37 states, but in New York and Massachusetts the laws were passed, and in Illinois and Florida measures are still pending.

The Sunday Blue Law was tested in South Dakota and the Supreme Court decided in favor of Sunday openings.

New classifications for scrap film and new specifications for shipping cases were adopted during the year. Efforts are being made by which film may be shipped by parcel post to foreign countries.

The Film Theft Committee reported 13 arrests during the year.

Probably the most important move of the Association during the year was the adoption of a special committee, including a representative from each of the important producing and distributing companies affiliated with the Association to preview all pictures to be released beginning with July, 1921. An Appeal Committee will also participate in this work.

This committee will consist of the executives of the 15 leading companies and a quorum of 9 will be necessary.

The new financing plan of the Association calls for the following schedule:

\$150.00 for each feature released.

\$10.00 per reel for serials.

\$5.00 per reel for all short subjects (3 reels or under).

During the year, James S. Spargo called upon editors and publishers throughout the country in the interests of the industry.

Colonel Arthur Woods became the Chairman of the Americanism Committee succeeding the late Franklin K. Lane.

William A. Brady on June 6th, was re-elected President.

# Important Legal Decisions

## Canadian Copyright Act

The greatest achievement during the past year in connection with copyright legislation was the passage by the Canadian Parliament of an act to amend and consolidate the law relating to copyright in Canada.

A motion picture photoplay is protected as a "dramatic work" under the new Act. The term of copyright is fixed for the life of the author and a period of fifty years after his death.

The new Act is a departure from copyright acts of all other countries of the world in that it provides for a "compulsory license"; that is to say, if the owner of the copyright fails to supply the reasonable demand of the Canadian market, the Minister of the Crown named by the Governor and Council to administer the Act may, upon the terms and conditions stated in the Act, grant a license to any third party to exploit the work in Canada.

The Act provides for the registration of works sought to be protected by the copyright, as well as for the registration of all assignments or licenses under the copyright.

It will be necessary to register all assignments or licenses, because failure so to do renders such assignment or license void against any subsequent assignee or licensee for valuable consideration, without actual notice.

Registration fees are \$2.00 for registration of copyright, and \$1.00 for the registration of an assignment of copyright.

## Competition Between Title of Pictures and Title of Story

Judge Learned Hand of the Federal Court recently rendered a very important decision in the case of International Film Service Co., Inc. vs. Associated Producers, Inc. In that case, the plaintiff had made a picture entitled "The Broken Doll," basing its picture upon a short story by Bruno Lessing that appeared fifteen years ago in the *Cosmopolitan Magazine*, under the title "The Broken Doll." The defendant made a picture which it also entitled "The Broken Doll," but it was based upon an altogether different story, the only similarity, of course, being in the titles.

It had long been supposed that there was no competition between a motion picture and a prior novel or story under the same title, on an erroneous conception of *Atlas vs. Street & Smith*, 204 Fed., 389. Judge Learned Hand, however, ruled that there is direct competition between these two classes of literary work, and that if the novel or story had acquired a secondary meaning and was well known to the public, he would certainly restrain.

He refused to grant an injunction in the particular case before him, for the reason that the story was fifteen years old, had only been printed in one issue of the *Cosmopolitan Magazine*, and it was unlikely that the public was familiar with the title.

But the decision is of far-reaching importance in that it expressly sets at rest the erroneous conception held with respect to the *Atlas* case, and definitely holds a picture and a story to be directly in competition with each other. This means that if a story or novel has acquired a reputation and is known under its title, a producer cannot thereafter make a picture on a different theme, using the same title of the story or novel. If he does so, he is guilty of infringement and may be restrained.

## Rights of a Co-Author

An important decision was handed down by the Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of *Maurel vs. Smith*. In that case, Mme. Maurel had written a book of an operetta, which book was used in part by Robert B. Smith in the composition of "Sweetheart."

It was contended by Smith that the book actually used by him in the operetta was not the book as written by Mme. Maurel, but it was

shown conclusively that, although changed in many respects, Mme. Maurel's work was nevertheless interwoven with the work of the other authors of the operetta.

The Court held that this constituted a co-authorship; that the amount of collaboration between two co-authors need not be substantial or equal; that if, in fact, one collaborates with another, no matter in how slight a degree, the resulting composite work becomes the work in common of all the co-authors, and each one is entitled to share in the profits thereof.

## Liability of Manager Signign a Contract

An interesting case on the question of the liability of a manager with respect to a contract of employment signed by him was *Castle vs. Dillingham*.

There Miss Castle sued Charles B. Dillingham for breach of a contract of employment. She had been employed under a written contract for services to be rendered at the Century Roof. Her contention was that her employment was by Dillingham. His contention was that the employment was by the Century Roof, and that he had merely signed as agent. It seems that Dillingham and Ziegfeld were both managers at the Century Roof, and they each signed contracts of employment on behalf of the corporation, as follows:

"Century Amusement Corporation,

By Dillingham and Ziegfeld,

C. B. Dillingham."

Miss Castle sued for \$30,000, and the jury rendered a verdict in favor of Dillingham.

## Use of Cut-Outs or Discarded Films

A novel point was decided by Judge Hough in the District Court recently. It seems that Charlie Chaplin, years ago, had made twelve pictures for the Lone Star Film Corporation. In the taking of the pictures a considerable amount of film was thrown out as unsuitable for the final negative. Such discarded matter is usually designated as "cut-out."

The Rollo Sales Corp. recently acquired these cut-outs and proceeded to assemble them into pictures by patching together these isolated and disconnected cut-outs, in all of which, of course, Charlie Chaplin appeared. They designated the three pictures that they so made, "Dollars and Doughnuts," "The Movie Nut" and "The Boot-legger."

Chaplin warned them that he would not tolerate this practice, and on their refusal to pay any attention he brought suit in the United States District Court, claiming that such acts on the part of the defendant constituted unfair competition and were likely to hurt his reputation as an actor, director and producer.

The Rollo Company admitted that they had assembled these cut-outs, but contended that they had the right to do so, inasmuch as they own the film. Their contention, however, was thrown out, and the Court issued a temporary injunction to Chaplin, upon his filing a bond for \$20,000, which bond was filed.

## Author Infringing His Own Work

An interesting copyright case was decided not long ago in Ireland. It seems that an author had written a book for school use, the copyright of which had been assigned by him to the plaintiff, his publisher, and the author had agreed not to write any similar work during the existence of the copyright.

The author subsequently wrote for the defendant, another publisher, a book along the same lines as the first book, adopting the same system and representing the same kind of lessons and intended for the same class of pupils. This book was published by the defendant-publisher.

It was held that in this case the author was guilty of infringing his own copyright. That he had no more right than a stranger to take the material of this first work and use it in the



preparation of another work, and that the fact that he had been the author of the first work in nowise gave him any greater rights, inasmuch as he had assigned his copyright to his first publisher.

The case is interesting because it illustrates that in copyright infringement suits the author of the work may be guilty of infringement and held liable therefor, in the same manner that a third party would be liable.

Educational Co. of Ireland vs. Fallon.

##### News Reels

The case of *Ruth vs. Educational Films Corporation* (N. Y. Law Journal, Sept. 16, 1920, p. 1663), presents an interesting question under the New York Civil Rights Law. In that case the plaintiff, "Babe" Ruth, sued to enjoin the defendant from manufacturing and distributing films entitled "Babe Ruth, How He Makes His Home Run" and "Over the Fence," showing the plaintiff engaged in the activities which have made him famous. The pictures were taken during practice or in actual games throughout the 1920 Base Ball season, with the consent of the owners of the ball parks where they were taken and the oral consent of the plaintiff. The latter, however, had not given the written consent required by the Civil Rights Law. The defendant relied upon the decision of the Appellate Division, First Department, in the famous *Humiston* case (189 App. Div., 467), which held that the Universal Film Manufacturing Company had a right to show as a part of its weekly news pictorial scenes showing Mrs. Humiston engaged in legal work without her consent. The films of "Babe" Ruth, however, were not part of a weekly news pictorial, but were separate pictures. The New York Supreme Court, nevertheless, held that the Civil Rights Law did not apply as the pictures constituted matters of current news and were therefore permissible without the plaintiff's consent the same as news reels, and were not pictures made for "advertising purposes or for the purpose of trade" within the meaning of the statute.

##### Right to Ridicule

The case of *Willy Pogany vs. Frohman, Inc.*, and *David Belasco*, recently decided in New York, indicates the limits of the right of a motion picture or theatrical producer to ridicule well-known personages on the stage and screen. In that case, the defendants produced a play entitled "Call the Doctor," which had a long and successful run. There were several references in the play to a Hungarian artist called "Pogany Willy," who was referred to as an artist with no pictures to paint. The plaintiff, Willy Pogany, is an artist of Hungarian birth. He sued the producers of the play for libel, claiming that the references made to him in the play caused him substantial injury. The defendants demurred to the complaint as not stating a cause of action. The New York Supreme Court held that while a casual reference of the character complained of might not cause any injury at all, it must be presumed that constant repetition of such statements day after day before large audiences would have that effect. This decision was affirmed on appeal by the Appellate Division (186 N. Y., Supp. 952). The case is now awaiting trial.

##### Contracts

*Essanay Film Manufacturing Company vs. Lerche*, 267 Fed. 353, involved the interpretation of a contract for the services of an actress in motion picture productions. The plaintiff had been engaged to render such services to the defendant under a contract which was silent as to the nature and character of roles to be played by the plaintiff. The latter, however, had, therefore been continuously engaged in performing roles of a dramatic-emotional nature. The defendant attempted to make her play comedy roles, which she refused to do. The Circuit Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit held that this did not constitute a breach of contract on her part, and that where an actress was engaged to render services and the contract was silent as to the nature and character

of the roles to be played by her, it was a proper inference that she was to play in roles of the nature and character which she was known to be capable of doing at the time of making the contract.

Another interesting question of contract interpretation was presented in *Arliss vs. Brenon Film Corporation*, 230 N. Y., 390. The plaintiff, George Arliss, sued for breach of an alleged contract of employment whereby, he claimed, defendant had agreed to employ him to act in a motion picture production at a stipulated salary. The contract was not in writing, and the plaintiff admitted that there were various details of the agreement which had never been settled, and that he would never have signed the written contract without having it first passed upon by his attorney. The jury found a verdict for the plaintiff, but this was set aside by the New York Court of Appeals, which held that, as essential conditions of the proposed contract had not been agreed upon by the parties, there was no contract and the plaintiff could not recover.

##### First Run Showing

The right of an exhibitor claiming a "first run" contract to a preliminary injunction against a competitor who seeks to show the picture within the territory and period of time covered by the alleged first run, was involved in two recent decisions of the New York Supreme Court. The case of *Progress Moving Picture Co. v. Advance Theatrical Enterprises* was a controversy over the right to the first run of the picture entitled "The Greatest Love," starring Alma Rubens. The plaintiff claimed a first-run contract prior in point of time to the defendant's contract; this claim was disputed by defendants. Upon a motion for a preliminary injunction, however, the Court on the papers before it resolved the doubt in plaintiff's favor and granted the injunction, holding that plaintiff would be irreparably injured if his competitor were to show the picture in advance of its exhibition by plaintiff and before the trial of the action. The case has yet to be tried on its merits, which were not involved in the decision.

This result seems in conflict with that reached in *Traub v. Famous Players-Lasky Corp.* (N. Y. Law Journal, Feb. 19, 1921, p. 1751). There the plaintiff's right to a first run under his contract was disputed, and the Court consequently denied plaintiff's motion for a preliminary injunction, holding that plaintiff's damages in the event of his final success would not be incapable of ascertainment, and hence that plaintiff would not suffer irreparable injury from his competitor's prior exhibition of the picture pending the trial.

##### Company Liability with Star

An unreported decision of the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, in the case of *Equity Pictures Corp. v. C. K. V. Film Corp. et al.*, applies familiar equitable principles to a novel situation in the motion picture field. When Lewis J. Selznick and Clara Kimball Young severed their relations in 1919, Miss Young agreed, in consideration for her release from her contract of employment, to pay Mr. Selznick \$25,000 per picture on each of the next ten pictures in which she should appear, whether under her own management or otherwise. All pictures which she should make under her own management were pledged in advance to Selznick as collateral security for the payments. Miss Young further agreed that no picture in which she appeared should be released until the sums due Selznick thereon had been paid. Shortly thereafter Miss Young organized the Fine Arts Film Corporation through her attorneys and entered into a so-called contract of employment with this company, which in turn contracted to sell to Equity Pictures Corporation the pictures which it proposed to make. Equity Pictures Corporation attempted to release and distribute the pictures without paying Selznick the sums due him under his contract with Miss Young, and Selznick sued for an injunction and an accounting. Judge Learned Hand, before whom the case was tried, held that the contract between Miss Young and Selznick created an equitable lien upon each picture, which she should make under her own man-



purchasers having notice of Selznick's rights; that the pictures produced ostensibly by Fine Arts Film Corporation were really produced by Miss Young under her own management, the so-called employment contract being merely colorable; that Equity Pictures Corporation had notice of Selznick's rights when it contracted to purchase the pictures, and was therefore bound to pay Selznick the stipulated sums before it could release or distribute the pictures.

#### Binderup Damage Case

A recent unreported decision of the United States District Court in Nebraska, in the case of *Binderup v. Omaha Film Board of Trade*, et al., throws much light upon the application of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law to the motion picture industry. In this case the plaintiff, a Nebraska exhibitor, sued the Omaha Film Board of Trade and most of the leading film distributing companies doing business in Omaha for damages claimed to have resulted to plaintiff from an alleged combination in restraint of interstate commerce between the defendants. The contention was that the defendant distributors through the Board of Trade had deliberately conspired to wreck the plaintiff's business, consisting not only of the operation of several picture theaters but also of a local exchange conducted by plaintiff, which served several small towns in Nebraska. The complaint alleged that in furtherance of this conspiracy defendants had caused false charges of improper business practices to be brought against the plaintiff before the Film Board of Trade, and had "blacklisted" plaintiff and refused to supply pictures to his exchange, or even to deal with him at all unless he would put up \$1,000 as security for his observance of the rules of the board. Triple damages in the sum of \$750,000 were asked. Since neither the plaintiff nor the defendants in their dealings with plaintiff were shown to be engaged in interstate commerce, however, and for the further reason that the alleged conspiracy was not shown to be unlawful, the Court dismissed the complaint at the opening of the trial, holding that it stated no cause of action against the defendants under the Sherman Act.

Involving legal principles of less moment but almost equally important in its practical consequences was the case of *Swann v. Omaha Film Board of Trade*, et al. This was also an attempt by an exhibitor to hold the Omaha Film Board of Trade and the leading film distributors in Nebraska for an alleged conspiracy in restraint of trade, and met with a similar fate. This suit was brought under the Nebraska Anti-Trust Law, which is very similar to the Sherman Act. Similar allegations of conspiracy were made, but the Court dismissed the complaint at the close of the plaintiff's case on jurisdictional grounds.

#### BY HOUSE, GROSSMAN & VORHAUS

Two cases of interest to the theatrical profession, involving the question of copyrights, have been recently decided by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, before Judges Ward, Howe and Wanton.

#### Copyright

The first involves the production of the play "Sweethearts." The hook was written by Fred de Gresac and Harry B. Smith and the music by Victor Herbert. Miss Christie McDonald was engaged in the stellar role and the production was under the management of Werba and Luescher. However, in 1912, de Gresac contracted with the managers to complete a scenario for this play which was then known as the "White Swan." Harry Blossom was her collaborator and the performing license was granted to the managers. The lyrics were blended into the book and in 1913 Harry B. Smith applied for a copyright to the opera, which was granted and issued to him. What had taken place, as the Court said, so far as the composition of the completed work was concerned, was that there was a confusion of literary labor contributed by independent efforts. De Gresac furnished the scenario, Smith the libretto and Victor Herbert the music. The question arose in litigation was whether the consent

to take out the copyright in the name of one person destroyed the interest of the others who jointly labored with him in the production of the play, and the Court decided that the consent to take out the copyright in the name of one person did not destroy the interest of the others who may have labored jointly with him, and that Mr. Harry B. Smith, although the holder of the record right of the copyright, holds the same for the benefit of all his collaborators.

#### Copyright of Photographs

The other case is the one of *Samuel Lemiere v. Pathe Exchange*. The facts are briefly as follows:

In 1918 Miss Cassinelli, a well-known moving picture actress, employed a publicity agent and at his suggestion had artistic photographs taken of herself to be used for publicity purposes. She went to Lemiere and bought 200 photographs. On each photograph the plaintiff had caused to be placed a notice of copyright. Thereafter Miss Cassinelli was engaged by Pathe Exchange as an actress in a motion picture called "The Unknown Love." The plaintiff sold one dozen of these photographs to the exchange. The latter subsequently inserted this picture as an advertisement in the April issue of the Motion Picture News, and caused the copyright notice to be removed from the picture and another's name to be placed thereon instead. This was held to be an illegal act and an infringement on the plaintiff's copyright. Of more importance, however, was the Court's holding that the plaintiff's copyright was established by the mere act of publication with notice of copyright and could not be declared void because not followed promptly by depositing copies with the Registrar in Washington, as required by the Act, the Court holding that the deposit is merely a condition precedent to the bringing of an action and that the copies may be deposited at any time before commencement of suit, but that an infringement of the copyright lies, even though no copies have been deposited.

#### Contracts With Stars

In *Shubert v. Rath Bros.*, the acrobatic talent of Rath Bros. has become a matter of judicial decision. They were engaged by Shuberts and subsequently broke their contract with them to take another employment. The managers thereupon brought an action to enjoin them from performing for anyone but themselves. They won their suit and the Court enjoined Rath Bros. Rath Bros. had contracted to work for Shubert and not to work for anyone else. Their agreement not to work for anyone else was sustained by the Court, which laid down the decision that before they will enjoin a star, the star must be one of the first magnitude. In other words, the services to be rendered must be of a unique character and the star must specifically agree not to work for anyone other than the contracting party. On the trial of the action it was sought to defeat the plaintiff's claim on the ground that the contract was void because it required the defendants to perform on Sunday, but as the contract made Sunday performances optional with Rath Bros., the Court sustained the contract and granted the Shuberts relief.

# J U D G M E N T

¶ Proper consideration has never been given in the film business to the fact that judgment is the most essential single item to be considered in any phase of the industry.

Much has been written and much has been said about what is wrong with the film business, this coming chiefly from the public, who cannot understand why they are forced to see so many productions which are not only mediocre but frequently bad. The reason for this, and the fundamental fault with the industry, is analyzed briefly and conclusively in the one phrase, "lack of judgment."

¶ Being a very young industry, the film business has remained in the hands of those who started with it, except in the few instances where large organizations have recently fallen into the grasp of Wall Street, which condition is, if anything, worse than the first, because Wall Street undoubtedly knows less about the show business than the daring adventurers who first broke into the film industry in the early days of the nickelodeon.

¶ When all is said and done, it is impossible to consider the film industry in any way except to divide it into three branches—production, sales and distribution, and exhibition. It is true that some producers have tried to exhibit, and some exhibitors have tried to produce, and it is a great misfortune that practically all distributors have produced.

¶ The fact is so fundamental that it is hardly necessary to discuss the statement that a sales machine should be selling product purely on its merit instead of considering the fact that bad pictures must be forced because the distributor had made production mistakes.

¶ The exhibitor has been improving steadily year after year; our theatres are certainly wonderfully different than what they were, and are getting better every day; and it is generally acknowledged that the form of presentation and the caliber of advertising are certainly improved.

¶ Let us consider, then, what has happened in the most important problem of all, that of production:

¶ We find that we are still laboring under the same faulty system of organization-made productions, with the men at the head of these organizations woefully lacking in the training and brains needed to give them the right to authoritatively pass on what will make an artistic success and what will be greeted by the American public as pleasing and worth-while entertainment.

¶ It is not particularly the fault, personally, of the men in charge of these corporations, because they have been so busy with the rapid turn of events that their hands have been quite filled with the task of keeping their organizations to-

gether; but it does seem to be certain that they should have devoted sufficient time to the analysis and study of the personnel of the industry to have been able to select men to work with them. who could, through proper training and experience, give the necessary and important judgment.

There are three items in production which make or break any film. In all of these three items the man who says yes or no in the final passing of opinions either makes or breaks a film—and these three items are: First, the selection of story; second, the selection of personnel to direct and portray that story, and third, and frequently most important of all, the judgment as to what portion of the film negative shall be retained for the final presentation to the public and what shall be eliminated, together with the proper writing and placing of titles. This includes the all-important main title for the production itself.

This matter of judgment, unfortunately, has frequently been in the hands of men not equipped for the work. They have been additionally handicapped by the fact that they have not known how to pick men to pass judgment for them. They have had to rely on opinions as to the merits of these helpers given them by associates, competitors and friends. Unfortunately, the film business has had the curse upon it of the "blood-is-thicker-than-water" method of using all of the relatives of the chief down to the forty-second cousin in various capacities, and almost every big corporation has also been throttled with the internal politics which invariably puts into positions of importance men absolutely incapable of efficiently holding down such positions, because of personal relationship or personal friendship.

Recently one or two of the biggest corporations have attempted to correct this fault, which has been recognized, by associating with their executives brains from the theatre and brains from the story telling field. It is a fact, however, that motion pictures are entirely different in form from either the theatre or the writing of books, and this new influx of really worth-while brains has been greatly befuddled by the difference in the mode of expression. These really brainy newcomers have also been placed in a position which quickly disgusted most of them in that after passing judgment they have been overruled by some "film man" of pitifully inferior judgment.

The larger corporations have also been fearfully handicapped by their attempt to make productions in a machine fashion, with a committee rule for judgment, this method having resulted in each member of the committee becoming a critic and tearing down rather than building, because each sought to dodge responsibility and hoped to place himself in the position of being able to say, "I told you so" when the production failed, as it generally did. As the head of the Baldwin Locomotive Works recently said, "You must either run a business or a debating society." He has con-

¶ conducted the Baldwin Locomotive Works for years, having started in the shops as a workman, on the plan of giving responsibility and depending on the judgment of the men who are responsible to carry through. He presents the unerring truth that a committee not only wastes time but generally finds out everything that might be the matter with the plan, method or definite undertaking, with the various members of the committee seldom able to agree on any one method of improvement.

¶ Gradually, within the past two or three years, the film business has been getting around to unit production instead of machine-made production, and it is being definitely proved that the unit idea is the only practical and sane solution of the production problem.

## STORIES

¶ The film industry has gone through several stages in the selection of stories for the screen. In the old days, which was not so many years ago, when two and three reels were "features," the director used to write his story on the back of an envelope the night before and go out and "shoot" his picture the next day. Then came a few attempts to make well known books and plays, which was followed by the mad scramble to produce anything which had been presented on Broadway or had been published. Some of our sheep in the film industry have not recovered from that obsession yet.

¶ We also had the period when thrills were the thing, and the period when vampires were the thing. To-day, if you will go through the list of current releases month after month, you will find that practically every large producing-distributing corporation is wandering around in circles, doing over and over again the things which have been done.

¶ It is more or less true that there is nothing new under the sun in the way of dramatic situations; but that is not what is chiefly wrong with the manner in which stories have been produced by the various corporations in the past few years. The chief fault has been simply this—someone in an organization, either the boss, some relative, or scenario chief, or ex-scenario chief, at some time, when in authority, bought a story. With that story a possession of the corporation it became necessary, in the mind of the head of the corporation, to produce it whether it was going to make a good picture or not, and frequently, very frequently in fact, that story was turned over to either a staff continuity man or a director, with the result that when it got to the screen it was something else again, but the man who had originally bought the story was vindicated because, after all, that "thing" had been produced.

It is a well known fact in every studio of a big corporation that story after story is forced into production despite the protests of the director, who is ordered, mind you, "ordered" to produce it. Rarely indeed is there any genuine co-ordination in the matter of allowing the director doing a particular type of thing to work on a certain story. The order of events has been for years that a certain number of stories have been bought by somebody, and as each director finished with his last production he was handed one of these "things" with instructions to make it; and when he protested he was called, in plain language, a temperamental nut.

The selection of the story is one of the first of three tremendously vital actions in the making of a successful production. Here judgment is supreme. And the selection of the story must be followed by the intelligent translation of that story into terms of the screen. There are few people indeed in the industry who do this with genuine and consistent success, and here, again, the matter of judgment in knowing when a story has been successfully translated is all important.

In selecting a story, or, after having selected the story, in deciding who is to produce the story, judgment becomes of tremendous importance, because the director must believe in a story if he is to get real results with it.

The matter of choosing personnel to portray really depends upon the director since that comes within his jurisdiction. But it is easy to understand how important the personnel of the players is to the successful production, and so the matter of judgment in first choosing the director himself assumes even greater proportions.

## CUTTING and EDITING

It would astound many people if they could really know just how many of the tremendously successful films have been made successes in the cutting room. It would also astound many to know how many productions have been ruined in the cutting.

In the making of a photo-play production it depends altogether upon the temperament of the director and the character of the story on which he is working just how much negative raw stock will be used in actually "shooting" the scenes and re-takes which are to be finally assembled and edited for the finished print.

Few people realize the importance of the task of eliminating the undesirable scenes and picking just the right shots which are to be assembled into the finished product. Many a good director is a miserable cutter in the final choice of the best scenes and in the matter of wording the sub-titles to be used in tying the production together intelligently.

- Judgment is the biggest item necessary for success, and here, as in other phases of the film industry, it becomes necessary to depend upon the judgment of one man. You cannot have real success with a committee editing a production. It is of course true that discussion is advisable, helpful and almost always brings good results, but when all opinions have been passed it is necessary for one person to say yes or no.

## WASTEFUL EXTRAVAGANCE

- Almost invariably when some business men from the outside world, or when Wall Street or when representatives of the Wall Street district break into the film business, we have wonderful press agent tales about how they intend to do away with wasteful extravagance in the production of motion pictures.
- As a matter of positive fact, it has been these same business men and Wall Street representatives, together with the big corporations, controlled by owners who sit back of mahogany desks in handling production activities, that have been chiefly, if not entirely, responsible for almost all the unnecessary waste and extravagance that has ever come into the film business.
- It is a well known fact to anyone who has ever given a bit of serious study to the film industry, that ninety per cent, and possibly more, of the men directing motion pictures are sincere, hard-working, honest individuals who want nothing more than a chance to win success, which to most of them means personal glory and the thrill of creation and achievement even more than financial reward.
- Analyze carefully, however, the position in which the business man has persistently placed his director, who is engaged on a salary and very frequently forced to do productions entirely disasteful. What is the natural result? The only way in which that director can hope to win fame is to make a big picture. When the story has not been of his own choosing he naturally feels that if he spends more money on this production he has a better chance of getting a big picture, and he only figures, quite naturally, that if he takes greater care, which means a longer time, that he will not only very probably get a better picture but will also (and they are all human) be sure that he is drawing salary for that many weeks.
- There in a nutshell is the answer to the waste and extravagance item. The only solution, of course, is to place the director in charge of production and give him a share of the proceeds of his picture so that he only earns in proportion to his ability to make good pictures economically.

¶ The corporation which is trying to produce pictures as a business and has built a big studio which must be kept active is, of course, at a tremendous disadvantage in that it must continually force activity whether the proper combination of story, director to do it and cast to play it come forth in proper time or not.

¶ It is certain to develop that some of the corporations now foundering under the terrific overhead of unnecessary studio space are going to try the unit production system, but they will not succeed, for two reasons: First, they will be unable to appreciate the fairness of giving the director a share of the profits which he deserves, and, second, they have too big a black mark against them in the many experiences of the past where they have been promised a share of the profits and failed to ever deliver same.

## THAT AWFUL OVERHEAD

¶ Exhibitors frequently wonder why they get so many bad pictures from corporations which should know better. The answer is, that those corporations are driven relentlessly by a gentleman who, to them, looks worse than a Russian Bolshevik, and his name is Overhead.

¶ Big producing-distributing corporations have built up two machines: One, an acreage of studio space; and the other, an expanse of sales and exchange offices. These machines demand fuel day and night, and that fuel is money. Business men who built these machines have been astoundingly successful in digging up new money, but, strange to say, have been woefully lacking in ability to hold in their organization the necessary brains to get those machines somewhere in a successful manner. They are really like a man who has two high power racing cars that are running constantly, with the result that he is so busy keeping those cars filled with gas that he has not sense enough to notice that the men in charge of the cars are running them consistently in circles without ever getting anywhere or doing anything of consequence with them.

¶ It is unnecessary to point out that there are too many exchanges in every exchange city in this country. That is an acknowledged fact. The reason is, that each little boss in New York has insisted upon having his own producing and distributing machine. In the same way, there is ten times as much studio space in this country as will ever again be needed, with an appalling lot of it at present vacant; and this is due to the same reason exactly, that each corporation thought it had to build its own studio.

¶ The overhead of these two machines has been responsible for the appalling amount of mediocre and bad films that have been foisted upon the American public in the last few years. The little bosses of the various corporations are unable to understand that they are running round in rings; and when occasionally they stumble on a good production, which is always made in spite of them by an individual director, then they begin to think that their genius is being rewarded.

¶ The answer is, that there has never been a big, truly successful film production from an artistic and financial viewpoint that has ever been built in an organization studio unless it was done by an individual director who absolutely defied the organization in doing it.

## THE STAR SYSTEM

¶ Probably no one item in the film industry has been commented on as much as the much cursed and discussed star system. Recently the star system has become rather a thing of the past, and many reasons have been given as to the why for of this.

¶ It is a very simple matter. The producers found that when they did happen to make a good picture in which a star appeared they could not sell it for any more than the bad ones and, unfortunately, they found that the preponderance of bad star pictures was becoming so noticeable that frequently they could not sell a star at all; not because of anything the star had done, but principally because of the very bad pictures in which the star had been presented. Like a rotten apple spoils all the rest in the barrel—a star series has always suffered from the bad films the star made.

¶ We have never had a great many real stars in the film business. The greater majority of the so-called stars have been principally the product of press agent work and advertising. The few real stars who have won their success by the magnetism of their personality are still successful as stars, although they also have learned the lesson that after all production itself is of first importance.

¶ The star system as a system has fallen by the wayside in the steady march of the film industry because it was fundamentally faulty. The new era brings a situation where productions themselves sell on their merits and stars attract in proportion to their personality, and particularly in proportion to the success with which that personality has been properly presented in the particular production under consideration.





# The Foreign Market

## The Outlook

The quality of American made motion picture productions has been their telling factor in the international markets. It is quality that has placed our features, our comedies and other short length subjects in the theaters of both hemispheres and on both sides of the equator.

Quality in studio production is made possible through the judicious application of ample investment. The money to invest should come from the sales of the pictures themselves. That country which derives the largest returns on its output will continue to make the most excelling productions—and because of its steadily developing and numerically greater theater field, the United States finds its producers most favored in this important matter of revenue from within its own territories. Our studios will therefore continue in the future, as now, the dwelling place of quality—with all that that means to the export markets.

It is true that the present rate of exchange permits productions to be made abroad for less money than in this country. Nevertheless this advantage to the foreign producer is but relative and will dwindle in importance with the improvement in the balance of international finance.

Mediocre pictures are today manufactured in every country abroad where there are studios in operation. It is not necessary to come to New York or America for this class—and that condition is both natural and beneficial.

But quality productions, and I make it my business to deal in these only, now have, long have had and always will have a ready market abroad. And to America the world's film buying fields rightly look for the best in films.

## Should Watch South America

During the last six months the only South American territories which showed any real activity were Argentine, Chile and Uruguay.

Brazil has almost entirely ceased buying any American films. This is easily understood in view of the fact that Brazilian money today is worth only one-third of its par value in dollars. A year ago Brazil showed about 85% American films as against 15% of other productions, while today the proportion is reversed. The public in Brazil would be glad to see the return of American films on account of their general superiority, but the distributors and exhibitors claim that they cannot even get their money back at the prevailing prices. Something should be done by American producers to handle this situation, so that American films shall retain their present position in Brazil. When conditions will again be straightened out in Brazil the American producers will have no regrets at having retained control of this important market.

In Argentina there is a strong demand for films better than the ordinary program picture. The public taste has been refined by the superiority of recent American productions and "any old thing" will not suffice in the future. The public knows what it wants and will have it. There is an increasing demand for big pictures and it is a noteworthy fact that some of the outstanding productions of the last year which have received marked approval in the United States have also met with great success in Argentina, Chile and Uruguay. Among such films are a number of European productions. American producers should study this fact as these productions may be obtained much more cheaply than the prices Americans would ask for films of equal grade.

In summing up, I may say that there is a great demand throughout South America for good films of the type made in this country. The exchange conditions make it more profitable for South American concerns to obtain their programs in Europe at the present time. American producers should endeavor to meet this situation in order to maintain their position in Latin America.

In my judgment the outlook for foreign business for the forthcoming year is very promising.

On careful analysis I find a steadily increasing foreign market for high-class American productions, despite the present adverse rates of exchange and the very much talked about competition of foreign made pictures.

I base my reason for coming to this conclusion upon the fact that foreign exhibitors have found that American pictures appeal to their public, and that they are beyond question their most consistent box office attractions.

## An Optimistic View

I am of the opinion that economic conditions abroad as they exist these days can hardly be worse than they are. The period of readjustment to normal has been in progress in most parts for nearly two years and is slowly but surely reaching the turning point. Business during the 1921 and 1922 season should not only be bigger because of the better economic outlook, but also for the very good reason that the old stock of pictures is being gradually absorbed and foreign distributors will find it necessary to take on new material.

## Expects Continuation of Poor Business

Film export business in 1921 was very bad, especially to Europe; the Central Powers, with exception of Czecho Slovakia, have only taken a few films.

The outlook for 1922 is not splendid and to my opinion business will not be much better than it was in 1921. The economic conditions in Europe are still very bad and unless the unemployment question will soon be solved, the amusement business is bound to suffer. Wages in all industries will have to be adjusted.

A further cause which might affect the export of films from the U. S. may be the new import duty ad valorem on foreign made pictures, and I am afraid that countries like England, France, Italy and Germany will reciprocate and make higher duties for American made films.

Film exporters in New York will face very difficult times in 1922 and I think that they will have to accept considerably less prices for many territories, if not for all foreign territories, to remain in existence.

¶ The star system was a mistake because the poor star or near-star was forced to carry the burden of fearfully bad production, since the corporation employing the star generally lacked brain power sufficient to understand the necessity of giving any star, big or little, proper support in the way of story, director and cast. Many prospective stars and many stars of real merit from the speaking stage received a fearful setback in their first work on the screen because of bone-headed judgment in the matter of selecting story, director and cast. Some of these prospective stars have eventually been able to get a fair opportunity and win a certain degree of success, and some of the speaking stage personalities have been able to come back with better opportunities after their first failures. But in many instances these prospective stars and speaking stage stars were fearfully handicapped, so far as the screen might be concerned, by these early mistakes in judgment.

¶ In the future productions will be sold as productions, and the presence of personalities will be an incidental matter varying in importance with the actual importance of that particular personality to the particular production being considered.

## CANNOT CONTROL BRAINS

¶ Many times the old cry of a film trust has been heard in the land; Wall Street is dreaming dreams today. There isn't a chance.

¶ It is an old story and has been often sung, that money can buy anything. It cannot buy the film business.

¶ The youth of the film industry has in many ways been a curse. It is this very youth, however, that will always save it from the Wall Street octopus. You cannot corner brains.

¶ The number of people capable of creating quality motion pictures is very limited indeed. For the most part they have been under-paid despite the fact that some get salaries tremendously out of proportion to salaries paid in other industries. That item of payment is the item that will always block big business from owning the film industry. It is a well known fact that the mahogany desk executives have consistently insisted upon drawing anywhere from one thousand to five thousand a week in salary themselves just because they had to pay big money to individuals who made films for them. They could not understand how any man who worked for them could be worth more money per week than they personally might be worth.

- ¶ No big corporation controlled by Wall Street interests will ever give the creator of film productions the proportion of the profits that he has coming to him. This year there has been a concerted effort to hire and develop underlings in order to force the more capable creators to better payment terms. The result has been a flood of pictures even worse than the casual run. You cannot make a director of motion pictures over night, and authority and money are certainly the last bit of equipment necessary for the creator of truly great film entertainment.
- ¶ Forget the fancy headline. The film business will never be in the hands of a film trust.

## THE THEATRE BUGABOO

- ¶ When it comes to propaganda the Germans were pikers alongside some of our prominent officials (we cannot call them executives) of various big film corporations. For the past two years a strenuous effort has been made to create the impression that the independent producer was absolutely at the mercy of the big corporations because the big corporations controlled theatres.
- ¶ As recently as last week reports were being actively circulated of the possible coalition of two or three big corporations, each of which controls a few score theatres. These reports were circulated for the benefit of directors who considered independent production decidedly more desirable than the slave-driving, bad judgment methods of certain corporations.
- ¶ The ridiculous part of this propaganda is the plain fact that within the past year it has been conclusively demonstrated in more than a score of cities that control of theatres by producing corporations is decidedly a liability rather than an asset. If you are uncertain as to this, talk with anyone on the inside of any of these big corporations and get the facts.
- ¶ Every corporation owning theatres has had to book within the past year independent and outside productions in order to avoid constant loss at the box office. An even more important development has been the demonstration that in any city in the country a successful production carrying the proper appeal can do a wonderful business in any kind of a theatre, with the result that the bugaboo of the monopoly of the first run houses has been put very decidedly in the discard because a producer can get more money for his film by running it six weeks in a small house than he can by running it one week in a very big house. This has resulted in the opening of hundreds of small capacity houses in the key cities of the country where worth-while films are shown for several weeks instead of for one week in the big houses.

### The Beaverbrook Idea

In April, in London, Lord Beaverbrook presented the following resolutions to a number of important English exhibitors:

1. That it is desirable that exhibitors bind themselves to cease booking films for release after August 31, 1922, pending a general arrangement for limiting the booking of films for release within six months after the trade view.

2. That it is desirable that exhibitors should reject entirely the systems of block booking and of booking films for release on date already covered by existing bookings.

3. That it is desirable that exhibitors should make a request for an immediate reduction of 25 per cent on the price of existing bookings.

4. That the committee, subject to alteration by the Cinematograph Exhibitors' Association, consisting of Councillor MacDonald, Mr. Davis of Cardiff, F. E. Adams, I. Davis of Marble Arch, V. Sheridan, Mr. Freeman, E. E. Lyons and Lord Beaverbrook, which has already had this matter in hand, should be asked to continue its activity

in order to carry the policy embodied in these resolutions into effect.

These resolutions were adopted by the delegates of the general council of the Cinematograph Exhibitors' Association who were present at the meeting.

English opinion, as voiced in the British Trade Journals, had it that Beaverbrook was interested in the formation of a First National organization, and for that reason was desirous of cancelling existing contracts between British exhibitors and important American producers.

Wid's Daily, on June 6th, published a letter forwarded to it by F. E. Adams, managing director of the Provincial Cinematograph Theaters, Ltd., the important English theater circuit in which Lord Beaverbrook is financially interested. Mr. Adams, in his letter, said for himself and Beaverbrook that they were not interested in the formation of a distributor-exhibitors company, as had been reported. Adams maintained that Beaverbrook's resolutions were set forth in an effort to eliminate the pernicious British block-booking system, which prevented exhibitors in England from showing new attractions unless at the expense of shelving an old picture to play the new one.

Previous to this, David P. Howells, foreign representative for First National returned from an extensive stay in Europe, and brought back with him the announcement that important English exhibitors, including the P. C. T., were very much interested in the formation of a British First National.

- ¶ The independent producer of quality films need never fear any possible control of the film business, because money cannot corner brains, and the purchase of theatre property can never stop, can never reach the proportions of making it impossible for an independent producer to find good theatres in which to run his product, because it has been demonstrated that the small houses invariably bring a larger revenue to the producer from a really good production than do the big houses.

## MACHINE-MADE VS. HAND-MADE

- ¶ It is a fact that no producing-distributing organization selling machine-made product has ever turned out a big, outstanding success from that machine. It is the old story of the difference between the machine-made and hand-made product.
- ¶ Some corporations realizing that they were only turning out mediocre caliber product began to buy theatres two years ago, with the result today that the theatre properties are giving them tremendous worry and making their bank accounts look very sick, because they quickly learned that they could not force the public to pay their good money for bad pictures, just because Mr. Producer chose to run them in his own theatre.
- ¶ The fault with machine-made product has always been the lack of capable judgment and the failure to understand the sincerity of the creator, who can only do his best work with something he believes in.
- ¶ It is hard to understand a method which would force directors to produce picture after picture which they considered rotten before they started. And yet, the big corporations have proceeded to do that year after year. The executives in charge have generally forced the issue because they considered the directors a lot of over-paid nuts who should be told what to do instead of consulted with.
- ¶ It is a fact that whenever in the history of this business a big corporation has held for distribution a very successful production they have done so absolutely in spite of themselves. The biggest money making film ever sent through a corporation distributing organization was made outside their studios, and half of the organization were bitterly opposed to taking it in. There are several other instances where corporations have declared positively against releasing productions which afterwards became their most noteworthy successes. Two of these were "Humoresque," which was debated over for many months before finally presented to the public, and "Where Are My Children," which Universal wanted to sell for a song before releasing. Some of the big corporations are leaning toward unit production but lack the foresight to freely give the creator his proper portion of his well-earned profits, with the result that they are still wondering why they cannot get better results.

# Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce Reports

## AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND

Statistics sent in by Consul Norton and Winslow, at Sydney, Australia, and Auckland, New Zealand, respectively, show that the majority of motion-picture films imported by the two Dominions come from the United States, with Great Britain the next country of export. Ninety per cent of the films displayed in New Zealand are supplied by the United States. Australia imports some from France and small portions from a few other countries.

## BRAZIL

According to an official report, 351 motion-picture films, totaling 411,680 meters, received from 78 different companies, were censored during the first quarter of 1921; 240 of these censored films were American, 47 German, 37 Italian, 10 French, 5 Brazilian, 4 Danish, 4 Portuguese, 2 English, and 2 Austrian.

## CHINA

The office of the commercial attache at Peking is constantly receiving requests from commercial organizations, colleges, schools, and Young Men's Christian Associations for motion-picture films of a commercial and industrial type. Mr. Arnold believes that American firms should know of this demand and send such films through their representatives in China. His office could distribute them most effectively. In view of the fact that only a small percentage of the people of China can read or write, even their own language, the motion picture is peculiarly adapted for advertising purposes, and at present it is the only way short of an actual demonstration of the products themselves by which American manufacturers can make their goods known. The value of films would be greatly increased by the insertion of Chinese subtitles.

## ENGLAND

Suggested Reform of British Motion-Picture System. By Alfred Nutting, clerk in American consulate general, London.: For some time past comments have appeared in the London press respecting proposed alterations in the system of releasing and booking motion-picture film. The

most recent statements refer to the matter as a controversy which, in the result, "will affect the whole future of the industry"—which has been lately suffering from a slump in audiences, a circumstance only partly traceable to the general depression.

It is contended by the reformers that the present system of releasing and booking films precludes the showing of up-to-date and first-class productions, and they desire that the date shall be hastened for the public exhibition of pictures; and further, that the block-booking system shall be abolished. At present, it is stated, two years or more may elapse between the date at which a film is shown to the trade and that at which it is released for theater exhibition. The custom has been for the press to publish descriptions of the film at the trade showing, but not when released for public exhibition; while in very many cases the "atmosphere" of the film has passed at the latter date, and the film loses its drawing power in consequence.

Concerning the block-booking system, it is complained that by this method films are booked for a series of years ahead before they are actually produced and consequently before the trade has had an opportunity of judging them; when they are ultimately produced and released for exhibition, cinematograph proprietors find themselves loaded up with "dud" films. It is reported that a powerful agitation is on foot to completely alter the system, the principal opposition coming from the motion-picture trade journals. At a recent meeting of the shareholders of the Provincial Cinematograph Theaters (Ltd.), the chairman expressed views strongly in favor of reforms; this concern is one of the largest combinations of motion-picture theaters, owning some 72 halls, one of which is capable of accommodating over 2,500 patrons at a time.

## British Foreign Trade in Films

The appended statement shows the number of linear feet and value thereof of motion-picture films imported into and exported from the United Kingdom during the calendar years 1918, 1919, and 1920.

It may be stated, in conclusion, that British films are being exhibited in this country in far greater numbers than has hitherto been the case.

## Exhibitors Form Cooperative Society

It is stated that there are 4,000 motion picture theaters in the British Isles, but that it is a rare thing for a first-class picture to get into more than 800 of them. While the war was in progress the theaters were crowded with people glad to go to see anything; but this spirit is gradually undergoing a change, and the public is now demanding the best that can be produced. This

feeling is becoming so pronounced that exhibitors, especially those who have booked pictures in blocks, are growing perturbed and are seeking means to gratify the changing public demand. To this end a number of the most prominent film exhibitors of the country have formed a cooperative organization to be known as the Exhibitors' Cooperative Association of Great Britain and Ireland (Ltd.), to buy and distribute their own pictures.

The society's registered address is No. 6 Princess St., Hanover Square, in the County of Lon-



don, and the membership enrollment is already over 300, with prospects that the 1,000 mark will shortly be reached. A statement popular in the press is to the effect that one of the objects of this new company is to prepare against the possibility of being forced by American organizations, as well as other circumstances, either to accept the "sharing terms" system of booking films or to go without the better class pictures.

A further object of the association is stated to be that of fostering British production, as it hopes in a short time to be in a position to finance British work on a big scale. The promoters say that this is the first real step in the direction of guarding the picture theater against absorption by combines of producers and distributors who are planning to capture the British kinemas.

#### SWITZERLAND

Motion pictures have not, as yet, penetrated to all sections of Switzerland, but reports show that progress is being made from day to day. The war had a very stimulating effect upon the industry, all the belligerent countries having used this means for propaganda work; and while no one can state what effect this propaganda had upon individual opinion regarding the war, it has had the result of converting the people to this form of amusement. Switzerland possesses to-day a relatively small number of motion-picture theaters and none at all of any great seating capacity. As a result, the smaller houses are very well patronized and their owners are apparently making large profits.

#### Licenses—Imports of Films

It is not possible to state the average weekly cost of running a motion picture theater in Switzerland, this being naturally dependent upon the size and location. The license, necessary to operate, costs from 1,500 to 2,000 francs per year, the latter being for a theater having a capacity of 500 seats. In some towns a graduated tax is levied upon the entrance fees. The license can be revoked at any time.

The production of motion pictures has not been undertaken to any extent in Switzerland, there being at the present time but one concern and it is not important. Films are imported into this country under paragraph 902 of the Swiss customs tariff, which imposes a duty of 30 francs per 220 pounds gross, and requires also the net weight and value to be stated. This paragraph of the tariff also covers photographic negatives, positives and projection pictures on glass or gelatine. The total quantity imported during 1918 was 3,900 kilos (kilo equals 2.2 lbs.) having a value of 149,578 francs. The greater portion came from Germany and France. During the first six months of 1919, 2,800 kilos, having a value of 85,575 francs, were imported (as against 1,800 kilos valued at 84,519 francs during the same period of 1918), of which 23,000 kilos came from Germany and 500 kilos from France.

#### American Films Reproduced in France—Are Growing Popular in Switzerland

In view of the great number of American films being shown in Switzerland at present, the foregoing scarcely gives a clear idea of the amount of these films imported; and it should be borne in mind also that films coming from France are, in many instances, reproductions of American films made at the French agencies of the American producers.

There are a number of film exchanges in Switzerland which conduct their business along lines very similar to those followed in the United States. They lease from the producer, and, in certain cases, have purchased outright the sole rights for presentation in this country. A well-known agency in Geneva is reported to have recently paid 80,000 francs for the sole Swiss rights to two American feature films produced several years ago in the United States. It is stated by men engaged in the business that the American product is fast overcoming all competition. The European producer does not seem to pay such close attention to minor details as does the American. The European picture lacks action; the scenario, often taken from some published literary work, is long drawn out and lacking in interest,

although the settings are magnificent. American films are winning the theatergoers because they are lively and full of action, the comedy is clean and wholesome and rarely tends to vulgarity, and minor details are supplied which convince the spectator that no expense has been spared to entertain him. It is not strange to hear loud applause from an audience when notice is thrown on the screen that one of the well-known American film stars is on the program for the coming week.

#### Film Rentals—Government Censorship

The independent theaters lease their films at prices ranging from 0.40 francs to 2 francs per meter (meter equals 3.28 feet) per week, but for special features a percentage of the gross receipts of the theater is demanded. As in the United States, the age of the film affects the price. The practice of having a regular program at a fixed rental is not followed in this country. The exchanges buy the films, with exclusive display rights, from the producing companies (generally only one copy, as the territory is small) and hold the person showing the films responsible for their safe return to the exchange. Worn-out films are destroyed when beyond repair, but the purchasing exchange has the right to make reproductions if it so desires.

Each new film requires the approval of a Government censor in each city or canton before it can be shown. This service must be paid for in some places, while in others it is given free. No special days are fixed for the release of new films as in the United States, but, naturally, the importing exchanges give their own theaters first call. Advertising matter must be paid for by the theaters.

#### FINLAND

There are about 100 motion picture theaters in Finland. The average seating capacity of those in Helsingfors, the capital and largest city, with a population of 187,137, is about 300. The next cities in size and importance are Abo (population 54,421), Tammerfors (population 44,321), and Viborg (population 25,782), in each of which there are several picture theaters. They are also to be found in most of the large towns.

#### Methods of Purchasing and Importing Films

All American films used in Finland are bought in Copenhagen or in Stockholm from the different American agents for Scandinavia. Contracts for picture films are usually made in June or July for the following season, which begins in August or September. Importers usually buy only one print, as it does not pay to buy more where such a limited demand exists as in Finland. This is used a week at a time by the different theaters.

The subjects most in favor are well-known historical dramas, and society, comedy, detective and cowboy dramas, comedies, cartoons, serials, etc., in about the order mentioned. The pictures preferred here are American, Swedish, Danish and German, in the order mentioned.

The import duty on films is 10.50 marks (Finnish mark equals \$0.193 at normal exchange) per kilo (kilo equals 2.2 pounds). It is levied on both the film and the container. The duty on advertising material is 9 marks per kilo. Advertising material may be packed with the films. Invoices may be made in English.

#### BELGIUM

In the motion picture field there are some opportunities for development in this country. American films are widely shown here, and are for the most part extremely popular. They are generally distributed from agencies in Paris which have the combined rights for France and Belgium, or are authorized to sub-let the films to minor Belgian distributors. I consider it a safe estimate that three-quarters of all films shown in Belgium are of American origin. There are some 1,200 moving picture theaters in the country, but of these only three, one at Brussels, one at Antwerp and one at Liege, can be considered modern in installations and comfort. It is my personal conviction that a chain of modern moving picture houses in the large cities (Antwerp, Brussels, Bruges, Liege, Ghent and possibly Charleroi) would be a money making proposition. The newest and most modern moving picture theater in Brussels, which is itself owned by an American,

turns away crowds every night. One difficulty is that a large number of the films shown here are antiques which have been shown in the States some years back, but are considered by American exporters apparently good enough for the poor European.

I do not think the proposition of producing films in Belgium is a promising one, because, aside from the initial expense of installation and building up a cast, you would also have to create a sales force and compete with the established American film companies, whose products are well distributed throughout Western Europe. On the other hand, the organization of a film distributing agency in Brussels to work Belgium and Holland, and to some extent the occupied territory of Germany, seems to me worthy of consideration, since all American films arrive here second hand. Programs are changed in Brussels cinemas on Fridays, and on that day the theater owners from the provinces come up to the capital and purchase films, so that an organized market already exists here in case fresh films should be brought in from the States. There are no motion picture producing houses of any importance in Belgium, and the only Belgian films shown are those of the Government cinema service with production mainly of weeklies. If one were to establish a producing organization in Belgium, there is plenty of labor of which one could dispose, as, particularly in construction work, lack of employment is very widespread.

#### Brussels

American motion pictures have proved extremely popular in Belgium, and are at the present time shown regularly at most of the best Belgian picture theaters. Films are generally purchased in Belgium with an exclusive right (monopoly) clause secured by contract. The duration of this contract is, as a rule, from three to five years. Quotations are preferred per meter, that being the unit of measurement of the country. Belgian purchasers seldom desire more than two copies of a film. Comedies are usually purchased in a single copy, while dramas which promise to be sufficiently interesting are taken in duplicate. The usual price of single copies of ordinary films is 1.50 to 1.75 francs per meter. The number of reels in a drama is said to be of no great importance; the feature films, however, are generally in the vicinity of 1,500 meters in length. Comedies range from 500 to 800 meters. Films in episodes (serial pictures) are proving popular in Belgium, especially in the provincial districts. There is at present no censor for motion pictures in Belgium, but the advisability of appointing one is being strongly urged by the Chamber of Deputies.

Films dealing with religion, except when well handled from the broad standpoint of Christianity in general, are not in demand. Themes involving political questions, drunkenness, murders, etc., are not popular. It is exceedingly rare that films of the war are met with favor, the public having ceased to demand pictures of that sort. The most popular screen subjects in Belgium at this time in the approximate order of their appeal are: (1) society dramas, especially when rich in luxurious scenes, furnishings, etc.; (2) melodramas with rapid, forceful action; (3) comedies, particularly the exceedingly comical variety; (4) dramatic comedies with rapid action; (5) Far West (cow-boy) scenes, if low in price; (6) detective dramas in a limited number, and (7) series pictures at a moderate price. Dramas with wild animals, as well as circus pictures, are also in moderate demand. American films have been well received in Belgium. During the war many French firms purchased American films, with exclusive rights for France and Belgium, and all these films have been introduced on the Belgian market since the armistice. French films are well known, also, and there is a limited number received from Italy, Norway, Sweden and Denmark. At the present time no German films are on the market, but it is predicted that two or three strong German producers will make every effort to regain their former business here.

The best known and most-used projectors are those manufactured by the French firms of Pathe, Gaumont, and the German firm of Hermemann. The writer has been informed that Belgium offers

an excellent market for American projection apparatus if it can be handled through a depot in Brussels, carrying a small but representative stock.

The Belgian motion-picture industry is organized under the *Chambre Syndicale de la Cinematographie*, Palais de la Bourse de Commerce, Brussels. Practically all Belgian motion-picture men are members of this organization.

#### FRANCE

There are about 4,500 motion picture theaters in France, including the halls and fairs devoted to this form of amusement at fairs and expositions. The seating capacity of French motion picture houses varies. It ranges from theaters of 500 to 600 seats in the country towns and small cities to theaters in Paris and in the large cities of the provinces which have a seating capacity of from 1,500 to 2,000 places. The Gaumont Palace at Paris is the largest motion picture theater in France, having a capacity of 6,000 persons.

The number of daily performances in Paris, for example, is arranged in two different ways. A small number of theaters on the main thoroughfares give performances known as "permanents," which begin at one thirty or two o'clock in the afternoon, and terminate at eleven o'clock at night. Generally speaking, two hours is the average length of each performance. In the other Parisian theaters performances are held every evening, with a matinee on Thursdays, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

The kinds of films used vary according to the people who attend the performance. The average program may be described as follows: an outdoor film of from 125 to 150 meters; a news film of about 125 meters; a comedy film of about 300 meters; and a drama film, of a total length of from 1,500 to 1,800 meters, divided in parts of 300 meters each. It is becoming more and more the custom to enliven the performances with various attractions such as songs, gymnastics, sports, and dances, which generally save about 300 meters of film in each performance.

The Monthly Summary of the Foreign Commerce of the United States furnishes the following data relative to the export of films from this country to France during the past two years: (in linear feet). During 1919, 358,645 linear feet, valued at \$55,227; during 1920, 925,957 linear feet, valued at \$36,678.

The types of American motion pictures which meet with the greatest popularity in theaters in the Bordeaux section are: (1) comedies and farces, particularly those which contain scenes of great animation, (2) Outdoor dramas of the western plains, (3) Dramas which portray life in industrial centers. French audiences also display great interest in highly emotional portrayals of family life, wherein the motives of jealousy, love, and revenge are allowed full play. Particular mention should be made of the deep admiration which French audiences manifest towards films which contain dramatizations of 17th and 18th century romances. In this connection it is also pointed out that French spectators are extremely critical and observant of details, a fact which American producers should keep in mind to avoid anachronisms as the use of modern army revolvers by cavaliers of the Napoleonic era.

Detective dramas which require seven or eight performances for completion of the story are at present very much in vogue in cinema theaters. The element of suspense must be well sustained in films of this type, and the end of each serial presentation should be of such an exciting nature, as to arouse the curiosity of the audience in the subsequent chapter.

The French import duty on exposed motion picture film amounts at the present time (May 4, 1920), to 264 francs per 100 kilos, net weight. At the normal rate of exchange of 19c to a franc, this duty is equivalent to \$23.10 per 100 lbs.

The Franco-American Cinematograph Corporation, with a capital of a million dollars, has been incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware. It is announced that the Corporation will unite French and American interests and facilitate the exchange of films between the United States and France.



With the exception of theaters owned by film manufacturers, the motion picture houses in the Marseilles district rent their films from local distributors, who handle the entire business in their districts as sub-agents of Paris representatives of the manufacturers. American manufacturers should not expect to do any direct business with the owners or managers of local theaters. The films are rented on a program basis, their total length varying from 2,750 to 3,300 yards. The programme is usually divided into two parts. The following is a popular arrangement, 1st part comprising news or open air film; a brief drama or sentimental comedy; and a burlesque of about 600 yards; second part, episode or dramas, about 1,500 yards in length. The dramas that require a large number of performances are in greatest demand. The programme is usually taken for a week, but in the larger houses for only 3 or 4 days. For this section, the episode film is absolutely necessary. In order to meet the demands of the trade, three films of 10 to 14 episodes per year should be distributed, the first film in September, the second about November 15, and the last at the end of January. The American films are now, and have been for some time, the most popular in this district, and several well-known American makes are represented in this district. French and Italian films are next in importance.

### ALGERIA

The motion picture has spread extensively over Algeria and has become a very popular amusement among all classes of the population, among the Arabs as well as Europeans, alike in the smaller towns and principal cities. Theaters and other places of recreation are not numerous in the present state of development of the country, but the cinematograph has established itself in most of the principal centers of population and, considering the population, wealth and growth of Algeria, promises to make still more rapid progress in the future as the people's chief form of diversion. In the year 1914, there were about 200 motion picture houses in Algeria, and many others were about to be established when the war began and arrested development.

In Algiers, the metropolis, there are at present a dozen establishments, several of which, in size and attractiveness, will compare favorably with picture houses in France or America. Oran and Constantine, the next largest cities, have also a number of picture houses, but the large exploitation is to be found in the smaller cities and towns, scattered throughout the country, where other forms of amusement are few or practically non-existent. There are in all some 700 centers of population which should eventually be supplied with the motion picture.

In considering the Algerian market, it should be remembered that the native Arabs and Berbers largely predominate. The latest census (1911), gave a European population of 732,043, in a total of 5,492,569. The Europeans are almost entirely of Latin origin, and come from the adjacent northern shores of the Mediterranean, the Spanish constituting the chief European element in Western Algeria, and the Italians being especially numerous in the east. It follows naturally therefore that films Latin in theme and temperament should be most in vogue and that those most shown are of French and Italian origin.

The films reach the local market for the most part through the medium of the large Paris houses, which have their own agencies in Algiers, among the best-known being Pathe, Gaumont, and the "Agence Generale Cinematographique." The local agents furnish their customers with complete programs, varying from 2,200 to 2,600 meters. Ordinary films, for a first showing in the country, are generally paid for at the rate of 30 centimes (\$0.058) per meter (3.28) feet. For subsequent showings, the price is reduced, ranging from 15 centimes (\$0.029) down to 5 centimes (\$.0097) and even less. Extraordinary attractions command very good prices, such, for example, as Quo Vadis, Forfaiture and Cabiria. One film recently rented for 3,500 francs, (\$675.50). The highest price ever paid in Algeria, for one of the well-known large productions for a period of two

weeks, said to have been 12,000 francs (\$2,316). The films are very seldom bought outright; the almost universal practice being to rent for a certain period.

### STRAITS SETTLEMENTS

In the motion-picture business of Singapore and the Federated Malay States, which, according to Consul Dickinson, of Singapore, has grown into as prosperous and successful an industry as in other parts of the world, American films are gaining in favor and are far more popular than those of European manufacture. Most of the theaters have full orchestras and give two performances nightly of about two hours each at prices ranging from 8 cents to \$1.15, United States currency. Good comedies and serials are especially in demand, and in view of the fact that a tendency exists among a certain class of dealers to accept films of a questionable character, which results in detriment to the business, it seems justifiable that American manufacturers should grant distribution of their products exclusively to first-class and reliable firms. In establishing this trade in these markets special precaution should be observed in packing films and film-projection equipment, which should always be accompanied by instructions regarding its installation, for attention to such details is essential if dissatisfaction is to be avoided.

### POLAND

While the British makers appear to be making strenuous efforts to capture the market, American films are beginning, although only beginning, to acquire a strong hold on the favor of the Polish theater-going public.

"It may be said in general that, after the Polish films themselves, the productions of French and Italian makers are most popular in Poland. Soon after the Poles had set up their own independent state, German and Hungarian films, and later Danish ones, went out of favor. At first only an occasional American film was seen and that of the second (even third or fourth) hand and of the "blood and thunder" variety.

"A number of excellent films with purely Polish subjects were very popular during the early days of the war with the Bolsheys last year. These Polish pictures covered a very wide range and variety of subjects drawn from the most stirring events of Polish national history and literature, and featured the most attractive scenes and panoramas afforded by the natural beauties of the land. The government took an active part in their preparation.

"There are, according to recently issued figures of the licensing bureau, some 350 movie theaters in Poland today. In general, the program is changed twice a week. Admittance charges vary according to a locality and according to the falling of the Polish mark. A municipality tax of 100% is levied on all tickets.

"As to other government regulations, there is the censorship, the customs duty, and in Warsaw certain very stringent rules issued by the police authorities with regard to hours of opening and closing—this in order to conserve electricity during the present coal shortage.

"The present custom duty on films is 5,000 marks in gold for 100 kilograms in weight, the duty being levied on the films alone, not on the subject. There is no duty on film advertising material. Custom house invoices must be made out in Polish. Films are usually bought by the meter or with a license for Poland. It is obligatory that films be packed in tin containers separately from advertising material. Dealers usually buy not only for their own particular districts but for sale or lease throughout Poland.

### DANZIG

"What is reported to be the first moving picture factory in the Free City territory has recently been established at Zoppot near Danzig, under the name of Gedaniafilm Gesellschaft m. b. H. The concern is said to have its own studio with a floor-space of 450 square meters and to be supplied with the necessary technical equipment. A copying plant is being installed and it is also planned to open a school for the instruction of players, this being found necessary owing to the lack of experienced actors in the vicinity."

Trade Commissioner Louis E. Van Norman, Warsaw, says: A study of the market for motion-picture films in Poland shows that, although the British manufacturers appear to be making strenuous efforts to capture the market, American films are beginning to acquire a strong hold on the Polish theater-going public. After the Polish films themselves, the production of French and Italian makers are most popular in Poland. Soon after the Poles had set up their own independent States, German and Hungarian films went out of favor.

A number of excellent films with purely Polish subjects have been very popular. The Government has taken an active interest in their preparation. If one may judge from the response of the audiences in the large cities, such as Warsaw, Krakow, Posen, and Lwów, sensational dramas, with elaborate staging, are most in favor at present. There must be a story with a plot and plenty of action.

There are, according to recently issued figures of the licensing bureau, some 350 motion-picture theaters in Poland to-day. In general the program is changed twice a week. Admittance charges vary according to locality and to the fluctuation of the Polish mark. A municipality tax of 100 per cent is levied on all tickets.

#### Government Regulations—Customs Duties

As to other Government regulations, there are the censorship, the customs duty, and, in Warsaw, certain very stringent rules, issued by the police authorities, with regard to hours of opening and closing for the conservation of electricity during the present coal shortage.

The present customs duty on films is 5,000 marks in gold for 100 kilos (kilo=2.2 pounds) in weight, the duty being levied on the films alone, not on the subject. There is no duty on film-advertising material. Films are usually bought by the meter under a license for Poland. It is obligatory that films be packed in tin containers separately from advertising material. Dealers usually buy not only for their own particular district but for sale or lease throughout Poland.

**Constantinople:** The first cinema, according to a report transmitted by Consul General Ravandall, February 2, 1920, was installed in Constantinople in 1905, and enjoyed a great success. A few months later one of the theaters with a large seating capacity was almost entirely given over to moving picture shows. The majority of the films projected belonged to the French firm Pathe Freres. In February, 1920, there were 11 moving picture theaters in Constantinople, besides smaller halls temporarily mounted. Success in this kind of entertainment is due to the fact that a comparatively small percentage of the population possess sufficient education to appreciate the theater or the opera, while everybody can take an interest in the moving picture show. Usually all films are bought on a royalty basis. A single print is purchased, which is projected in one or two local theaters and then used for one year at least in all the moving picture halls at Smyrna, Beirut, Trebizond, and other cities of the country. According to the style of the film and to the popularity and beauty of the performers films are paid for at rates varying between 6 cents to 9 cents a foot. From 1,600 to 2,000 yards, divided into four or five reels, is the most desirable length. Serial firms are now successfully introduced. Most of these are detective dramas with a total length of 9,000 to 10,000 yards, divided into 25 to 30 reels. There is no censorship of moving pictures in Turkey, except on religious pictures. Exciting films of hunting and war stories, shooting and murders, killing of natives and cowboy dramas are very popular. They are known as American films. Educational films, as well as cartoons and animal pictures are not appreciated, but people take a tremendous interest in comedies, society drama, detective drama, and episodes of the late war. Italian films, with performers such as Maria Garmi, Pina Menichelli and Ida Borelli are appreciated above all others. Next to these come the French and Danish films, while English and Russian films are unknown in Constantinople. Films are bought from September to March, and the only periodical read by film importers is the French "Cinematographique."

**Beirut, Syria:** This information is taken from a report entitled "Market for Motion Picture Films in Beirut," transmitted by Consul General W. Stanley Hollis, and dated Beirut, Syria, April 5, 1917. This report did not reach the United States until 1921, because it was held up in Constantinople and later in Paris. When this report was written Beirut had but one moving picture theater. Before the war, however, there were a number of motion picture machines in nightly operation. These machines were supplied by the French houses of "Gaumont" and "Pathe Freres," and these houses kept their clients regularly supplied each week with entire new outfits of films. They used these films for a week in Beirut; they were then forwarded to other users in other Syrian towns. Three establishments were running regularly in Syria before the war, each with a seating capacity of 500. The price of admission ranged from 12 cents for a chair on the main floor, down among the vendors of oranges and licorice water and the purveyors of narghiles, to 88 cents and \$1.32 for private boxes. The films best received were sensational ones, such as train robberies, burglaries, etc., also such spectacles as "Ben Hur" and "Jean Valjean." In a letter dated May 21, 1920, Consul Paul Knabenshue at Beirut, says that the films used by cinema houses are principally imported from Egypt, and are of French, Italian, and American make.

**Aleppo, Syria:** In a letter of May 14, 1920, Consul J. B. Jackson of Aleppo says that formerly the high class European films, such as Pathe Freres, Gaumont, Eclair, Bandman, Ambrosio, Pasquale, etc., were all the rage in Syria, but of late years the livelier American films are most popular, especially the wild west, detective, and police specialties, such as the "Mysteries of New York." Films showing the most popular American actors, such as Douglas Fairbanks, Charlie Chaplin, William Hart, Marie Dressler, Mary Pickford, Ruth Roland, Pearl White, etc., are greatly appreciated. All films are supplied by the producers through their distributing agents. Admission charges in Aleppo are as follows: boxes of 4 seats, 50 gold piasters (\$1.375), single seats in boxes, 14 gold piasters (38.5 cents), single chairs in "Second Class" rows, 7 gold piasters (19.25 cents). The only moving picture magazine seen in Aleppo is "Le Courier Cinematographique."

**Jerusalem, Palestine:** A Consular letter of May 8, 1920, states that there are no film distributors in Jerusalem. The moving picture theaters in Jerusalem at the time this letter was written were the Empire Cinema and the Zion Cinema; the first with a seating capacity of 500, and the second of about 800. The admission charges were from 5 to 30 cents, the favorite type of American films being the romantic and tragic.

**Mesopotamia:** The Consul at Bagdad, Mesopotamia, under date of March 8, 1920, sent a copy of a new municipal regulation, published at Bassorah, establishing a censorship upon films shown in that city. Similar regulations are now in force at Bagdad. These regulations are as follows:

1. An assistant commissioner of police will, if possible, be present the first time a film is shown to the public of Basrah. This officer will stop the film should he consider it desirable to do so. The film will then be shown to a committee consisting of the deputy commissioner of police, the municipal commissioner and Mr. Bahjat Forage or any two of them. The cinema proprietor concerned will arrange with the municipal commissioner for the committee to see the film and the committee will decide whether the film is to be shown to the public or not.

2. Cinema proprietors will not exhibit films to the public which:

- (a) Are indecent or immoral,
- (b) Are likely to offend the reasonable susceptibilities of the local population,
- (c) Are politically undesirable,
- (d) Are likely to give a distorted idea of European customs or morals.

It is not thought necessary to censor all films, but cinema proprietors are informed that they will be liable to punishment by cancellation or suspension.



sion of license if they show films which transgress the requirements given above.

Should any cinema proprietor have any doubts regarding any film which he has received, he will at once communicate with the municipal commissioner who will arrange for the committee to see the film and issue orders concerning it.

**Malta:** The following information is quoted from a report by Consul Carl R. Loop, Valetta, Malta, May 26, 1920: There are about 15 moving picture theaters in Malta, with admission charges ranging from 6 to 10 cents, including entertainment tax. The seating capacity ranges from 200 to 500, with an average of about 340. The types of pictures most popular are melodramas, "western" plays, and comics. Few American films are shown. Italian films are most popular, partly because the Italian language is better understood than the English, partly because the Italian temperament is more nearly akin to the Maltese, but largely because of the greater facility with which the Italian films may be secured. There is a tendency, however, in favor of American films, based upon the growing conviction that American films are better, and upon the increasing interest the Maltese are taking in things American. Advertising is limited to posters displayed near the entrances to the theaters, and occasionally in conspicuous places about the cities and towns.

**Egypt:** Quotation is made from a Consular letter of December 10, 1920. The most popular American films seen in Egypt are "western" plays, melodramas, and serial pictures. The Egyptian trade in films by months from June, 1920, is being sent to you, so far as this material is available in the Bureau.

Out of seven moving-picture representations visited in Alexandria, four ran American films. In every case the explanatory text accompanying the picture was thrown on the screen in four languages and occasionally in five. Two small side or supplementary screens carried the explanation in Arabic, Italian, English, and Greek, while the main screen on which the picture was thrown carried the customary explanation in French.

**Greece:** According to a Consular letter of November 29, 1920, there was but one moving picture theater in the Patras Consular district, namely, the Ideal, located at Patras. This theater has a seating capacity of 500, and the admission charge is two drachmae. When this letter was written American films were seldom shown, but received a good reception when shown. Films produced by the Unione Cinematographica Italiana of Rome, were the most popular, although the Pathe Freres were also used. Society drama seems to be the type of films desired by the Greeks. Pictures are generally bought by foot meter. There was no censorship on films. Films must be packed in tin cans. The Greek film buyer generally gets his supply from France and Italy, while a few come from the United States. All Greece had about 15 motion picture theaters in June, 1920. The program is usually changed twice each week, the average price of admission being 2 drachmae. The seating capacity of theaters in Athens ranges from 600 to 1,500, and 3 performances are given daily. The principal producers of films used in Athens in 1920 were Pathe Freres, Gaumont, Italia, Cines Caesar, and Roma. All titles and inserts are either in Modern Greek or French, principally French.

#### SIBERIA

The only firm in Siberia dealing in motion picture film is Alexeioff, Dontello and Company, Svetlanskaya 50, Vladivostok.

There is only one regular motion picture theater here, although from time to time pictures are shown in various other theaters. This theater has a capacity of about 1,000 and it is owned by the above-mentioned firm.

Dramas, good comedies, and short educational films seem to be much favored. The price of admission varies from 100 rubles to 350 rubles, depending upon the location of the seat. According to the present rate of exchange, this would be from 25 cents to \$1. Russian motion picture theaters, unlike most American ones, have a different price for almost every row in the house, those in front being the most expensive.

#### FINLAND

Motion pictures are not as extensively shown in Finland as in other Scandinavian countries. The proportion is about 1 in Finland to 4 in Sweden. The largest dealer in films is Finland Biograf Corp., Helsingfors, of which Aug. Sorja is the director. Mr. Sorja states that the chief source of these pictures are Germany, Sweden, Denmark, and U. S. A. I quote a part of his statement: "With regard to American pictures, it is very hard to procure first class films from there. They must be bought without seeing them and the censors may refuse to let them be shown. The price is \$5,000, which prohibits direct importation. The American pictures we show must be secured from Sweden unless the direct price can be adjusted to Finland's demands and possibilities."

It is stated that the Scandinavian Film Co. of Stockholm monopolize the importation of films to Scandinavia; that the rental charge for each picture shown is 30% of its gross receipts.

#### BRAZIL

According to an official report, 351 motion-picture films, totaling 411,680 meters, received from 78 different companies, were censored during the first quarter of 1921; 240 of these censored films were American, 47 German, 37 Italian, 10 French, 5 Brazilian, 4 Danish, 4 Portuguese, 2 English, and 2 Austrian.

Assistant Trade Commissioner Bernard H. Noll, Feb. 21, 1921, reports: During the last six months American motion-picture films in Brazil have met increasingly strong competition from Europe. Large numbers of Italian and German films have been brought into the country, where they have been received quite favorably. This is due in part to the favorable exchange situation between those countries and Brazil. Therefore American film manufacturers must soon see the necessity of making the lowest possible prices in Brazil, in order that they may meet this competition adequately. Another point to be noted is that the details of rentals of films in foreign countries are given too little consideration, and representations are often placed in the hands of foreigners who are not in sympathy with American business methods or have had no training with the home organization. Thus it often happens that a representative places American films on the market at prices higher than the exhibitor feels he can pay.

#### Choice of Films

Commenting upon the success of American pictures abroad, an American who is well acquainted with the film exchange business expressed the opinion that the United States will always hold first place in the production of comic films and "wild-west" pictures, but that it will have to meet European competition in other types of pictures. There is no hard and fast rule as to what kind of picture finds most favor with Brazilians. To the uneducated class action is the prime requisite, and such films as "wild west" and "adventure" appeal. The better educated and well-to-do people like society drama, detective, and mystery films, with educational and travel supplements. It is particularly necessary that films be new, because Brazilians are in the habit of following American fashions, and pictures have a great educational and advertising value. Brazilians are known to copy American styles in clothing, architecture, automobiles, and interior decorations and to be guided in their purchases by what they see on the screen.

Another important consideration is the introduction of industrial films. Subjects of interest in Brazil include the automobile industry, dairying, iron and steel manufacturing, farm machinery, furniture, etc. Many of these films are lent to exhibitors by manufacturers at little, if any, cost, and exhibitors in this country are glad to use them as an addition to their programs. Introducers of films into Brazil should avoid sending those showing racial or national prejudices.

#### Distribution of Films

Nearly all of the Rio de Janeiro film distributors have subagencies at two or more of the principal cities in Brazil, and films are shipped to these agents for rental and distribution. Rio de Janeiro is undoubtedly the center of the film exchange

business of Brazil, although before the war some films were received at other ports of entry. There are 10 film distributors and importers in Rio de Janeiro. Three of these are branch agencies of large American producers; several own and operate motion-picture theaters in connection with the film distribution business, and four import films on their own account and rent them out to theaters. All of these distributors maintain agents in the principal cities who handle their films. One American distributor employs two prints of each picture, sending one print around the northern sections of the country and the other to the south, each trip lasting about five or six months. In some districts, where the distributors have no agents, films have been shipped by mail as printed matter, but the director of the mails has just issued a decision that films must be classed as parcel post. This will increase the cost of transportation about 500 per cent and prohibit the rental of films except at points where they can be delivered by freight.

#### Imports—Tariff

In 1913 France and Italy supplied 90 per cent of the films imported into Brazil, the French films having a slight advantage. During that year 18,695 kilos of film, valued at 571,669 milreis, was received. Of this amount 8,462 kilos, valued at 340,566 milreis, came from France, and 8,193 kilos, valued at 108,343 milreis, came from Italy; 16,834 kilos were received at the port of Rio de Janeiro, 1,261 kilos at Santos, and the small remainder was distributed among the other ports of the country. In 1914 the importation of French and Italian films decreased to 2,036 kilos and 7,027 kilos, respectively, while only 124 kilos were received from the United States. During the years of the war the United States began introducing large numbers of films into Brazil, the imports from that country amounting to about 8 tons in 1917. In 1919 Brazil imported 18,730 kilos of motion-picture films, valued at 1,693,022 milreis. (At present exchange rates the milreis is valued at approximately \$0.14 United States currency.) Information as to countries of origin is not available, but United States statistics show that 5,872,513 linear feet of film, valued at \$298,809, was exported to Brazil in 1919, and 8,799,893 linear feet, valued at \$360,071, was exported in 1920.

The purchaser of a film for rental in Brazil invariably pays the freight and import duties, and if freight is prepaid by the shipper it is charged back to the buyer on the invoice. The nominal import duty on films coming into Brazil is 25 milreis per kilo. However, because of the fact that duties are calculated on the basis of 55 per cent in gold and 35 per cent in paper, the actual duty paid in paper, including the gold surtax, is 77.125 paper milreis per kilo.

#### Theaters in Rio—Admissions—Machines Used

There are about 50 motion-picture houses in Rio de Janeiro. Most of these are small and have a seating capacity of from 350 to 600 persons. There are a few in the center of the city, however, which accommodate 1,000 to 1,500 persons at each performance. The better class picture houses have comfortable lobbies, where an orchestra plays, patrons being required to wait for the completion of the picture before entering. These larger theaters usually show pictures continuously from 1.30 to 11.30 p. m. In other parts of the city and in the suburbs pictures are shown only at night. Programs are changed four times a week, and usually consist of a 5-reel drama, a comedy, and a serial, while theaters in the business section replace the serial with an animated cartoon, pictures of travel, and even films of different cities and districts of Brazil. Distributors claim that in the suburbs and interior parts of Brazil the serial is the back-bone of their business.

The price of admission to a performance in a motion picture theater is usually 1 milreis, except when special pictures are shown; on such occasions 2 or 3 milreis admission is charged. The theaters are well patronized, although during the warm months of January and February attendance falls off about 25 to 30 per cent. During these months also the people are inclined to be saving, in anticipation of the annual carnival celebration.

It is estimated that the attendance at a motion-picture theater seating 600 people and open continuously averages 2,000 a day.

Different makes of projecting machines are on sale in the city, some of the distributors carrying a stock on hand.

#### Pictures in Sao Paulo and Santos

There are about 500,000 people in the city of Sao Paulo, and in the city and suburbs 40 motion picture houses are operating. Five or six of these seat from 1,500 to 2,000 persons, and the remainder from 300 to 1,000. The larger houses charge 1½ milreis and the smaller ones charge 1 milreis admission. The theaters are open only in the evening, and programs are changed seven times a week, each house requiring from 75 to 80 reels of film a week. Some 15 film distributors are established in Sao Paulo, most of them being branch offices opened and operated by film-renting agencies at Rio de Janeiro. After films are exhibited in Sao Paulo they are sent to Santos (two hours distant) for exhibition there. There is a hooking combination in Sao Paulo known as the Sao Paulo Theater Trust. This organization is composed of four or five men who own two to four cinema theaters each, all being the largest and most profitably operated houses in Brazil. It is reported that the organization cleared over 470,000 milreis during September, 1920, its most profitable contracts being with certain American companies. One of these contracts provides the sum of 700 milreis rental for each film for a period of 14 days, to be exhibited one night each in 14 theaters.

and 4 over 1,000 seats. In Lower Austria of the 184 theaters, 86 have 300 seats, 43 have 600 seats and 2 have 1,000 seats, according to "Film Express." In upper Austria of the 65 theaters, 38 have 300 seats, 14 have approximately 600 seats and 2 have 1,000 seats.

## CZECHO-SLOVAKIA

Bohemia has 211 theaters. 34 have 300 seats, 83 have 600 seats, and 21 have 1,000 seats.

Moravia has 118 theaters, 28 of which contain 300 seats, 26, 600 seats, and 2, 1,000 seats.

In Silesia there are 37 theaters: of this number 10 have 300 seats, 11 have 600 seats and 1 has 1,000 seats.

In Slovakia there are 121 theaters, 70 of which contain 300 seats, 37 of which contain 600 seats, 3 contain 1,000 seats and 1 has over 1,000.

Jugoslavia has 231 theaters, 22 containing 300 seats, 29, 600 seats; 5, 1,000 seats, and 1, 1,000 seats.

Galicia has 88 theaters. There are 5 which contain 300 seats, 14 which contain 600 seats, and 2 which contain 1,000.

#### PAUL CROMELIN'S IDEAS

Following will be found some excerpts from an address delivered by Paul H. Cromelin, of the Inter-Ocean Film Corporation, before the Eighth National Foreign Trade Convention at Cleveland in May.

In part, Mr. Cromelin said:

"The American Motion Picture is a Pace Maker in the development and promotion of foreign trade. In the efficacy of the story which it brings before us it has no competitor. American life, American homes, American machinery, American Modes, American Methods, American ideals, American habits, American industry, are shown daily to untold millions of people throughout the world.

"The American Motion Picture, in unfolding from day to day various phases of American life and industry, is doing more than any other agency to create a desire on the part of those who view them to visit our shore personally to see those wonderful sky-scrappers, those crowded thoroughfares, the great bee-hives of industry known as department stores.

"In a remarkably short time the Motion Picture Industry has forged ahead, until now, ac-

according to the classification of the Department of Commerce, it is ranked as the fourth in the United States; steel, lumber, automobiles and electric machinery leading it.

"The twenty leading Motion Pictures producers have a capital investment of over two hundred and fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000), and when to this is added the amount invested in Distributing Companies, Theatres and in the manufacture of raw stock (the sensitized unexposed film on which the pictures are made), in the making of Projecting machines, Cameras and other Mechanical Apparatus, of Carbons, Posters and necessary products of other affiliated allied and dependent businesses, the amount is estimated to be about one and one quarter billion dollars (\$1,250,000,000).

"Although the American Motion Picture has always had a leading position on the screens in foreign countries, it is only in recent years, since the introduction of the so-called 'feature films,' that its very great importance as an article of export has come to be realized.

"In the autumn of 1914, shortly after the beginning of the Great War, because of stringent rules and regulations covering the export of motion pictures put in force by Great Britain, and the imposition of a duty on the import, both of negatives and positives, into England, the center of distribution gradually shifted to New York. Buyers who had previously been accustomed to view the pictures in London and to make their purchases there, established headquarters in New York which is today and is destined to remain, if we handle the problem intelligently, the world's greatest export centre for motion pictures.

"The exclusive right to exhibit such a production has become a form of property which is the basis on which practically all of the export business in motion pictures is handled today. No longer are prints sold outright; the owner rarely, if ever, parts with title to his property. For a valuable consideration, the amount of which is determined by the extent of territory granted, or the number of theatres in the country, or other conditions which might influence the price for any particular territory, a contract of lease is entered into, usually for five years, during which time the lessee is given the sole and exclusive right to exhibit or let for hire the particular production for the territory granted. The form of these contracts has become so standardized that this method of handling the business is practically internationalized. The lessee thus obtains a valuable exclusive right. He agrees under severe penalties not to send the copies outside of the limited territory leased to him, and is protected from an infringement of his rights by having the right to seize any copy which through any possibility might find its way into his territory. This happens with remarkable infrequency, first, because of the heavy penalties to which the wrongdoer is subjected if caught, but primarily because in the evolution of the business, the whole world has been carefully zoned and each lessee is too busily engaged in developing the business in his own territory to attempt to illegally infringe on the other fellow's exclusive domain.

"Prior to their being exported, the pictures are examined by expert translators and retitled in New York into Spanish, Portuguese, French or whichever language is desired, or in some instances, the prints are sent out without titles and the titling is done in the countries where they are to be shown. The contracts usually provide for the return of the prints, if in existence, at the expiration of the term of the lease, or affidavits certifying to their total destruction. These lease contracts are entered into with great formality, properly witnessed, attested and usually notariably acknowledged, and constitute the sole understanding and agreement between the parties in respect to the production.

"Until now the business done in the export of motion pictures has been practically upon a cash basis. Payments are usually cash in New York. The foreign customer will arrange for payment through a New York banker on pre-

sentation of documents or will make a deposit with the manufacturer or its export representative against which shipments are made, the deposit being renewed from time to time.

"It is not to be expected that customers are going to continue to pay for the goods, cash in advance, or cash against documents New York. Already in many countries they desire to pay cash against documents, on arrival, a very reasonable request, and the time will come when they will require and deserve to have extended to them reasonable credits in the conduct of their business. To a large extent we are still in the kindergarten class in our knowledge of handling export problems. It would be worse than folly to imagine that the abnormal export increases which we enjoyed during the war are due to either our export salesmanship or special brilliancy in handling the transactions. In many instances we succeeded in spite of our inaptitude and the business was thrust upon us by war conditions despite our incapacity. In the near future we are in for a period of competitive operations, and in order to succeed, we need not only the right goods, properly priced and in the hands of expert salesmen, but adequate banking facilities at home supporting reliable and competent shipping and exporting companies, who, working together, will see to it that excessive, burdensome and frequently unnecessary charges are not added before the goods reach the customer; bankers, who not only have the vision, the breadth of view, to recognize in the exported American motion picture an added source of wealth, but also the greatest sales agent which leaves our shores; bankers, who will keep pace with our American manufacturers by establishing their own branches in the principal foreign capitals or at least convincing themselves that their foreign correspondents are in sympathy with American aims and ideals and the promotion of American trade.

"The time has come for the American banker to recognize in a negative of a motion picture, made by any reputable company, a form of bankable security not only as good, but superior to ordinary merchandise, such as corn or wheat or articles of manufacture. The time has come for the American banker to know that a warehouse receipt of a bill of lading with proper insurance policies attached, covering a motion picture negative, means a security on which he can realize the amount of his reasonable advances all over the world. That a negative capable of producing sufficient copies of the production to satisfy the world's needs is usually a better security and one a foreclosure, should it ever become necessary, will yield more money than most of the ordinary merchandise which is today universally looked upon as a good safe bankable security. The time has come for our American bankers to realize and to know of their own personal knowledge that in the vast majority of cases in most countries the motion picture rights secured by any lessee are eagerly sought by several who would in an emergency gladly and quickly step into his shoes, and those bankers who have handled such transactions for reputable film exporters will testify how rarely it happens that a draft with documents covering a film shipment is not paid immediately on presentation; and, finally, the American banker ought to recognize that when a business has reached the commanding position of the American motion picture, it is pretty nearly time to look upon it as an 'industry' and no longer as a gamble to be referred to and spoken of as the 'film game.'

"Of all the branches of the motion picture industry there is none where there is so little risk as in the export end. This branch does not entail any of the risks of production. It deals with the finished picture, not only after it is ready for projection, but usually some months after American exploitation and when its success or failure has been accurately gauged and determined. Experts in the export branch with a knowledge of world conditions can tell with reasonable certainty what it will yield in each country, and bankers will be just as safe in making proper and reasonable advances against the lease contracts, the positive prints and the negatives as they are in

respect to other security with which by long practice they perhaps have become more familiar.

"From a motion picture standpoint, there is no country so highly developed and organized as the United States. At the present time, the industry is accustomed to consider that all of the rest of the world should yield about one-quarter of what any ordinary production will bring in the United States and Canada. The money received from the lease of rights to the production in other territories, to a large extent, represents the real profits of the operating companies, and to an American industry with such large capital investments it is of paramount importance to not only retain its present position in foreign markets, but to look ahead and safeguard its future by taking advantage of the opportunities now existing for American films abroad.

"The foreign field for motion pictures is so large, the amount of work ahead so important in directing this great, this enormous force either for good or for evil, along proper lines, that one hesitates to venture a prophecy; but of one dared, it is pretty safe to predict that of all instrumentalities to be brought to bear at that time when China shall awaken, and once again become one of the great enlightened governments of the world, the motion picture, greater and more powerful than the printed or spoken word, will be found to be the means chiefly employed to convey to its millions in the shortest possible time the lessons of our western civilization."

# Films Released by the Department of Agriculture

In the following list the titles of films are arranged under the names of the bureaus that are authority for the subject matter.

Films released since April 1, 1920, are marked "New"; films revised since that date are so designated.

### BUREAU OF ANIMAL INDUSTRY

#### Sheep and Wool

Lambs from Range to Market ..... 1 reel.

Ewes and lambs grazing on National Forests; lambs separated from ewes at end of season and taken to feeding yards for fattening; fattening of lambs on different feeds, and loading lambs on trains for market.

This reel largely duplicates "Grazing Industry on the National Forests."

From Wool to Cloth ..... 3 reels.

Reel 1.—Wool sorted and weighed at warehouse. Buyers purchasing wool from sample clips.

Reel 2.—Lowell Textile School. Wool sorted by hand and cleaned and washed by machinery. Wool carded and wound by machines.

Reel 3.—Wool twisted into yarn of various grades, then woven into cloth. The 15 processes of shrinking, singeing, etc., through which the cloth is passed after weaving.

#### Sheep on the Farm series:

A Year with the Flock ..... 2 reels.

Selecting a purebred ram and good grade ewes in the fall to start the flock; winter management; shepherd's spring duties—docking, shearing, dipping; sheep on summer pasture.

Wool and Lamb Marketing.....1 reel.

How wool is handled, graded, and sold through community and county wool growers' associations; how lambs are graded by co-operative lamb marketing clubs.

Killing and Dressing Mutton for Home Use 1 reel.

Showing the proper way to kill, dress, and cut mutton and lamb.

Out of the Shadows ..... 2 reels.  
(Bureau of Animal Industry)

The appearance of animal tuberculosis on the farm of Henry Benton and its communication to his daughter, Mary, through the milk of a tuberculous cow. The clean-up of the farm and Benton's acquirement of a herd of cattle accredited as free from tuberculosis. Mary's departure for a sanitarium and her return, restored to health after three years, to join a happy family circle.

### POULTRY

Selecting a Laying Hen ..... 1 reel.

Culling the flock. Physical characteristics by which the good egg producer can be recognized.

Government Poultry Farm ..... 3 reels.

Picturization of the Department of Agriculture's poultry work on its farm at Beltsville, Md.

Reel 1.—Natural and artificial incubation of eggs and methods of handling; general view of the poultry farm; the brooders and pens in which young chicks are raised, how kept, cleaned, etc., and chicks in the pens.

Reel 2.—Houses and pens used for chicks as they grow older and reach maturity; chicks moved from one house to another, weighed; separation of cockerels and pullets.

Reel 3.—The use of a trap-nest, and the numbering and recording of eggs.



**Embryology of the Egg (revised)**..... ½ reel.  
How the hen's fertile egg develops into the chick, and the infertile egg does not. A short picturization of the beginning of life.

#### SWINE

**Control of Hog Cholera (revised)**..... 1 reel.  
Causes of hog cholera, the use of hog-cholera serum, methods of application and results, and proper sanitation as a remedy and a preventive.

**Health for Hogs (new)**..... 1 reel.  
How portable colony hog houses help the hog keep himself clean, and self-feeders keep him from "making a hog of himself." Advantages of portable houses and self-feeders in producing fat healthy hogs.

**Uncle Sam's Pig Club Work**..... 1 reel.  
The formation of pig clubs among boys, and one boy's success in raising a prize hog.

#### CATTLE PARASITES

**Making the South Tick-Free (new)**..... 1 reel.

**Milk and Honey**..... 2 reels.  
A dairy romance, in which methods of conducting a modern dairy are shown as part of the story.

Mrs. Brown learns how cottage cheese is made from skim milk at a modern creamery and marketed, and how to use it in the home. Serves it to her family.

**Construction of a Concrete Silo**..... 1 reel.  
All steps in the construction of a concrete silo.

**Construction of a Wooden Hoop Silo**..... 1 reel.  
Method of construction of a silo of wooden hoops and staves.

**Cooperative Cow-Testing in Vermont**..... 1 reel.  
Work of cooperative cow-testing associations in increasing profits and improving dairy herds.

Common barberry the cause of wheat rust. Science magnifies the rust germs and explains cause and effect.

**Bridge Grafting to Save Trees**..... ½ reel.  
Trees girdled by rodents are saved by grafts bridged across the injury.

#### White Pine Blister Rust series:

**The Story of White Pine (new)**..... 1 reel.  
Eastern white pine from virgin forest to finished products; second growth; nursery planting; with special reference to the white pine blister rust, a serious disease introduced from Europe.

Methods of logging and lumbering as practiced in Pennsylvania. Portable saw mills in New England; old-fashioned water-power mill of colonial days.

Second growth of white pine, which is largely replacing virgin timber in the East. White pine reclaiming waste lands, sandy soil and rocky pastures. A valuable crop made more valuable by care and cultivation.

**White Pine—A Paying Crop for Idle Lands (new)**..... 1 reel.  
Reforestation of idle lands with white pine, showing nursery practice, field planting, and care of plantations.

**A Plant Disease and How it Spreads**.... 1 reel.  
(Bureau of Plant Industry)

A microscopic and field study of rhubarb blight, used as an example to show the workings of the minute organisms that cause plant diseases; about half of the scenes were photographed through a high-powered microscope; despite the technical subject the picture is suitable for use before non-technical spectators.

**White Pine, the Wood of Woods (new)**.... 1 reel.  
Eastern white pine from log to lumber, illustrating its wide range of usefulness. Lumber yards, stave and box factory; making screen doors, window screens, boxes, barrels, and buckets.

#### STATES RELATIONS SERVICE

**Apples and the County Agent**..... 3 reels.  
The true story of a farmer who, unprogressive and unsuccessful at first, is later enabled through the assistance of the agricultural extension service to introduce modern methods in production and marketing of apples, and thereby becomes successful and prosperous. Extension methods and progressive practices as applied to the apple industry are shown in the course of the story.

**The Home Demonstration Agent**..... 3 reels.  
Her work with women and girls and its effects on the whole community, but particularly upon Mrs. Meade and her daughter, Mabel, who have known none of the benefits of home demonstration work; the new agent's arrival; how she organizes the county; she demonstrates home conveniences; the girl's canning club; the egg circle; the community kitchen; the county encampment and picnic;



the exhibit of club work at the county fair; Mabel finally wins first prize, a trip to the college short course; activities at the short course; several years later, Mabel a home maker.

**American Home Canning in France (new) 1 reel.**

Demonstrations of American home canning methods given in 1919 at the agricultural college at Grignon, France, by specialists from the United States Department of Agriculture at the request of the French Ministry of Agriculture.

**Fresh Fish—Can It (new)..... ½ reel.**

Fish freshly caught is canned in a stream pressure canner on the banks of the stream; the ideal way—taking the canner to the fish.

**Drying Fruits and Vegetables in the Home 1 reel.**

Types of driers, methods of drying, packing, conditioning, and labeling tomatoes, carrots, and other root vegetables, corn, berries, and apples, and a luncheon of dried delicacies attended by the wives of cabinet officers.

**Club Champions at Camp Vail..... 2 reels.**

A day at a boys' and girls' encampment held in connection with an interstate fair, featuring exhibits, demonstrations, and judging contests by teams which have won State championship honors.

**Cured by Canning..... 1 reel.**

How illness and idleness in a Middle West rural community were banished by the first mother-daughter canning club, which converted products formerly wasted into canned food.

**The Red Cross Pig Club..... 1 reel.**

How, through organization under the county agent, Carroll County, Miss., helped win the war by producing and sending, in one trainload, to the St. Louis market, \$100,000 worth of pigs and donating 10 per cent of the proceeds to the Red Cross.

**Helping the Farmers of Tomorrow..... 2 reels.**

The trip to Washington and sightseeing tours of children who won State prizes for raising fruit, vegetables, and poultry in club work.

**Helping Negroes to Become Better Farmers and Homemakers..... 2 reels.**

(States Relations Service)  
Showing the operation of the agricultural extension system among negro farmers of the South and their families; how it was begun, and the benefits it gives.

**The 4-H Camp for Boys and Girls..... 1 reel.**

(States Relations Service)  
Work and play at one of the camps where club boys and girls learn better farming and home work, and the meaning of 4-H—Head, Heart, Hand and Health.

**The Farm Bureau Comes to Pleasant View 2 reels.**

This picture and the four following picture the organization of a rural community for farm bureau work and some of the good results obtained, especially for the farm women.

Best Breeds of Swine..... 1 reel.  
(Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimate and Bureau of Animal Industry.)

Examples of hog aristocracy in the United States, with pictures showing the extent of the swine industry; made with Spanish titles to encourage the sale of American breeding stock in South American countries.

Production's Pulse ..... 2 reels.  
(Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimates.)  
How Government Crop Reports are made by the work of 215,000 crop reporters, and how they are released to the public, placing the farmer on a par with the speculator in farm products; the crop report is followed from the field to the newspaper.

Sweet Potatoes from Storehouse to Market 1 reel.  
(Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimates.)  
Approved methods of storing, grading and shipping sweet potatoes; how to prevent losses in storage and transportation.

## BUREAU OF CHEMISTRY

Dust Explosions in Mills and Elevators... 2 reels.  
Some of the causes, results, and means of preventing grain dust explosions in mills and elevators; laboratory tests showing the in-

flammability of grain dusts and the velocity of propagation; results of five dust explosions which occurred during the summer of 1919; suction sweeps, revolving dampers, and other preventive devices.

Explosive Dusts (new)..... 1 reel.  
A brief presentation, in less technical form, of the same subject covered in "Dust Explosions in Mills and Elevators."

Dust Explosions in Threshing Machines... 2 reels.  
Explosions and fires in threshing machines, their causes and results. Use of preventive devices—suction fans, fire extinguishers, wire systems. Experiments with dust from starch, flour, sugar, coal, and sulphur made by Bureau of Chemistry and Bureau of Mines.

## BUREAU OF PUBLIC ROADS

Granite Paving and Curbing..... 3 reels.

Reels 1 and 2.—The story of granite paving and curbing from the quarry to the finished pavement and curb in the large cities. Defects in granite pavements and their causes: Specimens of good and bad paving.

Reel 3.—Paving blocks.  
Bituminous Macadam Road Construction... 1 reel.  
Construction of a bituminous macadam road in Maine.

Cement and Concrete Tests..... 1 reel.  
How cement is tested in briquettes and stone slabs tested for bridge building.

Concrete Road Construction..... 1 reel.  
Construction of a concrete post road in Ohio.

Gravel Road Construction ..... 1 reel.  
Construction of a gravel road in Virginia.

Macadam Road Construction ..... 1 reel.  
Construction of a macadam road in Maryland.

Road Tests with Traction Dynamometer... 1 reel.  
Work in repairing and maintaining roads. Testing rock used for road and test of the machine which records wear of different weights on a road.

Testing Rock to Determine its Value for Road Building ..... 1 reel.  
Drills and machines which are used to test rock for durability and toughness.

Modern Concrete Road Construction.... 1 reel.  
(Bureau of Public Roads.)

Approved methods of highway building by the use of concrete; some of the modern machinery and practices used in this work; a contrast is drawn between old-fashioned mud roads and modern highways; the ending is a race between a railway train and a motor truck on a concrete road.

## BIOLOGICAL SURVEY

The Wichita National Forest and Game Preserve 3 reels

Reel 1.—The Witchery of the Wichita. Weird rock formations and scenic wonders of this little-known forest; native birds.

Reel 2.—Bison on the Wichita. Including an Indian buffalo hunt.

Reel 3.—Wild turkey and deer on the Wichita.  
The Last Days of the Prairie Dog..... 1 reel.  
The prairie dog in Arizona, the damage he does to farming, and the work being done by the Biological Survey toward the extermination of the pest.

## OFFICE OF FARM MANAGEMENT

Help Wanted: To Feed the Nation (revised) 1 reel.

The need for city men to help harvest the crops of the farms so that the country will be fed; how they can help, tasks they can perform.

Training Boys for Farm Service..... 1 reel.  
A short course in farm practices taught city boys at summer agricultural training camps held at State agricultural colleges.

## MISCELLANEOUS

Agricultural and Forest Resources of the United States ..... 1 reel.

The position occupied by America in the world's output of plant, animal, and forest products.
