Name's:

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Going to

USE


- ❖ Use going to to talk about definite plans or intentions.

FORM

Be +going to + infinitive

For example

- ❖ I'm going to get more exercise.
- ❖ They're going to live in Canada.
- ❖ Are you going to get more exercise? Yes, I am.
- ❖ Are they going to live in Australia? No, they aren't.



Note: When the
main verb is go,
you can omit it.

❖ I'm going to go
to the movie.

Future will

USE

- ❖ Use will to talk possible future plans, especially after certain verbs- hope, think, imagine- and words like perhaps, possibly and maybe.



For example

- ❖ I think I'll leave work early today.
- ❖ I hope I'll meet my ideal man/woman.
- ❖ Do you imagine you'll always live here?

Also use will to make offers or promises.

- ❖ I'll take the sandwiches to the party.



Form

Will + Infinitive

- ❖ I think we'll have a test on Tuesday.
- ❖ Do you think you'll always live here?
- ❖ Will you take some CDs to the party?



Afirmative sentences

Example:

He **will play** football.

NOTE: short/contracted
form in the will-future:
He'll play football

Negative sentences

Example:

He **will not play** football.

NOTE: short/contracted forms
in the will-future:

He **won't play** football. or

He'll **not play** football.
