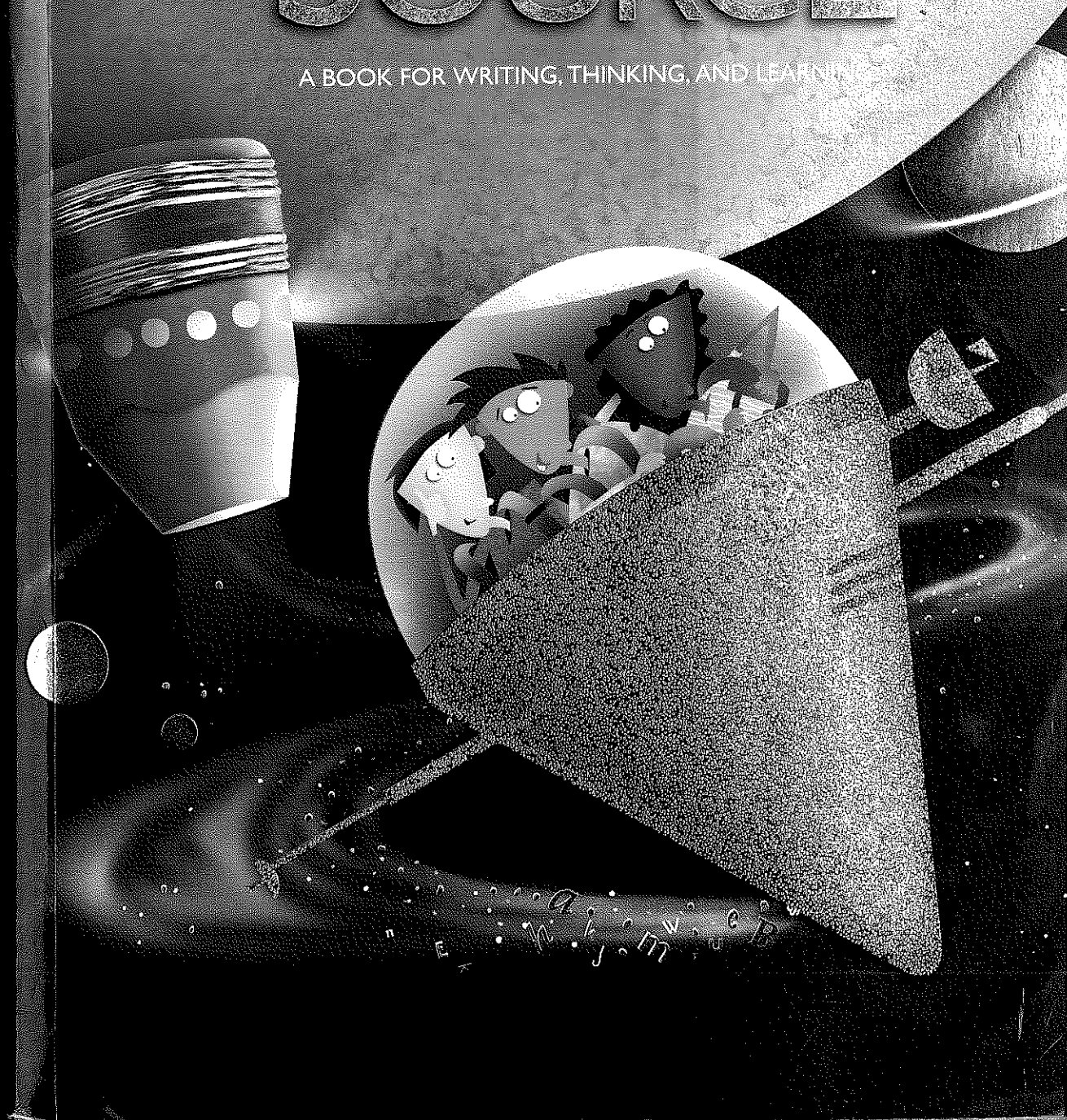


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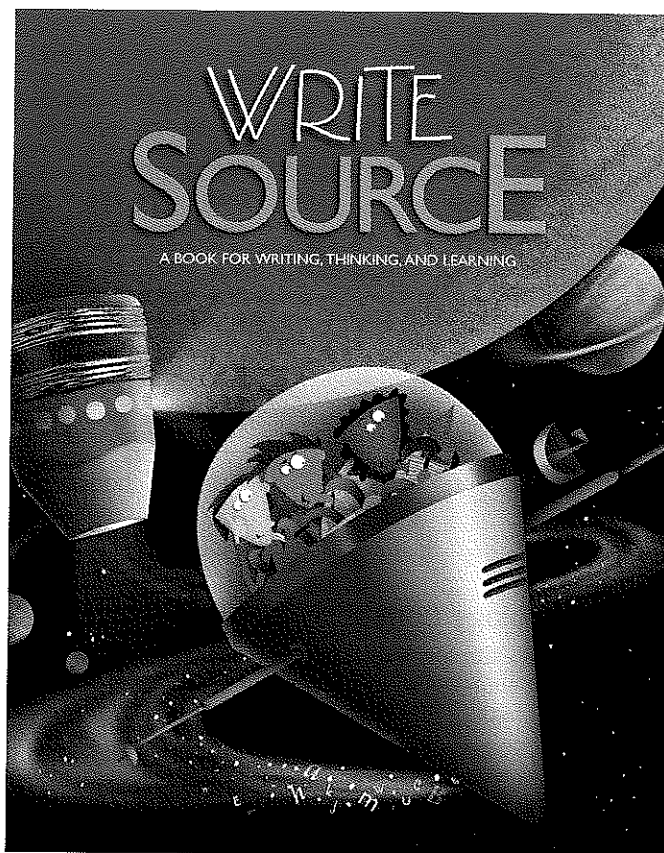
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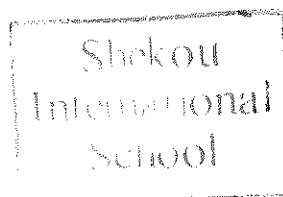

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Creating Your Works-Cited Page

The first step to creating a works-cited page is to format your sources according to proper style. The two following pages show formats for common types of sources.

BOOKS

Author or editor (last name first). Title (underlined). City where the book was published: Publisher, copyright date.

MAGAZINES

Author (last name first). Article title (in quotation marks). Title of the magazine (underlined) Date (day, month, year): Page numbers of the article.

INTERNET

Author (if available). Page title (if available, in quotation marks). Site title (underlined). Name of sponsor (if available). Date published (if available). Date found <electronic address>.

BOOKS

MAGAZINES

INTERNET

ENCYCLOPEDIA

Author (if available). Article title (in quotation marks). Title of the encyclopedia (underlined). Edition (if available). Date published.

INTERVIEW

Person interviewed (last name first). Type of interview (personal, phone, mail, e-mail). Date.

- 1** Write your sources using the guidelines above and on the previous page. You can write them on a sheet of paper or on note cards.
- 2** Alphabetize your sources.
- 3** Create your works-cited page. See the example below.
