What is the connection between your inquiry and your action? (How and why does your action spring from your inquiry?)


Your Action



What problem does your action seek to solve, and how does your action seek to solve that problem?

DATA COLLECTION: What methods are you using to collect information on WHAT HAPPENS when you take your action? Note that you must have qualitative data, which means that you need to ask open-ended questions, among other methods of collecting information on what happens.



#### FINDINGS:

WHAT HAPPENS when you take your action? Examine your qualitative research and ask what the data tells you. Identify patterns, observations - Note that findings must be very specifically grounded in the data you collect. You should refer to specific responses/datum in your findings. In your findings, also attempt to link back to the research you included in your action plan (as support for your findings).

#### CONCLUSIONS:

What broader conclusions can you reach, including (but not limited to): What did you learn? How did your thinking grow, change or develop as a result of your action research? How were you personally affected and/or impacted by your action? What does your action research help you understand? You originally anticipated results (in your action plan); how did the actual results compare to what you anticipated? Think critically about why some actions were or were not as successful as you originally intended them to be. How does your action inform your inquiry? What new questions does your action research raise for you? Where might you go from here? Do you think you will continue with any of this inquiry and/or action as you move into college and beyond?
