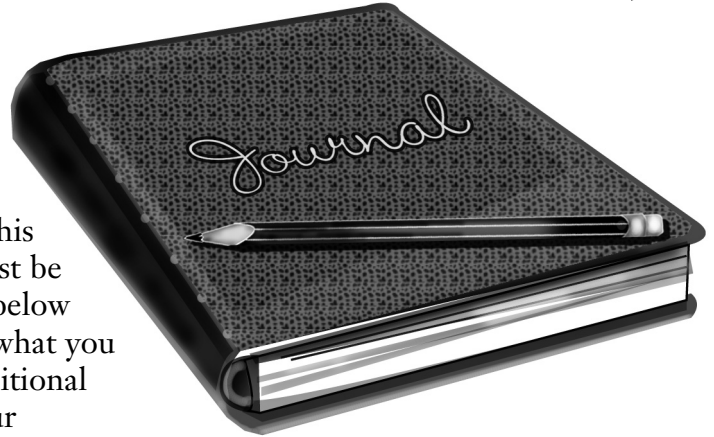

Journal: Atticus after the Trial

The point of view is the way that the narrator sees the events in the story. In Chapter 22, after receiving gifts from Tom Robinson's friends and neighbors, Atticus excuses himself and heads downtown.
