Shall there be enacted a Missouri statute to establish a Natural Streams System made up of specific Missouri streams, tributaries and related lands; to be regulated and protected through creation of a Natural Streams Commission and through adoption of management plans and regulations — developed with local input — that maintain existing lawful uses while regulating the future use of the System by prohibiting activities such as the construction of dams and the use of certain motorized vehicles; and by establishing fees for certain System users with revenue from those fees used to help finance administration of this act? Annual administrative costs ranging from \$1,270,000 to \$2,600,000 with \$10,000 to \$1,250,000 from General Revenue and \$85,000 from the Highway Fund, not including possible legal challenges. Permit fees of \$2,700,000 to Natural Streams Fund.
