

### Chapter outline project - Chapter 13

1. Models? - look back at chapter 8 or chapter 9: one was a hierarchically organized outline (8) - the other was topically organized. Consider the one for chapter 12 from professor Neumann.
2. Necessary things to cover - in my opinion:
  - a Categories or classifications for the new words. I doubt it would be useful just to list all of them. Besides, that has already been done for you in your chapter vocabulary. Come up with some sort of groupings. Find things that at least a couple of them have in common in meaning or sense or use, and try to find as many groupings as possible to cover at least most of the new words. I suppose to a limited extent grouping by grammatical classification would have some usefulness when a new declension is introduced.
  - b New grammar stuff. This seems pretty obvious. But the key here would be to find a way to understand and explain - in an organized, categorized way - whatever new uses of cases for nouns and adjectives, or new forms are introduced in the chapter, like in this chapter the ablative of time when, the regular comparative and superlative forms and so forth.
  - c Organization can be in traditional outline form, or topical with various kinds of font tool emphasize - underlining, bolding, italicising, capital-lettering, small-capping, bullet-pointing, word-arting, etc.
  - d Must be word-processed, traditional type of font, easy to read.
