He is Pete Sanstol, the Norway kid who was a finished product before he started calling George "Mr. Blake" the same as Fidel Labarba did.

Sanstol shoots the windmill tonight with Young Tommy—a Filipino who made and spent \$25,000 last year and is still getting better. They meet at the Olympic.

### MAY GET MILLER

If Sanstol wins the club will not have to look any further for an opponent the folks would like to see fight Freddie Miller, the classy and "unbeatable" featherweight champion whose list of "boxoffice" opponents has ran dry. They are talking of showing Sanstol with Midget Wolgast—also a very movable target like the Scandanavian. But if Sanstol gets over big enough the Wolgast negotiations may be sidetracked like northern beer and Miller moved into the picture.

Sanstol, hardly acclimated yet, won from Georgie Hansford with a "Young Griffio" style.

Against Tommy he will have to launch more offensive—especially those last five rounds for Tommy starts slow and finishes on the whip.

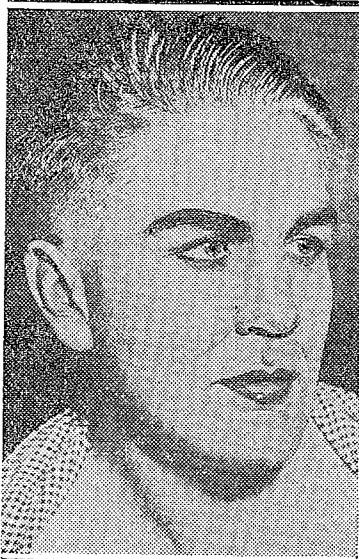
### MAY BE DIFFERENT

If Tommy beats Sanstol it will probably be just another fight. But if Sanstol defeats Tommy it will be a show like the Baby Arizmendi and Baby Face Casanova scraps were here. People talk about them afterwards.

Defeat will cost Tommy the real match he wants. It is another crack at Speedy Dado. Right now Tommy is sitting well with the commission. The ring board has ordered Dado to fight Tommy within 60 days or give up his state bantam title and his claim to the world crown.

In his last start the Filipino beat Arizmendi in San Francisco. Prior to that he twice whipped Joe Feiken who makes the best of them in high gear.

### BLAKE'S BOXER PICKED TO WIN

*Little Fellows Clash at  
Olympic Tomorrow*

Pete Sanstol, who throws gloves faster than Oscar (Battling) Nelson and is as hard to hit as Young Griffio, will go to the post a slight favorite over the fast-stepping Filipino, Young Tommy, at the Olympic tomorrow night.

The Spring-street crowd likes Sanstol for two reasons. First—he looked like a whirlwind in the gymnasium last week. Second—he is a George Blake-managed fighter.

It has always been said that any boy, who fights a Blake fighter, has to beat two men. One is the opponent. The other is Blake.

For years Fidel La Barba and Blake worked as a team that was seldom beaten. La Barba used to use a different style every round until he found the winning brand of stuff.

While Sanstol will be making his bid to establish himself in Los Angeles, La Barba is sitting in a darkened room awaiting word from physicians to take bandages off his eyes.

An operation to save his sight is believed to have been successful, which is good news to little Fidel's thousands of friends scattered from California to New York.

If either Sanstol or Tommy wins sensationally a match with either Midget Wolgast or Freddie Miller is in the offing.

Wolgast, recognized in New York as a lightweight champion, is

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he retired did he show much of a right.

Blake knows that there is more boxoffice in a right than there is in a left hand. Sanstol has had around 100 fights. He is 24 years of age and has never been hurt.

The Norwegian campaigned two years around New York and two more years at Montreal before joining the Blake colors. He was ranked just a step back of Al Brown by eastern critics in 1932.

### FOUGHT BROWN

Twice Sanstol engaged Brown in fifteen-round bouts, losing both times. The Negro's height proved a handicap for Sanstol who is of average size.

Sanstol holds decisions over Bobby Leitham, Canadian champion. He defeated Eugene Huat, French champion, and drew with Emil Pladner, the other French star.

Tommy after losing a sensational fight to Baby Face Casanova here late in 1932 has won four straight so far this year.

The Filipino took two decisions from Joe Ticken, stopped Al Citrino and defeated Baby Arizmendi—all northern fights.

### CHALKY WRIGHT GETS BIG TEST

*Blake's Fighter Conceded  
Edge Over Filipino*

*Colored Boy Faces Strong  
Opponent in Cohen*

*Olympic Has Two Important  
Bouts on Bill*

Pete Sanstol of Oslo, Norway, and Young Tommy of Manila, Philippine Islands, may revise the bantamweight rankings after their ten-round Olympic bout tonight.

The East rates Sanstol one-two with Al Brown, the champion. The West tabs Tommy as Speedy Dado's foremost rival.

The eight-round semifinal featuring Chalky Wright and Mickey Cohen of Cleveland is just as good a betting bout as the main event.

Sanstol and Wright are the favorites, but neither is by any means a cinch.

The Scandinavian throws so much leather and is so hard to hit Tommy will have to score a knockdown or two to get an even break probably. Wright has made a great reputation against preliminary opponents, but Cohen has been fighting top men in his division.

Hollywood's fans saw Sanstol whip an up-and-coming featherweight, Georgie Hansford. He could not slug with Hansford, but he didn't need to try it to win.

George Blake, now handling Sanstol, thinks he boxes much like Young Griffio. The chief change Blake has made in Sanstol is to make him shorten up his right hand.
