

SANSTOL, TOMMY FEATURED FIGHTERS ON

Norwegian Scrapper Faces Hard Puncher; Wright Meets Cohen

Main Eventers Compare Closely; Blake's Bantam Displays Class

Pete Sanstol, young and rugged Norwegian bantamweight who succeeds Fidel LaBarba in the George Blake stable, starts in his own class tonight. He meets Young Tommy, Filipino rival of Speedy Dado, in the Olympic's ten-round main event.

The Norwegian proved he was a sterling fighter when he defeated Georgie Hansford in his first start in California. Hansford couldn't hit him.

Tommy is more experienced than Hansford and is a very accurate puncher so Sanstol has his work cut out for him. Both boys have fast lefts, but if their rights are

compared the Filipino gets the best of it.

However the general opinion is that Tommy will have to score some effective blows with his right or lose the decision on points. Sanstol is known as a little leather-thrower.

The Scandinavian bobs and weaves and crouches, making his head a difficult target. He also is a fast starter, while Tommy's one

fault is that he doesn't get going until four or five rounds.

The eighth round semi-windup between Chalky Wright and Mickey Cohen figures to be as closely contested as the main event. Wright hasn't boxed as good opponents as Cohen, but the fact that Baby Arizmendi and Freddie Miller ducked him has boomed his stock upwards.

Cohen is a Boyle Heights boy who went back to Cleveland to do his fighting. He has beaten boys like Johnny Datto, Dominic Petrone and Phil Zwick and drew with Johnny Farr and Eddie Shea. He lost to Tommy Paul.

Johnny Keyes brought Cohen back home, and if the Jewish boy whips a boy like Wright the featherweight class will have another top-notch contender.

The Tommy-Sanstol bout is being fought at 120 pounds, catchweights for both. Tommy is slated to box Dado within 60 days for the Coast bantamweight title by order of the commission. If the Filipino loses to Sanstol he may lose the Dado fight.

Last year a poll of sports writers throughout the country voted Sanstol second in the ratings to Al Brown, the champion. Brown holds two 15-round decisions over the Norwegian. At Montreal, Sanstol defeated Eugene Huat and drew with Emil Pladner.

Sanstol Looms as Favorite For Olympic Bout Tomorrow

Spring street boys are of the opinion Young Tommy will never hit Pete Sanstol—modern shadow

of Young Griffio. Sanstol makes his second appearance in Los Angeles at the Olympic tomorrow night against the Filipino, Tommy, after giving Georgie Hansford a "ducking" at Hollywood.

If Tommy can't hit Sanstol and if Sanstol throws leather like it was running off of a flywheel belt the favorite is decidedly Scandinavian in the coming bantamweight bout.

Hollywood is dark this week because of the date. It will be Good Friday.

ASKS FOR TOMMY

American Legion fans got a once-over of Sanstol against a young, rugged, hard-hitting, right-hand crazy boy named Hansford.

Sanstol made Hansford miss enough to lose the fight and the

blows he landed were the "gravy" that gave him an unquestioned decision.

George Blake used to pick opponents he figured Fidel LaBarba could beat. Sometimes they were too one-sided to be interesting.

After the boy from Oslo, Norway, had beaten Hansford and become California acclimated a bit Blake asks for Tommy or Dado. He gets Tommy because Dado has been trying to be a featherweight for the past few weeks.

In his last start Tommy whipped Baby Arizmendi, the Mexican rival who beat LaBarba in Mexico and would never give him another bout.

THE PRELIMS

The semi-final between Chalky Wright and Mickey Cohen runs the Sanstol-Tommy fight a close race for honors in interest. Cohen is a better fighter on his record than Wright because he has fought the Johnny Farris, Eddie Sheas, Varias Millings and Tommy Pauls. Locally Wright has many supporters who think he can lick Miller, featherweight champion.

Other bouts are: Harry Thomas vs. Tommy Souza, Hoyt Jones vs. Stanley Sharp and Joe Goeders vs. Patsy Flannigan.



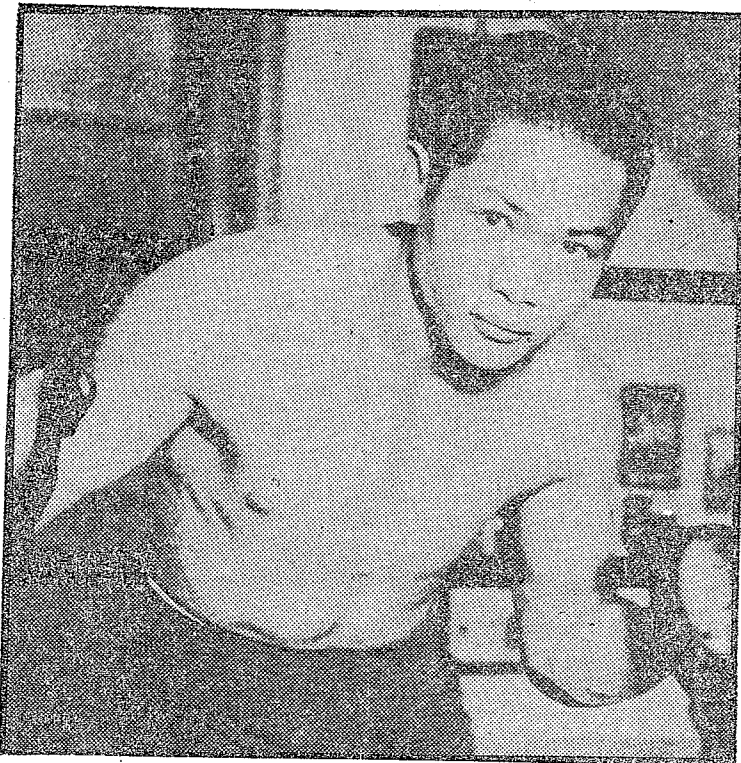

OLYMPIC PROGRAM TONIGHT

ON SPOT TUESDAY NIGHT



These boys are on the spot at the Olympic tomorrow night. Young Tommy, left, has a chance at Speedy Dado and the state title if he does not lose to Pete Sanstol, right. Sanstol is also in the middle, since he is fighting for local recognition.

If Young Tommy beats Pete Sanstol—Norway's son—it will not cause much of a ripple.

But if Sanstol whips Tommy—rated neck and neck with Speedy Dado for Pacific coast bantamweight honors—it will be an event.

And the wise boys are getting down on Sanstol when he tackles Tommy at the Olympic tomorrow night in his second California test after making Georgie Hansford "miss" his way out of the decision at Hollywood.

FOUGHT BROWN

Sanstol, who has twice fought Al Brown—15-round fights, is a will o' the wisp kid from the land where they have the midnight sun four months of the year.

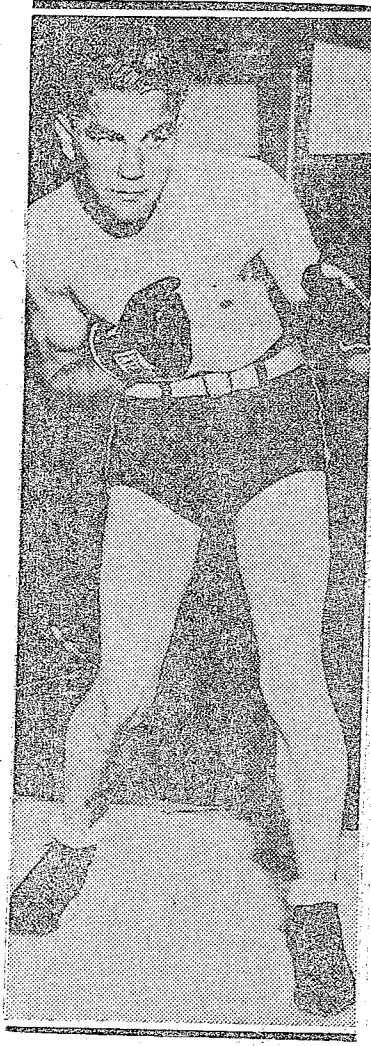
He is as hard to hit as a target in a revolving flywheel. Here he is and there he isn't.

The crowd at the Manhattan gymnasium, presided over by Mrs. Barney Dempsey, thinks that Sanstol will make Tommy hit somebody in the audience. He will start punching like an adding machine and he will evaporate before every lead the Filipino makes.

However, Tommy has made a lot of boxing friends during the year and a half he has operated in the United States.

TOMMY HERO

The time Tommy fought Baby Arizmendi it out-drew any other



Mexican-Filipino card and although he lost, the Filipino was the hero. The same happened when he tackled Baby Face Casanova. Tommy lost the decision, but got credit for making one of the best fights the Olympic had in 1932.

More recently Tommy beat Arizmendi. And if he fights Dado within 60 days as the commission has ordered he will be either favorite or even money. Tommy is classed among those that are "coming"—not "going."

The Chalky Wright-Mickey Cohen semi-final has promise of running the Sanstol-Tommy fight a sharp race for being a classic. Around Wright there has been built up a feeling that he is a better featherweight than Arizmendi and should have fought Freddie Miller. But Chalky has been held out of the picture because he hadn't proven "boxoffice."

The other bouts tomorrow night are: Harry Thomas vs. Tommy Souza, Hoyt Jones vs. Stanley Sharp and Joe Goeders vs. Patsy Flannigan.
