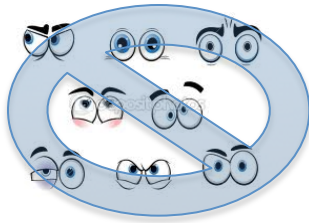
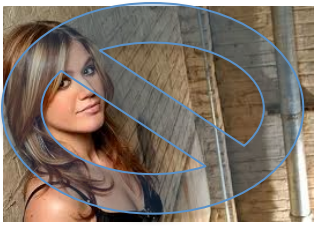
- Idea that the world is in constant flux and that
