

MINIATURE STATUETTES OF LIBERTY.

The committee in charge of the construction of the pedestal and the erection of the statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World," in order to raise more funds for its completion, have prepared from models furnished by the artist a perfect fac simile miniature statuette, which they are delivering to subscribers throughout the United States. It is estimated that \$40,000 is yet needed to pay for the iron fastenings and the erection of the statue. Liberal subscriptions for the miniature statuettes will, it is believed, produce the desired amount, and Richard Butler, the Secretary of the American Committee of the Statue of Liberty, whose office is at No. 33 Mercer-street, has undertaken to dispose of them. The smallest statuette is six inches in height, the figure being bronzed and the pedestal nickel-silvered, and is sold at \$1 delivered. A larger size is sold at \$5. It is 12 inches in height, and beautifully bronzed and nicked. One 12 inches in height, finely chased, with the statue bronzed and the pedestal heavily silver-plated, with a plush stand, is sold at \$10.
