

# YANKEES, PIRATES CLINCH PENNANTS

## World Series Starts Oct. 5 —Ted Williams Retires

The New York Yankees and the Pittsburgh Pirates clinched the major league baseball pennants yesterday. They will meet in the world series, starting Oct. 5.

The Yankees defeated the Boston Red Sox, 4—3, and won their tenth American League title in a dozen years under Manager Casey Stengel. The Pirates clinched their first National League title in thirty-three years when the Chicago Cubs defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5—0, and mathematically eliminated the Cards.

The first two games of the series will be played in Pittsburgh on Oct. 5 and 6. After a one-day break, the series will resume in New York for three games in a row, if a fifth game is necessary. If neither team has won the required four games by then, the sixth and seventh games will be played in Pittsburgh on Oct. 12 and 13.

The Yankees and the Pirates met once before in the world series—in 1927. The Yankees won in four straight games.

In another baseball development, the Boston Red Sox said that Ted Williams, who has won six American League batting championships, would retire. He will remain with the club as a batting coach.
