

TO DRUM UP CONTRIBUTIONS.

The Sons of the Revolution report that they are receiving a very satisfactory response from the public to their appeal for a national subscription to the pedestal of "Liberty Enlightening the World." They wish by one pull all together to place the full amount necessary to complete the pedestal in the treasury. They have received a favorable response from a large number of the steamboat owners to their requests that orders be issued to the steamboats under their control to salute the statue in course of erection in passing the same from now on as a notice to every one hearing the whistles that the funds are still incomplete. They have also requested every theatre in the city to place on their programme, until the fund is made up, the "Marseillaise." On Saturday Wadsworth Post, G. A. R., Flute and Drum Corps, and the Battalion of the Grenadiers Rochambeau will assemble at the Battery at 2 o'clock and march to the Produce Exchange, where they will play the "Marseillaise," "America," and other national airs, and receive from the committee of the Produce Exchange, long ago appointed, their contribution to the fund. From there they will march to the Cotton Exchange, receiving their contribution; thence to the Stock Exchange, giving their concert at the base of the Washington statue. They will then march up Broadway to Twenty-third-street, finishing the concert at the Worth monument. They will be accompanied by the committee, and will have boxes carried by Sons of the Veterans to receive contributions to the fund all along the line. At 8 o'clock in the evening the committee of the various Exchanges and other organizations will meet with them at Parlor F of the Fifth-Avenue Hotel, where the money will be counted. The public is requested to have their contributions, large and small, ready to drop in the boxes as the Sons of the Veterans and the Grenadiers march up Broadway.
