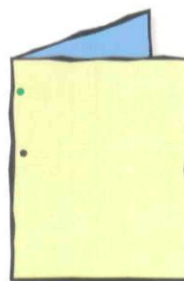


Go Fly a Kite!

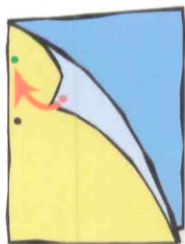

Making the Kite

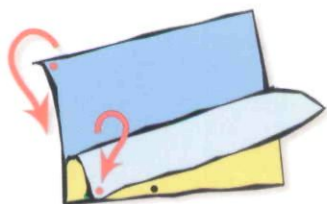
Ask a grownup to help you cut, fold, staple, and attach string to your kite.



1 Cut out the kite along the solid black line, then fold it in half along the dashed black line.

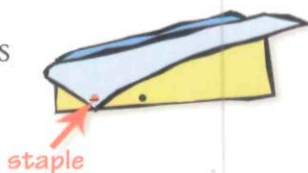


2 Bend a corner with a red dot to meet the green dot along the fold. Be careful not to crease the paper.

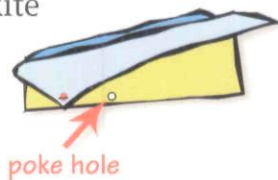


3 Repeat step 2 on the other side.

4 Staple the corners in place.



5 Use a hole punch or the point of a pen to poke a hole through the kite at the black dot.

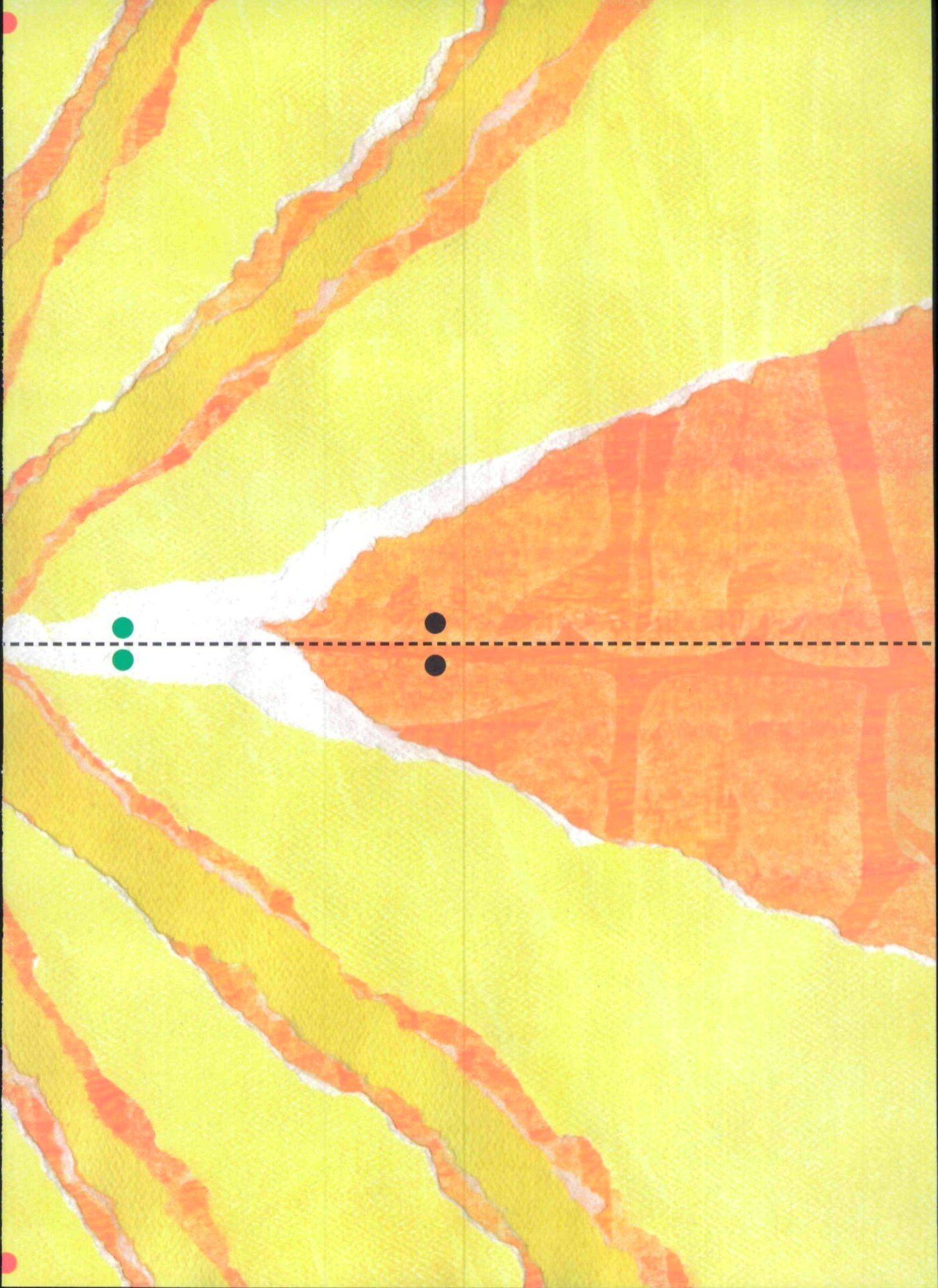


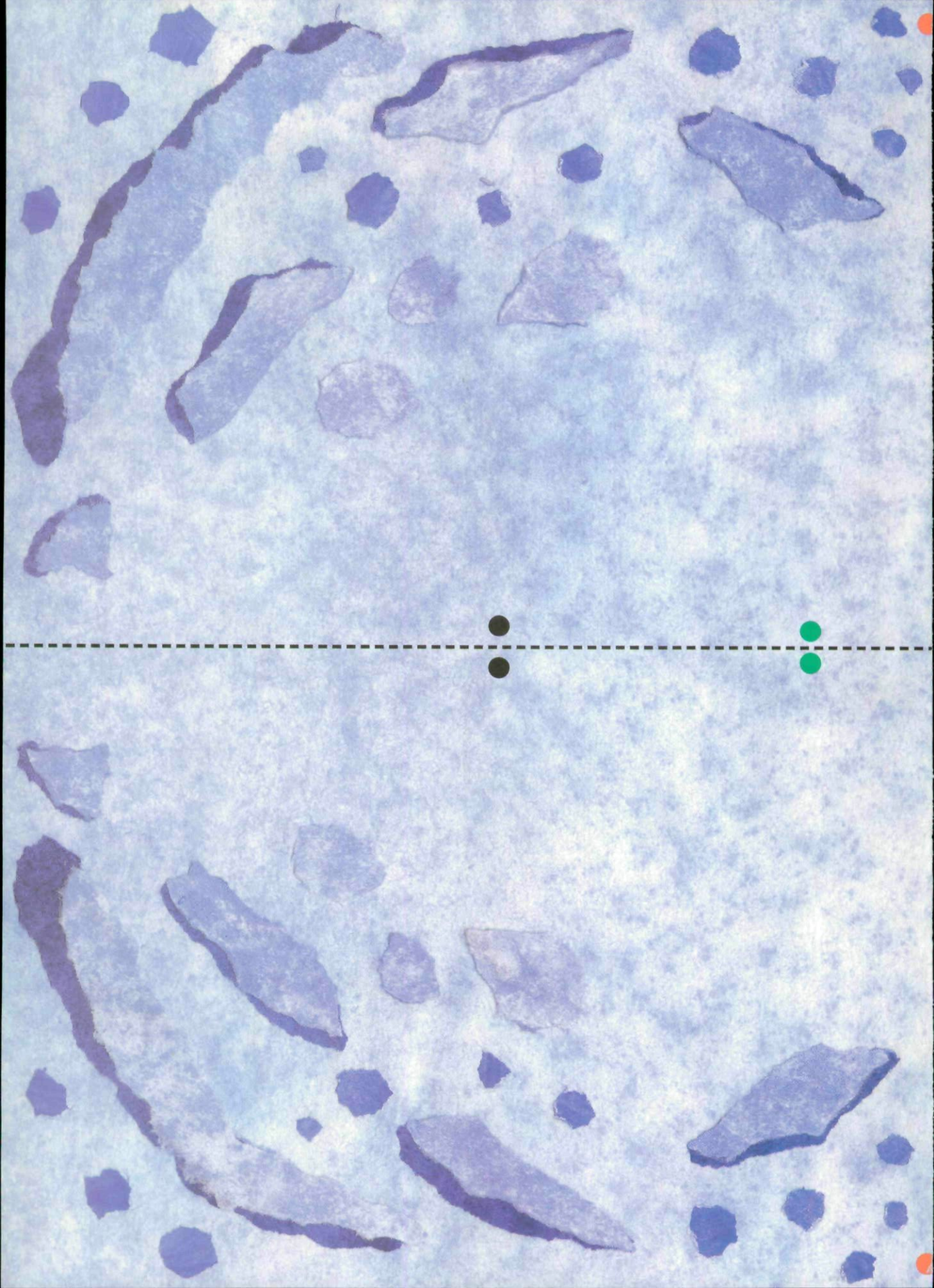
6 Push a piece of string or strong thread through the hole, and tie a knot to attach the string to the kite.



7 Have fun flying the kite outside on a breezy day. If there isn't enough wind, try running with the kite or twirling it over your head.







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
